Efficiency Doesn't Equal Humanity

Once upon a time, long, long ago, but not that long ago, really, I would visit my father's home off Highway 63, east of Livingston in the heart of the Big Thicket. I remember the turn off the highway, wandering through interminable high-rising pine trees that cast autumnal shadows on the red clay, rutted road. As we passed over the rickety one-vehicle bridge that each time I thought would certainly fall in, but never did, and climbed up a steep grade that allowed, on looking back, a view of the dirt-crumbling, muddy creek as it cut across a small stump-studded valley, the road turned fine-sandied, as it twisted through scrub pines, made impenetrable by thick bramble briers. I knew then that we were close to my father's home and began dreading the welcoming kiss snuff-smelling from my grandparents.

Even to a boy of five, locked hard into lower middle class, my father's home was primitive. The wooden, unpainted house had a covered porch stretching across its length. Two deerhide rocking chairs were placed there, upon which grandma and grandpa Walker rocked, after a hard day's labor, dipping and spitting as they waited to wave at the occasional car that would rumble past.

Inside, in the living room, a radio played Hank Williams, Billy Tubbs and Red Foley, and on Sunday, gospel, songs and preaching, so there must have been electricity and light bulbs, although I don't remember them. I do remember the Franklin stove and the warm fire crackling and beckoning before dawn. To the left of the living room were two small bedrooms and in the back a oneroom kitchen and eating area abutted with a small nub of a porch, upon the rail of which sat a bucket with a water dipper from which we all drank. The water tasted good and was cool, always.

I don't ever remember taking a bath there, and probably didn't. I do remember flies and flyswatters and churning milk on the front porch. They didn't have running water, or central heat and air. They didn't have screen doors, or windows. There was no dishwasher, or washing machine, or clothes dryer. No television, or telephone. They made their own soap, cured their own meat, grew their own vegetables. For fun you rocked on the front porch, dipped snuff and went fishing.

They also didn't have Fax machines, call-waiting, answering devices, electronic mail, car phones, and all the other modern conveniences that mess up our lives. No one had heard of genetic engineering and euthanasia.

Sometimes, now, we're too efficient, and efficiency doesn't equal humanity. Faster is not necessarily better.

Some technical devices cause more stress than they alleviate.

When we allow science to impose untested new technologies on society without considering their broader implications I wonder if a primitive culture might not be better. Technological advances that endanger our environment and diminish our view of human life cannot be considered more appropriate than rocking on the front porch and dipping snuff.

We must find a balance between efficiency and empathy -- a middle ground between lye soap and electronic mail. We benefit from efficiency only when it allows us to live more simply, not when it makes our lives more complex. A question for this new decade now becomes how to simplify our lives, while at the same time, becoming more efficient.

Because I seek, always, a simpler, gentler life, I plan to return this spring to the home that now I visit only in memory. If that place of long ago still exists, I hope to find running water there, but no answering machine.



Efficiency Doesn't Equal Humanity

Once upon a time, long, long ago, but not that long ago, really, I would visit my father's home off Highway 63, east of Livingston in the heart of the Big Thicket. I remember the turn off the highway, wandering through interminable high-rising pine trees that cast autumnal shadows on the red clay, rutted road. As we passed over the rickety one-vehicle bridge that each time I thought would certainly fall in, but never did, and climbed up a steep grade that allowed, on looking back, a view of the dirt-crumbling, muddy creek as it cut across a small stump-studded valley, the road turned fine-sandied, as it twisted through scrub pines, made impenetrable by thick bramble briers. I knew then that we were close to my father's home and began dreading the welcoming kiss snuff-smelling from my grandparents. Even to a boy of five, locked hard into lower middle class, my father's home was primitive. The wooden, unpainted house had a covered porch stretching across its length. Two deerhide rocking chairs were placed there, upon which grandma and grandpa Walker rocked, after a hard day's labor, dipping and spitting as they waited to wave at the occasional car that would rumble past. Inside, in the living room, a radio played Hank Williams, Billy Tubbs and Red Foley, and on Sunday, gospel, songs and preaching, so there must have been electricity and light bulbs, although I don't remember them. I do remember the Franklin stove and the warm fire crackling and beckoning before dawn. To the left of the living room were two small bedrooms and in the back a oneroom kitchen and eating area abutted with a small nub of a porch, upon the rail of which sat a bucket with a water dipper from which we all drank. The water tasted good and was cool, always. Beyond the smokehouse, and the outhouse, past the hog pen lay the small field that my grandfather plowed. He raised some peanuts and corn, I remember, but even then the land he plowed with his

inadequate.

I don't ever remember taking a bath there, and probably didn't. I do remember flies and flyswatters and churning milk on the front porch. They didn't have running water, or central heat and air. They didn't have screen doors, or windows. There was no dishwasher, or washing machine, or clothes dryer. No television, or telephone. They made their own soap, cured their own meat, grew their own vegetables. For fun you rocked on the front porch, dipped snuff and went fishing.

They also didn't have Fax machines, call-waiting, answering devices, electronic mail, car phones, and all the other modern conveniences that mess up our lives. No one had heard of genetic engineering and euthanasia. Sometimes, now, we're too efficient, and efficiency doesn't equal humanity. Faster is not
