Loyalty Day Is In Local Spotlight

The first of May is "Loyalty Day" and as such it is a day filled with activities designed to involve the community in an overt display of loyalty to flag and country. Fields, commander of Parmer County Memorial VFW Post number 1413.

Loyalty Day has become a tradition with the Veterans of Foreign Wars. With the passage of Public Law 85-529 on July 18, 1958, the VFW won a long hard battle to have Loyalty Day approved by Congress. However, this day does not belong to the VFW alone, it belongs to all Americans.

Date Set For Soil Stewardship Week

Emphasizing everyone's role in protecting soil and water resources for future generations, the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is encouraging local churches, organizations and individuals to join the nationwide observance of Soil and Water Stewardship Week, April 29-May 6.

The local district, which works throughout the year on soil and water conservation measures, is providing literature and speakers that highlight man's responsibility to be active stewards of our nation's soil and water resources.

M.C. Osborn, chairman of the Parmer County SWCD, said that everyone needs to learn about the

impact of their actions and the actions of those around us. "Recognizing that, we can commit ourselves to individual and community action. By using good erosion prevention practices, conserving water or simply planting a tree, we'll each help make the world a better place for our children's children," said Osborn.

Since 1955, the National Association of Conservation Districts has sponsored Soil and Water Stewardship Week, in cooperation with nearly 3,000 local districts nationwide, as one way to emphasize the importance of good stewardship of basic soil and water resources.

Track Teams Are In Regional Meet

The Friona Chieftains and Squaws are participating in the Region 1-AAA track and field meet at Odessa this weekend.

The Chieftains are competing in eight individual events plus the mile relay, while the Squaws are competing in four individual events and with their 400-meter relay team.

Seniors John Edd Duke and Jeff Stowers have been the most consistent winners for the Chieftains this spring, and may have the best chances for a state meet berth, but anything is possible.

For one thing, sophomore Curtis Brady was the team's only winner in last week's regional qualifiers' meet at Canyon, leaping 22-1/4 in the long jump. The Chieftain sophomore missed several meets this spring, and may not have hit his peak as yet.

Duke will enter both the 1600 and 3200-meter runs at the regional meet, having won both races on the district level. His best time in the mile is 4:44, and in the two-mile it's 10:04.5.

Stowers has run the 300-meter hurdles in 39.4, but barely edged Michael Ethridge of Dimmitt in the district meet.

Besides this trio, freshman high jumper Brian Herring raised some eyebrows by winning district as a frosh, and will try his luck at regional. His best height is 6-0.

Distance runner Ramon Sanchez is also a regional entrant, having placed second to Duke in both the mile and two-mile at district, and Ismael Rocha is a qualifier in the 200-meter dash.

Friona's 400-meter relay team also is competing at regional. Members of the team are Scott Houston, Rocha, Andre Duran and Stowers.

For the Squaws, Kendra Gordon is competing in two events, the shot put and the 800-meter run. Miss Gordon threw the shot 32-4 1/2 at district, and ran the half mile in 2:35.45.

Freshman Mendi Milner will enter the 300-meter hurdles, after winning district with a 48.43 time.

Jenny Procter will compete in the 400-meter run, where she had a 61.88 effort at district.

The Squaws' 1600-meter relay team, composed of Alicia Widner, Misses Milner, Gordon and Procter, will also compete at Odessa. Their district time was 4:15.27.

Friona Will Host Jr. High UIL Meet

Tuesday, May 1, Friona will host the UIL Literary Meet for the elementary and junior high. Tuesday's meet will consist of ready writing for grades 3-8 and science for grades 7-8. All contests will be held in the junior high building. Events begin at 4:30 p.m.

Friday, May 4, Friona will host the junior high One Act Play Contest in the Junior High Auditorium. Plays begin at 1 p.m.

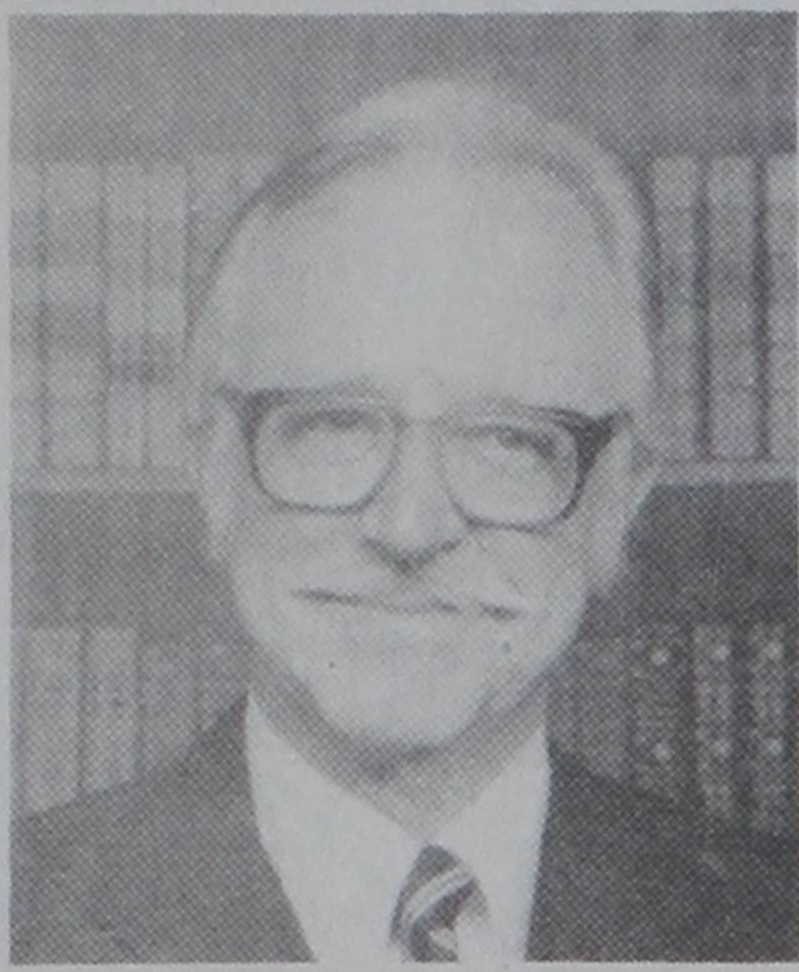
Saturday, May 5, Friona will host the remaining UIL events for the elementary and junior high. Saturday's meet will consist of

second and third grade storytelling, fifth-eighth number sense, fourth-fifth picture memory, fifth-eighth spelling and fifth-eighth oral reading.

Events begin at 8:30 a.m. and run continuously until about 1:30 p.m. Events will take place in both the elementary and junior high buildings.

An awards assembly is planned for approximately 1:30-2 p.m., depending on how events finish.

Schools participating are Dimmitt, Floydada, Friona, Littlefield, Muleshoe and Tulia.

Jr. High Classes Are Feted

Bill Harris, a retired Defense Department employee, spoke to the sixth grade social studies classes recently at Friona Junior High.

Harris now lives in Amarillo, but has lived in Singapore and on the island of Okinawa. He has also traveled extensively throughout Asia. He is related to Elizabeth Gore of Friona.

Harris has 30 years' experience in solving management problems, especially those involving organization, executive development programs and integration of programs and budgets.

He served as financial consultant to the Minister of Defense, Republic of Singapore. As management consultant, he served as advisor to the minister.

He also served as deputy comptroller for the Army Material Command, supervising the financial management and program coordination in an organization of 160,000 employees with budgets ranging from \$9 to \$14 billion. He had an immediate staff of 250 to 400 and a field staff of 6,000 to 7,500.

Harris also served as assistant comptroller of the Army, providing leadership, guidance and staff supervision for the integration of programming, budgeting, accounting and manpower control into a single management system.

He received his BSS degree from American University in psychology, and his MA from George Washington University in public administration.

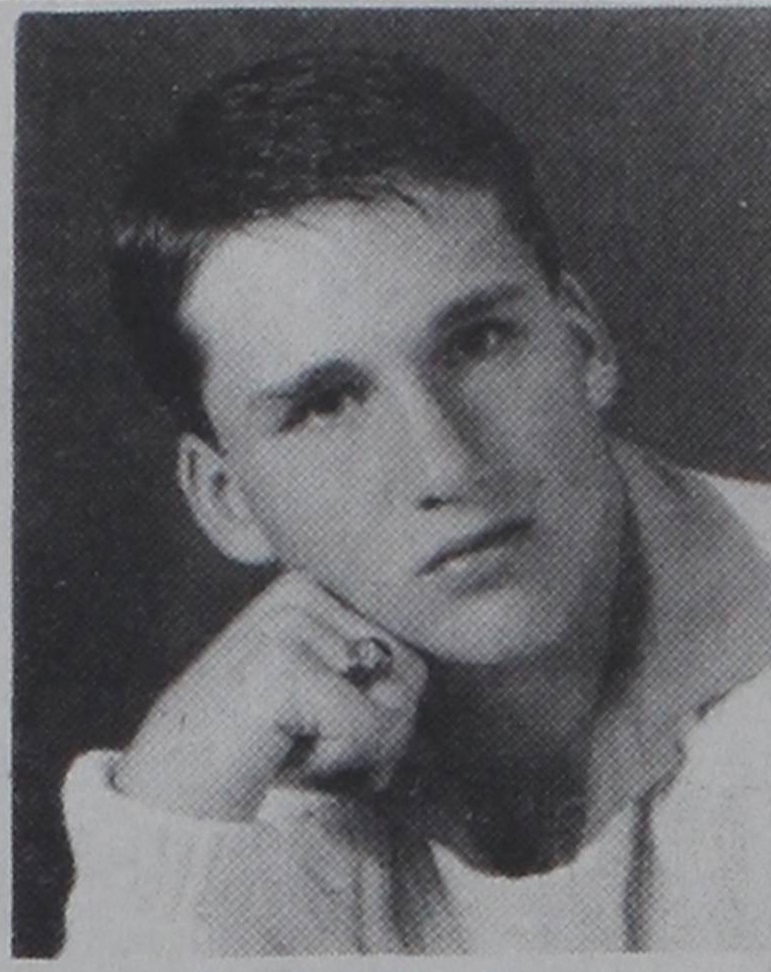
Marca Lynn Herring delivered a can of popcorn donated by Friona State Bank, which is enjoyed as a snack by those attending the social.

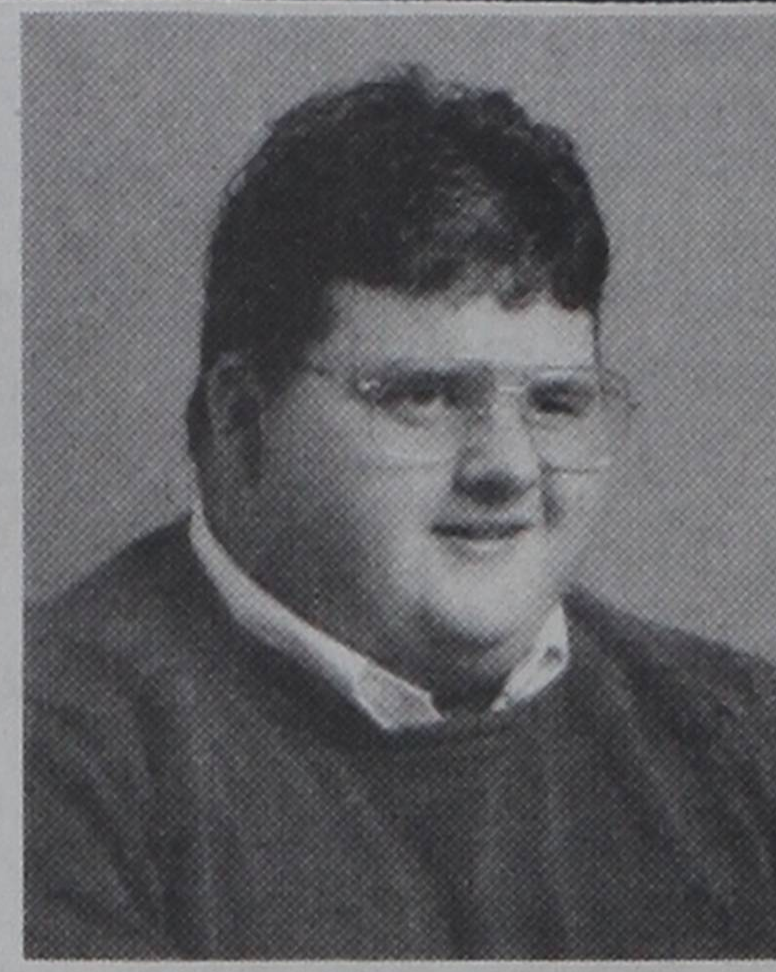

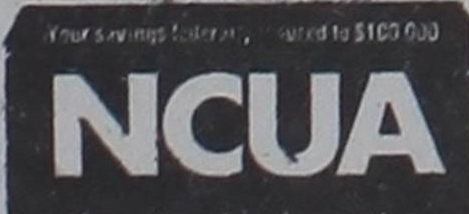

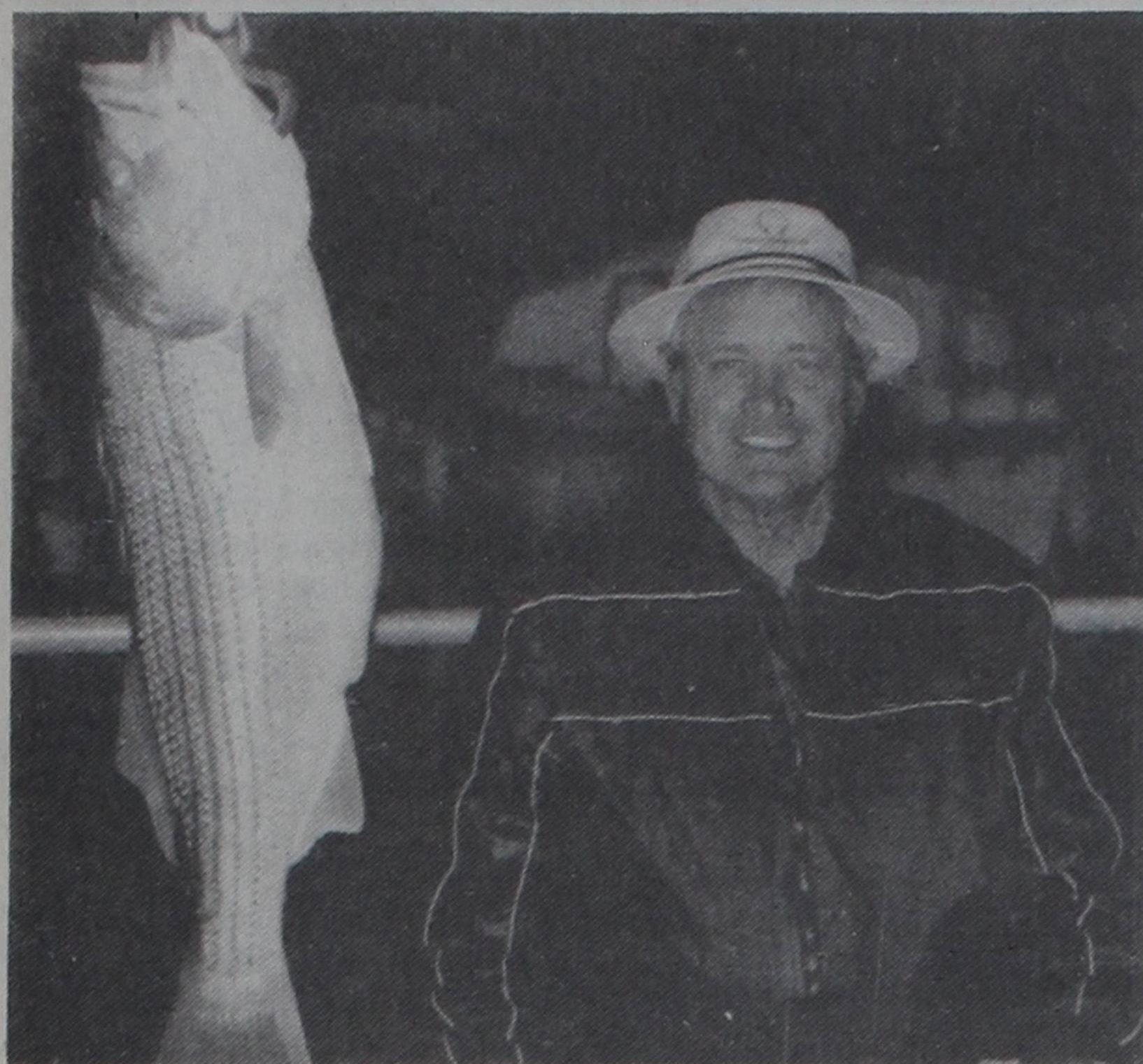

Norton Attends Seminar

Parmer County treasurer, Anne Norton, took part in the 18th Annual County Treasurers' Seminar at Texas A&M University, April 16-19.

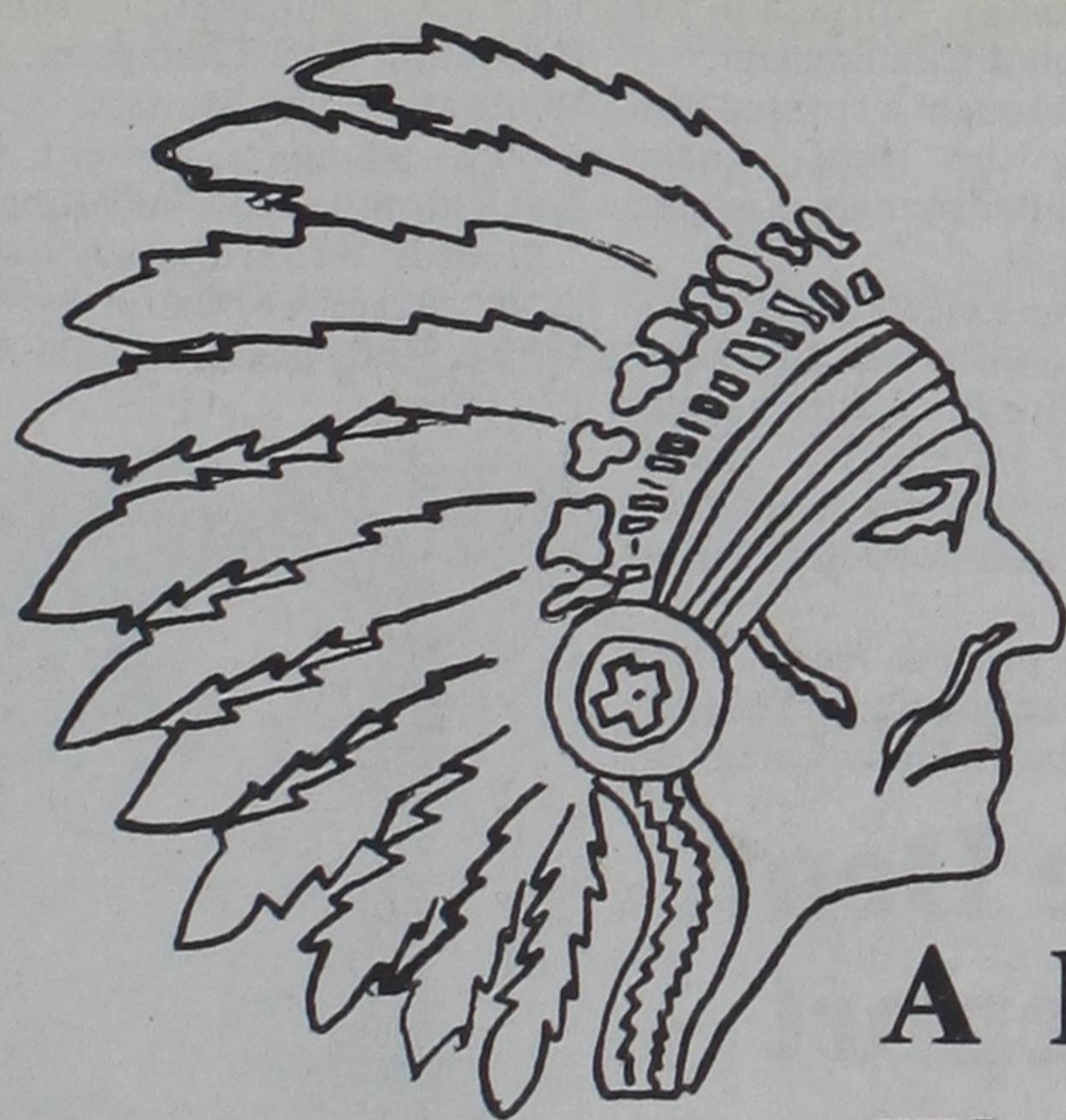

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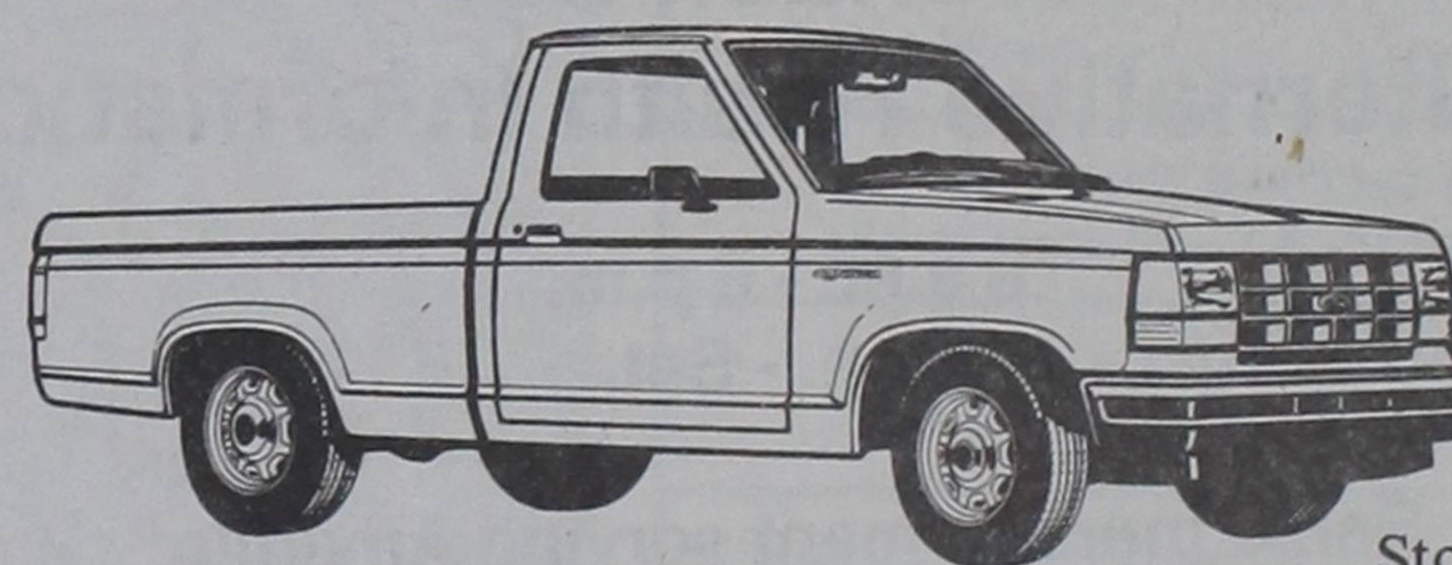
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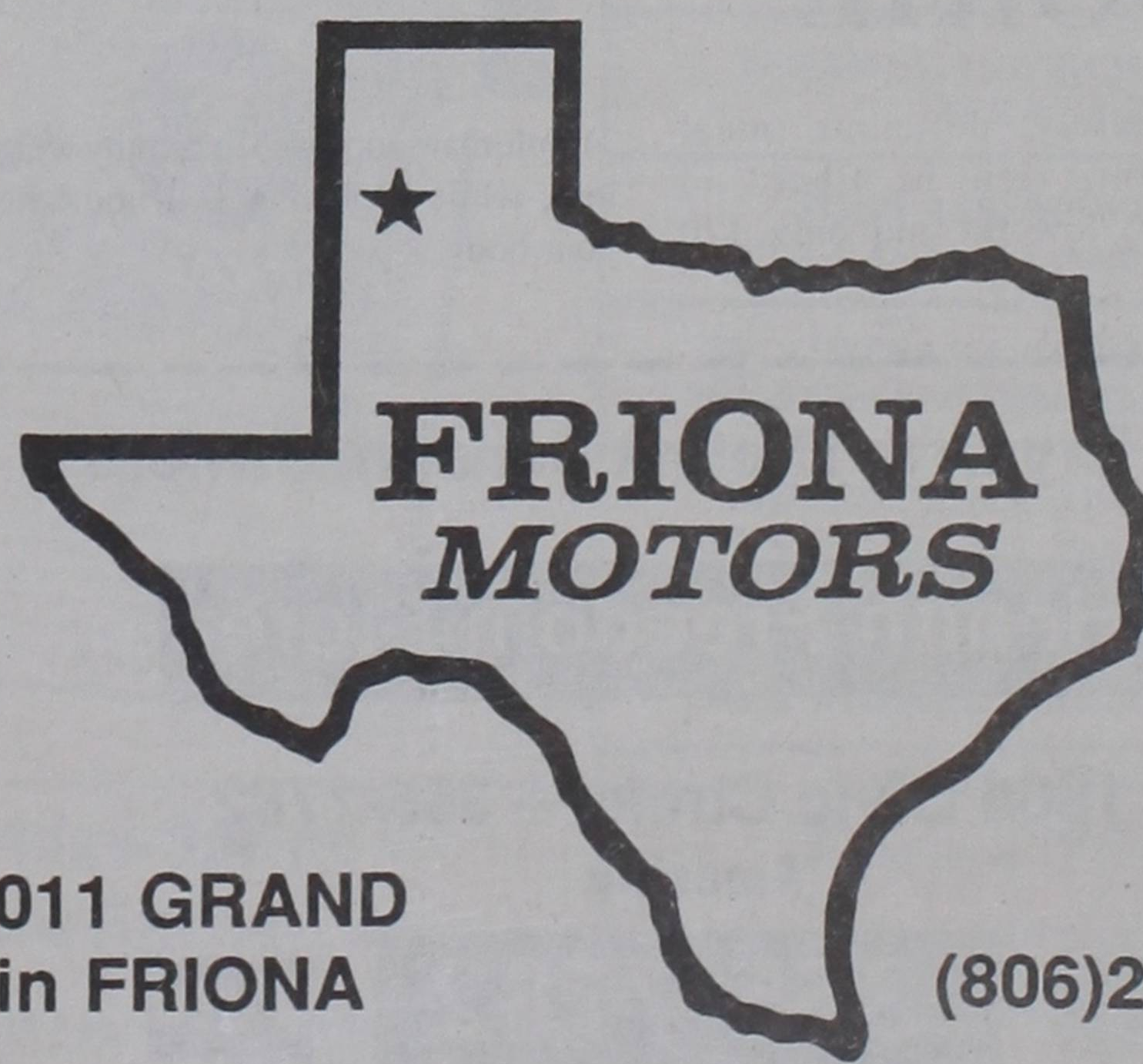

Students making the President's Honor List included: Glenda Lynn Ellis, a junior food and technology

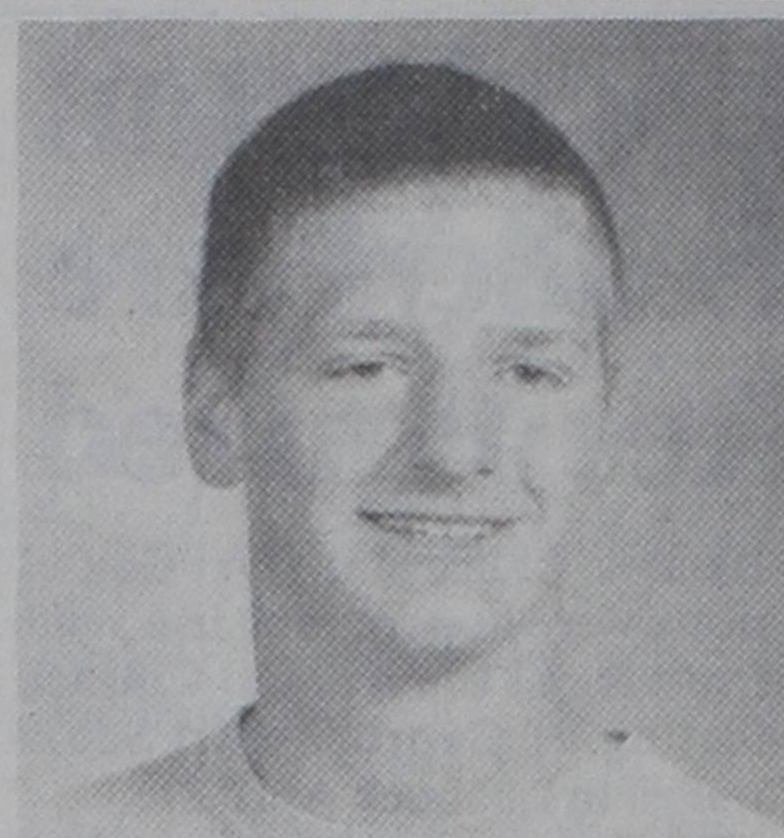

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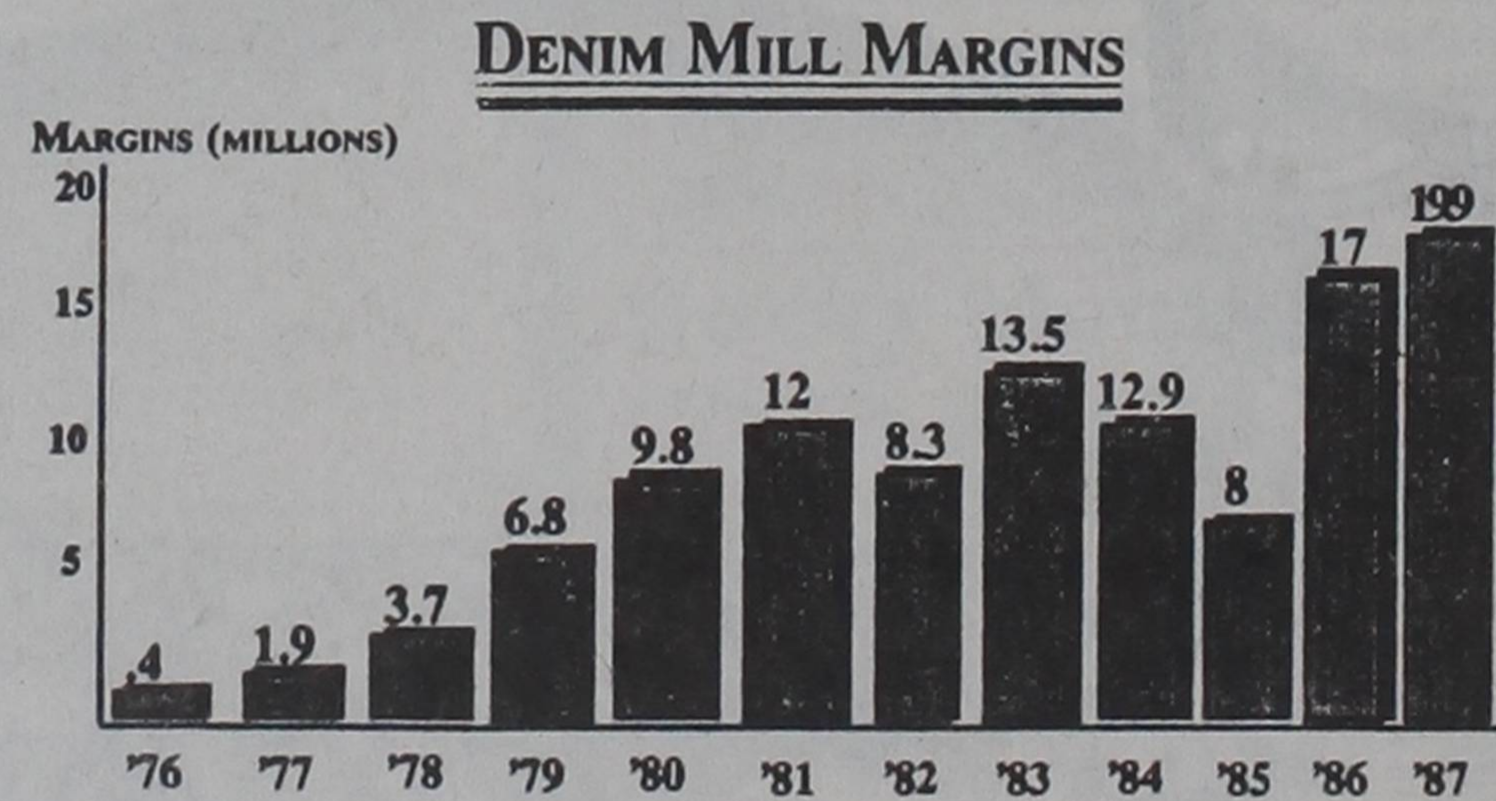
