## Report Angers County Residents

Area residents have been shocked with disbelief this week with a report from Harvard University which named Parmer County as one of the nation's 150 "hungriest counties."

The catch in the ranking seems to be the percentage of use of food stamps by those residents who are qualified for them.

"Some yardbird office boy who wanted to get his name in the paper sat down and came up with these projections and numbers he didn't know anything about," was the reaction by Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts, and most residents seemed to echo his feelings.

"My folks are retired and they are eligible for food stamps—a whole \$7.50 worth per month. But it's not worth all the paperwork

and red tape for just that amount of food stamps," said a Friona resident.

Parmer County was ranked 67th in the nation—first being the worst, on the "list." Other Texas Panhandle counties included were Motley, 47th, Briscoe, 78th, Collingsworth, 98th, and Swisher, 134th. Neighboring Roosevelt County, N.M. also made the list at 141st.

"The only hungry people around here are the ones going to Pat Walkers, or Weight Watchers, who are trying to lose a little weight," commented another, who said she seriously doubted there were any really hungry people in the county. "If they were, someone would take them some food," she concluded.

## McLellan Honored

Ken McLellan, longtime racing enthusiast, was recently inducted into the National Hot Rod Association Hall of Fame at a banquet held at Austin Ranch near Dallas.

Dale Ham, South Central Division Director and emcee of the ceremony, presented McLellan with a plaque and stated, "Ken was virtually unbeatable in class eliminations in the three years he ran his super stock car. He has achieved the highest honor a drag racer can achieve."

In his acceptance speech, McLellan credited his wife, Elizabeth, his brother, Joe, also active in drag racing, and his three children, Ronnie, Cliff and Becky, for their help and support throughout his racing career.

McLellan's racing career began in the late 1950's. He won numerous meets during the following years, driving a super stock race car.

In 1970, he won the Super Stock Division IV championship. In 1971, he competed against the top sixteen super stock racers from all over the United States and Canada, to win the NHRA Super Stock World Finals. He retired from racing in 1972.

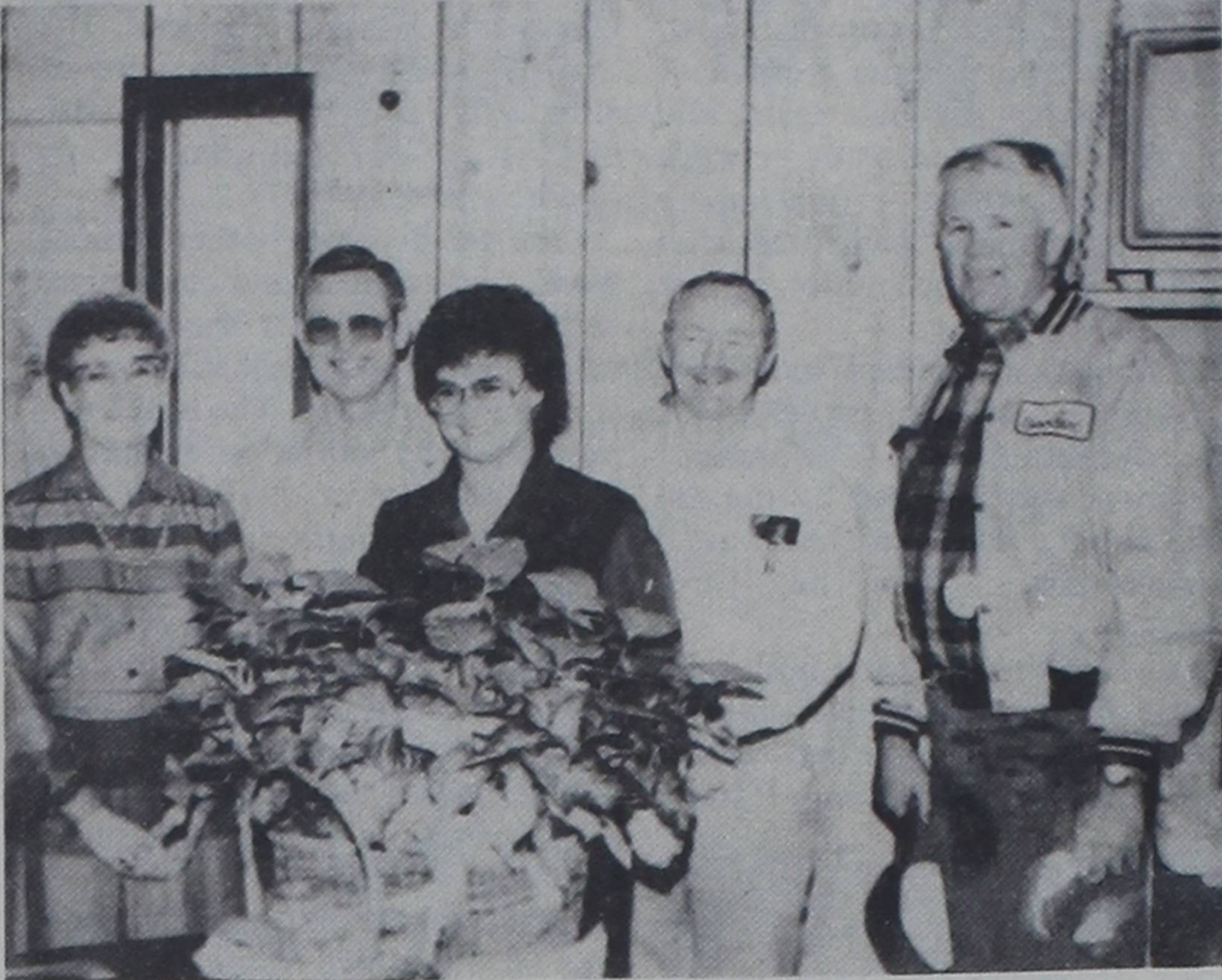


**KENNETH McLELLAN** receives award from Dale Ham of the National Hot Rod Assn.

"If re-elected, I promise to do the best I can, with the interest of the people of Parmer County as my number one goal," Roberts says.



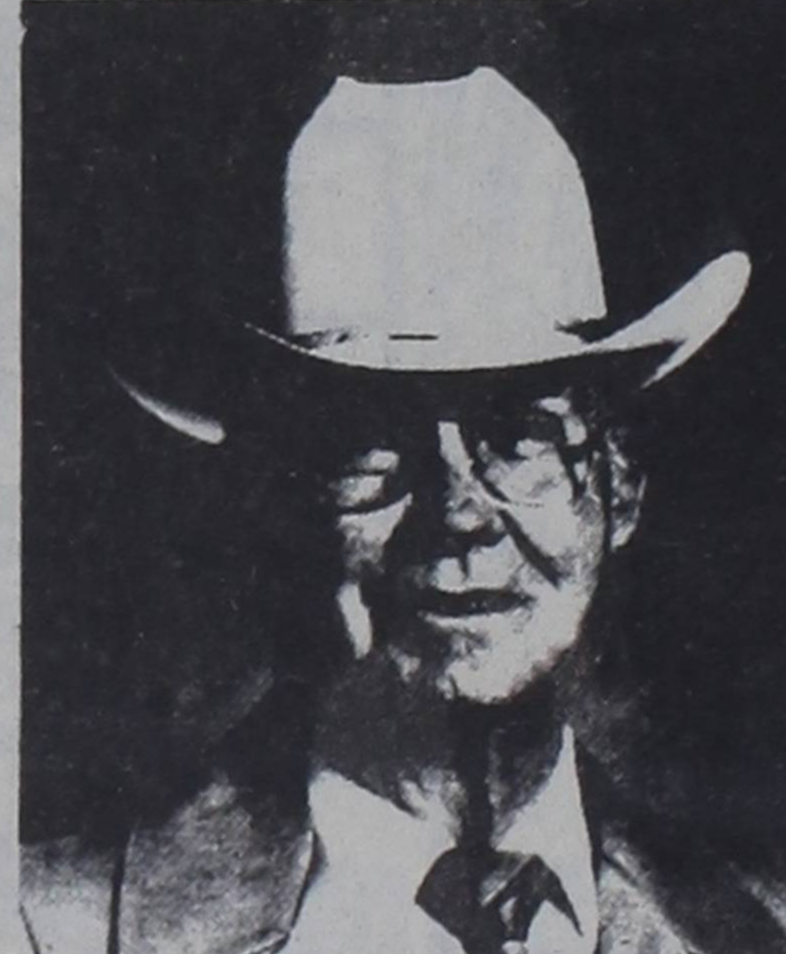

## Discipline Plan Is Complete

School districts throughout the state have been involved in writing discipline management plans recently. This is a result of a requirement of Texas school reform, House Bill 72, enacted by the Texas Legislature.

The Friona School District is in the process of putting its plan together. A committee of 24 has completed work on a recommended plan for the district.

This committee consists of five administrators, the Special Education supervisor, two school counselors, six teachers, four students, and six parents.

The committee looked at present policies and procedures in view of legal requirements and accepted, rejected, or made changes thought to be necessary or desirable in the district's policies.

Included in the plan is the addition of rights and responsibilities of students, rights and responsibilities of parents, rights and responsibilities of teachers, and rights and responsibilities of administrators. In delineating these rights and responsibilities the results will hopefully be an improved cooperative effort of all involved in attaining a smooth, uninterrupted, and productive environment in the public schools.

Discipline management techniques and procedures are included in the document. Offenses are identified in categories of major and minor offenses. Management techniques and discipline procedures that may be used are identified.

On Thursday, January 23 at 7 p.m., there will be a meeting open to the public at the Friona High School Auditorium for a general overview of the plan. Following this overview, building principals will meet with patrons and students from their buildings to present and discuss a more in-depth look at the plan. Questions, concerns, comments, etc. will be encouraged. Parents, patrons, students, and teachers are invited to attend this open meeting.

Recommendations from the committee along with comments expressed at the hearing will then be reviewed by the Board of Trustees at their meeting February 10 for their final approval of the district's plan.

The committee named to structure the plan included: Tom Jarboe, superintendent; James Warren, administrative assistant; Hal Ratcliff, high school principal; Cecil Maddox, junior high principal; Freeman Melton, elementary principal; Nancy Edelman, elementary teacher; Kay Hinton, elementary teacher; Jeffie Talley, junior high teacher; Bob Wied, junior high teacher; Charlene Shafer, high school teacher; Lynn Weiland, high school teacher; Jackie Morgan, high school counselor.

Also, Sheryl Salyer, elementary counselor; Charles Turner, special education supervisor; Stephanie Ancira, junior high student; Adrian Smith, junior high student; Roy Flores, high school student; Melanie Gallman, high school student; Sharen Black, elementary parent; Tony Garcia, elementary parent; Estela Rejino, junior high parent; Archie Echols, junior high parent; Mike Riethmayer, high school parent; and Maria Medina, high school parent.

# Rectors Host Friend With Unusual Auto

Some residents of Friona were astounded last week to see an outlandish vehicle being driven around town.

The vehicle, a 1923 Hennway, was designed and built by Norm Grabowski, who is presently on tour for Darrell Starbird, a sponsor of car shows across the nation. Grabowski stopped for a visit with the Lloyd Rectors south of Friona.

The Rectors had met Grabowski a few years ago, when they caught his act at the Roy Clark Theatre at Branson, Missouri.

"We were waiting outside the theatre in 1983 when Norm rode his motorcycle up the steps outside the theatre. I offered to open the door for him, so he could drive inside, and our friendship has

developed from there," says Betty Louise Rector.

Mrs. Rector says that she visited Grabowski after seeing his show, and they traded some recipes. A year later they saw him again, and this time he traded some artwork with the Rectors, promising to "drop in on them" sometime. Last week's visit was the fruition of that promise.

Grabowski designed and built the unique truck and trailer which he drove into Friona. (The name of the truck was inspired by the old joke about "what's a Hennway?" answer-about two or three pounds).

His Hennway truck is built on a chassis of three-inch round tube. At the rear where the flatbed rests is three-inch square framing. It has a

1968 Dodge 383 cubic-inch engine, with a torque-flight automatic transmission, and has a large Chevy station wagon rear end. The truck is made of wood, a lot of aluminum, a tremendous amount of brass, screws and untold hours of elbow grease.

Grabowski does other woodwork, and rebuilds and customizes cars and boats. His most recent work of art was an eight-foot man-sized rocking horse. The horse was purchased by and is on display at the Wildflower Theatre in Branson, Missouri.

Grabowski got into show business in the late 1950s when he rented his customized hot rod for use in the TV series "77 Sunset Strip." That launched his movie and television career. He says the hardest thing in the movie business is to keep working.

Grabowski's first speaking part was in "Darby's Rangers" with James Garner and Ed Burns. Then came "The Beat Generation," "Six Kittens Go To College," "College Confidential," with Mamie van Doren and "The Big Operator," with Mickey Rooney.

He then began working in films produced by Walt Disney. The first was "Son of Flubber." Next was "The Misadventures of Merlin Jones," with Annette Funicello, followed by "The Monkey's Uncle," "A Horse in a Grey Flannel Suit," "Happiest Millionaire," and "Blackbeard's Ghost." It was during the filming of "Blackbeard" that Disney died.

"Walt Disney was a very talented man, and very humble for his position. I liked him very much," Grabowski said.

Grabowski appeared in two movies with Elvis Presley--"Roustabout" and "Girl Happy." In the latter he played the part of Elvis' buddy. Of Elvis, he says, "He was a super guy to work with. He was quiet, not boisterous or a showoff, preferring the company of his buddies."

Then came "The Towering Inferno" with Steve McQueen and two movies with Burt Reynolds--"Hooper," in which Norm played

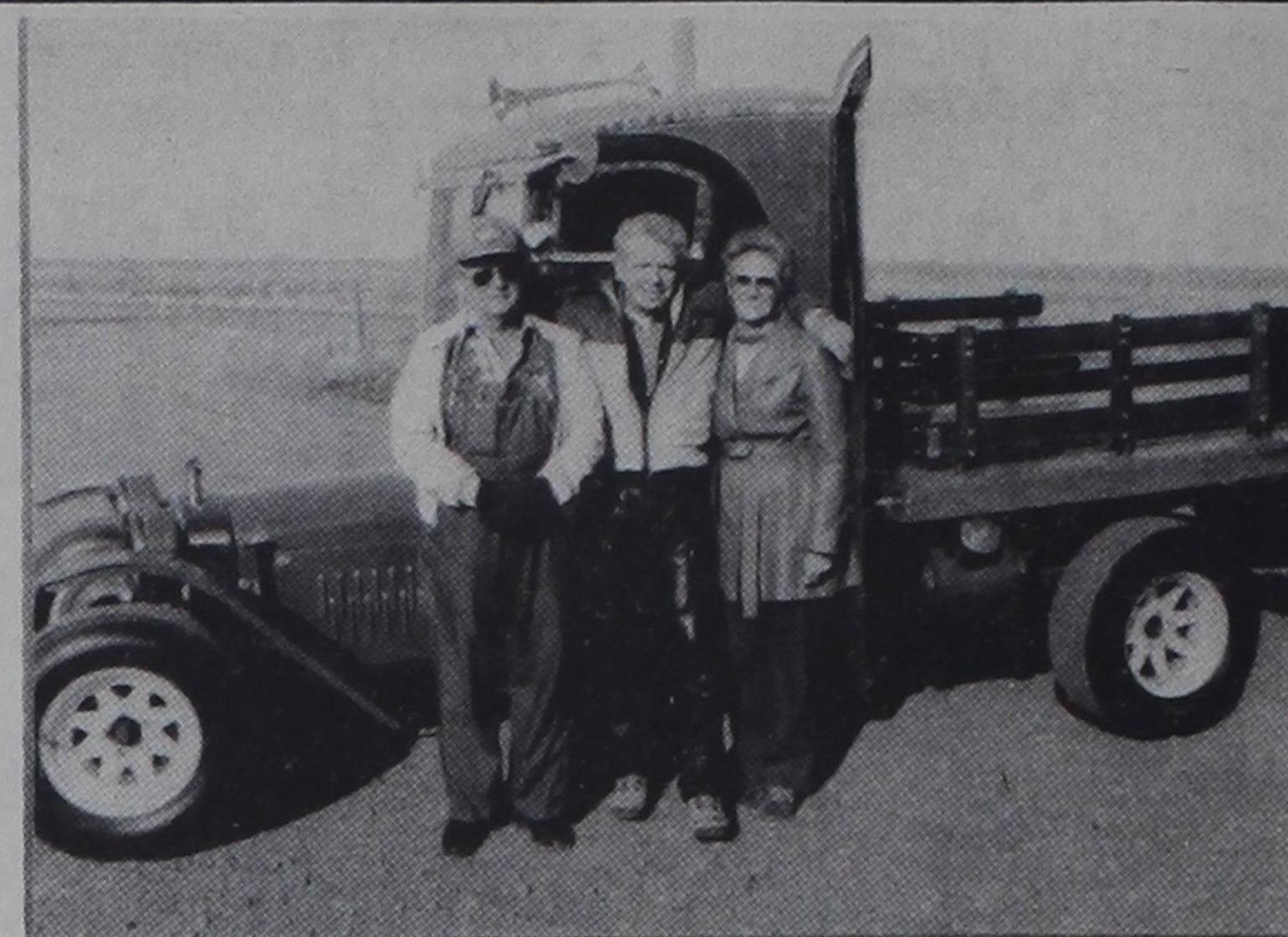
the part of Hammerhead, and "Cannonball Run." About Reynolds, Norm says "Burt is a wonderful guy. He's a down-to-earth fellow. I expected to see some arrogant, self-centered, egotistical person, but he was great to work with."

After that, Grabowski appeared in the TV series "The Blue and the Grey," playing a northern colonel.

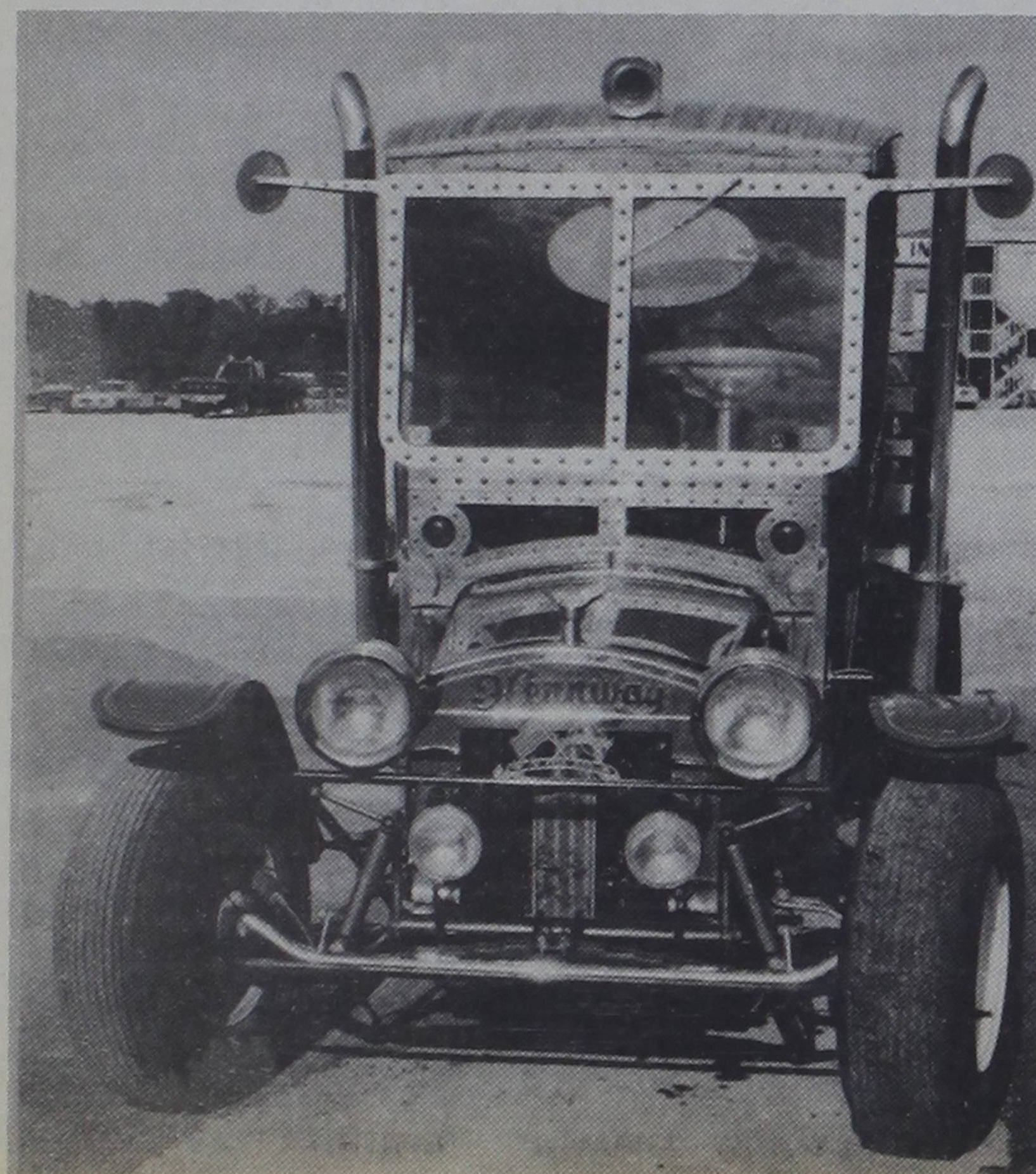
In the TV series "Mod Squad," he appeared as a retarded man, appropriately named Norm (type cast?), who was accused of being a strangler. He considers the role of a Hell's Angel type in "Run for Your Life" as his favorite.

Grabowski and his wife, the former Sandy Jo Ingersol, moved from California to Arkansas about 12 years ago, and tried to buy Bull Shoals Lake. When this was not possible, they settled for some property located on the lake. Their home is located in a very small place called Tucker Hollow, about ten miles from Lead Hill, Arkansas.

Norm has been entertaining with his whistling since he was six years old. His unique technique is done by rolling his tongue against the top of his mouth and "letting the

# Booths OK'd-Fer Sure!

The on-again, off-again voting booths, which have been considered by the Parmer County Commissioners, are on again.

The commissioners, acting after County Clerk Bonnie Warren passed around copies of the voting law, stating that voting booths SHALL be provided at each polling place, first came up with a tie vote on the question. Judge Porter Roberts broke the tie by voting in favor.

"According to the law, we could have been in violation at our May elections, if we didn't have the booths," Roberts explained.

The court voted in 1985 to order the booths, and after the order had been made, recinded the order on a re-vote.

In other business by the court this past Monday, a motion was passed to pay the county's four fire departments \$3,500 each. This amount is budgeted each year to

help the various departments, which have a certain number of rural fire calls.

Motion was approved to purchase the copy machine which had been on trial in the County Clerk's office, at a price of \$2,600 from Baker Graphics.

Boarding care bills for the county's foster children, in the amount of \$3,428, were approved. This amount will be reimbursed by the state.

A motion was passed to deed the City Park property to the City of Friona, while reserving all mineral rights for the county.

The court approved payment of certain bills owed to Parmer County Community Hospital in the amount of \$999.80, owed by indigents.

The county treasurer's quarterly report was approved, with the stipulation that it be printed in the county's three newspapers.

The salary schedule for county

employees for 1986 was approved, showing a five per cent increase.

A handling fee of \$59 was paid to Panhandle Community Services, for the commodities distributed by the county.

Dues of \$125 were paid to the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas, along with a \$50 payment of dues to the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Assn.

A request for a special assessment of \$131 from the National Assn. of Counties, to try to keep the Revenue Sharing payment coming, was approved.

Sheriff Morgan was given approval to promote Murlene Smith to Chief Dispatcher at a monthly salary of \$781.04, which was within the department's budget.

June Rhodes was appointed to replace Bessie Holt on the Parmer County Child Welfare Board, and Mrs. Dendy Williams was

appointed to replace Kay Williams.

A resolution opposing the location of a P.C.B. disposal facility in Hansford County was approved by the court.

Other discussion included approval of paying a gas bill for an indigent citizen. Needed repairs to the District Courtroom were discussed further.

Janette Pierce, County Extension Agent for Home Economics, reported on various activities underway in the county. A motion was passed approving soil work on ten county properties, when the machinery is not otherwise needed. Cost of such work is paid by the farmers requesting the work.

Other items included adopting the county's holiday schedule, setting of the 1986 terms of court, and appointing a county salary grievance committee.

**Friona Ex-Students Banquet Has Excellent Attendance**

They came from Pakistan. They came from Germany. They came from all over the world for their 1985 Alma Mater Banquet and get-together.

They came from Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Minnesota, Washington, Wisconsin, Wyoming and Texas. They came from all over America. They came to eat and visit.

In Texas, they came from Adrian to Arlington, Bootleg to Benbrook, Dumas to Dallas, Graham to Galveston, Laguna Park to Lubbock, Muleshoe to Mineola, Crane to Cleveland, Hart to Houston, Spearman to Sealy, Rhea to Richardson, Farwell to Nacogdoches, and all in between including Friona.

They laughed and cried. They hugged and shook hands. They showed pictures of their children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren to each other. There were three generations of ex-students in some families. They said, "No, you can't be..." but their name tag through their trifocals said so.

Toupees, hair coloring, false teeth, walking aids, eye glasses, artificial limbs and hearing aids were common accessories. There were beautiful young looking great-grandmothers present. They were from the 1916 to 1980 graduating classes. Some were there that had never been back to a school reunion before. "This is fun--this is great--let's do this more often," said those who hadn't worked for several weeks getting it together.

Many local ex-students made many phone calls, asked lots of questions and drove many miles trying to and finding ex-classmates, but "It was worth it," they said.

They reminisced of school plays, ball games, sand storms, blizzards, trips to the principal's office and old school buses. When Frio Draw would come down (or was it come up?), the school kids south of town would have to ride a wagon across the draw pulled by a team of horses or a yoke of oxen. Friona may have been the first school to have buses in the state, maybe even in the nation.

Some remembered the nice easy-going superintendent who finally got all the mischief he would stand for from a group of high school boys; then took them to his office and busted their little butts good and hard. One boy called the superintendent into the locker room and dropped his pants and drawers and bent over to show a

couple of big red cherries on his bottom, then said, "Thank you, sir, I didn't think you had it in you."

Lessons learned from the books are mostly forgotten but a good example is long remembered; and the ex-students had many fine teachers to thank for these examples. Some remembered the Agriculture teacher and his wife who taught Home Economics.

Who'd have ever thought that a bunch of lug-headed boys could learn to open doors for the ladies? Some remembered the new little English teacher who came from Claude to her first teaching job. She was younger than some of her students, but she was always the teacher.

Many ex-students were there who are also teachers and ex-teachers of Friona schools. Many reminisced about the little schools they started in: Black, Rhea, Lakeview, Messenger and Jesko and the good start they got before coming to the 'Big' school in Friona.

Some got to visit with old and ex-school day sweethearts. Many, many met their lifetime mates at Friona schools, married and

became leaders in community activities: scouts, school trustees, churches. Some have come back to work at various places: hospitals, schools, grain elevators, cowboys, farmers and housewives.

When the master of ceremonies asked for a moment of silence in memory of the ex-students who have passed on--every head was bowed and every eye was closed. There were remembrances, each in his own way of a downed B17 over Europe, a school activity that was the last for some, a hard cold final winter in Korea, a new young wife and mother who didn't get to raise her child, a beach head on a far away shore, nature's way of taking some, or a steamy jungle in Vietnam. Amen.

Before they ate supper a Prayer of Thanks was spoken by one of the ex-students to express the gratitude of all--Amen.

Six hundred name tags were there for the names and year--that was a lot of help (37 tags were not used, but some did not get their tags). 580 chairs were set up around tables. A few were not occupied, but some other chairs were brought in. And still just like school kids, water glasses were

spilled, etc., but everyone enjoyed a wonderful meal and as fast as a serving line as possible for nearly 600 people.

After the banquet, some of the different classes met in a member's home to reminisce and visit. Before the banquet at 6 p.m. some of the classes met in a member's home to visit and reminisce, that's what is needed locally. Ex-students that arrive in town in the middle of the afternoon need someone's home to go to visit. It used to be fun to 'drag Main' all afternoon, but one drag is more than most ex-students need now.

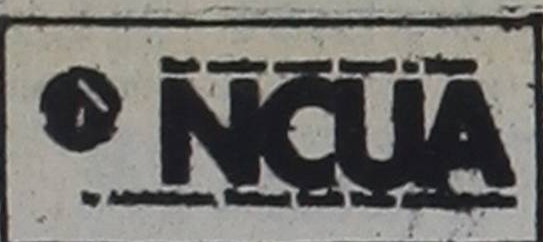

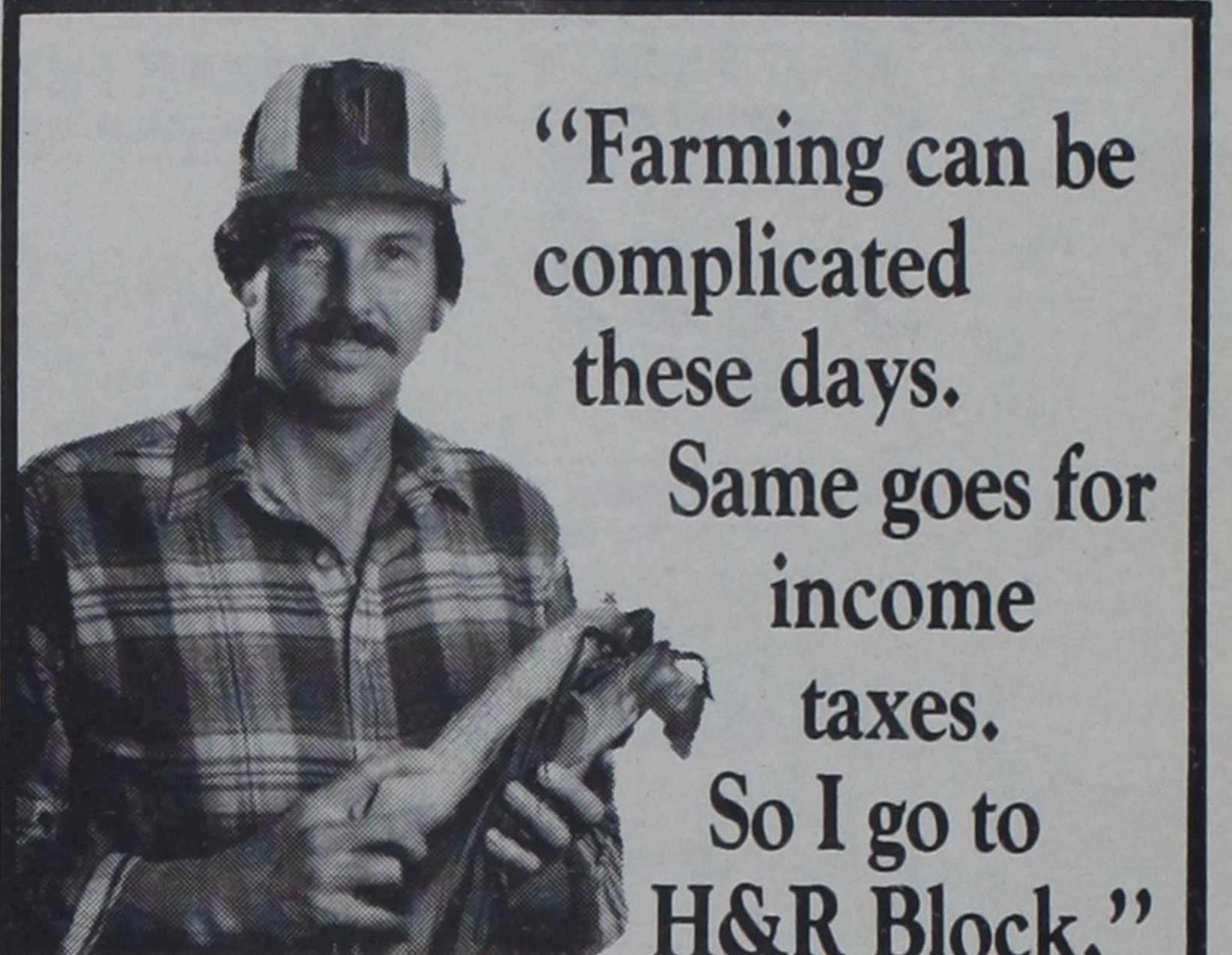
