Star Lites

THE MONTH of January is virtually gone, and so far it has been one of the mildest Januaries that most folks can remember.

We have had afternoon temperatures in the 60s and 70s, with some thermometers reaching 80 last Sunday.

We all know, deep down, that winter has to be lurking around the corner, and that when it hits, it is really going to hurt, after all of this mild weather. But we're enjoying it while we can, and letting the folks in the north and northeast have the cold weather.

In the meantime, our area is beginning to be somewhat dry. It has been quite some time since we had any moisture to amount to anything. The little snow we had back before Christmas was the last appreciable moisture, and that didn't amount to much.

Someone said that our first snow came on November 30, and going by the "Old Wives' Tale," we should have received 30 snows during this winter.

So far, the Old Wives' Tale is going down the tube, but again, winter-time can be stretched into the portion of the calendar that is normally considered spring, so anything can happen. Meanwhile, we'll take the warmer weather, as opposed to the much below freezing temperatures that we could be having.

CONGRESS IS RESUMING after the Christmas break, and one of the most controversial items it will discuss will be the Gramm-Ruddman bill, which proposes a mandatory balanced budget within five years.

We have always considered ourselves to be politically conservative, so when Gramm-Ruddman first came out, our first reaction was "Good...this is going to cut taxes and force congress to operate on a balanced budget, like the rest of us."

But the more we read and hear about the bill and all of the programs that would be cut by its implementation, we have found ourselves wondering just how conservative we really are.

We've always been a Reagan fan, before and since hearing him speak in person in 1968. And President Reagan has done a lot to help cap inflation.

But at the same time, the Reagan years have been less successful for most business people, especially the farming industry, than former years when inflation was at an all-time high.

It sort of set us to wondering if perhaps our country isn't geared to have to have a certain amount of inflation, so we can at least have "business as usual."

Most people are more apt to buy and sell when there is a "careless" mood in the land. When the attitude is to cut back, that trickles on down to the individual consumer.

Our small towns, and even our county government has been helped in recent years by the Revenue Sharing program. While the governments involved were warned not to become dependent on the funds, they sure have been a nice addition to the tax-based revenue.

The Revenue Sharing program was a vehicle through which most people felt that at least they were getting a little bit (even though a small percentage) of their federal taxes returned for local use.

This program would undoubtedly be terminated by the Gramm-Ruddman bill, as would many other federal assistance programs.

It behooves taxpayers everywhere to study more about the proposed bill, and let your representatives know how you feel about certain things. Although it sounded good on paper, we may not be quite ready for a balanced budget.

Don't condemn the judgment of another—you may both be wrong.

39th Annual Show Slated

The 39th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 29-February 1 at the Community Center-Showbarn.

Some 600 animals are expected for the show, which draws entries from all over the county. A new category will be judged this year: turkeys. Otherwise competing will be steers, barrows, lambs, heifers and goats.

Weigh-in will be on Wednesday from 1-7 p.m. Judging of the turkeys will begin at 7 p.m. Wednesday. Classification of lambs and steers will begin at 8 p.m. Wednesday.

Lambs and goats will be judged Thursday, January 30, starting with lambs at 5 p.m. The barrow show will be held on Friday starting at 8 a.m. Steers judge at 8 a.m. Saturday, followed by the heifer show.

The premium sale will be held on Saturday, February 1, starting at 2 p.m.

Terry Copley of Friona is general superintendent of the 1986 show. Mack Heald of Farwell is assistant general superintendent. Rick Seaton of Lazbuddie is in charge of the barrow show. Noel White of Friona is heading the lamb and goat divisions. Gene Schueler of the Rhea community is in charge of the cattle division.

Once again Friona State Bank will be hosts for a free breakfast for exhibitors, buyers and workers on Friday morning, January 31, 6:30-8 a.m.

Squaws At Tulia In Big Game

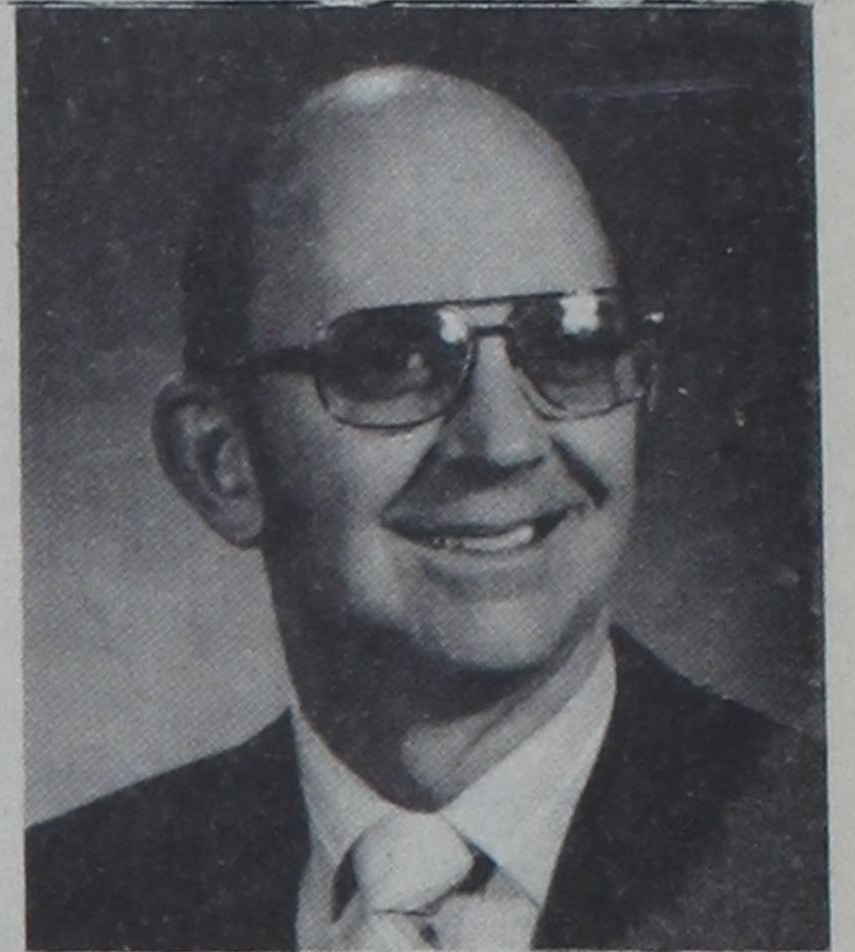
The inside track to the second-half district lead may be the stakes when the Friona Squaws visit Tulia on Tuesday night.

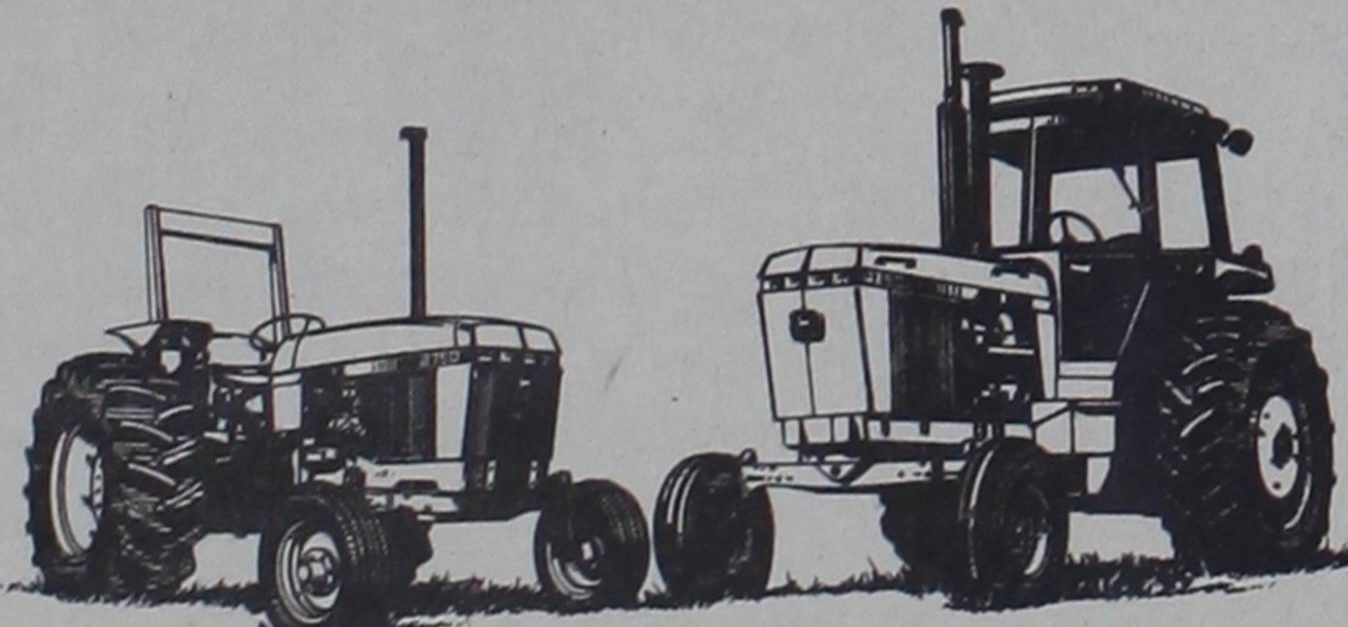

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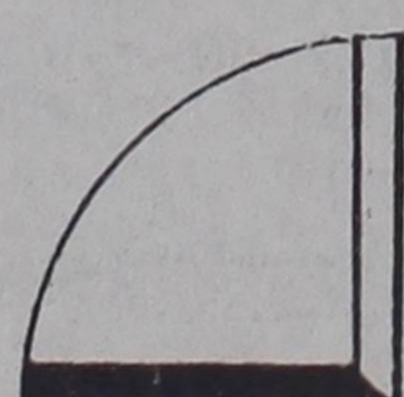
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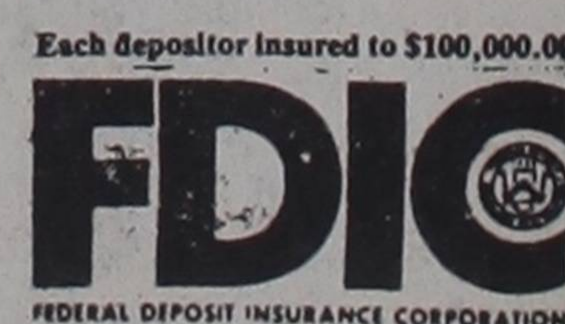

"We probably played our best game of the year against LaPlata," said Braves coach Dennis Field.

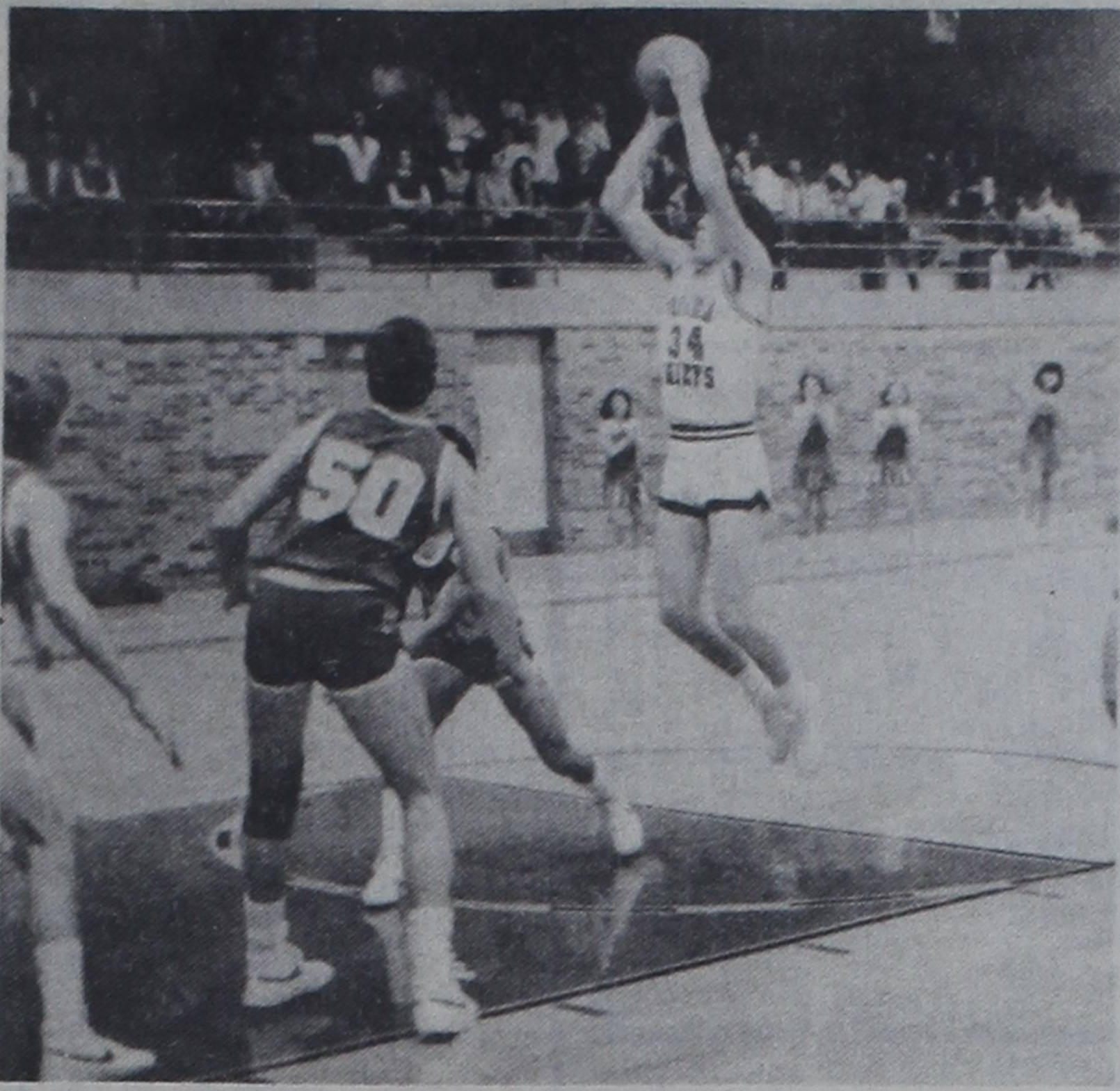
The Braves held the lead virtually throughout regulation time, leading at the half, 18-11. But the Hereford team rallied to take their first lead late in the game.

Gonzales Leads Area All-Staters

Paul Gonzales, Lazbuddie's record-setting wide receiver, continued to reap postseason honors Saturday when he was named to the Texas Sports Writers Association's Class 1A all-state football team.

Gonzales, a 6-foot-2, 145-pound senior, caught 67 passes for 1,126 yards and two touchdowns during the Longhorn's 4-6 campaign. He also ran for two more touchdowns on ends-around and returned a kickoff 91 yards for another TD.

The Avalanche-Journal South Plains Class 1A Player of the Year, Gonzales etched his name in the record books October 25 against state-ranked Nazareth, catching 17 passes for 196 yards.

Only one Texas high school football player has caught more balls in one game than

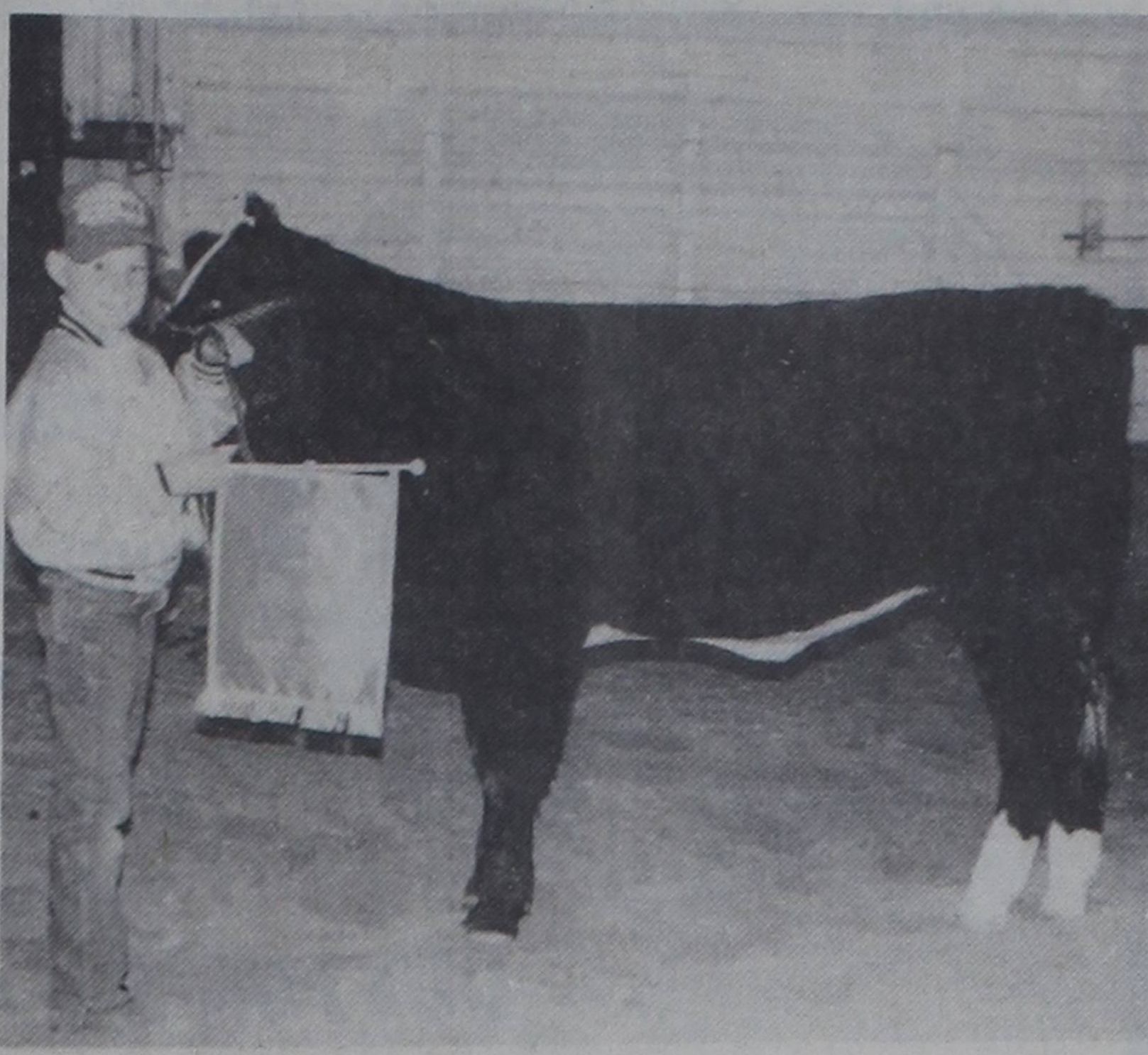

39th Annual Jr. Stock Show Set

The 39th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 29-February 1 at the Community Center-Showbarn in Friona.

For the third time in five years, the show will sport a new division, as a turkey show has been added for the 1986 show.

Judging of turkeys will be done on Wednesday at 7 p.m. The first order of business will be the weigh-in of animals set to begin at 1 p.m. Wednesday. The weigh-in period will be from 1-7 p.m. Lambs and steers will be classified starting at 8 p.m. Wednesday.

The lamb show will be held beginning at 5 p.m. Thursday, January 30, followed by the goat show. Judging the lambs and goats will be Bill Gardner.

Barrows will be judged beginning at 8 a.m. Friday. The entire day of judging is given over to the barrows, which consistently produces the biggest division in the show. Judging the barrows will be Stanley Young.

The steers will be shown starting at 8 a.m. on Saturday, followed by the heifer show. Judging the steers and heifers will be Tracy Haymes.

The auction sale for the premium animals will be held beginning at 2 p.m. on Saturday, February 1.

Also on Friday, Friona State Bank will once again sponsor a free breakfast for all exhibitors, buyers and workers, at the showbarn, from 6:30-8 a.m.

Exhibitors of grand champion animals at the 1985 show were: Dana Berend of Friona, steers and heifers; Chad Rhodes, Friona, barrows; Tracy Moore of Bovina, sheep; and Shannon Cochran, Friona, goats.

Miss Berend won the steer title with a 1254-pound Chianina crossbred animal. That gave her school the county's steer title for the 20th time since 1948. It was the

eighth time for a crossbred steer to claim the county title. Hereford steers have won 18 banners in the show's previous 38 years. Angus or Angus crosses have won six titles.

Rhodes' win in the barrow division marked only the third time in 25 years for a Friona showman to exhibit the champion barrow, and just the eighth for Friona in 38 years.

The champion barrow in 1985 was a Hampshire, the breed which has won the most county banners--eleven. Duroc barrows have won eight times; crossbreds have been tapped on seven occasions; Polands have won six titles and Chester Whites four.

Stock show boosters and buyers are urged to attend the premium auction sale, beginning at 2 p.m. on Saturday, February 1.

The animals placing in the top portion of each class will be eligible for the sale.

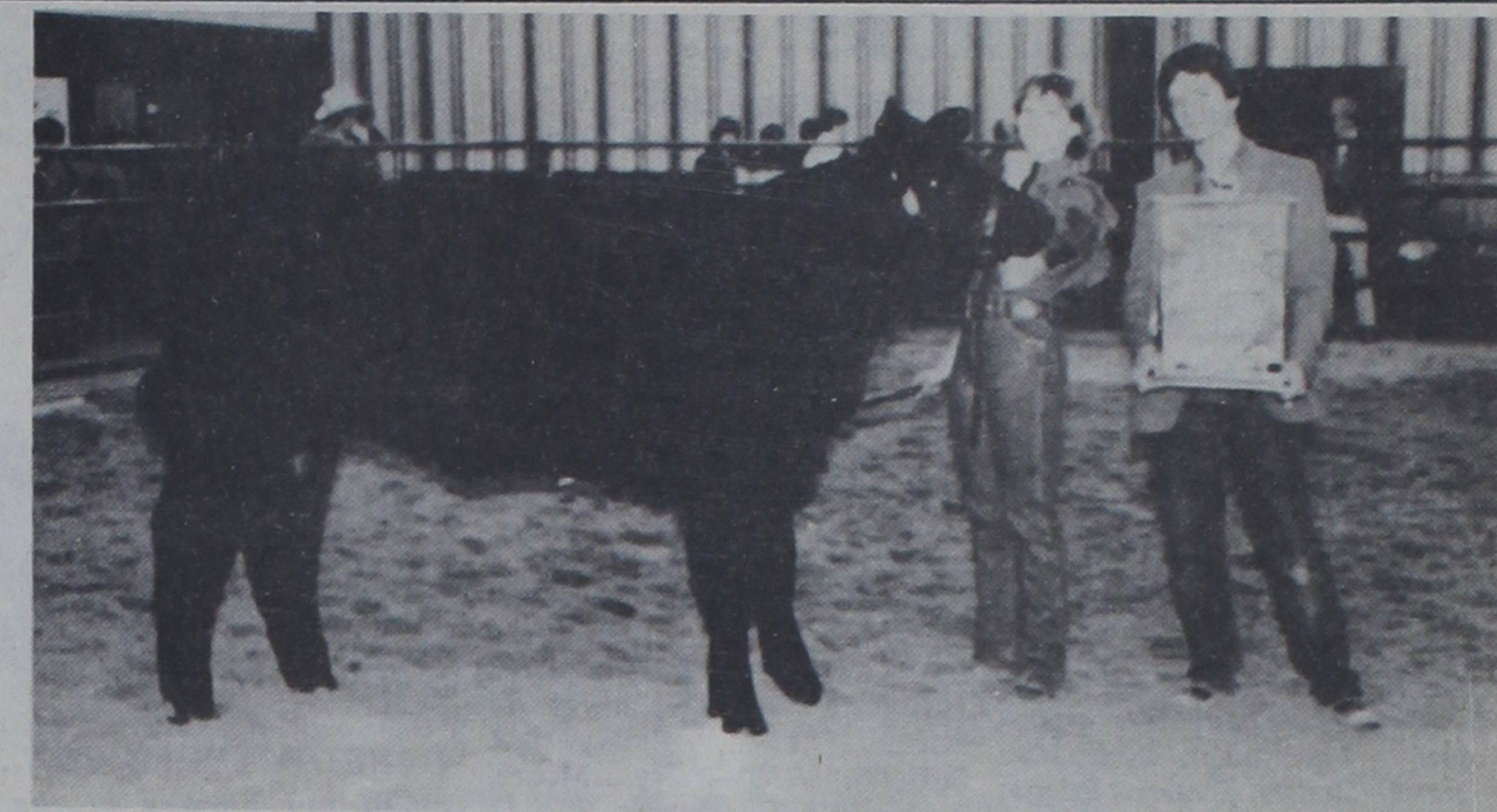

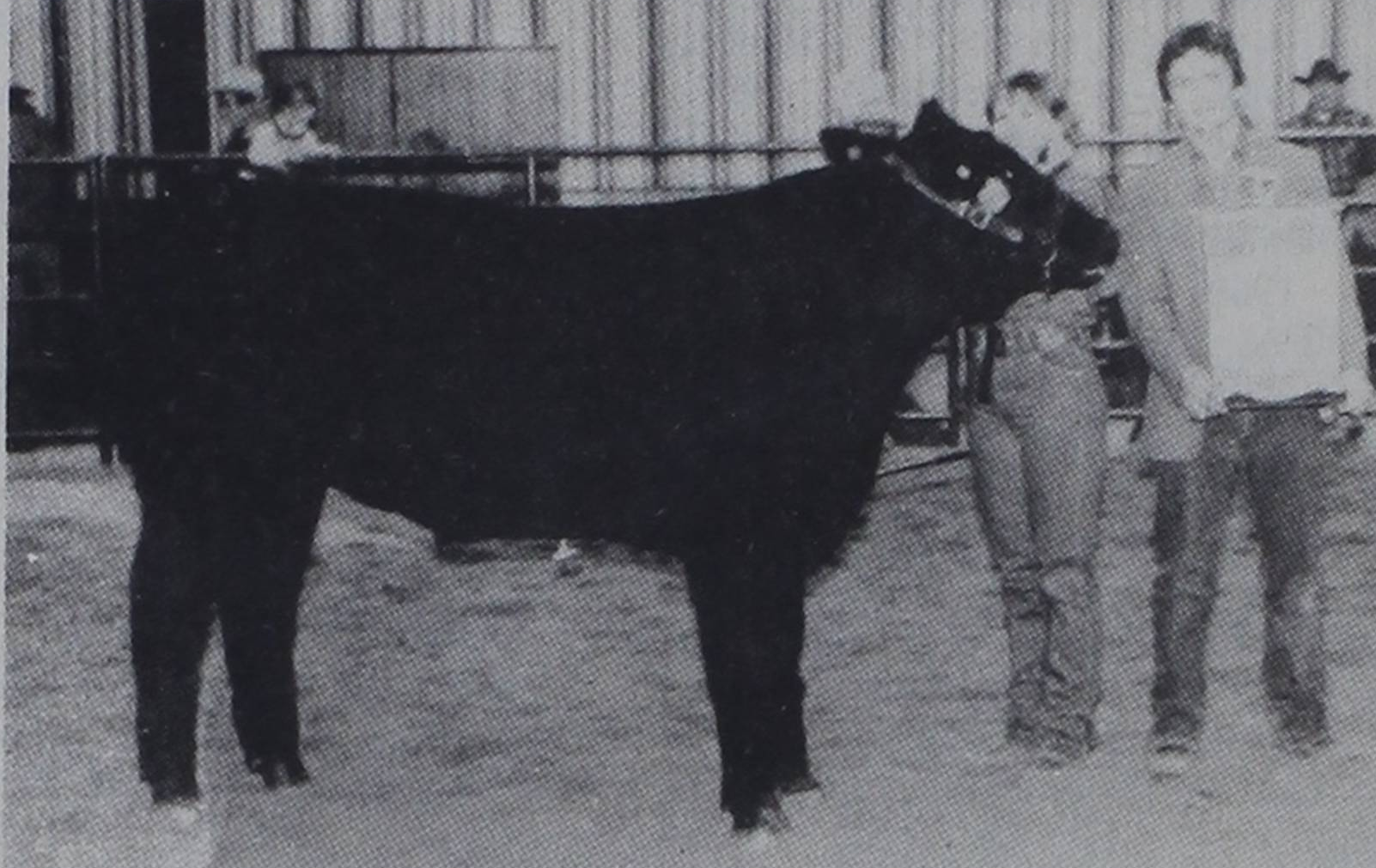

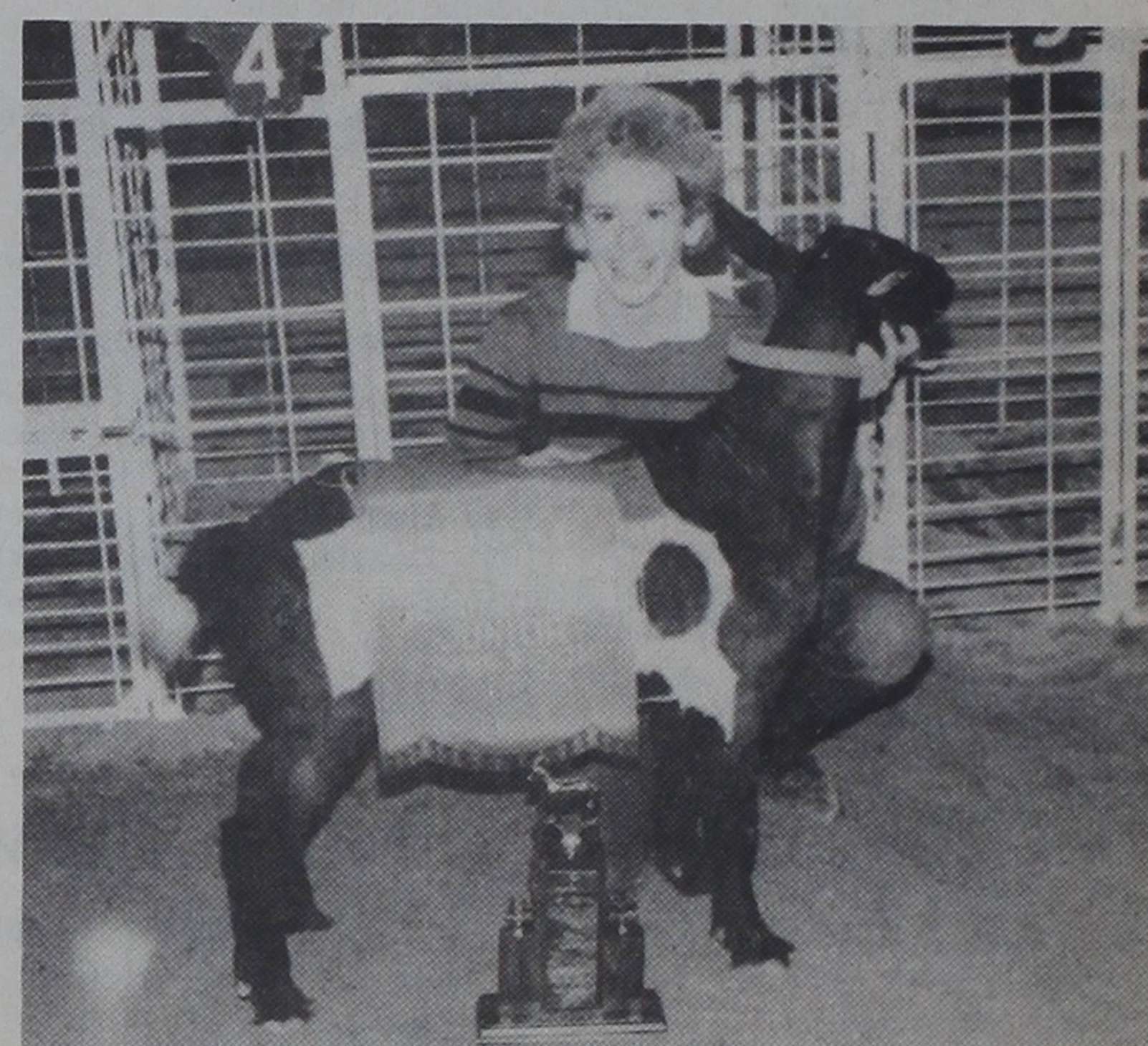

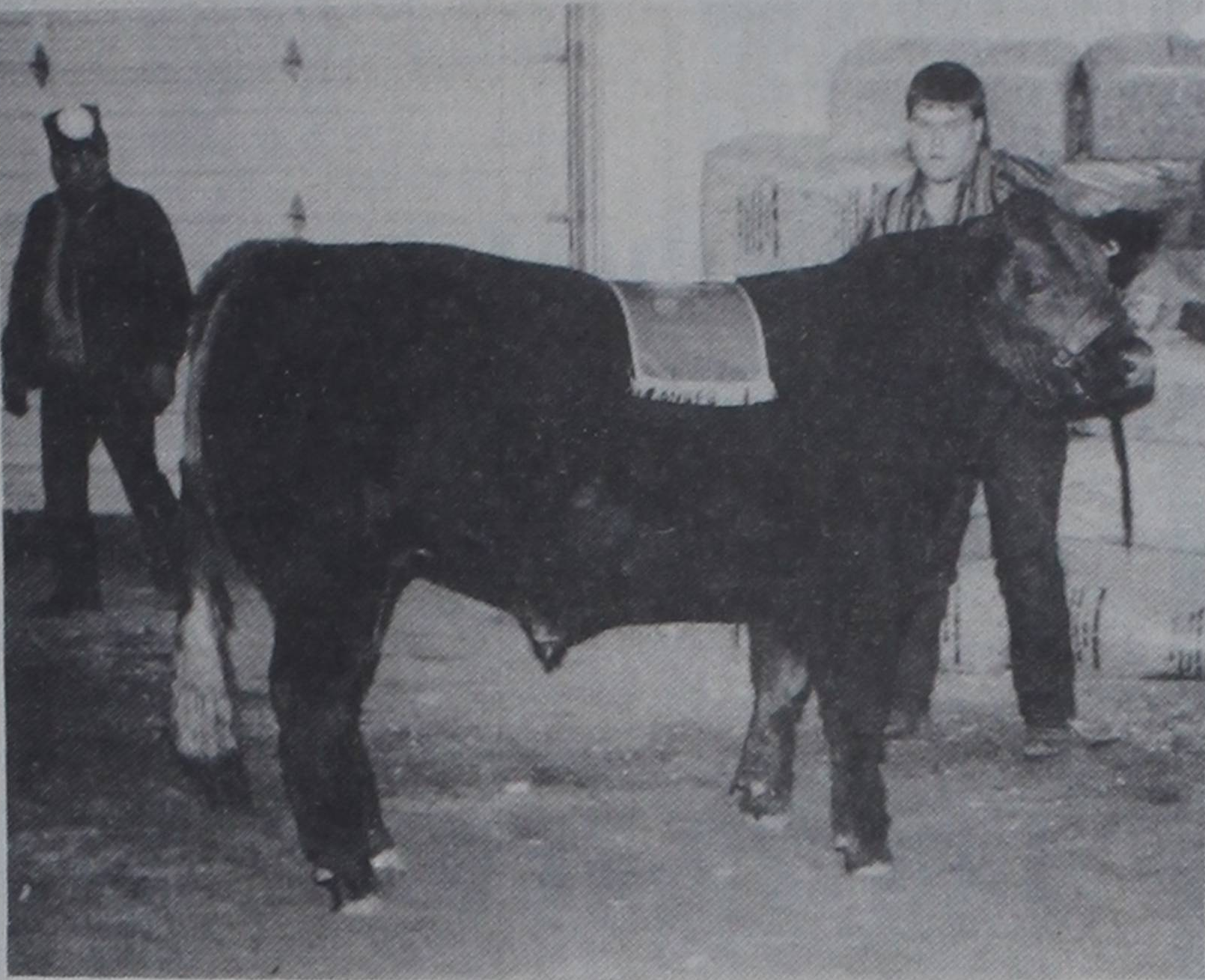
In the sheep show, Dustee Gee exhibited the top fine wool lamb and Jennifer Smith had the champion fine wool cross.

Reports were given in regard to the clothes closet at the Friona Methodist Church, Christmas activities sponsored by the board, and availability of video cassettes for public viewing.

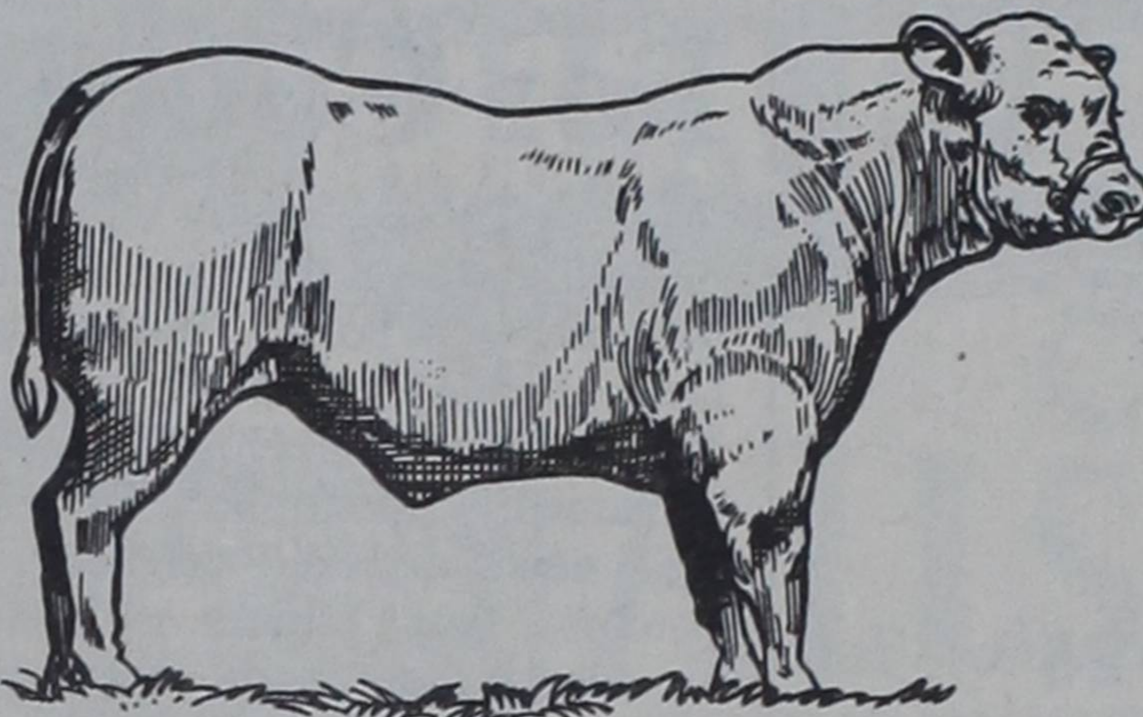

The Modern Study Club met Tuesday night, January 21.

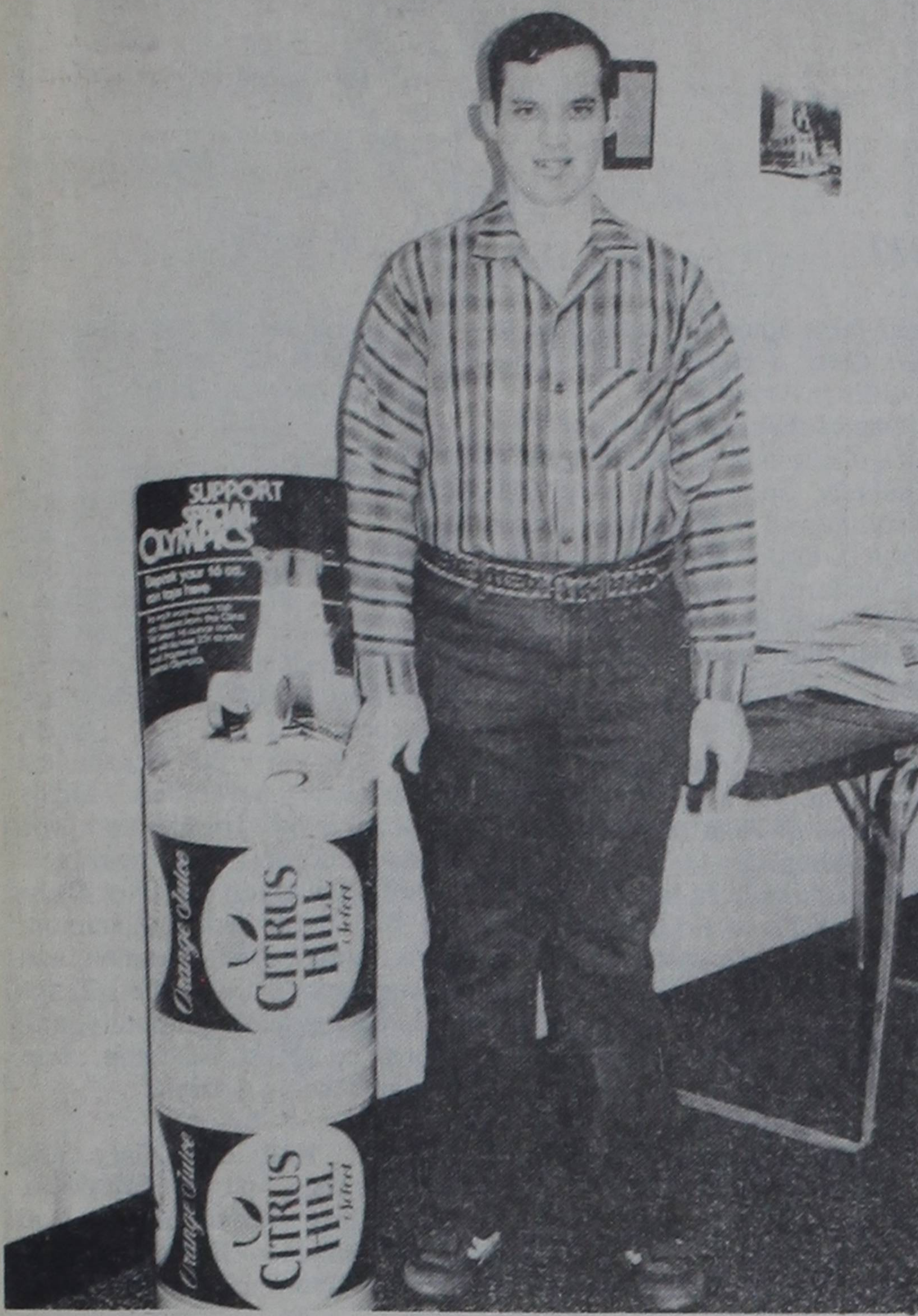
During the business session, the president, Beth Thompson, asked for the report of the nominating committee.

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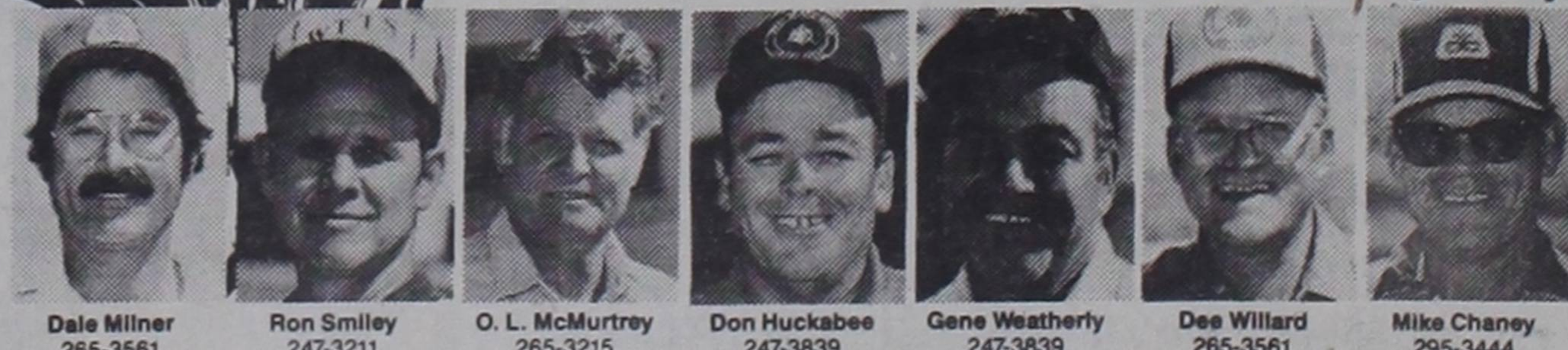
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Farwell Home Is Historic Landmark

One of Farwell's oldest homes has been designated a Texas Historic Landmark by the Texas Historical Commission.

Known locally as the Aldridge house, it is recorded by the Commission as the Hopping-Aldridge house in honor of the two previous owners. Located at 710 4th St., the structure is currently owned by Mack Heald.

The house was built at this site between 1915-17 for R.C. "Coke" Hopping, Parmer County Sheriff from 1910-1918. It was purchased by James and Minnie Aldridge in 1918. Aldridge succeeded Hopping as the sheriff, with his term starting in 1919.

The Aldridges' two sons, Sam and John, grew up in the house. After John married Lillian Orr, they moved into the house with his parents. Their two daughters, Mary Bell Aldridge Washington and Nancy Aldridge Mehler, grew up in the home, and it remained in

the Aldridge family until selling to Heald in 1981.

Architecturally, the house is a two-story, foursquare design-frame structure with two coats of wire and stucco applied over the wood siding. This technique was sometimes practiced in this part of Texas, with the resulting structure of this type called a Prairie Style building. The Hopping-Aldridge house is one of the few homes of this style to be found in this part of the Texas Panhandle.

In 1984, the house received an exterior restoration that consisted of replacing the bannisters that had previously been removed. All wood and stucco surfaces were painted in colors that were used in the era that the house was built.

The Hopping-Aldridge house is the first residence in Parmer County to receive a state medallion. Two buildings--the Parmer County Courthouse and the old First National Bank building (currently part of the Aldridge, Harding, Aycock and Actkinson law firm office on Third Street)--in Farwell have been designated Texas Historical Landmarks in the past.

Interesting and often unusual highlights of Texas history can be found on more than 8,000 historical markers that dot the state. These familiar markers are the results of a joint local-state program. Markers are initiated, researched and funded by county historical commissions, and are approved and written at the Texas Historical Commission in Austin.

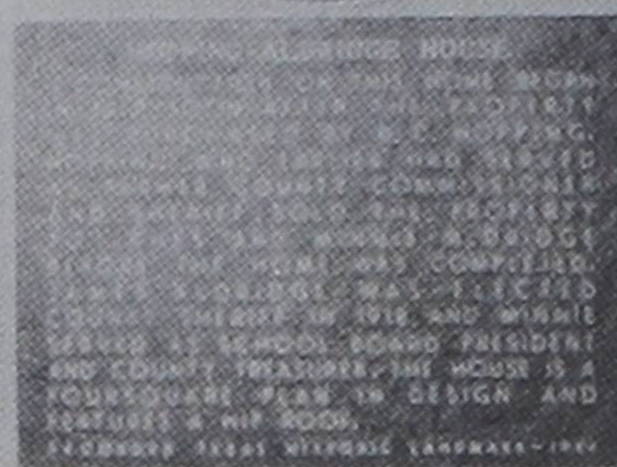
A systematic program of historical markers began in 1936, in conjunction with the state's centennial. Granite markers, often containing brass plates, were placed to honor counties' roles in the state's first 100 years.

In 1962 the placement of official

historical Medallion building markers began under the auspices of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, forerunner of the Texas Historical Commission. These markers are awarded to structures worthy of preservation because of their historical, cultural, and/or architectural value. Structures receiving the building markers are known as Recorded Texas Historic Landmarks and are afforded a measure of protection from demolition or alteration under state law. Currently there are approximately 2,000 of these building markers in Texas.

Soon after the placement of Medallions began, the marker program expanded to include interpretive plates with all Medallions. Subject and grave markers were also developed. With these additions, the program came to encompass a wide variety of historical subjects, including events, persons, institutions, cemeteries, archeological sites, ethnic groups, churches, and communities.

A marker dedication for the Hopping-Aldridge house is planned for sometime in 1986 in conjunction with the Texas Sesquicentennial Celebration.
