While the last census showed over 13,000,000 head of cattle, this would not show over 10,000,000, and while it showed 19,000,000 sheep, this census would likely show 28,000,000. ### W. T. S. Keller.

Saturday night, about ten o'clock, surrounded by his physicians, daughter, Miss Fannie Keller, and a few friends, Judge W. T. S. Keller departed this life.

This sad closing of a series of tragic events can be briefly summarized as follows: Since the Supreme Court's affirmation of his brother-in-law, Weathersby's, five years sentence, he had grown more and more despondent and was very rarely seen on the streets. On the Friday, a week before his death, he said that he was going to Tyler. From that time he was seen by no one until his daughter, going to his office in the brick block next to the Hotel San Angelo for a few of her possessions which had been left there, found him in an exhausted and dying condition. She at once summoned physicians, who applied restoratives and did everything possible to revive him, but, although he at times regained partial consciousness, he never rallied, but gradually sank until death claimed him.

His death was caused by exhaustion, brought on, it is supposed, by starvation. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon at the Methodist church, and was under the direction of the Knights of Pythias, of which lodge he was an active member. It was the largest attended funeral ever held in San Angelo. Not only was the church crowded but even the sidewalks and street.

After Dr. Riggs, an old friend, had delivered the touching funeral sermon, the remains were interred in the city cemetery with sad and impressive rites of the K. of P.

Judge W. T. S. Keller was born in Harrison county, Texas, near Marshall, August 24, 1849. His parents were in ordinary cir-

### SEYMOUR BROOME SHOT

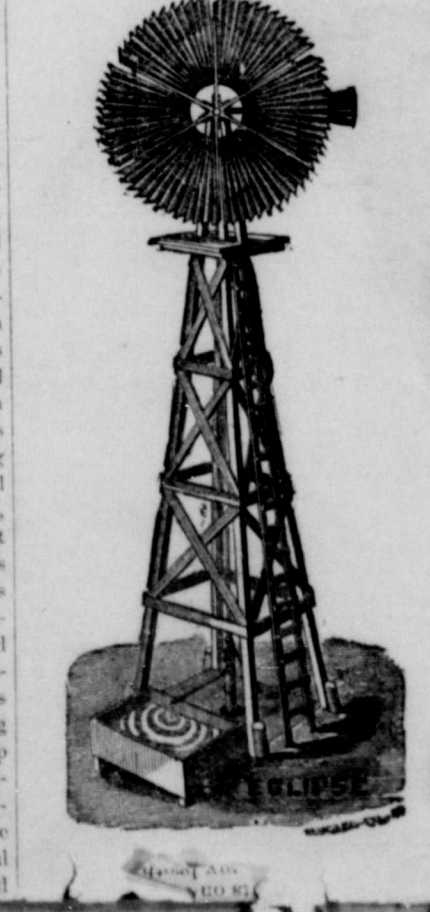
A COWARDLY ASSASSIN ATTEMPTS TO MURDER HIM

In His Own Home, and Afterwards Shoots at Rome Shield from An Ambush.

About 11 o'clock Saturday as Seymour Broome was entering the back door of his home on Beauregard avenue, some unknown person shoved a six shooter against his breast. Broome grabbed the pistol and shoved it down as the would-be assassin fired. The ball took effect in the side hitting a rib and glancing off making a bad flesh wound and setting his clothes on fire. As Broome fell back, the assassin cried in good English, "There I've got you, good d--n you," and started to fly. Broome drew his pistol and shot three times at the retreating figure without effect. His father, United States Deputy Marshall C. L. Broome, rushed from inside the house and at once tore off his burning clothing. He was taken inside and beyond flesh wounds and bad burns he was found to have received no serious injuries. A large crowd had assembled at the report of the six-shooter, all well armed. About fifteen minutes later Rome Shield came riding down the street in a lops and as he drew up at the corner of the block, the same or another assassin, concealed behind Jas. Shupert's barn shot at him. Shield at once jumped from his horse and shot several
