ORDINARILY, by November 1 on the odd-numbered years we have the announcement by the University Interscholastic League (UIL) pertaining to the district alignments for the following two years.

This allows coaches and athletic directors to complete their football and basketball schedules, by knowing which dates are reserved for district games, which teams will be district opponents and which will not.

In keeping with statewide agencies' apparent new slogan of "Let's Change Things up Considerably," school officials will not learn about the new district alignments until after January 1, and coaches have been warned against scheduling games prior to the first of the year.

If they do, they may be in violation with the UIL. What could happen, we're not sure. It could be that they plan to send H. Ross Perot out on horseback, and arrest every school official who has allegedly told another: "We still want to play you in our first game, just like we have for the past 25 years."

Just what is supposed to be accomplished by the two-month delay by the UIL is not certain. We have not been able to find out the reason for it. Perhaps this will be learned later.

In the case of schools which are expecting to move up or down in the classifications, the changes will be dramatic, since some of the schools they have played in non-district games could be district opponents in 1986, and perhaps vice-versa.

Of course, all schools are in the same boat as regards the later start for matching non-district games, but the January 1 delay seems sort of anti-climatic for football.

Most coaches, by this time in the season, have some pretty good ideas of what they would like to do along the line of changing their schedules for the coming year.

The two-month hiatus will definitely serve to break the football "momentum." It will probably be harder for coaches and school officials to accomplish their goals in regard to scheduling, being forced to do it in the off-season.

The UIL always receives a certain amount of "heat" when their re-alignment plans are announced, from those schools who feel they may have been dealt with unjustly.

The two-month delay by the UIL may be an attempt to release the information at a time when it might have less of an impact on school officials and fans.

By January 1, some people might not be able to tell you if such-and-such a school was a district opponent or not.

Or maybe the UIL figures they will get less complaints from the school that learns that they will be having to "drive to Marfa" for district activities for the next two years by making the release in the off-season.

Like we said, we don't know the reasons for the change. Maybe there are some good ones. But human nature being like it is, and considering ourself basically human, we're viewing the change with skepticism.

Donnie McDonald of Muleshoe, although being one of the few in

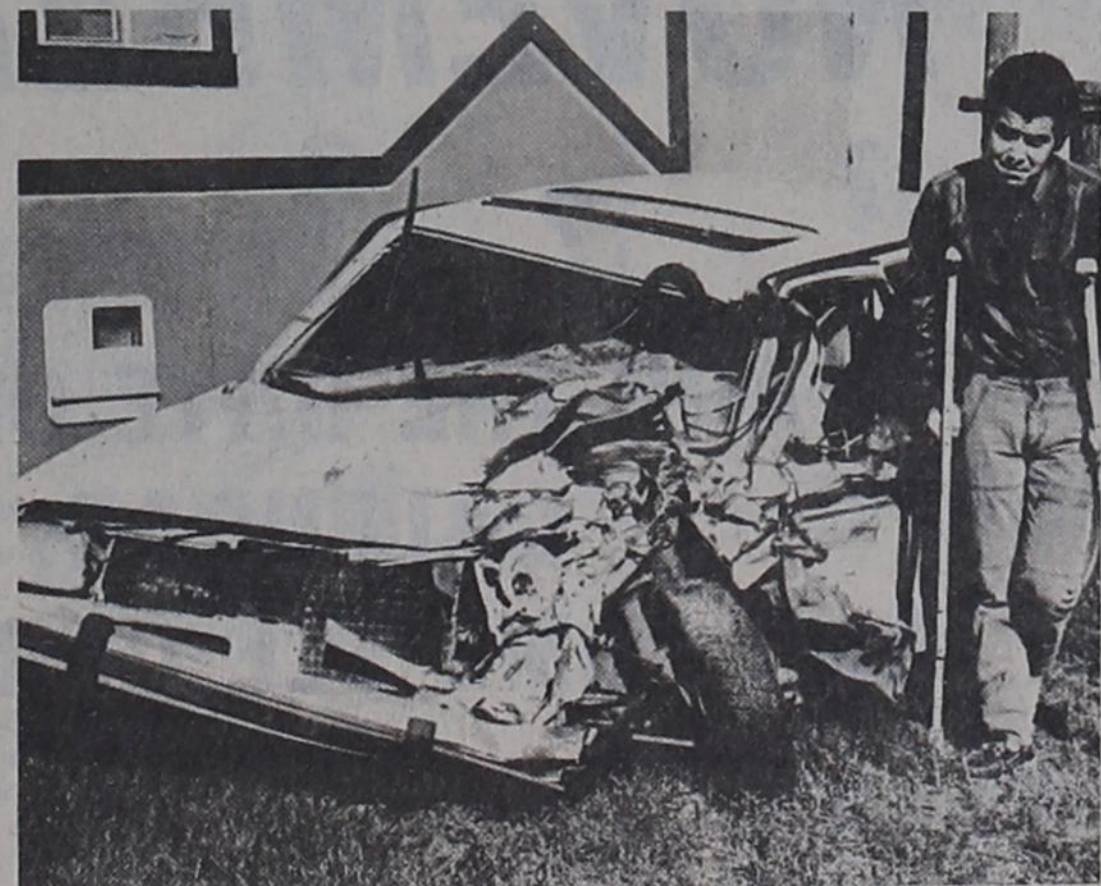
Amendment Vote Set

Voters will cast their ballots at the regular polling places for general election voting. Friona's polling places are: Precinct 2--Fire Station; Precinct 2-1--Calvary Baptist Church and Precinct 2-2--Friona Community Center.

Otherwise, the area polls include: Black, old Tri-County Elevator office; Rhea--Parish Hall; Lakeview--J.D. Willard residence and Lazbuddie--High School.

The two water-related amendments, numbers 1 and 2, are the main items of interest for local voters.

United Way Sets Kickoff Luncheon

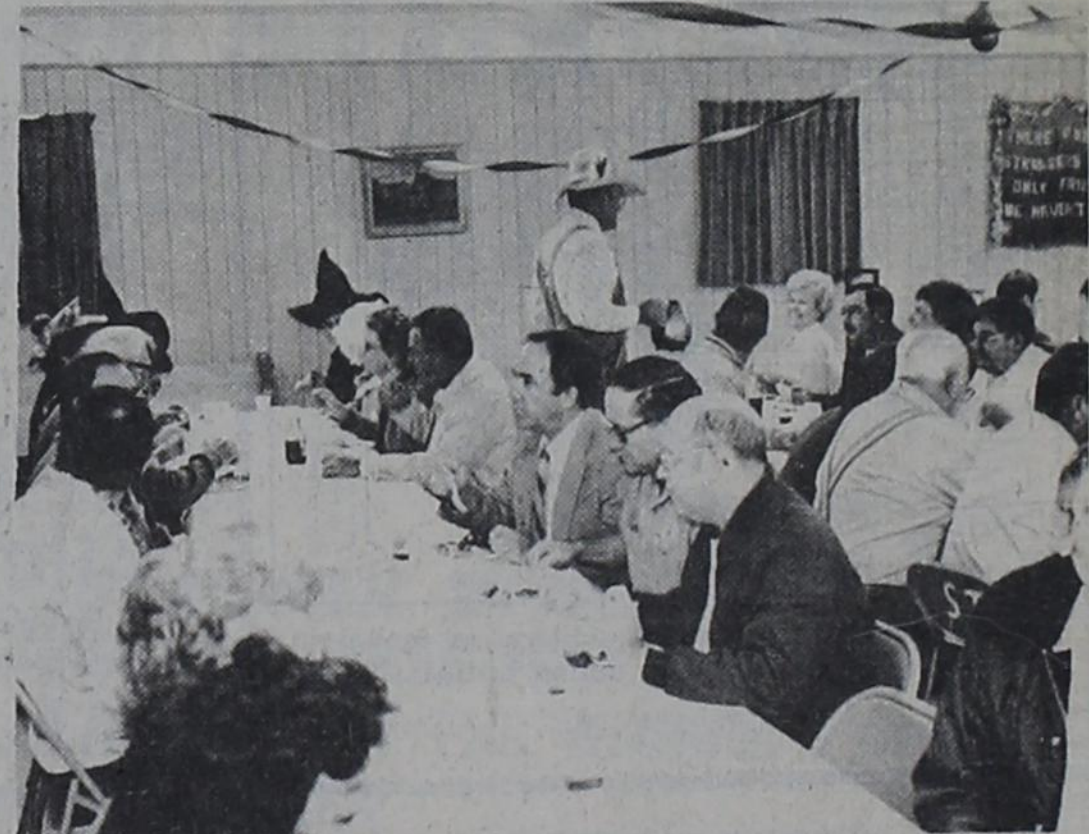
Friona's United Way kickoff luncheon for 1985 will be held at 12 noon Monday, November 4 at the Girl Scout House, 704 Ashland.

Bryan Johnston and Jack Hamil are co-chairmen of the 1985 campaign.

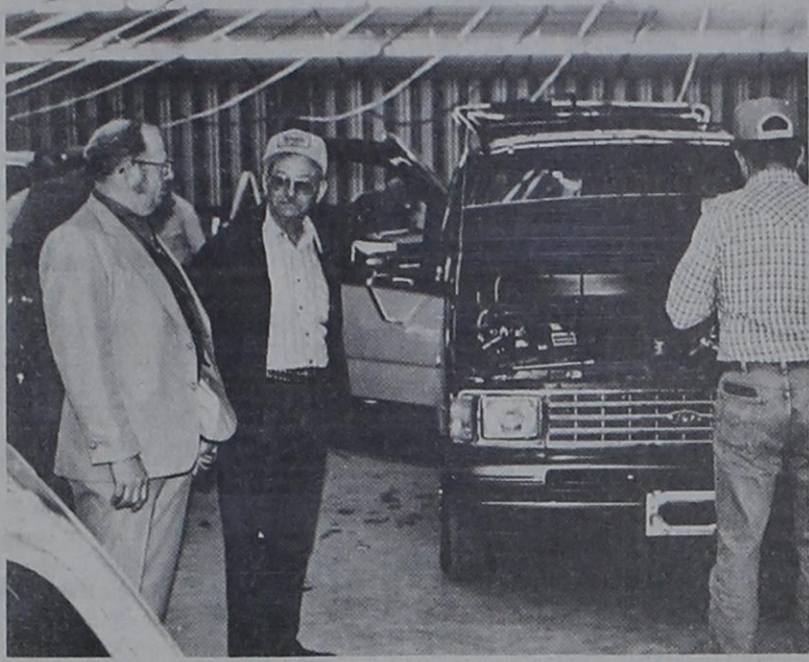
The 1985 goal for the Friona United Way is \$12,710, which is exactly the same amount as the 1984 goal.



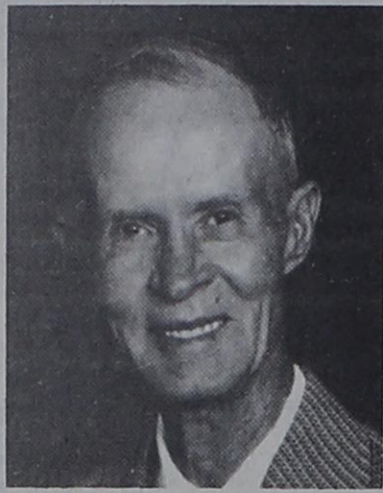

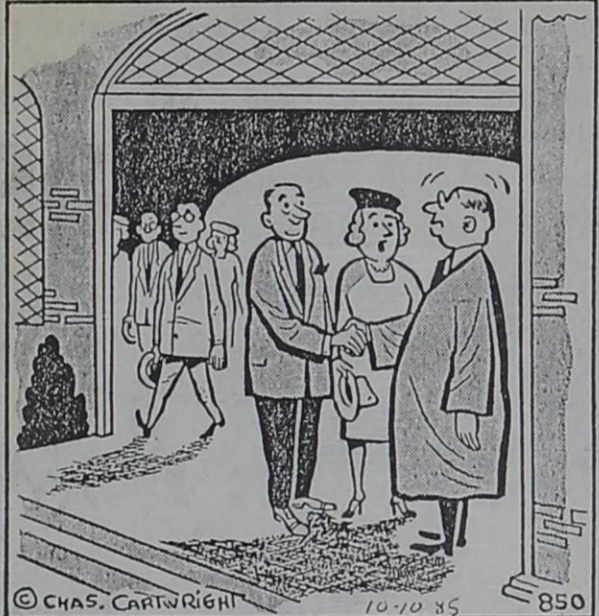

Seventh Graders Defeat Dimmitt

The Friona Seventh Grade Braves won their fourth consecutive game last Thursday, and they upended previously undefeated Dimmitt's seventh graders, in a hard-fought 24-20 game at Chieftain Field.

The difference in the ball game came in the conversion department, where Friona scored two-pointers after each of its three touchdowns, and the Braves' defense held Dimmitt behind the line on two of their three attempts.

Harvey Sanchez burst up the middle on a 50-yard touchdown run early in the game, and David Caballero ran the two-pointer for an 8-0 score.

Dimmitt came roaring back for a touchdown, but Friona held on the PAT try, to lead, 8-6.

The teams battled on near-even terms the rest of the ball game, with first one, then the other scoring. Rafael Torres scored the other two Braves' touchdowns, and he and Caballero each had

another PAT run.

The Braves had good balance in the backfield. Torres gained 99 yards on 12 carries; Sanchez tallied 71 yards on just four tries, and Caballero added 58 yards on 13 trips.

On defense, Torres again led the way with nine tackles. Glen Shirley had 7; Anthony Padilla 6; Lupe Reyes, Caballero, Steven Dickson and Sanchez four each; Wes Drake two and Gary Stowers one.

In addition, Sanchez had a pass interception and Dickson recovered a fumble that led to a Friona score.

The team's season record is 4-2.

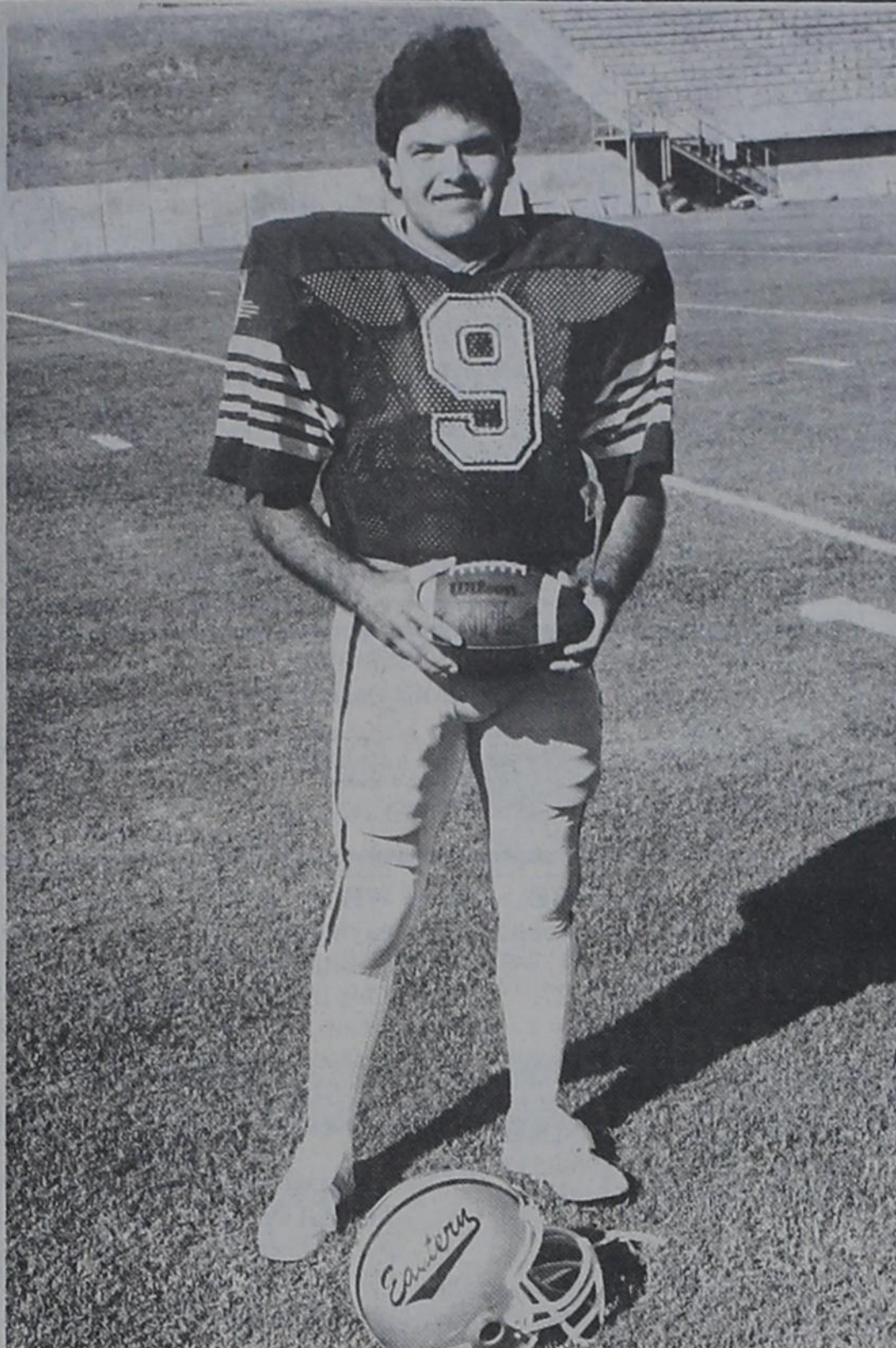

8th Grade Zaps DJHS By 28-6

The Friona Eighth Grade Braves scored an easy, 28-6 win over the Dimmitt eighth graders in a game at Chieftain Field last Thursday.

Andre Duran sparked the offensive thrust with 150 yards rushing, including three touchdowns. Benny Trevino added 30 yards and a TD; Benny Vasquez added to the backfield chores by gaining 67 yards on eight tries, and Jessie Arias gained five yards.

The Braves recovered a Dimmitt fumble and Duran got Friona off and running with a 20-yard touchdown scamper. Brian Brogden added the two-pointer for an 8-0 lead.

Before it was all said and done, Andre added touchdown runs of

30 and ten yards, and Vasquez chipped in a two-point conversion run.

Friona ran up a 22-0 halftime lead, and had a 28-0 lead before Dimmitt, which had only a 14-man squad, got on the scoreboard.

Chiefs Blank Bobcats, 7-0 To Stay In Playoff Picture

Just when they were desperately needing it, the Friona Chieftains came up with one of their better performances of the season, and it resulted in a 7-0 win over rival Dimmitt at Chieftain Field last Friday night.

The win kept the Chieftains in the thick of the playoff race with two games remaining.

Although the final score was close, it could have, and should have been much worse, as the Chiefs squandered two other scoring chances from first and goal situations inside the Dimmitt five-yard line, which kept the team from scoring a blow-out, or at least a more comfortable win.

The Chieftain defense, meanwhile, played one of its finest games. The secondary intercepted five passes from usually consistent Bobcat quarterback Woody Glass, and limited the 'Cats to just 44 yards on the ground.

The Bobcats had played a "cat and mouse" game involving their leading rusher, Mark Smotherman, as to whether the big fullback would be able to play. He

played all right, but after being limited to just 29 yards on ten attempts, the 185-pounder might have wished he'd have stayed home.

And the swarming Chieftain defense held two usual speed merchants, Cruz Arce and Warren McDonald, to a combined -7 yards for the game. Arce, a flanker, had -4 yards on five attempts. Tailback McDonald never made it to the line of scrimmage, having a -3 total on four assignments.

Friona's offense, meanwhile, was clicking. Brad Moyer gained 115 yards against the big Bobcats, and Lonnie Phillips, back in the backfield after a two-week absence, got the game's only touchdown with a brilliant 49-yard scamper in the first quarter.

Phillips had an outstanding defensive play also, when he made a diving interception of a Woody Glass pass on the game's second play from scrimmage. That set the Chiefs up in great field position at the Dimmitt 35.

Moyer gave the Chiefs a first down at the 24, and Phillips ran seven yards to the 17. Moyer then

almost broke for a TD, being tackled at the Bobcat four, where Friona had a first and goal.

But on the first down play, Moyer was separated from the ball by the desperate Bobcat defense, who recovered at their own six to prevent a quick Friona lead.

However, after limiting the visitors to just one first down and forcing a punt, Friona still had the ball in pretty good shape. It would have been even better, after a ten-yard punt return by Shy Burney to the Bobcat 40, but a clipping penalty moved the ball back to the Friona 38.

In fact, Friona fans might have thought during the course of the game that Dimmitt had brought its regular coaching-staff officials they normally use in their subvarsity games, the way the yellow flag fluttered on outstanding Friona plays.

Another time when Burney had a 20-yard interception run, a 15-yard walkoff cost the team 38 yards in field position, and yet again, a five-yarder moved Friona from the brink of the Dimmitt goal and forced an ill-fated field goal attempt.

But the clipping penalty in the first quarter only served to make Phillips' nifty touchdown run that much longer.

The 150-pounder took the ball and appeared to be stopped at the line by a couple of Dimmitt defenders. But he kept his legs churning, wrestled free and raced up the west sideline. The play covered 49 yards, and when Montoya split the uprights, Friona had a 7-0 lead with 4:55 left in the opening quarter.

More encouraging, it meant that the Chiefs had made it to at least the Dimmitt four-yard line in both of their first two possessions.

Burney got his first and Friona's second pass interception on the third play of the second quarter, and returned the ball 20 yards to the Friona 40.

After a motion penalty and a seven-yard loss on an end-around

try, Moyer burst through a hole for a 30-yard gain to the Dimmitt 34.

However, three plays found the Chieftains only on the 33, and Montoya was called on to try a 50-yard field goal, which fell short in the end zone.

But the aroused Friona defense threw Arce and McDonald for losses, and scored a sack on Glass for an 11-yard loss, and halftime expired with the 7-0 score.

Friona found themselves in trouble after receiving the second half kickoff when Williams was popped at the 23 and Dimmitt recovered the ball. Things looked even worse when Glass connected with Todd Durham for 11 yards to the Friona 11.

But with the Bobcats again trying to pass on a second down from the Friona nine, Burney stepped in front of Durham and swiped the ball, to save what looked to be a sure Dimmitt scoring threat.

The team had to fight to keep the ball on a fumble which lost back to their own one, and on fourth down, Montoya showed why he is the premier kicker in the district by booming the ball from deep in his own end zone to the 46-yard line.

Friona held, forced a punt, and Burney's 23-yard punt return gave the team the ball at their own 43. However, they could gain just eight yards in three plays and Montoya had to punt again.

This time, the junior punter's kick went to the Dimmitt 11. With two great punts and a great punt return, the team had moved the ball from their own one-yard line to the Bobcat 11. That swing in field position more or less dictated the style of play for the rest of the game.

Late in the third quarter, Burney got his third pass interception, and his run would have set Friona up at the Dimmitt 23, except for another clipping penalty.

However, the team went to work with Moyer and Williams alternating, and quickly moved the ball from their own 39 to the Dimmitt five as the quarter ended.

The break for the quarter may have inspired the Dimmitt defense,

and if that didn't do it, an offside call on the Chieftains moved the team back to the ten.

On fourth down, the ball at the nine, Montoya came in for what should have been an easy field goal. But a Dimmitt defender got his hand in the way, and the kick fluttered off the mark.

What could have been a 13-0 or 17-0 Friona lead was still just 7-0, with an entire quarter left to play.

But the Chieftain defense was equal to the task. Its cautious defense did allow three pass completions for ten to 15 yards, but Wendell Woodruff got a fifth team interception with 3:49 left in the game, to again blunt the Bobcat threat.

And although the Chieftains couldn't put any more points on the board, Montoya boomed punts of 44 and 53 yards into the Dimmitt end zone to keep the Bobcats bottled up in their own end of the field.

Although denied his field goal which would have put the game on ice, Montoya's punting proved to be just as big a weapon. He kicked the ball 248 yards for a 41.3-yard average.

The win somewhat eased the pain for last year's 3-0 Bobcat win in a game dominated by the Chieftains. But with that, and other recent reminders of Dimmitt's late-game heroics, fans were on the edge of their seats until Glass' fourth-down pass fell to the turf with 52 seconds left on the clock.





The Library Board of Trustees met October 24 with six members

present. Fine money use, overdue notices, their cost and return were among the topics discussed. The board also decided to again set aside a portion of their funds to draw interest with plans toward the purchase of a computerized library system for the Library.

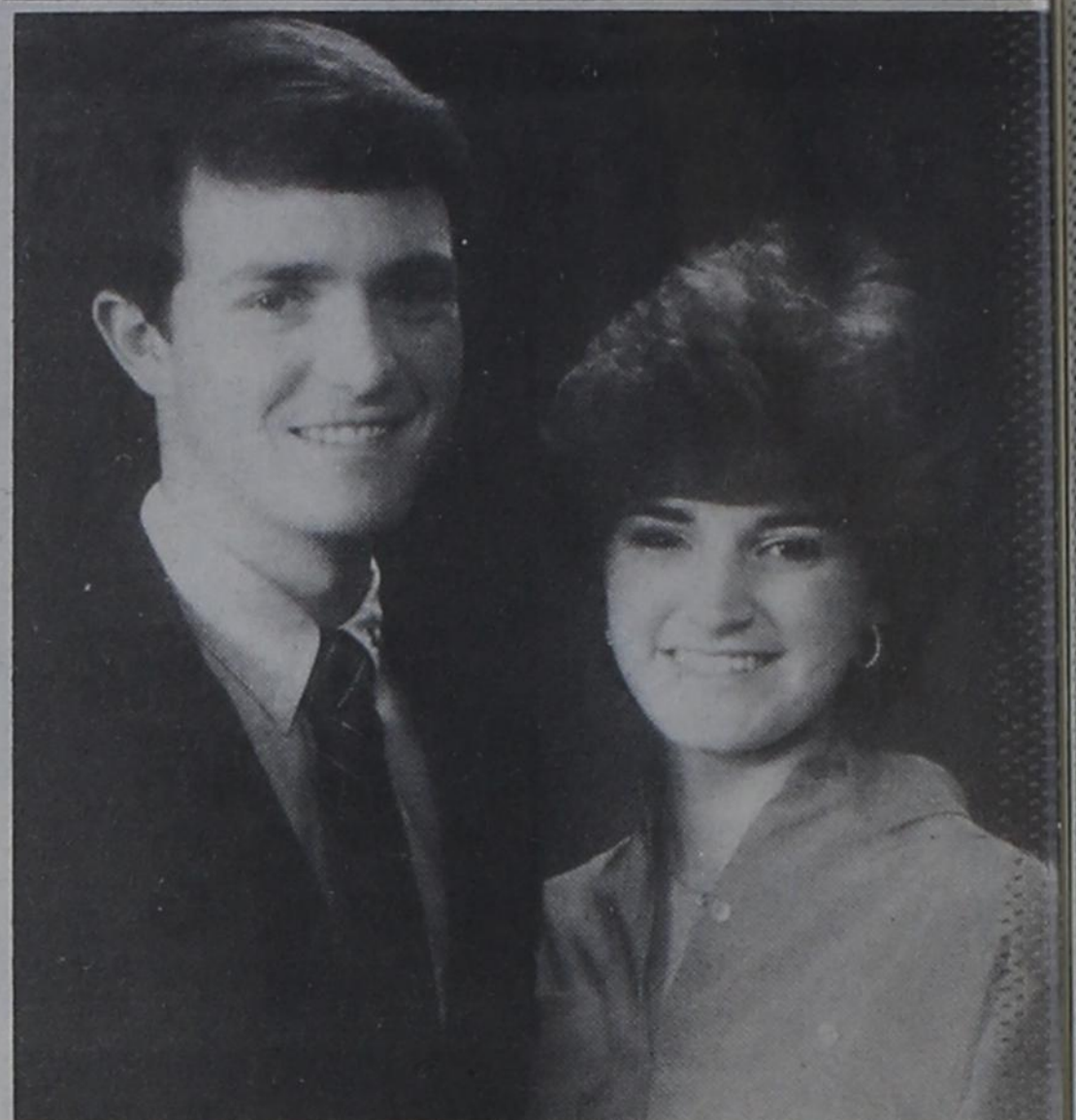

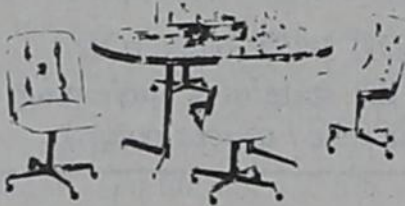

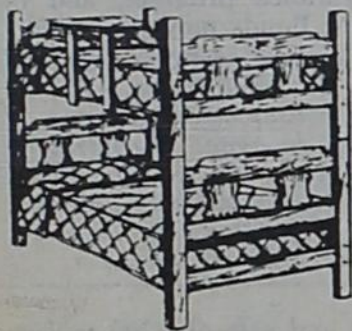
