ONE OF MY favorite former Parmer County folks was Paul Crume who wrote the page one column for the Dallas Morning News for many years. Back in 1969 he said, "The grass-roots American is neither liberal nor conservative. He is opinionated."

Well, he hit home on that one. I am an opinionated person, and will be glad to generously share my opinion with anybody whether they need it or not.

Another of my favorite folks was Abe Lincoln who once said, "A house divided against itself cannot stand." Well, I am of the opinion that Parmer County and Friona, in particular, has suffered greatly from being "divided against itself" over the years.

It was the cause of the courthouse being lost from the central part of the county and its being placed over on the edge of the state line many years ago. And it has resulted in these three small towns which have had quite a struggle to grow and remain progressive. You don't see this much divisiveness in counties where the courthouse is the hub of the county.

Friona stands to lose a lot if we don't get our local man elected to the County Judge's spot in the coming run-off election. Run-offs in this county have a very poor record of voter turn-out. This is one time when Friona folks cannot afford to stay at home on election day and lose our toe-hold in the courthouse over at Farwell.

When the county was redistricted, to supposedly give the more populous area more of a say, the map was drawn so that all it did was force the Bovina commissioner to have constituents in Western Friona, and the Lazbuddie commissioner to have a strip along Highway 214 leading into Friona. This area gained absolutely nothing from the change, and the cost of local elections was tripled because now we have to have three voting boxes

Mrs. Clayton having gained the endorsements of the Farwell candidates, appears that the current ploy is "let's wrest the judge's seat from Friona's control." That should make voters in the Friona area fighting mad.

At the March 8 meeting of the board of trustees for Friona Independent School District, the board considered contracts of all personnel in the school district for the 1990-91 school term.

All of the teachers were re-hired except two who had submitted their resignations. These were Patsy Kingston, who has taught Early Childhood Education, and Kent Smith, science teacher and assistant coach in high school.

Otherwise, the board approved an order for the election, to be held on Saturday, May 5. Oneida Allen was appointed as absentee voting clerk. Absentee voting by personal appearance will be held at the Superintendent's office from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. from April 18 through May 1.

Kathryn Goddard, board president, certified that all board members have completed the basic amount of school board training required by the Texas Education Agency.

Superintendent Hal Ratcliff reported that school enrollment on February 28, 1990 stood at 1,307 students. This was an increase of 44 students over the enrollment of 1,263 on February 28, 1989.

The board approved the textbook recommendations given by the textbook committee.


Superintendent Ratcliff reported on other routine matters to the board.

But on March 22 of each year in the community of Lazbuddie, the direction of the wind is very important. That is the day Weldon "Indian" Crim makes his annual spring forecast. The "fire burning" is a vital ritual taken from an old Indian tradition in which the wind actually predicts the weather.

The "fire burning" occurs at sunrise on the 22nd, which is traditionally the first day after the start of spring. The wood is stacked in a teepee-type shape, and the direction in which the smoke coming season.

According to the year's wind, Crim predicts a "good" year for area farmers.

A good year is needed for the area because the last such prediction came in 1984. The past five years have all been in the




She married Carl Hall, who preceded her in death. She then married J.J. Waldo.

Since this preferred stock is directly associated with common stock, it's more volatile in market price than the nonconvertible preferred stock, which behaves more like a fixed-income bond.

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

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

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.



Since this is membership month, anyone may attend this concert even if they are not currently members of the concert association, by registering at the door.

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
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
