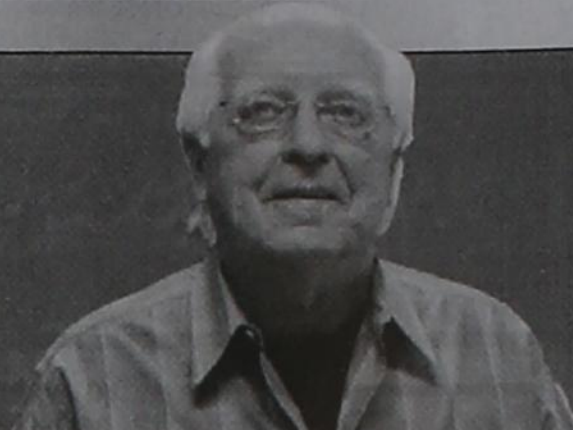

“A-F ACCOUNTABILITY - REALLY?”

In my third article for Make Education a Priority Month, I want to look at accountability. One of the new education “reforms” that came from the last legislative session was the new law that every campus in the state would be given a grade of A-F. According to politicians, this would be a way to let parents and our communities know how our schools are really doing in a language that they understand; because everyone can relate to a grade of A and how that compares to a grade of F.

So, let me ask you a question: If you were taking 18 hours of college classes and at the end of the semester, you made five A's and one F, would you consider yourself to be an A student or an F student? This is the problem with the one-size fits all accountability system that we currently operate under.

In his book The Pitfalls of Reform, John Tanner asks, “What if someone in a position of power insists you build a building that is pretty much guaranteed to fall down, threatens you with losing your job if you don't build it, and after it starts to crumble, points to you as the source of the failure?” In education, we have seen this process over and over again. The state tells us our schools are failing, so they devise a test. Over the course of a few years, our students prove they can pass the test at a high level, so the politicians say the test isn't hard enough. So, they devise another test – and this same process repeats itself. They have devised enough tests now that our current system is supposedly “predicting” whether or not our third graders are on track to be college and career ready. Really? Don't you think the motive is really to “prove” that we are failures so they can divert money to other places?

We have literally hundreds of classes, programs, projects, and experiments going on simultaneously in our schools. Our students are coding computers,

programming robots, building airplanes, taking college classes, and competing at the highest level in fine arts and athletics. We are also preparing our students for careers when they leave high school with a multitude of technical classes and certification programs. If you come to our campuses, you will see active classrooms with critical thinking, high level discussions, and real-world projects going on each day. Our students graduate and attend the finest colleges and universities, military institutes, and technical schools in the country.

However, under our current accountability system, the bulk of our grade of A-F will depend on a once-a-year, multiple choice, bubble test that our students have to sit quietly and take for up to 3-4 hours at a time. This test has been proven

to be defective, not statistically significant or reliable, and graded by minimum-wage employees hired off the Internet. The company making millions off this test cannot even guarantee their system will work when our students take the test online and also has a history of losing tests, sending them to the wrong schools, and grading them improperly. Is this really what our campuses should be graded on?

Throughout the entire testing debate, we never hear about how poor the test is. We never hear that we have spent well over a billion dollars on these tests over the past ten years. We never hear that there are other proven, nationally normed tests that actually diagnose where our students are and what steps we should take to give them the assistance

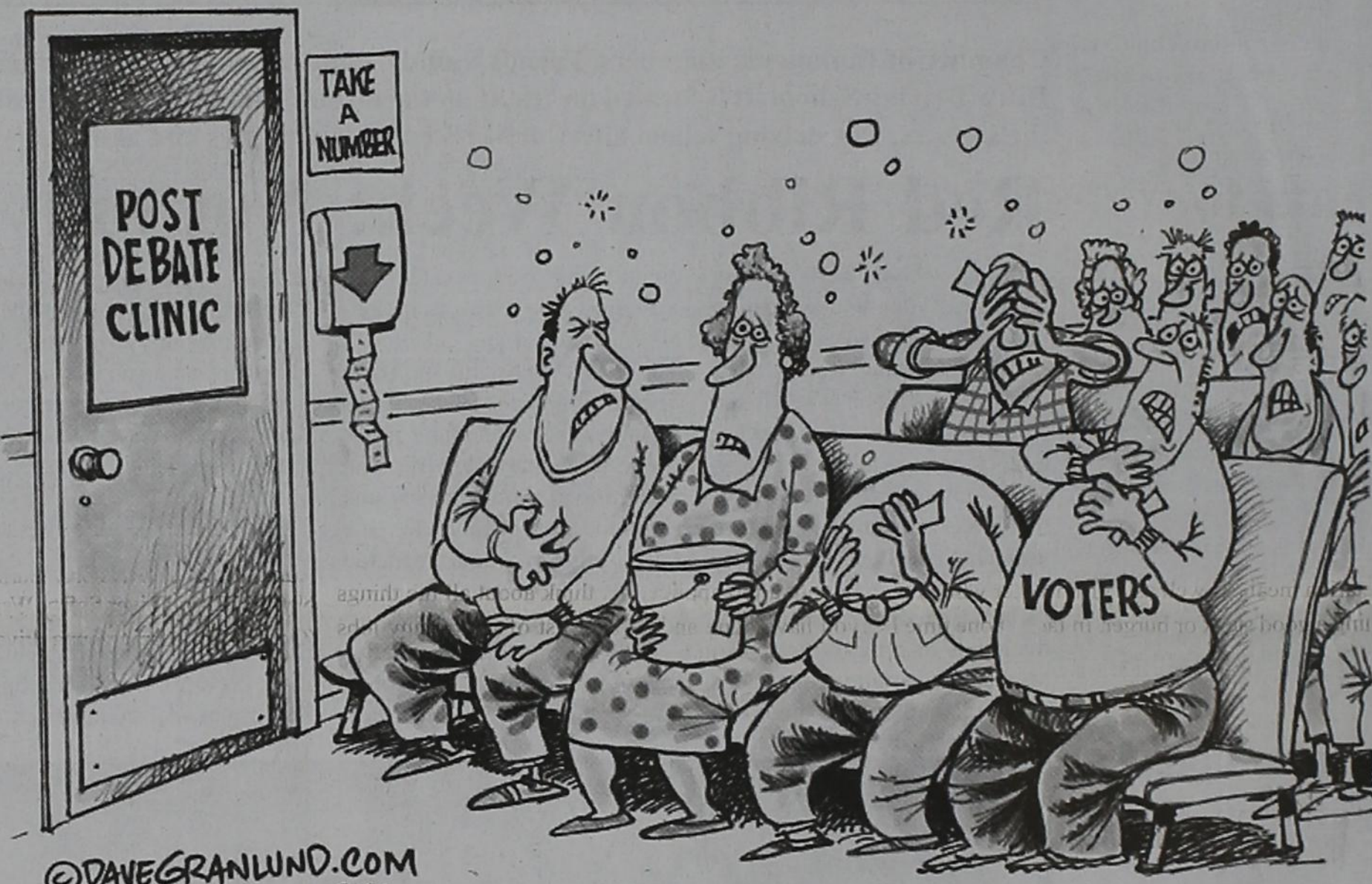
they need. Most importantly, we never hear about the thousands of professional educators who work hard every day actually teaching students in a classroom. If I were basing my knowledge of how well a student is doing in class, I will take the word of a professional educator who is with that student every day over the results of a one-time-a-year multiple choice test.

If politicians really want to see how well we are doing in public schools, they should rely on statistically reliable diagnostic tests that let parents know what level their child is on and ways to improve. These tests should not be used to pit schools against each other by giving campuses arbitrary grades that have no meaning. They should also come up with a system that tracks our

students when they leave our schools – how many are graduating on time, going to college, technical schools, the military, or to meaningful jobs? Aren't those the numbers that really matter?

In our current climate of politics and public education in Texas, our focus, energies, and dollars should return to educating children rather than pitting us against each other. Public education is the most important thing we do as a state. We should all be working together to make sure we are doing the best job we can to prepare our future generation.

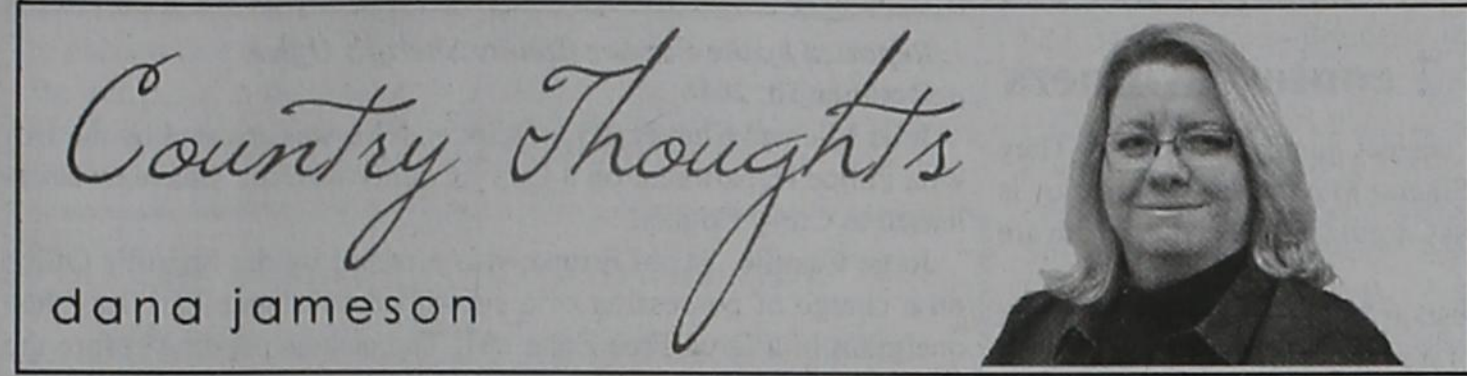

News from the week of October 17, 1963

*A fund drive to finance an addition to Parmer County Community Hospital was begun in Friona this week. It is hoped that funds can be raised in a short time, so their construction on the much needed rooms can begin soon.

Plans call for the addition of 10 new private rooms to the hospital, at a cost of approximately \$75,000. The rooms, which will measure 13 by 14-6, will be designed to convert into semi-private rooms, and actually give the hospital room for an additional 20 beds.

*Rose Ann Greeson, daughter of Mrs. Lester Dean, was crowned football queen during pregame ceremonies at the Homecoming game last Friday.

*Frona Lanes will close its doors on November 15, announced Ed Hicks owner. He said the reason

for closing the bowling alley was strictly its financial standing.

*Kay Burleson, a Texas Tech freshman from Friona, has been named Brigade Sweetheart by Tech's Army ROTC cadet corps.

*The Friona Chiefs can claim the unofficial "Parmer County Championship" after its win last Friday.

While the Chiefs don't meet Lazbuddie, their 38-0 win over Bovina gave them a clean slate against the

two county rivals which were met this, since Farwell was beaten 26-13 in the season opener, Friona ran its season record to 6-0.

*Frona will remain in District 4-AA for the next two years, but the district alignment has been changed. Leaving the district are Muleshoe and Morton. New teams in the district next year will be Abemathy, Floydada and Lockney. Olton and Dimmitt remain district foes.

DPS urges teen drivers to stay alert

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is joining the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) during National Teen Driver Safety Week (Oct. 16-22) to urge young drivers to put safety first when behind the wheel.

"Driving can be one of the most dangerous things Texans do on a daily basis - and can pose even more risks for inexperienced or young drivers," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "All drivers have a fundamental responsibility help keep our roads safe, and teens can play a significant role in that effort. DPS is urging teens to use extra caution and always obey traffic laws in order to protect themselves, their passengers and others from possible injury or death."

According to the NHTSA, motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death in teens, ahead of all other types of injury, disease or violence. In 2015, more than 81,900 drivers ages 15-19 were involved in traffic crashes on Texas roadways.

DPS and the NHTSA offer the following tips to help teen drivers stay safe:

Don't drink and drive. (Reminder - the drinking age in Texas is 21.)

Buckle up everyone in the vehicle - it's the law.

Avoid distracted driving - including using mobile devices, eating or anything that takes your attention off the road.

Obey posted speed limits and drive to road conditions.

Avoid having more than one passenger at a time.

DPS also is reminding student drivers about the Impact Texas Teen Driver (ITTD) program requirement for driver license applicants who take a teen driver education course - including Parent Taught Driver Education. (Individuals aged 18-24, who choose to complete a teen driver education course, must also complete the ITTD program.)

ITTD should be completed after the driver education course classroom hours and all behind-the-wheel instruction, and it is the last step before taking the driving skills examination. The two-hour ITTD program contains several videos that provide awareness about the dangers of distracted driving.

Water district closes permit offices

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) Board of Directors voted to discontinue operation of county water well permit offices at their October 11 meeting.

"Our County Secretaries have provided exemplary service to residents of their respective counties since the water well permit program started in the mid-1950s. However, with today's mobile technologies, persons can begin the water well permit process or obtain water well permit information/well logs from the interactive map feature on the HPWD website. As a result, persons no longer need to visit a permitting office in their county for these services," said General Manager Jason Coleman.

Throughout the years, vari-

ous local businesses have provided space and allowed their employees to serve as County Secretaries on behalf of the district. "The HPWD Board of Directors greatly appreciates their support," Coleman added.

In recent years, HPWD has either closed or combined several permit offices as County Secretaries either retired or moved from the area. These included Armstrong, Lamb, Parmer, Potter, and Randall Counties. Permits for Crosby, Lubbock, and Lynn Counties were handled by HPWD staff at the district office in Lubbock.

"We encourage persons to contact the District office at (806) 762-0181 if they have questions relating to the water well permit process," Coleman said.

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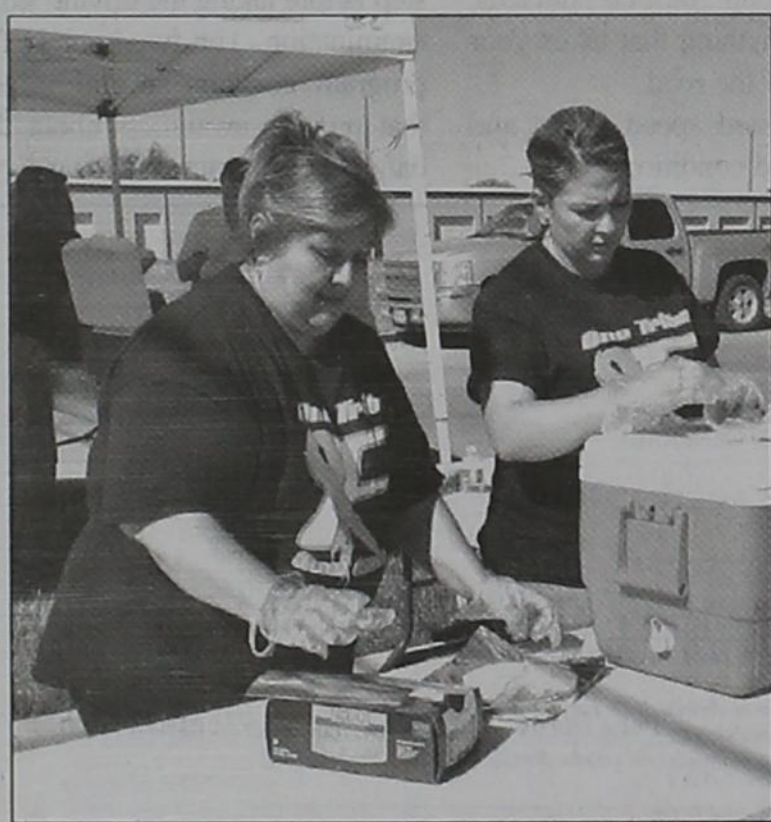

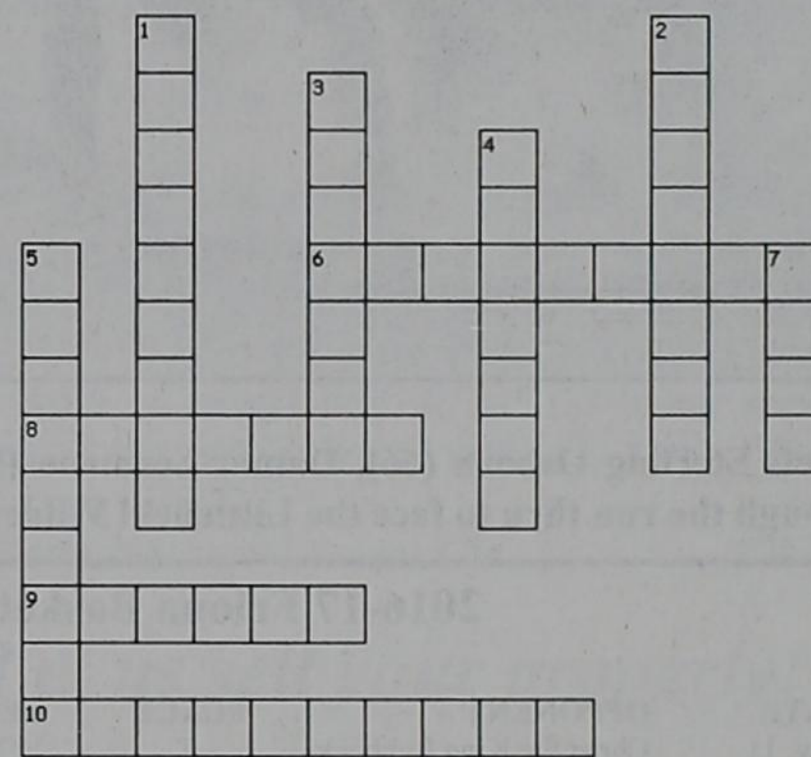

Chiefs fall to Littlefield 48-20

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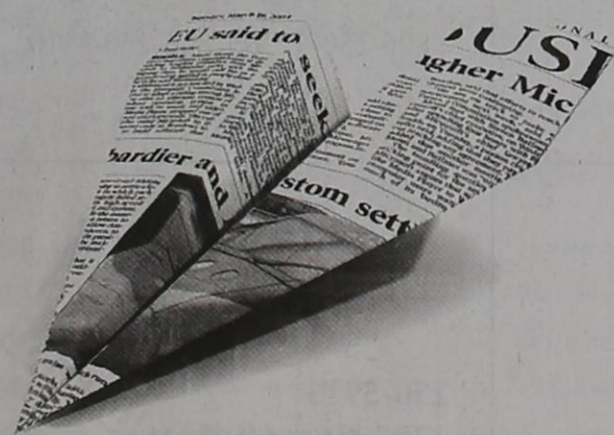

Licenses required for hunting leases

As the fall hunting season comes into full swing, area landowners are reminded that they are required by state law to obtain a hunting lease license to operate their hunting leases. The owner of a hunting lease or the landowner's agent may not receive pay or anything of value from hunters unless the owner or agent has acquired a hunting lease license from the department. Similar to an individual's hunting or fishing license, the lease license must be renewed yearly.

Lubbock district public information officer Aaron Sims explains that this is enforceable throughout the year, and covers all seasons for both game and non-game animals. "Anytime an owner of a hunting lease or the designated agent receives pay or barter for the rights to hunt that property, they are re-

quired to obtain a lease license. Landowners can lease their land for hunting a variety of animals on their property ranging from dove, deer, or even feral hogs." Sims also says that the license must be available upon request when asked by a game warden.

The hunting lease license is for the total amount of property in a county owned by an individual, partnership, firm, or corporation. Lease licenses can be purchased at any location where Texas hunting or fishing licenses are sold. Or, licenses can be bought online with a credit card at www.tpwd.statetx.us. Fees are:

- Fewer than 500 acres - \$79
 - Between 500-1,000 acres - \$147
 - More than 1,000 acres - \$252
- Sims reminds landowners that obtaining the license is

simple, and relatively inexpensive compared to what some hunting guides are charging. "For example, when some outfitters are charging over \$2,000 for a single person to hunt mule deer, obtaining a once a year lease license is a small fee to pay. I also want to remind the public that funds generated from the purchase of these licenses go directly back into managing the natural resource that they are in fact utilizing. It's a successful management system."

A person who violates any provision of the hunting lease license requirements or who fails to comply with any provision of the hunting lease license requirements commits an offense that is a Class C Parks and Wildlife Code misdemeanor, which carries a fine of up to \$500.

Beef producers need to be selective when choosing replacement heifers

Spiraling cattle prices in recent weeks are not leaving much wiggle room when it comes to marketing calves and replacement females to fit current trends, according to cattle experts.

The recent Brazos Valley Beef and Forage Expo held at the Brazos Valley Livestock Commission featured talks that included purchasing replacement heifers, evaluating feeder cattle and marketing the right type of cattle to achieve maximum profits. The program was sponsored by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service beef and forage committee.

"One of the traits we are looking for when purchasing replacement heifers is docility and temperament," said Dr. Joe Paschal, AgriLife Extension beef cattle specialist, Corpus Christi. "I want my heifers to be calm and to protect her calf. I don't want her to run away from me or try to run over me as I approach."

Paschal suggests talking to local sale barn operators to find out what buyers are wanting in calves marketed each week. That will give the beef producer key insight as to which breeds or crossbreeds of replacement heifers to consider when buying.

"After all, why not produce what the market wants?" Paschal said.

Ideally, Paschal said producers

should be developing heifers to calve at 24 months. Most beef producers like to have crossbred heifers in their herd because of hybrid vigor. A popular option is a Brahman and Hereford cross or Brahman and Angus cross. Both these combinations have hybrid vigor, which Paschal said, "is like having an insurance program giving you a greater chance of having them bred and calving at 24 months."

"Structural soundness is also important," he said. "We want heifers that have good frame size and the ability to calve with ease."

One thing to keep in mind is annual cow cost. Paschal said the average cow cost is \$600 annually, which includes feed and taxes.

"One thing that drives up the cost of replacement heifers is hay and purchased feed," Paschal said. "In some parts of Texas, you can get away with not me or try to run over me as I approach." "In my area in South Texas, I don't feed any hay at all. I stockpile forage and utilize rotational grazing. That helps keep my annual cow cost in line. But for those in South Central Texas, it can be cold, muddy and nasty during the winter, so you have to feed hay. Just keep in mind how expensive hay is to produce or purchase. There are feeding strategies that can be developed to keep those costs in check."

Meanwhile, Pete Scarmardo, owner of Brazos Valley Livestock Commission, told attendees cattle prices have been very volatile.

"The futures market has been used more as a trading tool than a speculative tool," he said. "That's made things very difficult for the cattle market. Somewhere, we will reach a bottom."

Through October, fed cattle prices continued to trend lower, he said.

"We've got to get some equity back into these cattle," he said. "We have no bargaining power in the cash market. Until we reach a peak in the cattle supply, the U.S. dollar gets weaker, our industry has some big problems. There are a lot of people who have lost money over the last 18 months."

However, Scarmardo said the packing industry has continued to have strong processing margins of \$150 to \$200 a head. He said feedyards are being filled with specific types of cattle being bought.

"What they buy is dictated by corporate specifications," he said. "There are more branded beef programs than ever, then you've got all the commodity beef (U.S. Department of Agriculture grades) that is not branded beef. It's not people buying cattle and taking a gamble. They are purchasing the type of cattle that fits their specifications."

New bacterial pathogen found in corn in Texas

A new bacterial pathogen, bacterial streak, was found in the Texas Panhandle corn crop this year, and while its effects were inconsequential, it bears watching in the future, according to Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service specialists.

In June and July, corn leaves with brown, tan, orange to reddish streaks or stripes were observed and fully confirmed in a few fields in Hansford and Hutchinson counties in the

Texas Panhandle, said Dr. Ron French, AgriLife Extension plant pathologist in Amarillo.

French visited a couple fields with infected plants and saw that in initial development, leaf lesions were limited to between-leaf veins. But in later development, the lesions extended beyond the veins with a wavy, uneven shape rather than rectangular shape.

The lesions varied in length from half an inch to several inches and occurred throughout the leaf blade, French said. The lesions were translucent when held up to the light. These foliar symptoms were also seen in several other states where the disease has been found.

The disease, bacterial streak, caused by the *Xanthomonas vasculorum* bacteria, was confirmed in Texas by French's plant pathology lab in Amarillo, the Great Plains Diagnostic Network Regional Lab at Kansas State University, and by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service in Maryland, he said.

The good thing, said Dr. Tom Isakeit, AgriLife Extension plant pathologist in College Station, is this disease has not been confirmed in other corn production areas of Texas. Also, there is no indication that this disease can cause adverse impacts in yield or quality in any of the states where it has been found.

"Although we don't anticipate that this disease will be as important as some other diseases corn growers have to deal with in Texas, it's a new disease, and we need to learn more about it in order to provide better disease management strategies," Isakeit said. "So if growers think they have it, they should contact us or their local AgriLife Extension county agent."

French said while many diseases caused by other *Xanthomonas* can be seed borne on other crops, it is not known if bacterial leaf streak of corn is seed borne.

The specialists advised when scouting for bacterial leaf streak in corn, producers should be careful not to confuse its early symptoms with gray leaf spot, a fungal disease caused by *Cercospora* spp. Gray leaf spot appears as rectangular lesions or stripes, which are smooth and tend to stay within the veins. These lesions are initially tan and later

may appear gray as the fungus produces spores.

Advanced symptoms of gray leaf spot are quite different from bacterial leaf streak, French said. Because gray leaf spot is dependent on hot weather, high relative humidity and moisture on the leaves, it may be more prevalent during flowering, while bacterial leaf streak has been observed as early as V7 or seven leaf collar.

In Texas corn production areas, gray leaf spot is a minor disease, if it occurs at all, Isakeit said.

"As a general recommendation for managing bacterial diseases, crop rotation should be practiced and weeds, especially grasses, should be controlled," French said. "For bacterial diseases of corn, there are no chemical treatments available."

"Time will tell whether bacterial leaf streak becomes an important disease in Texas, but as this disease becomes the subject of research, we can expect to see more information on hybrid susceptibility and factors affecting disease severity."

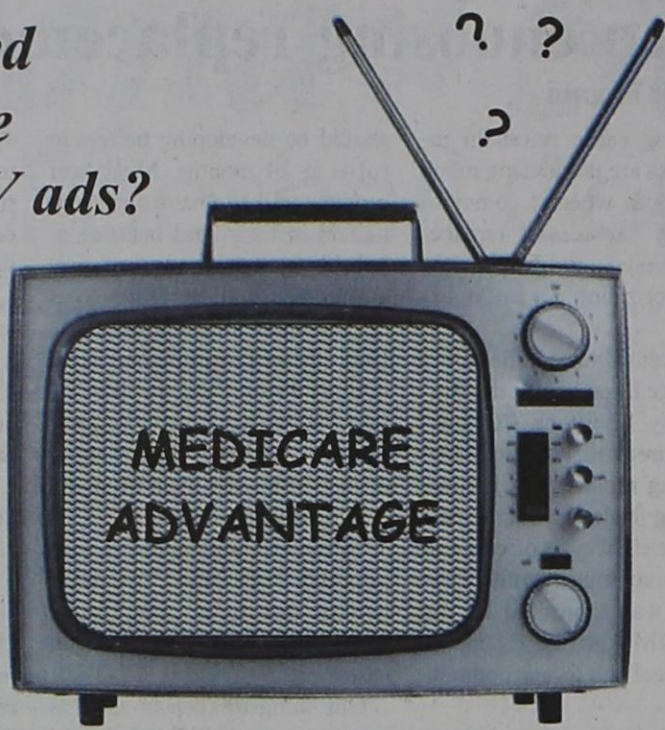

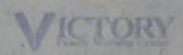
Both School Winners and State Finalists have been announced recently. School win-
