You will need to present your Medicare card and drivers license at the time of the injection. For all other vaccination recipients the cost for the injection is \$29.00.

Everyone in Parmer County is invited to come out and enjoy hamburgers cooked by Cargill and the Friona Noon Lions Club "World Famous" French fries as well as games, music, prize giveaways and much more.

The National Night Out (NNO) is a cooperative effort designed to bring communities together with Law Enforcement and First Responder agencies. The NNO promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make neighborhoods safer, better places to live.

The NNO was an offshoot of the National Association of Town Watch (NATW) which was founded by Matt A. Peskin in March of 1981. The NNO enhances the relationship between neigh-

bors and law enforcement while bringing back a true sense of community while providing a great opportunity to bring everyone together under positive circumstances.

*Chips and other garnishments are allowed for presentation purposes. Leal's will provide the chips for the tasting to each contestant.

*Salsa will be judged on appearance, taste and texture.

*Appearance scores will be judged on the attractiveness of the entire presentation.

City council sets two meetings

A special city council meeting will be held Friday September 30 at 7:30 a.m. to consider an ordinance amending the budget providing for excess revenue and expenditure of additional funds for the operation and maintenance for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2016.

Action will be taken on moving money from the fire department roof repair to the community center roof repair for the 2016-2017 fiscal year. Action is also requested to move money from an employee water

department to salaries regular employees wastewater department in the 2016-2017 budget year.

The regular city council meeting will be held Monday October 3 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers, 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

The council will consider an annual resolution designating the Friona Star as the city's official newspaper. They will consider a resolution for professional service procurement for engineering services for

the Community Development Block Grant application.

Departmental report from the police department will be heard. The usual accounts payable, financial statement for September, and quarterly financial statement ending September 30 will be discussed and approved.

The city proposes the disposal of records management control series that the maximum time has expired to allow destruction. It will be discussed for approval. They will consider a request for a carport vari-

ance on the southwest corner of the Templo Damaso Church located at 403 Woodland.

The above agenda items

are temporary and subject to change. The final official agenda is posted at city hall 72 hours prior to the meeting.

Voter ID is still required in Texas. For ID requirements go to parmercounty.org to see a list of acceptable forms of identification.

Commissioners reject security bids

Parmer County Commissioners met Monday September 26 in the county court room in Farwell.

A proposal for an Elevate Youth Program for Juveniles was not approved after consulting with the county juvenile officer.

The Sheriff's fees were approved for 2017 with no changes. Commissioners voted to skip the regular meeting on October 10 due to it being a holiday. The next meeting will be October 24th.

Lawn service for the courthouse and sheriff's office was approved at \$700.00 per month. The contract was awarded to Andrea Griswold who has had the contract and it was continued.

A one-year service agreement with UniFirst was approved. UniFirst picks up and services the mats and rugs at the courthouse and the detention center.

Two bids to provide the update for courthouse and sheriff's office security video were rejected. Commissioners hired a consulting firm for technical assistance on what is needed before bidding the security again.

Sheriff Geries gave the commissioners an update on the National Night Out activities that will be held in Farwell October 4th.

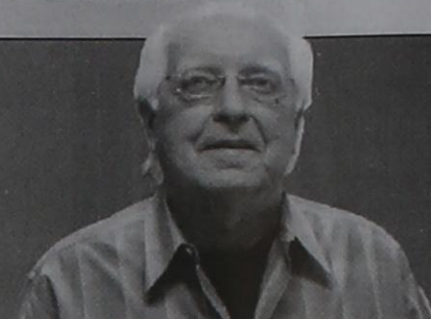

Apparently Bear didn't con-

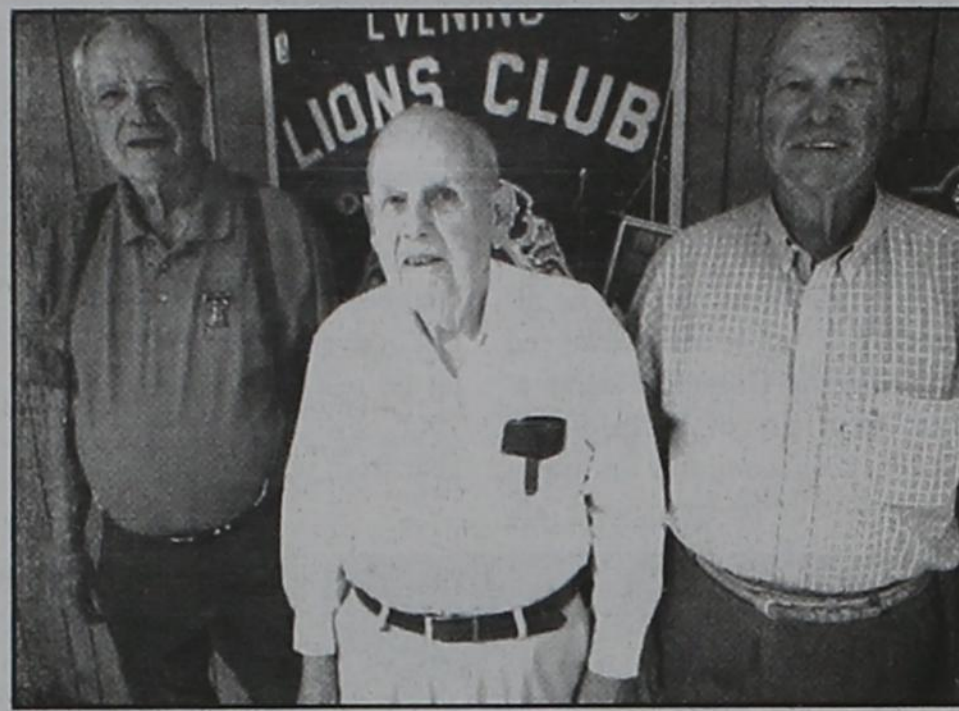
sider he went with the trade, because he has adjusted to the new pickup now, Tannahill says. Perhaps he was just irked because he wasn't consulted ahead of time.

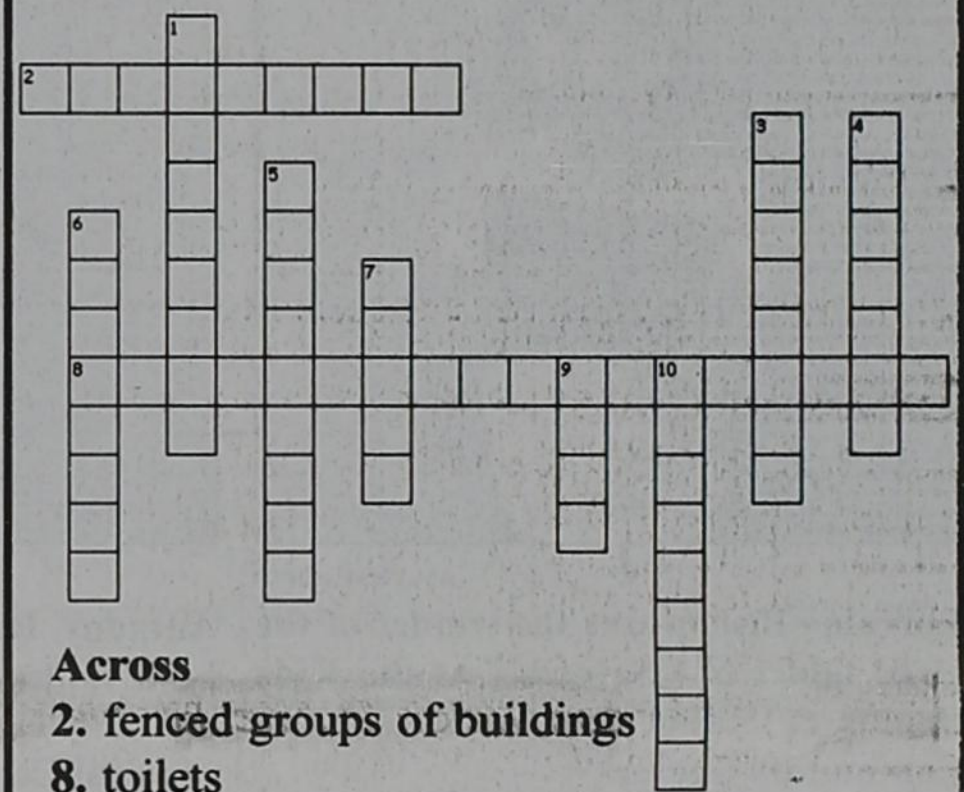
There's No Place Like Home

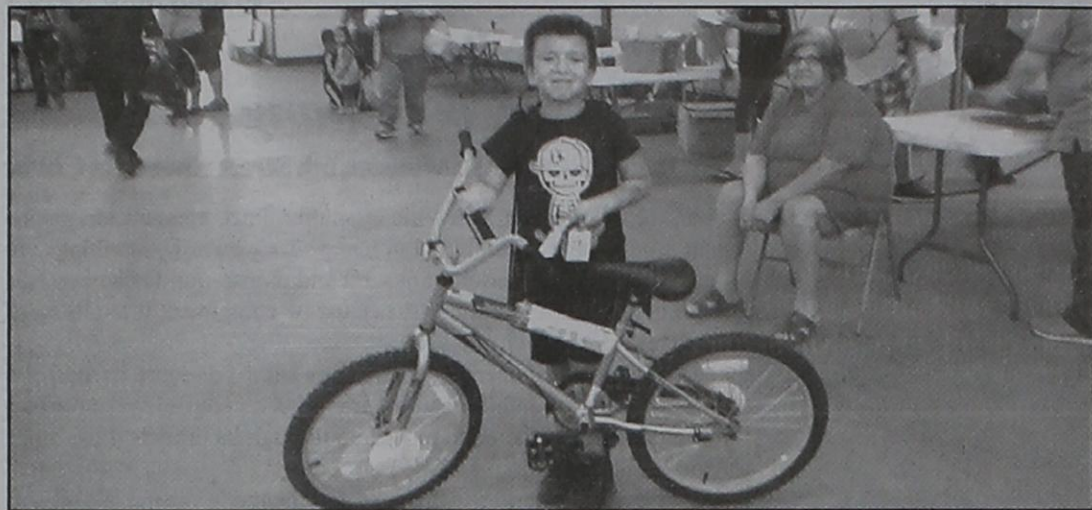

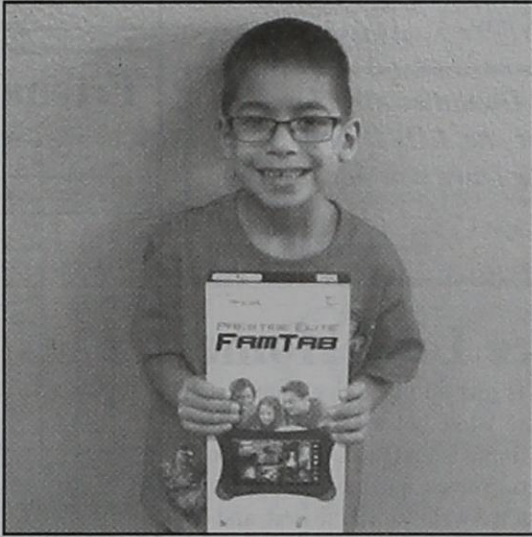

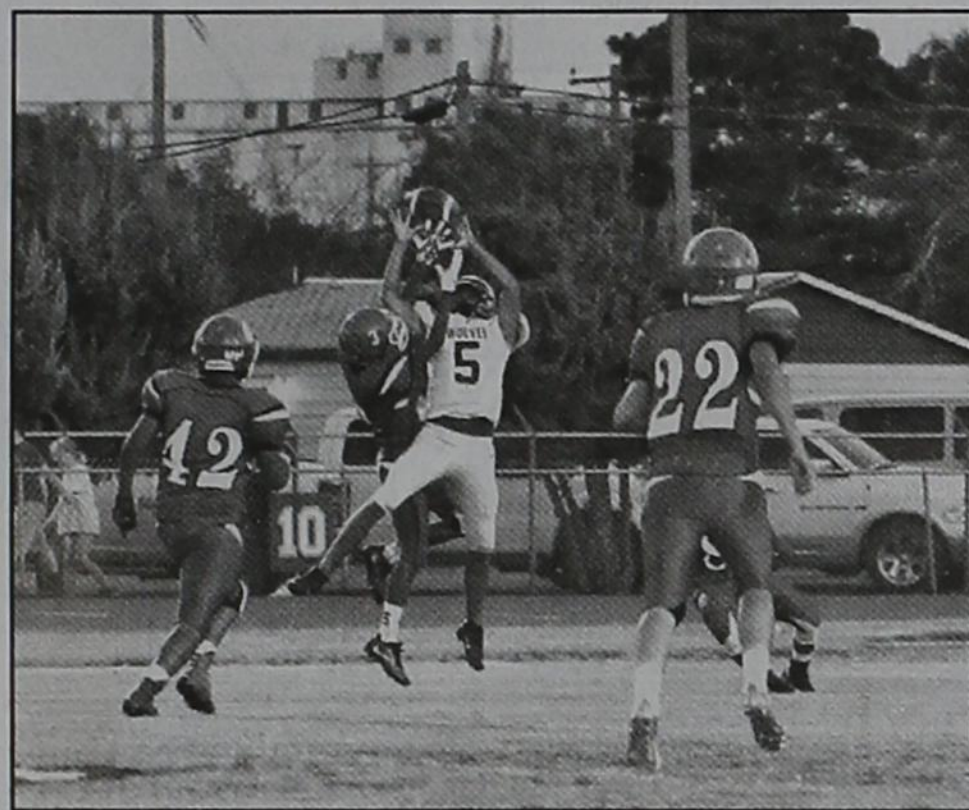

The JV scored a knockout with a 25-13, 25-13 win. The ladies continued to pass well and serve consistent to put pressure on the

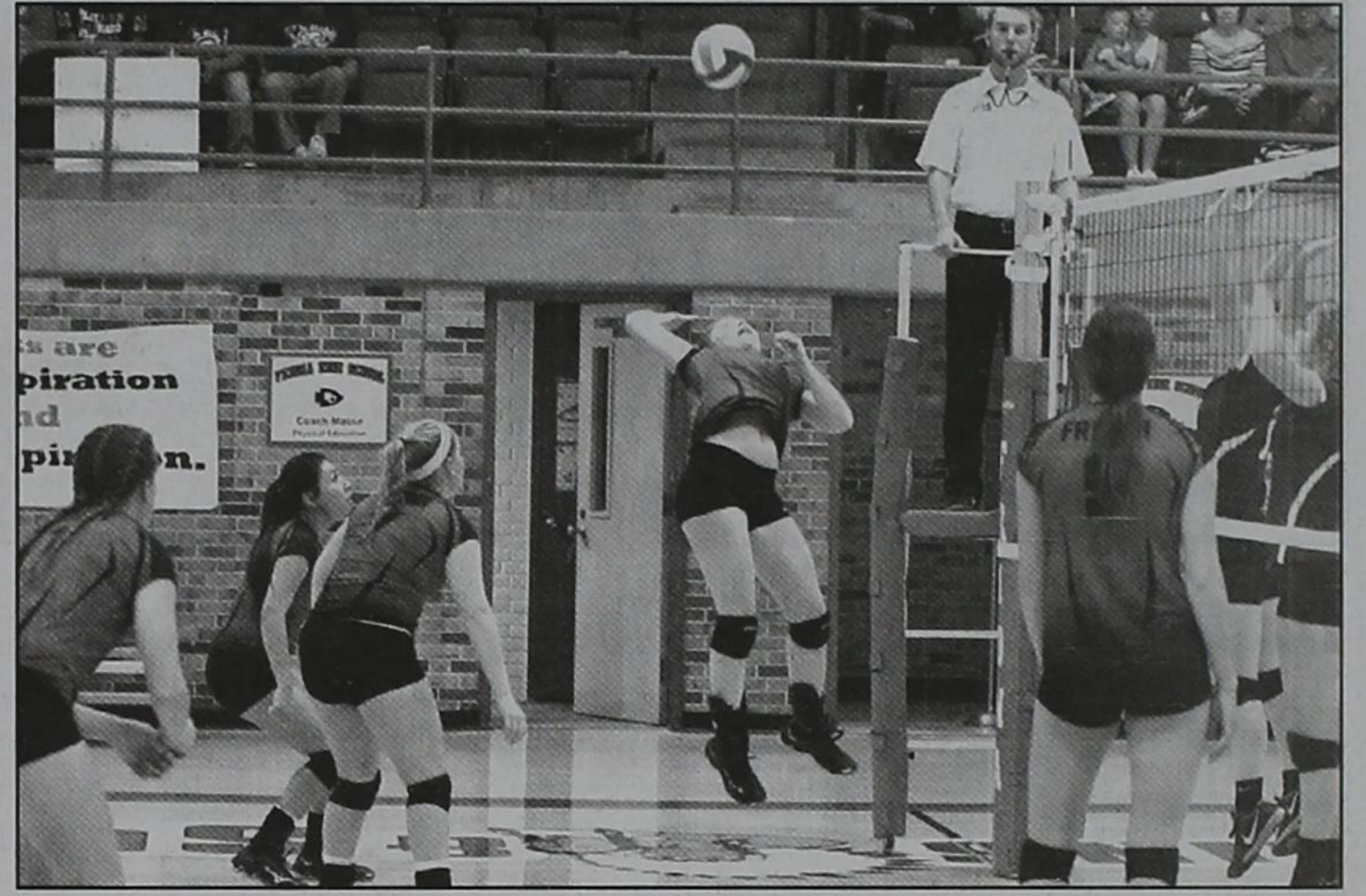
Fillies. The JV continues to improve and is starting to become a multiple threat offensive team.

Planting sorghums early might help reduce sugarcane aphid damages

Every year is a learning year right now for Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service entomologists and anyone else dealing with the sugarcane aphid, both on grain sorghum and forage sorghum in the Texas High Plains.

"We have a lot more information about grain sorghum than we do on the forage sorghum," said Dr. Ed Bynum, AgriLife Extension entomologist at Amarillo.

Bynum, participating in a recent forage sorghum turn-of-row meeting near Bushland, said the crops are pretty close to each other, the major difference being the grain sorghums are shorter and the forage sorghums are taller and have more leaf area.

"But I think the type of damage the sugarcane aphid is causing is basically going to be the same regardless of whether it's forage sorghum or grain sorghum."

What is known, he said, is the amount of yield loss is greater in grain sorghums when infestations become established in the whorl stage than during the flowering and grain-filling stages.

"We know when infestations get started in the whorl stage and you don't do anything to protect the sorghum, you can

have as much as 80 to 100 percent yield loss in that grain sorghum," Bynum said.

"So, I would expect that it would be similar to that in these forages. Looking at the forage sorghum plots, what was evident is where infestations were really heavy, they were not putting on the amount of grain as others that did not have as heavy an infestation."

Bynum said specific data will be coming in after Dr. Jourdan Bell, AgriLife Extension agronomist in Amarillo, and her team measure the grain yield, silage yield and quality.

While the biggest expected damage from the sugarcane aphid is the loss of grain yield, he said it also weakens the stalk. So in forage sorghums that grow taller, weak stalks could result in a lot of lodging.

Another thing worth noting, Bynum said, is the grain sorghum trials infested at the grain-filling and dough growth stages saw yield losses of only about 20 percent.

"So there is a lot of difference between when the sugarcane aphids begin to build up in the grain sorghums and also the forage sorghums, I believe," he said. "The question is, what kind of management practices can you do to try to avoid the level of damage you get?"

After two years of infestations in the High Plains, he said they know the aphids generally are brought in from the South.

"They don't overwinter north of Amarillo, or haven't in the last two years, so we know that the aphids have to be blown back in here," Bynum said.

In the South Plains, they begin infesting sorghums in the early part of June and populations build in July, he said. But infestations the last two years in the Amarillo area and north haven't been seen until August and into September.

"Your management practices need to aim at avoiding the sugarcane aphids until you can get the forage sorghums at a later growth stage," Bynum said. "I would think that if you can adjust your planting dates and plant earlier, you can get into the field and get the crop up and get it cut before you get the sugarcane aphid damage."

The second part of the equation is controlling the sugarcane aphids, he said.

"What levels of control are you going to get when the sorghum is waist-high compared to when it is 5-feet tall or taller? We know the level of control is better if you can get better coverage within that canopy."

Bynum said two aerial insecticide applications were made to the forage sorghum field plots. The first application was with Transform at a rate of 2 ounces per acre, a high rate, trying to get good control.

"They did get a good level of control, but because of the pockets of infestations and sorghums that were taller than others, they still had areas that didn't get good control, so the aphids built back up," he said.

A second application of Silvanto was made about two and a half weeks later, at a rate of 6 ounces, and again some plots had good control while others didn't, Bynum said.

"It comes back to the amount of leaf canopy and it not allowing that chemical to get down into the plant," he said. "Try to scout as early as you can and if you find sugarcane aphids, try to get an application on as early as possible. You don't want to allow the population to build up and have to treat when plants are taller and there is more leaf area on the plant."
