McCathern Takes Issue With Combest

"Our nation is in one of the biggest crises it has faced in years," Gerald McCathern told a group of supporters at a rally in his honor last Thursday evening in Friona.

McCathern is the Democratic nominee who will face incumbent Larry Combest in the November election for the 19th District Congressional seat.

"There is no reason that wheat prices should be \$2.00 a bushel today, and corn prices should be dropping close to \$3.00 a hundred," McCathern said.

"We have people running our government who either do not understand the farmers' situation, or if they do, they have decided to get rid of a bunch of farmers," the candidate said, pointing out the large number of farmers who have already been driven from their farms.

"Our district (19th Congressional) affects the national economy as much as any in the nation, due to our agriculture and oil," McCathern said, decrying the sad economic condition that both of these industries are currently faced with.

"Yet, the farm program we have was pushed and supported by our present congressman, who voted for it eight times. He also was quoted as saying the drop in oil prices might be good, as it would push out the marginal, ineffective producers," McCathern said.

The Hereford area farmer, who was a leader in the American Agriculture Movement, said that in order for our national economy to be strong, the pricing of raw materials, including oil and farm products, must be adequate for producers to make a profit.

The congressional candidate also attacked the nation's import policy. "We are an island of free

trade in an ocean of protectionism," McCathern charged, implying that our domestic industries need to be given more consideration by the government.

"We don't need more taxes, we need more taxpayers," McCathern said, pointing out that the 19th Congressional District was formerly one of the biggest taxpaying districts in the country, but that due to the current situation with agriculture and the oil industry, the district could be facing a tax-deficit situation.

The candidate said that agriculture was a great industry (in years when prices allowed the farmers to make a profit). "Every farm is a factory. We manufacture a product. But our tax base is going to be eroded if the present situation continues. That will in turn be a major problem for our school districts.

"This is what made me decide to run for office. Someone needs to tell our story. I feel we have an excellent opportunity of winning the election, if we carry the rural areas by a big margin," McCathern told the group.

Jerry Don Glover of Lazbuddie introduced McCathern, and urged those attending the rally to work on behalf of his election. "We appreciate Gerald taking this year out of his life to run for office. We need to do everything in our power to get him elected," Glover said.

The rally was sponsored by the Steering Committee to elect McCathern. A "Mexican Fiesta" meal was served, and a good crowd attended the event at the Friona Grade School Cafeteria.

After his speech, farm toys, donated by Friona implement dealers, were auctioned off, with proceeds going to the campaign.

Frionans Involved In Montana Flood

While Friona has seen more than normal rainfall recently, folks in this area do not usually worry about floods and flooding rivers. But some of our Friona residents that were in Montana for harvest will now be very sympathetic to flood stories that they hear.

Edward Allen, Dexter and Cristy Allen, Dexter and their three-year-old son, Derek, are in Harlem, Montana, and have their trailers in a trailer park there.

It has rained in this part of Montana for the past 18 days, and they received 11 inches of rain Wednesday night through Thursday morning causing 30 miles of the Milk River to flood.

Someone pounded on the trailer doors about 6 a.m. Thursday morning and awakened them with a warning to leave their trailers at once. The Allens did not have time

to put on their clothes or take anything with them. They then waded water neck deep and carried Derek on their heads, to safety.

The two trailers are still in the flood, along with Dexter's pickup. Edward's pickup and all the harvest equipment were at a different location and not in the flood.

This is the first flood for that area of Montana and the local residents were quick to offer homes, and clothes, to the flood victims.

Highways and railroads have been washed out and the area is considered a disaster area.

Three Will Get Eagle BSA Badges

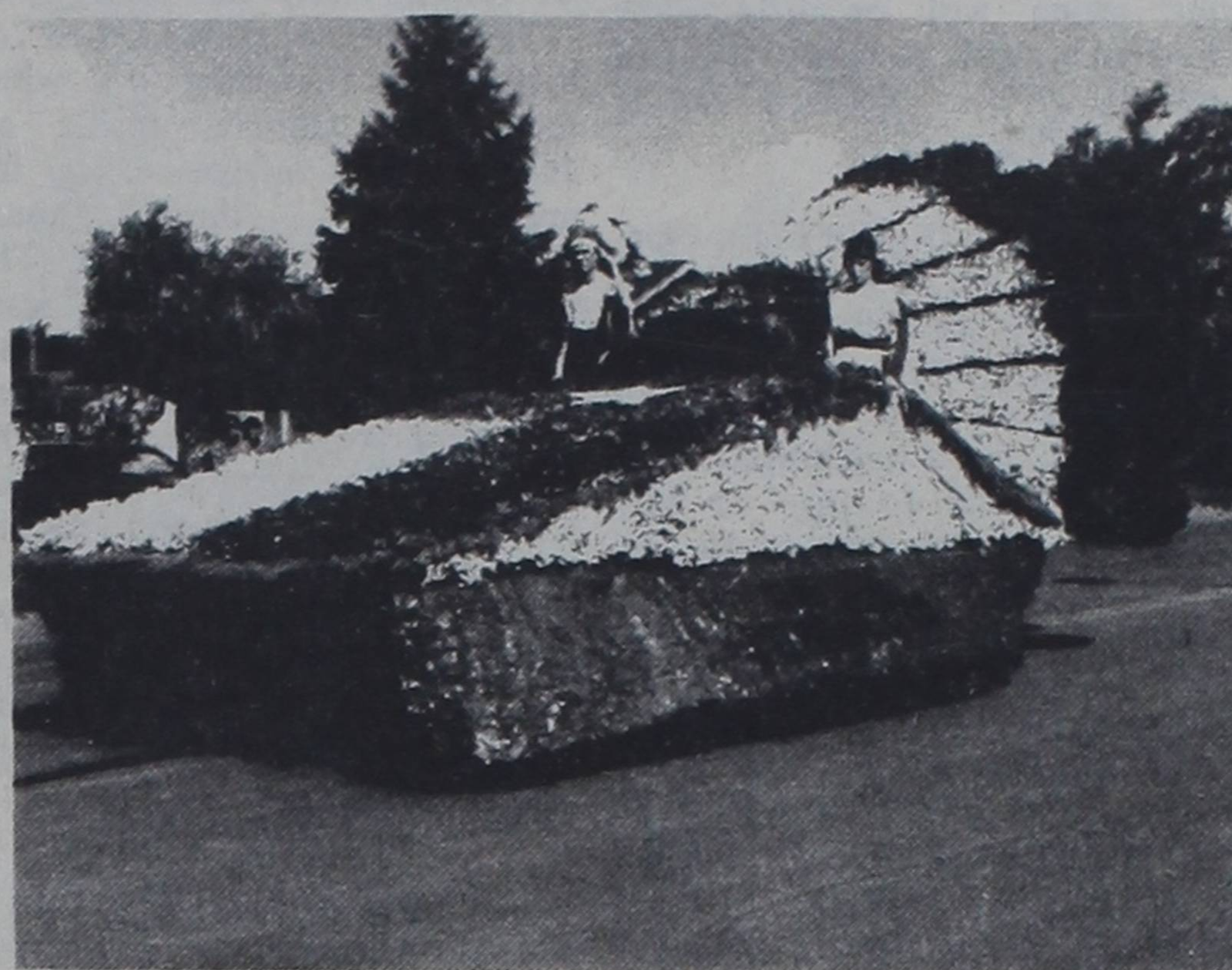

Phillip Johnson Is Grid Specialist

Phillip Johnson was the football expert for the third week's football contest, co-sponsored by 24 local merchants with the Friona Star.

Manchee missed Purdue-Pittsburgh, WT-Louisiana Tech, Miami-Jets, Houston-Kansas City and New England-Seattle.

Johnson weathered the tide of upsets and posted a score of 19 in taking the outright win. He was the only contestant entering the third week's contest to pick as many as 19 of the 24 contest games.

Three contestants managed scores of 18, and of these Danny Stevens of 1410 Cleveland claimed second place on the basis of the Friona-Portales tie-breaker score.

Stevens picked the Chiefs to win, 28-13, missing the actual score by 20 points.

Mal Manchee of Hereford took third place. His tie-breaker prediction of 28-14 was 27 points off the actual score. Paula Wilson barely lost out on a weekly prize, when her tie-breaker guess of Friona 17, Portales 7 was 31 points off the actual score of Chieftains 41, Rams 0.

Scores really took a nosedive for the week, with the average score being 14, after being 16 for the first two weeks.

Nine contestants came within a point of challenging for one of the weekly prizes, with scores of 17--an outstanding score for the week.

Those correctly picking 17 games were Jo Blackwell, Patricia Carr, Patches Fleming, Marc Hamil, Donita Martin, Myrtle Melton, Kent Patterson, Joe Tongate and Nita White. Twenty-two contestants had scores of 16, and another 22 picked 15 games right, both above average for the week.

Knocking the scores down a notch to begin with was the River Road-Dimmitt tie on game number one. Ties are counted wrong, since it is technically possible (although risky) to pick a tie.

Besides the tie game, Johnson's only misses were Purdue-Pittsburgh, Oklahoma State-Houston, Baylor-USC and New England-Seattle.

Stevens missed Purdue-Pittsburgh, Oklahoma State-Houston, Kansas City-Houston, New England-Seattle and San Diego-Washington, in addition to the tie.

Manchee missed Purdue-Pittsburgh, WT-Louisiana Tech, Miami-Jets, Houston-Kansas City and New England-Seattle.

FHS Hosts Pampa For H'coming

The Friona Chieftains' final non-district game may turn out to be one of the toughest games they will play all season.

The Chieftains will host the Pampa Harvesters of conference 4A next Friday. The Harvesters are being met for the first time on the gridiron by Friona. The game also serves as Friona's Homecoming game for 1986.

Back in January, Coach Tommy Moss had to do a lot of calling to fill in the season's fifth game, due to the redistricting situation. Pampa turned out to be one of the few prospects anywhere in the Panhandle-Plains area with a date matching Friona's needs.

Complicating matters somewhat is the fact that the UIL cut out one area conference 4A district. Pampa's district is composed of nine schools, which leaves only two non-conference games.

The Harvesters filled their non-district slate with Amarillo High School from 5A, and Friona from 3A.

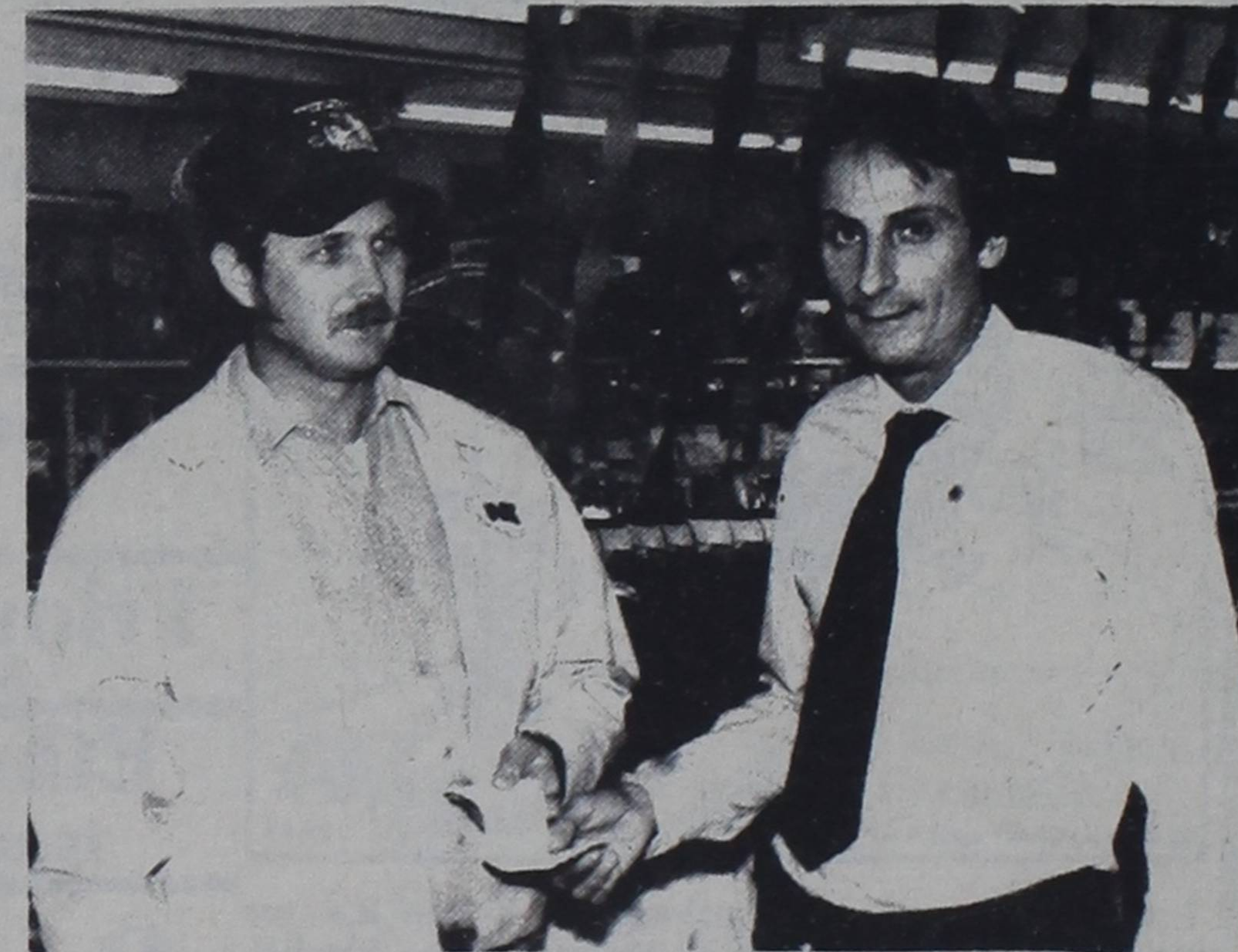
Pampa has been impressive in what was supposed to be a "rebuilding year." They played last year's playoff veteran Amarillo off the field before losing, 16-14, in their season opener.

Then, they played tough Hereford close before falling by a touchdown.

"We have been looking forward to playing Pampa, and I know it's going to be a tough game. It ought to get us ready for our district schedule," said Coach Moss.

The Chieftains suffered some injuries against Portales, but only one of them, Albert Trevino, will be out of action for any length of time. Trevino sustained a sprained knee, and was expected to miss three weeks.

Lonnie Phillips had a shoulder injury, but was expected to play at Olton Friday.

Harvest Is Underway

Corn harvest continues in the Friona area, although showers on Monday and Tuesday of this week again delayed the cutting to some extent.

Ron Smiley, spokesman for Friona Wheat Growers, said that a lot of the early corn was cut as ensilage for the feed yards.

The big drawback to the harvest situation is the price of corn, which at midweek stood at just \$3.30 per hundredweight.

This is down by almost one-half of what farmers got for their corn 20 to 25 years ago, when prices were \$5.50 to \$6.00. Only problem is that expenses have risen considerably since that time.

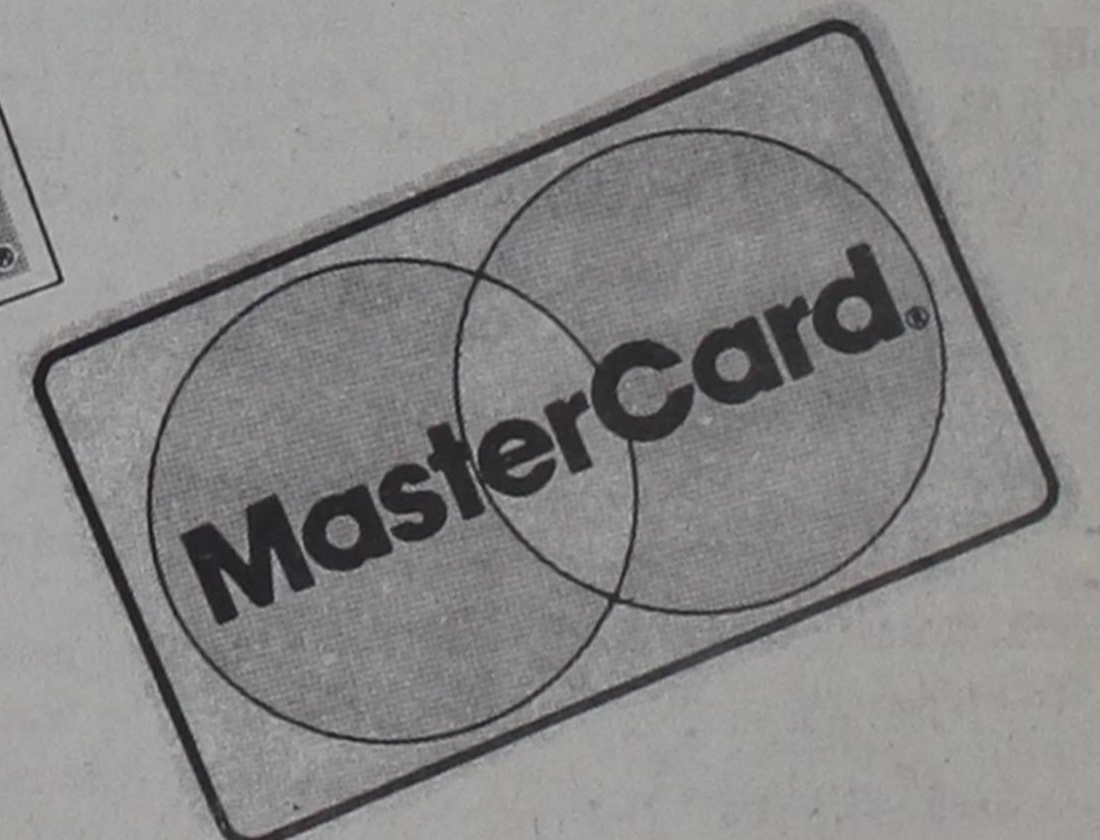

41-0 VICTORY

Chiefs Impressive In Blanking Portales

The Friona High School Chieftains rebounded from their hard-luck loss to Idalou with an impressive 41-0 win over the Portales Rams in a game at Chieftain Field last Friday.

It was only the second win ever for Friona over a Portales team, although just the sixth meeting between the two schools in football. The other Chieftain win was way back in 1944.

Jimmy Williams had a big night against the Rams. The 182-pound fullback scored three touchdowns and rushed for 121 yards. Tailback Lonnie Phillips gained 103 yards, and scored one touchdown.

Phillips accounted for Friona's first touchdown as the Chiefs took the lead. Phillips raced 51 yards up the west sideline, tackled at the Portales one. Phillips then cracked into the end zone for the score.

Friona tried a pass for two points, but Shy Burney was called for going beyond the line of scrimmage although the pass was complete. Friona settled for a 6-0 lead, with 4:15 left in the quarter.

The Chiefs held Portales, and forced a punt. However, the Ram punter got a bad snap and was tackled at his own nine-yard line, where Friona took over late in the quarter.

Patches Fleming passed to Rusty Rainey on first down to the five, and on third down, Williams crashed over from the three. A run by Daniel Echols for points was stopped, and Friona had a 12-0 lead with 49 seconds left in the opening period.

The Chiefs couldn't gain on their next possession and had to punt. However, in their fifth

possession, they again put points on the board.

Albert Trevino intercepted a Portales pass at the Rams' 30, and returned it to the 18 to put Friona in great field position once again.

Lance Gatlin raced 16 yards to the Portales two, and then got the last two yards for his first touchdown of the season. A pass attempt by Fleming on the PAT went incomplete, but Friona had hiked its lead to 18-0 after 6:01 of the quarter.

Portales made one first down after the kickoff, and then got a great, 47-yard punt that backed Friona up to their own 23-yard line. The ball didn't stay there long.

Williams burst through the line up the middle, and found himself in the secondary. He shook free from a would-be tackler at midfield and then went all the way—a 77-yard touchdown run. Again trying for the two-pointer failed, but the lead had become 24-0. That turned out to be the halftime score.

Taking the second half kickoff, the Rams picked up a pair of first downs before fumbling a pitchout that resulted in a 19-yard loss and forcing a punt.

Phillips had gains of ten and 13-yards, but Friona faced fourth and ten from the Portales 30 after being hit with an offensive pass interference penalty.

Sam Montoya came on to kick a school record-tying 46-yard field goal, to hike Friona's lead to 27-0 with 4:48 left in the third quarter.

The Rams couldn't move on their next two possessions, and Friona took the ball at the Portales 43. Friona had its troubles moving the ball, and Montoya punted to the Ram five yard line.

Portales fumbled on their first play, and Friona recovered. Three plays later, Williams blasted over from five yards out for his third touchdown of the game. Montoya

split the uprights, and Friona's lead had become 34-0.

Reserve tailback Terry Widner came on to make some good runs for Friona, but neither team could mount a drive.

Finally, with 53 seconds left on the clock, safety Daniel Echols swiped a Portales pass and ran it back 45 yards for a score on a nifty run. Montoya's kick made the score 41-0.

Echols had yet another interception and return with 20 seconds remaining, but was tackled at the Rams' 35.

The Chieftain defense did a great job on the explosive Ram offense, limiting the visitors to only eight first downs and 134 total yards.

Friona created six turnovers, and four of them led to scores.

Albert Trevino, center and linebacker, suffered a sprained knee, and will be out of action for about three weeks.

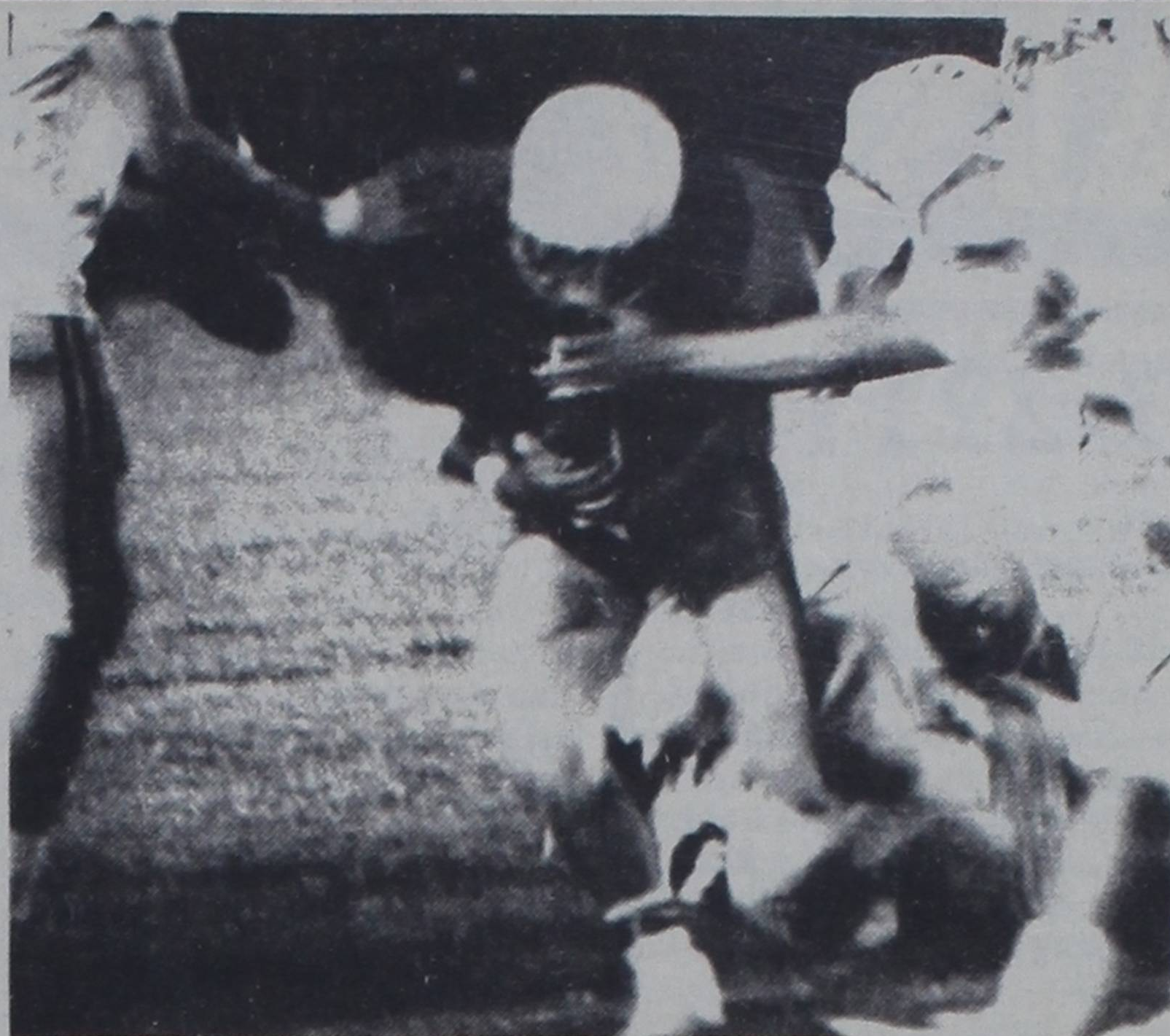

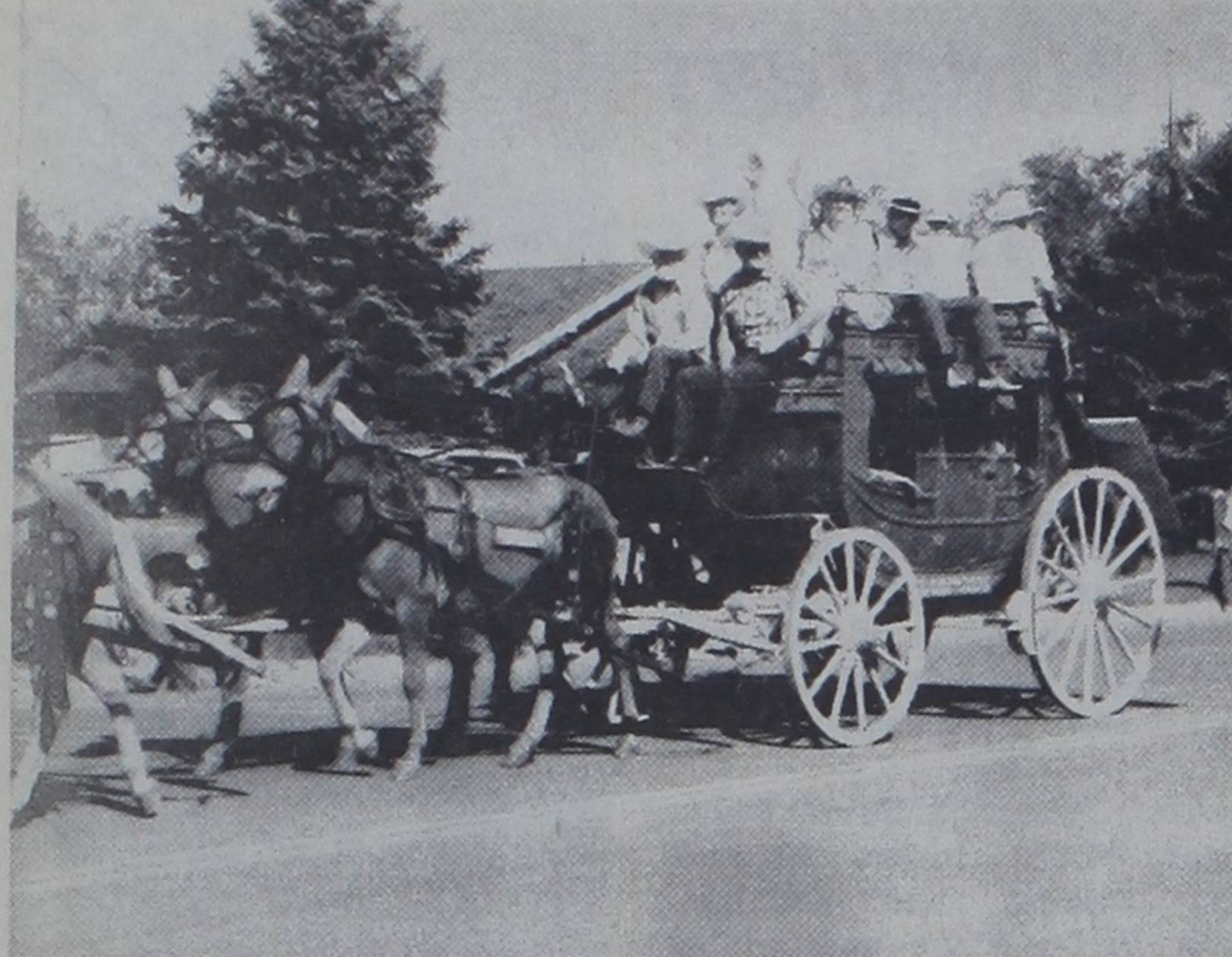

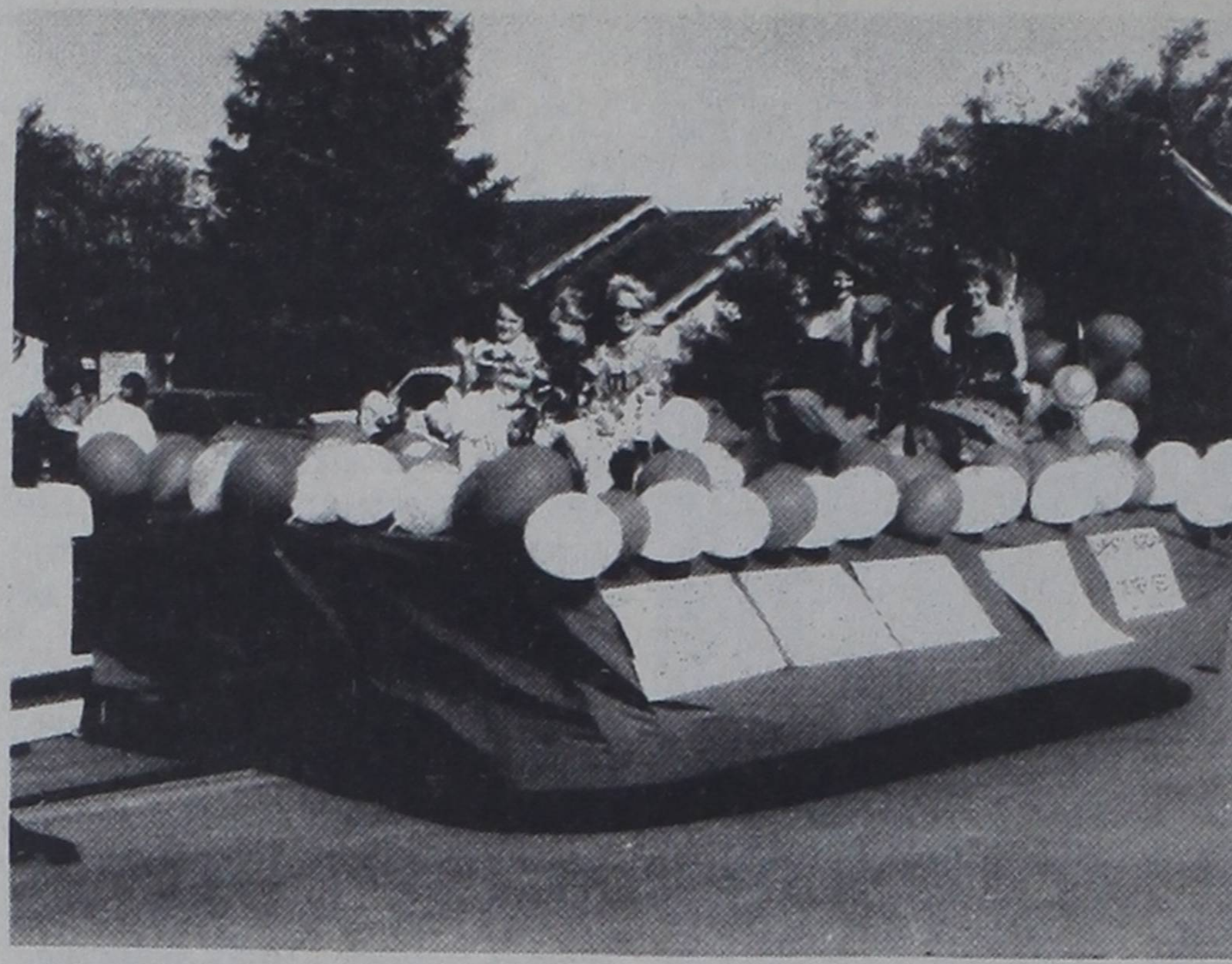

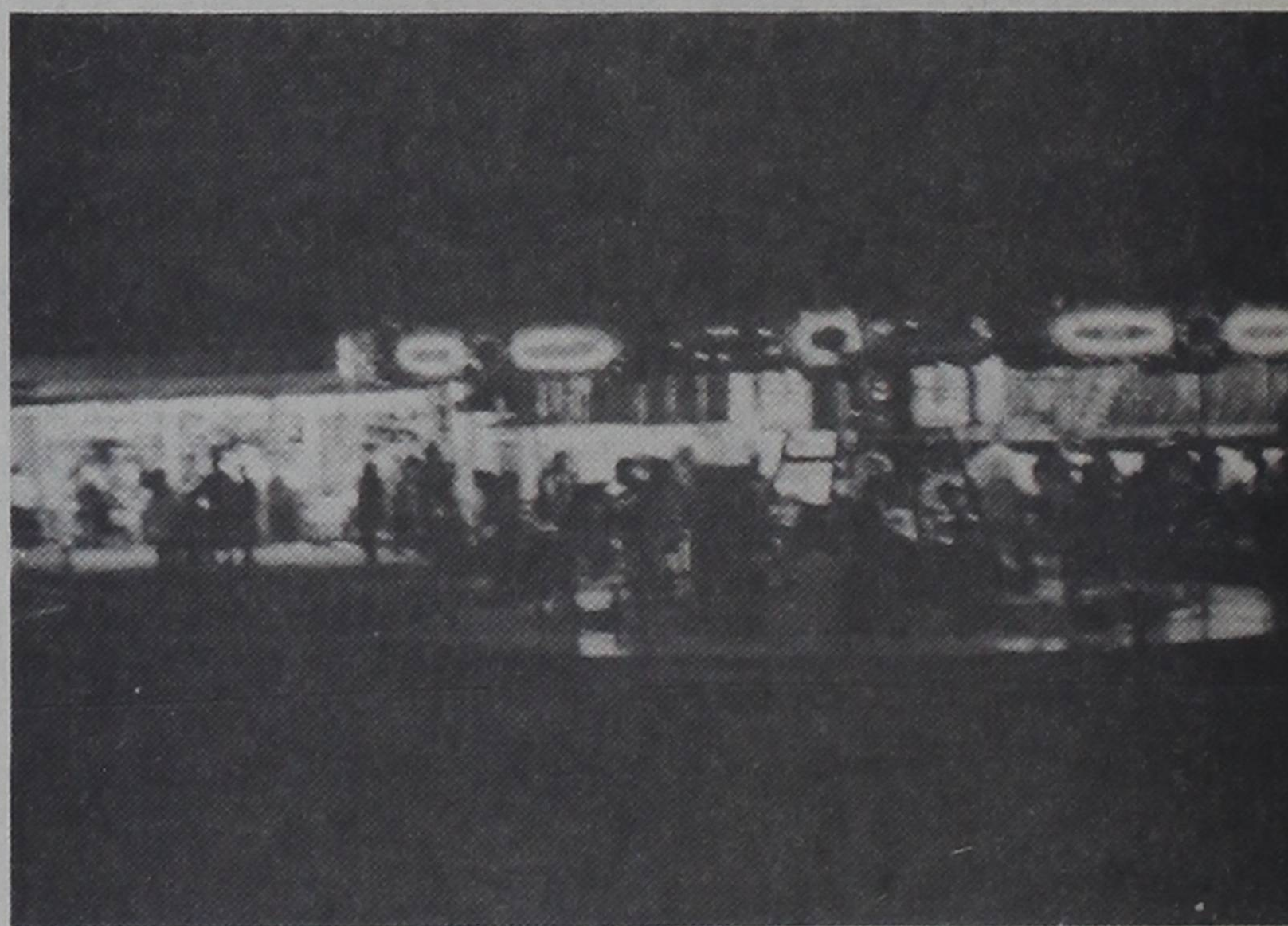

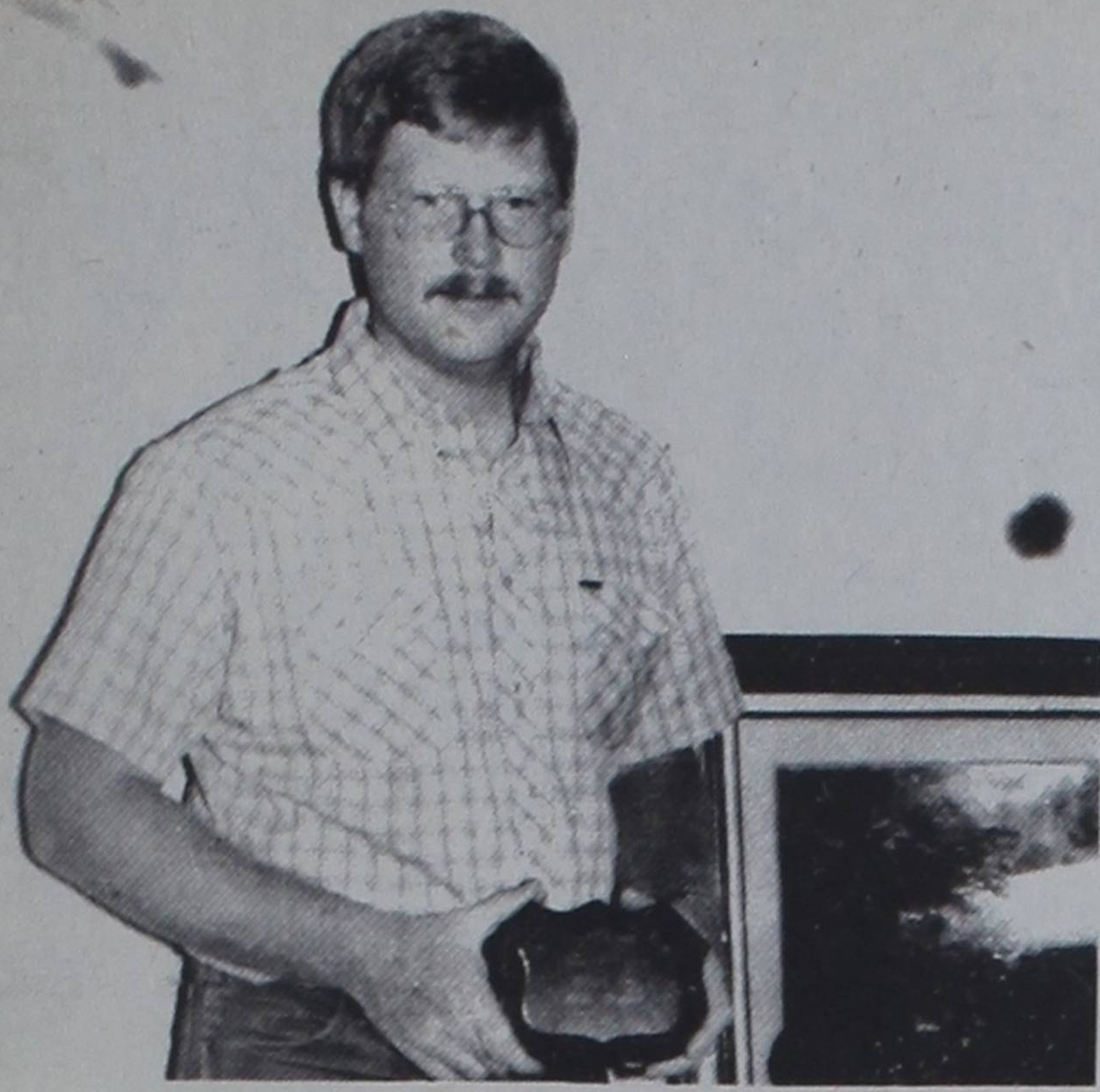

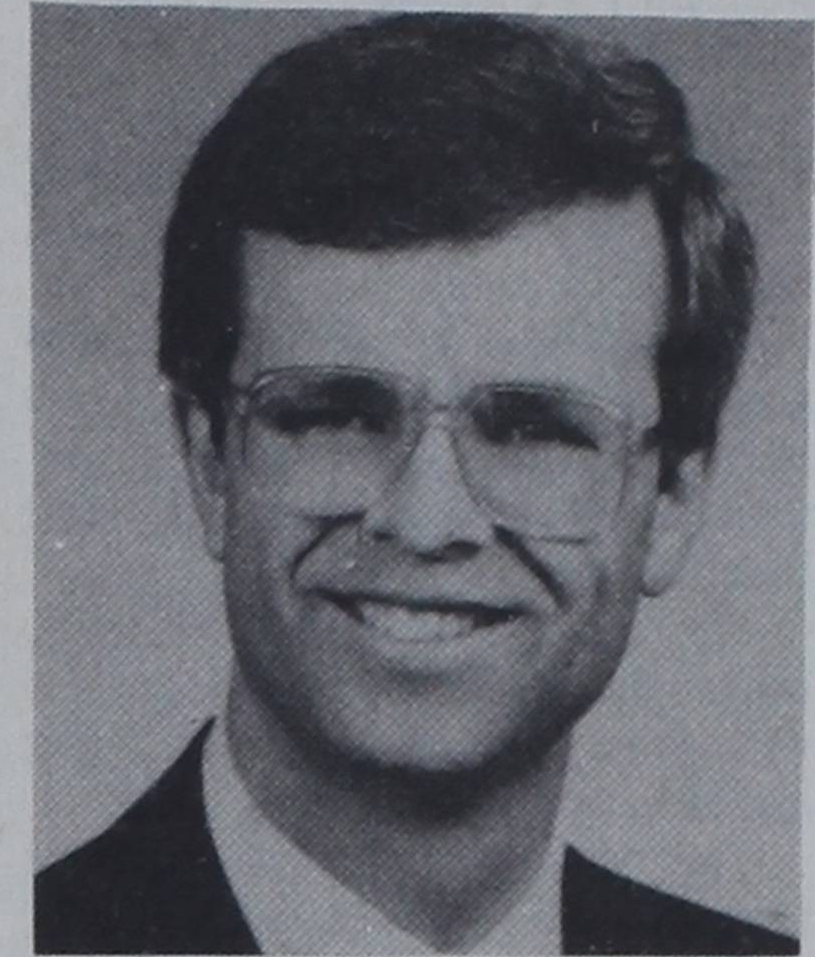
