Chiefs In Football Playoffs

Friona, Perryton To Meet In Amarillo

THE BEGINNING of the state football playoffs brings to us a reminder of what a sprawling state we live in, as well as the diversity that is involved from end of the state to the other.

Take, for instance, the state's largest UIL classification, the 5-A schools.

Region I for conference 5-A stretches all the way from Amarillo on the north (it used to be Pampa and Borger, when these schools were in 5-A) to Midland-Odessa on the south, El Paso on the west, and the Duncanville-Hurst-Irving schools on the east.

That, my friend, is a pretty healthy-sized region. If you visualize it on the state map, you'll see that the region takes in just about half of the state's area.

The Amarillo schools involved in the playoffs have a pretty good "break" this time around. They are playing teams from Midland and San Angelo in the playoffs, and the games are being played in Lubbock.

Not too many years ago, the winner of the Amarillo 5-A district was obliged to play El Paso schools in bi-district competition. That happened a couple of times when Hereford represented the district. That's a pretty good trip, just to meet the "neighboring district."

It's 410 miles from Amarillo to El Paso, and 620 miles from El Paso to Dallas. That's Region I for the class 5-A system. Now, let's look at Region III.

Region III for 5-A schools is virtually encompassed by the city of Houston. The only district winner outside greater Houston in that region is Port Arthur Jefferson.

Eight of the 16 district winners are schools with Houston in their names. Others, such as Katy, Deer Park and Aldine, all are on the perimeter of Houston.

Thus, the teams in the playoffs in Region III can play for three weeks and never leave the confines of Houston (unless they have to make the 45-mile trip to Port Arthur).

When schools in our area make the playoffs, they think in terms of making a "trip" to the playoffs, and it really is a trip.

Glenna Holt Picks 18, Claims Prize

Contestants in the Friona Star's football contest hit another of those weeks when the favorites had a tough time coming out on top.

But despite this, a few contestants managed to post decent scores.

One of them, Glenna Holt, came up with an 18, and won the weekly first prize and \$10 cash.

Only three other contestants had scores of 17, and two of these claimed the other two weekly prizes. Ansel McDowell of Hereford took second place on the basis of the Friona-Floydada tiebreaker score.

Nancy Jackson won third place on her score prediction. Roger Fields was the other contestant scoring a 17. He missed out on a cash prize by the margin of six points.

McDowell picked Friona to win, 21-6, missing the actual score by eight points. Mrs. Jackson picked the Chiefs, 27-7, and was 11 points away. Fields picked Friona, 27-13, missing by 17.

In the race for grand prize, Buford Hartwick pulled into a tie for the lead with Patches Fleming, after posting a score of 15 for the

week. Fleming and Hartwick lead the pack with scores of 160.

Jack Clark, Phillip Johnson, Donita Martin, Vicky Moss and Charlie Morgan are next at 157. Danny Stevens and Joe Tongate are a point back at 156. Then come Jim Beard, Jo Blackwell, Mike Field, Jayn Looper and Jackie Morgan.

Glenna Holt's misses were Idalou-Seminole, SMU-Notre Dame, Alabama-LSU, Denver-San Diego; L.A. Rams-New Orleans and Dallas-L.A. Raiders.

McDowell also missed the Idalou, Alabama, Denver, Rams and Dallas games, along with UCLA-Stanford and Seattle-Kansas City.

Mrs. Jackson missed Dimmitt-Mulshoe, Alabama-LSU, Steelers-Bills, Broncos-Chargers, Rams-Saints, Chiefs-Seahawks and Cowboys-Raiders.

Counting the current week, three weekends remain in the contest. The entrants are shooting for the grand prize of \$100 to be awarded at the conclusion of the 13-week event, in addition to the \$22.50 in weekly cash prizes.

The Friona Chieftains will face the Perryton Rangers in a bi-district football playoff game Friday, November 14, at 8 p.m. at Amarillo's Dick Bivins Stadium.

The Chieftains, 8-2, represent District 2-3A as the district's second-seeded team. Perryton, 7-2, won the top seed in District 1-3A. Both Perryton and Childress had 4-1 district records, but the Rangers beat Childress in their head-to-head meeting.

Coach Tommy Moss said this week that the Chieftains are excited about their prospects of making the playoffs. He thought the Chiefs matched up with the Rangers pretty closely.

"They remind you considerably of Littlefield," Coach Moss said.

The Chieftains had their spirits boosted this week by the return of runningback-safety Lance Gatlin, who suffered a broken ankle in the homecoming win over Pampa.

Gatlin was released for possible play last week by his doctor. However, he was held out of action so that he could get back into physical shape.

Lineman John Cass, who has been coming on strong for the Chieftains, suffered a broken finger in the team's win over Floydada, but was expected to be able to play with a special hand cast.

Otherwise, the team will be at near peak strength for the game. Linebacker Peter Malouf is on crutches from his recent knee surgery. Lineback Albert Trevino is at full strength. Malouf and Trevino have both been hobbled by injuries this season.

The Harris Rating System rated Friona a three-point favorite over the Rangers in the game. In their weekly ratings, Friona was rated 18th in the state for class AAA teams. Perryton was ranked 26th.

Friona has been ranked around 34th for most of the season, and this is thought to be the first time Friona has been in the state's top 20 teams since competing in class AAA.

Perryton brings a 7-2 record into the game. The Rangers were limited to nine games due to the

late re-alignment announcement. One of their district members, Canadian, was dropped a classification, and Perryton could only come up with four non-district games as a result.

The Rangers are led by 210-pound tailback Mike McKinley, all-state as a junior. McKinley has gained over 4500 yards in his three-year varsity career.

The Perryton star gained 1446 yards in this year's nine-game season. He had over 1700 yards a year ago in ten games.

The Rangers are in their fifth straight playoff appearance. They have met District 2-3A's runnerup team each of the last four years, and won only last year over Tulia.

Perryton's only losses have been to class 4A Borger, 15-8, and to River Road, 29-15.

In their game with Borger, the score was tied, 8-all until Borger

scored with 1:45 left on a long run.

Perryton's other non-district wins were over Dumas, 41-0; Liberal, Kansas, 42-6; and Canadian, 35-0.

Behind McKinley is fullback Harvey Land, who has gained 177 yards. McKinley has scored 19 touchdowns and Land two.

Perryton quarterback Derek Holmes has completed 44 per cent of his passes, 38 of 85, for an average of 16.5 per completion and eight touchdowns.

Lance Tigrett, split end, is the leading receiver with 17 catches for 305 yards and four TDs. Tight end Craig Wright has caught seven for 108 yards and two scores.

On offense, Perryton is averaging 328 yards per game and averaging 30 points. They have allowed an average of 129 yards rushing and 87 yards passing or 216 yards per game.

Friona will match up well size-wise. Perryton averages 188 pounds per man on offense. The defense averages from 180 to 210, depending on the group that's in the game.

Area Gets Below Zero Chill Here

The Friona area was hit by a wintry blast on Wednesday of this week, when an Arctic front blew through, bringing chill factor readings of up to 15 degrees below zero, and by far the coldest weather of the season.

Luckily, the blast brought no additional moisture to speak of. Some snow flakes were blown about on Wednesday, and a threat of snow was forecast for Thursday.

The temperature dropped from 38 degrees at 7 a.m. Wednesday steadily throughout the day. The low on Thursday morning was 14 degrees.

With some farmers still trying to get their corn, maize, sugar beets, and cotton harvested, most folks are hoping for a return to warm, dry weather.

As the calendar still lacks over a month until winter officially arrives, the question might be posed "What will we have when it really gets here?"

55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 6, 1931

Another firm of grain dealers has recently been organized in Friona, and is composed of O.G. Taylor and E.B. McLellan, and the new firm proposes to make grain, especially grain in the head, bring all it should for the farmers in this locality. They do their weighing at the Farmers Elevator, and their office is wherever they may be found, with their shingle hung on their car window.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 6, 1936

To date, the cotton census report shows that there were 349 bales of cotton ginned in Parmer County from the 1936 crop prior to October 18, as compared to 213 bales ginned by the same date in 1935.

On Thursday night of last week, the Friona Chiefs met the valiant team from Melrose, N.M. on their own grid, and came out with their first victory of the season, by a 37-0 score.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 7, 1941

One of the most apparent signs of the steady progress of Friona is completion of the new building erected by Dr. R.J. McReynolds, adjoining his residence on Main Street and housing Friona's new clinic. It is a neat and roomy structure, and houses a reception room, four bedrooms for patients, a consultation room, private office, operating room and X-ray laboratory.

Two Friona businesses have planned promotions of interest to the public in the coming week. T&H Service Station, the new Texaco station, will have its formal openings Saturday and Mary's Cafe will be open for business on Monday. The new service station is located on Friona's recently widened Highway 60. Mary's Cafe, owned by Mary Pilgrim and Hayden Cayson, is in the Welch-Shackelford development in western Friona, just off Highway 60.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 1, 1961

The budget committee for Friona's 1962 Community Chest Campaign discussed and accepted quotas for the drive in a meeting Tuesday. The actual drive will not begin until later this month. A budget totaling \$5,880.00 was adopted, according to Robert R. Ginsberg, chairman of this year's drive.

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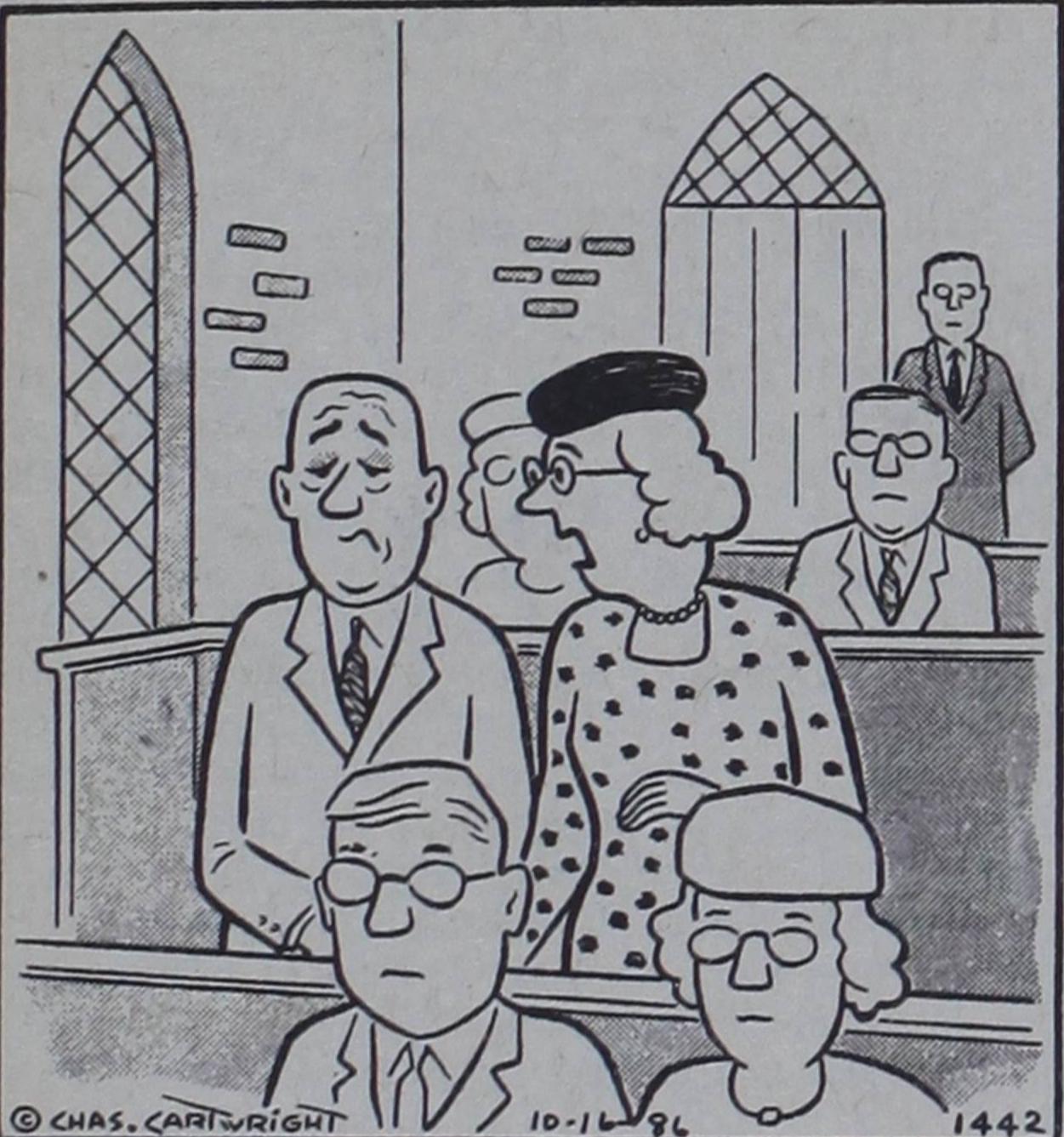

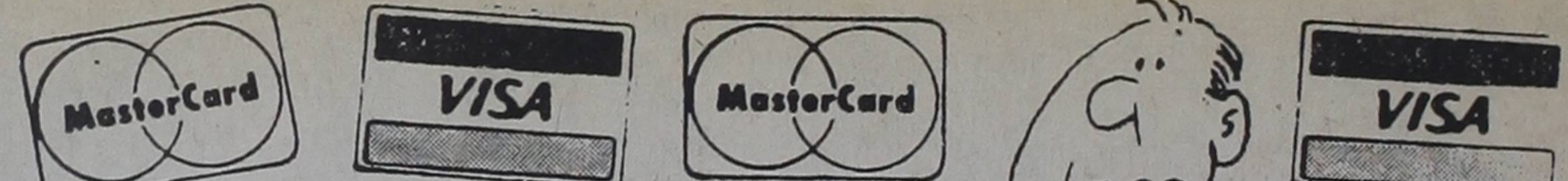

Fatal Crashes Kill 84 In District 5

In 1985, 84 persons were killed in automobile crashes in the 17-county District Five of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, according to Mel Pope, District Engineer, of Lubbock. This number is 23 less than the number of persons killed in automobile crashes in the district in 1984. However, traffic accidents have increased in the district from 10,669 in 1984 to 11,733 in 1985.

"Traffic safety education and seat belt laws have been contributing factors to the decrease in fatalities," Pope said.

"Alcohol, speeding, not wearing seat belts and apathy seem to still be our greatest problems," Pope said.

There were 164 accidents in Parmer County alone, one of which was fatal, with one person being killed during 1985.

To further help to bring down the great number of accidents and fatalities, the SDH&PT will be working more closely with local traffic officials, police departments, and schools for education of the community as a whole.

The city of Lubbock has a grant of \$34,907.38 this year from the Department for a DWI Selective Traffic Enforcement Project (STEP). These funds are used to pay salaries for personnel at 20 specific locations in Lubbock where a DWI problem exists. Captain Gordon Hoffman is the coordinator for the project.

Lubbock County has a grant of \$205,438.00 from the SDH&PT for the FY 1986-87 for an anti-DWI (anti Driving While Intoxicated) project in the county. The project is designed to improve the apprehension, adjudication,

prosecution, rehabilitation, and treatment of DWI offenders. Jim Freeman is the coordinator for this project.

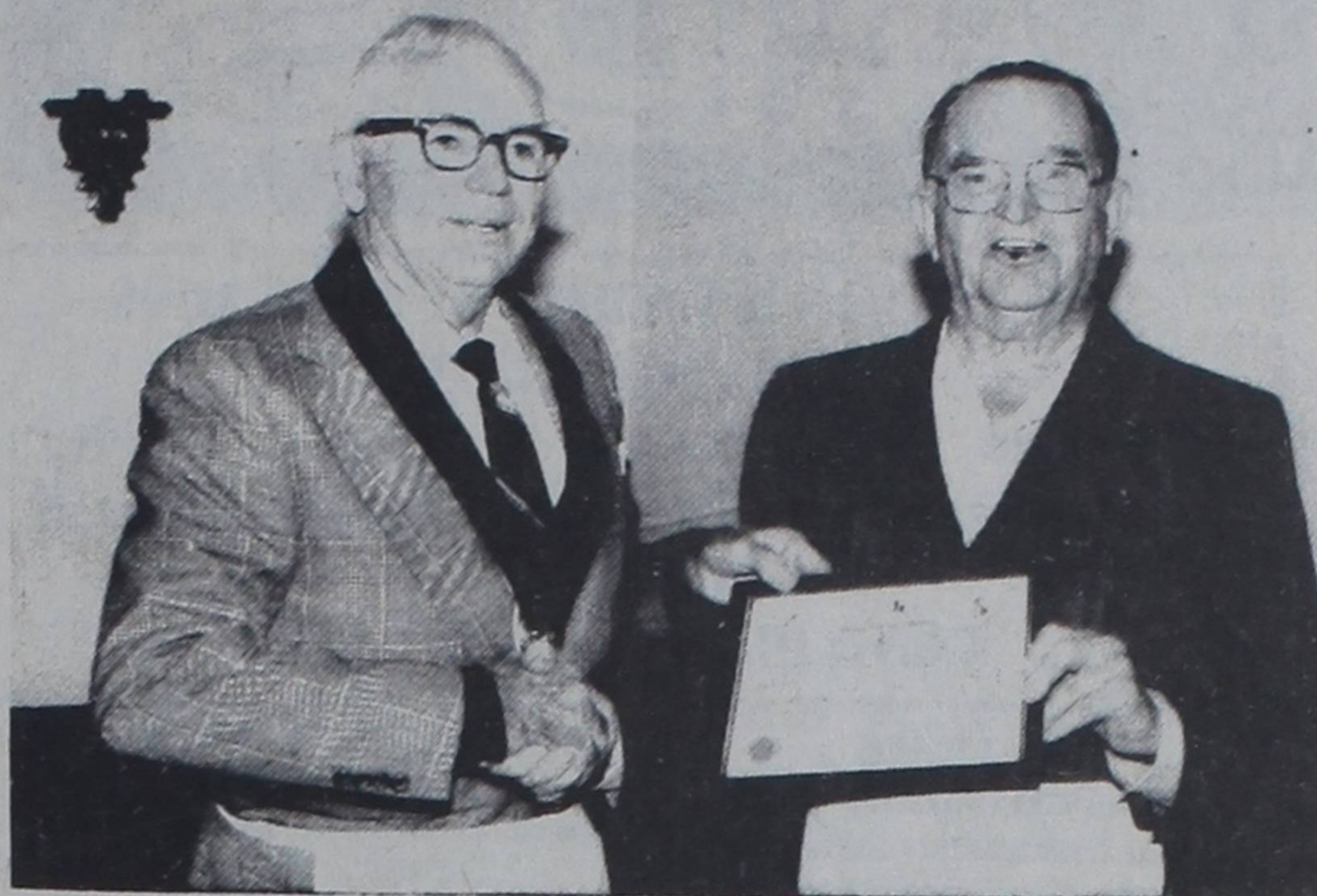
The Health Education Department at Texas Tech University has a grant from the SDH&PT for \$28,044.00 for the 1986-87 fiscal year to educate the public on wearing seat belts in the nine-county area surrounding Lubbock. Education reinforces the laws recently passed. John Morehead is the coordinator for the project at Tech.

The SDH&PT has available a Project Graduation kit to help high school seniors have a chemical-free graduation party. This kit shows students, teachers and parents how to make chemical-free graduation parties so enticing that everyone will want to attend. Two hundred high schools in Texas had such graduation parties last year. There were 36 such parties in the 17-county Lubbock district. Kits are available at the SDH&PT District office.

"We are making an effort to reduce our traffic problem and save lives. If people would obey the laws, wear safety belts, eliminate drunk driving and use caution and good judgment in driving," Pope said, "our fatalities would drop tremendously."

"Safety precautions are used in building our highways," Pope said. "We would like to see our motorists drive with that same kind of precaution."

Check Vehicles For Their Winter Needs

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminds motorists that the winter season is upon us, and it's time once again to get both the driver and the vehicle in the best possible condition for this most grueling driving season.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5, said, "Winter driving can be very hazardous. Drivers are faced with many dangerous obstacles: nights are longer, freezing temperatures, snow, sleet and ice covered roads, all creating handicaps for the driver."

The most important safety tip for winter driving is to "slow down." On ice covered roads, only drive when it's necessary and realize that it's going to take you at least twice as long to cover that same distance that you drove when the road was dry and clear of ice.

So, remember to set more time aside for driving under winter conditions.

When temperatures drop below the freezing point, drivers must guard against reduced visibility caused by frosted windows and windshields. Allow your car's engine to warm up and for the defroster to become effective before driving. Be sure your windows and headlights are clear and free of any obstructions like snow or mud. Do all this in advance, before you hit the road.

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminds you that the hazards of winter driving can be reduced. It's in your hands, the defensive driver, to make for a safer winter.



Litter Signs Are Popular

The state's tough-talking antilitter program has made litterbugs and bumper stickers touting "Don't Mess With Texas" so popular that the Highway Department has trouble keeping them in stock.

Texans who missed getting a litterbag or bumper strip will now find them available free at all State Department of Highways and Public Transportation offices and Texas Tourist Bureaus.

"We distributed one million litterbags and 500,000 bumper strips in a two-month period when they were first introduced last spring. Initially, we expected that quantity to last us six to eight months, but we just couldn't keep them in stock," said Don Clark, director of travel and information with the Highway Department.

"We are encouraged by their popularity. Research indicates that states with active litterbag distribution, combined with a strong public awareness program, are making major progress in reducing litter," Clark said.

Last month, the Highway Department released figures showing that litter had declined 29 per cent since the "Don't Mess With Texas" program was implemented.

The "Don't Mess With Texas" slogan has proved so popular that several entrepreneurs are now selling t-shirts and caps bearing the logo.

"We've even heard that some people are selling our free litterbags and bumper strips," Clark said. "But why buy what you can get free?"

Texas Tourist Bureaus are located in Amarillo, Anthony, Austin, Denison, Gainesville, Langtry, Laredo, Orange, Texarkana, Harlingen, Waskom and Wichita Falls. Offices of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation are located throughout Texas, with at least one in most Texas counties.

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Land Bank's Rates Slated To Decline

Farmers and ranchers who finance with the Federal Land Bank of Texas will pay lower interest rates beginning December 1.

Variable interest rates on long-term farm and ranch land loans will be 10.75 per cent, down from 11 per cent. Rural residence and farm-related business loans will decrease to 11.25 per cent, down from 11.50 per cent.

According to Bill Liles, president of the Federal Land Bank of Muleshoe, the reduction, due to the drop in money cost, will save Texas farmers and ranchers more than \$6 million a year in interest.

The bank and its 44 Federal Land Bank Associations have more than \$2.5 billion outstanding to 40,000 Texas farmers and ranchers for terms of up to 30 years.

"Lower interest rates will give Land Bank borrowers some financial relief," says Liles. "We feel that each time we bring interest rates down even a few basis points, we are helping stabilize the overall farm economy and Texas land prices, in particular."

Since August 1 the bank has lowered interest rates ¼ of 1 per cent. This represents almost \$19

million a year less in interest rates for farmers, according to Liles.

"The Texas Land Bank mortgage loan portfolio continues to earn money," Liles said. "Almost 98 per cent of our loans are current. Only two per cent or about \$4 million of our loans are delinquent. We view this as acceptable considering the bank has \$2.5 billion in loans outstanding."

Liles warned that even though the Land Bank continues to make money, third quarter earnings will be negative because of aid to other ailing Farm Credit districts. He emphasized, however, that recent legislation passed for the Farm Credit System would alter these figures. Special accounting methods and spreading losses over a 20-year period will allow the bank to reverse some payables to other districts, changing year-end earnings for the bank significantly, the association president said.

The Land Bank, this year, has averaged almost \$2 million a month in net earnings, before aid to other districts and loan loss reserves.





SPS Agreement To Help Irrigators

Irrigation customers of South Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. of Lubbock, Texas, and Bailey County Electric Association of Muleshoe, could benefit from an experimental rate structure agreed to by the cooperatives and Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The rate structure is pending approval by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC).

The arrangement would allow the cooperatives to surpass their target demands for electricity without increasing their cost of electricity per kilowatt-hour or interrupting service to their irrigation customers, said J.C. Roberts, general manager of South Plains cooperative, and Duane Lloyd, general manager of Bailey County cooperative.

SPS supplies wholesale power to the cooperatives.

Under the existing rate structure, the cooperatives interrupt service to irrigation customers when a target peak demand is reached. This is done because the cooperatives' electric bills for the next year are based in part on the peak demand during each preceding summer. The concept is that classes of customers who cause the need for more power plant capacity to meet brief peaks in electric usage should pay their fair share for the cost of additional capacity, said Gary Gibson, SPS vice president-marketing.

The experimental rate structure is possible because there is ample electric generating capacity available due to the completion last year of SPS' Tolk Station power plant unit number two near

Muleshoe, Gibson said.

Under the new rate structure, prices effective September 1986 through August 1987 would be based on the target or actual peak demand—whichever is lower—that occurred from June through August 1986. Thus, if farmers need to irrigate this summer more than the cooperatives' target amount, they wouldn't risk having their service interrupted simply because demand is exceeding the target.

South Plains Electric Cooperative serves 5,570 irrigation wells. Bailey County Electric Association serves 2,449 irrigation wells.

This rate structure would be instituted on a one-year basis. After one year, the electric cooperatives and SPS will review the effectiveness of the program.

The two electric cooperatives and SPS applied to FERC for the new rate structure on July 9. A ruling is expected later this summer. FERC regulates wholesale sales by SPS to electric cooperatives.

South Plains Electric Cooperative provides electric service to portions of the City of Lubbock, and in the counties of Crosby, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock and Lynn.

Bailey County Electric Association serves customers in Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Lamb and Parmer counties.

SPS provides electric service to a population of about one million in a 52,000-square-mile area of eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

Six Flags Finishes Excellent Season

Six Flags Over Texas has ended its regular 1986 season on a positive note. Attendance at the Arlington theme park was up despite a rainy spring and a shorter season.

Attendance exceeded 2,575,000 persons, an increase of nearly 50,000 visitors over 1985's figure.

General Manager Bob Bennett credited Six Flags' 25th anniversary celebration, the Texas Sesquicentennial and low gas prices for the increase. "The results are particularly impressive when you consider that we lost seven weekends to rain in the spring and the fact that we closed three weeks earlier than usual."

Those three weeks will be used to prepare Six Flags for its second annual Holiday In The Park event.

The Christmas festival which begins its 1986 run the day after Thanksgiving features special

holiday shows, lavish decorations, foods of the season and opportunities for shopping.

Most of the park's rides are closed during the event. This year, however, the new Avalanche Bobsled and the Six Flags Railroad will be open. A sledding hill covered with tons of icy artificial snow will also be featured.

P. Weatherly Inducted Into Honor Society

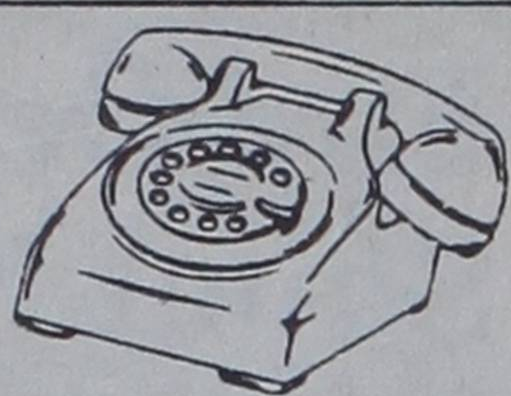

Chiefs Play Well In Win Over Whirlwinds

The Friona Chieftains scored a 23-0 victory over the Floydada Whirlwinds at Floydada last Friday night. The win enabled the Chieftains to qualify for the state playoffs, thanks to Littlefield's 16-7 win over Tulia.

The win also equalled Friona High School's most wins in one season, at 8-2. This record has been achieved just three other times.

Thanks to some untimely flags, the margin of victory was probably held down somewhat. In the early going, every time the Chiefs had a nice run, a flag would call the play back for a penalty.

The Chieftains drove across midfield on their first possession, but a holding penalty spoiled the drive.

Late in the first quarter, Floydada faced a third down and 21 from their own 13. The Chieftains stopped the quarterback on a roll-out, but was called for a personal foul. That should have brought up a fourth and six after the 15-yard penalty, but the officials gave Floydada a first down.

Finally, things began to click for the Chieftains in the second quarter. Jimmy Williams, running from the tailback slot as Coach Tommy Moss sought to give Lonnie Phillips a bit of a "breather" in the game, gained good yardage, picking up a pair of first downs to the Floydada 43.

Then Williams ran 12 yards to the Floydada 26. After another holding penalty moved Friona backwards 10 yards, Williams broke up the middle for 34 yards and a touchdown. Floydada broke through to block Montoya's point-after kick, but Friona had a 6-0 lead with 8:34 left in the first half.

Floydada began a drive at their own 20 that went into Chieftain territory before the Friona defense stiffened.

Albert Trevino stopped the fullback for a three-yard loss, and Jeff Chaney sacked the Whirlwind quarterback to force a Floydada punt. The 'Winds had controlled the ball for over seven minutes of

clock time but could not score.

Friona took over the ball with just 1:34 left before halftime.

Phillips gained 11 yards, Williams six and Phillips five as Friona moved to midfield. Friona used its time outs to stop the clock.

Quarterback Daniel Echols fired a perfect pass to Phillips, who caught the ball at the Floydada 13 with five seconds left on the clock.

After a time out (plus another from Floydada for good measure), Montoya came on to kick a perfect 30-yard field goal, to send the Chieftains to halftime leading, 9-0.

The Chiefs have suffered from "third quarter slump" in some of their games, but they didn't in this one.

The second time they had the ball, they started on their own 29-yard line. Williams gained 11 yards and then 19, to move the ball to the 46 yard line.

Phillips picked up a first down with a 14-yard run, and then another with a two-yard run to the Floydada 34.

From here, Echols ran a bootleg play and dashed 34 yards for the score, to extend Friona's lead to 15-0. Montoya's kick went a shade wide.

After the kickoff, Floydada couldn't move and had to punt. The punter shanked the ball only to the Whirlwind 42, giving Friona the ball in great field position.

Phillips ran ten yards to the 30, and Williams ran 22 yards to the Whirlwind 18.

Three plays later, Echols again kept the ball and circled right end for a 16-yard scoring jaunt.

Shy Burney took the snap and elected to run the ball in for two points, making it for a 23-0 score. The TD came on the third play of the final quarter.

The Chieftains later drove from their own 32 to the Floydada eight. Coach Moss began letting his starters rest up. On a third and two play from the Floydada eight, the Chieftains fumbled a snap from center, and lost that scoring opportunity.

Ben Osborn came in during the drive to post two good gains.

Friona had the ball in the latter stages of the game again. With Patches Fleming calling signals, the team again drove within the Whirlwind 20. Terry Widner had a couple of nice runs. Time expired with the ball at the Floydada 17, and the happy Chieftains content to count off the final seconds.

Williams led the ground-gainers with 172 yards in 21 carries. Phillips still had an even 100 yards though used sparingly. Echols added 47 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

The Chieftain defense once again played a bang-up game. They only allowed Floydada to cross the midfield stripe twice. The 'Winds made it only to the Friona 40 in the first half, and to the 43 in the second half.

Stats Show Balanced Offensive Attack

The Friona Chieftains have a balanced offensive attack, according to season statistics tabulated this week for the ten regular-season games by the team.

Three backfield men have gained over 600 yards going into the bi-district game. Lonnie Phillips leads the pack with 1053 yards on 170 carries.

Jimmy Williams has added 818 yards on 160 carries, and quarterback Daniel Echols has gained 616 yards on 87 carries.

As a team, the Chieftains have gained 2708 yards rushing, and have averaged 5.8 yards per carry this season. In district games alone, the Chieftains gained 1567 yards on the ground, and averaged over six yards per carry as a team.

The team's scoring leadership has been about as evenly divided as it possibly could be.

Both Daniel Echols and Lonnie Phillips have scored 11 touchdowns in ten games. But Echols has a two-point conversion run, to lead with 68 points, with Phillips at 66.

Fullback Jimmy Williams has scored nine TDs, and has 54 points. Sam Montoya, with eight field goals and 19 point-after kicks, has 43 points.

The Chieftains had their top three scorers listed in the South Plains area's top ten scoring leaders for the season, published this week by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

The A-J's statistics varied a little from ours, showing Echols with 74 points and ranked sixth in the area; Phillips with 66 points and ranked ninth, and Williams with 54 points and ranked tenth.

Phillips, with 1053 yards (or 1104, depending on whose figures you use), ranked sixth in the area, just ahead of Tulia's Stephen Powell. Phillips was the leading ground-gainer in District 2-AAA with 105 yards per game.

As a team, Friona had a commanding lead over its ten season opponents, in spite of playing a much-improved schedule this season.

The Chieftains gained an average of 296.3 yards per game, seventh best on the South Plains, and gave up 181 yards per outing, third best behind Roosevelt and Denver City.

Friona has been a "fourth quarter" team, with its biggest point production coming in this quarter, 98. The third quarter has been the team's worst, as they scored only 16 points after intermission in regular-season games.

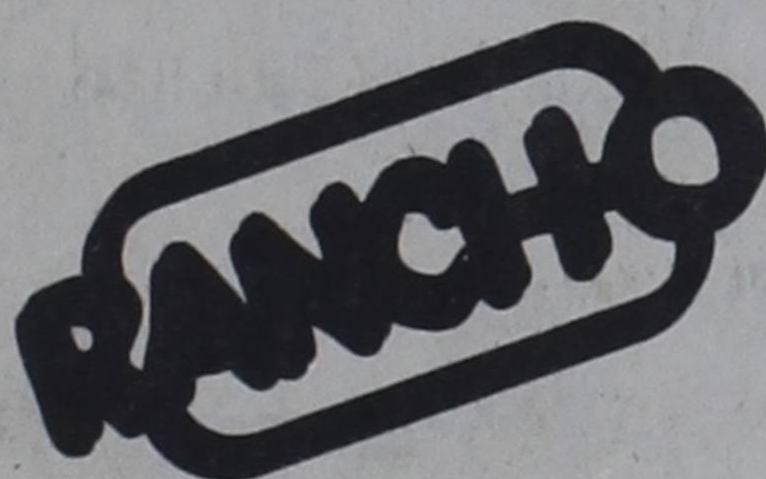
A report was given concerning the heating system at the hospital. Part of the system is out and the Auxiliary will use part of their rummage sale money for repairs or replacement of heaters.
