**OUR COUNTRY'S** battle against terrorism, and particularly those elements commanded by Libyan leader Muammar Kaddafi resulted in a violent response early this week, as the air strike was carried out against Libya.

President Reagan pointed out that Kaddafi had been warned repeatedly to stop his program of stepped-up terrorist attacks. Also, America had pleaded with its allies to join in an economic embargo against Libya, as an alternative to the military action.

America's allies appear to have been more passive in their reaction to our country's battle against the terrorists, at least prior to the strike. Apparently many, including Japan, had refused to cooperate in the proposed economic embargo, which would have been preferable to the use of force. (Wonder if we should consider a year's embargo against Japan...and France too, come to think of it?)

The use of force is always regrettable, but as we detailed in this space last week, Libya has become a home base for international terrorism, with training bases well-established. And Americans have appeared to be the major targets of the world's terrorist attacks in recent years.

It's unfortunate, but force is the only language that some people understand. "They counted on us to be passive. They counted wrong," stated President Reagan in his speech Monday night.

We fear that given the fact that Kaddafi has been bent on provoking such an attack for the past several months, that Americans in that part of the world are likely to suffer and perhaps die as a result of Monday's mission.

While America's attack this week was carefully planned, and attempted to be limited to military installations, Kaddafi's reprisals are likely to be more reckless. As expected, the Libyans have called upon their friends to attack "Americans everywhere" to avenge this week's attack.

The next few days and weeks will be critical ones, as our leaders hope the terrorists will have been shown that their actions will not go unpunished.

But, as we also have noted, the Palestinians believe in an "eye for an eye," and although the attack was called 'self-defense' by the administration, America will be made out as an aggressor, and retaliation is to be expected.

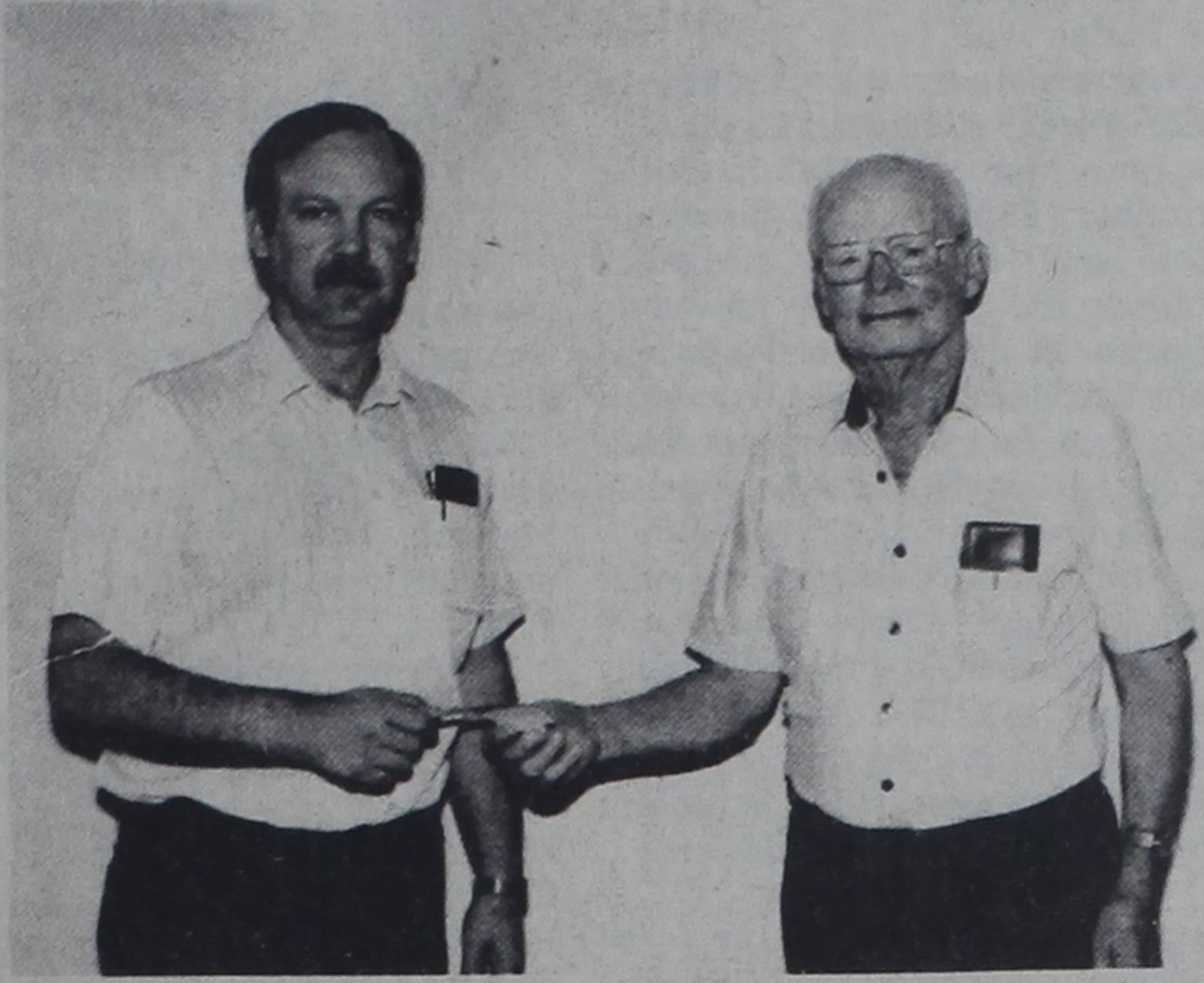
Early reports told of civilian casualties in Monday's raid, which is unfortunate. But one needs to be reminded that the terrorists' main target has always been civilians, and in many instances helpless civilians at that, as in the instance of the hijacking of the pleasure ship Achille Lauro.

The bombing strike in Libya has made some sort of history. President Reagan went on television last week to warn about such an attack. Less than a week later, the attack was carried out, so it can hardly be labeled as a "sneak attack," as in the case of Japan at Pearl Harbor.

Secretary of State Shultz and Vice President Bush had been in the Middle East for a week or more prior to the mission. In retrospect, it must be assumed that they were preparing the leaders of Libya's neighbors for such an attack, so they would not be surprised and alienated by the attack.

## Court Approves Various Expenses

County commissioners approved adding \$2,975 to the previously-approved renovation project for the District Courtroom, at its meeting Monday, April 14.

Judge Jack Young and contractor Jay Sherrill appeared before the court and explained the need for the extra cost. Judge Young also stated that he had shipped the courtroom furniture to the state prison in Huntsville, where it is to be refinished. The court approved expending \$881.60 for the refinishing of the furniture.

A request was approved for laying carpet in the adult probation office. The tile in this office was reportedly "coming to pieces." Cost will be approximately \$155.

Approval was given for payment of the boarding care bills for the county's foster children, in the amount of \$3,999. This amount will be refunded to the county.

Approval was also given for charges by attorneys Collard and Johnston for acting as attorney ad item for two juveniles.

It had been called to the attention of the court that the building being used by the Neighborhood Center in Bovina is in a sad state of repair. Another building has been located, which is in much better condition, and can be had at slightly higher rent (\$105 versus \$86 per month).

The court approved paying the additional rent for the better building.

## Absentee Vote Slated Here

Friona area voters who wish to vote absentee are reminded that they may cast their ballots next Thursday, April 24 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Friona Texas Federal Credit Union.

As there might be some confusion as to where to vote in the primaries for Republicans and Democrats, anyone wishing to avoid this issue may do so by voting absentee.

## No Action By Board On Laywell Issue

The Friona School Board heard statements from three citizens regarding basketball coach Paul Laywell at its meeting on Monday night.

After the "public hearing," the board adjourned into executive session. When it returned, board president Jerry Hinkle asked if there was a further motion regarding Laywell, and there was none.

The board had voted not to renew Laywell's contract at its last meeting, following a lengthy discussion.

Some 70 or 80 residents attended Monday's board meeting, which was moved to the auditorium from the board room, due to the crowd.

In other business, the board approved the physical education, athletic and band budgets for 1986-87.

On the recommendation of band director Jim Parker, the seventh and eighth grade bands will be combined starting next year.

Parker pointed out that combining the bands would enable them to maintain a better balanced instrumentation, and to have a stronger junior high contest band. The loss of 20 to 25 per cent of the students due to the "no pass, no play" rule can severely damage a band's balance, and handicap it in contests, it was pointed out.

Requests by students wishing to transfer into the Friona system for 1986-87 were approved. Superintendent Tom Jarboe pointed out that anyone who wishes to request such a transfer must do so by May 1, 1986.

Jarboe reported on the proposal to remove asbestos from the junior high building. He pointed out that the building has had professional as well as Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) checks, and the specialists feel that the asbestos contained in the building, being under a floor, presents no specific health hazard.

But, in order to be on the safe side, the school plans to purchase a machine that will monitor the air and alert officials if the asbestos level in the air should reach the danger point.

It was pointed out that to provide the minimum number of instructional days, school will be held on Memorial Day, May 26, as well as Friday, May 30. These extra days are necessary due to the two days that school dismissed due to snow.

## Book Fair Slated At Jr. High

The Friona Junior High School Library will have their annual Book Fair Tuesday, April 22, through Friday, April 25.

The Book Fair will be open from 8 a.m. to 4:40 p.m. each day in the Junior High Library and books will range in price from 30 cents to \$6.95.

All profits from the Book Fair will be used to benefit the Junior High Library.

All students and parents are welcome to come by and see the good selection of books. These books would make great gifts and this is a good time to stock up on books for the children's summer reading.

## School Out On Monday

Monday, April 21 will be a school holiday in Friona. The date, which is San Jacinto Day, was set aside by the Texas Education Agency as a "Sesquicentennial Day" holiday for the schools.

This will be a one-time only school holiday, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

However, eighth grade graduation will be held on Thursday, May 29. Friday, May 30 will be an organized field trip for the eighth graders.

Jarboe reported to the board that on April 30 and May 1 the school will have an accrediting "monitoring" visit from the Texas Education Agency.

Tax collections show that 92 per

cent of the 1985 tax roll has been collected. This is the same percentage as this time a year ago, and due to an unusually good year in collecting delinquent accounts, the school finances are in good shape, Jarboe said.

Administrative assistant James Warren presented some routine budget amendments. Reports were made on the various school funds.

## Association Names Two New Directors

The annual meeting of the Friona Cemetery Association, Inc. was held at the City Hall, April 15 at 4:30 p.m.

The meeting was called to order by Roy V. Miller, president, with other directors present: Geneva Williams, Juanita Reed and Mary Joyce Barnett. Others present were Beelee Goodwin, C.L. Vestal and Estes and Zona Bass.

Purpose of the annual meeting was to canvas the ballots that had been returned for election of officers. City employees tabulated the ballots and Mary Joyce Barnett was re-elected along with Glenn Evan Reeve and Melody Drake for three-year terms on the board of directors.

The annual letters are duplicated by the city office and give us assistance when we need it. "In view of these added services, we increased our funds to \$2,500.00 and we feel that this will help offset other work that will be done at the cemetery," Miller said.

"More work is being done to improve the appearance of the corners of the driveways as well as protect the corner properties. We

The Friona Chamber of Commerce urges all residents to take special pride in their community this week. "Let's make this one of the cleanest communities in this area," Atwell says.

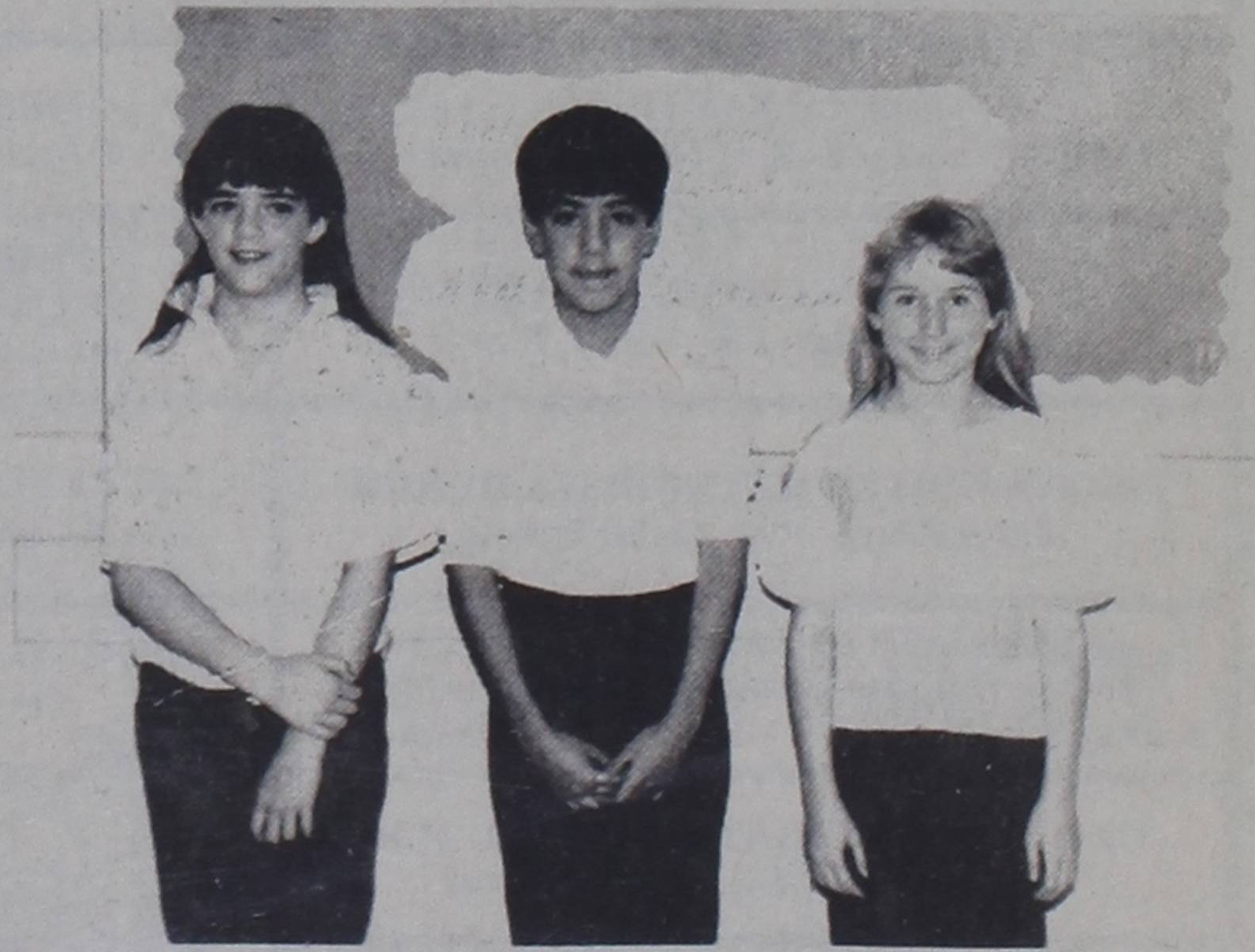
## Stockholders Set Meeting

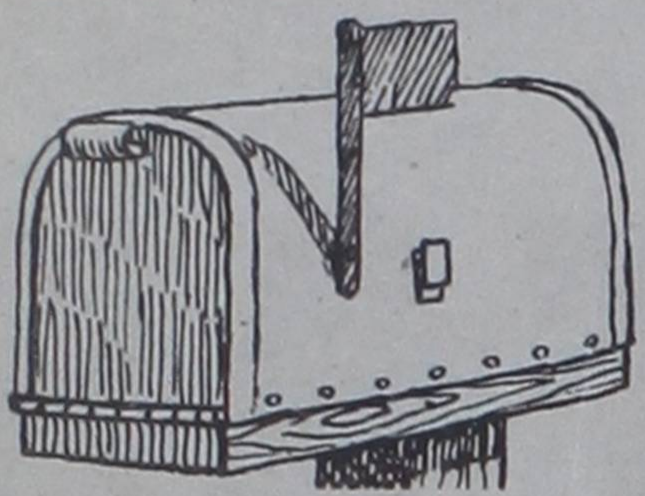
The group will be electing two directors: one from the Hub area and one from southern Bailey County.

## Letter To The Editor

There has been a great deal of discussion lately concerning the permanent school fund, which is controlled by the county Commissioner's Court. I feel that there are some facts that need to be brought out in regard to this fund.

The principal of this fund is earmarked for capital improvements and/or bonded debt. Regardless of who controls the fund, it cannot be used for any other expenses. The interest from the fund may be used for operational expenses, but at the present time, Bovina ISD's share of that interest represents about 1 per cent of the total budget.

The sources for the estimated revenues for the 1985-86 district budget are:

- A. Local sources--29 per cent (this includes local taxes, food service collections and sale of used equipment).
- B. State sources--60 per cent.
- C. Federal sources--10 per cent.
- D. County available--1 per cent.

Bovina ISD is presently needing to replace a 31 year old roof, and between now and 1988 will need additional classrooms to comply with the HB72 mandate of one teacher to each 22 students through grade four. If the district provides local funds for these improvements, then the county money becomes available, this will not help us because the county fund can only be used for capital improvement. The local dollars that are spent for these improvements are tax dollars. The Board of Trustees is concerned about holding the tax rate as low as possible and still provide accredited and quality education to

the student population of Bovina.

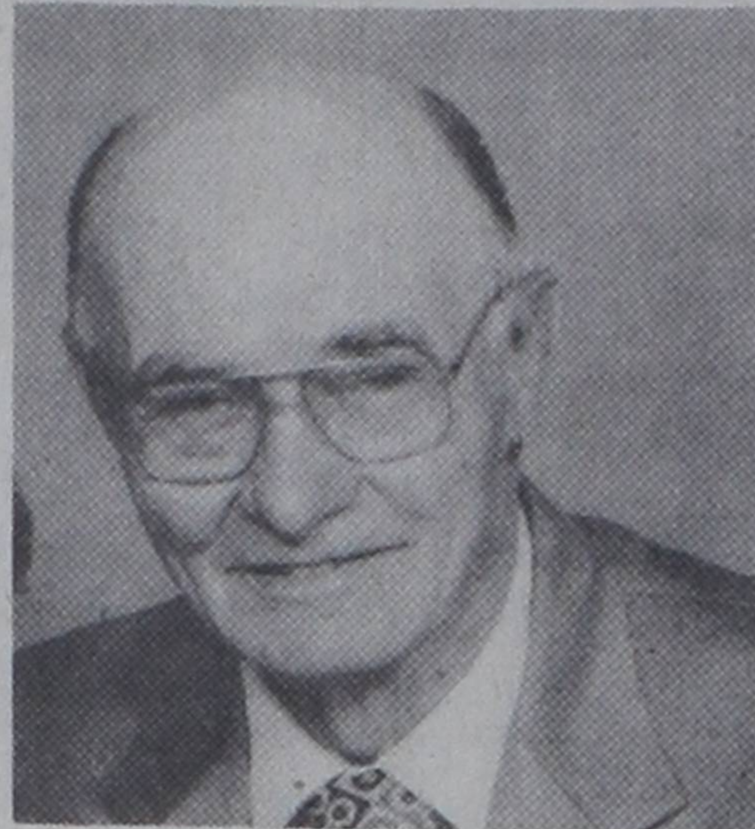
The School Board of every school in the county have met with the commissioners to request disposition of these funds. To date these requests have gone unheeded. These funds were set aside for the schools in Parmer County, but apparently only at the whim of our Commissioner's Court. The disposition of these funds could help county school boards keep tax rates lower.

The Bovina Board has requested to be placed on the agenda of the court this month. Please contact Judge Roberts and/or your commissioner and express your opinion regarding this matter. This is a controversial issue, and I realize that some are opposed to splitting up the fund. Everybody has a right to their opinion, but I believe that it is time to compare notes as to how many are for, and how many are against.

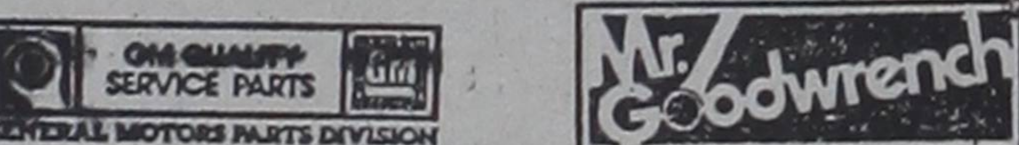

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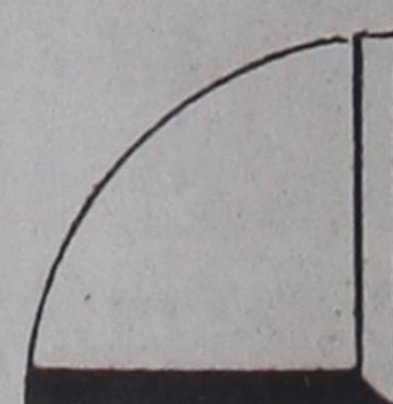

Lisa Sandoval made a strong bid for second place in the 800-meter dash, but in a photo-finish for second with two other girls, had to settle for fourth place. Miss Sandoval also placed sixth in the 1600-meter run.

Jill Herring placed fourth in the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 17.4. Mika Maddox was fourth in the triple jump.

The Squaws' 400-meter relay team placed fifth with a time of 53.1.

## Local Kids Place In Olympics

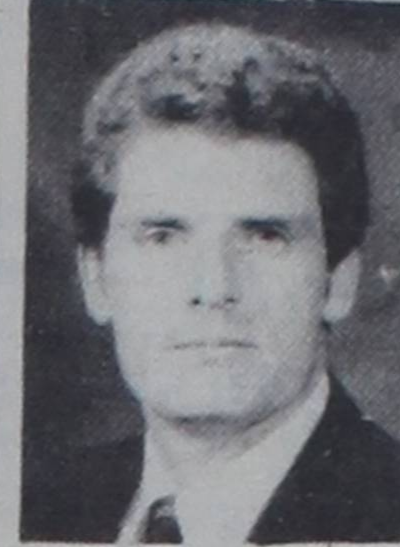

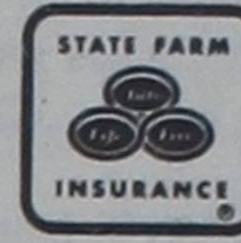
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FIFTH GRADERS...Jon Parker, left, and Kyle Potts, fifth grade students, both had second place ribbons on their projects from the Science Fair.

and students will be admitted for 50 cents. Children six and under are free.

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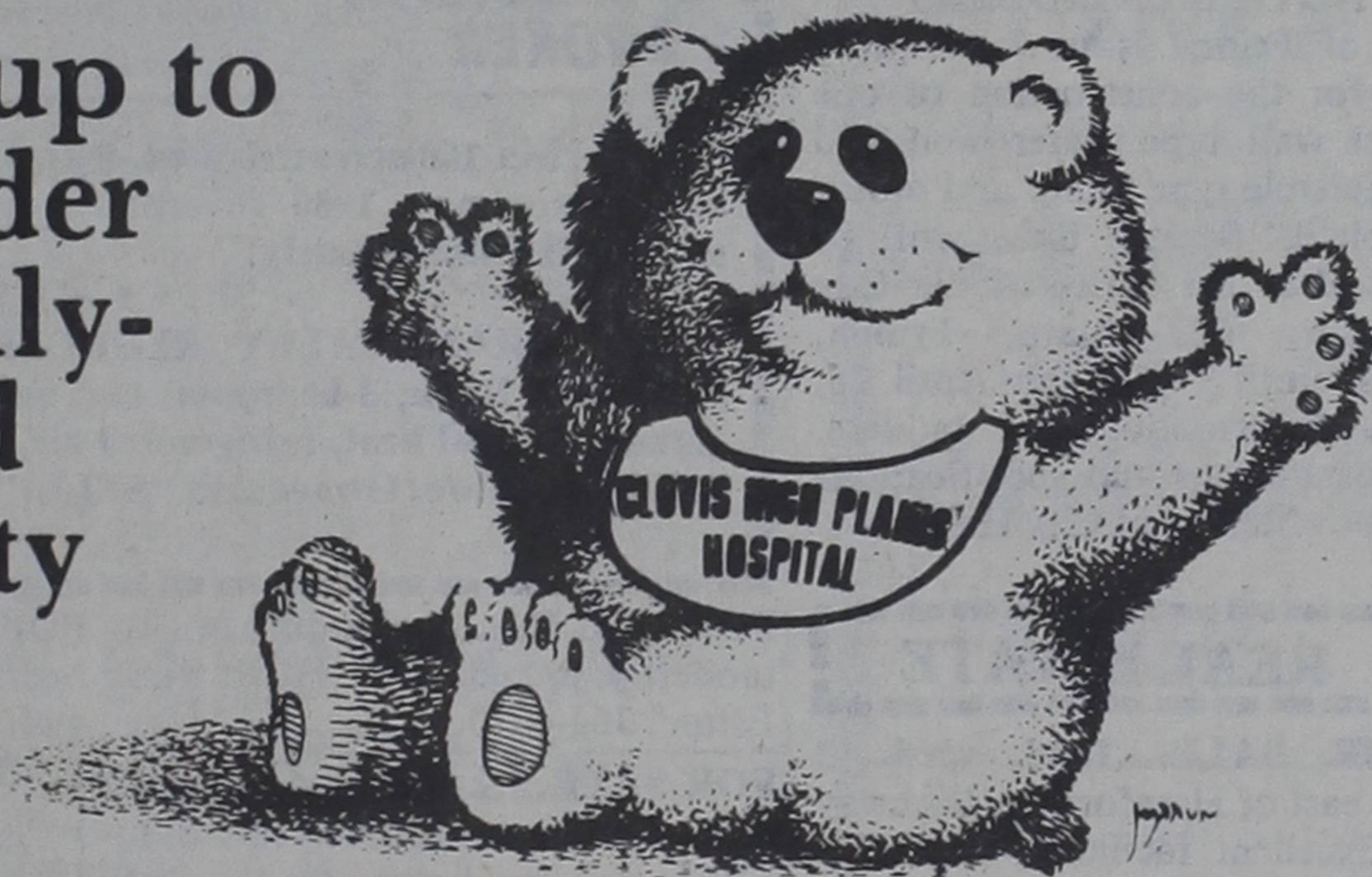
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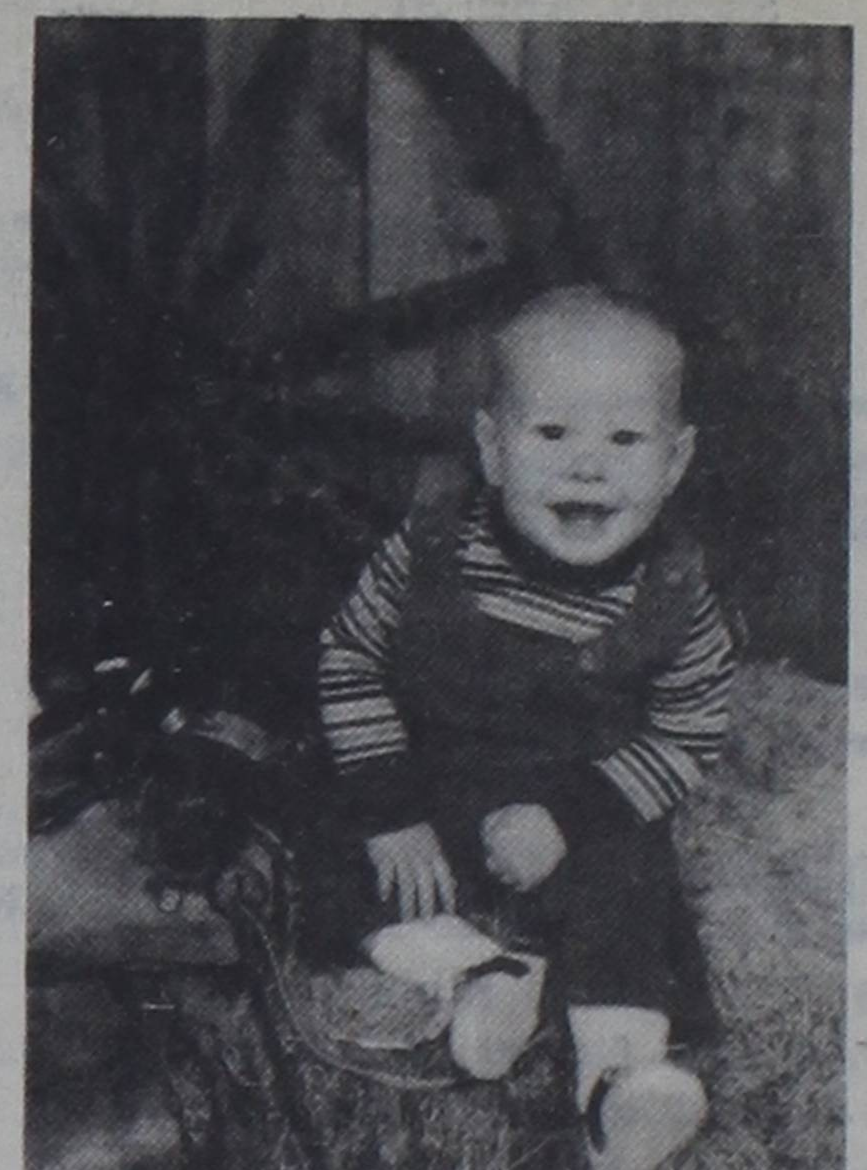

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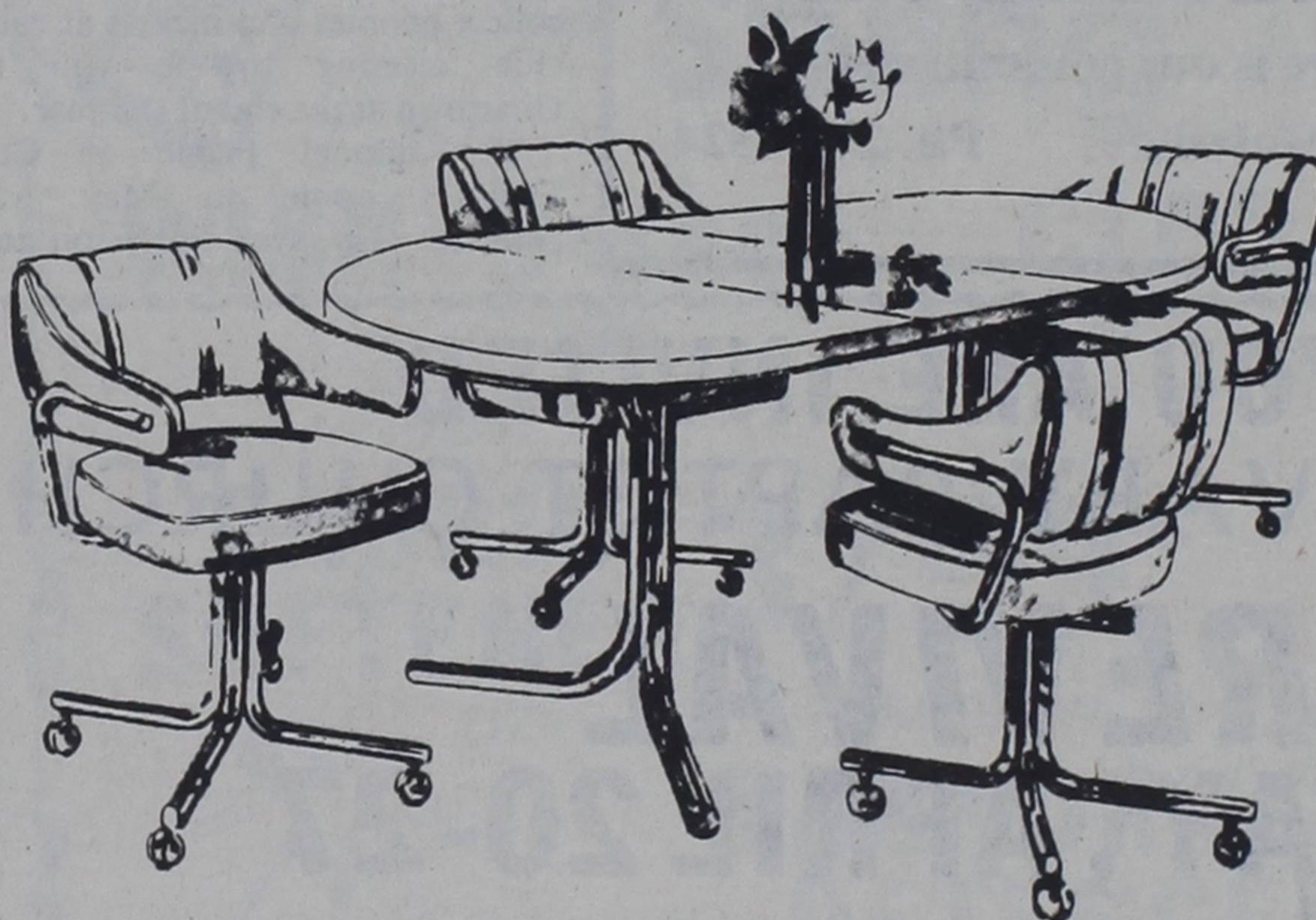
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## D. Simpson Chairs Local CF Activities

Although geared primarily for children up to ten, children of all ages enjoy the plays. It offers enjoyment and entertainment to adults as well, but the main enjoyment comes from watching the children become involved in the plays.

This will be the troupe's third tour to Clovis to perform in the great Lyceum Theatre.
