Chamber Honors Leading Citizens

The Friona Chamber of Commerce held its Salute to the Texas Sesquicentennial banquet Thursday evening, with a good crowd attending the affair at the Friona Community Center.

A highlight of the annual banquet was the presentation of the Chamber's outstanding citizen awards.

Those honored were Patricia Fleming as Woman of the Year; Jim Johnston as Man of the Year; Rick Tullis as Teacher of the Year; Margaret Wilshire as "Most Courteous Employee," and Susan Bailey and Daniel Gowens, Outstanding Young People.

In a special award, the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce presented Bonnie Wilhelm an award for the work she performed in transferring a vacant park-eyesore into a "mini park."

Also, Mayor Clarence Monroe read a proclamation extolling bagpiper Harold Taylor for his excellent job in representing the city, and naming him as the "Pipes of Friona."

Taylor played several selections on his bagpipes, including a tune he had composed especially for the occasion.

Bill Stovell, 1986 president of

the Chamber, served as Master of Ceremonies. He introduced the 1986 directors of the Chamber: Bud Rainey, Carmen Rape, B.K. Buske, Dave Hutson, Dianne Tatum, Jim Atwell, Jayson Grimsley, Mickey Harrelson and Mike Riethmayer.

Bob Welch, 1985 Chamber president and an ex-officio member of the board, presented gifts to retiring board members Pat Fleming, Dee Willard, Harry Hutcheson and John Mars.

Marsha Lewis, president of the Women's Division, introduced her board members, and presented a gift to outgoing president, Jeannie Tucker.

Sonia Lafuente, the reigning Miss Friona (Maize Queen) performed a tap routine, wearing a red and white western outfit. Also introduced were the runners-up in the 1985 Queen's pageant: Kelly Wied and Leslee Upton.

Also given special introductions at the banquet were members of the 1985-86 Friona Squaws' basketball team and their coach, Vicki Hatton. The Squaws were lauded for winning the district and bi-district cage titles and advancing in the playoffs for the first time in 13 years.

Larry Brock of Eastern New Mexico University presented a special slide show, starting with a patriotic theme and going into pictures of local people, events and businesses, with a special emphasis on Chamber activities.

Mrs. Fleming has been a city resident since 1965, and has been quite active in civic activities. She has served as secretary of the Chamber board, secretary of the Friona School board, is Democratic Precinct chairman and a member of the Hospital Auxiliary.

She is active in the Methodist Church, serving as Church School superintendent and on the church board. She is active with Prairie Acres and as a CPR instructor and also assists with blood drives.

Johnston has been a resident of Friona since 1962, and is a former Little League coach, was on the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce, is past president of the Friona Evening Lions and a former board member for Prairie Acres.

He is a lifetime member of Delta Sigma Pi, is a Sunday School teacher at First Baptist Church, and is an honorary member of the Friona FFA and the Friona Young Farmers. He was named "Father of the Year" in 1974 by Friends of the Library.

Tullis, in his fifth year as a Friona teacher, was lauded for his work in establishing a local Science Fair, and also starting the Regional

Science Fair in Canyon. He has enlisted the participation of children from first grade on up, in the Science Fair program.

Every year since he has been in the Friona school system, a student from Friona has won at the Regional Science Fair and has gone to the International Science Fair and won awards there as well.

Mrs. Wilshire is a native of Claude. She is a teller at Friona State Bank, and formerly worked in the bookkeeping department and at the drive-in window. She has been a resident of Friona since 1974.

Miss Bailey is a senior at Friona High School, where she is a member of the Chieftain Band, achieving all-region status for five years. She also has been a member of the school's award-winning one-act plays.

Susan holds office in the NHS, is a member of the FCA, FTA and Science Club. During the 1985 football season, she served as the Chieftain mascot. She participates in track, being on the regional-qualifying mile relay team a year ago, and a member of the Squaws' basketball playoff team this year. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bailey.

Gowens was born and raised in Friona. He is a member of the Chieftain Band, making all-region three years. He received the "Marching Chieftain" award in 1985.

A highly competitive person, Gowens was a star on the gridiron for the Chieftains until a knee injury sidelined him. He also starred in track, holding the school high jump record until this past weekend.

After a year of four knee surgeries, Gowens wears two knee braces to throw the shot put. He plays tennis, and is working on a "comeback" in the high jump. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernie Gowens.

Court Approves Various Expenses

Approval of various expenditures comprised the main items on the agenda at the regular meeting of the Farmer County Commissioners Monday, March 10.

The court voted to re-imburse Commissioner Ernest Anthony, who had written a personal check for \$1,937.02 to pay for replacement of the engine in the County Agent's pickup while on a trip to the Houston Livestock Show.

The repair work was done in Brenham, and the Chevrolet agency there would not allow the work to be done on open account billing. Anthony wrote the check, to allow the pickup to be released.

Laywell Ousted By Board

Teachers' contracts were the main item of business for the Friona School Board, in a marathon session this past Monday night.

The contract of high school varsity basketball coach Paul Laywell was not renewed by the board. All other teachers' and coaches' contracts were renewed.

"The board felt that it was the best interest of the program to make a change at this time," was the comment from the Superintendent's office.

When contacted, Laywell said that he felt it best that he make no comment regarding the situation.

Laywell, 28, is in his first year as boys basketball coach. He came to Friona from Byers, where he had served as head coach. Previously, he was in an assistant's capacity in the Hurst-Euleus-Bedford school district. He is a 1981 graduate of Texas A&M.

Motion was approved to pay the boarding care bills on the county foster children in the amount of \$3,630, which will be reimbursed to the county.

The court also approved payment of \$1,485 for repairs to the district judge's restroom.

Bills were approved from two court-appointed attorneys, Richard Collard and Bryan Johnston, for representing two juveniles in court hearings.

District Clerk Marjorie Watkins appeared before the court to discuss the carpet in her office, which is badly worn. It had been stated that replacing her carpet at the same time the carpet is laid in the district courtroom would effect a considerable saving. A motion was approved to allow the carpet replacement at this time.

The district judge had asked about the possibility of doing some extra decorating in the courtroom while the remodeling is being done.

Renner First Saw Area 60 Years Ago

Sixty years ago, March 11, 1926, Rudolph and Clara Renner came to Friona. As a young man, 26 years old, Rudolph thought the Texas Panhandle was surely the land of opportunity. As a 17 year old he had come to the Panhandle and worked as a cowboy on the Jersig Ranch and the Escarbada, which was the headquarters of the original XIT Ranch in Texas.

At the time Rudolph worked there it had been leased to someone else. He used to ride his pony to the Rhea Community every Sunday to attend church there.

When he went back to Oklahoma, he sold his pony and bought a Model T, and a stetson hat. He always hoped he could come back. In 1926 the Syndicate was selling the land around the Friona area. Rudolph chose a farm southeast of Friona and paid \$34 an acre for it.

Rudolph, Clara and their boys, John and Lee and Clara's sister, Rebecca Weis and her two boys came to Friona in a Model T Ford. H.H. Weis came on the train with all their belongings, some livestock, chickens and a Samson tractor.

Rudolph and the women and children left Shattuck, Oklahoma

at 11 a.m. on March 11, 1926. They stopped in Canadian where the train had stopped for awhile and left a blanket with Mr. Weis for the rest of the trip. They arrived in Friona about midnight and went to the Syndicate Hotel, 12 miles southeast of Friona to spend the night. It was filled so they came back into Friona and stayed in the Friona Hotel for the night.

The train was to arrive the next morning so Rudolph took the girls out to their farm where they had a little two-room house. He went back to town to meet the train, with all their belongings and Mr. Weis.

The train was late arriving in Friona, about 4:30 in the evening. Rudolph and H.H. hooked the wagon to the team and loaded some of the things in it. As they headed out of town Charlie Adams met them in a new Model T truck. He offered to load some of their things in his truck and ended up making three trips back for them.

Meanwhile the women on the farm were sure wondering what happened to Rudolph and the train. He had intended to bring them food and water back that morning after he met the train, so needless to say they were hungry and thirsty.

The land around Friona at that time was six inches high with native grass and thick as carpet. It hadn't been grazed for a long time. Rudolph broke some land out and planted row crops (maize and

55 YEARS AGO—MARCH 13, 1931

The throbbing, vital question in the minds of most of the people of Parmer County today is "Where should the county seat be?" Where do you think the county seat should be and why? The Friona Star is sponsoring a contest for the person writing the best letter on the subject. First prize is a \$10 gold piece. Second prize will be a \$5 gold piece, and to the next five letters will be awarded a year's subscription to the Friona Star.

50 YEARS AGO—MARCH 13, 1936

Parmer County's second annual Calf and Meat Show was held here on Saturday of last week, and was well attended by people from almost every part of the country. The calf division of the show was won by Boggess of Friona. Wines of Bovina was second, and Lilly of Bovina was third. Other entries were Julian, Lazbuddie; Welch, Friona; Harold Lillard, Friona; Franklin Lillard, Friona; Schlenker, Rhea; and Howard of Lazbuddie.

45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 14, 1941

Amassing a total of 1099 points in 34 games, the Friona Squaws earned the title of "point a minute" basketweavers, having met all comers from Texline on the Oklahoma line of the north Panhandle, to Silsbee, deep in East Texas. The Squaws lost their opening game of the state tournament, but came back for three wins to take the consolation title. The Squaws bowed to only three teams during the season.

40 YEARS AGO—MARCH 5, 1946

After battling their way to the finals of the Texas High School Girls Basketball championship tourney at Hillsboro Saturday night, the Friona girl capers lost to their old jinx and three-time winner, Aquilla High School of Hill County. Friona led at halftime, 14-11, but the final score was 29-26. M. Taylor, Cobb, Crow, Mingus, Horner and Robertson made up the starting lineup for Friona.

35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 15, 1951

A concert will be presented next Wednesday night by the Friona High School Girls Choir, under the direction of Glen H. Cunningham. The group is preparing to go on a 500-mile tour March 29-30-31. Included on their tour will be Crane-Odesa, Imperial and others.

30 YEARS AGO—MARCH 9, 1956

W.V. Null, representative for Cooley Construction Company, the contractors who will build Friona's new post office building, will arrive in town this week to begin construction of the building, according to word received by Leo McLellan. Friona's present post office has served the town since 1929. The building belongs to T.J. Crawford.

25 YEARS AGO—MARCH 9, 1961

An Amarillo man was arrested here Tuesday night at the rear of Gib's Cleaners after that building had been burglarized. The man was arrested by night patrolman Jack Fleming as he made his rounds. He is being questioned in regard to break-ins in Amarillo and other Panhandle towns recently.

20 YEARS AGO—MARCH 10, 1966

Monsanto Chemicals opened its new plant just east of the city limits, with Bill Wooley as manager. David Bailey has been hired by the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin as the company's new manager.

15 YEARS AGO—MARCH 11, 1971

The Friona Apartments, largest single housing project in the city's history, have been completed on the northeastern edge of Friona, and are now renting. The 60-unit project has been underway for more than a year, and began taking renters in mid-February.

10 YEARS AGO—MARCH 7, 1976

The Friona High School Stage Band under the direction of Charles Faulkner won the second place trophy in AA at the South Plains College Jazz Festival held

Saturday, February 28, in Levelland.

Season scoring statistics showed that Friona Squaw forward Terri Patterson had one of the best individual scoring seasons in recent girls basketball history at Friona High School, during the season just passed. Miss Patterson scored 714 points in 29 games. Her per-game scoring average of 24.6 is the best average that could be found among available records for the past 20 seasons at FHS.

The Friona area, entertaining hopes for some much-needed moisture, instead was buffeted by gale-like winds on Thursday of this week. The southwest wind also kicked up sand which made outdoor activities unbearable.

5 YEARS AGO—MARCH 8, 1981

The City of Friona issued a report, indicating that building activity was active in Friona. Permits were issued during the month for construction valued at an estimated \$178,100. One new residence, two commercial buildings (Friona Ford Sales and Friona Wheat Growers), one addition to an existing residence, and three alterations were included in the permits. The monthly total is the most for a single month since September of 1979, whose total was \$497,000.

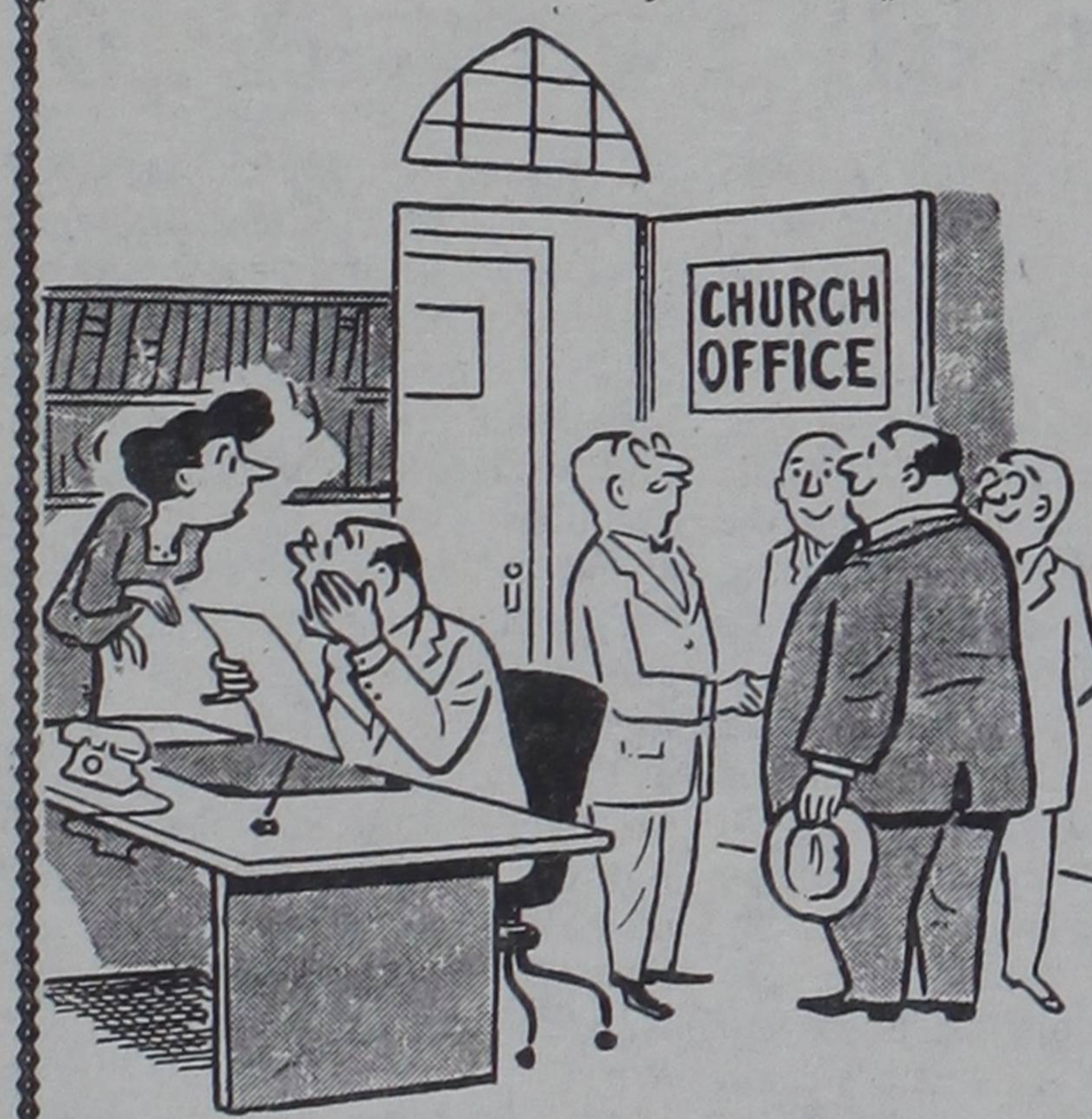

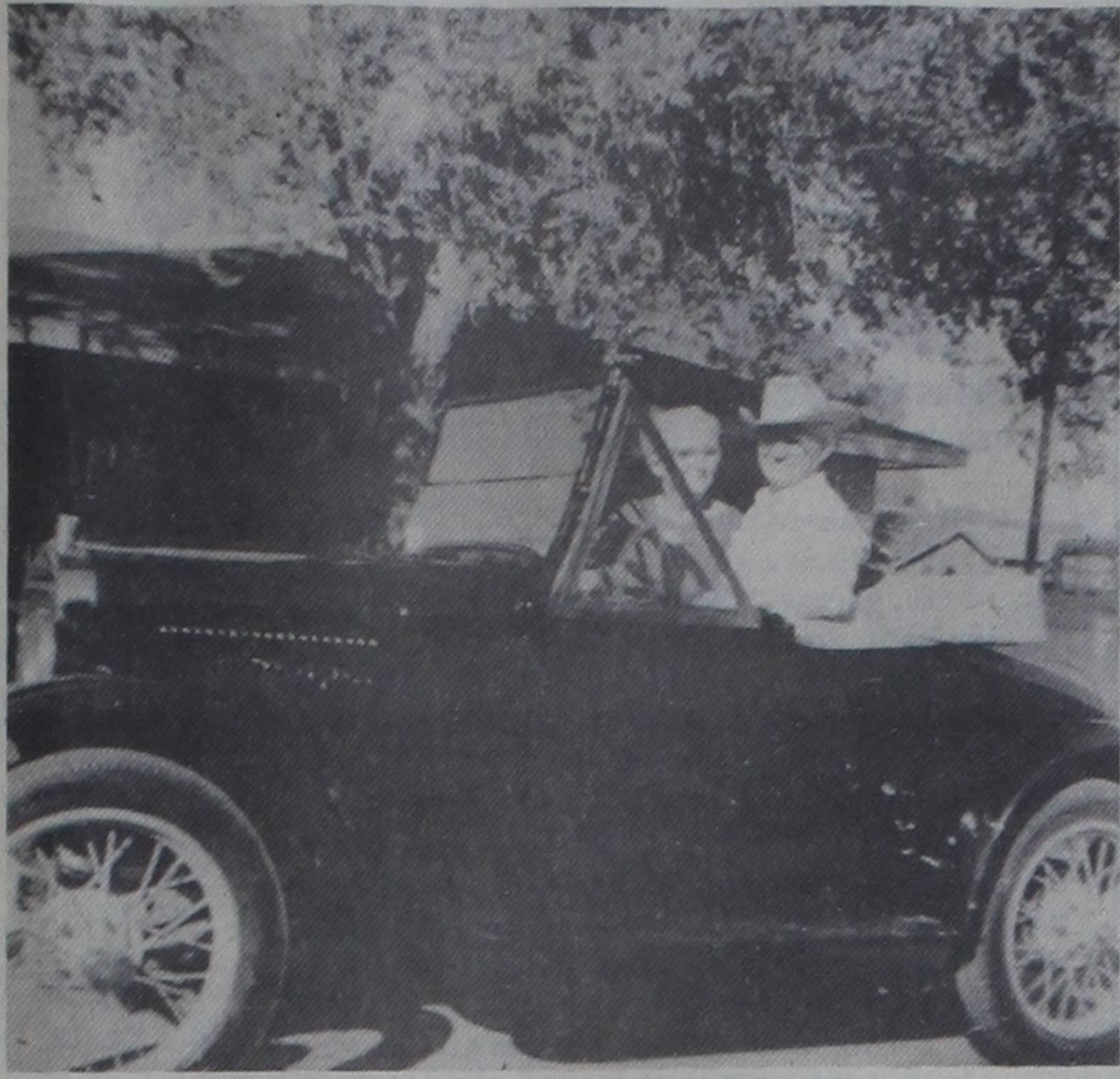

hegari) that summer. They had a big snow the last of March and then lots of rain during the summer.

Rudolph said, "Every time a little cloud came up it would rain." That was the only thing that saved them. Rudolph went back to Shattuck to cut a wheat crop he still had there and he stayed 40 days and worked on a threshing crew and threshed wheat for other people.

When he got home he couldn't believe how his row crop had grown and how pretty it was. He made a good crop but got only 25¢ a hundred for it. That was only enough to pay the interest on the land he had purchased. The Renners worked hard and paid for their farm even though at times during the depression it looked like they couldn't stay, but they survived. They watched many of their neighbors leave during this time.

They raised six children, four boys and two girls, and have 14 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren. Four of their children still live around Friona and four of their grandsons live here.

The Renner children are sons Lee, John, R.J. (Junior) and "Cotton," and daughters Lillie Mae Baxter and Mary Joyce Barnett.

They have taught their children and grandchildren many things but the greatest of these is how to love one another.

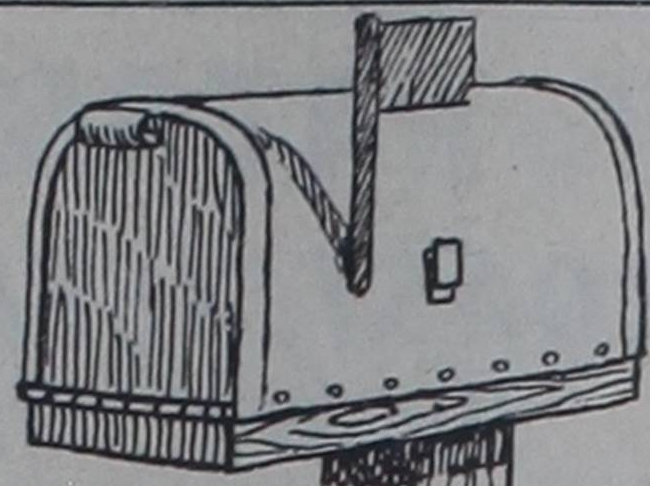
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Letters To The Editor

As a member of the community, taxpayer, and registered voter, I wish to express my disgust concerning the failure of the Friona School Board to renew the contract of Coach Paul Laywell. Not one viable reason has been given for this line of action. They have come up with one or two excuses but not one valid reason.

Let me review some facts: (1) Coach Laywell is the first coach in a long time, maybe ever, to organize a "summer league" basketball program. The league was set to go with the following participants: 8 out of 9 varsity guys, 11 out of 13 junior varsity, 18 out of 18 8th graders, 8 out of 9 7th graders, 26 varsity-level kids from Farwell, and 8 varsity-level kids from Bovina. This shoots down any myth that Coach Laywell hasn't sold his program to the kids.

(2) Both Coach Laywell and Coach Vicki Hatton are the first coaches in many years to go to the Junior High and implement their programs to the kids in person and to take an interest in all the kids. This took extra time and extra work. They have brought consistency and continuity to the basketball programs.

(3) The Friona basketball situation prior to the arrival of Coach Laywell was disastrous. Paul has brought excitement back to basketball. You don't have to believe me, ask the kids.

(4) Even after the season was over, the buys were up in the gym working on their skills. This was after they worked out in track. Not just one or two guys but ten or eleven varsity and varsity-level boys out working to improve themselves. No one was forced to be there, but then again, ask the kids and they will tell you the truth.

(5) Coach Laywell was hired to teach and coach the kids. He was not hired to take orders from "armchair" coaches, "socialize" with boosters, compromise his morals, or have a "charming" persona. I can attest to his high moral character, his integrity, and the fact that the kids are his first priority. Not only has he earned the respect of the kids he has coached, he also is one of the most-liked teachers at Friona High School. This can be easily verified by asking those who know best, the kids.

If this isn't building a program then the School Board doesn't know what a program is. In my

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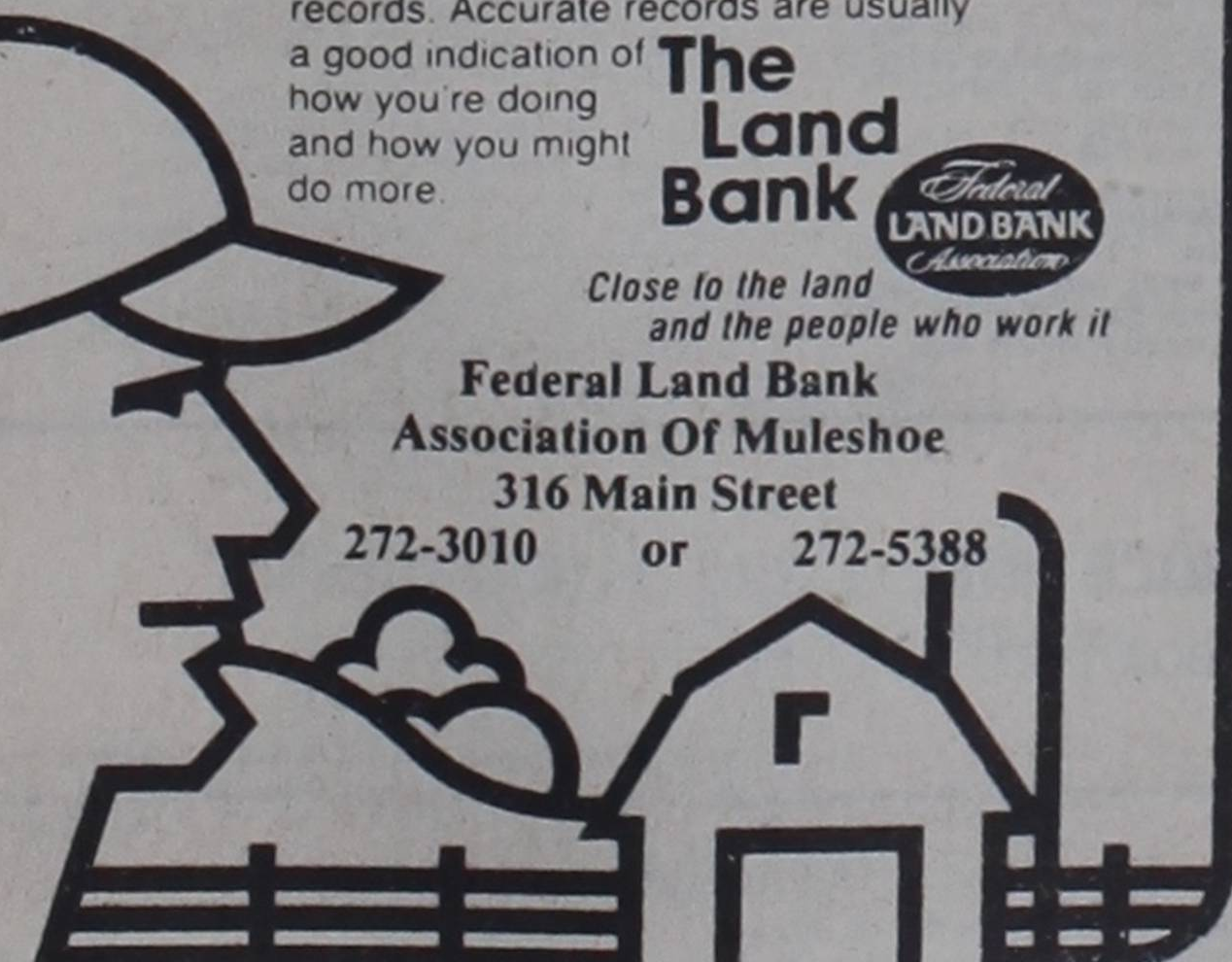


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Leaders Given For Squaw Cage Year

Senior post girl Kerry Cain was the leading scorer for the 1985-86 Friona Squaws, according to statistics released this week by Coach Vicki Hatton.

The final season figures showed that Miss Cain led the team with 391 total points in 28 games, an average of 14 points per game.

Ronda Ratcliff was the second leading scorer with 193 points and a 6.9 points-per-game average, and Lacey Osborn scored 169 points for a 6.0 average.

Miss Osborn was the best shooter on the team, both from the field and at the free throw line. Lacey hit 66 of 142 field goal attempts, or 46.5 per cent. Miss Cain hit 153 of 343 shots from the field, 44.6 per cent.

At the line, Miss Osborn hit 37 of 52 shots, 71.1 per cent. Miss

Cain sank 85 of 130 shots from the line, or 65.4 per cent.

Miss Cain also was the team leader in rebounds with 190. Ronda Ratcliff had 146; Miss Osborn 140; Shannon Atwell 115 and Kelly Wied 110.

However, Miss Ratcliff led in offensive rebounds with 77 to 73 for Miss Cain. Miss Cain had 117 defensive rebounds, compared to 91 for Miss Osborn, who was second in that category.

Miss Wied led the team in assists (passes leading to scores), as well as steals, with 42. Mika Maddox had 39 steals; Miss Atwell and Cain had 30 each.

As a team, the Squaws had a good shooting percentage from the field, making 486 of 1269 shots, or 38 per cent. The team's percentage from the foul line was 55 per cent, 254 of 464.

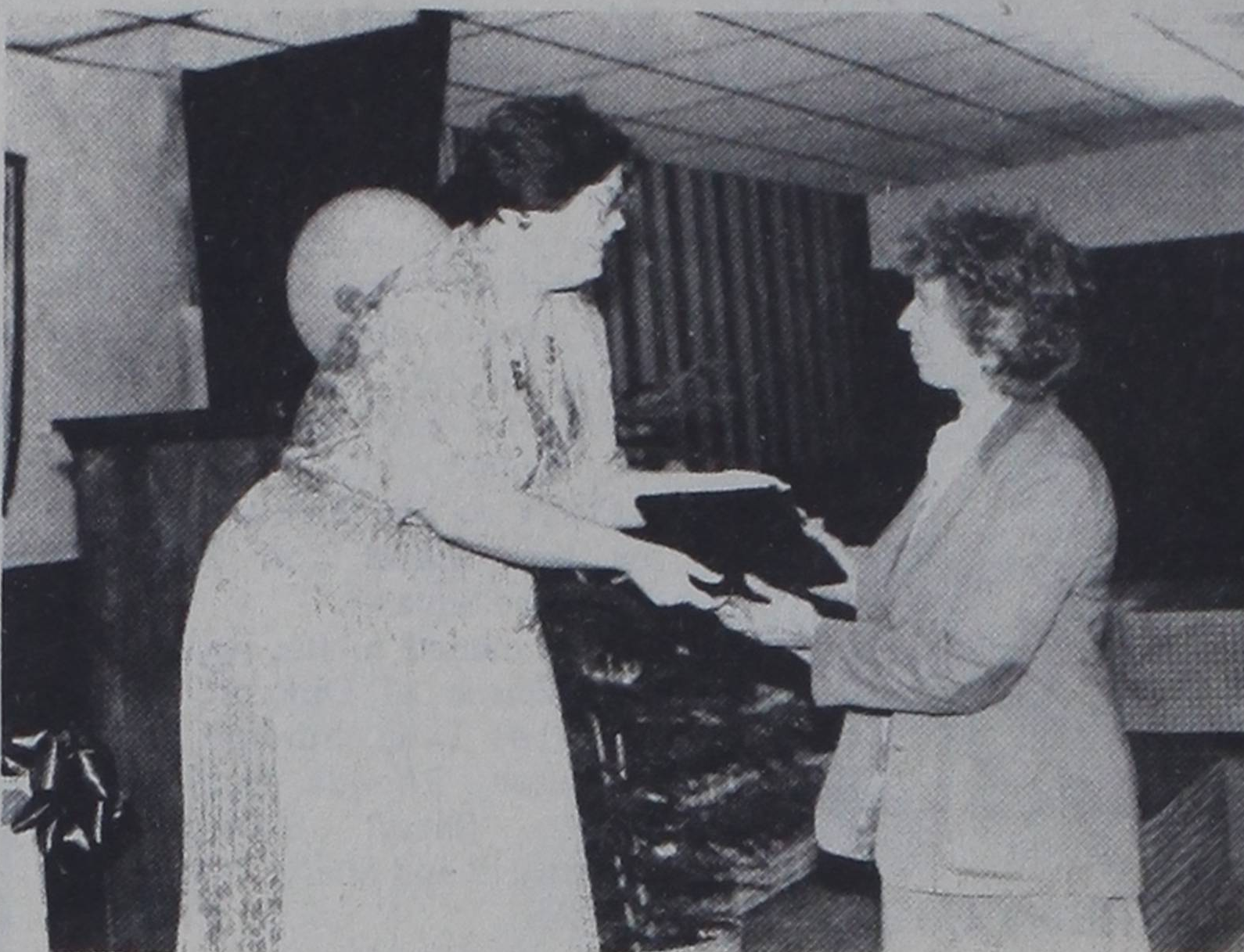
