SUMMER IS FINALLY bearing down upon us with full force. At this time of year, shade trees and air conditioners are favorites for ye editor.

Anyway, we heard a few days ago that some people in Illinois are actually cultivating dandelions and selling them to restaurants for salad greens. If there is a market for them, we think there's a good cash crop right here in Friona.

A recent issue of the U. of Calif. "Wellness Letter" contained the following "Summer Survival Quiz." We'll share it with you here and perhaps there will be some tips to help you through these hot summer months.

Take the quiz below and see if you can sort out the myths from the solid advice.

1. True or false: It is a mistake to eat or drink anything just before swimming. Wait at least an hour after eating to prevent cramps.

2. True or false: If stung by a bee, the first thing you should do is pull out the stinger.

3. True or false: If you burn your hand at the barbecue pit, the best remedy is cold water.

4. A thunderstorm is raging and you are in a house without a lightning rod. Which of the following should you stay away from? (a) the bathtub, (b) the window, (c) the telephone.

5. More than half of all boating accidents involve: (a) collisions, (b) small boats, (c) alcohol.

6. True or false: An adult should take a salt tablet after strenuous exercise in the heat.

### Answers

1. False. Swimming after a heavy meal does not sound appealing, but no scientific study has ever shown that swimming after eating will bring on cramps. As for drinking, you should drink water before and after swimming. Like any other vigorous exercise in hot weather, swimming tends to dehydrate you.

2. False. First, cut the stinger away from the skin with a knife, then remove it. The stinger's exposed end carries a sac that may produce more venom when squeezed.

3. True. Don't treat it with butter, no matter what anyone tells you. Any oily or greasy substance may seal in bacteria, causing infection.

4. All of the above. Don't stand by an open window, don't bathe, and don't make phone calls until the storm blows over. Your body may attract lightning through a window, and plumbing could also serve as a conductor. Though telephone equipment is designed to prevent electric surges, a bad thunderstorm can send them down the line. Painful jolts are not unusual, and electrocution is not unknown.

5. (b) and (c). Alcohol and boats can be a hazardous combination.

6. False. More water than salt is lost in sweating, with a resultant rise in salt concentration in the blood. A salt tablet may constitute an overdose. The replacement of fluid, not salt, is of key importance. Excessive sweating in the heat over very long periods may, however, deplete both fluid and salt and cause muscle cramps. In such cases, a little additional salt on food should be sufficient replacement.

**55 YEARS AGO--JUNE 12, 1931**  
Once again the Magnolia Petroleum Company has changed agents here. Some time ago, M. Lacy purchased the interests of J.C. Wilkinson, and now Mr. Lacy turns the agency over to Homer T. Walker, who will take charge of the property immediately.

**50 YEARS AGO--JUNE 12, 1936**  
F.S. Truitt, proprietor of the Truitt Lumber Company, departed last week for Dallas, where he is spending this week attending the Texas Centennial.

Dust or sand storms appear to be diminishing in both volume and frequency as the acreage of plowed land increases throughout the territory.

**45 YEARS AGO--JUNE 13, 1941**  
The members of the Friona Lions Club, assisted by a group of the Muleshoe Club, duly installed the officers of the new club last week. Officers are W.L. Edelman, president; E.M. Rushing, secretary; C.E. McLean, Tail-twister; Frank Spring, first vice-president; Sloan Osborn, second vice-president; Tiny Magness, Lion Tamer; Ray Landrum, Dr. R.J. McReynolds, W.E. Boedecker and Roy Clements, directors.

**40 YEARS AGO--JUNE 7, 1946**  
Spencer Hough brought in the first load of 1946 wheat last Saturday. The wheat was sold to the Santa Fe Grain Company, and tested 59 in weight, 14.6 in moisture. The yield is between 11 and 12 bushels per acre.

**35 YEARS AGO--JUNE 7, 1951**  
In a special meeting Wednesday afternoon, the Friona School Board outlined plans to present to the voters of the district a rebuilding program involving the best facilities possible in an enlarged high school plant, calling for a bond issue of some \$150,000. Insurance companies last week agreed to pay the full \$80,000 insurance carried on the old building, destroyed by fire on May 16.

**30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 7, 1956**  
Coming as regular as an afternoon dust storm in March, showers have visited the Friona area almost nightly for the past week, bringing the rainfall total in the local area to over four inches since the "wet spell" began three weeks ago.

Velma Vada Sessums, 47, died at the Parmer County Community Hospital at 6:30 Tuesday morning following a car wreck Saturday evening at the intersection of Farm Road 1731 and Highway 60.

**25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 8, 1961**  
More than 200 persons have signed up for summer swimming lessons, which got underway Monday at Friona's new indoor swimming pool. A swimming exhibition will be held Saturday at the pool's grand opening.

**20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 9, 1966**  
"On the Air" flashed at Friona's new radio station, KNNN, for the first time this week, as the new daylight hours station officially went on the air.

Travis Clements, Friona's Chief of Police since last September, was

relieved of his duties, and patrolman Kenneth McDermott was named his successor during the regular meeting of the Friona City Council Monday.

**15 YEARS AGO--JUNE 10, 1971**  
Mr. and Mrs. A.W. Anthony of Friona were among 100 persons from across the country honored with invitations to Washington from President Nixon for national observances of Salute to Agriculture Day, May 7. Anthony is president of the GSPA. The couple was treated to a full day of activities in Washington as the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Nixon, the USDA and other federal officials.

**10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 6, 1976**  
The Friona area has been hit by extremely high winds on two or three occasions during the past couple of weeks. The worst was Sunday, May 30, when gusts destroyed an old airplane hangar at Benger Air Park, and toppled utility poles east of the city. 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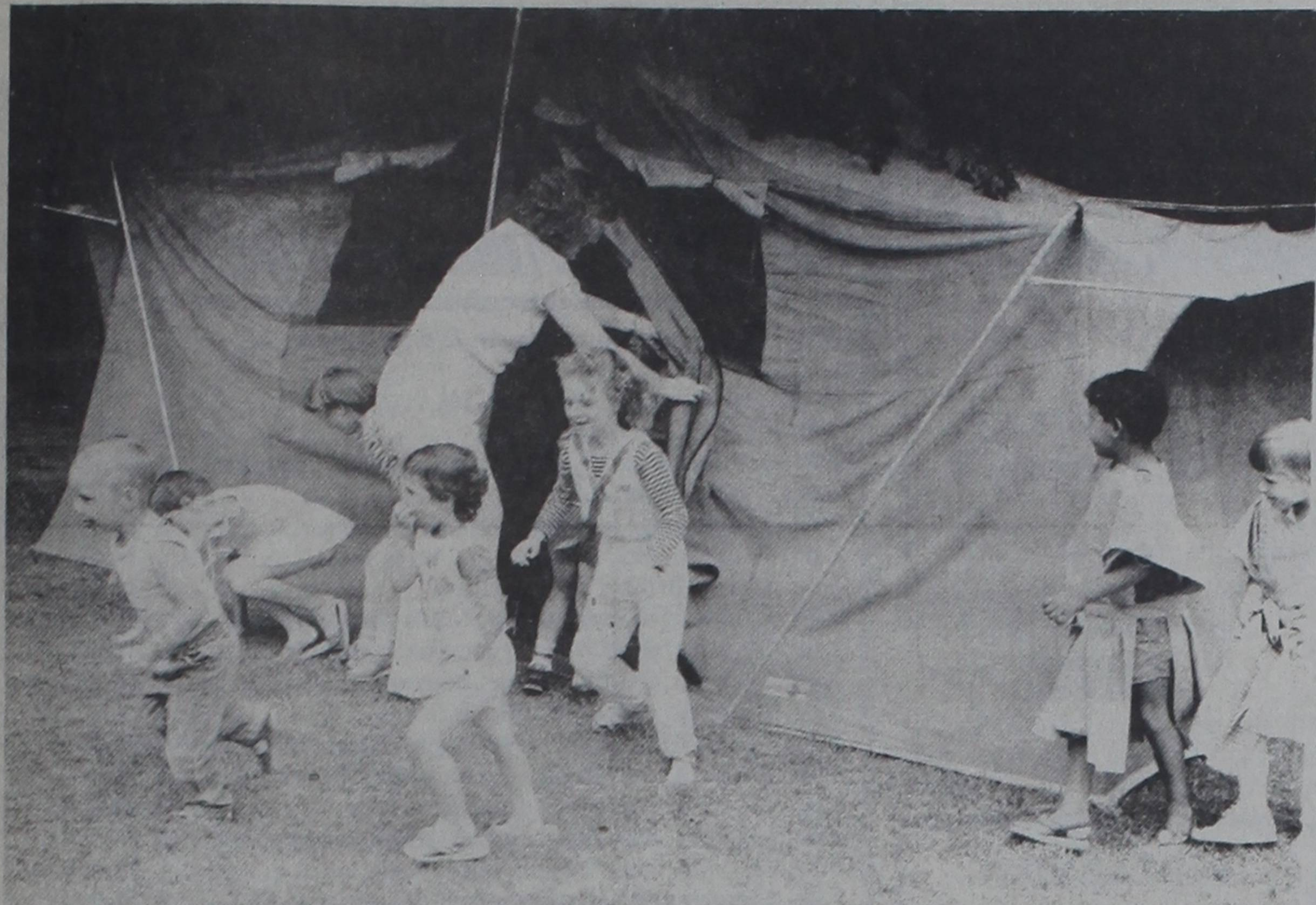
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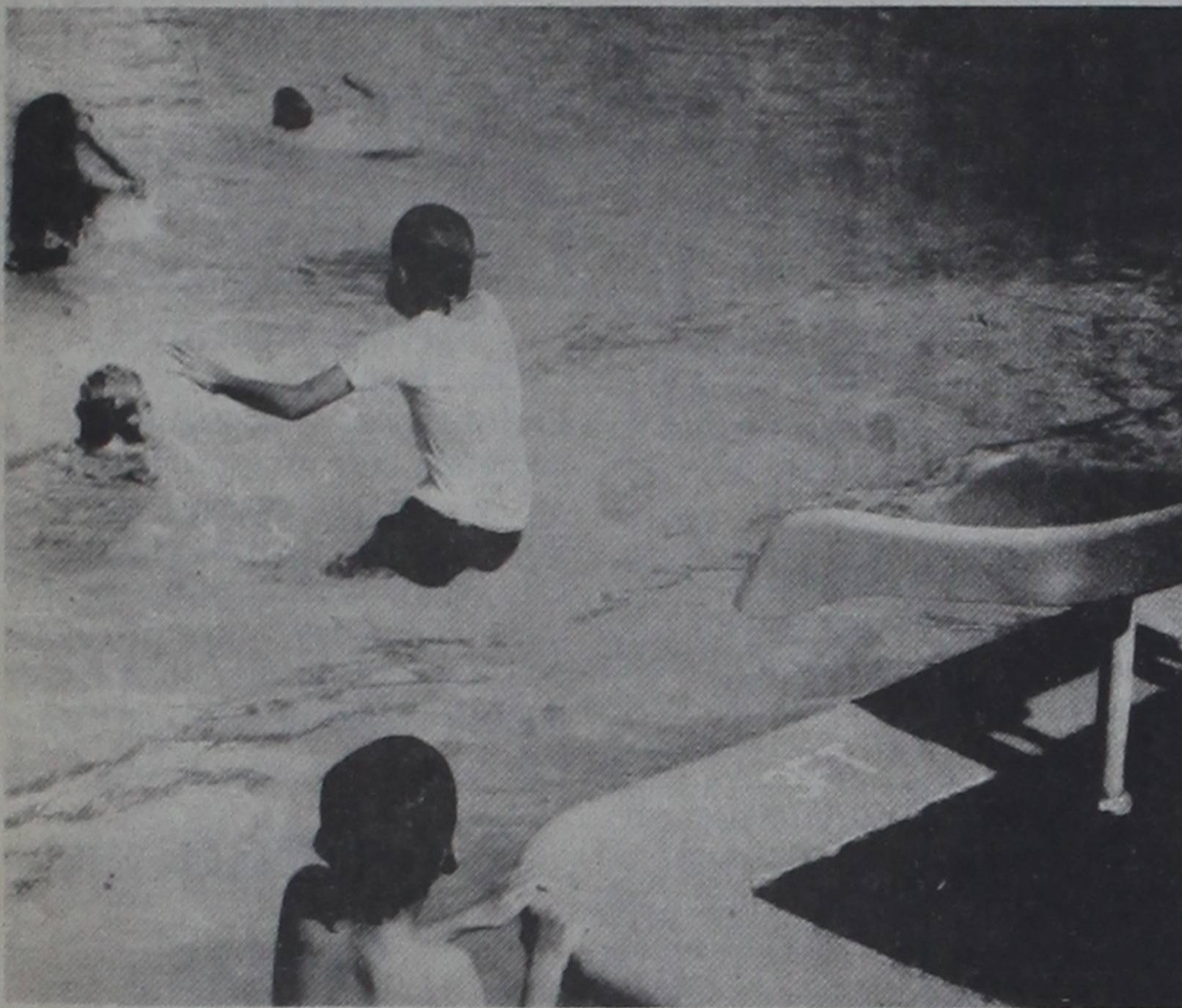

## Manage Your Lawn To Cut Water Bill

When the weather turns dry, don't just turn on your lawn sprinkler and then gripe about your high water bill.

By watering, fertilizing and mowing your lawn properly, you can reduce your water bill as much as 40 per cent, says a turfgrass specialist.

"Conservation by the homeowner provides the only solution to high water bills and excessive water demands during our hot and usually dry Texas summers," says Dr. Richard Duple with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

In small cities where industrial demand for water is low, lawn watering may account for as much as half of all the water used during summer months. Even in larger cities, lawns get 30 to 40 per cent of all the water supplied by municipalities.

"Most Texas lawns use about two inches of water per week during the summer, and most of this usually comes from irrigation," Duple says. "However, as little as one inch of water per week can keep lawns alive and green."

Exactly what can a homeowner do to reduce his summer water bill?

"First, water your lawn only when grass starts to show signs of drought stress," explains Duple. "Look for discoloration and wilting. If leaves roll up in the late afternoon and footprints remain after walking across the lawn, then water within 24 hours."

"Once you've decided that your lawn needs watering, do it right," he emphasizes. "Most homeowners don't water their lawns properly. They either water too often, causing grass to develop shallow roots and making it a prime target for insects, diseases and temperature extremes, or they water too infrequently and apply too much water at one time, resulting in a lot of runoff."

"When watering, soak the soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches," recommends the specialist. In heavy clay soils, watering for 15-20 minute periods may be necessary to prevent excessive runoff.

"Cutting back on lawn fertilization can also reduce watering," says Duple. Applying fertilizer in the spring and fall will generally keep your lawn healthy. Fertilizing during the summer, especially with nitrogen fertilizer, will green up your lawn, but it will also increase grass growth and water use.

## Water Level Shows No Declines

For the first time in the 35-year history of the High Plains Water District, the depth-to-water level measurements made in the District's observation well network show a "0" average change from January 1985 to January 1986. In other words, the volume of water in storage in the District's service area as of January 1986 is the same as it was in January 1985.

Measurements of the depth-to-water were taken in January and February in 950 privately-owned water-level observation wells located throughout the District's 15-county, 5.2 million acre service area.

Individual county depth-to-water level measurements show either a small decline in the water level, or an actual rise in the water level for the one-year average. Average depth-to-water level measurements made in wells in Armstrong, Cochran, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock and Lynn Counties showed a rise.

The average depth-to-water in the remaining seven counties (Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Parmer, Potter and Randall Counties) showed a small increase in the depth-to-water, indicating a decline in the water table. Average declines for individual counties ranged from a 0.08 of a foot decline in Bailey County to a 1.40 foot decline in Parmer County.

For all wells measured, the ten-year average change shows a total decline in the water level of 9.70 feet, or an average change of 0.97 of a foot per year.

The five-year average change in water levels for the period 1976 to 1981 shows a total decline of 7.40 feet, which is an average decline of 1.48 feet per year.

Over the past five years, 1981-1986, there has been a dramatic decrease in the rate of decline in the aquifer. The five-year average change in water levels for the period 1981 to 1986 shows a total decline of 2.30 feet, for an average decline of 0.46 of a foot per year. The change in water levels from 1981 to 1986 indicates a 69 per cent reduction in the rate of decline as compared to the previous five-year period, 1976 to 1981.

The past three-year period, 1983 to 1986, compares almost equally with the five-year period showing a similar average change in the water level. The three-year average change is a decline of 0.44 of a foot.

District Geologist Don McReynolds notes, "In most counties the rate of decline in the water table has been significantly decreased, particularly in the last five years. A combination of non-use, increased energy costs and fortunate rains at opportune times has allowed the aquifer to replenish itself."

## Yogurt Coated Snacks Are Just Candy

Consumers may be buying yogurt coated raisins and nuts under the misimpression that they are "health" snacks, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) specialist.

Nutritionist Marilyn Haggard says the yogurt coating used in these snacks usually has sugar as its major ingredient. The other ingredients include partially hydrogenated vegetable oil, which may contain saturated coconut or palm oil, non-fat milk solids, non-fat yogurt solids, whey and artificial color and flavor.

She says that many people believe that they'll get the benefit of yogurt's protein, calcium and riboflavin from these snack foods.

But a .9 ounce serving of yogurt raisins provides only 2 per cent of the recommended dietary allowance (RDA) for calcium, less than 2 per cent of the RDA for riboflavin, and one gram of protein.

These products should be considered in the same category as candy-coated nuts or raisins, says Haggard.

For a real high-nutrition snack, the TAEX nutritionist recommends putting some raisins in a cup of plain yogurt and adding a non-nutritive sweetener to taste.

## Obey Traffic Laws While On Vacation

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said, "Texans are lucky, because they have better highways on which to travel to more enjoyable places. The Department would like to emphasize that vacation driving during the summer months is far more enjoyable when traffic laws are obeyed." Major Cawthon added, "It is much easier and less expensive to drive within the law."

When it is hot and the highways are crowded, fatigue and lack of alertness is a serious problem on long vacation trips. The motorist should stop every two hours to rest and never drive more than ten hours a day.

During the hot summer months alcohol consumption will be on the increase. Traffic increases with added tourism and our highways can become more dangerous.

This year could be the greatest tourist season Texas has ever had; for the state visitor industry, you could call it a billion-dollar summer!

The Major reminds the Texas motorist to be alert, buckle up, and drive within the 55 mph speed limit. Plan your trip so that you have plenty of time to reach your destination and return in comfort and safety.

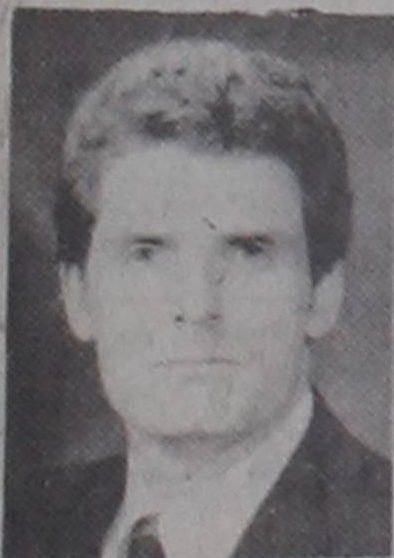

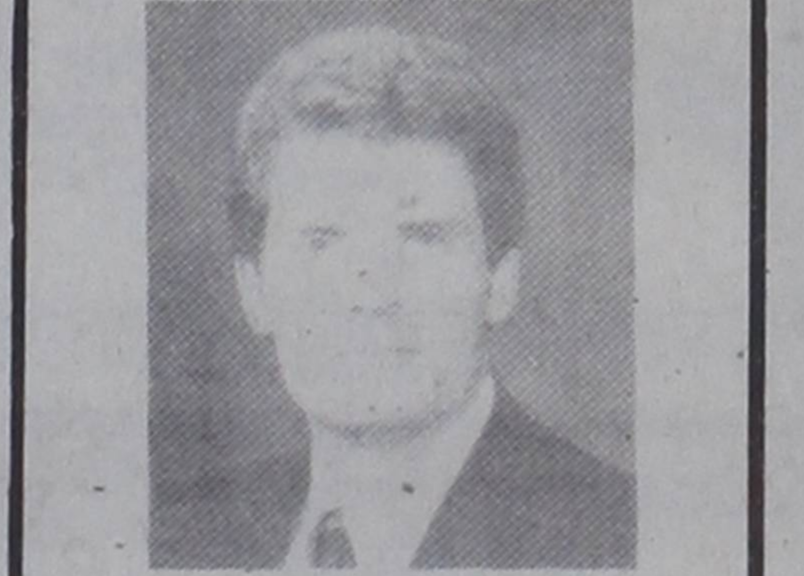

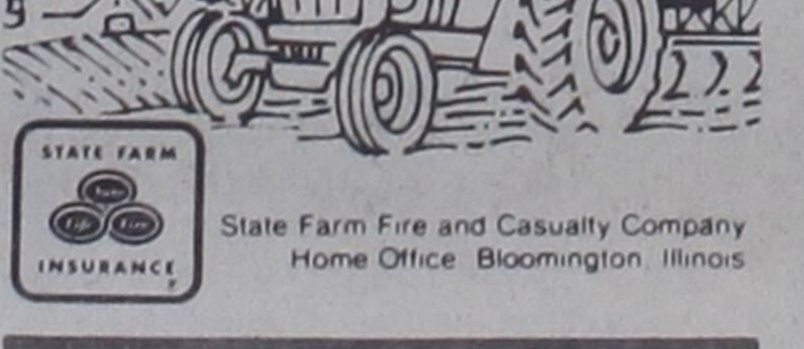

## Humane Society Updates

We need homes for: a three-month-old female German Shepherd; a 1½-year-old female Poodle/Cockapoo; and a one-year-old female Blue Tick Coondog.

Hot days, cool nights and fun times are a few of the things that summer brings us. It also brings numerous unwanted animals, namely kittens and puppies. Friona's Animal Humane Society continues to speak for those who can't throughout the year. However, summertime finds us working harder due to the large number of litters being born.

Since January 1986, FAHS has been forced to destroy over fifteen cats and dogs within our community for various reasons, the most common being "unwanted." This figure may not seem high, but it disturbs us, as euthanasia is our last resort.

When an animal comes to us and is healthy, our first action is to give it the necessary vaccinations (\$20-\$25). Our next job, the hardest one of all, is placing the animal in a home. Since we have yet to build a shelter, the animal is either boarded by the veterinarian or housed in one of our member's homes. If luck is on our side, we will place the animal within several weeks. If not, our only choice is the use of euthanasia.

It has come to the attention of FAHS that the citizens of our town are still unfamiliar with our program.

\*If your animal has been injured or is sick, we will help direct you to

one of our area veterinarians for the proper care needed. But we are not responsible for your pet.

\*We will try to help you find another home suitable for your pet. But we are not a "drop off" for cats and dogs that have gotten "too big" or have become "uncontrollable."

Our main goal is to educate the people in our community of their responsibility as pet owners. Yearly vaccinations and daily care and affection are the biggies. It is also important to realize that unless you are willing to properly care for all of these litters, spaying and/or neutering is a must!

Please help us by looking after your own pets and letting us know about others who are mistreated or no longer wanted. Our Sad Dog Banks continue to keep FAHS going and we thank you for your support. For more information, call 247-3793 or 247-8029.

## Texas Bonds Sales Are Up

During the first quarter of calendar year 1986, Texas sales of U.S. Savings Bonds amounted to \$94,802,245, an increase of over \$13 million over 1985 for 16.4 per cent. T.J. Morrow, District Director for U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, announced recently. These sales represent 25.6 per cent of the state's 1986 assigned dollar goal of \$370 million. March 1986 sales of Series EE Bonds were \$33,634,254, an increase of 15.1 per cent over March 1985.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$32,672 during March 1986 in Parmer County, Charles Allen, Volunteer County Chairman, said. Total sales in the county during the period January-March, 1986 were \$40,766, which represents 36.7 per cent of the county's 1986 assigned dollar goal.

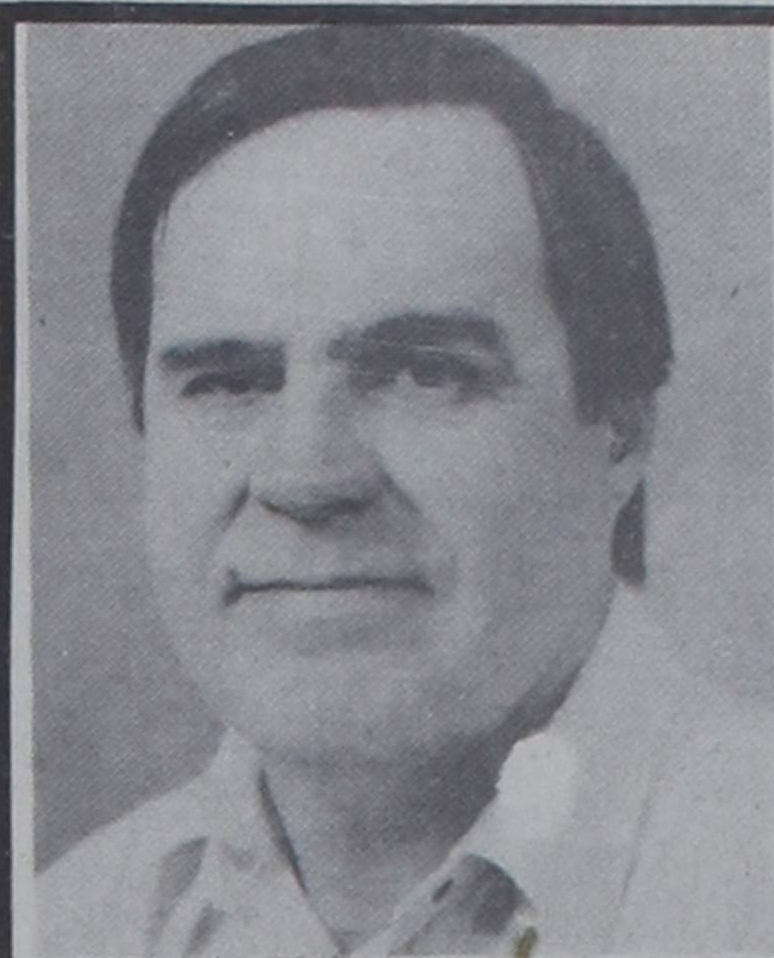
Nationally, March sales of U.S. Savings Bonds totaled \$600 million, 40 per cent above March a year ago and the highest sales for any March since 1979. Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds for the first half of fiscal 1986 increased 40 per cent over the same period a year ago. Savings Bonds held by the American public reached an all-time high--over \$81 billion for the first time ever--to \$81.42 billion.

Much of the sales growth can be attributed to the new market-based rate which was effective November 1, 1982. The current rate in effect during the time of these sales (November 1985 through April 1986) for bonds held five years or longer is 8.36 per cent. The average rate since November 1, 1982 is 9.69 per cent. Bonds held at least five years earn 85 per cent of the average rate on five-year Treasury marketable securities during the holding period or 7.5 per cent, whichever is more. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.

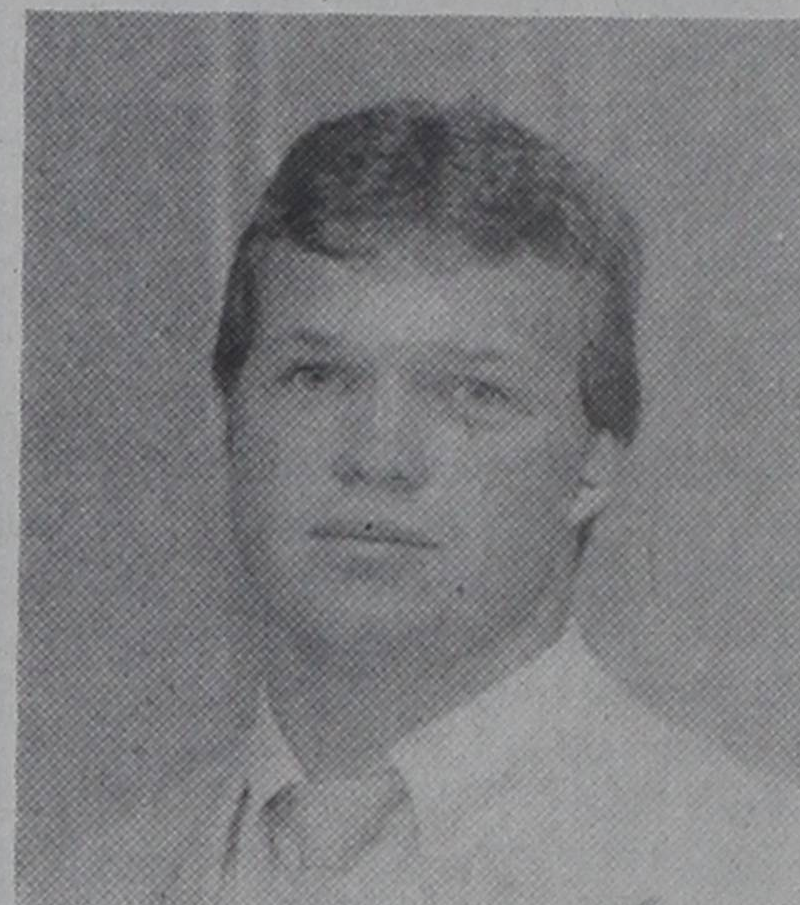
