

### Harvest Is Underway

Corn harvest continues in the Friona area, although showers on Monday and Tuesday of this week again delayed the cutting to some extent.

Ron Smiley, spokesman for Friona Wheat Growers, said that a lot of the early corn was cut as ensilage for the feed yards.

The big drawback to the harvest situation is the price of corn, which at midweek stood at just \$3.30 per hundredweight.

This is down by almost one-half of what farmers got for their corn doors about 6 a.m. Thursday 20 to 25 years ago, when prices were \$5.50 to \$6.00. Only problem is that expenses have risen considerably since that time.








