TEXAS PRESS Association sent us an interesting booklet this week. The booklet is entitled "Books From Texas Publishers."

It appears that a number of publishers are bent on trying to cash in on the Sesquicentennial by publishing books. Several of the titles sound more than passingly interesting.

For example, one book which is to be published in April by a Houston publisher, will be for young readers, explaining how early Texas towns and cities got their names. The book's title is "Did a Mule Lose its Shoe in Muleshoe, Texas?" (Surely Waylon Jennings, from nearby Littlefield, could set that title to music!)

Some of the books are of a historical nature, such as "Unsung Heroes of Texas," and "The Alamo and Other Texas Missions" from Lone Star Books and "Legendary Ladies of Texas" from E-Heart Press.

Other of the books are novels, such as "Sam Bass" and "Eighteen Holes" from Corona Publishing, and "The Dream Patch" and "The Boy in the Alamo" from the same company.

Some of the books are based on the lives of contemporary Texas residents, such as "Elevator Man," about the life of Bobby Johnson, wheeler-dealer grain elevator operator and fertilizer swapper who supposedly drowned off the Gulf of Mexico in 1977.

A number of the books are travelogues, such as "The Alamo and Other Texas Missions," "Great Hometown Restaurants of Texas," "Backroads of Texas," and "Camper's Guide to Texas Parks, Lakes and Forests," all from Lone Star Books.

There are several cookbooks offered, such as the "Calf Fries to Caviar" Cookbook from Jan-Su Publications of Lamesa.

A Panhandle publisher, Maverick Books of Perryton, offers the "Hank the Cowdog" series, which has been featured on television, along with "Ace Reid, Cowpoke," and an epic novel entitled "The Hunter."

The book list includes "how to" books, such as "Management of Poisonous Snakebites" from Glass Publishing, "How to Incorporate Your Texas Business" and "How to Live and Die with Texas Probate" from Lone Star Books.

Those who like folklore might enjoy "How the Critters Created Texas" from Temple Publishers, or "T for Texas" from E-Heart Press.

Adventure stories also abound, such as "Stowaway to Texas," "In the Line of Duty: Reflections of a Texas Ranger Private," and "The Texans," all from Post Oak Press.

There are picture books, such as "Where Texas Meets the Sea," and even a list of books, "The 50 Best Books on Texas." Both of these latter are from Pressworks Publishing, Inc.

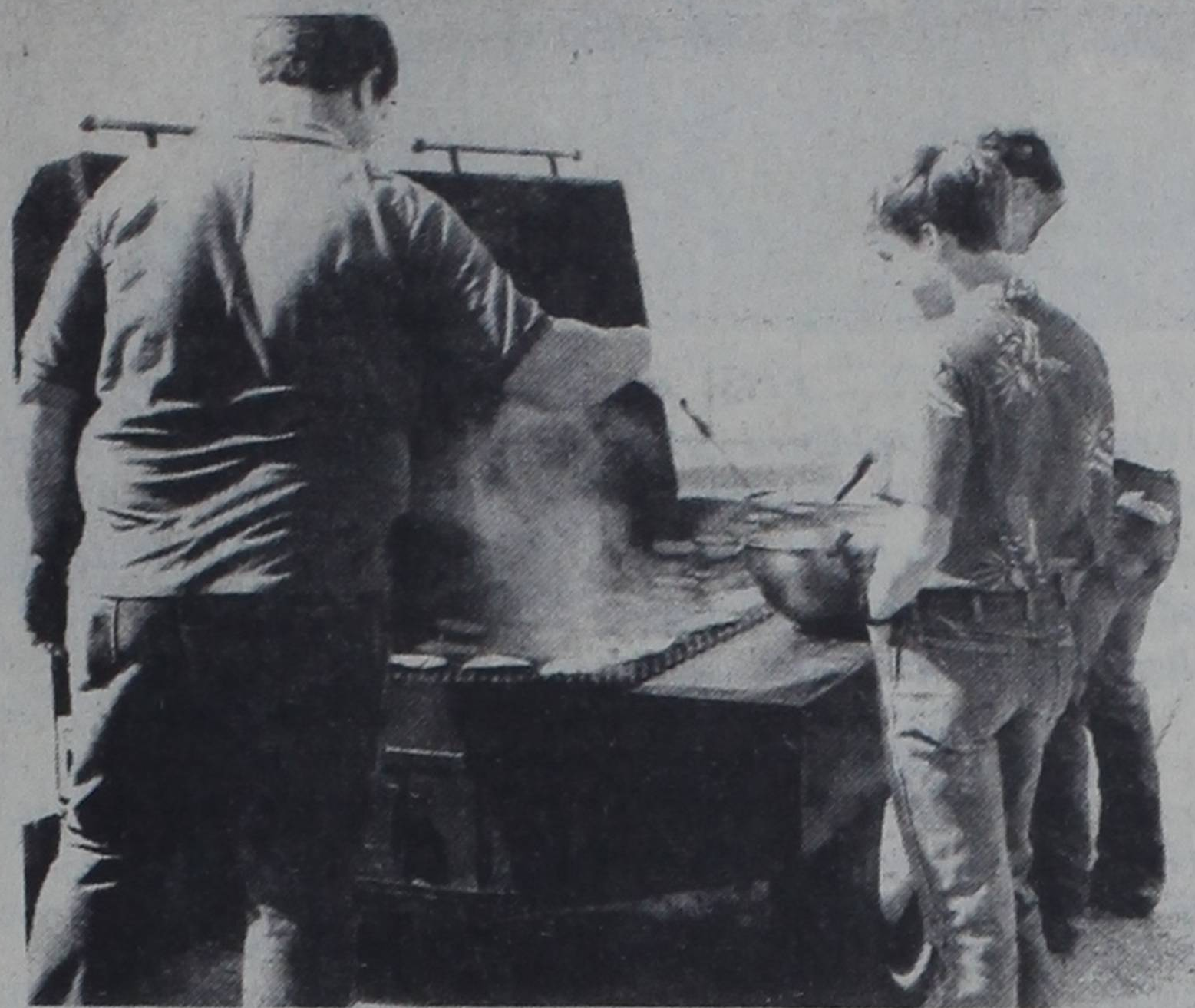

## ASCS Chief Gives Farm Bill Details

Martin Chandler, executive director of the ASCS office for Parmer County, has explained the 1986 Farm Program to Parmer County farmers in meetings this week.

Chandler spoke to farmer groups in Friona and Bovina on Monday and Tuesday of this week.

In his remarks, Chandler had a couple of new announcements. One was the fact that farmers and ranchers are now approved for a hay and grazing program for a seven-month period. The months not covered are June 1 through October 31. This will be of particular interest to those having cattle, or involved in grazing, Chandler said.

Also, the ASCS county chief said that President Reagan has signed the bill which eliminates the cross-compliance requirement for those participating in the program. In the past, those who participated in one program had to also participate in all others on an individual farm, in order to be eligible. This will no longer be a requirement starting in 1986.

Chandler said that the government has changed the computation formula for figuring the crop basis used in the ASCS program, which has delayed the sign-up that was due to have started on Monday.

"We are having to look at the records for the past five years and see what a farmer has done for that period and figure the average. This will take some time, and we asked the farmers to wait until at least Thursday to come in to sign up. In fact, if they will wait until next week, we will be better prepared to assist them," Chandler said.

Other items covered by the ASCS official were the ACR (Acreage Conservation Reserve) handbook, which sets out what land is termed irrigated and what is considered as dryland.

Also discussed was the farm program's ten-year CRP program, which is similar to the old Soil Bank program. Farmers may put certain erodable land in this program on a ten-year basis, but the land has to be highly erodable.

Signup for this program is March 3-14, and the ASCS is working closely with the Soil Conservation Service on determining if land qualifies for the program. During the two-week sign-up period, employees of the SCS are on hand at the ASCS office to assist in confirming the eligibility of farmland for the program.

Overall, Chandler said the 1986 farm program is "not all that much different" as far as small farmers are concerned. However, a big difference is the \$50,000 limitation (per person) included in the new program, which will affect all farmers in the mid-size to large farm category.

This will affect most farmers in the county, Chandler said.

Also highlighting the evening will be drawings for door prizes and give-aways totaling over \$1,000.00, including a color television set.

**55 YEARS AGO—MARCH 6, 1931**

Friday night there will be a "hot line in the old town." At 8 p.m. most of the prominent citizens of Friona will lose their reputations, and maybe their tempers as well, at the high school gym. The faculty will play the townsmen in a volleyball game for the benefit of the Parent-Teachers Association.

**50 YEARS AGO—MARCH 6, 1936**

J.L. Landrum, who owns both the Friona Drug Company and the J.L. Landrum Grocery and Market on Main Street, was quite busy during the early part of this week placing both stores under one roof. Goods and equipment from the drug store were moved from the T.J. Crawford building adjoining the post office to the J.G. Weir building adjoining the City Drug Store, where the grocery and market business has always been located.

**45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 7, 1941**

Friona's scarlet-clad basketballers, champions of District I of the Girls Basketball League of Texas, left Wednesday morning for Waco where they will take part in the state tournament to be held March 6-7-8. Taking the place of the Wayside Lassies, winners of the meet last year, the Squaws have the favored position in the tournament. Making the trip to Waco are R.L. Bates, coach, Miss Reba Jenkins, sponsor, H.T. Magness, school board, Edna Brown, Betty Ann Taylor, Wynell Thompson, Wynona Hill, Frances Massey, Betty Mae Massey, Jean McFarland, Jacquelyn Wilkison, Frances Buchanan, Christine McKenzie, June Maurer, Yvonne McFarland and Florence Baxter, manager.

**40 YEARS AGO—MARCH 8, 1946**

Changes in management and service at the Ira Benger Field northeast of Friona and owned by Carl C. Maurer of this city were instituted when Elvie T. Jennings took over last week as manager, machinist and flight instructor. Mr. Jennings has recently been discharged from the Army Air

Service, where he served as mechanic and flight trainer, and is therefore expert in both.

**35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 8, 1951**

A locally-owned gin is assured for Friona and the surrounding territory as a result of purchase this week of a Hardwick-Etter four-stand gin. Wright Williams and Pete Buske, spokesmen for a local group of men making the purchase, said the gin appeared to be the ideal type for operation here. Concentrated efforts to secure a gin were commenced after cards mailed to cotton growers were returned to the Chamber of Commerce indicating some 11,000 acres to be planted in cotton in the immediate area.

**30 YEARS AGO—MARCH 2, 1956**

The worst sandstorm in four years rolled over the Golden Spread last weekend, bringing winds with gusts up to 90 miles per hour on Friday, according to the weatherman, and accounting for a toll of accidents and property damage. Cars along Highway 60 were stopped during the height of the storm, but cars were still involved in accidents. Worst injury was to Mrs. Joe Hromas of Bovina, who suffered lacerations on her face from striking her car windshield.

**20 YEARS AGO—MARCH 2, 1961**

Ground was broken Monday for Friona Country Club's golf course, work on the bases for greens of the nine-hole course has been progressing since then. The club will continue to work for more members. One director said 115 members will be needed to maintain the club. The number currently in the organization is thought to be about 100.

**15 YEARS AGO—MARCH 4, 1971**

Four indictments were returned and five charges were passed by the Parmer County Grand Jury, which was in session on Friday, February 20. An indictment was not returned against Rex Beardain of the Rhea Community, who had

been charged with the murder of his father. A "no bill" was the result of the Beardain case.

**10 YEARS AGO—FEB. 29, 1976**

MBPXL Corporation (formerly Missouri Beef Packers) announced this week an \$850,000 expansion of its Friona facility. The expansion will enable management of MBPXL to install a second shift at the beef processing plant, increasing slaughter capacity by 45 per cent.

The auction sale at the 29th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show zoomed to a new all-time record last Saturday, when premiums totalling \$68,568.38 were paid to the boys and girls exhibiting animals. This year's auction total was more than \$8,000 more than the previous record of \$60,387 which was set here in 1974.

**5 YEARS AGO—MARCH 1, 1981**

Joe Dan Tarter of Lazbuddie, Casey Riddle of Bovina and Roddy Berend of Friona won the three top prizes awarded at the 1981 Parmer County Junior Livestock Show last Friday, February 20.

The auction sale following the stock show set a new volume, as the 142 animals making the sale (80 barrows, 46 sheep and 16 steers) sold for a total of \$93,729.47.

Mark Blankenship, Patti Hinton and Kipi Fleming, members of the FHS Band, qualified for the state UIL contests as soloists.

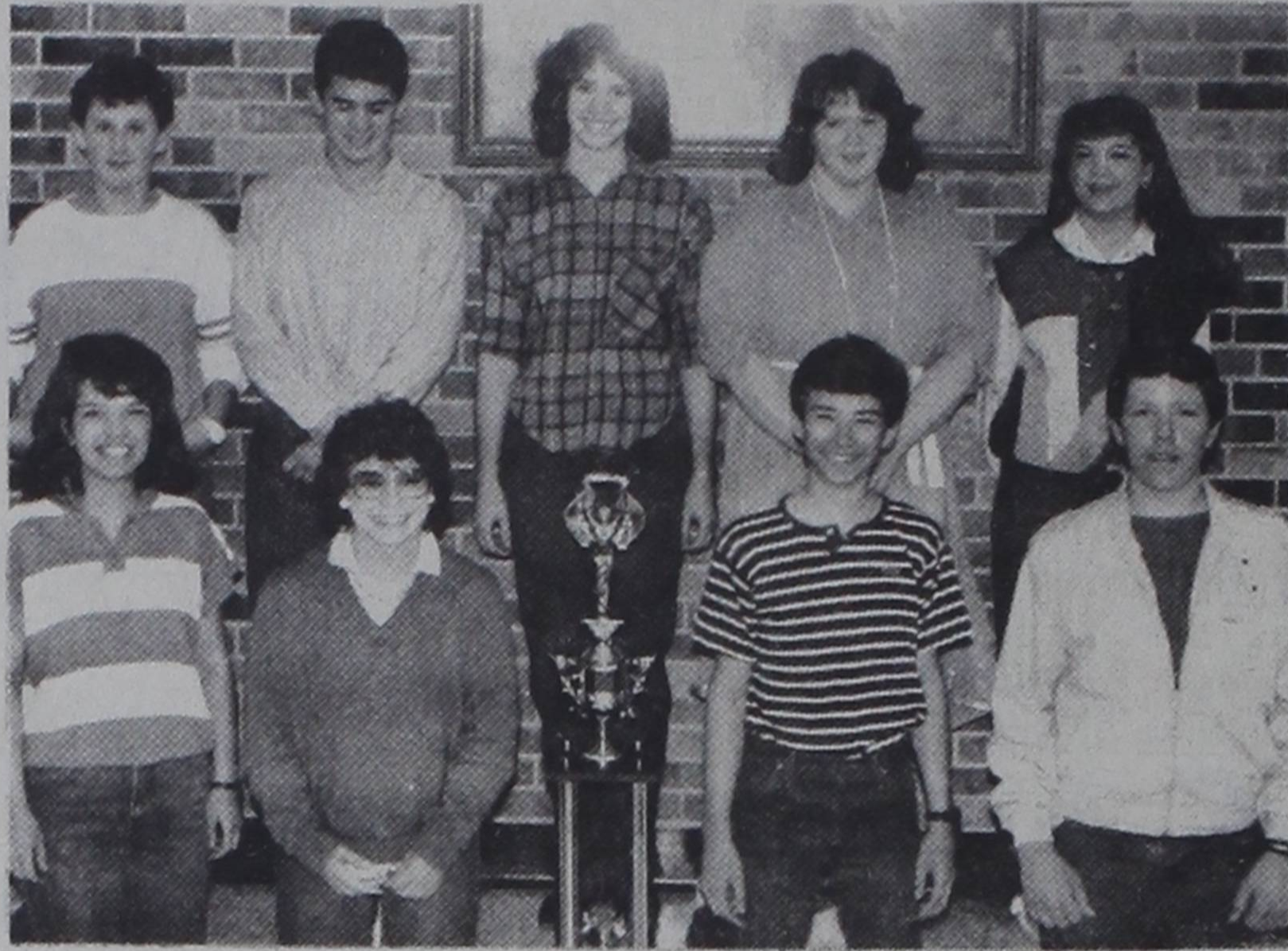

## Local Boys Catch Calves In Scramble

Shannon Cochran and Daylen Gallman, Friona 4-H Club members, won \$600 calf purchase certificates at the February 24 performance of the 1986 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

MBank Houston was Shannon's sponsor in the scramble. Don and Martha Young sponsored Daylen in the competition.

The calf scramble event involves 28 youngsters chasing half as many calves on the Astrodome floor. Contestants must catch a calf, halter it, and drag it across the finish line to win. Each winner receives a \$600 purchase certificate to buy a registered beef or dairy heifer.

That heifer will be fed, fit, groomed and brought back to the 1987 Houston Livestock Show for special showing competition.

The winning youngsters are required to keep accurate records of their animals and to submit monthly progress reports to both the Houston Livestock Show and to their individual sponsor throughout the following year.

The entire project is supervised by the winner's county extension agent or vocational agriculture teacher.

The project officially ends when the winner brings the animal to the following year's Houston Livestock Show.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo calf scramble provides a yearlong educational experience for each of the lucky winners. With tremendous support from numerous sponsors, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo has put more than 10,000 quality animals valued at more than \$2 million into

the hands of Texas youth.

The annual Livestock Show and Rodeo is Houston's largest charity event, with all net revenues contributed to scholarship and research programs throughout Texas.

A research study conducted by two Stephen F. Austin State University professors reports that through the purchase of feed and supplies, as well as the purchase of calves from purebred herds, the calf scramble program generates more than half a million dollars in economic activity each year throughout the state.

The 54-year-old Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo celebrates the Texas Sesquicentennial this year with more than 17,000 members and a yearly scholarship program commitment of \$1.8 million.

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## G-T Program Begun For Grades K-5

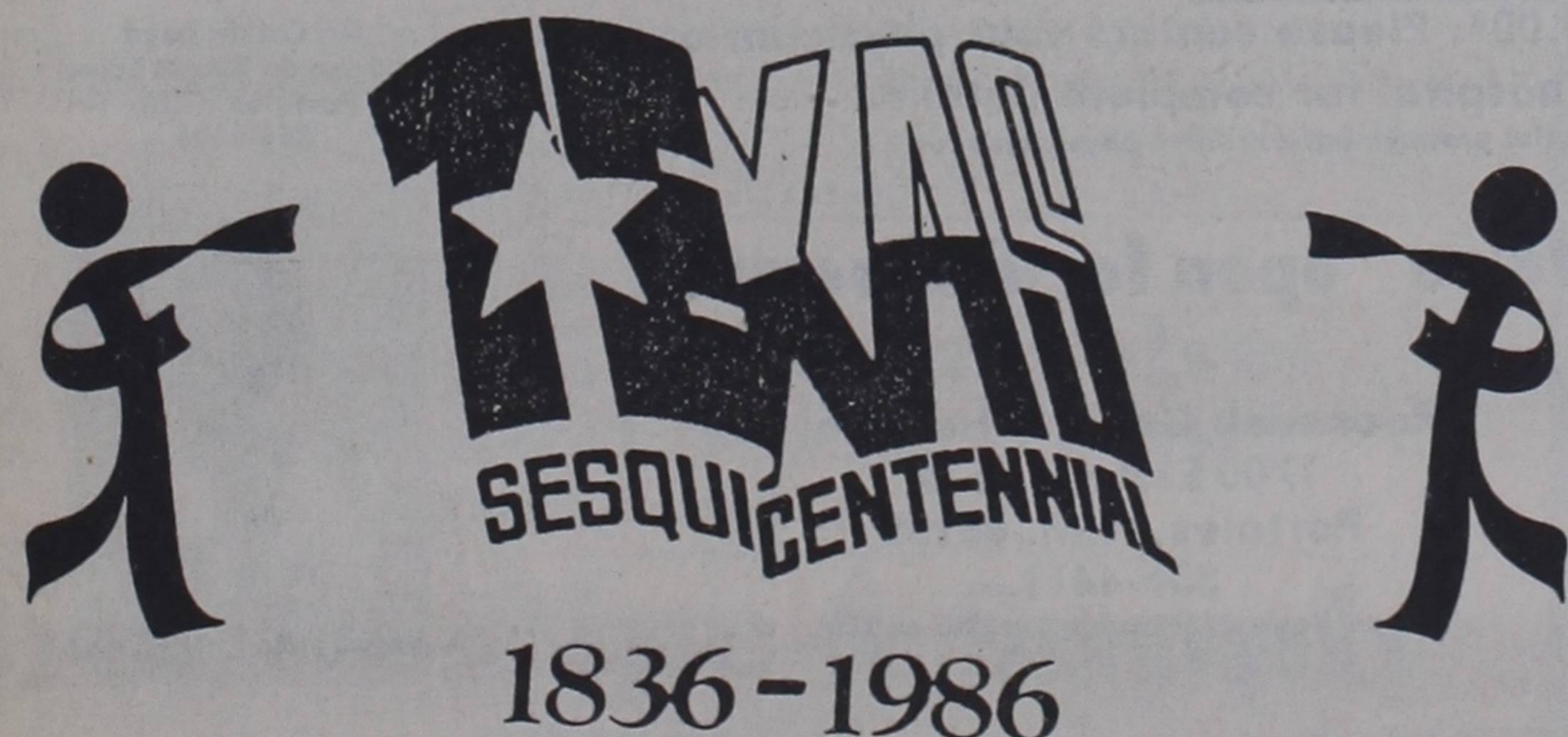

She is making satisfactory progress and the entire family, which includes, V'Lynda, is happy to be at home again.

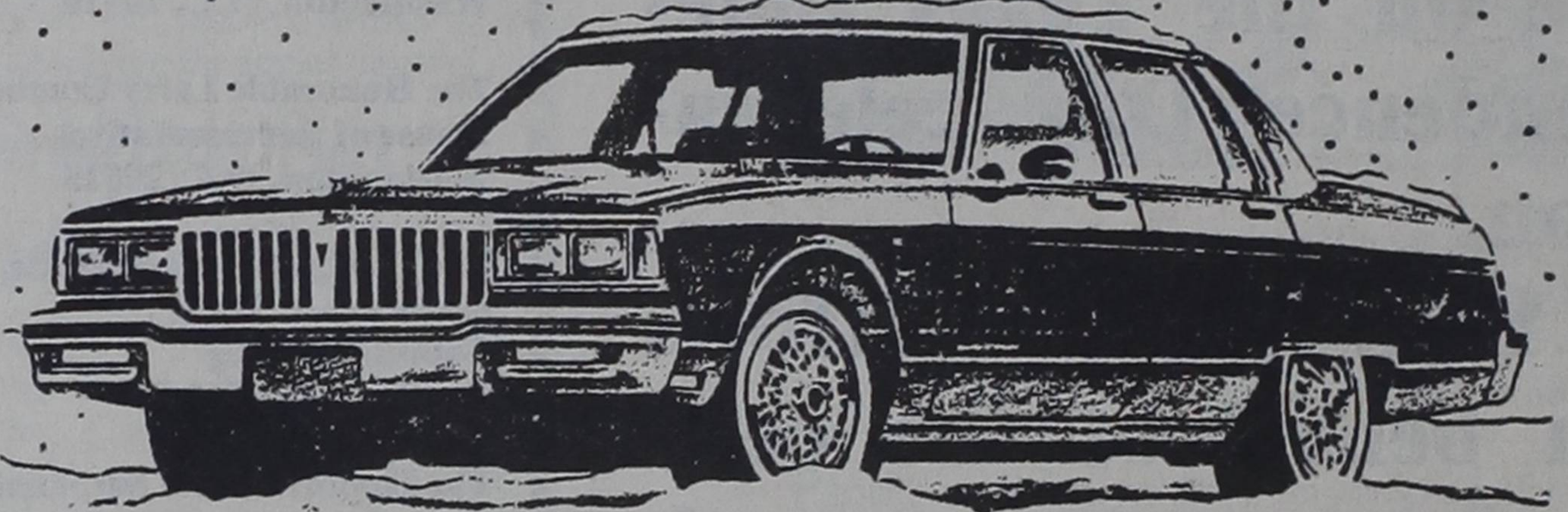

Great-grandparents are Mrs. Ann Martin of Friona and Mr. and Mrs. Harold Davis of Springfield, Colorado.

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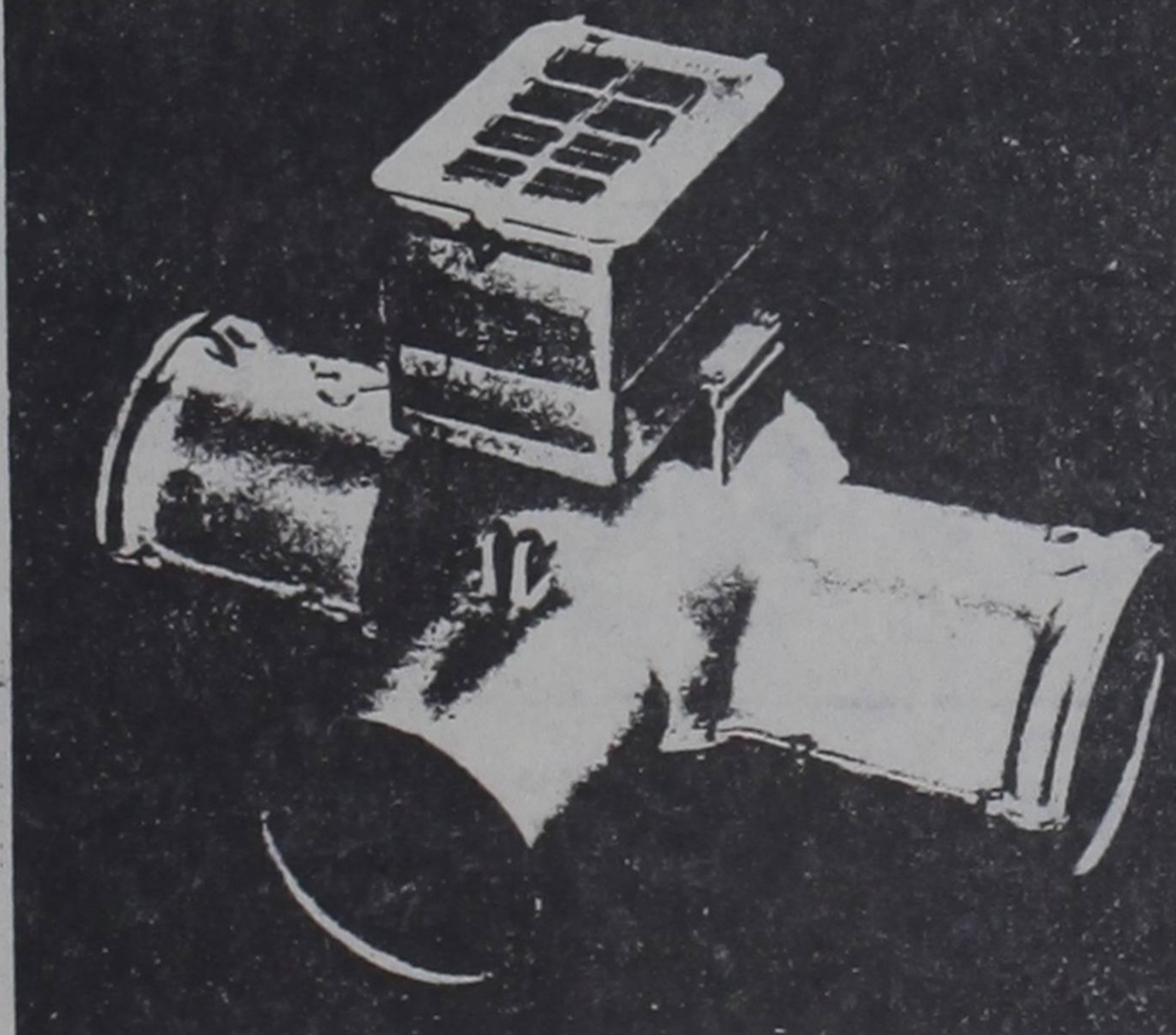
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
