



Slover Gets Edge In Demo Governor Race

Governor Mark White may have won re-nomination without a runoff statewide, but if the voting had followed the trend in Friona, that would not have been the case.

In a light turnout by Friona Democrats, local voters gave the most votes to Amarillo resident Ron Slover in the Governor's race, with 67 votes, to 60 for White and 36 for Andrew Briscoe III.

County totals saw White with the most votes, 277, to 254 for Slover and 224 for Briscoe.

In a very light turnout, only 221 people voted in the Democratic primary in Friona, as many who regularly voted in the Democratic primary cast their ballots in the Republican primary, the majority wanting to help Kent Hance's campaign effort.

"A lot of our 'regulars' have voted in the Republican primary," commented Pat Fleming, precinct chairman of Precinct 2-1 in Friona. The Republican primary was held just down the hall from the Democrats at Friona High School, and Mrs. Fleming no doubt was able to recognize some of her "regulars."

Friona Democrats backed Judge Porter Roberts' re-election effort with 181 votes, to just 35 for challenger Brenda Miller. Roberts won the nomination with 763 total votes, to 262 votes for Mrs. Miller. He was unopposed on the Republican ticket, so the primary win is equal to re-election.

Local voters also backed Anne Norton in her successful campaign for the County Treasurer's position. Mrs. Norton received 152

votes, to 47 for Jerry Davis. Likewise, there was no Republican candidate for the office, so Mrs. Norton will be unopposed in the November general election.

Voters in Precinct 2-2 were split in their voting in the County Commissioner's race. They gave Tom Ware the most votes, 17, by one over Don Murphy 16, and six for Lawrence Widner.

In the Rhea box, Murphy received 30 votes to 10 for Ware and two for Widner. Ware and Murphy will meet in the runoff June 7.

The Rhea precinct backed Norbert Schueler in the Justice of the Peace, Precinct 3 race. Schueler received 38 votes to five for A.T. (Buster) Morgan, one for Bonnie Clayton and none for the incumbent, Wayne Spears.

Countywide, the vote was Spears 132, Mrs. Clayton 124, Morgan 95 and Schueler 73. Spears and Mrs. Clayton will be on the ballot in the June runoff.

Local and county Democrats backed Hereford farmer Gerald McCathern's successful bid for the

Record Turnout In Republican Primary

A record was set in the local Republican primary last Saturday when 183 voters turned out to vote, lured by the governor's race.

In addition, another 59 residents of the Bovina precinct cast votes at the Friona polling place, making 242 Republican voters at the high school on Saturday.

Statewide, another new record was set as over 530,000 voters took part in the Republican primary.

The Friona precinct voters gave an assist to Kent Hance in his attempt to get the Republican nomination for governor. Hance received 129 votes here, to 48 for Bill Clements and six for Tom Loeffler.

In countywide totals, Hance received 269 votes, to 105 for

Clements and only 14 for Loeffler. Friona voters gave 50 votes to David Davidson, 43 to Aaron Bullock, 20 to Virgil Mulanax and 14 to Glenn Jackson in the lieutenant governor's race. Davidson and Bullock will meet in the runoff.

Roy Barrera received 51 votes, John Roach 44 and Ed Walsh 36 for Attorney-General. Barrera, a judge in San Antonio making one of the first state-wide races by a Texan of Spanish descent, led the state voting, and will face Walsh in the runoff.

Local voters went for M.D. Anderson, Jr. in the Land Commissioner's race, with 48 votes. George Collis received 39 votes and Grady Yarbrough, 31. Yarbrough, a black candidate, won the nomination.

For Commissioner of Agriculture, Charles (Farmer) Trompler received 61 votes here, to 59 for Bill Powers. Powers won the nomination.

For Railroad Commissioner, John Thomas Henderson received 65 votes, Milton Fox 23, Ralph Hoelscher and Ed Emmett 14 each. The final statewide results on this race still had not been published late in the week.

For Justice of the Supreme Court, Place 1, Charles Ben Howell, who also won nomination, had 73 votes, to 41 for Nathan L. Hecht.

For the Supreme Court, Place 4, Bill Stephens received 63 votes to 52 for John L. Bates.

Jack Hamil received eight votes for county chairman. Hamil also had four votes for precinct chairman, as did Ray Dean Fleming.

The Sesquicentennial Wagon Train is winding its way toward this area, and for the benefit of those wishing to travel to see the train, here is its schedule:

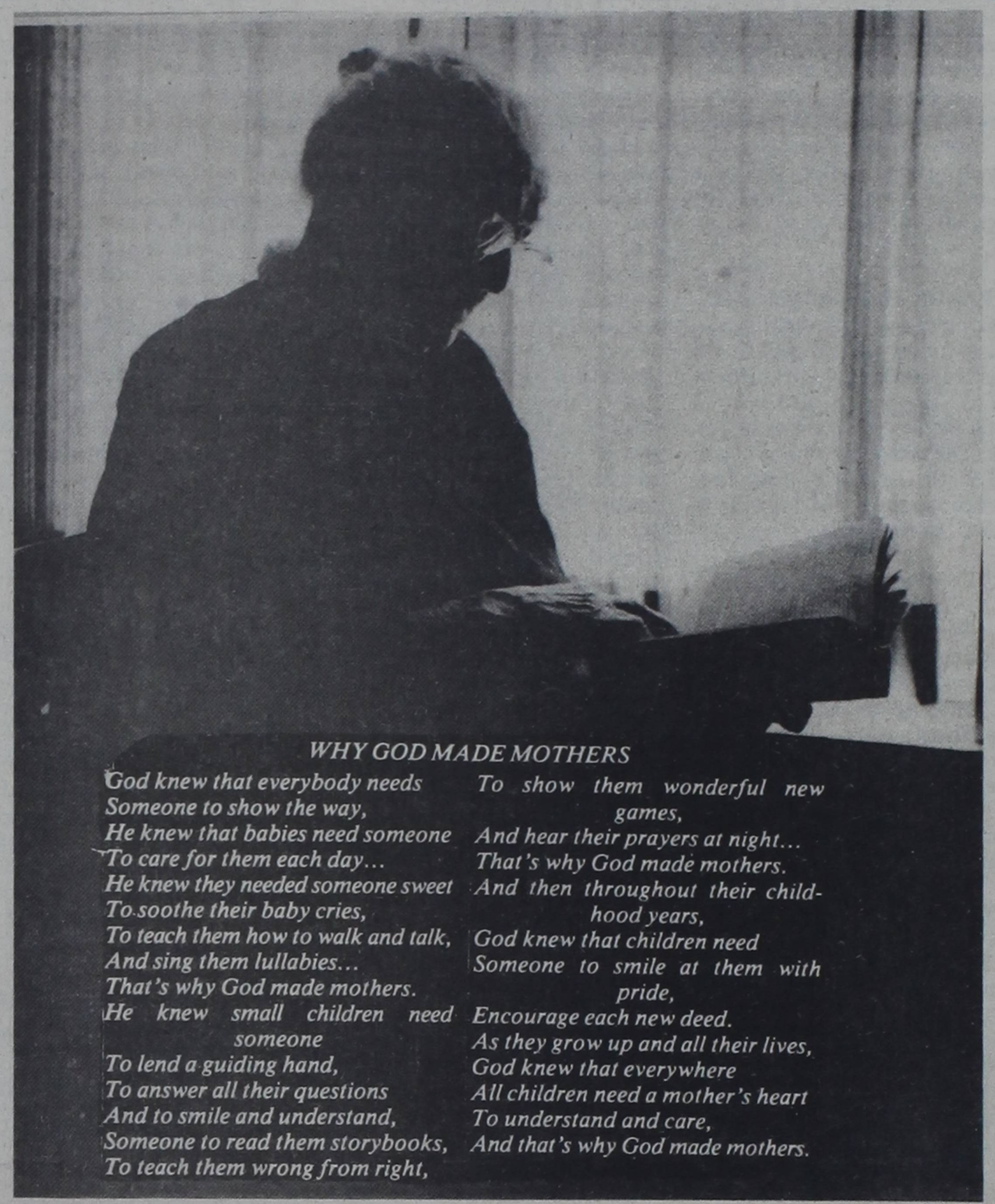

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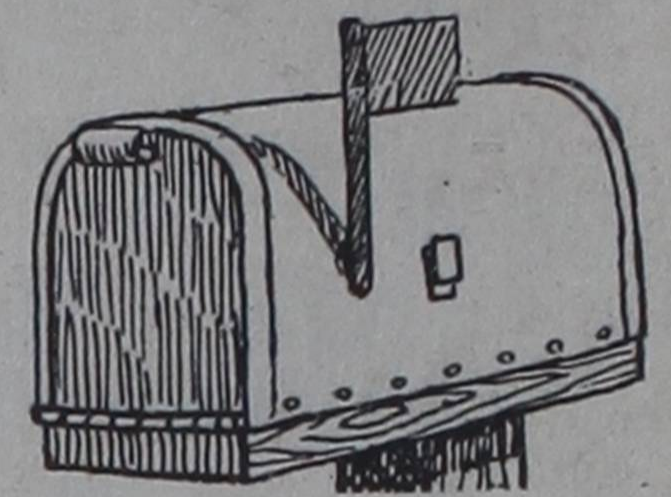

Election Slated For Over 60 Legislature

The Texas Silver Haired Legislature is an elected, representative nonpartisan body of citizens 60 plus years of age. The first Texas Silver Haired Legislature will be elected on May 30, 1986 and will meet this fall in the Texas Capitol for the purpose of considering and voting on legislation that concerns the needs of older Texans. The mock legislative session will closely resemble that of the Texas Legislature. At the close of the session, the Texas Silver Haired Legislature will select several issues which it feels are priority concerns of the elderly and present these to the Texas Legislators.

Although the Silver Haired Legislature is new to Texas, the concept is not new. Many other states have organized and convened a senior legislature with great success. The legislature, which will debate bills and pass recommendations to the 1987 Texas Legislature, will be made up of 116 Texans over the age of 60. Each of the state's area agencies on aging will sponsor at least four delegates. Five will come from Tarrant, Dallas, Harris and Bexar counties because of their large senior populations.

The Silver Haired Legislature will meet every other year to debate and approve priorities important to senior citizens. The delegates are elected to two-year terms and may be re-elected once.

Why did the Texas Legislature offer this opportunity?

1. To provide older Texans an opportunity to become knowledgeable about the legislative process through involvement.
2. To develop a forum for older Texans for discussion of senior citizen's issues and establishing legislative priorities for the Texas Legislature to consider.
3. To provide advocacy training enabling delegates to continue their role within the community and offering informed assistance to policy makers.
4. To provide an avenue through which older citizens may serve as a resource to public and private sectors, boards and commissions.

Balloting will begin with absentee voting Thursday, May 1, through Friday, May 23, 1986. Election day will be Friday, May 30, 1986.

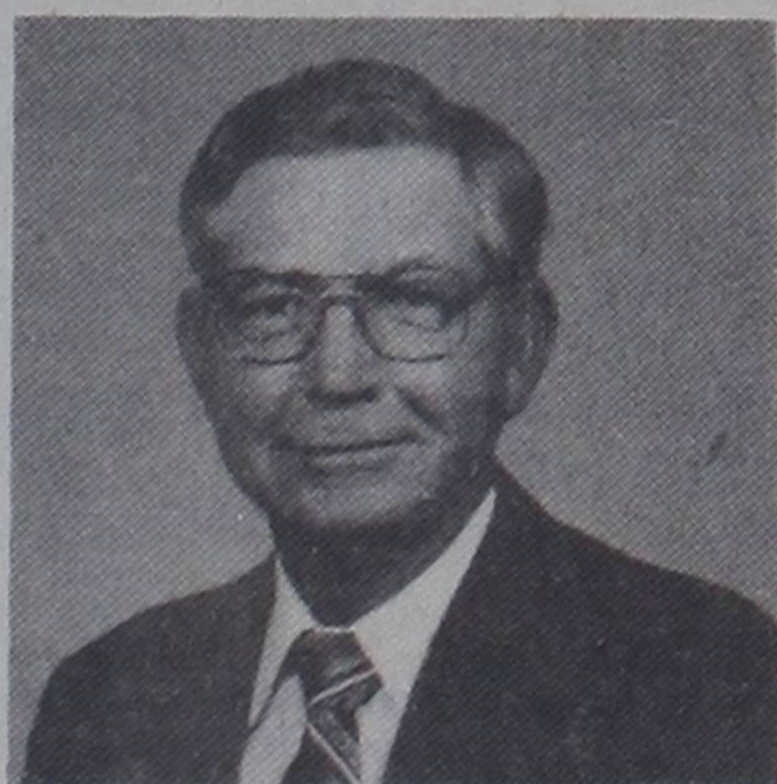

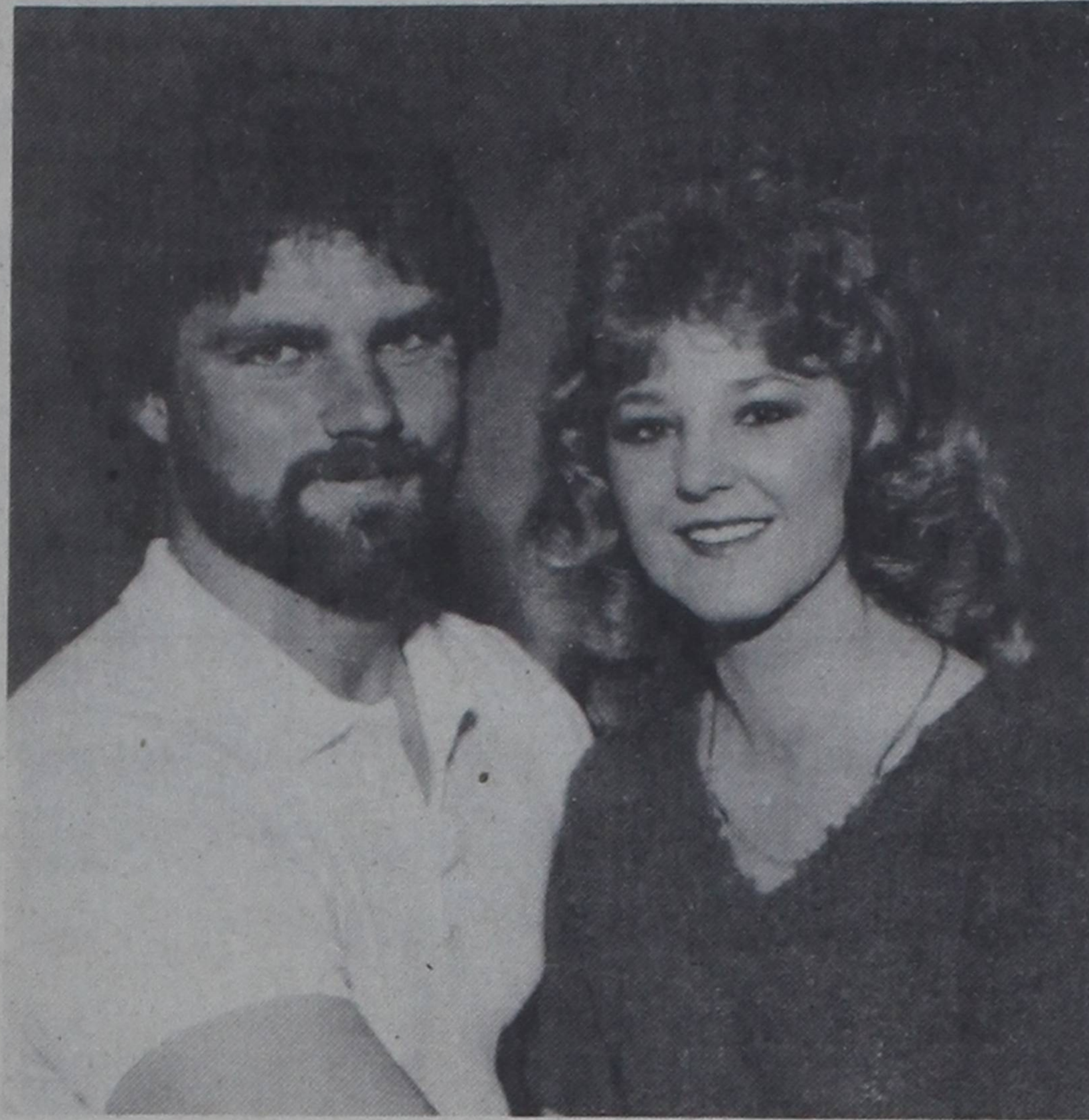

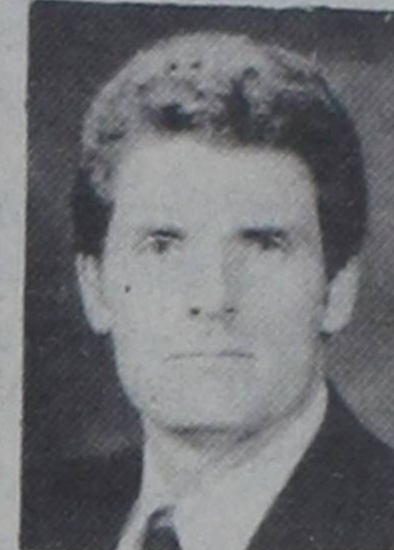
Ollie Besterio, TSTA vice president from Brownsville, was present to inform local leaders of current issues in education. She spoke on TECAT scores which will

And live today somewhere, somehow
Too ethereal for me to catch or
Ever hold again.

THE LITTLE RED POPPY

The idea of the poppy as a memorial flower for the World War dead sprang up as naturally as the little wild flower itself growing in the fields of France and Flanders. The flower was the one touch of beauty which survived amid the hideous destruction of war.

Along the edge of the trenches, beneath the tangled barbed wire, about the ragged shell holes and over the fresh graves it raised its brave red blossom. It seemed to be the one immortal thing in that region where death reigned. The soldiers of all nations came to look upon it as the living symbol of the sacrifices of their dead comrades.

It was a poet who first gave expression to the idea. Soon, himself to lie beneath the poppies, he wrote:

*"In Flanders' fields the poppies blow,
Between the crosses, row on row..."*

Even before the men had returned from the war, the perfect little poem of Colonel John McCrae had winged its way around the world carrying the picture of the poppies. Returning soldiers brought the vision of the poppy field back with them, engraved indelibly in their hearts with the memories of the comrades they had left on the battle-front. Spontaneously the poppy took on a sacred significance. It became the flower of remembrance for the men who had poured out their life's blood around the roots of the little plant.

Memories of the war dead always bring thoughts of those who did not die but came back doomed to years of hardship and suffering, sometimes worse than death. In the poppy was found a way to link the honoring of the dead with service for the living victims of the war. Soon after the war, patriotic organizations in different countries began to conduct sales of poppies made by disabled veterans, to raise funds for relief work among suffering ex-servicemen and their families. A double significance became attached to the poppy. Wearing the little flower came to mean honoring the dead and helping the living.

The first instance of wearing poppies in honor of the war dead occurred in New York City, November 9, 1918, when Miss Moina Michael of Athens, Georgia, who was serving on the staff of the Y.M.C.A. Overseas Headquarters, distributed poppies to men attending the twenty-fifth conference of the Y.M.C.A.

The poppy was first sold publicly on the streets of Milwaukee in connection with the reception of the Thirty-second Division, in June, 1919, and was sold by American Legion Posts of Milwaukee just before Memorial Day 1920, for the purpose of securing funds for disabled veterans.

At the inspiration of Miss Michael, the poppy was adopted as the official memorial flower by the Georgia Department of the American Legion in August, 1920 and this was presented by resolution to the Legion's National Convention in Cleveland, Ohio that fall to make the poppy the official memorial flower of this national organization. In recognition of her services, Miss Michael was later decorated with the Distinguished Service Medal of the American Legion Auxiliary.

The resolution was adopted at that National Convention, September 27-29, 1920... This resolution was to adopt the policy as a symbol to always remind us and to always teach us and the coming generations, the value of the "Light of Liberty: and our debt to those who helped save it for us by paying the supreme sacrifice, and that we may not forget that "In Flanders' Fields, the poppies blow, between the crosses, row on row." Thus the poppy was adopted as the official memorial flower of the American Legion.

The American Legion Auxiliary was organized in Kansas City, in 1921 and one of its first official acts was to make the poppy its official memorial flower and this was adopted October, 1921 and further resolved that its sales be promoted for the sole purpose of aiding in veterans' relief work.

The poppy also became the memorial flower of the British Legion. Other American veterans' organizations followed The American Legion and Auxiliary in adopting it as their official flower of remembrance. Soon many millions of the little red flowers were being worn each year in all parts of the English-speaking world, to honor the World War dead and to aid the war's living victims.

The nation-wide sale of memorial poppies was begun by the Legion and Auxiliary in 1921. At first silk poppies made in France by French widows and orphans were used. In 1922, the first poppies made by American veterans were produced in the hospitals of Minnesota and this work has steadily expanded until poppies are being made in more than fifty hospitals and disabled veterans' workrooms in the United States.

The crepe paper poppy was selected as the official poppy of The American Legion and Auxiliary because it provided the maximum of work for the disabled men, with the minimum expenditure for materials. The fabric poppy was not continued because it did not provide sufficient employment for the disabled veterans.

By 1924, it was recognized that the poppy programs lent itself more naturally to the work of women than of men and the American Legion gave the Auxiliary complete charge of the national program. The growth and progress of this program helps our disabled veterans who are in our hospitals to learn to coordinate their hands, minds, eyes, muscles, etc. as well as earn an income while they are hospitalized.

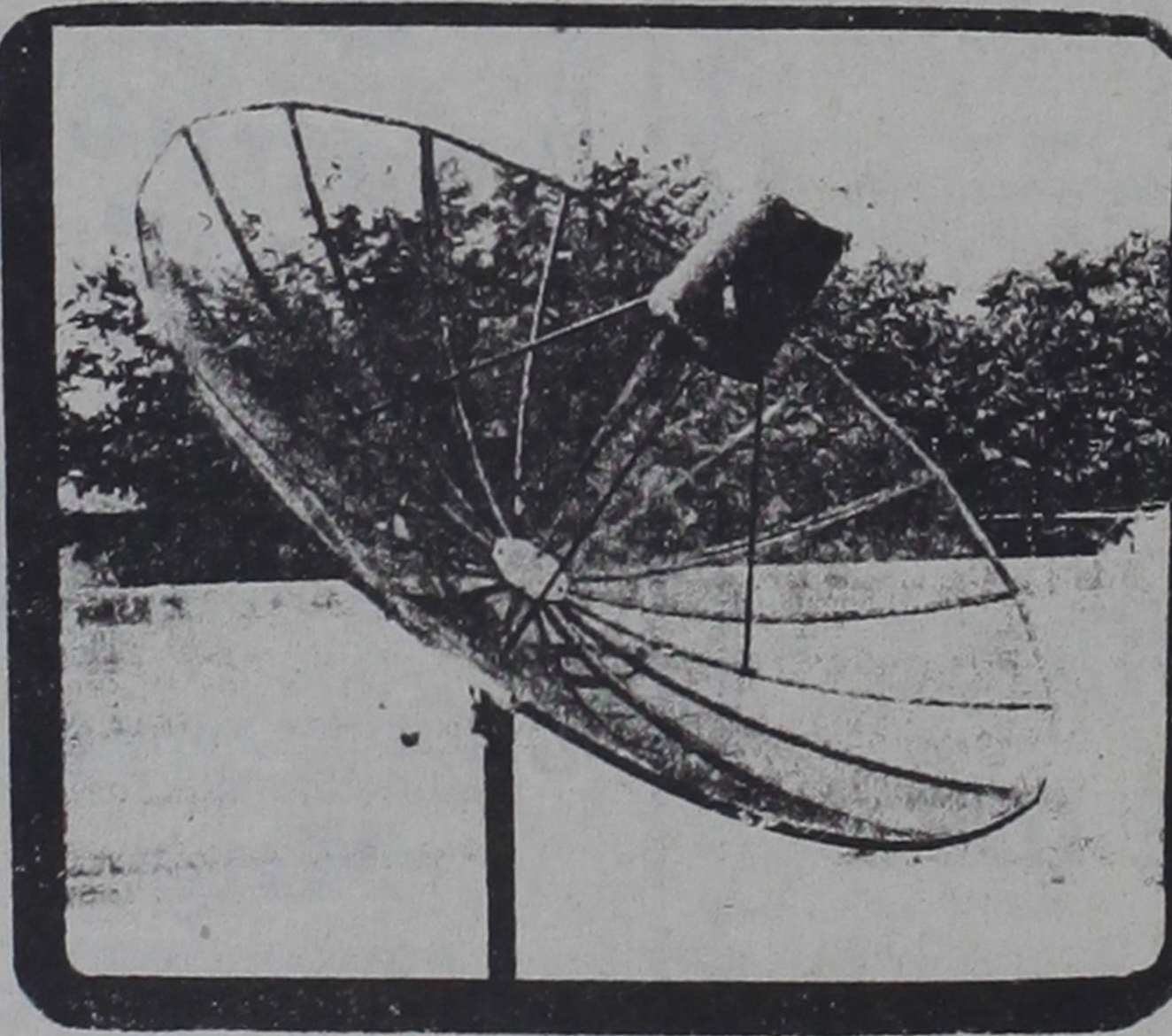

Enroute home from Dalhart Saturday afternoon I had to run my windshield wipers for a distance of about five miles--about two and one half miles on each side of the Canadian River. It was such a refreshing experience to see the change in color of grass and weeds along the way when they were wet.
