Star Lites

THE BIGGEST controversy involving the senate's tax reform plan is the proposal to curtail the deduction for many people on their Individual Retirement Accounts.

Those favoring the plan argue that only those workers who are not eligible for any company pension would be affected, it is estimated that 75 per cent of the IRA holders in the nation would be affected.

Personally, we think it is a mistake for our lawmakers to do anything to discourage saving. And the IRA deduction has been a big encouragement for Americans to save money.

It was estimated that from 24 million to 40 million Americans now have IRA accounts, which have grown from \$26 billion to \$250 billion since the deduction was increased to \$2,000 per wage-earner.

Economics experts say that young people are being drawn to the IRA accounts more and more—in part out of fear that Social Security won't be around by the time they retire. Supplementing Social Security was one goal of the IRA law in 1981.

An editorial in last Sunday's Amarillo Globe-News asked the question: "Wouldn't it be nice if American workers were paying into mandatory Individual Retirement Accounts instead of Social Security?"

The editorial imagined a hypothetical case of a 20-year-old just entering the job market. It was supposed that the worker was making \$20,000 a year and continued at that salary until he retired at age 65.

The worker and his employer would each pay \$2,860 annually into Social Security. If the same amount was paid into an Individual Retirement Account earning just seven per cent, compounded daily, the worker would have a retirement fund of \$907,698 by the time he reaches 65. It would amount to \$128,700 in principal and almost \$779,000 in interest.

If the hypothetical worker keeps the money in an account, still drawing seven per cent interest, he could spend \$63,000 a year for the rest of his life—and still leave his heirs an inheritance of almost \$1 million.

By contrast, Social Security will pay the same worker \$8,460 per year plus the cost of living increases that accrue over the years. And there will be nothing left over for the heirs.

Quite a difference, isn't it? And yet congress wants to curtail the IRA deduction.

The difference in the way the IRA contribution compounds is that they are invested in money-making accounts. Social Security payments are spent almost immediately to pay other people's benefits.

Also, Social Security has been expanded over the years to fund some welfare programs—such as disability payments. And that siphoned off a lot of money that otherwise might have gone for retirement benefits.

If congress really wants to help the workers, they should move Social Security's welfare benefits to means-tested programs funded by general revenues. Then, it should gradually convert Social Security into a mandatory, individual savings program.

That would be a start to resolving the inequity being imposed on longtime taxpayers at their time of retirement.

Ware Edges Murphy; Recount Requested

Tom Ware edged Don Murphy, 233 votes to 232 in the Democratic party runoff for the nomination for county commissioner last Saturday. Bonnie Clayton topped Wayne Spears, 259-192 in the justice of the peace race.

Murphy has notified County Democratic Chairman Leland Gustin that he is seeking a recount. Gustin says he hopes to have the recount accomplished by Friday.

Three people will be required to do the counting. Under the rules for a recount, Murphy, the loser, gets to choose two people for the recount committee, and Ware, the winner, gets to pick one. All must be approved by both parties, however.

After the counters are chosen, the county chairman must notify County Clerk Bonnie Warren in writing that a recount has been requested. Hence the time required to get a recount done.

Ware outpolled Murphy, 191-160 in Bovina, but Murphy had leads at Rhea, 31-11, led 13-4 in the western Friona box, and 28-27 in the absentee box.

Mrs. Clayton won every voting box in taking the nomination from Spears, the incumbent. She won at Bovina, 192-161, at Rhea, 26-17 and the absentees, 41-14.

The turnout at Bovina and Rhea was exceptional for the runoff, due to the two local races. However, in the rest of the county, the turnout was pitifully low. Even in the precinct 2-2 box (western Friona), which voted on the commissioner's race, voters stayed away from the polls in droves. There are 550 qualified voters in that precinct, and only 17 took the trouble to vote.

Grad Search Yields Eleven New Names

A further search of the files of the Friona Star and Friona Independent School District has revealed the names of eleven additional valedictorians for Friona graduating classes.

The research was attempting to discover whether or not there was a graduate with a grade average better than the school's 1986 valedictorian, Wendy Hinkle, whose four-year average was 97.83.

However, the search was hampered somewhat due to lack of grades which were reported. And in the case of the school's records, some of the earlier records are missing and presumed to be victims in the school's 1951 fire.

Of the eleven names added to our list, going back 50 years to the 1936 graduating class, only four averages were available. Of these, the highest was 94.11.

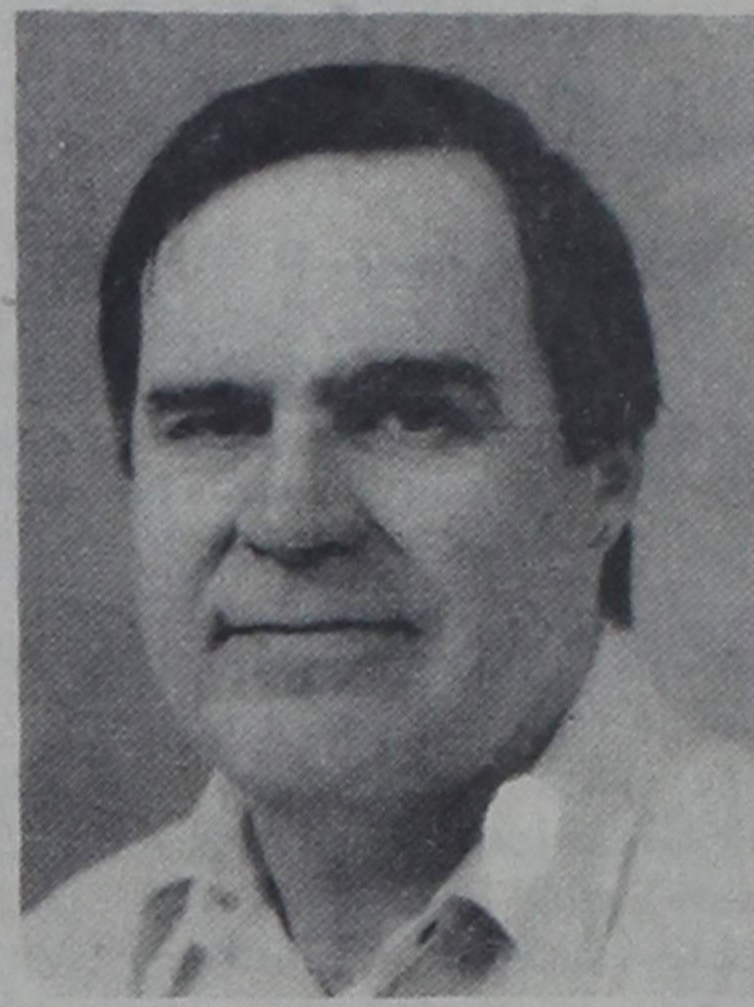
Anyone having documented evidence of the grade average for these valedictorians is asked to send it to the Friona Star, so we may fill in our records.

commissioner's race in Bovina. In that race, Tommy Williams received 236 votes, to 185 for Jack Patterson and 48 for Radford Venable. Williams thus won the nomination by three votes. That year's recount upheld the original results.

In the statewide races, John Sharp was given the edge over P.S. Ervin in the Railroad Commissioner's race. Sharp had 276 votes to 78 for Ervin countywide.

In the Supreme Court, Place 1 race, Shirley Butts led the county voting, 212-148.

In the Place 2 race, Jim Brady edged Robert Campbell, 178-164 countywide.

In the Place 4 race, Raul Gonzales topped Jay Gibson, 102-75.

In the Court of Criminal Appeals race, Rusty Duncan beat George Martinez, 276-75 countywide.

Countywide, only 520 people cast votes in the Democratic runoff, with 454 of these being from Bovina or Rhea. At the polls, Bovina turned out 357 and Rhea 43. In addition, 55 of the 58 absentee ballots were voters from the Bovina precinct.

York and family gathered at the basement of the church and enjoyed an hour or more social in honor of these two highly esteemed families, who were departing for homes in distant places. Rev. 30 YEARS AGO--MAY 31, 1956

A new business for Friona, to be owned and operated by J.L. Marcum and J.C. Claborn, will soon open its doors on Main Street in the former location of the Corner Drug and Knox's Ready-to-Wear. It will handle furniture and home furnishings. Marcum, who is now managing Marcum-Claborn Funeral Home here, made the announcement this week.

25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 1, 1961

Parmer County voters saw eye-to-eye with the majority of the ballot-markers throughout the state in Saturday's special U.S. Senate election, giving Republican John Tower a slight edge over his Democratic opponent, Bill Blakely. Lazbuddie was the only precinct to give Blakely an edge, and that was by a one-vote margin, 75-74.

20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 3, 1965

Dr. Robert Alexander, a former classmate of Friona's Dr. J.L. Humphrey, will move to Friona as the fifth medical doctor on the staff of Parmer County Community Hospital on July 1. The association of Dr. Alexander will mark the first time in its history that there have been five medical doctors on the staff.

He and Sally both grew up here and lived in Littlefield before moving to Abilene.

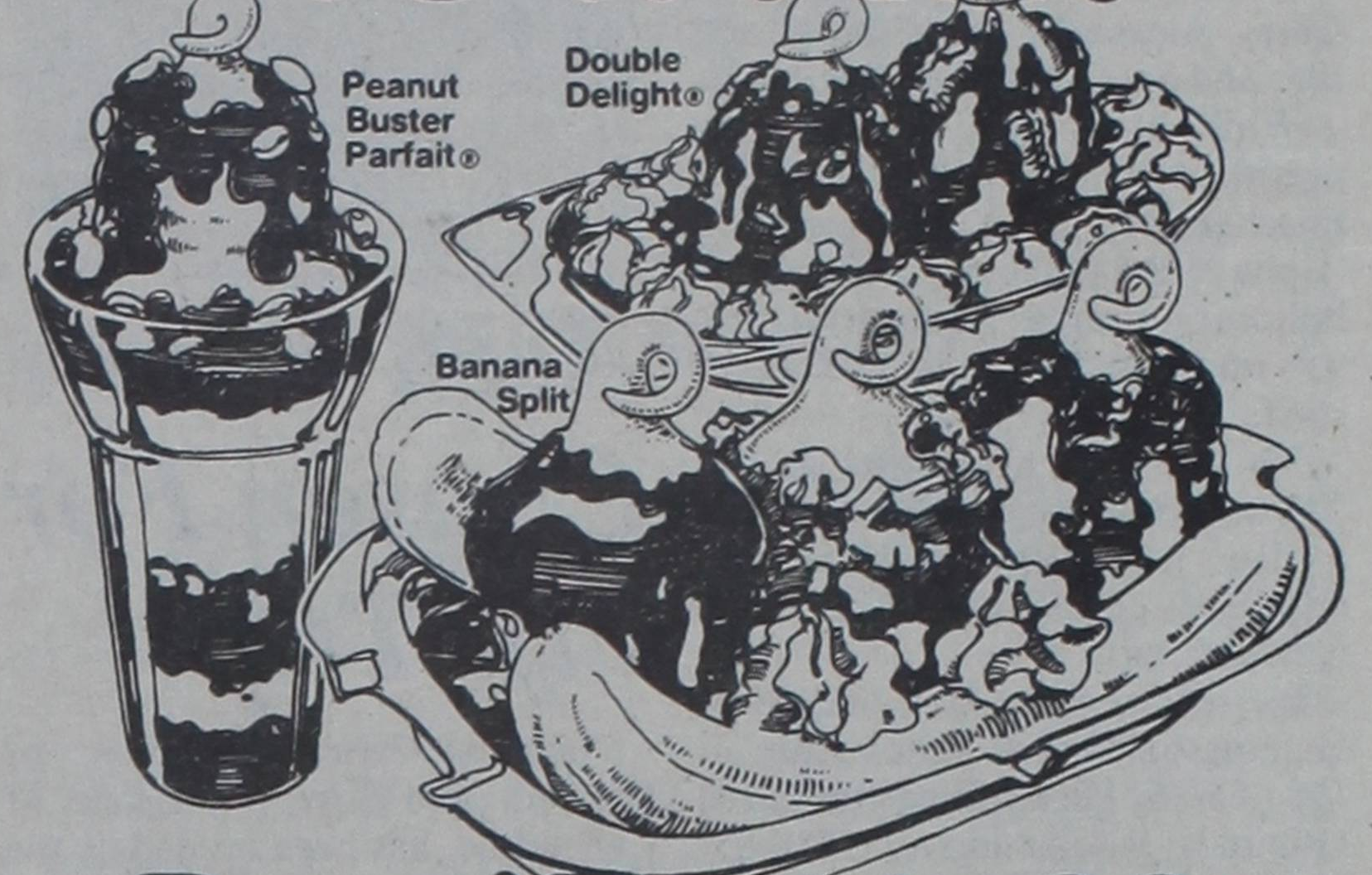

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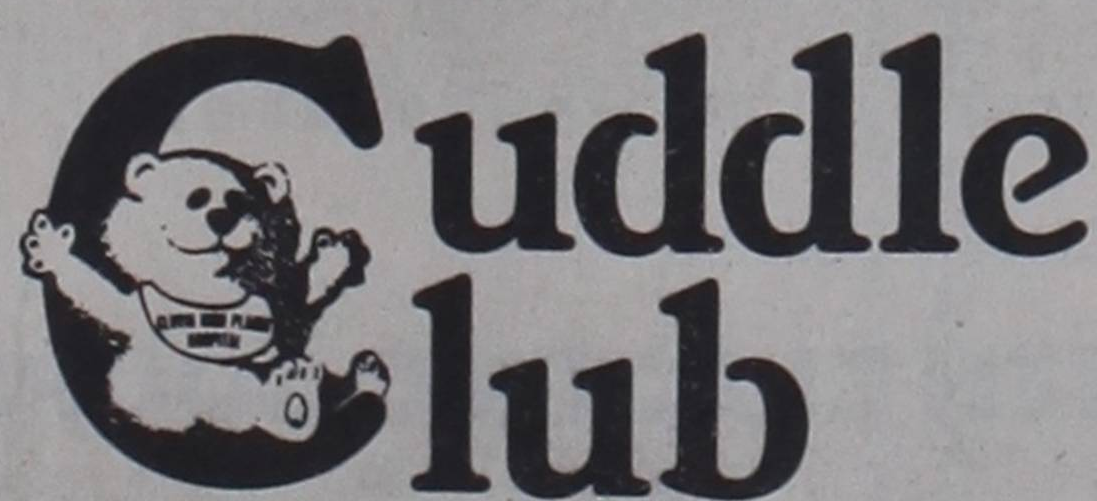
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A. Alexander Gets Degree

Protect Yourself From Lightning

Lightning is deadly and annually kills more Americans than tornadoes and more than hurricanes and floods combined.

However, since lightning usually kills only one person at a time, lightning deaths do not attract as much attention as other weather-related fatalities.

"Lightning is particularly common with spring and summer thunderstorms in Texas, so individuals should take certain precautions during stormy weather," advises Dr. Gary Nelson, a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Quick thinking combined with common sense can go a long way in preventing lightning fatalities when thunderstorms are on the prowl," Nelson emphasizes.

He lists some "dos" and "don'ts" regarding lightning safety:

Outdoors:
 --Do seek protection immediately. Safe places include a building that's protected from lightning; a large, steel-framed building; an enclosed automobile; and a large, unroofed building.

--Don't touch any metal fences, wires, clotheslines or pipes. In a car, keep your hands off any metal or the radio.

--Do get off your bicycle, golf cart, horse, tractor or motorcycle.

--Don't take cover under lone trees, taller trees in groves or in unprotected shelters such as those on a golf course or camp ground.

--Do head for a cave or under a cliff if you're hiking in mountains or other hilly areas.

--Don't huddle in groups; spread out a few feet from one another.

--Do head for a low spot--lower than ground level--such as a ravine, gully or ditch, but not one that's filling with water.

--Don't remain near railroad tracks.

--Do get off beaches, piers or docks and get away from pools, oceans and lakes.

--Don't swim, wade or go

boating; head for land at the first signs of a thunderstorm.

--Do seek shelter in a clump of head-high trees or a thicket of small ones if you're stuck in a forested area.

--Don't stand in open spaces, since most lightning fatalities are people who are taller than their surroundings--a golfer in the middle of a fairway, a farmer in a field, a rider in open country.

--Do immediately set down golf clubs, tennis rackets, fishing poles and other metal objects that can act as lightning rods.

Indoors:

--Do get away from appliances and metal fixtures such as refrigerators, ranges, sinks, bathtubs, air conditioners, washing machines, clothes dryers and television sets.

--Don't use the telephone except in an emergency.

Value Notices Contain Important Information

"If you are among the millions of Texas property owners who receive a notice of appraised value this year from county appraisal districts, pay close attention to it," advised Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board. "This notice contains important information concerning your 1986 property taxes."

Patterson explained that the notice of appraised value is designed to inform taxpayers of proposed increases in the appraised value of their properties and the possible effect on their property taxes. "The notice also tells you how to protest the appraisal to an appraisal review board if you disagree with it," he added.

In most cases, a notice of appraised value means that the appraisal district proposes to increase the property's value by more than \$1,000 over its value the previous year. It may also indicate that the proposed value is higher than the value the owner reported on a rendition form, or that the property is on the tax records for the first time in 1986.

Patterson counseled taxpayers to carefully inspect their notices of appraised value. "If the notice shows an incorrect description of your property, or if you simply disagree with the value, it's best to contact the appraisal district as soon as possible. By acting promptly, you can often clear up

errors or disagreements over value without a formal hearing," he said.

If the taxpayer can't settle his disagreements informally, he can file a written protest and get a hearing before the appraisal review board. The notice of appraised value shows the deadline for filing a protest, where to file it, and the date the appraisal review board will begin hearing protests from taxpayers.

"Again, it's best to file your protest soon after you receive your notice of appraised value," advised Patterson. "It makes it easier for the appraisal district to schedule protests and to provide you with information you may need to back up your protest."

Among other information, the notice of appraised value lists the taxing units that tax the property, any exemptions granted for 1986, and value information from the previous year for comparison.

"State law requires the notice to show your estimated taxes for 1986, so that you can gauge the possible effect of the proposed value on your taxes," said Patterson.

"However," he added, "keep in mind that these estimates assume that proposed values won't change and that the taxing units won't need more taxes than the year before. In practice, the estimated tax rates on your notice will rarely be the same tax rates that the local taxing units actually adopt."

Around The House

When we think "quality" clothing, most of us think of high quality fabrics, workmanship, style and price. But in fact, there are no features that are absolute marks of clothing "quality."

For example, not too long ago, polyester was thought to be a fabric suitable for inexpensive clothes, while natural fibers such as cotton, wool and silk were for expensive clothes.

Now even expensive designer dresses are made out of 100 per cent polyester, and natural fibers and fiber blends are found in clothing in all price ranges. Which type of fabric is the higher quality?

Or consider the fact that you can buy a sequined or beaded dress for hundreds of dollars, yet you would be unable to either wash or clean the garment without damaging it. Is that quality?

Many people paid extra for the style of designer-label jeans, only to find that they lasted about the same length of time as "plain" jeans they bought for much less. Which is the quality product?

Clothes made outside the United States were once considered to be inferior products. Yet it's now difficult to find clothes fully made in this country. And many garments manufactured overseas are made from Texas cotton, wool and mohair. Which place of manufacture shows quality?

The point is that judging clothing quality is relative. As consumers we need to know why we're buying a certain item of clothing and then we can make judgments about quality.

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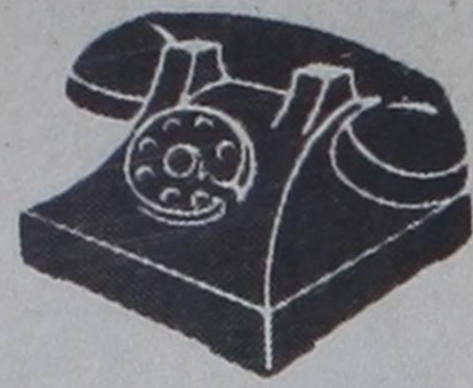

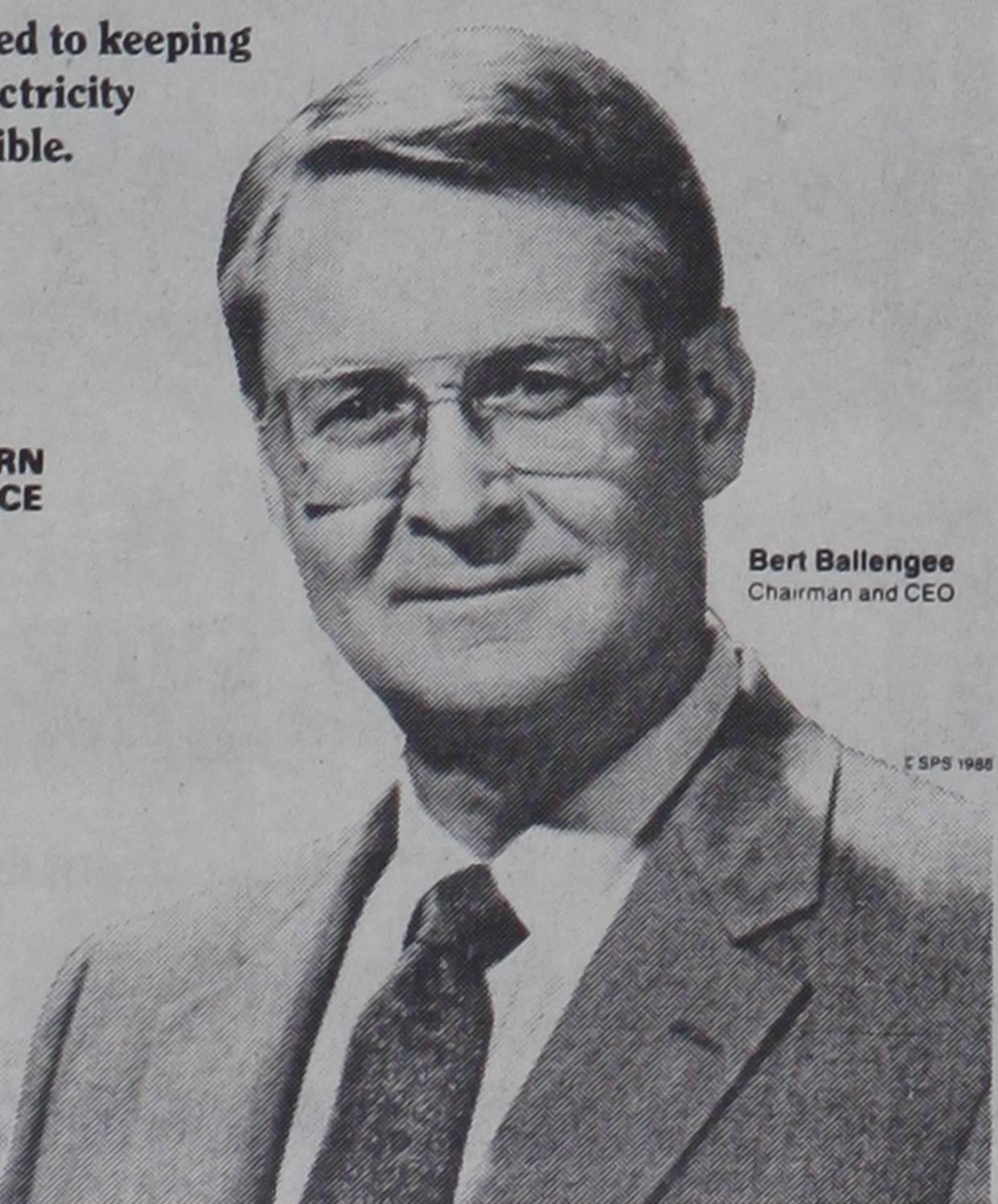

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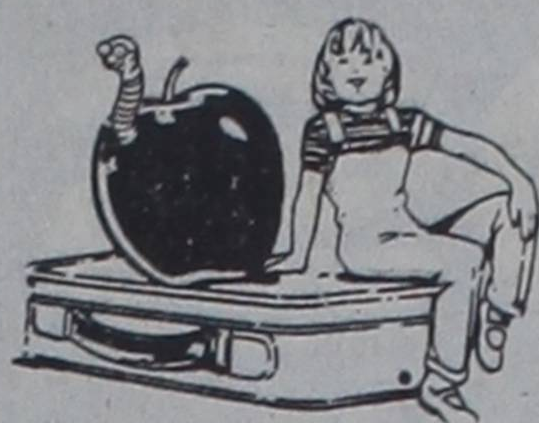

I don't know how many of you were able to see our bluebonnets in bloom, but you really missed seeing something special if you did miss them. Despite all odds against it, the bluebonnet plants we received from Juanita Wright's beautiful garden all thrived and bloomed for us during March, April and even into May.

The sky-blue blooms of the Lupinus Texensis gracefully adorn and help fertilize the rolling countryside of central Texas. Shaped like a tiny bonnet, the blossoms have five petals, four blue and one white. As the flower matures, a crimson spot appears which signals the bee that the nectar and pollen are all gone.

Friendship Week Set

Realizing the importance of promoting "Friendship" throughout the world, the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs in North America, South America, Europe and Austral-Asia are observing the week of June 22-28 as "International Week of Friendship."

During the regular meeting of the Friona Odd Fellows (Rebekah) Lodge on June 5 in Friona, the proclamation by Sovereign Grand Master George E. Shaw of Marlboro, Massachusetts, directed the observance of "International Week of Friendship" throughout the world of Odd Fellowship, and that all members of the international brotherhood should join together in acts of friendship to promote a better understanding among the people of all nations.

"Odd Fellows and Rebekahs are proud to join with civic and government officials in observing this special week," stated George Reed, noble grand of the local lodge.

As with many wildflowers, the bluebonnet has an interesting background with many nicknames, stories and legends having developed about it. One such story states that the bluebonnet is such a home-loving plant that it never crosses the state line. (How's that for Texas pride?)

Mexicans called it 'el conejo,' the rabbit because the white tops reminded them of the scurrying cottontail rabbits. Early settlers dubbed them 'wolf flowers' because they believed them to rob the soil of essential elements. Buffalo clover was the name early pioneers used to describe the delicate blue flowers upon which the buffalo grazed. The most popular name, bluebonnet, however, must have originated from the bonnets the pioneer women wore to protect themselves from the blazing Texas sun.

One of the most familiar legends tells of the little Comanche girl whose people were suffering from great drought and famine. After much deliberation, the leaders of the tribe decide that a sacrifice of their most cherished possession must be made in order to appease the Great Spirit. Having overheard this, the little maiden decides that the tribe's most precious possession surely has to be her beloved warrior doll with its beaded doeskin robe, black horse hair braids and headdress of beautiful bluejay feathers. So, later that evening, she casts her doll into the fire in sacrifice for her people and then scatters the ashes to the four winds. The next day the hills and plains are covered with blue flowers exactly the shade of her doll's headdress...The rains come and the drought is ended.

During May, we loaned 1,698 items to 847 patrons and registered 14 new readers; 60 children attended Story Hour in two sessions and 22 Story Hour children visited kindergarten on May 9. Thanks to all our volunteer mothers who helped with the program this year. As of this writing, 115 children have registered for the 1986 "Celebrate Texas" Reading Club including 31 read-to-me members and three newborn Texans members.

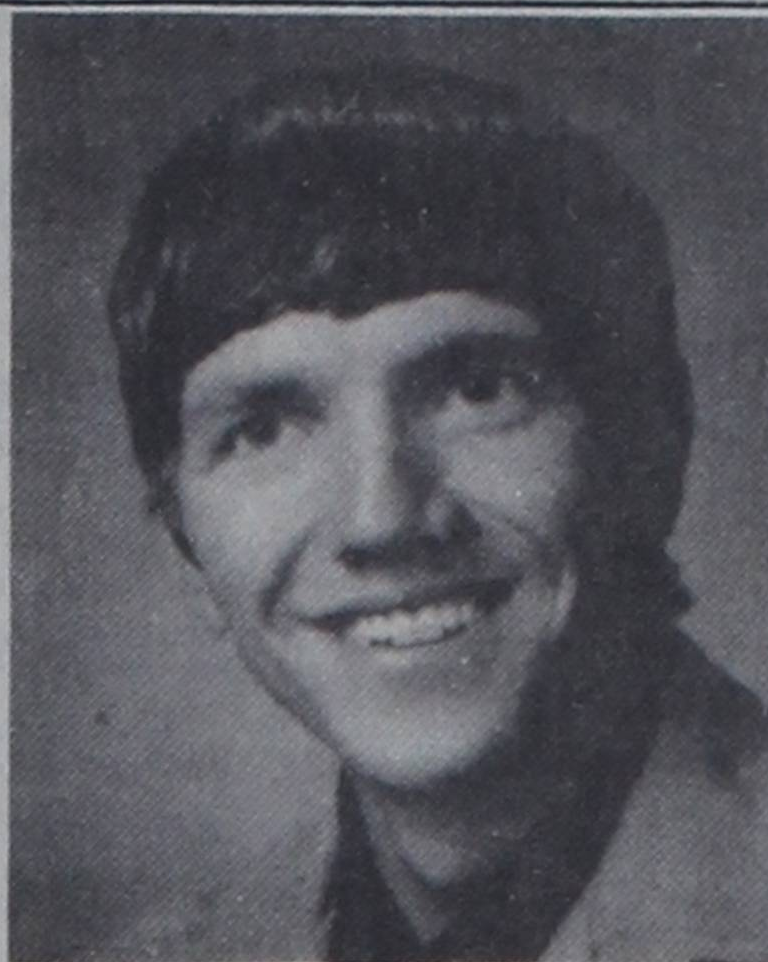

Beavers is the son of Alfred and Joyce Beavers. He attended school in Friona 12 years. He is planning to attend Texas Tech University next fall.

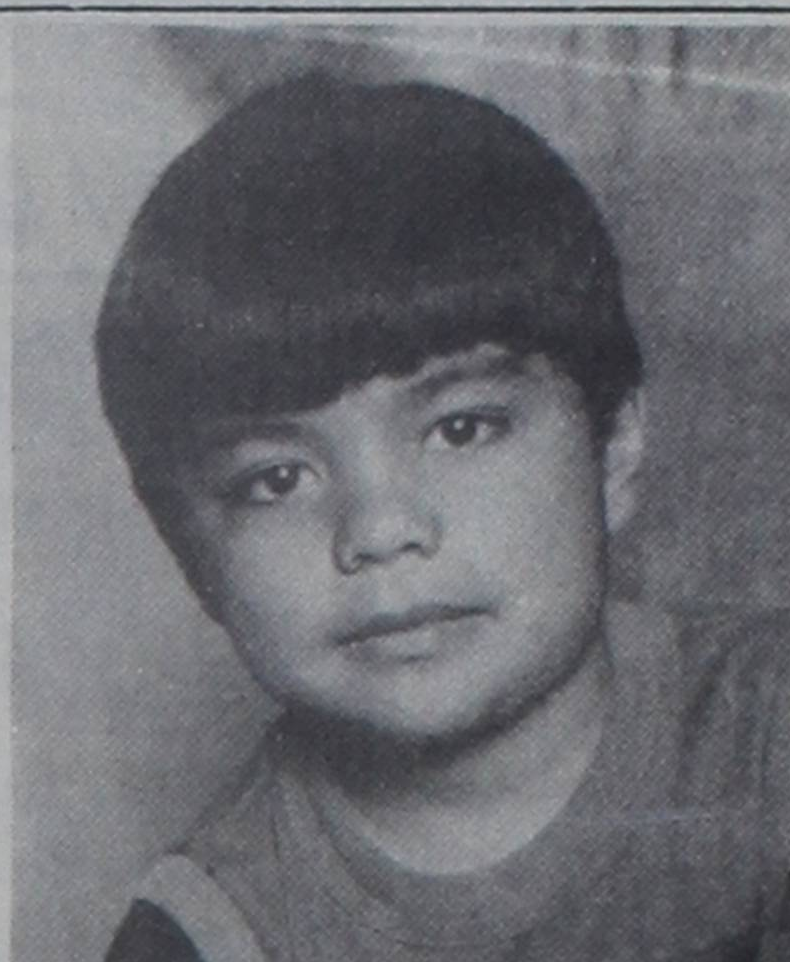
While attending FHS, Beavers had a 90 or above average all four years, and added the perfect attendance award as a freshman and a junior.

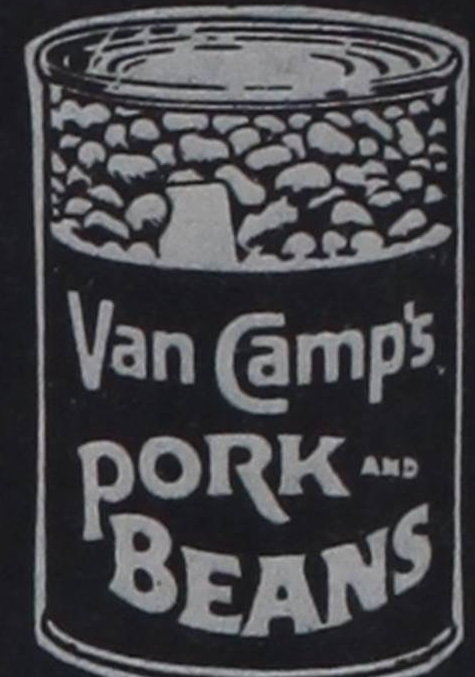

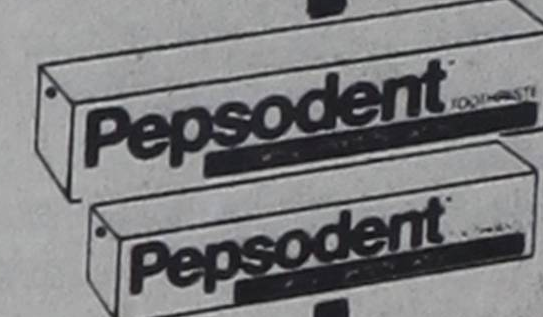

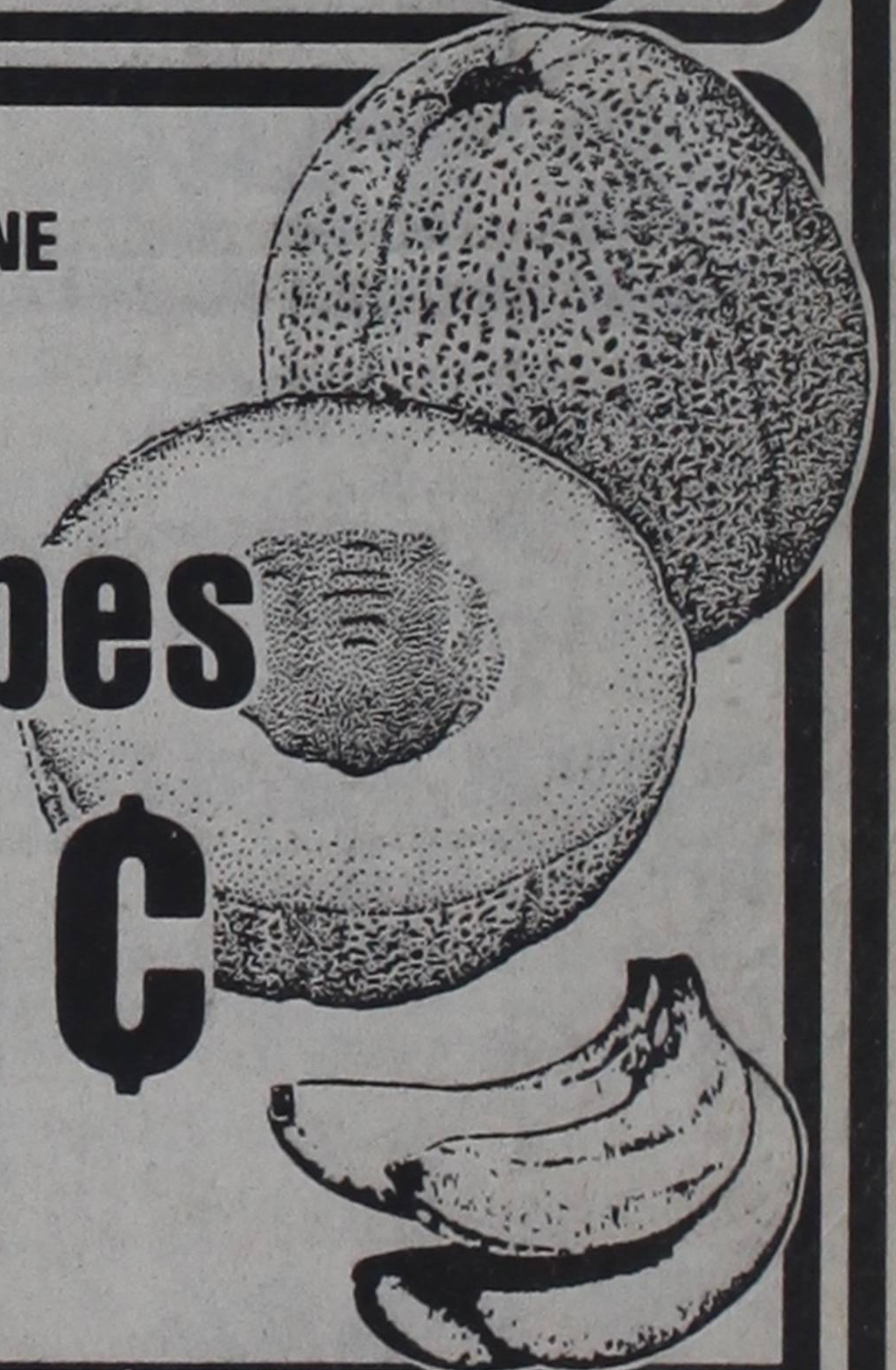
