ONE OF THE NEW fads seems to be "subliminal tapes," which have been produced in cassette form, to provide impetus for everything from losing weight to stopping smoking.

One national bookstore chain reports that one-third of all cassette tape sales fall into the category of subliminal persuasion or self-hypnosis.

Subliminal means "below the threshold," imperceptible to the conscious mind. Most people using the tapes play them at night when they go to bed, and let the taped message "talk them to sleep."

According to University of London psychologist Norman Dixon, subliminal programming is predicated on the belief that the brain receives far more sensory data than we realize, and that we actually retain some of them in our subconscious without realizing that we do.

Thus, words or pictures flashed so fast that we can't recall seeing them, or words spoken at such low volumes as to evoke no conscious memory may influence what we do.

The "subliminal" craze began in the late 1950s at a New Jersey theater when rapidly flashing words were inserted into a showing of a movie, allegedly resulting in a run on the snack bar. Since then, researchers have repeatedly tried—mostly in vain—to show that subliminal stimuli can affect human behavior to a significant degree.

Some large department stores have reportedly experimented with subliminal messages, which were broadcast along with the store's background music in an attempt to combat shoplifting.

Stimuli below the awareness level can have measurable effects on heart rate, muscle tone and blood pressure, but that does not necessarily mean they influence conscious thought or behaviour.

In one experiment, Dr. Lloyd Silverman of New York University used subliminal phrases to stimulate fantasies that reinforced conscious wishes of patients to lose weight. A more rigidly controlled study of subliminal stop-smoking tapes, currently underway at the University of Washington's Addiction Research Center, may give us some more hard data.

But so far, no research has shown convincingly that subliminal messages can make us modify our lives.

To buy a subliminal tape, then, requires a leap of faith, and that may be the main draw—not what they actually do, but what buyers expect them to do. The act of purchasing the tapes may reinforce a conscious resolution that the buyer has previously made.

Perhaps it's just as well that the subliminal influence isn't as easy to work as some would have you believe. There are always those, perhaps enemies of our country, who might use this tactic to disrupt our country.

And maybe this is what the national news media is doing at the present time in regards to the Iran arms controversy!?!?

School Dismisses For Xmas Break

Friona schools turned out for the Christmas holidays on Friday by dismissing an hour early (2:45 p.m.).

The local schools will dismiss for two full weeks. Classes will resume at the regular time on Monday, January 5.

Johnston Resigns School Board Seat

Mostly routine items were discussed by the Friona School Board at its regular meeting recently.

A main item was the resignation of board member Bryan Johnston, who will be leaving Friona at the end of the year.

Johnston had two years remaining on a three-year term. The board decided to operate as a six-member board until April, at which time Johnston's two-year unexpired term will be open for anyone wishing to seek it.

In other business, the board voted to cooperate with the Social Security System in getting Social Security numbers for all children. According to new tax regulations, it soon will be necessary for all children to have SS numbers in order that they might be claimed as deductions on their parents' tax

returns. The school will be sending out information along this line.

A report was given on two monitoring visits by the Texas Education Agency recently. One was on Bilingual and English as a Second Language, and the other was on Child and Nutrition and Food Services.

"The reports were generally good. The district is working on some minor corrections and violations," said Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

The school's 1985-86 audit was given by Bernie Gowens of Brown, Graham and Company, and was approved by the board.

The tax report was given, indicating collection of nine per cent of the 1986-87 roll as of the end of November. Jarboe also gave routine reports on the school funds.

Court Has Mainly Routine Business

The Parmer County Commissioners approved payment of fees for distribution of \$3,640 pounds of commodities during the month of October. A handling fee of two cents per pound is charged. This

came to \$1,072.80 for October. A motion was approved unanimously to pay the boarding care bills for the county's foster children, in the amount of \$3,570.00. This amount is reimbursed to the county.

A bill from Richard Collard for Bryan Johnston serving as attorney ad item for a juvenile, was approved, in the amount of \$526.

The county clerk and county judge have each received copies of a "Petition for Redress of Grievances" from the Texas Rural Legal Aid department. Judge Porter Roberts is in the process of getting copies of indigent policies from other counties in order to make a study to try to come up with a written policy for the county on aid to indigents.

Appointment of a "jury of view" for a new road was made. Members are Russell O'Brian, chairman, Vernon Brown, Thomas Mason, Jr., Dale Milner and Dee Willard. They are to check the proposed road area and report to the court the amount of damages, if any, to be awarded to the landholders.

Soil work for three county farms was approved. Cost of the work is paid by those receiving it.

Lighting Winners Are Told

Winners of the Chamber of Commerce's Christmas lighting contest were announced this week.

Winner of the residential division was the Dale Houlette residence at 804 West Sixth Street. The Bill Thornton residence at Black placed second, and the Gaye Tannahill residence at 1615 West 10th, placed third.

In the "lights only" division, the Wesley Barnett residence, three miles east on Highway 60, was the winner.

The top three residential entries received \$100, \$50 and \$25. The Barnetts received \$50. Only one prize was awarded in that division.

Three Chieftains, Coach Are Honored

Four members of the Friona Chieftains' bi-district champion 1986 football team have been honored by the All-South Plains class AAA team announced this week.

Tackle Jeff Chaney made both the offensive and defensive teams. Shy Burney made the defensive team as a defensive back. Sam Montoya was named both as the defensive team's punter and the offensive team's place-kicker.

In addition, Coach Tommy Moss, who coached the Chieftains to a new high in wins (9-3) and guided the football Chiefs to a new

plateau in the playoffs, was named as the class AAA "Coach of the Year" on the South Plains.

Chaney, who has been offered a scholarship by the University of Nebraska, led the team in tackles.

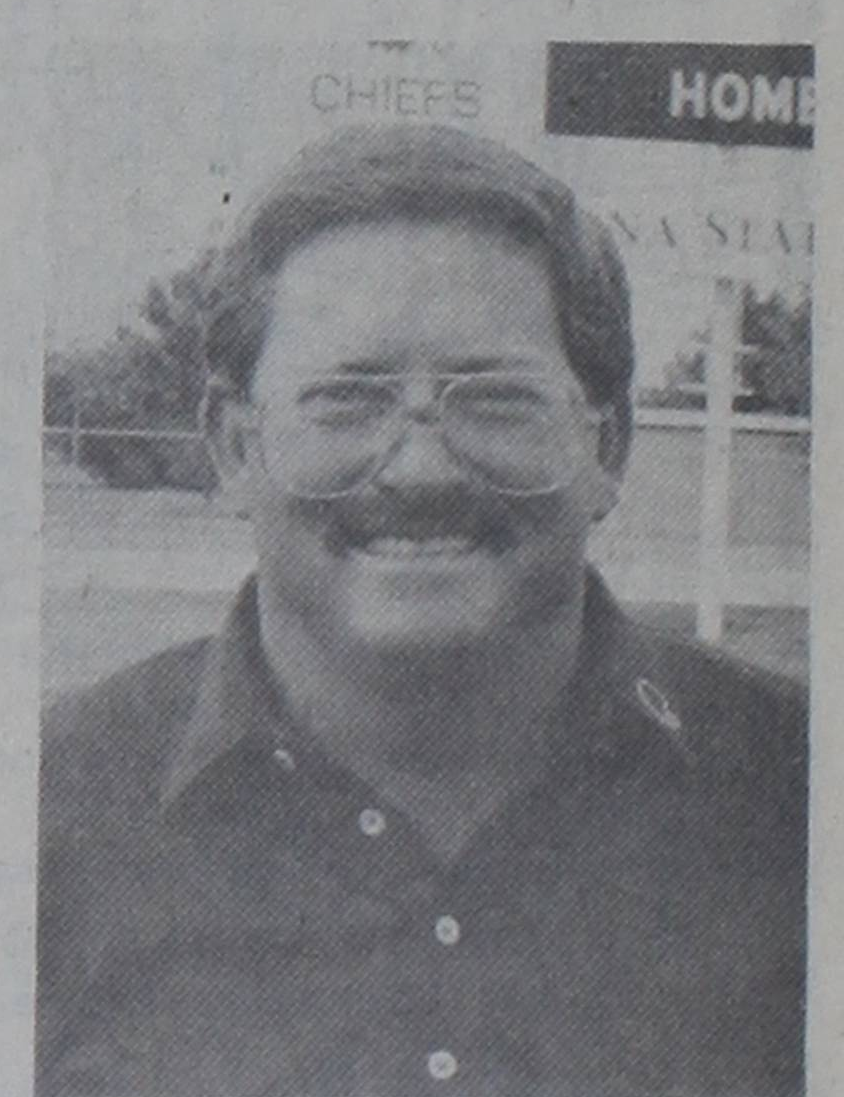
Burney for the second year was the team leader in pass interceptions, and had 17 in his varsity career.

Area Gets Snowfall

The first major snowfall of the season was received in the local area on Wednesday night. From four to six inches of snow was received.

The snow came down with very little wind, and when residents awoke on Thursday, the white stuff was stacked neatly on tree limbs, shrubs, fences, etc.

The snow was very wet in nature, and should have deposited about a half-inch of moisture. The calendar year of 1986 is going down as the wettest year on record in most places in this area.

The snowfall had ended by noon Thursday, and melting was well underway. It was pretty well gone from streets and highways by the day's end. Friday was clear and sunny, so much of the remainder of the snow should have melted by sundown on Friday.

However, forecasters are calling for another chance for snow in the area Saturday and Sunday.

The snow again called a halt to the harvest activities. A good many acres of sugar beets remain in the fields, along with some cotton.

55 YEARS AGO--DEC. 18, 1931
S.F. Warren, Friona's leading poultry breeder, took a number of his prize-winning Rhode Island Reds to the Slaton poultry show last week, and bore away a number of the best prizes. This is the fourth show he has attended, all with good results. The others were the Tri-State Fair, Amarillo; South Plains Fair, Lubbock; and Tri-County Fair, Hereford.

45 YEARS AGO--DEC. 18, 1936
O.C. Jones this week announces the opening of a Dodge-Plymouth agency here in Friona, with office and show rooms at his garage on Euclid Avenue. Mr. Jones will include at his agency both sales and service, and will also carry a stock of parts for these two popular makes of cars. Mr. Jones is a member of our city commission and one of our prominent machinist citizens.

45 YEARS AGO--DEC. 19, 1941
Parmer County farmers are being urged to check over their farm machinery at once in order to see what necessary repairs can be made before spring planting, and then get their order for repairs and parts in the hands of their dealers at the earliest possible moment. Farmers also have been asked to assist in the national scrap iron collection campaign, to help supply iron and steel scraps to speed war industries.

40 YEARS AGO--DEC. 13, 1946
At a regular meeting of the city commission Monday night at the city office, the city officials decided that the city was in need of an official nightwatchman, and accordingly, C.M. (Charley) Jones was secured for the position. His appointment was made to become effective at once.

County commissioners F.T. Schlenker of Precinct 2, and W.H. Flippin of Precinct 1, accompanied by Mrs. Schueler and Mrs. Flippin, spent a part of last week at San Antonio, attending the state convention of County Judges and Commissioners.

Hereford Teen's Death Mars Pheasant Season

The opening of pheasant season was marred early Sunday morning when Patrick Hund, 14, died from a gunshot wound after a hunting accident at the family residence, 1.5 miles north on Progressive Road and one mile east.

The Hereford teenager died at 10:40 a.m. Sunday at Deaf Smith General Hospital about 2½ hours after the accidental shooting. Game Warden Chuck Cosper said it was the first fatality for the local pheasant season in many years.

Justice of the Peace Johnnie Turrentine ruled the death accidental. She said investigation revealed that a hunting companion's .410 shotgun malfunctioned, and the blast hit one of two .20 gauge shells that Hund had in his left pocket. The shell in his pocket exploded and struck vital organs in his side.

Mass for Patrick was conducted at 11 a.m. Tuesday in St. Anthony's Catholic Church with the Rev. Pat Walsh, pastor, officiating. Assisting was the Rev. Joe Egan, associate pastor, and the Rev. Bernard McGorry, a Catholic priest from Friona.

Burial was in St. Anthony's Catholic Cemetery under the direction of Rix Funeral Directors of Hereford.

Patrick was born in Amarillo and was a student at Stanton Junior High School. He was active in football and basketball. He was a member of St. Anthony's

Church and the St. Anthony's Knights of the Altar.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Hund, Sr. of Hereford; a sister, Tina Adams of Hereford; a brother, Michael of Hereford; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C.W. James of Comanche and Mrs. G.W. Hund of Hereford; and great-grandmother, Mrs. Joe Jesko of Hereford.

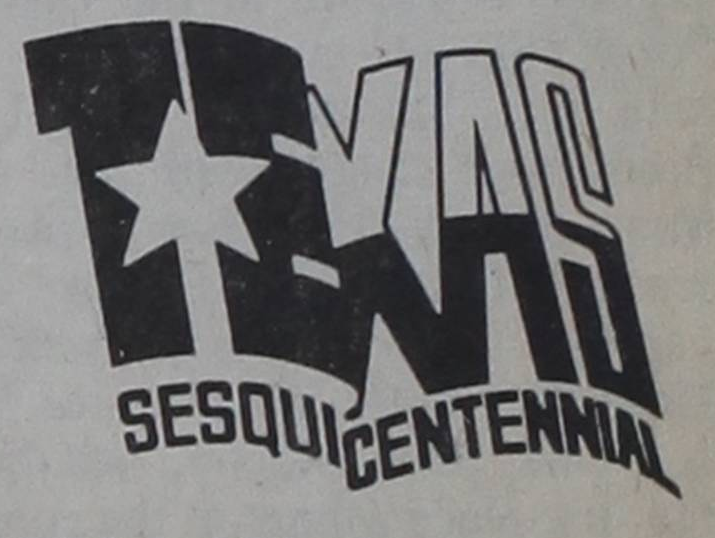

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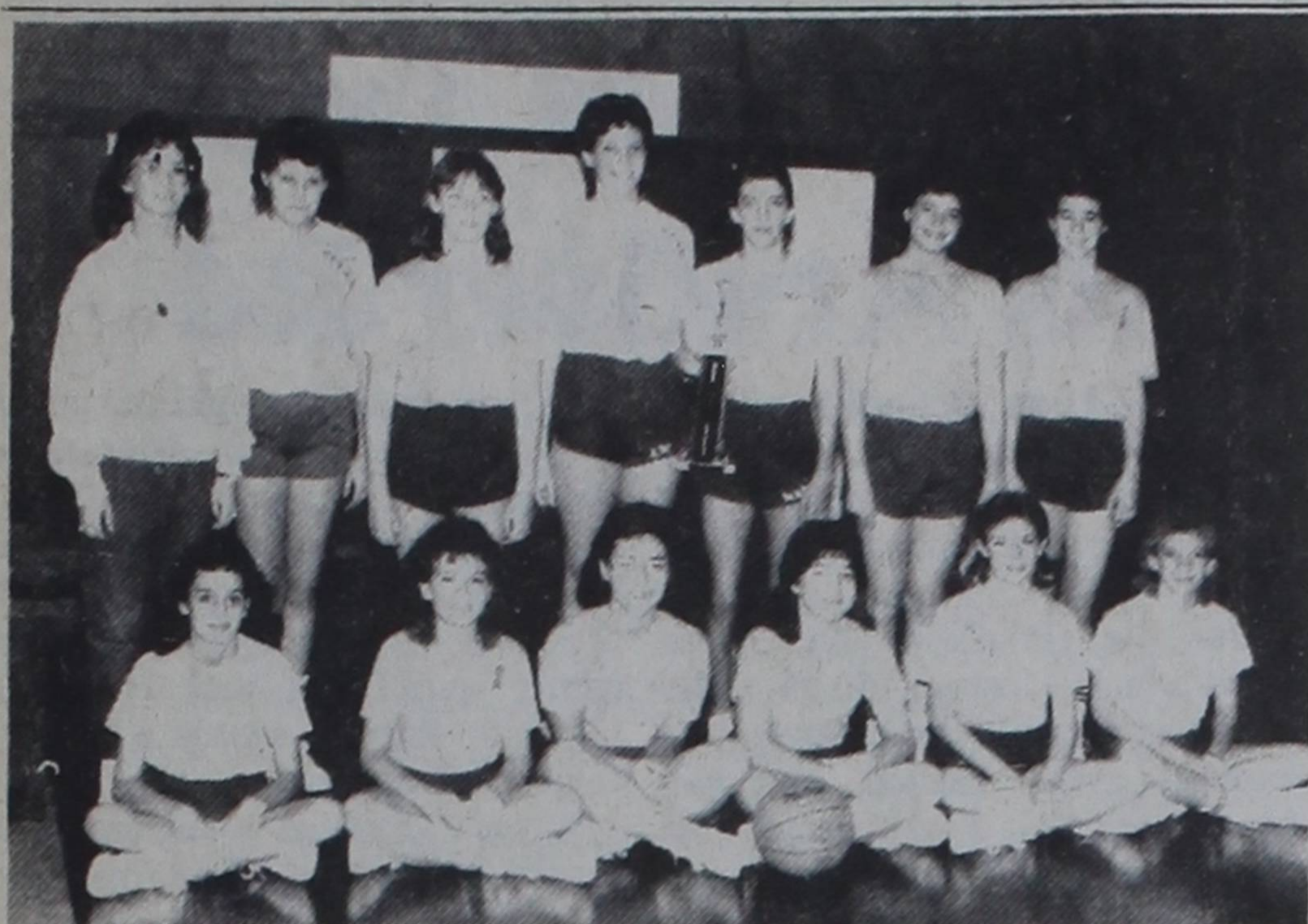

Hfd. Grain Depositors Asked To Speak Out

In an effort to determine how much grain should be stored in a defunct Hereford grain company, the Texas Department of Agriculture is asking depositors of grain in P.C. Grain Co. to contact TDA's Amarillo district office, announced Angela Lamb, Amarillo district supervisor.

TDA suspended the license of P.C. Grain in October after it was found to be more than a million pounds short of grain, Lamb said. After the shortage was covered, the company continued operation, she said.

"Later, TDA was notified that the elevator's bonding firm went out of business, which automatically invalidated P.C. Grain Co.'s license," Lamb said. "Someone has expressed an interest in buying the elevator and working out

the problems. One of the problems is that the quality of the grain is poor. But before the grain can be taken over by new ownership, we must determine exactly how much grain is supposed to be in the elevator."

Lamb stressed the importance of knowing whether an elevator is licensed. "Before leaving grain with an elevator, all farm operators should check on the status of the elevator's license. A valid license lets the depositor know he is protected because the elevator is bonded and insured," she said.

"Each depositor should also be sure to get a receipt for the total deposit and weight ticket for each load. Because it is a negotiable instrument, the receipt should be kept in a safe place," Lamb added.

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Scholarship Fund Started At A&M

A Sul Ross Scholarship at Texas A&M University has been established in honor of the late G.W. "Bill" Mayben by his wife, Norma Lee Mayben.

Mayben died November 21, 1985, in Methodist Hospital at Houston. He suffered from pulmonary fibrosis and was waiting for a heart-and-lung transplant at the time of his death.

Mayben graduated from Friona High School in 1945 and entered the Army where he served two years on active duty. Following the service, he enrolled in Texas A&M where he graduated first in his chemical engineering class in 1951.

He was a Ross Volunteer, a Distinguished Military Student, a member of Phi Eta Sigma (freshman honor society), and a member of Tau Beta Pi (national engineer honor society). He commanded the 8th Regiment his senior year.

Mayben married Norma Lee Osborn, daughter of Jesse and Grace Osborn of Muleshoe, in 1951. They farmed for three years in the Friona-Bovina area before Mayben joined Standard Oil of Indiana (Amoco) at the Texas City Refinery in 1956.

Mayben earned a second Bachelor's Degree in Management Science from Johns Hopkins University while at the Baltimore Refinery.

During his twenty-three years with Amoco, they lived in several locations including London, England, before moving to Houston in 1975. Leaving Amoco in 1979, he joined an independent oil company and then later established his own business.

Mayben held dual membership in the Masonic Lodge at Bovina and Tomball, and he also was a member of the Scottish Rite and Shrine in Houston. He retired from the Army Reserves after almost twenty-five years of service with the rank of Major.

He is survived by his wife, Norma of Houston; three children, Sherri Best of Tuscola, George of Brenham, and Norma Sue Luke of Houston; and seven grandchildren.

Texas A&M is an integral part of the Mayben and Osborn family traditions. Nine members of the families have graduated from A&M, and one presently is a member of the freshman class. Mayben was very proud to be an Aggie, and he represented the school well.

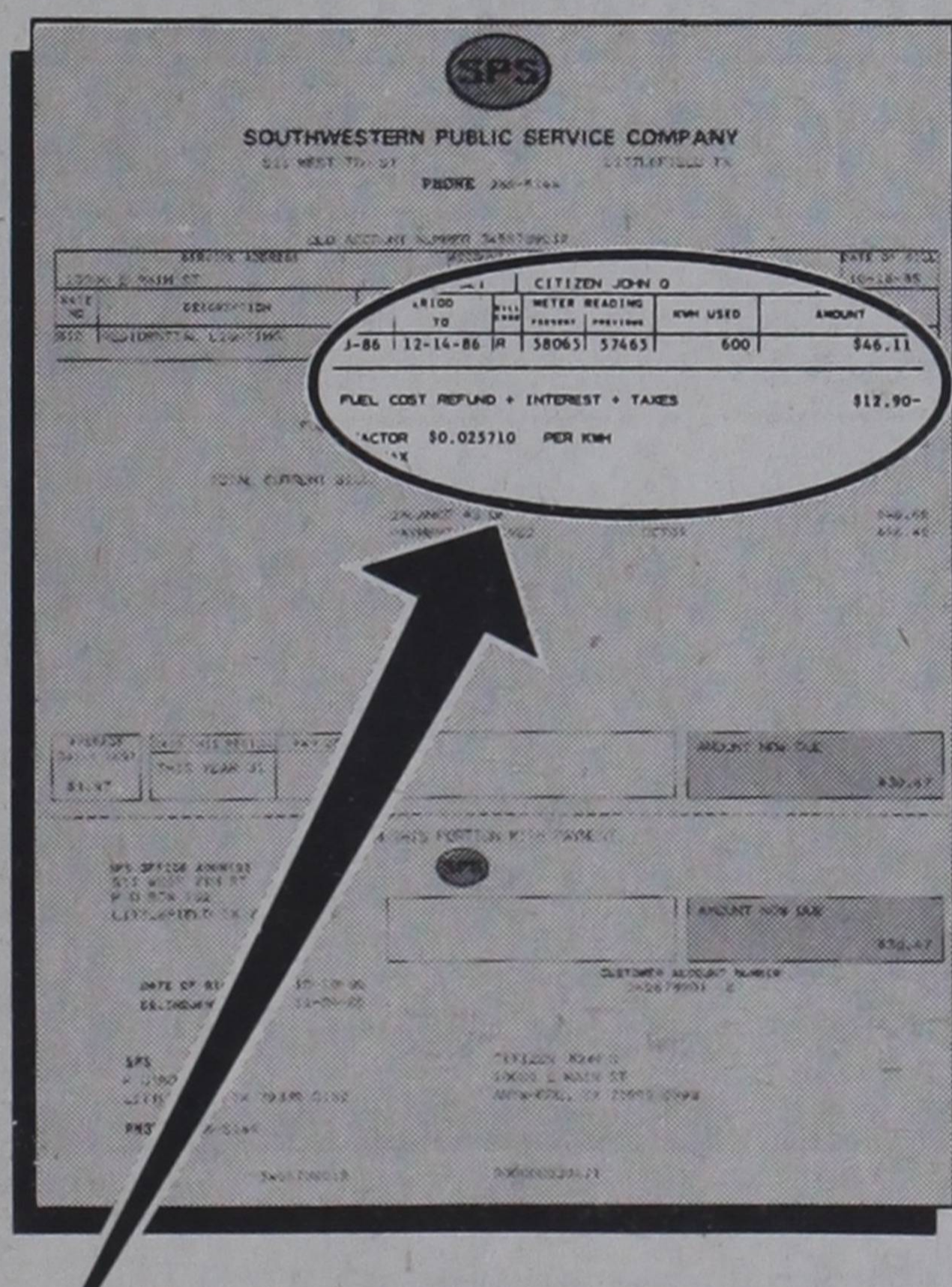
