
Cheer Camp registration

Parmer County Commissioners met Monday in the county courtroom in Farwell.

Requests from the Bovina ISD and Lazbuddie ISD to withdraw funds from the Parmer County Permanent School Fund were approved. Bovina ISD will receive \$760,665 to be used in the construction of a new gym facility. Lazbuddie's total was \$66,013 to be used for facility maintenance.

Earl Behrends spoke to the commissioners about the watershed structures along Running Water Draw. They signed an agreement with software company Indigent Healthcare Systems to monitor inmate medical care and renewed a lease agreement with Efrain Balli for the county roll-off box.

A new roadgrader purchase for use in Precinct 4 was approved and continuing education hours for Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace Pam Haseloff was approved.

Commissioners voted to maintain the County Extension Agent's position after the resignation of current agent James Graves. Two positions in the extension office are currently vacant.

Parmer County Sheriff Randy Geries reported that through the Texas Association of Counties he received a grant to purchase all reflective vests for deputies and a body camera.

Forest Service urges caution during Fourth of July holiday

As Texans from around the state make plans of picnics with family and friends, parades through town squares and fireworks displays after dark, Texas A&M Forest Service urges caution with outdoor activities such as grilling, campfires and fireworks.

"According to the National Fire Protection Association, July 4th has the most fires reported than on any other day and fireworks account for two out of five of those fires - more than any other cause of fire," TFS Mitigation and Prevention

Department Head Bruce Woods said. Due to the recent rains in May and June the potential for wildfire has decreased across much of the state. However, Texas A&M Forest Service encourages everyone to use caution and stay safe this Independence Day.

"Though the rains have helped decrease wildfire potential, it has produced a lot of tall grass across the state this summer. It's best to play it safe and avoid these areas for your fireworks fun; especially when using aerials," Tom

Spencer, TFS predictive services department head said.

Fireworks safety tips:

- Before you celebrate, always check with local government officials to ensure fireworks and outdoor burning are allowed in your county. Be sure to comply with all restrictions.

- Read and follow all warnings and instruction labels on fireworks.

- Use fireworks only under close adult supervision and in safe areas away from structures, dry grass and brush.

- Keep a hose, bucket of water and wet towels nearby in case of a malfunction or fire.

- Dispose of used fireworks in a bucket of water.

- Never ignite fireworks in a container, especially a glass or metal container.

Note: Burn bans and fireworks restrictions are determined by county government. Texas A&M Forest Service does not take a position on the use of fireworks, nor does the agency determine, set or lift restrictions.







America is being able to write a letter to the government telling them what you think can be don and knowing it will be read and considered.


America is knowing when you get home there will be something to eat so you do not starve.

DRT staff were only able to reenter the library after the Daughters received a temporary restraining order against Commissioner Bush and the GLO.

> Lamont Jefferson, who negotiated the settlement on behalf of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, said he was pleased with the result.

> "The Daughters of the Republic of Texas are a respected organization of women who honor and preserve our state's history. This lawsuit was about protecting individual liberties against the overreach of the state." Jefferson said. "This settlement will allow the Daughters to return to their work telling the story of Texas, which they have done so well now for almost 125 years."

> Edwards said the more than 7,000 members of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas are up to the task.







stock producers looking at green pastures, most know it can turn dry quickly and may want protection against drought loss on annual forage crops, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service specialist.

The first deadline to sign up for the Rainfall Index - Annual Forage Insurance plan, known as RI-AF, is coming in July, said DeDe Jones, AgriLife Extension risk management specialist in Amarillo.

The risk policy is designed to allow livestock producers to look at possible future weather conditions and buy protection against losses due to a lack of moisture, Jones said.

The sign-up deadline for RI-AF is July 15 for the fall growing season, Sept. 1 through March 31,

the spring season, which is March 1-Sept. 30, 2017.

Jones said RI-AF is similar to Pasture Range and Forage Insurance, or PRF insurance, but the difference lies in the type of commodity covered. PRF covers perennial grasses, rangeland and hay types, while RI-AF is for annual forage crops, such as wheat, oats, rye and triticale in the fall or Sudan grass, haygrazer, dryland sorghum silage and millet in the spring.

Payment is not determined by individual damages, but rather area losses based on a grid system, she said. RI-AF requires coverage on all certified acres not intended for grain production, and the same crop can't be covered on both a multiperil policy and RI-AF policy. Coverage levels between 70 are available, she said. A loss is triggered when actual rainfall for an area is less than the chosen coverage level for the time period selected. Producers also choose a protec-

tion factor between 60 and 150 percent, which is a price multiplier that allows an increase or decrease in the policy's base value. Each county has a base value established by the Risk Management Agency. Once coverage is selected,

participants must divide coverage among three two-month intervals per growing season, Jones said. There are seven months in each growing season, and months of cor/erage cannot overlap.

To sign up, producers should contact their local crop insurance agent, Jones said.

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
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



Windmills, Then and Now, Prairie Progress on the Plains

Wind powered machines are not new, in fact the first ones originated in Persia (now Iran) around 500-600 AD. These had sails or vanes on a vertical axis. Most ancient mills were used to grind grain. By the 1100's the windmill had spread to Europe, where a horizontal shaft was added to the basic design. The Dutch used windmills to drain water from the fields in addition to grinding grain into flour. Dutch mills had four large arms or wooden slats called sails. The Chinese also used windmills earlier for water pumping, but the designs are not well documented. The first European windmills in America appeared in Jamestown in 1621.

American mechanic, Daniel Halladay, created the first selfgoverning American windmill in 1854. John Burnham's contribution to the design was the hydraulic ram in 1840. Over 50 U.S. patents were issued during the 1850's for the 'self-governing' windmill that could operate without human attention (except for oiling or greasing of course). In addition to the Halladay Standard, other models included the Wheeler's Paddle-Bladed in 1867, Eclipse in 1873, the Vaneless Monitor in 1880, the Fairbanks, Morse and Co. and the Aermotor in 1890's and the Red



Star in 1899.

The windmill proved essential to the development of the American West when a water source was the greatest need. Native Americans and early settlers used natural 'streams and springs' which were few and far about \$1.5 million each. between, but a more consistent supply was needed. A necessary compliment to any windmill is the well underneath. The first well on Charles Goodnight's ranch was dug in 1886. In the the windmills. The wind millers Texas Panhandle, the water was deep and the wind currents high. The windmill at Yellow House on the XIT stood 132 feet high. Well diggers hand dug many wells-can you imagine digging a well \$1.50 per foot for the first 150 feet and \$2.00 per foot for the next 100 feet?! A well 444 ft. deep could cost \$600.

Oiling or greasing the mill was a dangerous job and most folks said, "No climbing the tower!" "Wind millers" and their crews went around oiling and repairing used 'chuck boxes' much as the early cowboys did while fixing fence. An oil change on later models entailed draining the oil, "BE SURE NO OIL GETS INTO YOUR WELL!" and refilling it. 'Pulling the wire' technology allowed oiling from the ground. Self-oilers came along in 1930 and used about 1/2 gallon For the first 20 years, all of the of oil while wind turbines today use 10 gallons of oil.

water source for steam locomotives, most all of the windmills were made of steel and iron. Water stations were located about every three miles or so.

Parts of a windmill are very basic: wheel or fan, rotor, gears, shaft, tower, brake and vane even on the new wind turbines; and whether the use was for grinding grain, pumping water or generating electricity, basic operation is the same. Windmills, assembled on the ground, were then hoisted or pulled into place from the ground and the fan or blades were attached with a gin pole. The bonnet, or helmet covered the gear box. Cost of the mill itself was about \$30 at one time. The wheels came in 8, 10 and 12 feet in diameter.


houses on the prairie' when oil lamps hung from the windmill towers could be seen at night for long distances. Windmills in the panhandle were also used for natural gas and for oil but were not as efficient as other means. One of the more unusual uses of windmill was in Las Vegas, NM where the tower was used as a gallows for hangings.

I remember drinking from a windmill on a trip with my dad many years ago. And Dr. Cash shows us the many unusual visitors to the windmill tank through his wonderful photography. 
