

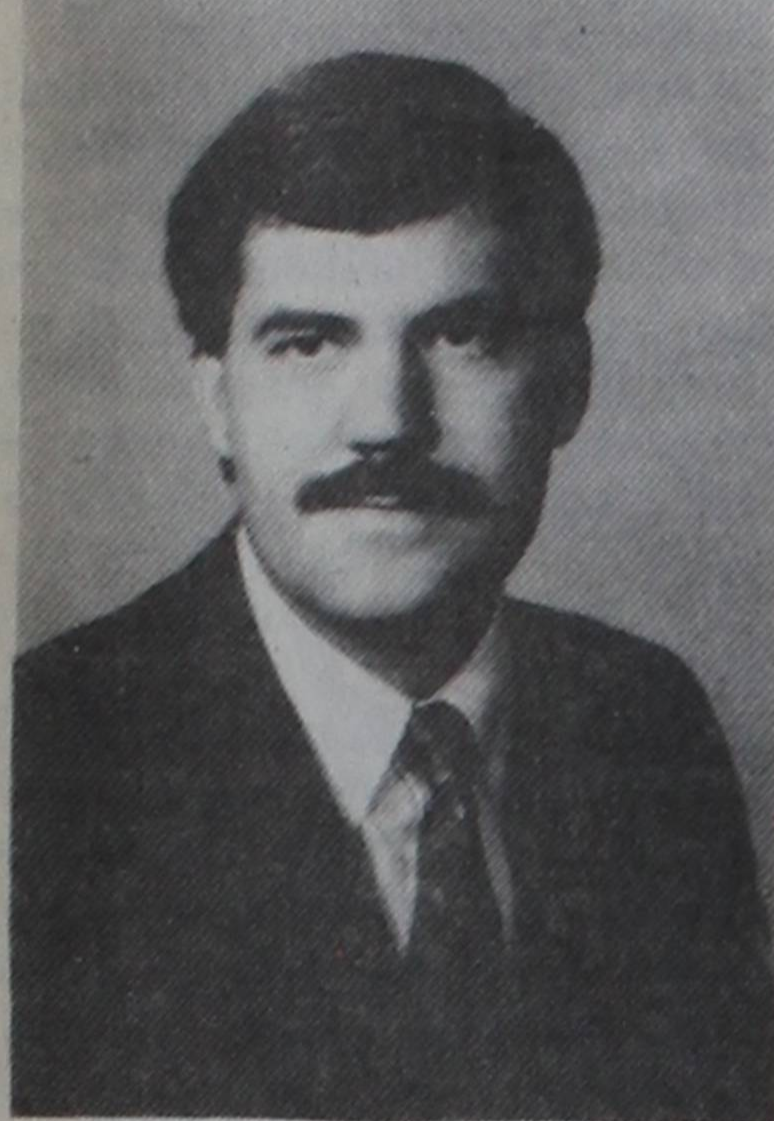

Williams Is Tapped For Coach

Following a marathon meeting of the Friona School Board Thursday night, Steve Williams was chosen as the new head football coach at Friona High School, to replace Tommy Moss.

The board met into the wee hours on Friday debating the coaching position, as several top-notch individuals had applied for the job.

Williams has served as assistant coach at Randall High School in Canyon the past two years. He previously held a similar position at Friona, from 1979-88, also serving as head track coach.

As head track coach, his teams won district once, finished second three times, third twice and fourth another time.

Williams is a graduate of Sanford-Fritch High School and West Texas State University. He is married to the former Donna Price and they are parents of a two-year-old daughter, Krista Lea.

Church Is Hosting Anti-Drug Speaker

Nothing in modern times has so drastically affected the total population morally and economically as the drug epidemic in America. Current estimates indicate that over one-third of the families in our country are adversely affected by drug abuse.

First Baptist Church of Friona is hosting a Drug Awareness Emphasis on Sunday, February 4 at 9:45 a.m. and 10:55 a.m. to assist in better understanding of the personal and social impact of drug abuse in Texas.

This special Drug Awareness Emphasis will be conducted by Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education, the oldest prevention organization in the state. The presentation will be made by Wally Williamson, who has been specifically trained to provide significant information and prevention alternatives for families.

County Officials Attend State Confab

About 800 county officials from across Texas took part in the 32nd annual statewide conference of the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas at the College Station Hilton, January 23-25.

The conference included discussions on issues such as ethics and elected officials, redistricting, criminal justice reform, disaster and risk management for counties, county and special district laws and addresses by several state officials.

County commissioner Ernest Anthony of Friona said highlights of the conference were federal redistricting requirements for counties in 1990, sanitary landfills and solid waste management and 9-1-1 rural addressing.

Yoakum County Judge Jim Barron of Plains, the association president, opened the meeting.

John Gilmartin, county officials program specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said county judges and commissioners who took part in all general sessions earned 8.0 continuing education units from the Office of Continuing Education at Texas A&M University. Commissioners who attended all conference sessions could apply the credit hours toward their mandatory 16-hour annual educational requirement.

The 71st Legislature enacted HB 1555, a mandatory minimum continuing education requirement for county commissioners, beginning January 1, 1990, Gilmartin explained.

The educational course work was coordinated by the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Extension Service.

Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education (TANE) provides materials and programming for prevention strategies for individuals, families, schools, churches, community organizations and businesses. It is their belief that prevention is the only answer to the widespread problem of substance abuse. While treatment is necessary to assist those affected by addiction, in the end, it is seen to only accommodate the problem.

First Baptist Church is concerned that every effort be made to provide the community with the information necessary for each person to both understand the potential dangers of abuse to themselves and to ones they love and take the steps necessary to prevent the spread of drug abuse.

Another break-in was investigated this week in Friona, according to Chief of Police Loyd Niece.

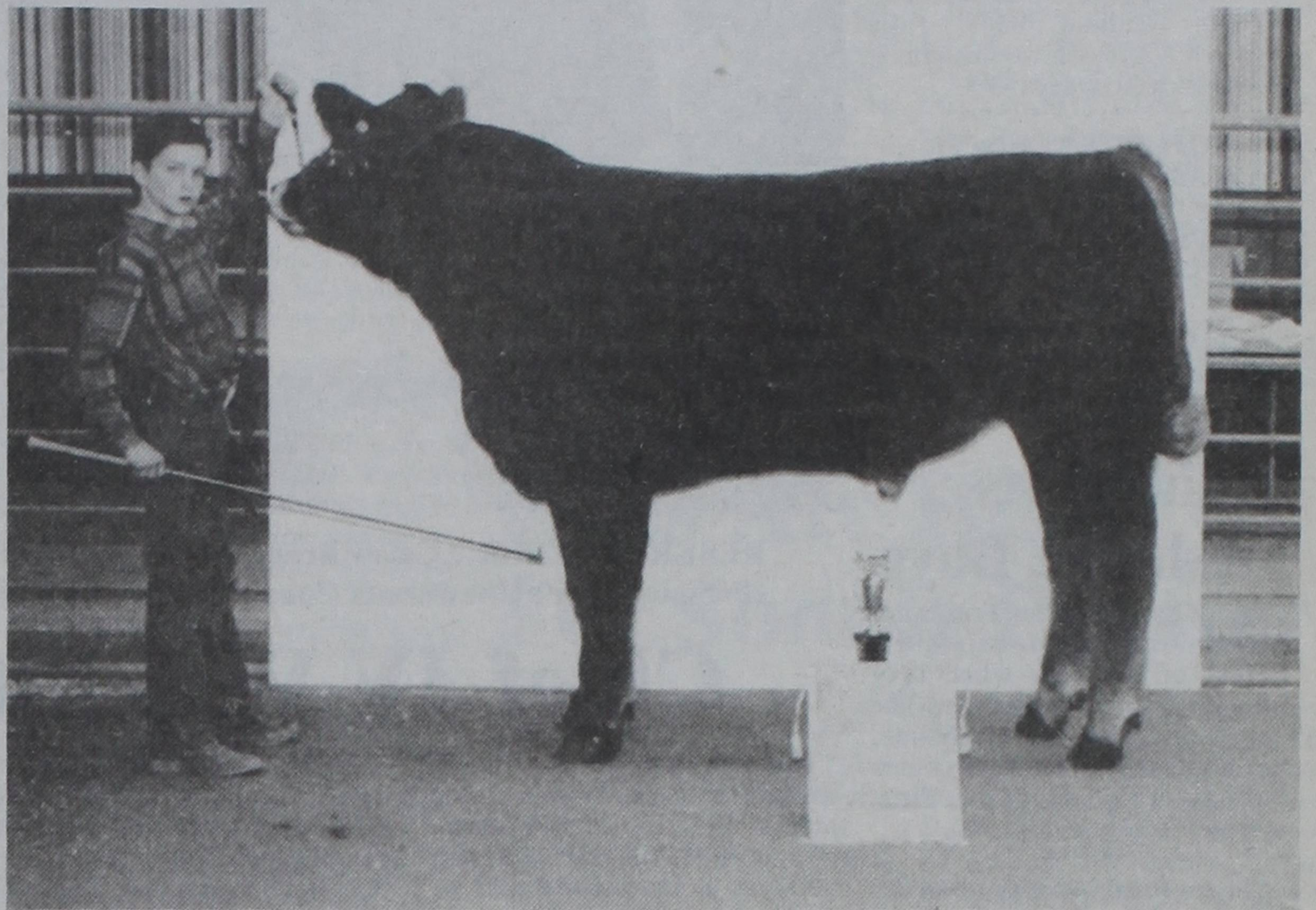
The latest break-in happened on North Virginia Street. Niece said it seemed that similar items were taken in this week's burglary as in the earlier ones, but that investigation was in progress.

Friona Youngsters Dominate Jr. Show

Young showmen from Friona dominated the 43rd annual Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show this week, winning three of the four top titles awarded.

Cammy Hancock, representing Friona FFA, exhibited the Grand Champion Barrow on Wednesday, a 228-pound Yorkshire. It was the first Yorkshire to be tapped for the county barrow title in the 43-year history of the county show.

Miss Hancock's barrow was bought during the premium auction Thursday night by Friona State Bank for \$2.50 per pound.

Chianina cross. Simmons' steer was bought at the sale by West Plains Feed Yard for \$1.70 per pound.

The third champion claimed by Friona was by Shannon Cochran, who won the Grand Champion Heifer banner with his Chianina-heifer.

The other championship was won by Cade Morris of Lazbuddie in the sheep division. Young Morris exhibited both the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Lambs. His animals were both purchased at the auction sale at \$5 per pound. Lazbuddie Feed Yard bought the champion and Friona Industries the reserve champion.

Kia Morris of Lazbuddie exhibited the reserve grand champion barrow, a 215-pounder which had earlier been named breed champion in the Hampshire division.

Casey Bradshaw of Lazbuddie owned the reserve champion steer, a 1210-pound exotic cross that was also named reserve breed champion in the "all other breeds" division of the show.

Jessica Smith of Friona entered the reserve champion heifer. Her animal had been named breed champion in the "British breeds" division of the show.

Breed champion banners in the barrow show were won by Lyndi Austin, Farwell, Chester White; Joshua McDonald, Lazbuddie, Berkshire; Clint Hurst, Friona, Poland China; Shena Seaton, Lazbuddie, Duroc; and Clint Hurst, Friona, Crossbreeds.

Breed winners in the lamb show included Cody Clark of Lazbuddie, Finewool; Seth Black, Lazbuddie, Hampshire; Cade

Morris, Lazbuddie, Finewool Cross and Suffolk; and Edward Terry, Lazbuddie, Southdown.

Class winners in the steer show, other than the champions included Seth Black, champion "British breeds" and Shannon Cochran.

Simmons' win made it 25 steer titles for a Friona entrant in the county show in its 43-year history.

Miss Hancock won the barrow title for Friona for only the 11th time. She was the first FFA entry to win in a number of years.

Cochran is the eighth Friona youngster to claim the county heifer title in its nine-year history.

Morris added to Lazbuddie's impressive numbers in the sheep and overall winnings. Lazbuddie has won 47 sheep awards and 79 overall.

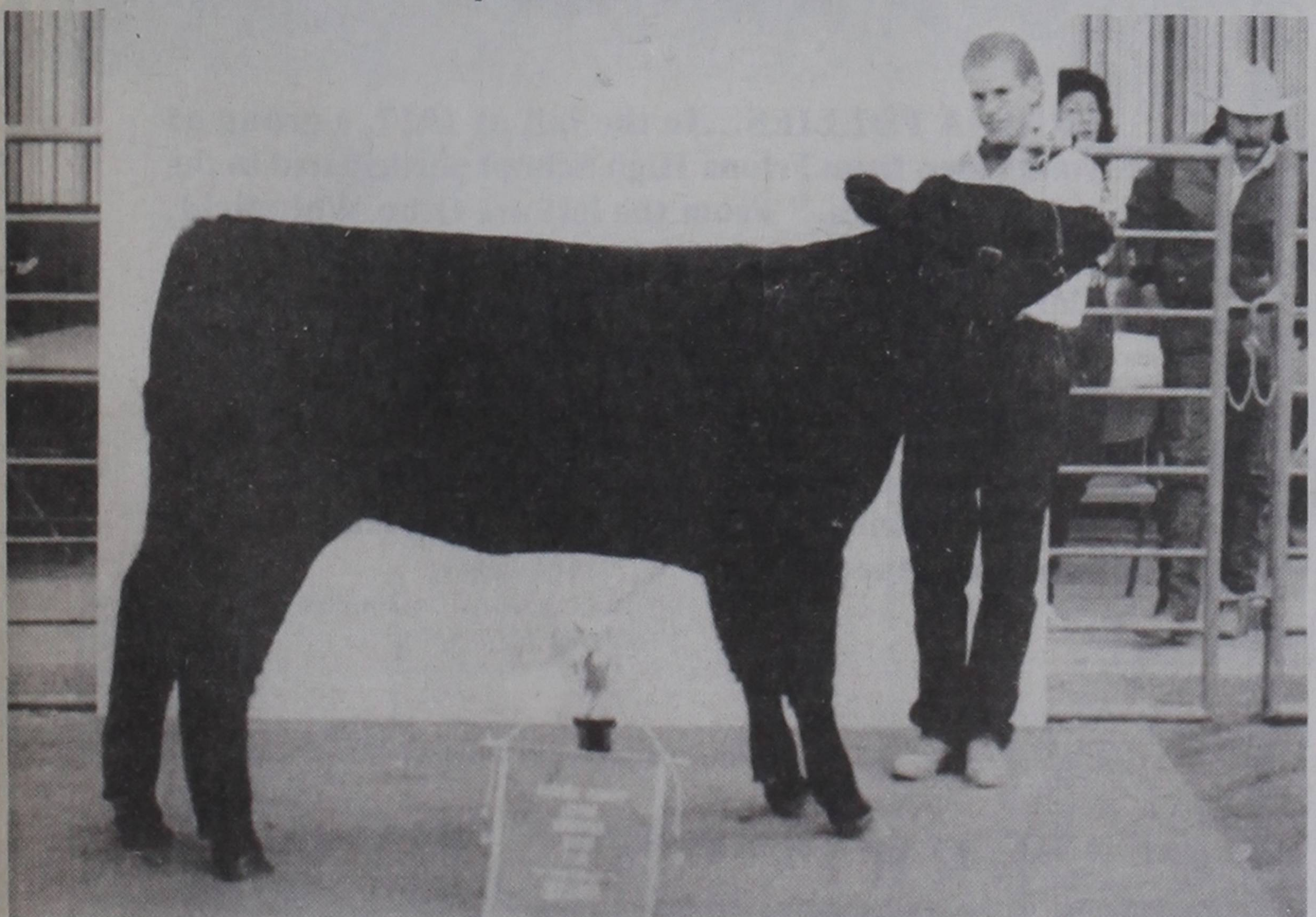
C-C Is Holding Contest

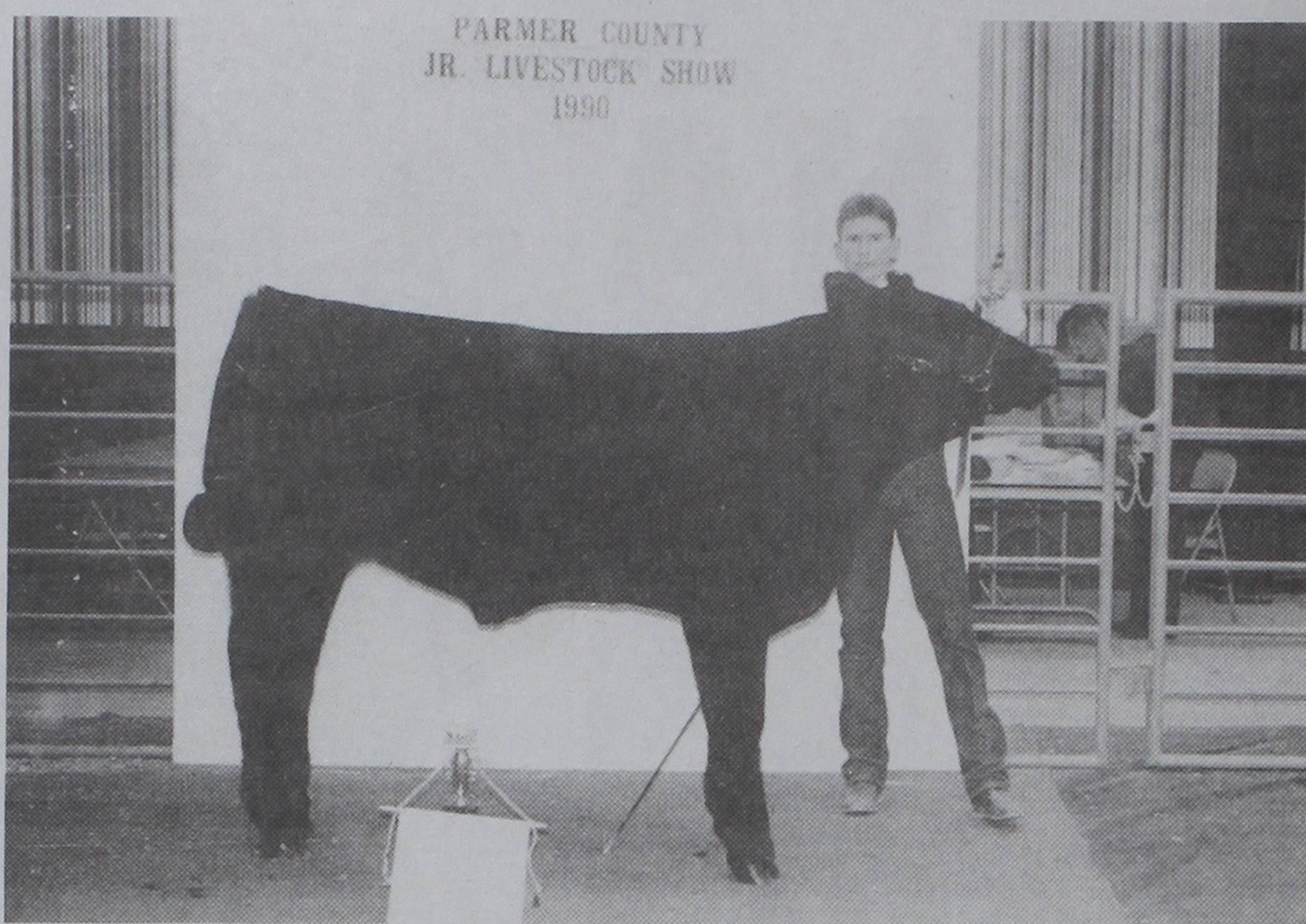



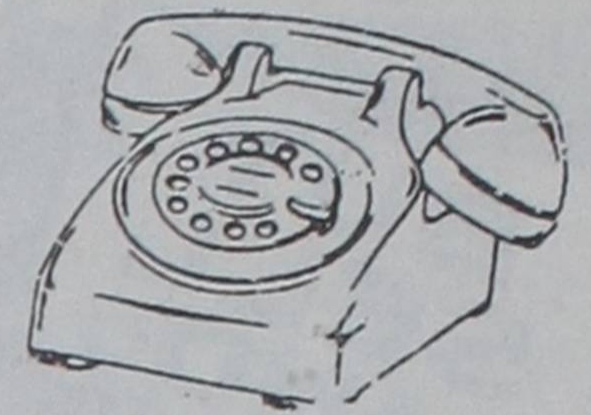
It's A Girl For Couple

Module XII: Bonds Often Predict Stock Market Movement

A stockholder owns part of the corporation in which he or she invests. With this ownership comes the rewards of success and the risks of failure. Owners of common stock accept this risk, along with less or no income, in hopes of lucrative future gains.

Bond owners, on the other hand, are lenders. They choose to invest where income is safe and all their principal will be returned at a specified future date.

Because of these two diverse investment philosophies, owning vs. loaning, some investors view stocks as risky and bonds as safe. As with most generalities, this is only partially correct as both offer some risk. In practice, however, there is a relation between stock and bond prices. A lot can be learned about stocks by watching bonds.

To appreciate this, first understand what makes bond prices move. Bond prices reflect interest rates. When interest rates rise, bond prices drop. Conversely, when interest rates drop, bond prices rise.

For example, if you own a \$1,000 bond paying 9 percent, you receive \$90 interest each year. If rates rise to 12 percent, new bonds would pay \$120 interest each year. As a result, to sell your bond with \$30 less income, you must discount it and lose some of your original investment.

On the other hand, if rates fall to 6 percent, your \$90 income is very attractive compared to the new \$60 rate. Your bond becomes more valuable, and the market price increases.

Although bonds are guaranteed to return principal at maturity, until then the market value changes with interest rates. That means if you decide to sell your bond before it matures, you may receive more, less, or the same amount you paid for your bond. Your original investment, or face

value, is not guaranteed before maturity.

Because bonds are bought primarily for income, the market value reflects changing interest rates more quickly than stocks. Stock prices, however, are also sensitive to interest rates and follow bond prices--only a bit slower.

Watch the relationship. When interest rates rise, bond prices fall. Generally, high interest rates hurt business and slow economic expansion. This causes corporate earnings to drop and eventually brings stock prices down.

When interest rates drop, bond prices rise. Low interest rates usually stimulate business, and stock prices react upward following the bond market.

Although this is an oversimplification, a close study of the stock/bond market price activity bears it out. The latest example showed that six months prior to the October 1987 crash, the average municipal-bond mutual fund lost about 6.5 percent in value. Corporate-bond funds lost about 5.5 percent. The bond market was suggesting that in the near future, we might expect a corresponding drop in stock prices. An overly severe drop in the stock market did occur. Although it adjusted to a more reasonable correction, it was, in fact, a drop in stock prices.

This is not to encourage investment decisions based solely on the bond market's movement. Analysts who foster the bond/stock relation temper their decisions with an understanding of bond prices and yields in relation to the inflation rate and yield gaps between bonds and stocks.

The point is simply that there's a relation between bond and stock prices. If you're an investor who's sometimes confused as to where the economy is heading, keep an eye on the bond market. You could get a good tip on the stock market.

Squaws Score Pair Of Impressive Wins

The FHS Squaws scored a pair of big wins in their last two outings, to grab a tie for the lead in the second half of district play with a 2-0 record.

Both wins were very impressive. The team overcame a 50-44 deficit to Floydada with four minutes to play, to beat the Whirlwinds, 64-62 in double overtime last Friday.

Then on Tuesday the Squaws beat Muleshoe, a team that had blasted them 70-39 just 18 days earlier, in a 53-49 barn-burner.

The win over Muleshoe was impressive, in light of the team's luck, or lack of it, in their first two meetings with the Mulettes, both won by Muleshoe.

At Muleshoe on January 12 the team could do very little right in one of their worst losses of the season.

But in Tuesday's game, the Squaws hung in against one of the tough teams in the district, and prevailed.

The teams traded leads in the early going. The Squaws led, 9-8, at the end of the first quarter. It was 22-18, Friona, at the intermission, as fans sensed an upset might be in the making.

The Mulettes came out determined, and scored the first six points of the third quarter to take the lead at 24-22.

But Kendra Gordon sank a long hook shot and Jenny Procter made two at the line for a 26-24 Friona lead.

After Muleshoe's Wendy Green gave the visitors a 28-all tie with 43 seconds left in the quarter, Miss Gordon drove for a layup, was fouled and converted, and Miss Procter canned a three-pointer from the side as the clock ran out, giving Friona a 34-26 lead at the buzzer.

Miss Green's layup, and Heather Hutton's three-pointer put the Mulettes right back in it at 34-33, less than a minute into the fourth quarter.

Two more baskets by Miss Green gave the Mulettes a 37-35 lead with 6:30 to play.

Elaine White countered with a jump shot to tie it, and Lisa Weatherly's jumper gave Friona a 39-37 lead with 5:37 left.

The Squaws had to hit some vital free throws down the stretch, to maintain their lead. Cindy Ureste made a pair at the 4:38 mark for a 42-39 Friona edge, but 14 seconds later, Miss Hutton's long shot tied it for Muleshoe at 42-41.

Amber Green's free throw gave Muleshoe a 43-42 lead with 3:46 to play. Both teams missed chances on fast breaks before Miss Ureste sank a jump shot for a 44-43 Friona edge at the 2:20 mark.

Free throws by Miss White (three of four), and Miss Ureste (one of two) stretched Friona's lead to 48-43, but two baskets by the Mulettes, the last one a three-pointer by Miss Hutton, tied the count at 48-all with only 47 seconds left.

The Squaws got the ball, and Miss Procter had her chance from the side, and her high-arching shot hit nothing but net for three points and a 51-48 Friona lead with 23 seconds to play.

Muleshoe threatened with a free shot with eight seconds left, but Miss Procter made a pair at the line to cement things with six seconds left for the final margin of 53-49.

Miss Procter had three three-pointers, three two-pointers and was 11 of 16 at the line for 26 points and Miss Gordon added nine.

All of Friona's fourth-quarter scoring came from the outside trio of Misses Procter, Ureste and White. Lisa Weatherly drew her fifth foul with 5:05 remaining. Until then, she and Miss Gordon had done a great job on the boards for the Squaws.

The Mulettes game seemed to be a continuation of the Squaw's late-game rally against Floydada, when the team came from six points behind.

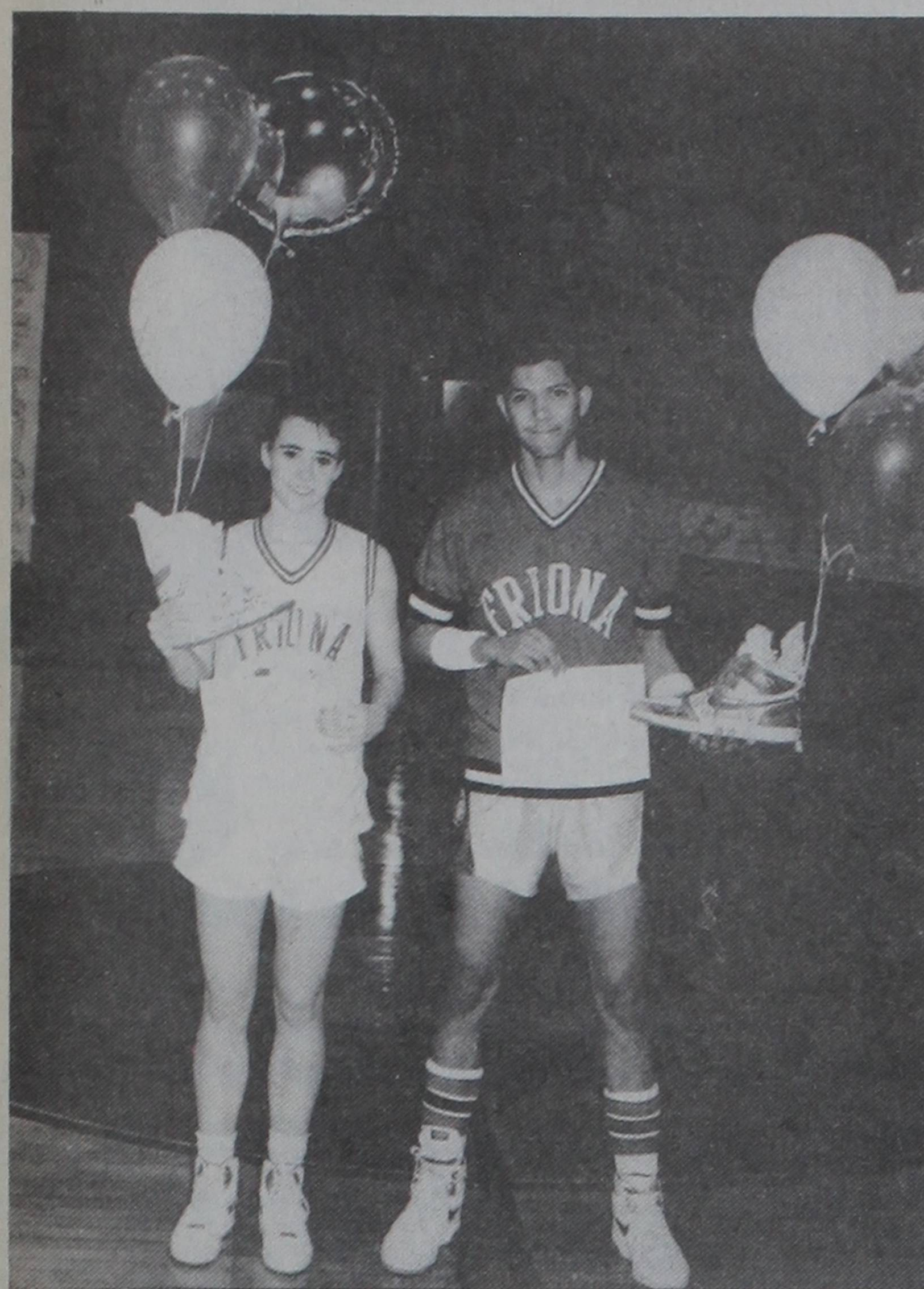
Lisa Weatherly's layup gave the Squaws a 56-55 lead, and two free throws each by Misses Gordon and

"I thought our defense played exceptionally well. Jenny Procter guarded Amy Harrison and held her to ten points, and Lisa Weatherly did a good job on Wendy Green until she fouled out," said Coach Jane Goheen.

Chiefs Suffer Tough Losses

The Friona High School Chieftains suffered a pair of frustrating defeats during the past week, to begin the second half of district play.

Last Friday the team met first half champion Floydada, and played on near-even terms with the Whirlwinds for 30 minutes, before the visitors broke open the tight game for a 55-44 win.

Then on Tuesday the Chiefs hosted Muleshoe and had the Mules erase a five-point deficit after three quarters in a 69-64 loss.

The Chieftains held only one lead against the Whirlwinds, at 7-4 after 2:32 in the first quarter on Bret Bronniman's three-pointer. But the team hung close, and was within three, 44-47, with two minutes left in the game, before the bottom fell out.

Darran Procter's layup tied the game early for Friona, 2-all, as did Shannon Cochran at 4-all. Floydada led at the end of the first quarter, 14-11.

The 'Winds built a nine-point lead 23-12, but the Chiefs rallied on Cochran's shooting for an 18-23 deficit. It was 24-18, Floydada, at halftime.

The Whirlwinds' longest lead was 12 points in the third quarter, but Friona rallied.

Cochran scored on a turning jump shot to trim the margin to six, 36-42, Procter made a pair of free throws, and Bronniman's jump shot made it 42-47 with 4:10 left to play.

Then David Barnett made good on both ends of a 1-1, and the Chiefs had fought back to 44-47 with 3:42 to play.

The team had a couple of fairly good shots when they could have cut the lead to one or tied, but they wouldn't fall.

Then the ball started to bounce all Floydada, and the Whirlwinds made eight of nine shots from the line in the last 1:40 as Friona had to foul to try to get the ball, hence the final margin of 11 points.

Cochran led the scoring with 14 points and Procter added 12.

The game here Tuesday against Muleshoe was virtually a carbon copy of the game played just over two weeks earlier at Muleshoe, except that the Mules changed the scrip for the game's ending, in their favor.

At Muleshoe, the teams were tied, 64-all with 1:36 to play and Friona scored the final four points for the win.

Tuesday, the rivals again battled to a 62-62 tie with 2:58 to play. This time the Mules outscored the Chiefs, 7-2 down the stretch, for the win.

Up until the final three minutes, the fans could have been watching a video of the game at Muleshoe, as each team took turns being hot, holding a lead, then cooling off and the other one would "come on."

Muleshoe built an 11-2 lead, but Cochran and Bronniman paced a

12-point spurt by the Chiefs, who took a 14-13 lead as the first quarter ended.

Friona had a six-point lead, 27-21, after Bronniman connected from la-la land 2:17 before halftime, but the Mules outscored Friona 12-6 the rest of the way and Friona had only a 33-32 halftime lead.

Friona reeled off eight unanswered points to begin the third quarter, boasting their longest lead at 41-32. But next thing you know, Muleshoe had scored eight straight, and it was a 41-40 game.

Cochran stole the ball, drove the length of the floor for a layup, helping his team post a 53-48 lead after three quarters.
