## Court Denies School Request

A formal request from the Friona Independent School District for re-imbursement of \$284,466.88 from the county's Permanent School Funds was denied at the last meeting of the Parmer County Commissioner's Court December 20.

Voting for the motion were Commissioners Tommy Williams and Robert White. Commissioners Ernest Anthony and Raymond McGehee voted against, and Judge Porter Roberts broke the tie by voting against.

The requested amount represented expenditures that the Friona School District has been out in constructing new classroom buildings which were mandated by the 1984 School Reform Bill.

In a meeting last November 25, the County Commissioners told school officials that the only way it would consider disbursement of the school fund was for the school in question to present a proposal for construction plans, or contractor's bill, as well as submit results of a school census which counts all persons in the school district eligible for free public education.

In other business, the court voted to renew a certificate of

deposit from the county's General Fund in the amount of \$100,000 which was maturing December 31, 1985, extended to mature January 31, 1986. Also, a C.D. from the Farm-to-Market Road fund, in the amount of \$200,000, which was maturing December 31, was renewed until March 31, 1986.

A motion was passed to approve the county's share of the annual budget for the Parmer County Appraisal District, in the amount of \$31,566.72.

Discussion was held with District Judge Jack Young concerning needed repairs in the district courtroom. Some ideas were discussed, but the court took no action in order that it might check the situation further.

Judge Roberts had been contacted by the Panhandle Community Services about the county participating in the emergency nutrition-temporary emergency relief program. Although there are funds available for use on a matching funds basis, Roberts pointed out that the amount of funds available is too small to be of any use. The court then voted not to participate in the program.

## Postmaster Wells Is Retiring

William W. "Bill" Wells has announced his retirement from the U.S. Postal Service and as Postmaster at Friona effective with the close of business January 3, 1986.

Postmaster Wells began his career with the Hereford, Texas post office in 1948 as a city carrier.

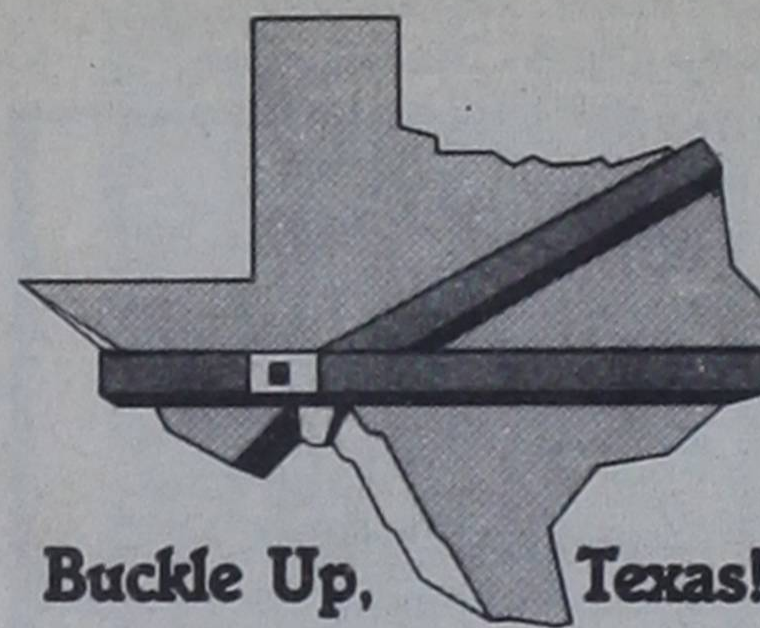
After a short break in service he again worked for the post office in Amarillo in numerous capacities, including clerk, letter sorting machine operator and later as supervisor for the letter sorting machine.

He also served as Foreman of Mails in both incoming and outgoing areas.

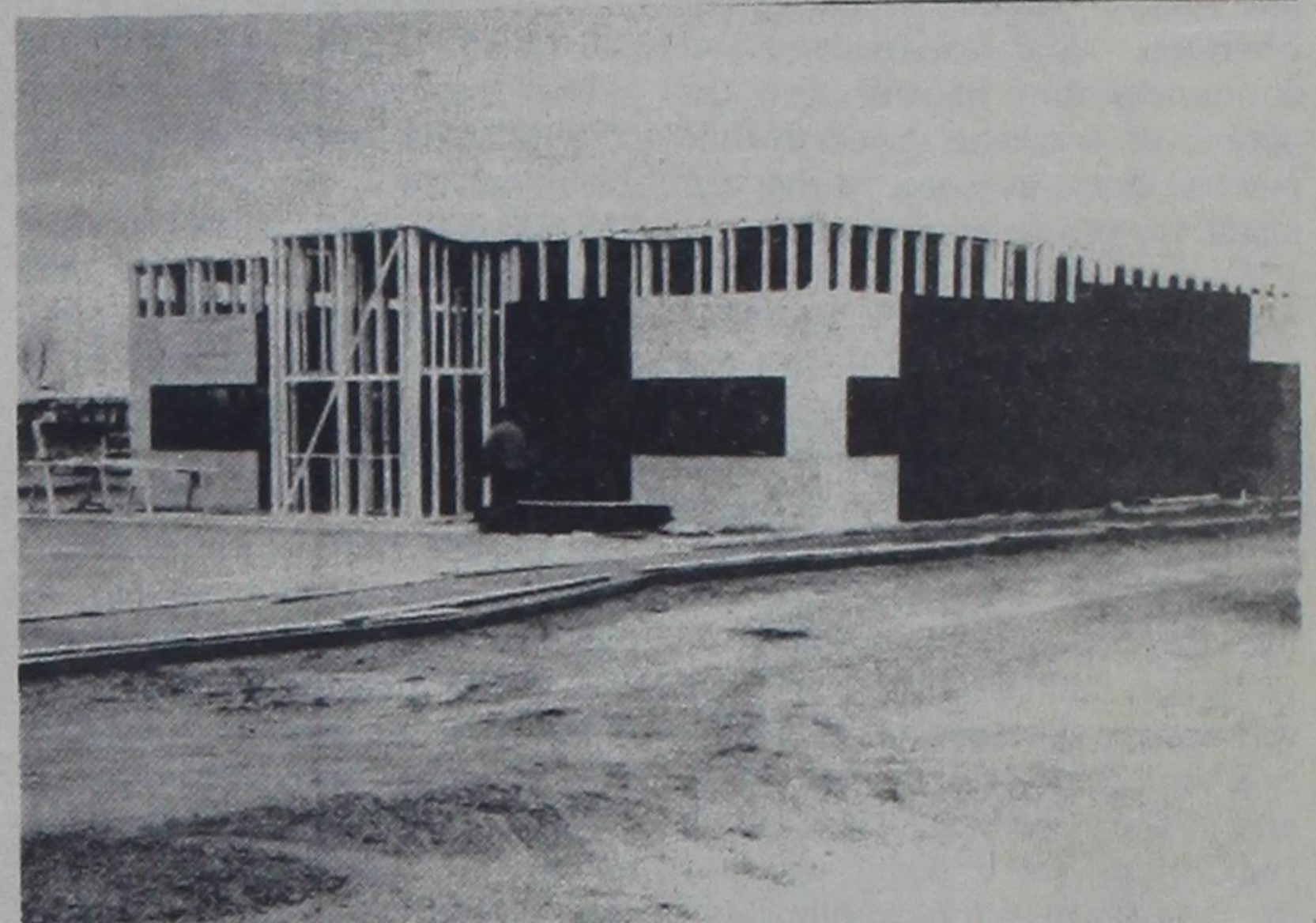
Wells also served six months as Officer in Charge of a small Oklahoma town before being appointed as Postmaster in Plains, Texas in 1978. He served there until his promotion to the Friona, Texas Post Office in June 1982, serving until the present time.

Postmaster Wells will retire with 29 years service, which includes over three years with the U.S. Navy during World War II. He and his wife, Audine, plan to make their home in Amarillo where they had previously lived for over 19 years.

Floyd Wilkins, clerk in the Friona post office, has been selected to serve as Officer in Charge of the Friona office until such time as a permanent Postmaster can be selected. This selection should be made in about six to eight weeks, according to Harry Hall, Sectional Center Manager, of Lubbock.

## Court Gives Stance On School Fund

"In the beginning, the State of Texas set aside some land designated as Parmer County School Land. This land was given to the County with the stipulation that the income from this land be divided among the schools in the County to help with their support.

The County Commissioner's Court was appointed as trustee over this land, a trust and responsibility that has always been highly and seriously regarded by the Commissioner's Court of Parmer County. When the surface of the land was sold, the money was invested in ways set forth by the legislature. Interest from this investment has been divided among the school districts through the years, as the County Available Fund. From 1975 through 1985, the interest from this fund divided among the county school districts adds up to \$778,459.02, broken down as follows: Bovina, \$157,119.97; Farwell, \$146,454.56; Friona, \$390,972.68; Lazbuddie \$83,911.81. If you were to go back to the start of the fund, you can see that more than \$1,000,000.00 has been earned in interest by this account to be divided among the school districts of the County.

"The County Permanent School Fund certificate of deposit in the bank at this time is \$946,500.00. This amount has accumulated through the years from the sale of

the surface rights, the sale of part of the mineral rights, the lease of some of the mineral rights, and royalty from two small producing wells. In 1984 and 1985 this fund was enhanced by leasing mineral interests in the amount of \$82,489.42.

"In a recent Attorney General Opinion, the County, acting through the commissioner's court, may reduce the county permanent school fund of that county and may distribute the amount of the reduction to the independent and common school districts of the county on a per scholastic basis to be used solely for the purposes of reducing bonded indebtedness of those districts or for making permanent improvements, with the final decision to be made by the commissioner's court.

"The commissioner's court is not the power-mad, penny-pinching bunch of ogres that some people seem to think. They have been begged, pleaded with, cajoled, threatened and probably lied about on different subjects as well as being blamed for things over which they have no control. They persist in trying to do what they honestly think is the right thing to do to benefit the most people at that time, knowing all the time that no matter what is done, there will be someone who does not like what they have done."

# Summary Of Year's News Given In Review

## JANUARY

After several years' absence, the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center will have an office in Parmer County (Friona), it was announced on January 13. Such an office was operated here from 1971 through 1978, when the federal staffing grant was lost.

Dr. Lee Spring, who had been a member of the hospital staff at Parmer County Community Hospital for over 30 years, retired at the beginning of the year. Dr. Spring is a Parmer County native, and had been a local doctor since June of 1954.

Prime, International took delivery on its first load of beef liver the week of January 27. The new company started with 31 employees on January 28. It leases space from Millard Warehouse.

Winners in the Friona Junior Livestock Show were Dana Berend, steers and barrows; Jeff Brown, lambs; and Shannon Cochran, goats.

## FEBRUARY

A cold front, called the "Siberian Express," dropped temperatures below the zero mark, and the chill factor to more than 30 degrees below zero the first days of February.

Friona youngsters dominated the 38th annual Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show, winning four of the five grand championships. Dana Berend exhibited both the champion steer and heifer; Chad Rhodes had the champion barrow, and Shannon Cochran, champion goat.

The Parmer County Commissioners voted on February 11 to disburse the county's permanent school fund to the four county schools, on a pro-rata basis.

An oil rig began drilling northwest of Friona on the Carl Maurer estate, and plans are for the test hole to be drilled to a depth of 5,000 feet.

Friona's Meals on Wheels program got underway the week of February 17, with 18 meals being delivered the first week.

## MARCH

In a surprise move in an early session, the Parmer County Commissioners reversed their decision from their previous meeting to divide the permanent school fund among the county's four schools. County Attorney Charles Aycock advised the court to reverse its decision until a written opinion could be obtained from the state attorney general.

A Friona native, Gwen Greeson, was named "Mrs. Kansas" at a pageant in Wichita, Kansas.

Glenn Reeve, Jr., Ron Cain and Joe Reeve purchased Cortese Oil Company from Mike Cortese, and it will be known as Reeve-Cain Oil.

Friona Chamber of Commerce honored its outstanding citizens on Thursday, March 14. They were Anne Osborn, Woman of the Year; Ron Davenport, Man of the Year; Faye Smith, Teacher of the Year; Darla Bracken and Billie Fairchild, Employees of the Year; and Julie Wilshire and Brent Hinkle, Outstanding Young People. Gene Schueler was named "Conservation Farmer of the Year" at the banquet.

of Commerce and Agriculture. Jeannie Tucker is president of the Women's Division for 1985.

The three-member State Highway Commission authorized the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to begin right of way acquisition toward making U.S. Highway 60 a four-lane divided highway through Parmer County.

Friona High School won the literary championship of District 3-AAA, qualifying for the regional meet in 17 events, as well as winning the one-act play competition.

Bonnie Israel won the Parmer County Spelling Bee, held at Farwell.

## APRIL

The Friona High School band received First Division ratings in both sight-reading and concert at the spring UIL competition.

Vicki Hatton was employed as girls basketball and track coach at FHS, to begin her duties in the fall.

Eclectic Ideas opened its doors on Main Street, and held Grand Opening the week of April 15-20. Carmen Rape and Sylvia Ingram are co-owners.

State meet entrants from FHS included debaters Brent Hinkle and Bill Caudill and informative speaker Trey Collier.

Modern Study Club's Dinner Theatre was held April 12-13, with good crowds attending the shows, which again featured an array of local talent.

## MAY

Beth Norsworthy, a 16-year-old Friona High School student, was killed May 1 in a grinding two-vehicle collision two miles north of Friona at an unmarked intersection of two county roads. Miss Norsworthy's car was hit by a pickup driven by Richard Lynn Herring, who was injured, as was Robin Wyly, Miss Norsworthy's step-sister.

Honor graduates for the FHS class of 1985 were named: Brent Hinkle is valedictorian with a 96.67 average; Sarita Ellis is salutatorian with a 95.75 average and Bill Caudill is historian with a 95.72 average.

Paul Laywell will be the new boys basketball coach at FHS next fall, replacing Oscar Bronniman, who was re-assigned within the system.

Holly Snead was named valedictorian of the eighth grade class, with Deena Willard salutatorian.

Monty's Flowers was honored by the Friona Chamber of Commerce with a beautification award on May 23.

Five Friona teachers who are retiring were honored with a tea. The teachers were Lucille Lewis, June Rhodes, Faye Smith, Valoris Osborn and Baker Duggins.

The Friona area received a total of 3.19 inches of rain which fell over a five-day period.

## JUNE

Big Wheels Truck Wash, owned by Hack and Patty Corbell, opened on June 10 on East Highway 60. It will be the only full-service truck wash outside of Lubbock and Amarillo.

The Friona area had a near-bumper wheat harvest, with the dryland wheat doing exceptionally well, with yields up to 40 bushels per acre.

At a special meeting of shareholders on June 18, Friona Industries approved an agreement of merger with CHS Holding, Inc.

## JULY

The city's July 4th celebration was well-attended, and one of the hottest days for the event was established, with the temperatures reaching 95 degrees with very little wind.

A "Kangaroo Court" promotion held by Prairie Acres Nursing Home was able to raise over \$3,000 toward building a garage and storage area for the facility.

John Bradshaw of Amarillo College came to Friona and helped local citizens establish a "Crime Watch" program, wherein neighbors are trained to watch for suspicious activities.

The Friona Chamber of Commerce began a "Coffee Cart" promotion which was first held each month, then later scheduled on alternate months at local businesses.

The Immanuel Lutheran Church of Rhea celebrated its 75th anniversary, and Calvary Baptist Church held its 25th anniversary during the month.

## AUGUST

A Pampa man, Abraham Hildenbrand, 66, was killed in a two-vehicle crash at the Fifth Street-Highway 214 intersection August 8. Chuck Rector, driver of a milk truck, was uninjured.

The Friona City Council agreed to accept the old Santa Fe depot as a gift from Santa Fe. The city plans to then turn the depot over to the Community Heritage Society, which is in the process of raising money for moving the depot.

Nineteen members of the FHS graduating class of 1935 held their 50th class reunion August 9-10.

A Morton resident, Falvin Harvey, 63, was killed in a two-vehicle accident August 31 at the Hub intersection. Harvey's vehicle was struck by a F-I truck driven by Reynaldo Gonzales.

## SEPTEMBER

The Friona Chieftains rolled to easy wins in their first three games, including a 68-0 pasting of neighboring Bovina. The Chiefs outscored their first three opponents, 127-7.

Sonia Lafuente, FHS senior, was crowned "Miss Friona" at the Maize Queen pageant September 21. First runnerup was Kelly Wied and second runnerup was Leslee Upton. Heather Martin was crowned "Little Miss Friona" at that pageant.

Friona's 29th Maize Days was well-attended. The parade was held in 55-degree weather, much better than the next day, when temperatures dropped into the 30s and the chill factor much below freezing.

## OCTOBER

Friona, like schools across the state, enforced the "No pass, no play" rule at the end of the first six-week period. Only one varsity

**55 YEARS AGO--JAN. 9, 1931**  
W.M. Lee, formerly of Hereford, has purchased the Marvette Theatre from H.B. Eberling, former owner and announces that he will give the people of this area a worthwhile picture show as soon as he can install the proper equipment.

**50 YEARS AGO--JAN. 10, 1936**  
Almost every day (if it isn't too cold to be out) I hear someone asking "Who is going to pay the taxes to repay all the money Uncle Sam has borrowed?" I, of course, do not know, but it just occurs to me that a normal amount of reflection linked with experience will answer the question by saying that we, of this present generation, and the several succeeding generations yet unborn, will pay the debt through multitudinous and ever increasing taxes.--J.W. White's column.

**45 YEARS AGO--JAN. 10, 1941**  
The filling station on Main Street, known as "Brookie's Filling Station," which was badly damaged by fire a few weeks ago, has been repaired and considerably enlarged, and is again open for business. Wilbur Brookfield is in charge of the business.

**40 YEARS AGO--JAN. 4, 1946**  
The Friona City Commission consisting of Mayor Glenn Reeve and commissioners F.L. Spring and Carl Maurer, have changed the method of administering the city's business affairs by employing a city manager rather than having the city commission look after the details of the city's business. Wright Williams, who recently received his discharge from the Armed Service, has been appointed to the position.

**35 YEARS AGO--JAN. 11, 1951**  
Friona residents were excited Monday at a report which was circulated that one of the FBI's most wanted men was seen in Friona driving a car with a Florida license plate. The excitement built even more by a report by an Amarillo radio station that clues

were being checked out in Friona. The rumors apparently were unfounded.

**30 YEARS AGO--JAN. 13, 1956**  
In a move to increase valuation of the Friona School District from its present \$8,700,000 to \$13,000,000, the school board recently voted to engage the services of an appraising firm from Stamford. Only rural lands will be affected, as city property was re-evaluated in 1948.

**25 YEARS AGO--JAN. 6, 1961**  
Diphtheria cases reported as near as Dimmitt were being viewed with concern by school and health officials in the county this week. The disease hit Plainview in epidemic proportions the week before Christmas, and communities throughout the area have kept an uneasy check on the situation.

**20 YEARS AGO--JAN. 13, 1966**  
Open house for the new million-dollar Friona High School will be held Sunday afternoon between the hours of 2 and 5 p.m. The new complex, completed this fall, was part of a \$1,250,000 bond issue passed by local voters in April of 1964.

**15 YEARS AGO--JAN. 14, 1971**  
They do things big in Texas. Like flying to Australia for a wedding. Miss Brenda Hawker's Texas "parents," Mr. and Mrs. E.G. Phipps, of Friona, arrived in Melbourne yesterday for her wedding. Brenda, 24, of Kaniva, near Nhill, 240 miles west of Melbourne will be married at Wesley Church on Saturday. Mr. Phipps will give Brenda away. Her father died last year. In 1964, Brenda stayed with the Phipps family for a year as an American Field Service scholar.

**10 YEARS AGO--JAN. 11, 1976**  
The Friona area lost a pioneer citizen and businessman on December 21, when Oscar F. (Os) Lange passed away in Houston after being ill for approximately two months. Services for Lange,

longtime civic leader and manager of Friona's Rockwell Brothers Lumber outlet, were held Tuesday, December 23.

**5 YEARS AGO--JAN. 11, 1981**  
Funeral services for Orville Houser, 73, were held Wednesday, December 31, at 3 p.m. at the Sixth Street Church of Christ with H.D. Simmons, officiating. He moved to Friona in 1946 and he and his brother, J.V. "Cotton" Houser, established Houser Grocery.

The first baby born at Parmer County Community Hospital for 1980 was Miss Sabrina Gonzales. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Gonzales of 200-9th Street, Bovina.

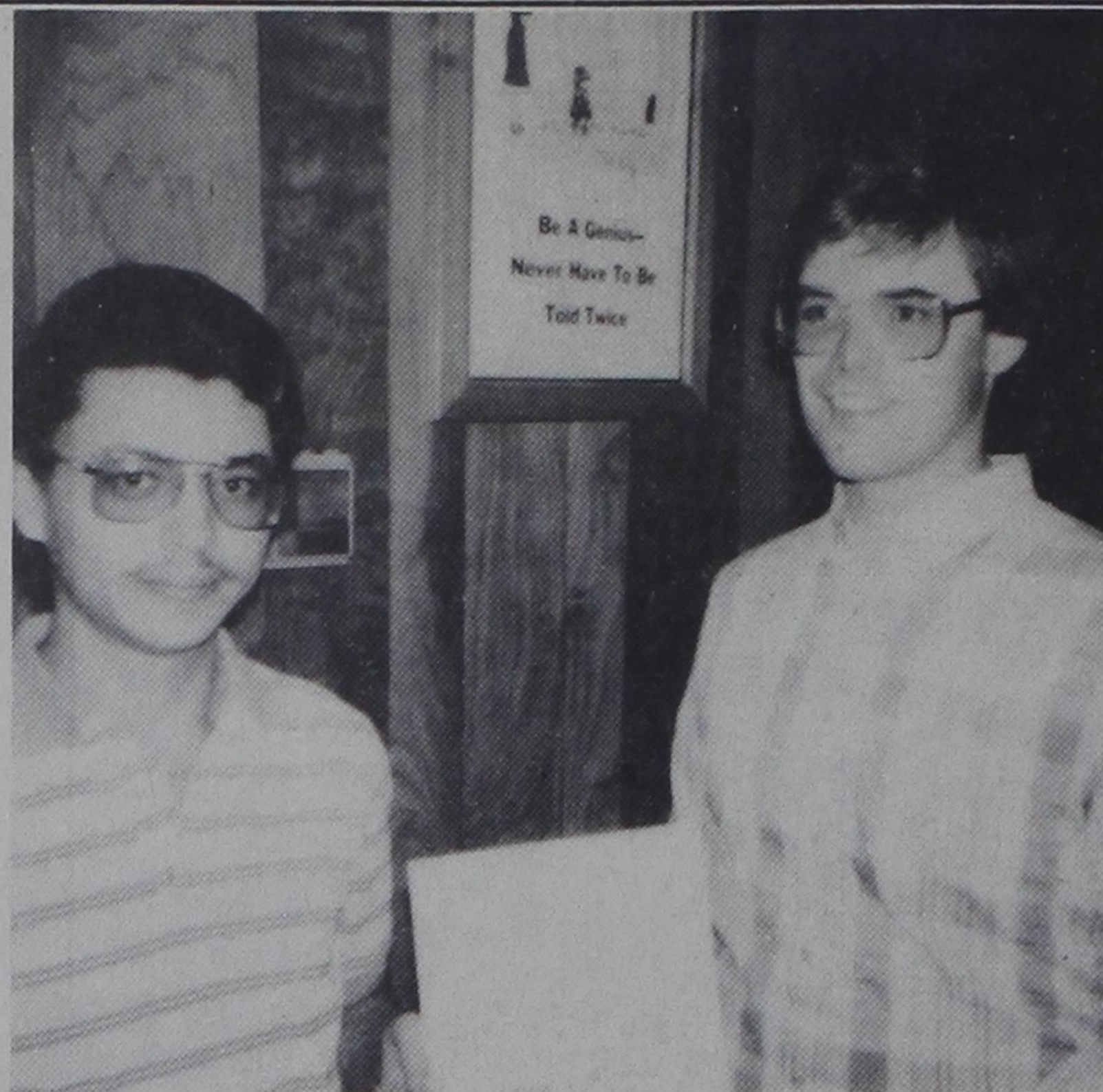

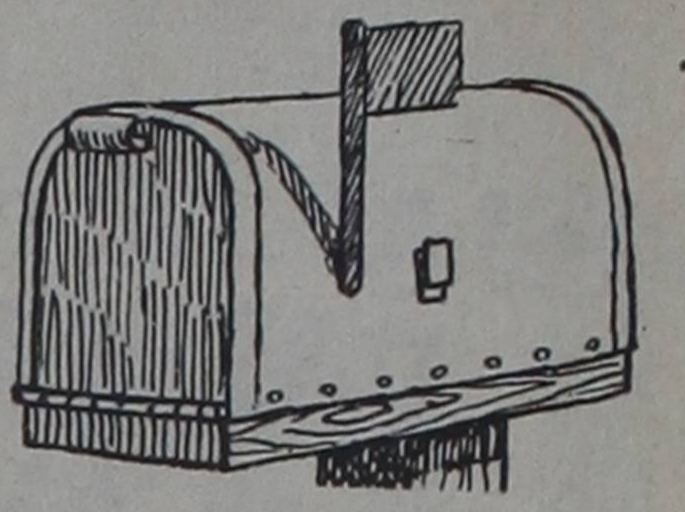

WITH THE START of the new year, we are making somewhat of a change at the Friona Star.

Since the closing of Plains Publishers in Friona in 1965 (which had been the pioneer for the offset central printing plant movement), the Friona Star has been printed in Hereford, by Southwest Offset and its successor, North Plains Printing.

We do our type-setting, ad makeup, page makeup, etc., here in Friona, then take our completed pages to the central plant.

Eight of us have formed a corporation known as Palo Duro Offset Printing, Inc., which is located in Canyon. To begin with, ten newspapers will be printed at the new printing plant.

Probably, readers of the Friona Star will notice no change in their paper, and we will have no deadline changes due to our new plant location.

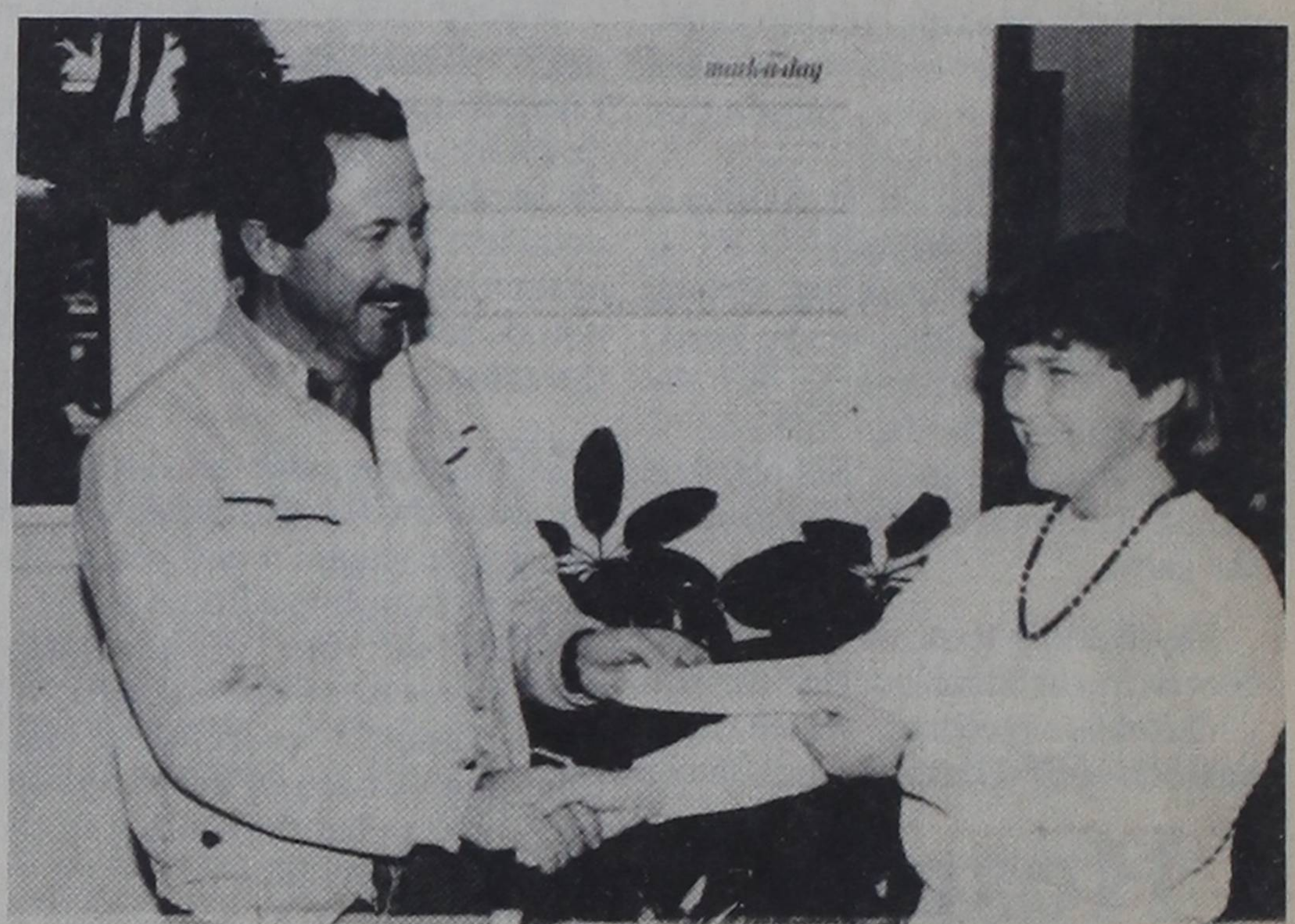

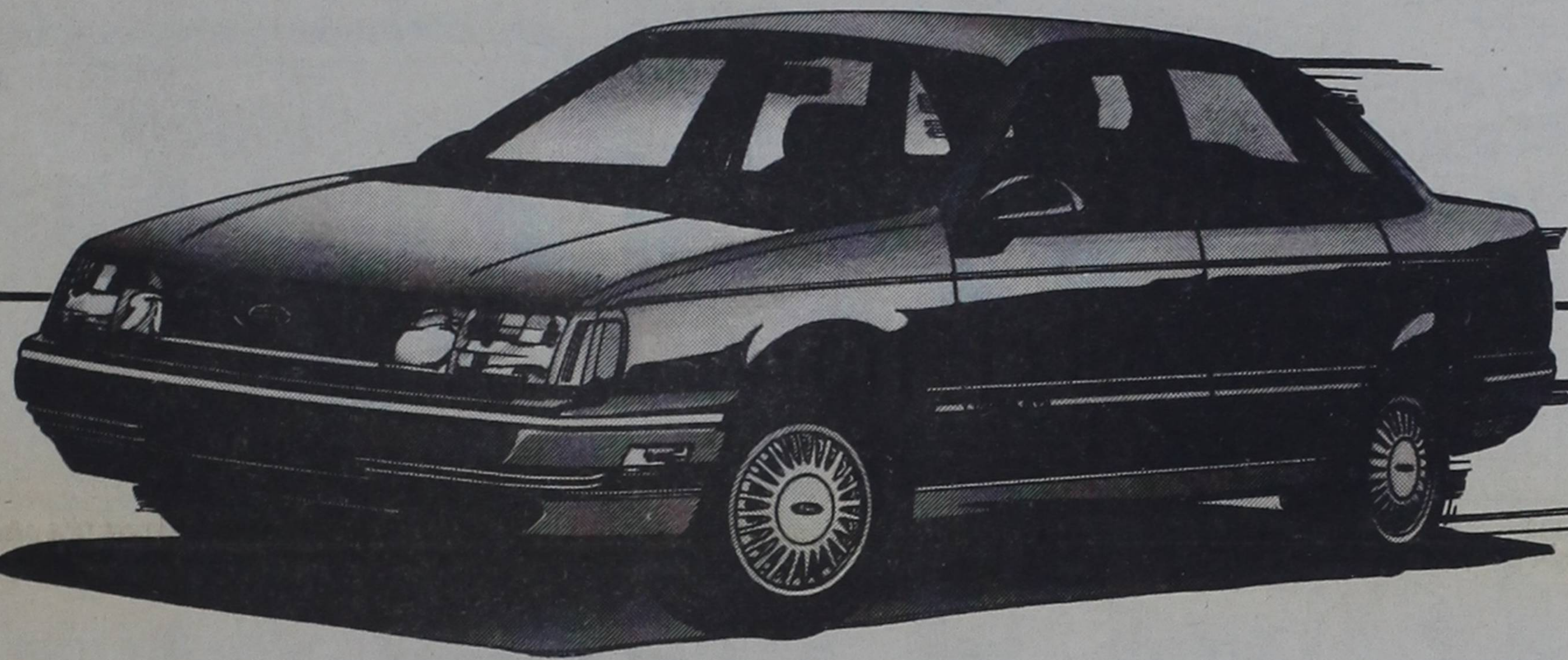

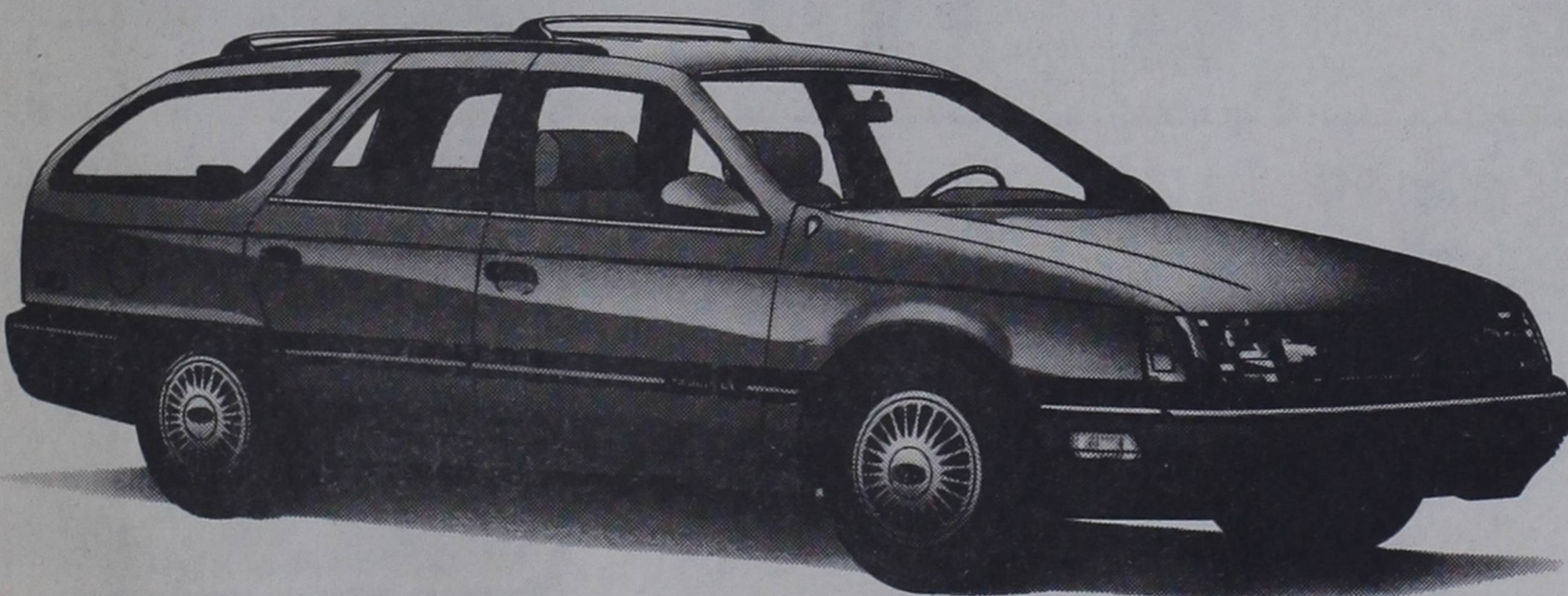
