THERE IS A LOT of debate on the subject of environment protection, and the work being done to protect certain endangered species.

But there is one program which has proven successful, and probably without expending too much in the way of tax funds.

This is the protection of the giant whooping cranes, which spend the winter at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Texas coast each year.

In a recent newspaper interview, Frank Johnson, manager of the wildlife refuge, gave some encouraging news concerning the whooping cranes.

At one point since the cranes have been placed on the endangered species list, their population dwindled to only 12 or 15 birds. Last spring, park officials counted 95 birds as they left to spend the summer at Wood Buffalo National Park in Canada.

Canadian officials report that 20 chicks large enough to fly were banded at the birds' nesting grounds in Canada, and at least one other chick was sighted. So, the 1986 population of the whoopers could be as high as 115, depending on how many of the birds survive the 2,500-mile trip from Canada to Texas.

In addition to the migratory flock, there are some 40 adult birds in captivity (in zoos, etc.), and there is a flock of 25 whooping cranes which live in a Rocky Mountain flock. So, from the low of only a dozen of the cranes spotted at one time, this year's population may possibly be around 180.

If you have ever seen the whooping cranes, either in person or in pictures, you can see why naturalists have worked and fought so hard to combat its threatened extinction.

They stand four feet tall as adults, with a seven-foot wingspan. The whooping cranes are snow-white, with black wingtips. They should not be confused with the sandhill crane, thousands of which overwinter at the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge. The sandhill crane is not on the endangered list. In fact, there have been specified hunting seasons for this crane.

The Aransas refuge is located approximately 75 miles north of Corpus Christi. Each year, approximately 40,000 visitors visit the park, many in an attempt to spot the cranes.

There is a sightseeing tower with telescopes for viewing not only the tall whoopers, but also much other wildlife including deer, javelina, alligators, wild turkeys, ducks, geese and many other species of birds.

Park officials say that the best way of seeing the whooping cranes is to take a commercial sight-seeing boat from Rockport or Port Aransas.

The editor has followed with interest the effort to save the whooping cranes, and it was especially good news to learn about the continued success of the program.

The whoopers have begun arriving at their winter home. We will be watching to see what the "count" is after their migration back from Canada is complete.

Chieftains Eyeing Football Playoffs

The Friona Chieftains were playing at Floydada on Friday, needing to get past the pesky Whirlwinds in order to stay in the running for a post-season playoff spot.

Chieftain fans were obliged to turn their attention to the Littlefield-Tulia game at Littlefield for the "rest of the story."

A win by the Chieftains and Littlefield on Friday would have assured Friona a spot in the playoffs, while any other combination would necessitate a coin-flip.

While Friona, Littlefield, Tulia and Floydada were battling for the District 2-3A playoff spots, four teams were also fighting for the two spots in District 1-3A. They were Dalhart, Perryton, River Road and Childress.

The top-seeded team in Friona's district will meet the second-seeded team in District 1-3A in the bi-district round, while the number two seeded team in 2-3A meets the champion from 1-3A.

The Chieftains and Coach Tommy Moss were hoping to make the playoffs for the first time since 1982, which was Moss' second year at FHS. The Chiefs have been in the playoff chase every year under Moss' leadership.

A win at Floydada Friday would tie the 1986 Chieftains for the best single-season record at FHS at 8-2. This mark was posted in 1963 and 1964 by the Chiefs and again in 1974. A Friona team has never won as many as nine games in a season.

A Friona win and a Littlefield loss would give the Chiefs a share of the district title, something they had not had in 21 years. The 1964 team was district co-champions, and the 1965 team won the title outright.

Clements Wins Big In City, County

Friona and Parmer County voters joined those across the state Tuesday in giving a majority of their votes to Bill Clements in his successful bid to unseat Mark White in the governor's race.

Clements carried Parmer County with 1482 votes to 680 for White, 67.7 per cent to 31.2 per cent.

In Friona, Clements' margin was 560-229, a margin of 70.2-28.7.

Parmer County gave a majority of its votes to Gerald McCathern in his race for the U.S. Congress. McCathern received 1298 votes to 821 for Larry Combest, who was re-elected.

McCathern received 61.3 per cent of the Parmer County vote to 38.7 for Combest, but unfortunately for the Hereford resident the totals were almost exactly reversed in the district as a whole.

McCathern carried the three Friona precincts, 496-287, 63.3-36.7. He carried every voting precinct except the absentee box, where Combest won, 53-30.

Survey Results Mailed

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, and the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture are cooperating to conduct a consumer opinion survey.

This survey will be used to make Friona a better place to live and shop. One important goal of this survey is to keep dollars in Friona which will help improve our local economic situation.

A limited number of these surveys have been randomly sent to Friona residents. It is very important to have as much response as possible. The survey is to be returned to Texas A&M at College Station, Texas.

Dr. Greg Taylor, consumer development specialist, will present the results of this survey to the Friona retailers. Further results will also be presented by the Chamber in December.

55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 30, 1931
Friona's new business concern, the Maurer-Gischler Grain Company, is preparing to get into the grain buying business in real earnest. The company is composed of Carl C. Maurer and Reuben T. Gischler, two of Friona's most popular and enterprising young men. The two local products are preparing to erect an elevator, which will enable them to handle two or more grades of wheat at one time.

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 30, 1936
Mr. and Mrs. E.S. White honored their young son, Ed Jr., Tuesday afternoon of last week, with a birthday party at their home in the east part of town.

We cannot resist the opportunity to tell of that fine six-inch snow which fell here on Thursday of last week. It fell so gently and evenly without the accompaniment of the usual north wind, and thus lay smooth all over the ground. The snow was quite moist, and was not accompanied by any severe freezing.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 31, 1941
Workmen and equipment in the employ of Cook & Ransom, contractors, building of the large Santa Fe Railroad dike here, have built the dike as far as a point opposite the depot building. Wet weather during the past two weeks has hindered the work. Friona Wheat Growers are building suitable approaches from the top of the dike to the elevator doors. The dike itself will be a driveway for the trucks when bringing grain to these elevators.

40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 25, 1946
At least one indication of the return of the good old pre-war conditions was manifest in Friona this week when two men spent Tuesday and Wednesday here quite busily employed at their craft of repairing typewriters and adding machines. They seem to have been quite welcome callers for many of our business concerns.

35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 25, 1951
The new school building located

just north of the grade school has been virtually completed, and occupancy is expected sometime next week. Four classrooms, a study hall and the high school principal's office will be contained in the new building, Superintendent Caffey said.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 25, 1956
Now under construction is a new building to house Jones Motor Company in east Friona on Highway 60. Opal Jones, owner, says he hopes to have the building finished by the first of the year. Jones was the Friona Dodge-Plymouth dealer from 1935 to 1938.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 26, 1961
An English class for Spanish-speaking people who are helping with the harvest in the Friona area will convene Sunday at 5:30 p.m. at the American Legion Hall in Friona. The first session of the year, October 15, drew a total of 92 to try to learn some part of the English language. Wesley Foster is ramrodding the class. The need for a similar class, to teach local businessmen and residents conversational Spanish, was discussed.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 27, 1966
A total of 783 farms were counted in Parmer County during the 1964 Census of Agriculture, the Bureau of the Census reports. The number was 80, or about one-tenth less than the figure obtained five years earlier, which indicated 863 farms in the county.

15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 28, 1971
Friona's Ken McLellan reigns as world champion in the Super Stock Eliminator class, following the National Hot Rod Association's World Finals of drag racing last weekend in Amarillo. McLellan, who has won a basement full of trophies during the past ten years, called his latest win his "most satisfying," though admitting that he felt little different since notching the world title.

10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 31, 1976
A freak October snow blanketed

the Friona area with an early coat of white on Thursday of this week, with a measurement of four to five inches received in the area.

A crowd of over 100 supporters attended a reception for U.S. Congressman George Mahon at the Friona Community Center this past Monday evening. The legislator told the gathering how he had attempted to represent the 19th Congressional District to the best of his abilities ever since its formation.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1981
A major accident involving two semi-truck trailer rigs occurred at about 4:30 a.m. Saturday morning, at Summerfield. Injured in the accident was Richard Allen White of Friona, who was operating a loaded feed truck at the time of the accident. The other driver was Douglas W. Bryan, 37, of Hereford. He was driving a cattle truck, which was also loaded. Bryan was pronounced dead at the scene.

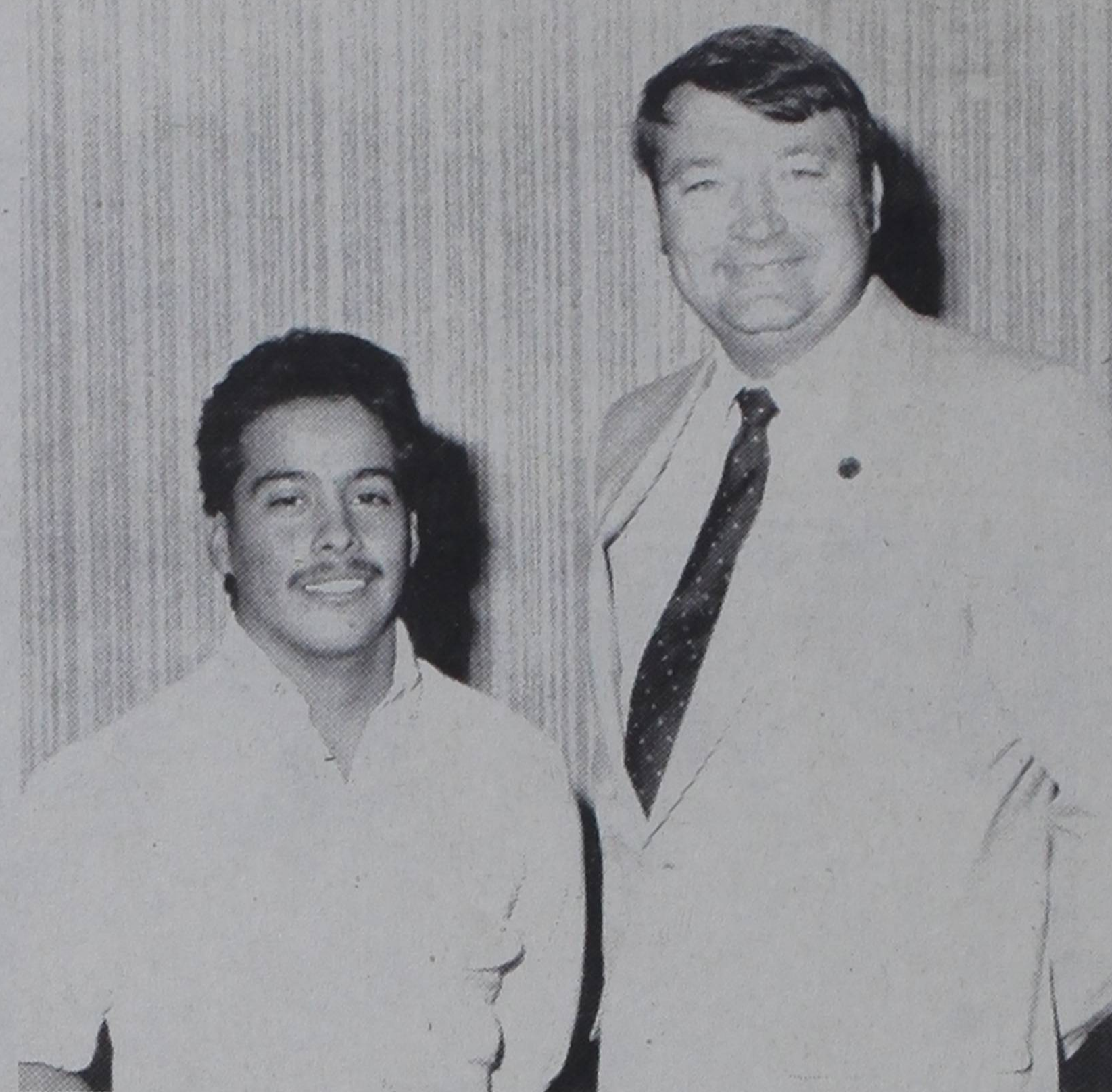

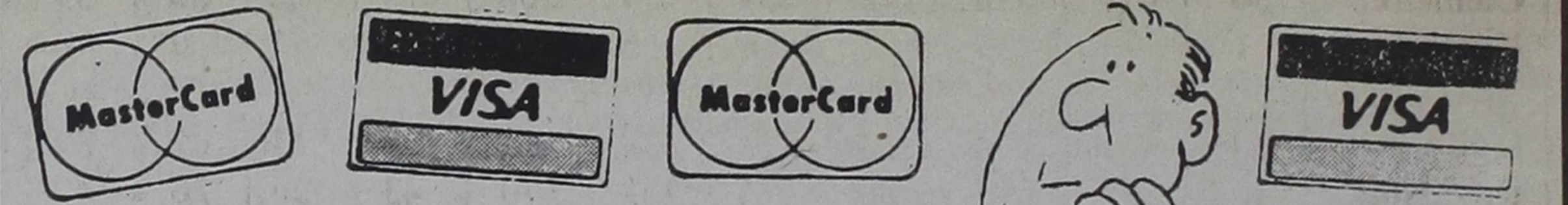

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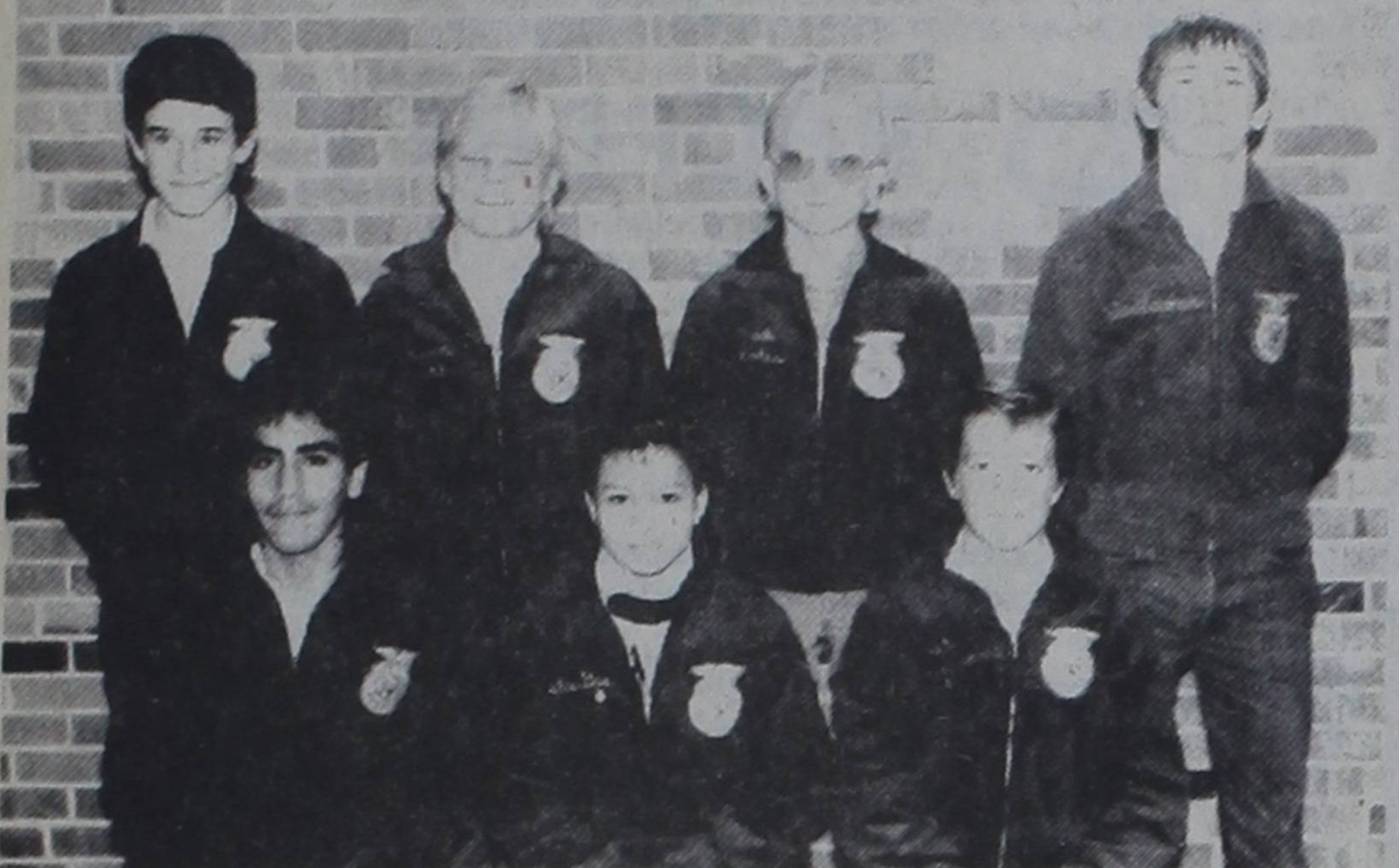

Library Corner

Football, one of America's favorite sports, originated in the United States in the mid 1800's developing from soccer, an English kicking game using a round ball. In fact, soccer is called football in many countries although the games are very different. The term "soccer" developed from the term "association football."

The first college games, with teams consisting of as many as 30 or more players, was played in 1869 between Rutgers and Princeton. In a game at Harvard in 1874, the visiting Canadian team picked up the ball and ran with it following the rules of English Rugby Football, and soon running and blocking became as important to the game as kicking.

By the 1880's, the first down rule had come into being with a first down consisting of five yards in three plays. Teams had been reduced to eleven players each and the round ball had been replaced by an oval one. The rules varied from game to game, however, and were usually agreed upon just before a game began. It was also in the 1880's that football spread from colleges to high schools and soon community rivalries began to develop.

By 1900, kicking was still the most popular way of scoring, but a narrower goal area had been added and marked with goal posts increasing the skill and accuracy needed to score.

Although still popular, the game became increasingly more violent until in 1905, Theodore Roosevelt, after having seen an injured player, threatened to ban the game if the extreme violence continued. So, in 1906, the forward pass was born and helped to relieve the stress on the runners and added to the game's popularity as well as to the variety and strategy of game plays.

Professional football began in the 1800's with early players being paid \$10 per player per game, an amount which quickly increased to \$600 per player per game even in the early stages. In fact, early college players helped to pay for their education by playing professionally usually playing for their college team on Saturday and their professional team on Sunday, a practice later outlawed. The National Football League was organized in 1922.

Texas High School football traces its beginning to 1894 according to "Texas High School Football" by Bill Murray, c. 1985. In the record section of this book, one Friona player, Nelson Jackson, holds the record for the longest pass interception return at 109 yards set in the Friona-Olton game in 1980.

Other records in this section are: Rushing--career 11,232 yards, 1950-53; season 4,045 yards, 1953;

single game 599 yards, 1978.

Carries--career 1,128 yards, 1972-74; season 441 plays in 1973; single game 62 in 1977.

Passing--career 6,190 yards, 1975-78; season 3,154 yards in 1982; single game 588 yards in 1968.

Longest field goal--62 yards in 1975.

Longest punt--97 yards in 1969.

Longest kickoff return--108 yards in 1977.

Longest pass play--6 record holders at 99 yards each.

Most points scored by individual player--career 899 points, 1950-53; season 395 in 1953; single game 75 points in 1937.

Most touchdowns scored by individual player--career 127 in 1950-53; season 57 in 1953; single game 11 in 1937.

Some of the rule changes listed are:

1894--egg-shaped rugby ball used; four point touchdown; no age limit on players.

1912--six point touchdown; fourth down added.

1915--numbers on jerseys legalized.

1936--age limit set to 19 years by September 1.

1937--numbers required on front and back of jerseys.

1939--helmets mandatory.

1948--kicking tees legalized.

1951--age limit to ten semester rule.

1957--face mask penalty instigated.

1973--mouthpiece mandatory.

1974--shoulder pads mandatory.

Friona is also listed as the only town in Texas with the mascot Chieftains. Chieftains is an appropriate name for a team mascot because it symbolizes the fact that every player is essential for a successful team effort and that no player can play the game by himself.

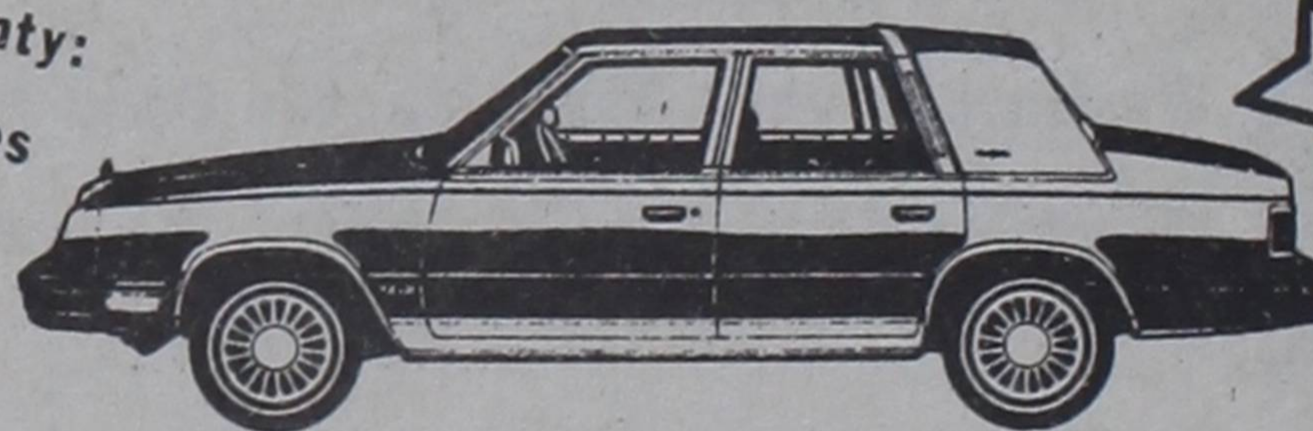
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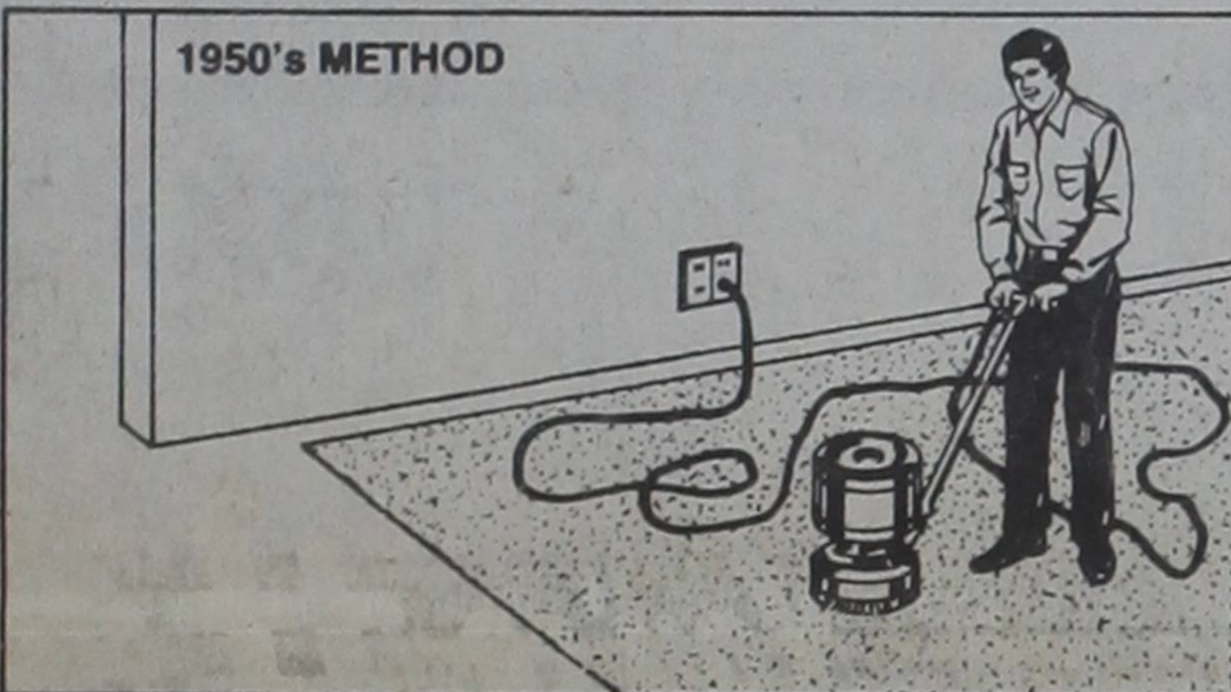
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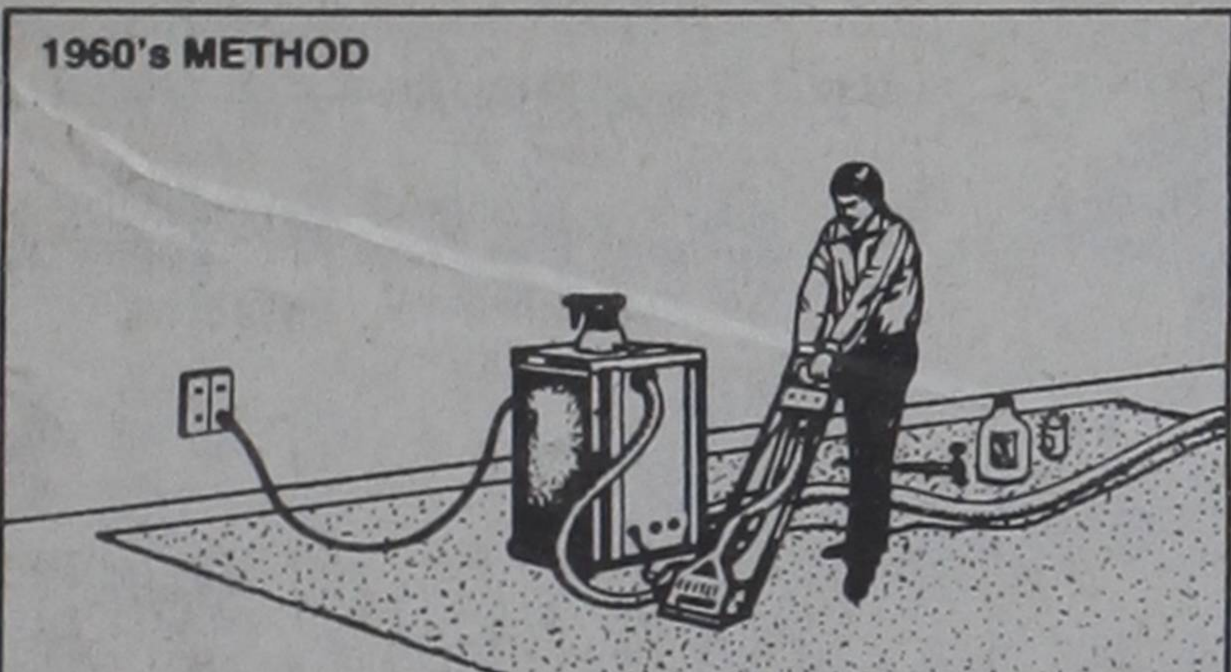
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Chiefs Whack Bobcats; Stay In Playoff Picture

It was a game of record proportions. And lucky for the Friona Chieftains, they didn't have any tricks pulled on them on Halloween night. Only treats.

The Chiefs scored a one-sided, 45-0 victory at Dimmitt. It was the second-worst defeat Friona ever had in football, beaten only by a 49-0 Friona win 52 years ago.

Kicker Sam Montoya got into the record-setting, with a 51-yard field goal. The kick broke the old school record of 42 yards which was held by both Sam and his older brother Mark.

Friona took control of the game early, and the outcome was never in doubt.

The Chiefs took the ball at the Dimmitt 36 after a short Bobcat punt, and sailed 36 yards in five plays for the game's first score.

Quarterback Daniel Echols rolled out to the left and outran his defenders 25 yards for the touchdown. Montoya's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead. Only 4:24 had elapsed in the first quarter.

Dimmitt ran three plays and punted again. Echols made a 23-yard return of the punt to the Bobcat 42, again giving Friona excellent field position.

Lonnie Phillips gave the team a first down at the Dimmitt 31, and three plays later broke around left end on a pretty 21-yard run, down to the Dimmitt nine.

Phillips carried two more times, one for eight yards and then for the touchdown. Montoya's second kick made the score 14-0 with 2:12 left in the opening quarter.

Dimmitt picked up a first down, and moved across midfield on a pass completion. But the Bobcats were burned on their second pass attempt when Shy Burney intercepted and ran the ball back to midfield.

Two plays later, Phillips broke through the Bobcat defense and raced up the middle 49 yards for his second TD. It was the last play

of the opening quarter, and gave Friona a commanding 20-0 lead.

A high snap foiled Montoya's try for a third point.

Dimmitt moved to their own 44 before having to punt. Echols again had a dandy return, except that a clipping penalty against the Chieftains moved the ball back to the Friona 40.

The Chiefs then set out on a nice, 16-play drive that used up over six minutes of clock time. Phillips had a pair of five-yard gains, and Echols ran eight yards, as Friona moved the ball downfield.

Echols ran 11 yards to the Dimmitt 19, then Phillips gave the team a first and goal at the Dimmitt seven.

The drive almost finished when Echols fumbled a snap while pulling away from the center. He recovered at the 14 for a seven-yard loss.

However, Echols hit Jimmy Williams with a 13-yard pass. Williams was tackled at the Dimmitt one. Phillips then cracked over for his third TD of the game, and after a low snap Burney ran it in for two points. The 28-0 lead turned out to be the halftime score.

In the third quarter, Friona was hit with a pair of holding penalties on first down, as soon as they started a drive. Both times it put the team in a first and 20 situation. And they led to Friona's only two punts of the game.

Late in the quarter, Phillips intercepted a Bobcat pass at the Dimmitt 39.

The Chiefs drew an illegal motion penalty, two plays gained two yards, and then Dimmitt had an offside penalty. Echols ran to the Dimmitt 33, where Friona faced fourth and four.

It was at this point that Coach Moss sent Montoya into the game to try his record kick. The ball was spotted on the Dimmitt 8. A crosswind out of the northeast seemed to die down for the

occasion, as Montoya got all of his leg into the kick. It split the uprights, with a few yards to spare.

The kick came with 11:09 to play in the game, hiking Friona's lead to 31-0.

At this point Coach Moss put Patches Fleming in at quarterback. Fleming immediately threw a 41-

yard strike to Stephen Thornton, who was wrestled out of bounds at the Dimmitt 19.

In fact, the Dimmitt defender threw a punch while out of bounds, and the Bobcats were flagged and backed up to their own nine, where Friona had first and goal.

Jimmy Williams scored the touchdown from seven yards out, and the score became 38-0 with 7:58 left on the clock, after Montoya split the uprights.

Once again Dimmitt ran three plays and punted. Williams and Phillips took turns making good gains for the Chiefs. Williams carried the ball four times in a row and scored from four yards out. Montoya's kick brought the score to 45-0, with 3:39 left to play.

Friona got the ball back with a minute left, and in two plays had the ball again at the Dimmitt 22. However, the team preferred to count off the game's final seconds, rather than try to crack the 50-point mark.

Except for the steady northeasterly wind, the game was played on a crisp, beautiful late fall night. There had been no rainfall for a week, and the field conditions were excellent.

Coach Tommy Moss had praise for Lonnie Phillips and Jeff Chaney in the game. Phillips, in addition to scoring three touchdowns, had a pair of pass interceptions on defense.

Moss also said that the Chieftains' offensive line did their job. "They were going against some good-sized Dimmitt boys, and they controlled things," he said.

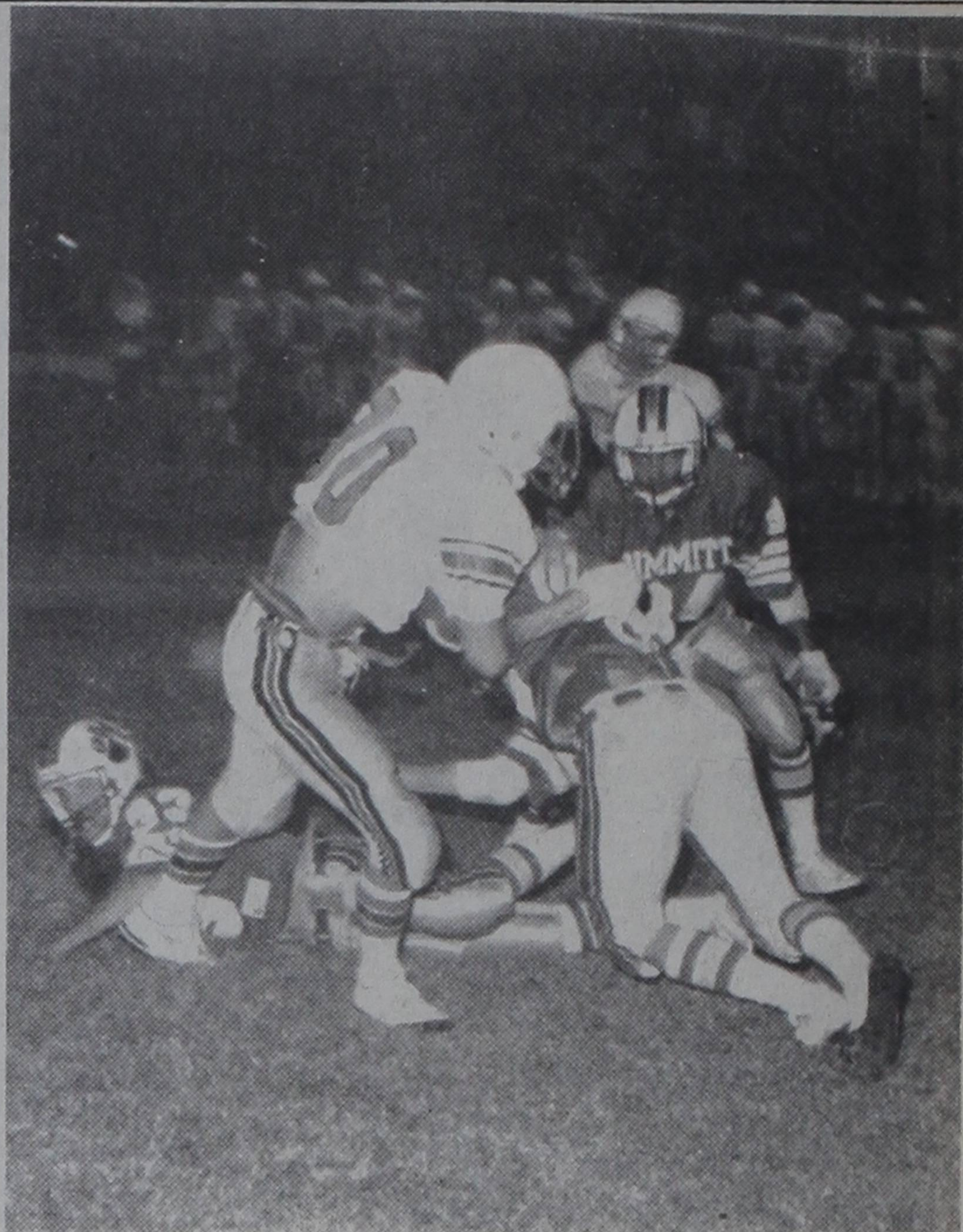
