IT'S THE DOG DAYS of August, and summer is rapidly winding down.

Football workouts began this week for high school youngsters, and that heralds a new term of school, starting a little later than usual this year.

So--if you are like some of us, and had plans to get a lot of things done this summer, then you'd better shift into high gear, because the summer is going to be gone before you know it.

ALL INDICATIONS are that our area has a fine set of farm crops this summer. As you drive around the county, the crops look as good as we've ever seen them.

Apparently, we have been spared any disasters such as the 2,4-D drift which ruined thousands of acres of cotton in the county in 1984. In fact, one ginner told us this week that those farmers who were hurt by the herbicide drift a year ago appear to have the best crops this time around. That would be a nice reversal on the part of nature. The corn crop is looking great, as are the maize crop, sugar beets, sunflowers and soybeans. The only "hitch" in the situation, as it usually is, may be the market price, which in recent years never seems to be at the level needed for farmers to make a profit. The area has received some wonderful rain this summer. The rains this year may not set a record for total inches in a calendar year, but the nice thing about most of the moisture is the fact that it has come when it was needed. As you know if you have lived in this area at least a year, this is not always the case when it comes to rainfall. Stop the presses!

The Friona Independent School District's board of trustees voted at their meeting this week to LOWER the tax rate for the district for the 1985-86 school year and budget purposes.

Superintendent of Schools Tom year. Jarboe said the new tax rate, 85 cents per \$100 valuation, compared to 93 cents a year ago, will generate about the same number of dollars as the school collected in 1984-85.

The difference is the fact that the district's tax roll values have increased. This has been brought about by such things as the addition of Millard Warehouse, the increased inventories of products stored at Millard by the EXCEL Corp., etc.

At its monthly meeting August 12, the school board adopted a budget for the Friona Independent School District calling for estimated revenues of \$4,589,706 for 1985-86.

This is down by about \$21,015 from the previous year's estimated revenues. The estimated expenditures, meanwhile, are \$4,529,708, which will still give the district a "cushion" of about \$60,000, Jarboe pointed out.



Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board was established in twenty-nine counties of the Texas High Plains in 1969. Since that time, it has financed most of the and market promótion development for Texas sorghum. In this election, sorghum producers outside the current TGSPB area will vote on a proposal to join TGSPB and expand the program statewide.

The High Plains candidates are: Dennis W. Anthony of Friona in Parmer County; Albert Scheele of Lockney in Floyd County; Weldon Shelton of Lamesa in Dawson County and Loyall Turner of Spearman in Hansford County. If the referendum to expand the program is approved by two-thirds of the producers voting, seven directors will be elected at-large from a slate of twenty-three. The seven directors-elect will join eight who are serving unexpired terms on the existing board. Directors are elected to six-year terms with one-third of them rotating off each two years.

The directors have the full responsibility of the TGSPB programs within limits approved by the voters. They have the authority to set the rate of the authority to set the rate of the assessment but may not exceed the Have Girl maximum specified in the referendum. They also hire staff, decide projects and determine collection procedures. They are elected officers of the State of Texas. They are not paid for their

Four grain sorghum producers of all sorghum farmers.

BLUEBONNET GIRLS STATE--ALIVE IN '85

By MELANIE GALLMAN Saying goodbye wasn't easy. In just ten short, fun filled days we had established a 51st mythical state, complete with 580 citizens, who made up 12 cities, six counties, two districts, and 36 precincts. A Girls State Bank took care of money matters, and the Girls State Store provided the necessities. There were two political parties, the Nationalists and the Federalists. it was still possible to run for an office. I did enter the race, and giving a "not so good" campaign speech and a half hearted attempt to pick up votes for the Assistant Justice for my district, I was surprised to discover that I had beat out my opponent by a margin of six votes out of two hundred voters.

If the cork breaks in the process of removal, insert the worm end of the corkscrew into the cork at a different angle and spot. Then, try again. Should the one cork go into the bottle, a helpful gadget to have is a "broken cork extractor". Insert the extractor into the bottle, maneuver it around the cork, squeeze the wires together, and pull the cork out. If the problem is not severe, a snail fork can be used to dig out the broken cork or to remove small bits. When opening a very old bottle of wine or port, if it is obvious that the cork cannot be extracted, the bottle's neck must be broken away and the wine decanted.


