IT'S THE DOG DAYS of August, and summer is rapidly winding down.

Football workouts began this week for high school youngsters, and that heralds a new term of school, starting a little later than usual this year.

So--if you are like some of us, and had plans to get a lot of things done this summer, then you'd better shift into high gear, because the summer is going to be gone before you know it.

ALL INDICATIONS are that our area has a fine set of farm crops this summer. As you drive around the county, the crops look as good as we've ever seen them.

Apparently, we have been spared any disasters such as the 2,4-D drift which ruined thousands of acres of cotton in the county in 1984. In fact, one ginner told us this week that those farmers who were hurt by the herbicide drift a year ago appear to have the best crops this time around. That would be a nice reversal on the part of nature.

The corn crop is looking great, as are the maize crop, sugar beets, sunflowers and soybeans. The only "hitch" in the situation, as it usually is, may be the market price, which in recent years never seems to be at the level needed for farmers to make a profit.

The area has received some wonderful rain this summer. The rains this year may not set a record for total inches in a calendar year, but the nice thing about most of the moisture is the fact that it has come when it was needed. As you know if you have lived in this area at least a year, this is not always the case when it comes to rainfall.

Some years you never get enough rainfall to amount to anything until harvest time, and then it sets in and rains until the crops begin to mildew, or whatever the various crops do when they get too much moisture.

But this summer has been much better than average in that department. Dryland farmers should be looking at bumper crops, and those who irrigate should have been able to cut 'way down on the amount of pumping, along with the high utility bills that irrigating produces as a by-product.

Meeting To Explore Depot Restoration

Refreshments will be served at the Ethridge-Spring Agency meeting room Monday night, August 19 at 8 p.m. when the Community Heritage Society will host an "Open Town Meeting" to discuss plans to move, preserve and restore the old Santa Fe Depot building.

Santa Fe Railway Company is donating the building to the city of Friona. This is one of the oldest buildings in the city, having been built in 1910 before the town was incorporated.

The city council has asked that the Heritage group be formed in such a way that it can take over the expense of the operation of the building so that it will not become a burden on Friona taxpayers. The Community Heritage Society of Friona is in the process of getting organized and incorporated especially for this purpose.

"Right now, our primary concern is to raise the money to

have the building moved to its new site on the City Park," said Lois Norwood who is currently acting as chairman of the group. "At some time in the future we will be looking at the possibilities of using the building for a museum and art gallery."

At the organizational meeting on Monday evening a charter will be drawn up. A board of directors will be elected, and various types of fund-raising activities will be discussed.

"In order to make this a success for future Friona generations, it is going to require a lot of work, time, money, labor and dedication from the townspeople," said Beth Thompson, a spokesperson for the group.

Anyone who is interested in helping to preserve the depot building in any manner is urged to attend the meeting at the Ethridge-Spring office Monday evening.

FOR NEW TERM

Pre-Kindergarten Program Is Slated

A new pre-kindergarten program will be offered in Friona this year for certain four-year-olds.

A new state school law provides that school districts provide a pre-kindergarten program for children who will be four years old on or before September 1 and have limited English proficiency, and/or are from a family whose income is below the subsistence level.

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe pointed out that the subsistence level is basically the same formula the school district uses in figuring the reduced-price and free lunch programs.

The pre-kindergarten program will be a one-half day (three-hour

program each school day. Parents who think they have an eligible child and want their children to participate in the program are asked to report with their children on Tuesday, August 27, to the Grade School building (Mr. Melton's office), between the hours of 9 a.m. and 12 noon and 1 and 3 p.m.

Immunization records and birth certificates should be brought at this time, Jarboe says. The school staff will process applications, test the children and determine their eligibility for the program.

Parents will be responsible for transporting the students to and from this program, and meals will not be served to the four-year-olds participating in the program.

School Lowers Tax Rate For 1985-86

Stop the presses!

The Friona Independent School District's board of trustees voted at their meeting this week to LOWER the tax rate for the district for the 1985-86 school year and budget purposes.

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe said the new tax rate, 85 cents per \$100 valuation, compared to 93 cents a year ago, will generate about the same number of dollars as the school collected in 1984-85.

The difference is the fact that the district's tax roll values have increased. This has been brought about by such things as the addition of Millard Warehouse, the increased inventories of products stored at Millard by the EXCEL Corp., etc.

At its monthly meeting August 12, the school board adopted a budget for the Friona Independent School District calling for estimated revenues of \$4,589,706 for 1985-86.

This is down by about \$21,015 from the previous year's estimated revenues. The estimated expenditures, meanwhile, are \$4,529,708, which will still give the district a "cushion" of about \$60,000, Jarboe pointed out.

The expenses for 1985-86 are up by about \$273,735 from 1985. Most of the increase is due to increased salaries, in keeping with the new state salary scales for teachers.

Jarboe says that the school will have a balanced budget for 1985-86, but due to requirements mandated by the state, the

School To Start Here September 3

The 1985-86 school term will start on Tuesday, September 3, according to Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

This is later than usual for the starting of school, and is the first time in a number of years that the opening of school was delayed until after Labor Day.

Students who are new to the Friona school system, including kindergarten students who did not pre-register last spring, are asked to report to their respective principal, Hal Ratcliff, Cecil Maddox or Freeman Melton, at their office.

Kindergarten or new first grade students will be required to bring birth certificates or acceptable birth records. New students should bring report cards or other information from their prior school, and immunization records, when they register.

expenses of the local district will eventually increase in excess of its revenues.

In preparing for the future, the board has projected that surplus funds will probably maintain the district through the 1987-88 school year.

Jarboe points out that the state has mandated a number of things for school districts to provide, but have not provided funds for implementing these demands.

"We can hold out a couple of years with things as they are now. Some school districts are having to raise taxes in order to comply, but we have hopes that the legislature will be forced to pass some changes in the school program before we have to do that," Jarboe said.

In other business at its Monday meeting, the school board accepted the resignation of Kathryn Goddard, as she will be moving from the community. Mrs. Goddard had been elected

president of the board for 1985-86.

Jerry Hinkle, who had been previously elected as vice president, was moved up to the post of board president, and Teddy Fangman was named vice president. The board decided to function as a six-member board for the time being, not appointing a replacement for Mrs. Goddard, and let voters select a replacement in the annual school board election next April.

Otherwise, the board awarded the bid for the school's gas to Houlette Petroleum Co. on a bid basis.

The board was required to schedule two bad-weather days on its 1985-86 school calendar. After some discussion, it was decided to schedule the days on May 26 and May 30.

Previously, May 26 was scheduled as a school holiday (Memorial Day), and May 30 was not scheduled as a class day. If no days are missed for bad weather, these will still not be used for instruction, Jarboe says.

Also, it was reported that April 21 has been declared as a state holiday (Texas Independence Day), for the state's sesquicentennial. Students will be given this day off and will not have to make up the day in the classrooms. This is just a one-time state holiday, it was reported.

Four Area Men Are TGSPB Candidates

Four grain sorghum producers of the Texas High Plains area are candidates for re-election to the office of Director of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. Their names will appear on the same ballot as referendums to establish a uniform grain sorghum checkoff throughout Texas.

Anyone who has produced sorghum in Texas during at least one of the past three years is eligible to vote in the election. Ballots will be mailed to more than 60,000 Texas sorghum producers on the ASCS roll. Any producer who does not receive a ballot by August 1, may obtain one at his County Extension Office or by calling toll-free 1-800-692-4169.

The High Plains candidates are: Dennis W. Anthony of Friona in Parmer County; Albert Scheele of Lockney in Floyd County; Weldon Shelton of Lamesa in Dawson County and Loyall Turner of Spearman in Hansford County. If the referendum to expand the program is approved by two-thirds of the producers voting, seven directors will be elected at-large from a slate of twenty-three. The seven directors-elect will join eight who are serving unexpired terms on the existing board. Directors are elected to six-year terms with one-third of them rotating off each two years.

The directors have the full responsibility of the TGSPB programs within limits approved by the voters. They have the authority to set the rate of the assessment but may not exceed the maximum specified in the referendum. They also hire staff, decide projects and determine collection procedures. They are elected officers of the State of Texas. They are not paid for their services but provisions have been made to reimburse them for travel expenses.

While farmers in counties outside the TGSPB area vote on the checkoff, those in the High Plains area will vote on a referendum to raise the maximum limit of the assessment from 1/4 cent per hundredweight to one cent. The proposition is to allow adjustments in assessments to meet the operating costs of the eighties. If approved, the board of directors will have the authority to set the assessment at any rate which does not exceed one cent per cwt.

The TGSPB checkoff funds are used to finance the promotion of Texas grain sorghum in markets throughout the world. In recent years, TGSPB has concentrated most of its efforts in Mexico. Due largely to those efforts, Mexico is now buying as much U.S. sorghum as half of the Texas production.

The surrounding counties are organizing in order to have a profitable pheasant season, Friona should too!

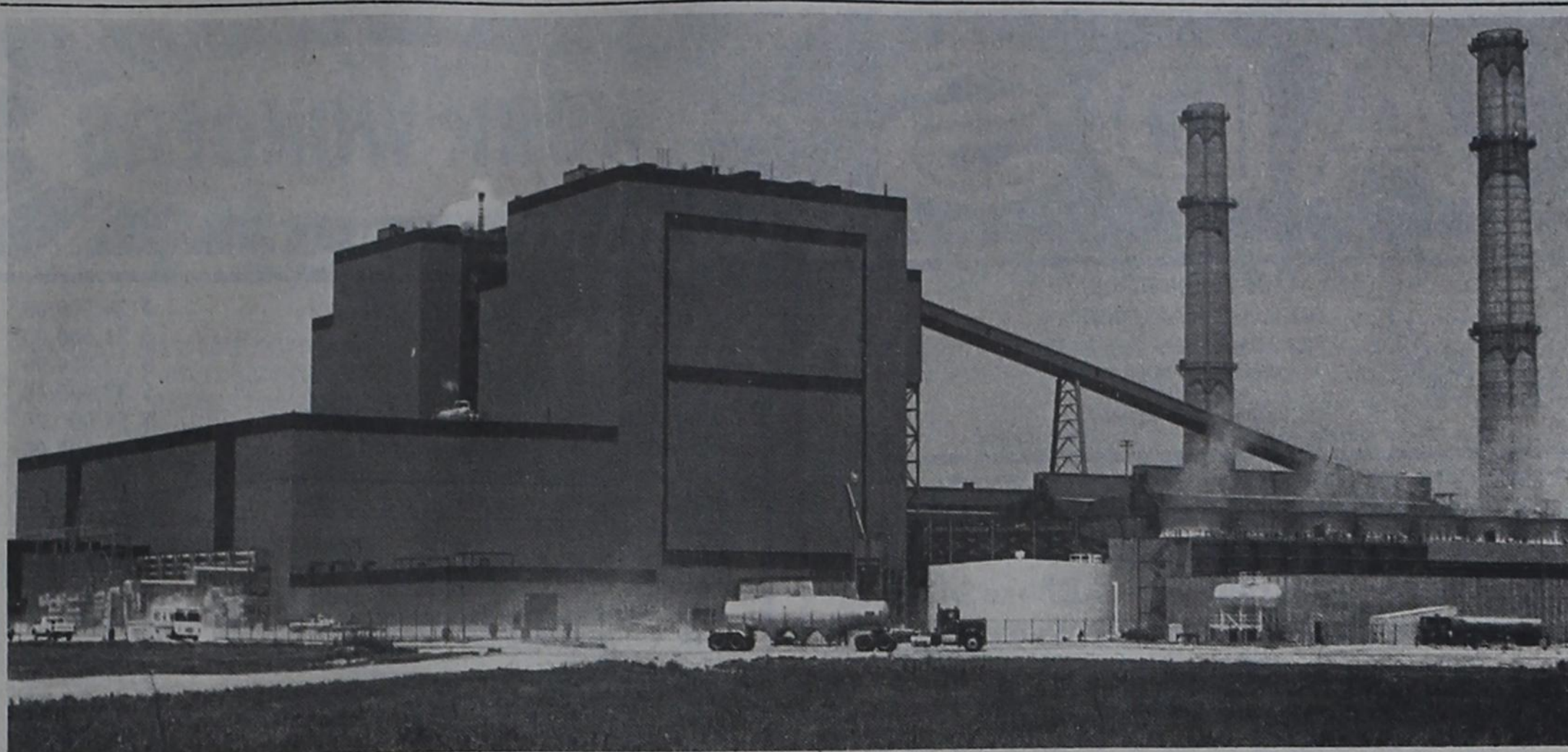
Doyle Meltons Have Girl

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) recently put into commercial service a power plant generation unit that can meet the electricity needs of 225,000 people.

The coal-fueled, 561,000-kilowatt unit, located at SPS' Tolk Station near Muleshoe, Texas, was brought into service June 30, 1985, for about \$287 million, on schedule and under budget.

It is the second unit at the Muleshoe site. The first unit was put into commercial service in August 1982.

"Tolk No. 2" is Southwestern's fifth coal-fired unit. The steam generating boilers of all five units burn low-sulfur, Western coal from Wyoming mines.

"We are particularly proud that we can build and finance plants at far less eventual cost to customers than can most electric utilities," said Bert Ballengee, president and chief operating officer of Southwestern Public Service. "We strive to keep electricity affordable, and our efficient, lower-cost plants help us achieve that goal."

Tolk No. 2 was constructed for \$512 per kilowatt of installed

capacity--significantly below the \$1,086 projected national average cost per kilowatt of comparable coal-fueled units coming into service this year, Ballengee said.

"The use of more coal and less natural gas as boiler fuel in the plants also saves our customers money," the utility president added. "Coal is the least-expensive boiler fuel practical for Southwestern. We estimate that using coal in our fuel mix will save our customers \$215 million this year alone."

The relative fuel-cost savings will continue to increase, Ballengee said, because Tolk Unit No. 2 in fiscal 1986 will increase generation by coal to about 76 per cent of SPS' total electricity production. SPS designs, engineers, and

oversees construction of its own power plants, Ballengee notes. "We are one of only a handful of electric utilities in the United States that can control costs to customers by using an in-house group to design power plants. Almost all other utilities must rely on consultants, making those utilities' power plants cost more."

Tolk Unit No. 2 is almost a duplicate of Unit No. 1, said Jim Matthews, SPS vice president, generation plant design and construction. The units share some large equipment, including the on-site coal-handling system, water treatment facilities, and offices and control room. A major difference between the units is that Unit No. 2's "baghouse," the fabric filter system that prevents coal fly ash from entering the atmosphere, was designed by SPS engineers.

General construction contractor for Tolk Station was Missouri Valley Inc., of Amarillo, Texas; the electrical contract work was by Budwine Service Electric of Carlsbad, N.M. Sometimes, there were as many as 800 workers on the site.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric service to a population of one million in eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Panhandle of Oklahoma, and Southwestern Kansas.

Embryo Transfer Meeting Aug. 26

Beef cattle producers in the Muleshoe area are invited to attend an educational meeting on Monday, August 26 at 8 p.m. at the Bailey County Coliseum. The main item to be discussed will be embryo transfer and nutritional management of the beef herd. The purpose of the meeting is to acquaint beef cattle producers with the economic feasibility of this reproduction process that is receiving major emphasis.

The two speakers for this meeting will be Dr. John McNeil, area livestock specialist from Amarillo, who will discuss beef herd nutrition and management, body condition related to breeding, herd vaccination, and health program and economic feasibility; Dr. Barry Cowart, DVM, in Muleshoe, who will speak on procedures for synchronizing cows, techniques used in collecting and transferring embryos, use of frozen eggs and success of new procedures at the Muleshoe Embryo Genetics Center.

Embryo transfer, simply stated, involves collection of multiple embryos from donor cows and their transfer to eligible recipient cows. However, the process involves many critical intermediary steps including donor selection, superovulation, artificial insemination, estrous synchronization, ova and embryo collection, classification of embryo and transfer of suitable embryos to prepared recipients. Although embryo transfer has been studied for 25 years, it still remains an exciting new technology and has grown to a multi-million dollar business within the last decade.

While the genetic gain from embryo transfer is small compared to artificial insemination (AI) and the use of superior sires, it offers many other unique opportunities. An average rancher's life span may cover only six to seven generations of cows. Therefore, the chances of obtaining a truly superior calf from an outstanding cow are limited with conventional breeding. Thus, the opportunity for selection with embryo is increased many times when one

considers that it is not unusual to obtain 12 or more calves from a donor cow within a single year.

This program is being sponsored by the Bailey County Extension Livestock Committee. The meeting is free and open to everyone in the general public. We would like to encourage beef cattle producers who have considered using this method to attend the meeting. Sesquicentennial Quilt Block Contest Is Slated

The Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are co-sponsoring the Panhandle Sesquicentennial Quilt Block Contest in honor of Texas' 150th birthday. Quilt block competitions will be held in each of the top 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle. Anyone is eligible to enter with the exception of Extension agents, museum staff and their families.

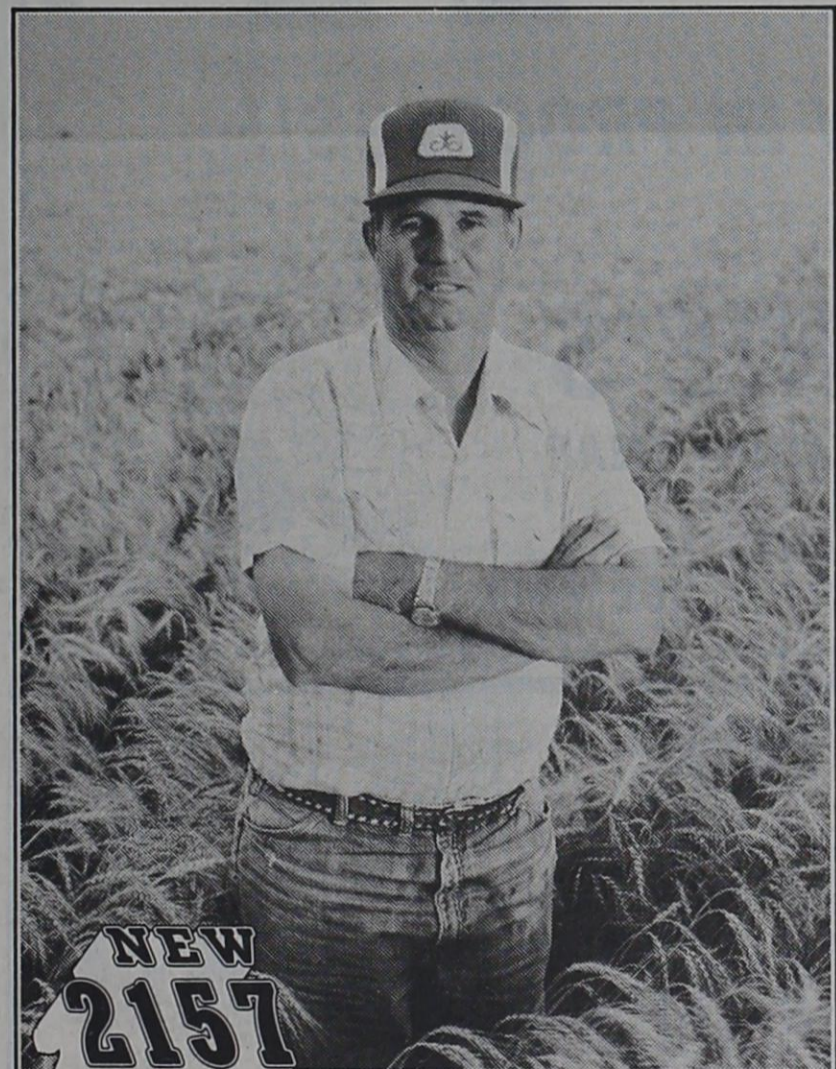
Each entrant is asked to create one or more quilt blocks representing a specific characteristic of his or her county. A panel of three judges will select the top three blocks in each county. Entries will be judged on overall appearance, workmanship, originality of design, adherence to theme, appropriateness of material and use of color.

The first place blocks will be sent to the museum in Canyon on

February 1, 1986, where they will become part of a 30-block Sesquicentennial Quilt. Thus, each of the top 26 counties will have a representative block with the remaining four blocks representing the museum, the Extension Service, the Sesquicentennial and the quilt project itself.

The museum and Extension Service are planning a "quilting bee" for February 22-23. After the quilt has been finished it will be on display at the museum as part of "Lone Stars: A Legacy of Texas Quilts, 1836-1986" a major exhibit of the best quilts in Texas. This display will be on April 27, 1986 through June 8, 1986.

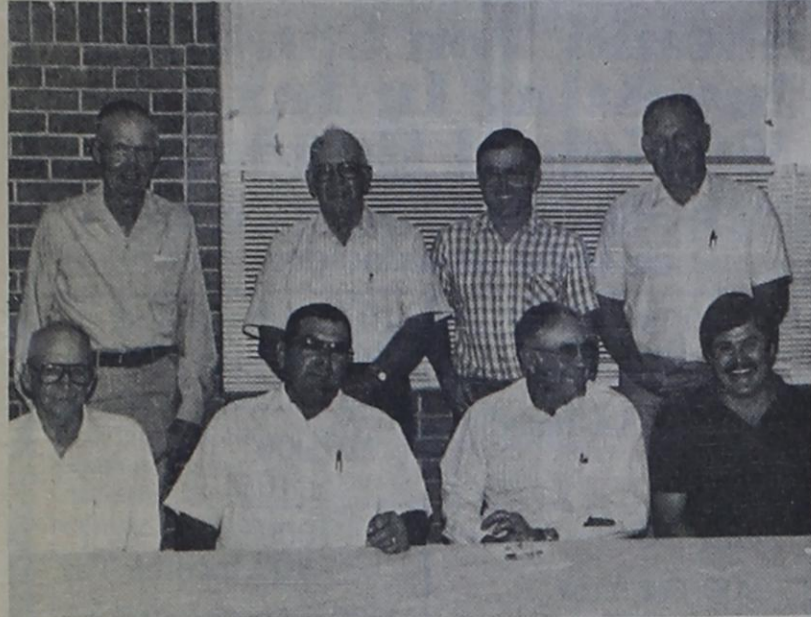

Co-op Gin Members Get Good Report

The cooperative's financial report showed a net profit of almost \$140,000 for the fiscal year which ended June 30. This was quite a turnaround from the net loss of \$121,959 the cooperative had showed during the previous fiscal year.

One difference in the two years noticed by the cooperative members was the fact that patronage dividend checks were being distributed to those attending the meeting.

It was reported that the number of bales ginned by the cooperative for 1984-85 was over 10,000. This was the second-highest number of bales ginned by Friona Farmers Co-op Gin in its history.

cooperative's board. They will re-join holdover members Bill Carthel, Harry Hamilton, Rickey Rector, Danny Murphree and George Frye.

Anthony presided over the business session, during which Hamilton, board secretary, read the minutes of the 1984 annual meeting. The financial report was presented by Jimmy Rogers of the cooperative's auditing company.

Gin manager D.L. Carmichael gave a short report on the status of the gin, and the outlook for the 1985-86 season.

Dale Widner gave the nominating committee report, after which Anthony and Welch were re-elected to the board by acclamation.

Loan Apps. Taken For Farm Losses

Applications for emergency farm loans for physical losses caused by this year's excessive rain and hail are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at 207 Avenue D, Farwell, Texas, FmHA county supervisor Weldon C. Rainey, has announced.

Parmer County is one of ten in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual physical losses resulting from the rain and hail.

Rainey said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 per cent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is five per cent; interest rate is eight per cent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.125 per cent.

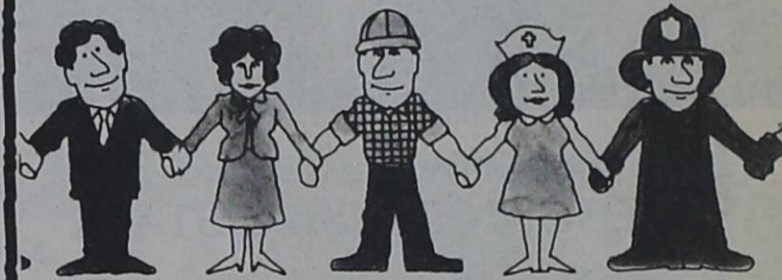

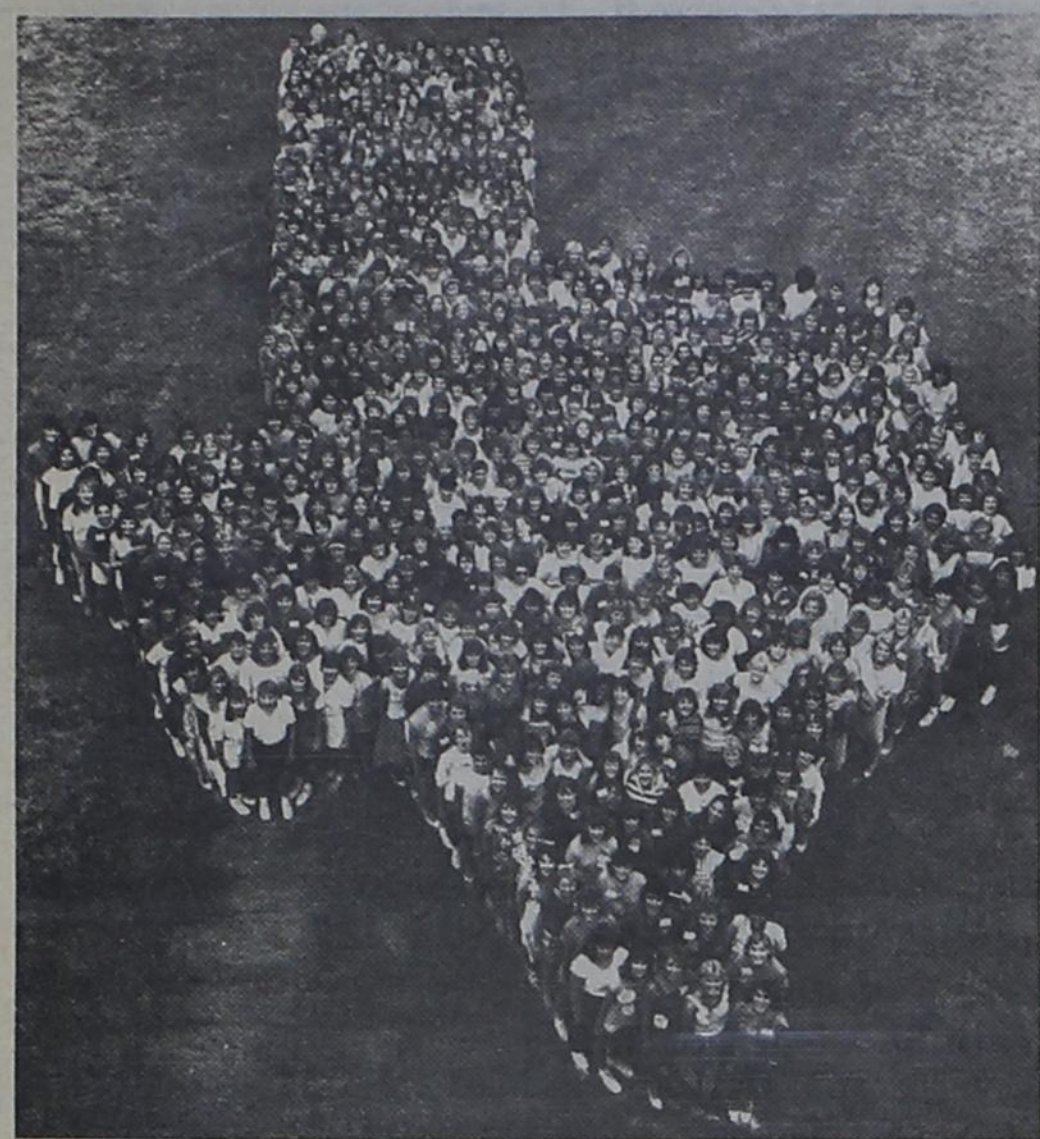

and built a county jail and a rehabilitation center. We also built a county park which had basketball and tennis courts, a baseball diamond, an aerobics and weight lifting center, and a swimming pool. Work was begun on a library-museum-art building.

I was a strong supporter of the Nationalist Party. In our precinct meetings we discussed and pushed ideals which we felt were solid planks for the Nationalist Party Platform. Some of those planks include stricter penalties for drunk driving, the revision of House Bill 72, and extensive research and development of the Texas water supply. These ideals were, of course, used in campaign speeches

and activities.

The actual process of transforming these ideals into laws was exercised in the House and Senate sessions. Approximately 24 hours of House and Senate sessions taught us the steps that a bill must take before becoming a law. Parliamentary Procedure was also practiced. As a Representative in the House, I voted in favor of bills which I felt my constituents would approve such as aid for farmers and a proposed water bill. I also helped kill bills such as legalizing marijuana and mandatory tap dance class for school children.

As we debated, legislated, laughed, elected, sang, and wished for letters from boyfriends, a

special bond grew among us Bluebonnets. I may not always remember the bills or what days the food wasn't so great, but I will remember the smiles and the laughter. Yes, it was hard to say goodbye. Although next year's citizens will also form their state, the memories of 580 Bluebonnet Girls State citizens will keep the 1985 session alive and special.

A special thanks to the American Legion Auxiliary who makes this experience possible. They volunteer their time and give their money unselfishly to inform the youth of the duties, privileges, and rights we have as American citizens.

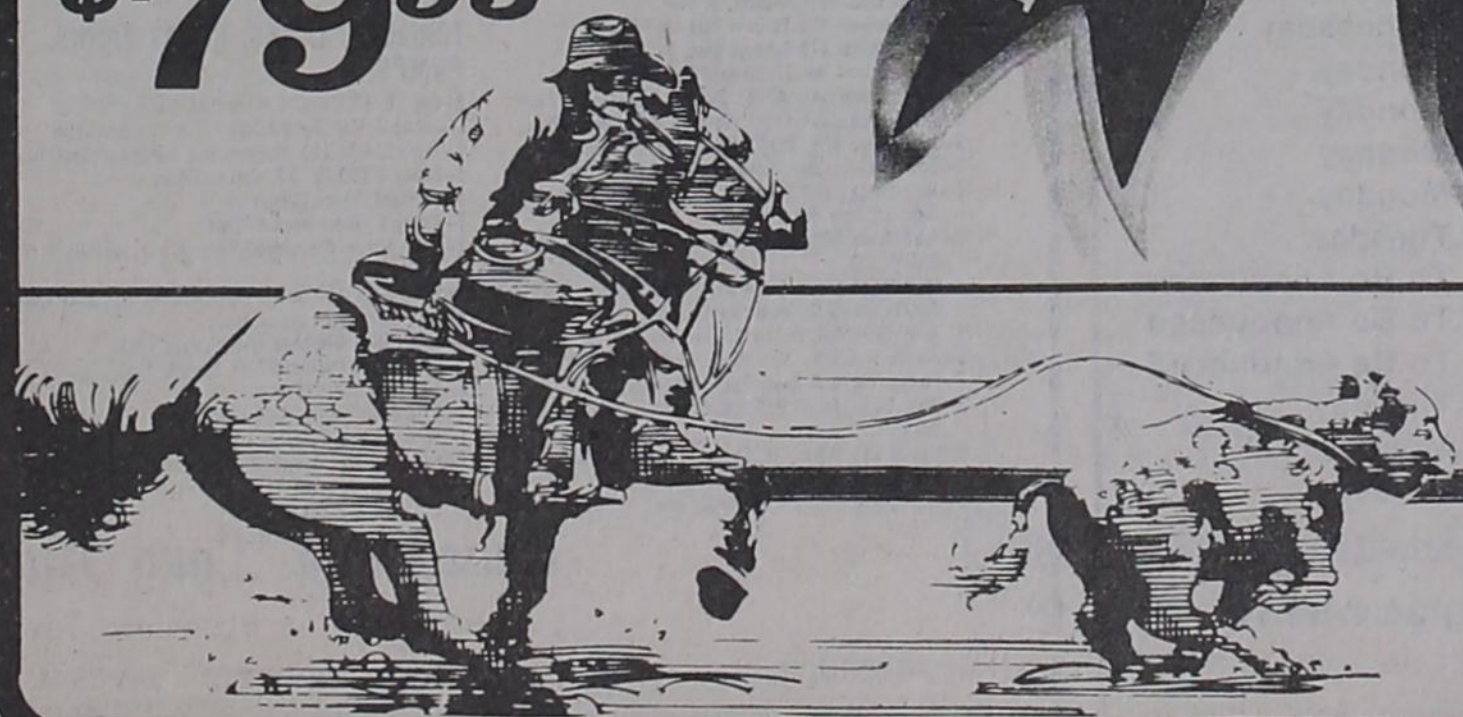
