THE MONTH of January is virtually gone, and so far it has been one of the mildest Januarys that most folks can remember.







In fact, it took a long shot by David Barnett in the last 15 seconds to tie the game, 28-all and send it into overtime.


Kyle Wilkins scored the team's two baskets in the second overtime for the win. Each team had scored a single basket in the first extra period.











# Farwell Home Is Historic Landmark

One of Farwell's oldest homes has been designated a Texas Historic Landmark by the Texas Historical Commission.

Known locally as the Aldridge house, it is recorded by the Commission as the Hopping-Aldridge house in honor of the two previous owners. Located at 710 4th St., the structure is currently owned by Mack Heald.

The house was built at this site between 1915-17 for R.C. "Coke" Hopping, Parmer County Sheriff from 1910-1918. It was purchased by James and Minnie Aldridge in 1918. Aldridge succeeded Hopping as the sheriff, with his term starting in 1919.

The Aldridges' two sons, Sam and John, grew up in the house. After John married Lillian Orr. they moved into the house with his parents. Their two daughters, Mary Bell Aldridge Washington and Nancy Aldridge Mehler, grew up in the home, and it remained in


