ONE OF THE PROGRAMS which congress is struggling to finish before they adjourn for the Christmas holidays is a Tax Reform Bill.

Opinion: It's going to be tough for a congress to vote for reduced tax exemptions, etc., for the general public, after exempting themselves this past week from new pension taxes, which are to affect all federal employees.

Or on the other hand, if the House of Representatives is that self-serving, in comparison with other federal employees, perhaps they could make it doubly tough on the rank and file taxpayer. Personally, ye editor is hoping that the Christmas break comes with no new tax program.

We have always gone under the theory that we can get along with what we have, whereas nobody knows what a legislature body, in a rush to pass a new law, will come up with. Witness the 1984 special session of the Texas legislature and the so-called School Reform Bill.

ON THE SUBJECT of government, a reader gave us this clipping, which appeared recently in the Ann Landers column. I think part of it has appeared lots of places, maybe even in our column.

"COMMUNISM: You have two cows. The government takes both of them and gives you part of the milk.

"FASCISM: You have two cows. The government takes both cows and sells you the milk.

"NAZISM: You have two cows. The government takes both of them and shoots you.

"BUREAUCRACY: You have two cows. The government takes both of them, shoots one, milks the other, then pours the milk down the drain.

"CAPITALISM: You have two cows. You sell one of them and buy a bull.

"Abby, what happens in a democracy?"

"Dear Mrs. McC.: In a democracy, everyone has two cows, then a vote is taken and whatever the majority decides to do, you do, and that's no bull!

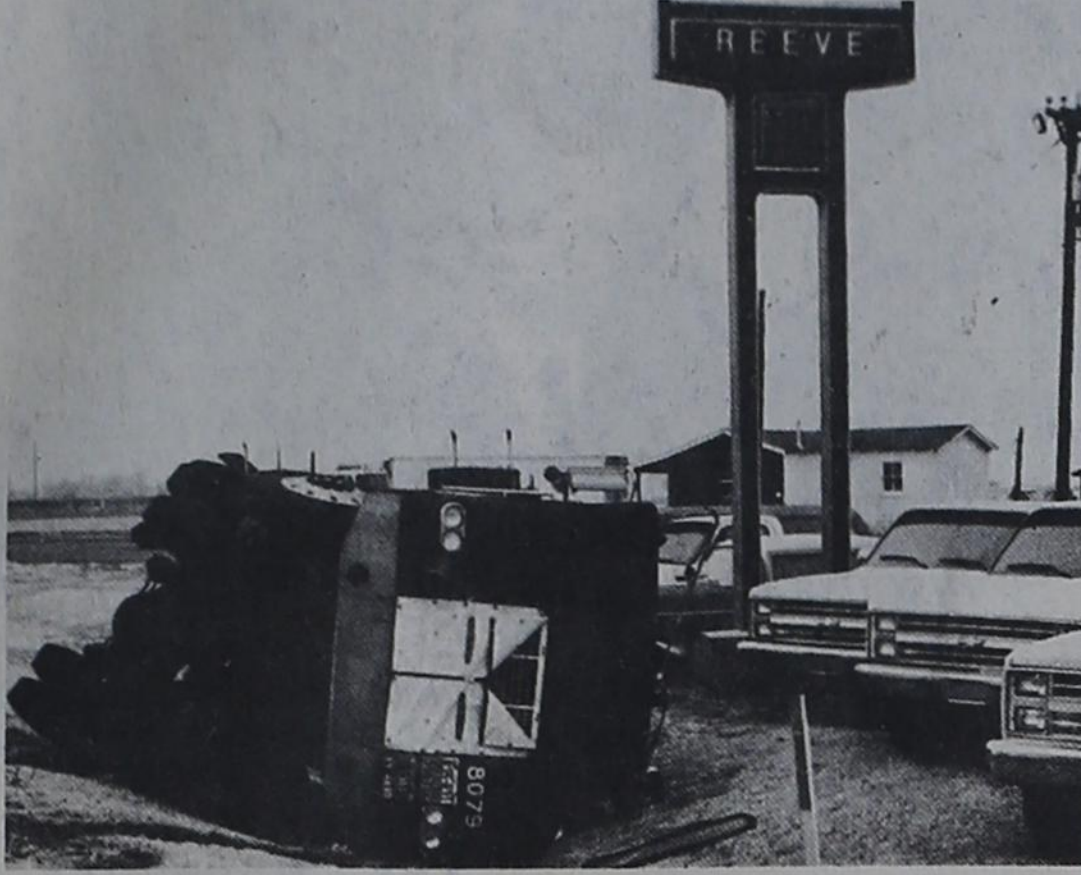
"Dear Abby: Our founding fathers did not establish a democracy; they established a republic. Let's use the two cows to illustrate the difference:

"In a democracy, you have two cows. A vote is taken among all the people, 99 percent of whom never saw a cow; they think milk comes from the supermarket. Whatever the majority decides you should do with your cows, you do—unless the government pays you not to raise cows, shoots one, milks the other one, and pours the milk down the drain.

"In a republic, you have two cows. You can sell one and buy a bull, have one or both cut up into steaks, or sell both and move into a condominium because under a republic each person has the inalienable right to do whatever he darn well pleases to do with his property. And that's no bull either. Around here, we call it liberty.

"Dear Abby: I hate to contradict your definition of democracy, but everyone in America does not have two cows. A more accurate description of how the system works would be: You have two cows, one neighbor has 10 cows and another neighbor doesn't have any. The government takes one of your cows and uses it as collateral to get a loan. It uses one-third of the money for "defense"—to protect your remaining cow—gives one-third to a foreign government to keep it from going communist, and spends the other third on research to find out why your neighbor's 10 cows aren't worth as much as your two were.

"Then the government milks the cows, makes cheese and gives it to the poor people, who would rather have a cow.

Project Xmas Card Deadline Monday

Monday, December 16 is the deadline for residents to join "Project Christmas Card" for 1985, and the response up to now has been somewhat lagging, says Mary Moseley, chairman of the event.

Project Christmas Card is sponsored by Modern Study Club, in conjunction with the Friona Star, and this is the 30th year for the project.

Proceeds from the project will benefit Parmer County Community Hospital. Since its inception, Project Christmas Card has raised over \$65,000 for new hospital equipment and related items. The bulk of that total, or around \$50,000, has been raised in the past 15 years, when hospital officials have designated a special need for the fund.

This year is no exception, and hospital administrator Elda Hart says the proceeds from the 1985 drive need to go toward the purchase of a patient monitor for the hospital's cardiac room.

"The monitor we have is worn out. We really need two units, with a control at the nurses' desk," Miss Hart said. She indicated that the price of the monitors would be around \$8,000 each.

Those wishing to donate to the

fund may bring their donations to Friona State Bank and indicate their desire to participate in the project. Donors are reminded to indicate exactly how they wish their names to be published on the full-page greeting, to be published in the Christmas edition of the Friona Star.

There is no set amount for the donations, and participants are urged to give at least the amount of money they would normally spend on Christmas cards and postage.

Other things which Project Christmas Card has provided to the hospital include automatic beds, heating and air conditioning for the emergency and surgery rooms, a fire alarm system for the building and an anesthetic machine.

Also, a Coulter counter, a monitor for the surgery room, a spirometer (a device to measure pulmonary functions for lung patients), I.V. drip counters, a table and carts for the operating room, a new light for the emergency room, and repaving the hospital parking lot.

Project Christmas Card has been an excellent manner for local (and former) residents to say "Merry Christmas" to their friends and assist the hospital.

Hospital Is Focus Of Piece

Parmer County Community Hospital's search for additional doctors was the focus of a news report produced by Amarillo's Channel 4 on Thursday and aired at 6 and 10 p.m. on that channel.

The channel 4 newsmen interviewed Dr. Bob Alexander at the hospital, as well as Chamber of Commerce spokesman Bob Welch, regarding the coordinated search to be launched for a new doctor.

Pheasant Season Kicks Off

The 1985 pheasant season will kick off Saturday morning, December 14.

Once again, the season will be two weeks in duration, spanning three weekends. Final day of the season will be Sunday, December 29.

The bag limit will remain the same as in years past: two cocks per day and four in possession. Only the cock pheasants are legal game.

This year, for the first time, it will be necessary for hunters to buy a hunting license if they plan to hunt anywhere other than on their own homestead. Game wardens will in all probability be checking for violators on this new law.

A good hunting season is anticipated. Jack Patterson, spokesman for the pheasant season, said he had seen a good number of pheasants in the Rhea community. Reports from other parts of the area have also been encouraging.

A large influx of hunters is expected for the opening weekend of the season next weekend.

A contest for the hunter turning in the longest tailfeather will be held sponsored by the Parmer County Game Management Association. Details on where to turn in the feather entries will be announced next week.

Texas followed the lead of its neighboring state, New Mexico, with the passage of House Bill 1421, which authorized the formation of Operation Game Thief. Concerned citizens may call a 24-hour toll-free number, 1-800-792-GAME, to report flagrant violations of Texas' wildlife and fish laws.

Since implementing its game thief program in 1976, New Mexico has collected over \$79,000 in fines and paid almost \$40,000 in rewards.

Trespassing laws have been stiffened with HB 717 upping criminal trespassing from a Class C to a Class B misdemeanor. In addition, if the offender carries a deadly weapon, he can be charged with a Class A misdemeanor.

Notice has to be present before a person can commit criminal trespassing. Notice is given in three ways: (1) Oral or written communication by owner of property; (2) Presence of fencing to exclude intruders or contain livestock, or (3) Sign posted on property indicating entry is forbidden.

Under the Texas penal code, a Class C misdemeanor carries a maximum \$200 fine. However, trespassers convicted under the new law, under a Class B misdemeanor, will face a possible \$1,000 fine and/or 180 days in jail.

If the offender carries a deadly weapon, and most hunters do, the Class A misdemeanor can cost up to \$2,000 in fines and up to a year in jail.

No public funds will be used in the Operation Game Thief program. More than \$20,000 in donations from individuals and organizations have been received to get the program started.

Bands Set Christmas Concerts

The Christmas concerts by the Friona High School band will be held on Thursday, December 19, beginning at 8 p.m.

The junior high concert, which was postponed Thursday night has been re-scheduled for next Thursday afternoon at 1:15 p.m., and will be an open assembly with the public invited.

In addition to Christmas music, the concerts will feature other contemporary and traditional music.

Area Receives Nice Snowfall

The Friona area received its first snowfall of the season on Thursday of this week. The area has been reeling under an assault of winter-like weather ever since Monday.

The area received freezing drizzle on Tuesday, which caused some driving problems. A local man, Emmett Eugene Bowman, had his truck overturn early Tuesday on Highway 60 in front of Reeve Chevrolet-Olds location. Bowman was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital, where he was checked but appeared to be uninjured.

Friona Police Chief Lloyd Niece said that Bowman, a driver for J-Lines, drove onto the right shoulder while braking his truck. He lost control and the vehicle came to rest on its left side in the ditch. Bowman was westbound, and did not have a trailer on a truck at the time of the accident.

Snow began falling at about 1:30 p.m. Thursday in Friona, and by nightfall the city had received three to five inches of the moist flakes. Official weather recorder Rodney Dunnam estimated 3½ inches of snowfall. The snow appeared to be

very moist, but the official "melt" amount was unavailable Friday.

The snow caused some local cancellations, including the junior high band concert which had been scheduled Thursday night, the Friona Evening Lions' regular meeting, the eighth grade basketball tournament at Muleshoe, and the 4-H Club's Christmas caroling.

The temperature fell to a season's low of four degrees Friday morning. A light amount of additional snow fell for a time Friday, but with no appreciable addition to the accumulation. Friona schools operated on schedule Friday.

55 YEARS AGO--DEC. 5, 1930

Grad Wallace, a rancher of Logan, New Mexico, lost his life last week from exposure while trying to make the trip from Moriarty by the route known as the Santa Rosa cut-off. Wallace was a brother of Mrs. G.C. Applegate of Friona, and was well known in this section. Grad Wallace died at Encino at 1 p.m. Saturday from exposure. He had wandered into a sheep camp Thursday. His car had stalled on the highway near the Ballard Ranch. He did not regain consciousness after being brought to Encino, but it was learned that he had spent two nights and a day at a sheep camp before he was brought to Encino by E. Johnson. He had been sent over the Santa Rosa cut-off on information that the route was passable.

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

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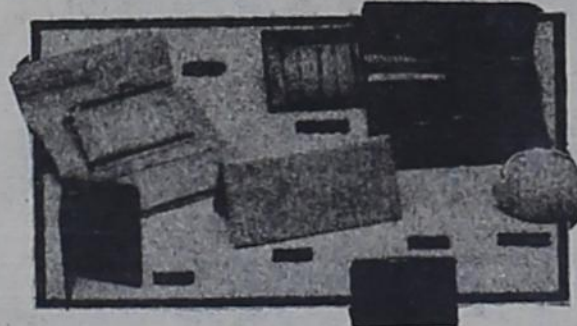
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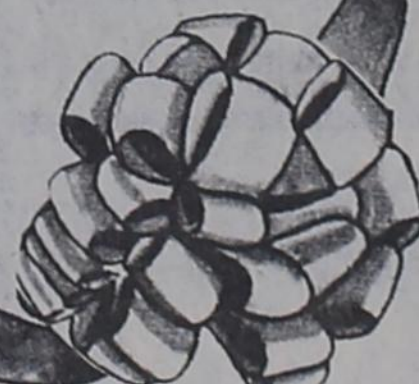
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Lubbock Banquet Honors Top County 4-H Members
