THE NATION'S Bicentennial Census will be taken beginning April 1, 1990.

The 1990 census, the 21st in our nation's history, will be the largest and most complex ever undertaken. The Census Bureau expects to count some 250 million Americans, and 106 million housing units.

About a week before Census Day (April 1, 1990), most households will receive a census questionnaire by mail. Others, depending on their location, will have forms delivered by census takers.

Roughly five out of six households will receive a "short form." About one out of six households will be asked to fill out a longer form.

Getting a complete count on the census is vital for a number of reasons.

First and foremost is the fact that the population figures are used to determine how our representation is determined, all the way from county commissioner's courts to state representatives to U.S. Congressional districts.

Billions of dollars in federal funds are returned to states, local governments, and other governmental agencies, and the amount of money is based on population counts or housing data.

Planners also use census facts to determine where to locate such facilities as hospitals, schools, day care and senior citizen centers.

Various social programs receive funds based on census information. Businesses use the data for decisions involving expansion and jobs.

THE CENSUS BUREAU has even come up with a name for those of you who may be living with your "significant other" without benefit of matrimony. You will henceforth be known as POSSLQs, pronounced possell cue. It stands for "persons of opposite sex sharing living quarters."

We ran across this catchy little poem by Charles Osgood and wanted to share it with the readers.

*There's nothing that I wouldn't do
If you would be my POSSLQ.
You live with me, and I with you,
And you will be my POSSLQ.
I'll be your friend and so much more;
That's what a POSSLQ is for.*

Cooperative Elects Three To Board

Three members of the board of directors of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative were re-elected at the co-op's annual meeting Tuesday in Hereford.

Billy Mayfield of Oklahoma Lane, who also serves as board president, was elected over Buddy Brothers; J.B. Noland of Summerfield, board secretary, was elected over Dale Christy, and Pat Robbins, who represents the Frio Exchange, was elected over L. Dee Taylor.

Holdover members of the board include Carl Straffuss, vice president, Milo Center; Charles Myers, Jr., Hub; Jimmie Cockerham, Tharp; Floyd Schueler, Parmer; Dick Fellers, Dawn, and Ernest Brown, Westway.

Also during the business session, manager Tom Hyer announced that the cooperative would be mailing checks to the membership for capital credits based on the organization's 1986 business year. "Please cash these checks when you get them, even if they're

only for \$1.50. It will be a lot of help if you do," Hyer said.

Hyer also reported on the status of the 911 emergency center, saying it would be available in the rural areas in the near future. "It will be costly, but will be a big convenience," Hyer said.

The telephone official explained that when a subscriber called the 911 emergency number, their personal number would be relayed to the emergency center in case they were unable to talk. The emergency message will then be relayed to the proper emergency center.

Hyer said that 911 calls in Deaf Smith County would come in to Hereford; those in Parmer County to Friona, and those in Castro County to Dimmitt.

Noland read the minutes from the 1989 annual meeting and read the annual meeting notice. Attorney John D. Aiken presided for the election of directors.

Members attending enjoyed a meal of polish sausage and beef, catered by K-Bob's Steakhouse.

Drug Awareness Meeting Is Held

The second meeting of the Drug Awareness Committee was held March 15 at the Junior High Cafeteria, with Tonya Gober in charge.

Reports were given by the following: John Blackwell, on public relations; Lexie Miller, law; Vergil Ichtertz, family; and Tonya Gober, education.

A brief discussion was held concerning a name for the organization. Suggestions included "FAD" (Friona Against Drugs) and "FADA" (Friona Against Drugs and Alcohol).

The program was given by Cynthia Schiebel-Knox of Amarillo. Mrs. Knox stated that Region 16 has several free seminars on drug prevention. Mrs. Knox then discussed 12 steps of prevention:

(1) awareness; (2) education--listening to our children; (3) communication--explain your position on drugs and alcohol; (4)

observation of signs of use; (5) cooperation with law enforcement, church and school officials.

(6) Determination to have a functional family; (7) involvement with kids' activities and friends; (8) strong NO USE message; (9) life skills training; (10) self-esteem check-ups; (11) personal responsibility, and (12) General Wellness training.

Mrs. Knox also discussed things that other schools and communities are doing to combat drugs and alcohol.

Sheriff Rex Williams made a statement regarding the alcohol problem in the county.

Next meeting for the group was scheduled for April 19.

Thoughts On Family Life

When our grandparents die, it seems to me, we miss them more than we miss our parents, because we remember our grandparents through the eyes we had as children, but we see our parents through the eyes of an adult. Although they've been dead for many years, I still miss my grandmother and grandfather terribly, especially when life appears to be running smoothly. I think: I wish my grandfather were here; I'd like to tell him this; I wonder what he'd think of that? It's always with fondness and respect that I remember my grandfather. I remember his leonine head, his regal bearing, his kind, understanding laugh.

I remember my grandmother with tenderness, as a little babe. At times I still long to sit in her lap and feel the warmth of her gentle smile. I'm too old for lap-sitting now, but I feel, instead, the warmth of my children and their respect for their mother and me, and there's no better feeling. Suddenly I have become what my grandfather was and there's great comfort in that.

Sadly, many of the younger generation will not have these good, warm feelings because the family's not there. Sociologists fret over the deteriorating family, homeless children, the absence of mother or father, the grandmother and grandfather lost to distant places. This lack of extended family, they say, will be the ruin of us. The family teaches love, tolerance, patience, endurance and the benefits of service to others. Without the family there resides no example.

According to pediatrician T. Berry Brazelton, M.D., "Families are really suffering and with the increasing divorce rate and the breakdown of the extended family, very few young people can turn back to their own families for support. That is very tragic because we're not handing anything on from one generation to another. Everything that we've got in the way of statistics--increasing teen pregnancy, drugs, suicide--shows that we are in deep, deep trouble in this country."

We must somehow bring back the importance of the family in shaping lives. Parents must give

children security and stability, a sense of confidence, a sense of importance, a belief that they can face whatever they must.

As a child I would listen to stories from my parents and grandparents about how they endured the Great Depression. I would hear tales of our family heroes in World War II. I would hear of courtship and death, of hard work and disappointments. These family legends were almost always recounted at the dinner table. Statistics now show that families eat less than one-third of meals together--and when they do eat together the television or radio often interferes with conversation. Telling family stories while eating meals together again can be one method for strengthening family traditions.

Making parenting fun offers another opportunity for restoring family stability. As parents, let's stop pushing ourselves so hard, relax and enjoy our families more. There's excitement in watching a child make a mistake, learn from it, try again and again, before finally getting it right. Remember walking one step at a time, bike riding with training wheels, playing the piano, the inevitable set-backs and frustrations, the subtleties of real growth--goal setting and defeating adversity. As we have watched our children grow, they, too, have enjoyed seeing us become more competent parents; they've helped us learn humility and patience. Let's focus on enjoying our growth together.

And let's not forget to get assistance from our parents. Just pick up the phone and call them. Invite them to spend a few days. Learn from their examples.

Were times simpler then, when I sat on my grandmother's lap and ran to greet my grandfather? Probably not. Their problems were different, but just as serious. Family love and support helped them endure then just as family love and support will help us endure now. Problems change, but love endures. Cultivating a rich family life will help us overcome this decade's challenges.

60 YEARS AGO-MARCH 18, 1930

A test pump was placed on the city well here Monday afternoon and put in operation for about four hours, with the result that more than 200 gallons per minute were produced from the well. Our people are highly elated with the fact that so strong a well has been secured and will provide an abundance of water for the city's supply.

50 YEARS AGO-MARCH 29, 1940

S.H. Haile, who recently purchased and took charge of the J.L. Riddle hardware store here, has been quite busy since taking the management over, in making decided changes in the arrangements and appearance of the interior of the store. Mr. Haile is also adding a number of new lines of goods to his stock as well as increasing the amount of the regular lines of goods.

45 YEARS AGO-MARCH 30, 1945

Don Edwin Lewis, seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lewis of Friona, has won the superior rating in the National Music Festival for the past two years. The festival was held this year at Hereford, where the young musician entered as a singer.

40 YEARS AGO-MARCH 24, 1950

Friona School District patrons will go to the polls Saturday, March 25, to vote on a \$225,000 bond issue. Voting will be at the high school. If the bond issue passes, a new auditorium and a new gymnasium will be constructed. The grade school building will be improved and remodelled, too. An increase in enrollment in the past three years from less than 400 to more than 500 indicated a definite need for a building program.

35 YEARS AGO-MARCH 25, 1955

Whether or not Friona is to expand its paving program, improve its water and sewer system, and whether or not a city hall is to be constructed--these three issues will be decided by vote at the special bond election set for next Tuesday. Total bonds to be voted are \$175,000, largest of which is proposition number one, improvements of the waterworks system, \$70,000.

30 YEARS AGO-MARCH 24, 1960

Bobby Redwine, 12-year-old Lazbuddie FFA chapter member, was a proud boy Saturday afternoon when his Grand Champion Hereford steer brought a record price of \$1,071 on a bid of \$1.00 per pound from the Sherley Grain Company of Bovina at the sale following the annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the possibilities of holding an "All Sports Banquet" for the students as opposed to the usual "Football Banquet." The proposal met with the approval of the majority present and the banquet will be planned for early spring starting with the 1970-71 school year.

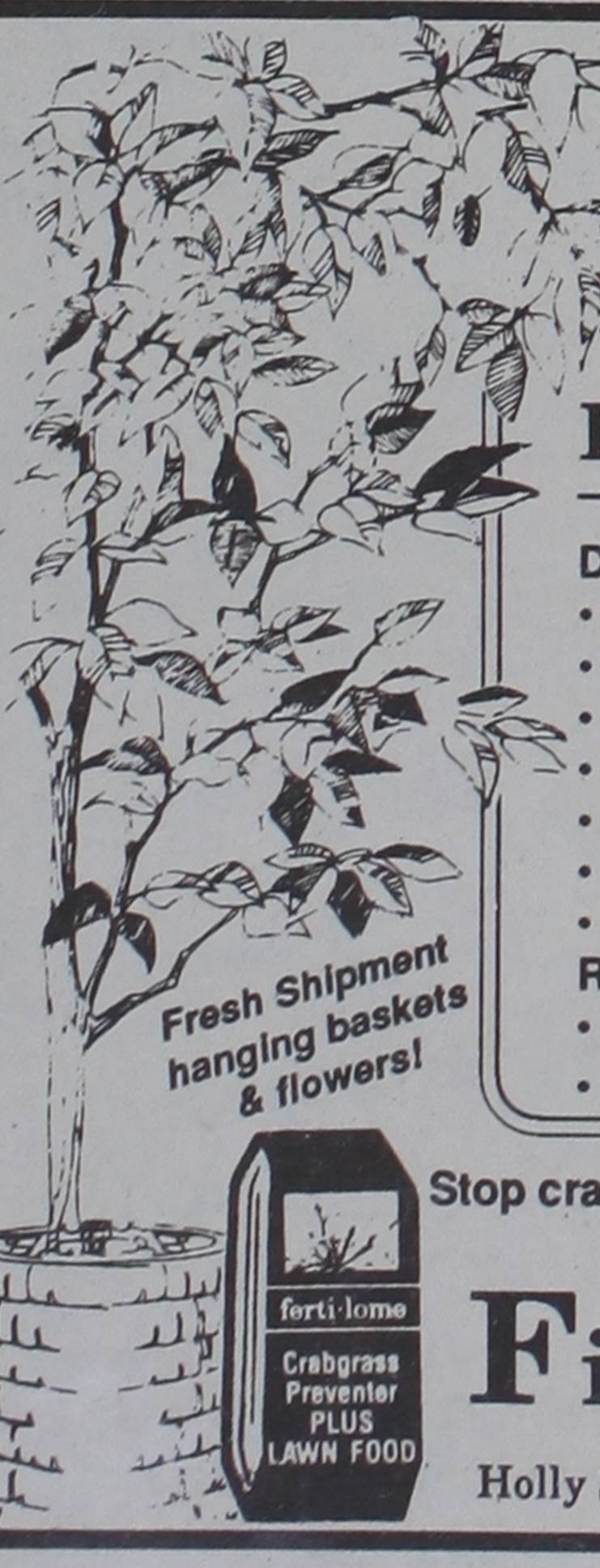

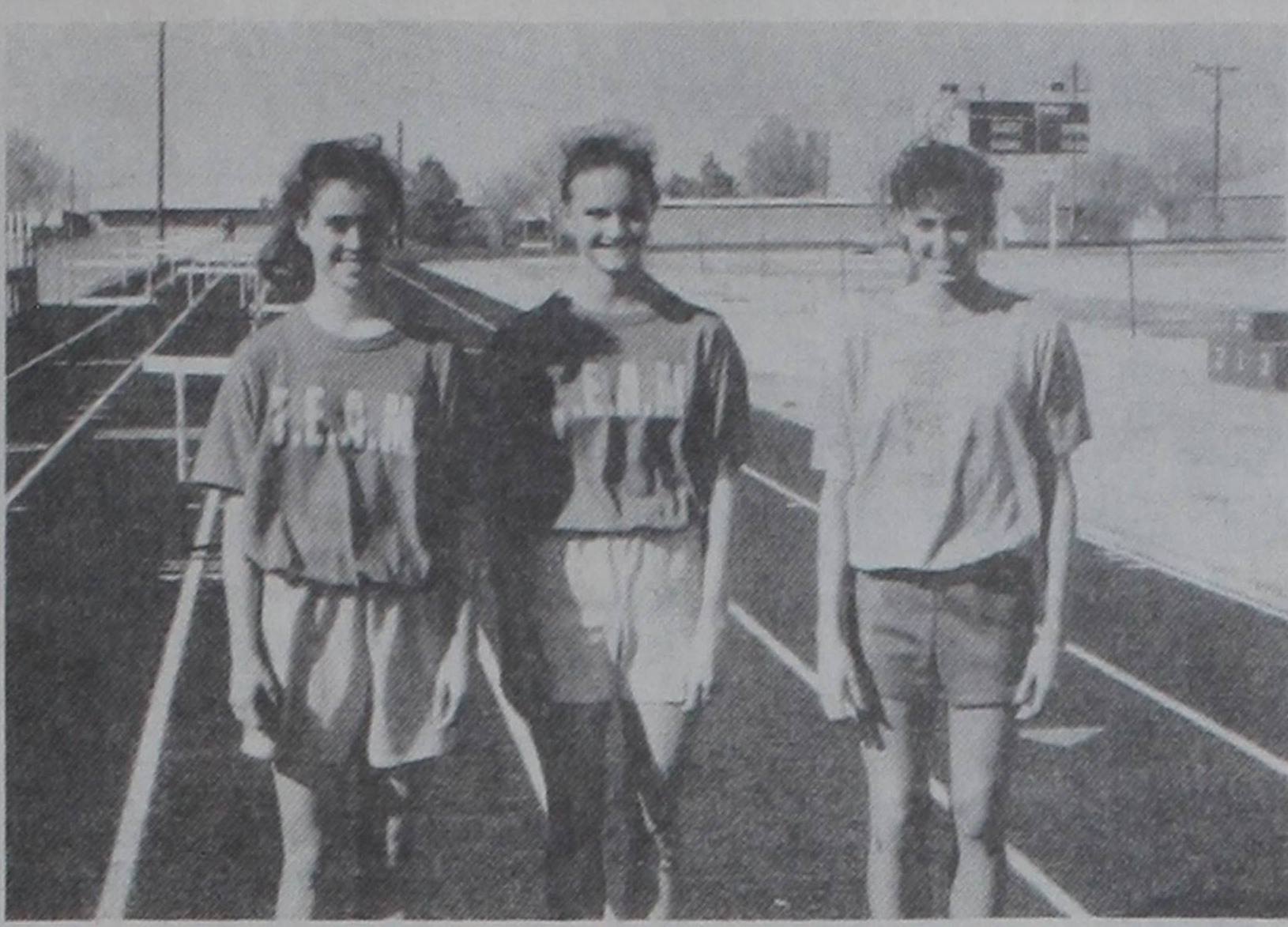
Mrs. Baker was a hygienist for Dr. J.W. Reeds of Lubbock.

Squaw Tracksters Post Good Times

The Friona Squaws track and field team turned in some good performances at the Friona Relays last Saturday, with some performers turning in their best marks of the season.

The team failed to rack up a first place, but Jenny Procter and Alicia Widner placed 2-3 in the 400-meter dash with times of 63.24 and 63.41.

Kendra Gordon also placed second in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:33.2.

Friona's 1600-meter relay team pushed Dimmitt, coming in second, with a time of 4:18.51.

Members of the foursome are Alicia Widner, Kendra Gordon, Mendi Milner and Jenny Procter.

Mendi Milner placed third in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles with a time of 51.08, and Renee Martin was third in the 1600-meter run with a time of 6:22.8.

Miss Martin was also fifth in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:42.5 and Miss Milner placed fifth in the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 17.88.

Freda Lafuente placed sixth in the 3200-meter run with a time of 15.50.

The Squaws placed third as a team with 55 points.

Chief Distance Men Excel In Relays

The Chieftain track and field team had some good performances in the Friona Relays last Saturday, paced by their long-distance runners.

Friona scored 37 points in the two distance races, as the red-clad runners took first and second in the 3200-meter run and first, second and sixth in the mile.

John Edd Duke kept up his pace in the 3200-meter race, winning with a 10:21.84 clocking. Ramon Sanchez placed second with a 10:42.09 time.

In the mile, Sanchez upset his teammate for the win with a time of 4:50.59, and Duke was second at 4:52.59. Another Chieftain, Javier Correa, was sixth in this race at 5:06.61.

Ismael Rocha placed second in the 400-meter dash with a time of 51.63. The first four finishers in this race were within .04 of a second of each other as the winning time was 51.62 and fourth place was 51.66.

Jeff Stowers ran a 39.77 time in

the 300-meter intermediate hurdles, but had to settle for second place behind Amherst's Johnson, a state qualifier last year in the race, who won with a 38.91.

Brian Herring placed third in the high jump, clearing 5-10, Friona's only field event points.

The Chieftain 1600-meter relay team placed third with a time of 3:32.9. Team members were Andre Duran, Jeff Stowers, Saul Espino and Ismael Rocha.

Friona's 400-meter relay team placed fifth with a 44.97 timing. This team was made up of Andre Duran, Scott Houston, Ismael Rocha and Jeff Stowers.

Other point-winners included Correa and Warren Duke in the 800-meter dash. Correa placed fifth with a time of 2:11.8, and Duke was sixth at 2:12.86.

Houston placed fifth in the 300-meter hurdles with a 43.48 performance.

The Chieftains scored 79 points as a team, good for third place overall.

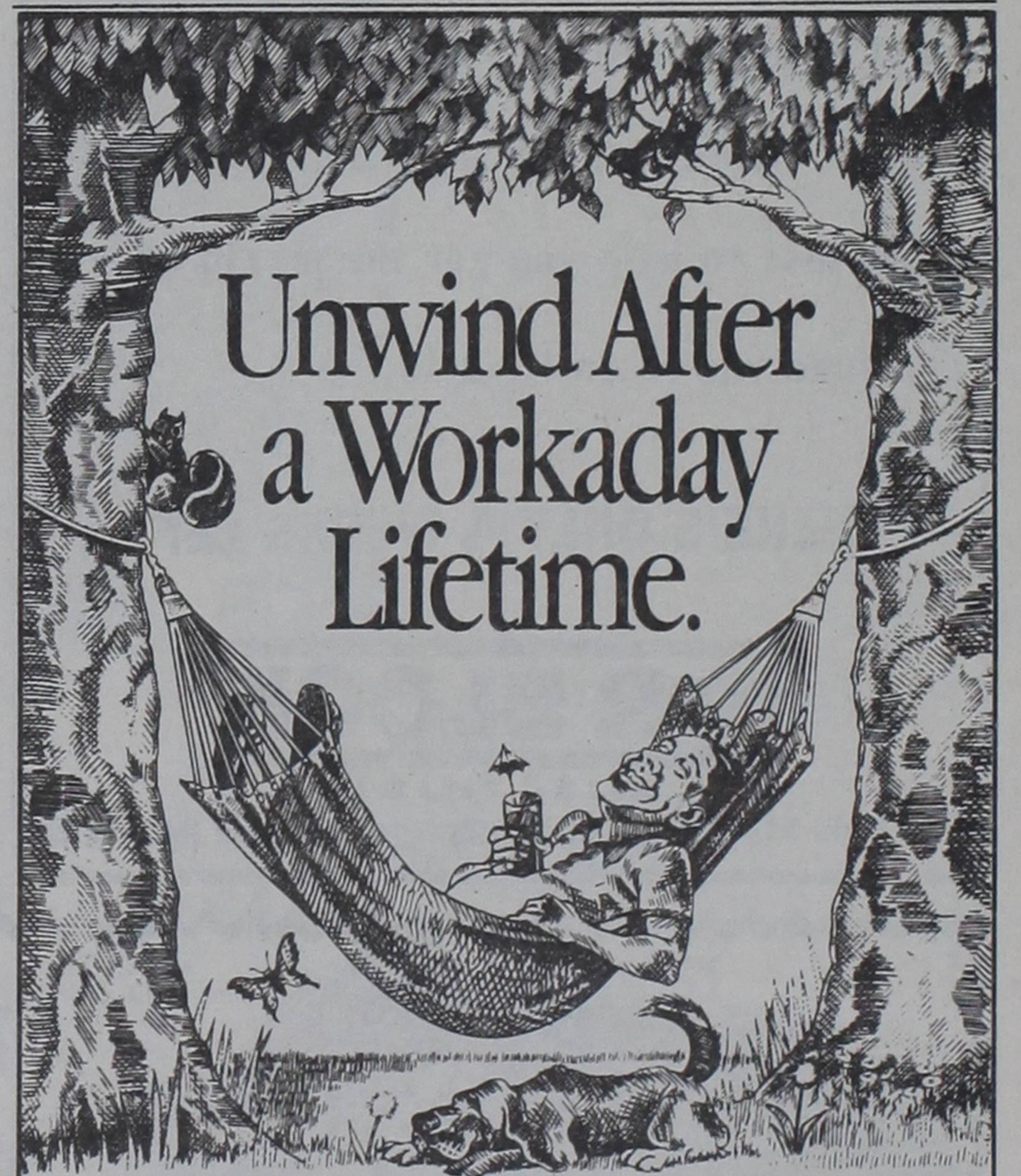

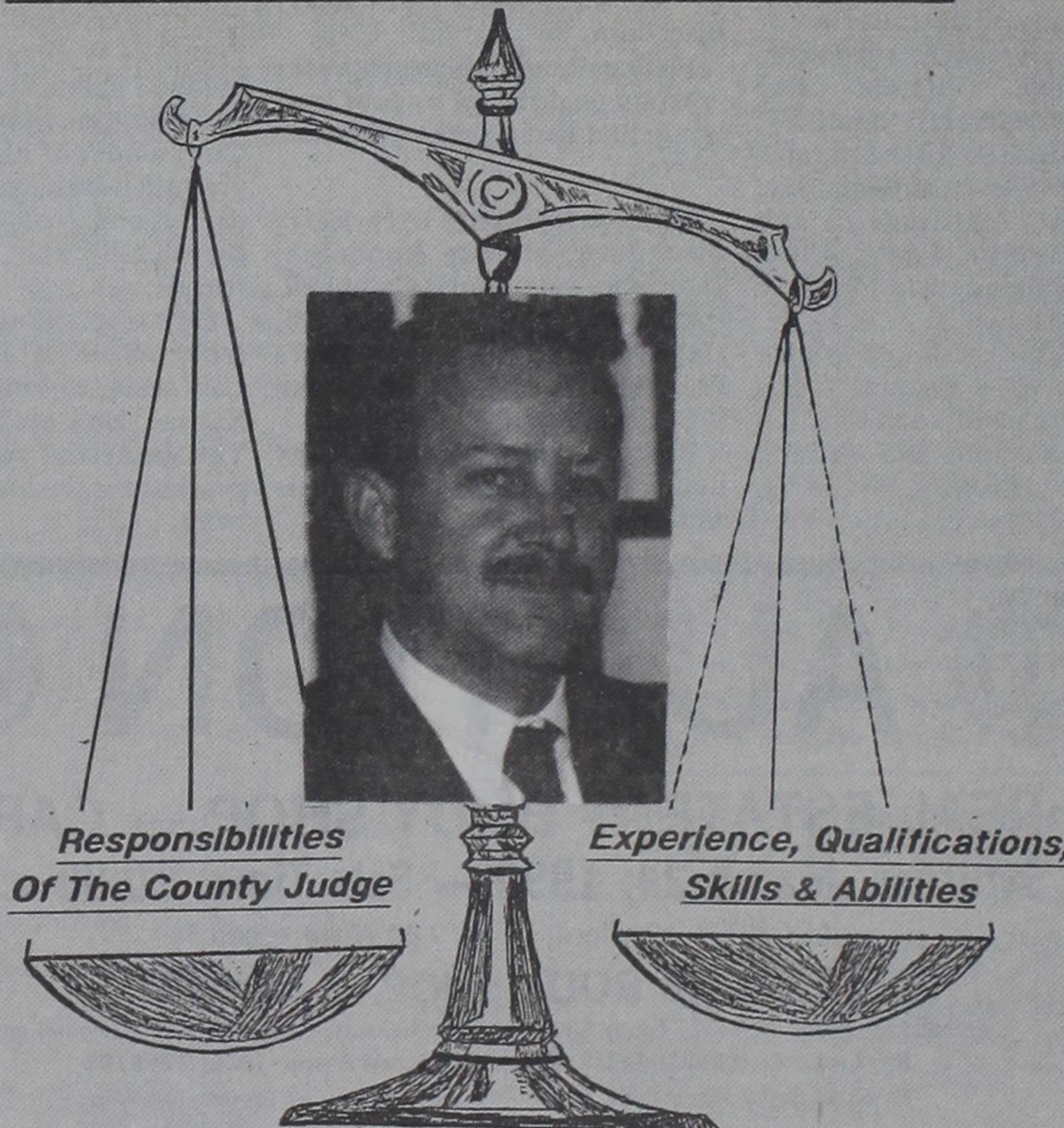

The Excel Beef Packers Corporation has begun taking steps to insure better employee safety with a new Ergonomics program which will go into effect at each plant.

The Ergonomic agreement which was negotiated between the United Food and Commercial Workers Union and Excel's corporate offices has been approved at the local level and a committee has been established to oversee the program.

Dave Stafford, head of the local ergonomic committee said, "The Ergonomic agreement is designed to cut down on the number of on-the-job, stress-related injuries and eliminate cuts and abrasions."

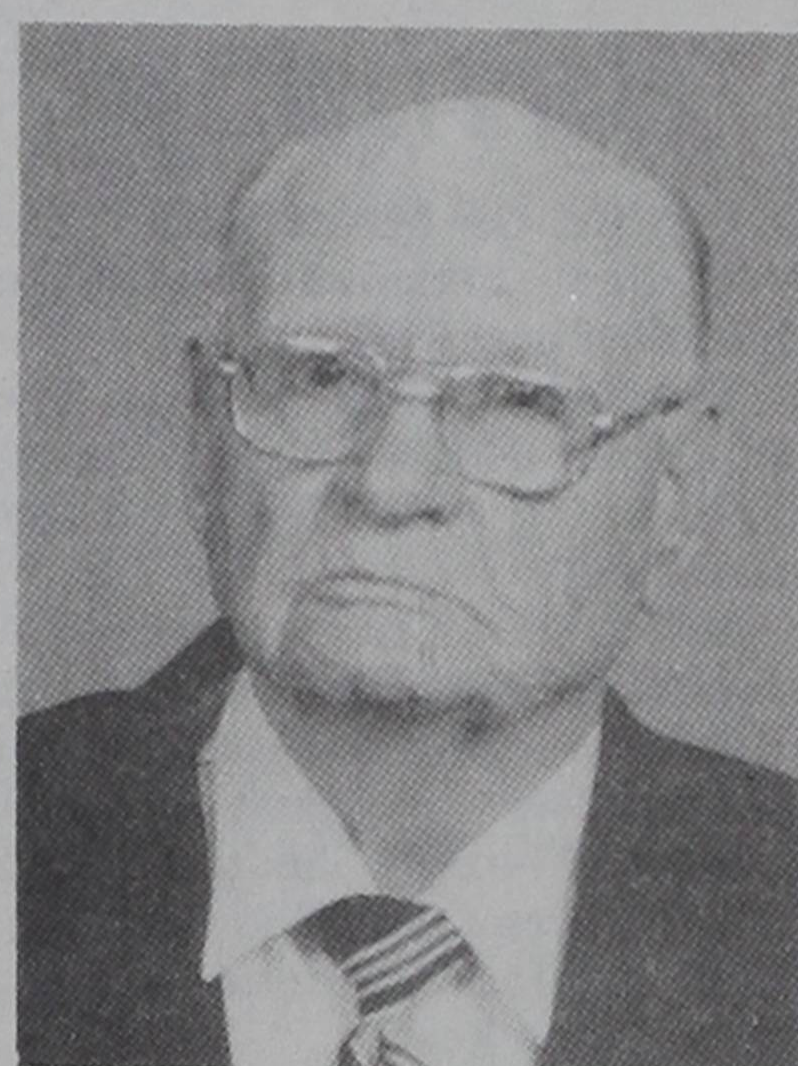
Local Plant Manager Terry Wilkerson said, "Talk of a program of this sort began last year after Iowa Beef Processors was assessed a large fine by OSHA for violations in employee safety."

The changes that are currently being made will help in the long run to increase profits and provide employees a safer working environment.

Tim Jeffress, assistant fabrication manager said, "Changes that have already taken place at the local level range from making adjustments in existing machinery, to buying new machines, and in some cases assigning more or less people to do a certain job."

Stafford also said, "What makes the whole agreement unique is that it was strictly volunteer on the part of the Excel corporation and the Union."

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NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Advisory Council Names F. Everett

A Lazbuddie mother of five has been named to the State Parent Advisory Council for Migrant Children (PAC). Mrs. Fidela Everett is one of only fifteen members chosen from throughout the state to sit on a committee of parents in an advisory capacity to the state's migrant program.

Mrs. Everett explained, "As a member of the Parent Advisory Committee, I shall be one of fifteen responsible for advising the Texas Education Agency in planning, implementing, and evaluating the state program designed to meet the educational needs of our migrant children."

She added, "I am very honored to be chosen as a member of this

great committee."

Mrs. Everett said that the committee will meet three times during the school year in Austin. At the meetings, the committee members, which include a superintendent, a counselor, a teacher, and parents, will discuss a variety of subjects concerning the plans for the future of migrant children.

She listed the role of PAC as follows: 1. to establish and strengthen the cooperation of parents in the education of their children; 2. to provide volunteer help to the classroom teacher to better meet the individual needs of migrant children; 3. to develop an environment that encourages friendly two-way communication between home and school; 4. to allow parents to make significant contributions to their school and to their community.

Mrs. Everett said, "I will do my best to bring information from these conferences so that we can better serve migrant children."

She praised the Lazbuddie I.S.D. migrant program and said that she enjoys working with the school. She works closely with teachers who head up the migrant program, Miss Debra Hall, and para-professional, Mrs. Darla McBroome.

Two issues that are being addressed by the state migrant program that are of particular interest to Mrs. Everett are efforts to curb the drop-out rate among migrant students and the possibility of reaching out to three-year-old migrant children at home. She said that, in the near future, a program may be developed to send people into the homes of three-year-old migrant children to help prepare them for school before they are ever placed in a school atmosphere.

Mrs. Everett stated that a migrant family is any family that

moves from one school district to another for the purpose of farm related employment. She said that migrants can be any nationality or race, and the migrant program was established to help these students, who may move several times during a year, to adjust to a new school environment and to "catch up" with other students.

Fidela Everett is the only representative from Region XVI to the State Parent Advisory Council. She was selected by the Region XVI Service Center to a list of candidates from this region. She was appointed to PAC by the Commissioner of Education based on her qualifications.

Lazbuddie I.S.D. presented Mrs. Everett with an Appreciation Award "for outstanding service to the State PAC and TPCC." Mrs. Eva Alcalá of Lazbuddie also received an award for parent involvement. Lazbuddie School administrators stated that they are very proud to be represented at the state level by Mrs. Everett.

Mrs. Everett commented that everything that is being done statewide in the migrant program is "for the kids." She emphasized this several times and encouraged parents of migrant students "to get involved in their schools for the kids' sakes."

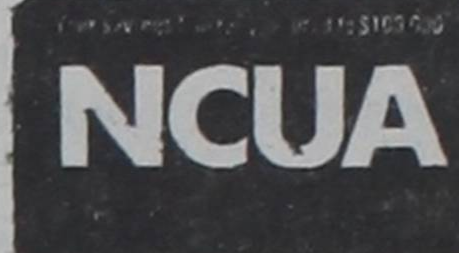

Module XIV: Mutual Funds and Diversification

Two reasons many investors choose mutual funds is diversification and diversification. No, you're not seeing double. It simply means that spreading risk is often the most important factor in an investment program.

For this reason, many investors choose mutual funds that can offer a diversified portfolio of a hundred or more individual securities. This often satisfies the diversification requirement.

Unfortunately, even by spreading risk it is still possible to lose principal. While many mutual funds offer a meaningful history of consistently positive results, none guarantee future performance. Diversification among mutual funds, however, can increase the safety factor.

To illustrate, all you need is a current "Standard and Poor's Stock Guide," which is available at most New York Stock Exchange Member Firms. In the back of this book is a mutual-fund summary with a wealth of statistical information. One fund column shows what \$10,000 invested as of a particular date, usually five or more years, is worth today. That's all that's needed for the diversification game.

Before beginning any multi-fund diversification program, however, two points should be understood. First, plan on leaving your money invested for at least five years. Second, diversify into at least five different mutual funds.

Using these guidelines, we hypothetically placed \$10,000 in each of our five favorite mutual funds. All are managed by the same family of funds. Although this is not necessary, it does offer the benefit of discounted charges

and swapping privileges. It also prevented us from using 20/20 hindsight to select only the best-performing funds. For illustration purposes we chose only middle-of-the-road growth-and-income funds.

Chart A shows that a \$10,000 investment made in each of five selected mutual funds on Dec. 31, 1982, grew to \$117,580. Chart B shows the value of the same \$50,000 divided equally into the first five worst-performing funds shown in the Stock Guide. Even had you selected the five worst-performing funds, as in Case B, your investment would have grown to \$61,034, a gain of \$11,034. Individually, one fund lost slightly, and one was unchanged, but collectively they managed to produce a modest overall profit. Although it offers no guarantee of future results, this little game does make a strong case for diversification.

By doing your homework, a careful selection of diversified funds dedicated to your goals and risk tolerance cannot only increase your safety factor but can also offer the opportunity of reasonable financial rewards.
