## Excel Files Suit Against Law Firm

THE LAST FEW YEARS, movie buffs have had their fill of oldtime comic book heroes made to come to life on the big screen.

First it was the Superman series, which made a millionaire of Christopher Reeve, and allowed this writer's generation to once again watch the Superman-Lois Lane-Clark Kent menage-a-trois in movie form. Not just once, but Superman II and III (we've lost count).

Don't know what we were doing last summer, but somehow or other we personally missed the Batman movie, but turned that over to our youngest kid. He thought it was far out, or something like that.

This summer's offering is Dick Tracy, played by Warren Beatty. Ye editor never was that much of a Dick Tracy fan, but no doubt the movie will do well. They usually do.

Before the current generation decides that making movies about comic strip heroes is the "new fad," however, they need to stop for just a minute.

"Tarzan" appeared first in book form, then a comic strip, and then a never-ending series of black and white movies, making a household name for Johnny Weissmuller, the former Olympic swimming champion who played Tarzan for more than a decade.

Movie-goers in the 1940s will also recall that Chic Young's Blondie had quite a run, with Penny Singleton and Arthur Lake in the lead roles. If you flip through the "nostalgia" channels on late-night cable TV, you might occasionally find one of these films.

Black-and-white movies didn't have the monopoly of bringing the comics to life, as a number of radio shows sprang from the daily comic strips, such as Terry and the Pirates, The Shadow, Superman and the Lone Ranger. There were probably more of these, we mainly recall the ones we could get on Amarillo or Lubbock radio (those were the only stations in this area at the time).

Some comic strip heroes made it big in Broadway plays, and then later the movies. Such were the case for Li'l Abner and Annie (from Little Orphan Annie).

In recent years, some of the comic strip characters have gone directly to television, by-passing the big screen. This worked for Wonder Woman, well depicted (ye editor thought) by Lynda Carter, and only recently we saw a movie about the "Archie" comic strip, complete with Veronica and Betty, on TV.

Of course, the animated cartoons have always been a big hit, beginning with Walt Disney's characters, and including such regulars as the "Peanuts" series.

In some respects, this "humanizing" of comic strip heroes always loses a little bit in the translation. It is sort of like the change from radio days to television, where you had a mind's-eye picture of your hero, then they picked a character that didn't look at all like you had your hero envisioned.

But the practice of moving a hero from one medium (comic strips) to another (movies, TV, etc.) seems to still be very popular.

It's been going on for over 50 years, and no doubt will continue for awhile yet. Wonder if they'll ever do a Captain Marvel? Shazam!

(From the Amarillo Globe-News) The Excel Corp., a subsidiary of Cargill Industries, is suing a Wichita Falls law firm for alleged "injury chasing" in workers' compensation cases.

Excel filed the suit Monday in 242nd state District Judge Marvin Marshall's court in Plainview against the law firm of Mason & Snodgrass of Wichita Falls, paralegal Trisha Owen of Wichita Falls and Leonel Esquivel of Plainview.

According to the suit, Esquivel was employed by Mason & Snodgrass as "a recruiter for the purpose of soliciting clients" for the firm.

In addition to Esquivel, the suit claims Mason & Snodgrass "employed or paid many other individuals for recruiting or soliciting clients"--including Owen, who works as a paralegal for the firm.

The firm "has actively engaged in payment of fees or the dividing of fees with non-lawyers," the suit alleges.

The suit also claims that Owen "did on numerous occasions come to Hale County, Texas, and rent a hotel room or other facility in Plainview in order to actively solicit clients for Mason & Snodgrass."

Excel claims the actions of

Mason & Snodgrass are in violation of Bar Association rules and state laws against barratry.

The suit is asking for an unspecified dollar amount in damages and an injunction to keep the firm from "soliciting or contacting employees of Excel for the purpose of representing their interests in workers' compensation claims."

Excel maintains the firm's improper solicitation of Excel employees has caused higher workers' compensation costs, due to claims being filed which would not otherwise have been filed and claims for higher amounts than what otherwise would have been claimed.

The suit comes in the wake of publicity that Excel may close its plants in Friona and Plainview if workers' compensation costs cannot be brought down.

In an earlier interview, Greg Lauser, a spokesman for Excel, said Excel had devoted about \$13 million to workers' compensation costs to the plant in Plainview and Friona during the fiscal year that ended May 1, 1989.

That amount was about 4.5 times more in workers' compensation than the combined total of Excel's four other beef processing plants in other states, Lauser said.

Cary Humphries, the Plainview Excel general manager, said, "This fiscal year, the (workers' compensation) figure is expected to be \$20 million or more. That cannot continue, which is why we have made our employees and fellow citizens of Plainview and Friona aware of the threat to the continued economic viability of our Texas plants."

## Fr. Dran: 40 Years In Priesthood

Father Timothy Dran, pastor of St. Ann's Catholic Church in Bovina and St. Teresa's in Friona, will be celebrating 40 years of priesthood this month.

Born in the Bronx, New York of parents, the late George and Kathryn Dran, he took his primary education in Jersey City, N.J.

After high school, he joined the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement at Graymoor, Garrison, New York.

From there he continued his studies in philosophy and theology at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. where he received a B.A. in philosophy. He was ordained as a priest at the Friars Monastery in Garrison, New York, on June 17, 1950.

Father Timothy had various assignments in the States as well as Canada from Nova Scotia on the east coast to Vancouver on the

west coast with two years in Montreal in between. Fr. Dran is the youngest of three children, a brother and a sister. His sister, Kay Schiller, is now living in Somerset, N.J.

Father Dran was first assigned to Texas in 1963 by his superiors, as assistant pastor at St. Anthony's Church in Hereford. He returned to Texas in January, 1987 after being appointed by Bishop L. Matthiesen of Amarillo as pastor of both St. Ann's in Bovina and St. Teresa's in Friona.

Last year, Fr. Tim (as his friends call him) had to undergo open heart surgery in Amarillo, where he received a steel mitral valve implant in his heart. Since that time he is doing well and says that some people claim they can hear the valve "clicking like a Mickey Mouse watch" when they stand next to him.

Fr. Tim hopes to continue as

pastor "for as long as the Good Lord allows," he says. On Sunday, June 10, Fr. Tim will offer an anniversary Mass of Thanksgiving at St. Ann's Church in Bovina at 4 p.m. followed by a dinner in the Parish Hall. On Wednesday, June 13, he will again offer another Mass of Thanksgiving for his people in Friona at St. Teresa's Catholic Church at 7 p.m., followed by a dinner in the Hall.

Everyone is invited to either celebration and no invitations are being sent.

enabled us to enhance the appearance of the intersection of Main Street and Highway 60," said Kathryn Goddard, executive vice president of the Chamber.

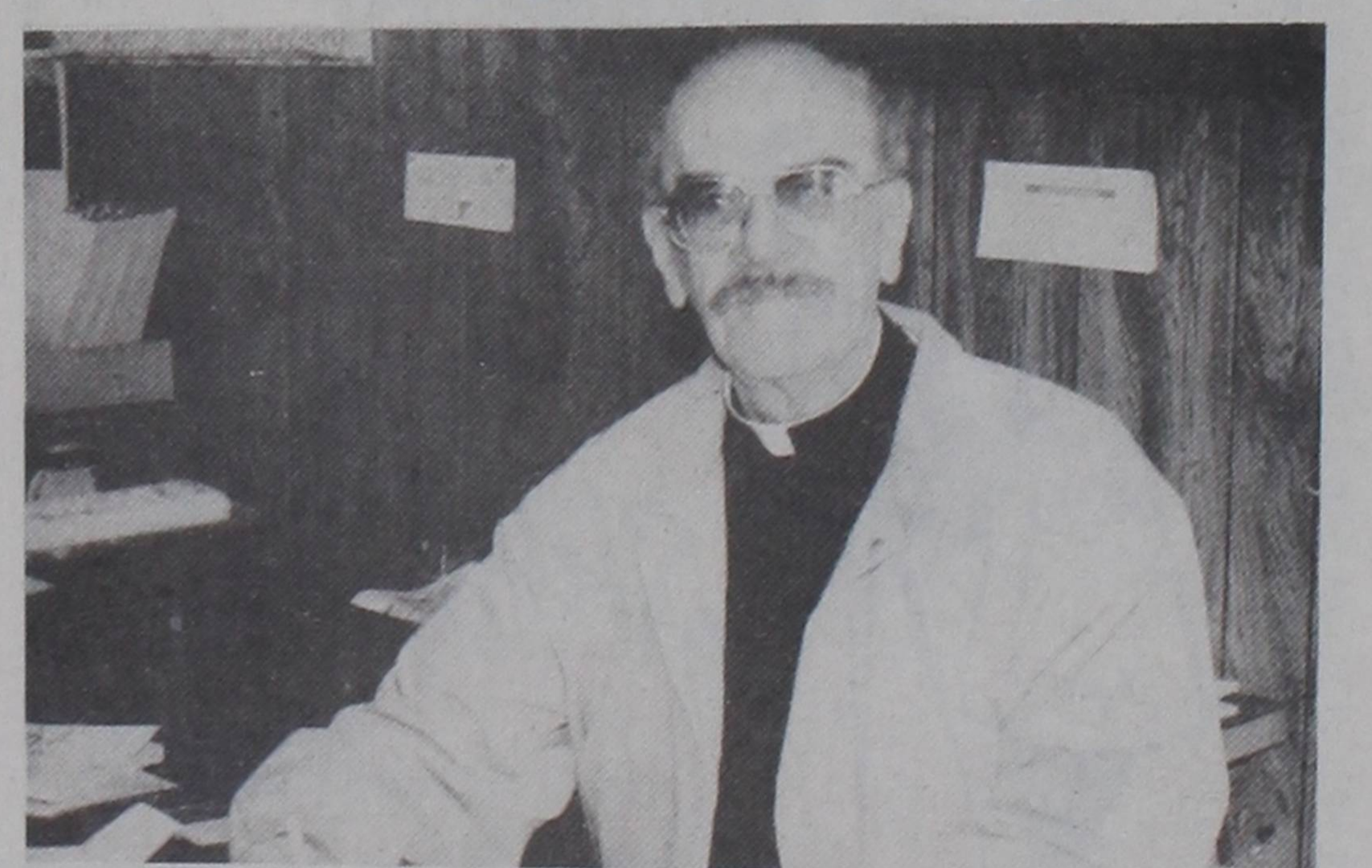

## Evaluation Offered For Area Irrigators

Irrigation represents the nation's greatest consumptive use of water. Industry and irrigation together use most of the water withdrawn from primary sources. In fact, farmers and ranchers withdraw nearly five times as much water for irrigation as municipalities use, and three-fourths as much as industries do. Irrigation consumes probably three times as much water as all other uses combined.

Throughout the irrigated areas farmers are becoming more conscious of the need to improve their irrigation systems and distribution lay-outs in order to use the already available water more efficiently. Water conservation must be accomplished through human effort. It will not get done until people have the knowledge, desire and means to do it. In all cases, a conservation farm plan is very important as a farmer's own guide in making the right decisions as to the kinds and sequence of practice to be applied on irrigated lands as on other land.

Water management on the farm is the crux or pay-off of irrigation development. One of the practices being applied in the area is surge flow irrigation. Through surge flow irrigation in appropriate soils, application efficiency can be as high as 85%. Surge is a relatively recent development which allow

for the intermittent application flow water to furrows in a series of surges rather than the traditional continuous furrow stream. It helps in sealing the soil surface and reduction in deep percolation losses.

The use of sprinkler systems has expanded rapidly during the past five to ten years. Center pivot systems have become increasingly popular in the area due to their reduced labor requirements and the ability to irrigate 20-25% more acreage with the same amount of water as with furrow irrigation.

It is recommended that an on-site irrigation system efficiency evaluation be done. They require four to six hours for sprinkler systems. The efficiency evaluation can analyze the delivery system's application rate and pattern uniformity; calculate the efficiency of the pumping plants; demonstrate the use of water metering; inform the farmer of equipment efficiency, evaporation, run-off water losses, and nozzle application patterns.

## Municipal Bonds Are Not All Risk Free

Tax-free municipal bonds, or "munis," traditionally have been one of the safest ways to invest your money. They still are, if, as with any investment decision, you exercise reasonable caution.

Munis offers the advantage of tax-free income because they are generally issued to finance public projects, such as highways, schools, hospitals and public utilities. Municipal bonds are not, however, issued by the federal government and should not be confused with government bonds.

A recent edition of Changing Times cited 123 municipal-bond issues valued at \$1.1 billion that defaulted in 1987.

Here are some reasonable precautions to exercise when buying munis: (1) Make sure the bond you were sold is the same bond described in your official confirmation. When the bond is delivered, verify the description of the bond with the description on your confirmation. Pay particular attention to the name and description of the issuer, the interest rate and the date of

maturity. Mistakes happen, and you want to be sure the proper bond was delivered to you.

(2) Read the bond indenture on the certificate. The indenture is your formal agreement with the bond issuer covering such considerations as the form of the bond, amount of the issue, property pledged, redemption right and call privileges.

(3) A legal opinion on a tax-exempt bond is necessary. The legal opinion on the certificate is the opinion of counsel that these bonds are free of federal taxes. The legal entity rendering the opinion is identified, and the opinion is signed by an official of that firm.

(4) If your bond is registered, make certain the registration is in the name or names you requested.

(5) Finally, if safety is a major concern, consider investing in insured munis. These bonds are backed by the credit of the issuer and are insured as to the timely payment of principal and interest by one of several major municipal-bond insurance groups. The largest and most widely used are American Municipal Bond Assurance Corp. (AMBAC), Municipal Bond Insurance Association (MBIA), and Financial Guaranty Insurance Corp. (FGIC). Your broker can furnish you with information on these insurers and others.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has instituted a Class Action Lawsuit seeking judicial approval of a settlement reached in Docket No. 7297, an inquiry of General Counsel of the Public Utility Commission of Texas into possible overcharges which occurred between September, 1976, and February, 1987, due to rounding practices, on bills of intrastate WATS/800 customers sent by Southwestern Bell and other telephone companies which concur in Southwestern Bell's tariff. The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District Court of Travis County, Texas.

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

### Claim Forms And Additional Information

Those customers who think they may be entitled to a refund or who desire more information must call 1-800-782-3026, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or write to WATS Refund Pool Administrator, One Bell Plaza, Room 670, P. O. Box 650376, Dallas, Texas 75265-0376, to request a WATS Refund Information Package. The WATS Refund Information Package will contain further information regarding the lawsuit and eligibility for a refund, a description of documentation required to support a customer's claim for refund, and a refund claim form to be filled out and submitted requesting a refund. REQUESTING A WATS REFUND INFORMATION PACKAGE DOES NOT OBLIGATE YOU IN ANY WAY.

All claims for a refund must be received by the Refund Pool Administrator by Friday, October 5, 1990, and all rejections of the settlement (that is, requests for exclusion from the class action lawsuit) must be received by the Court by Wednesday, September 5, 1990. Only those who respond by filing a claim or by filing a rejection of the settlement, as explained in the WATS Refund Information Package, will receive notice of future developments in this proceeding.

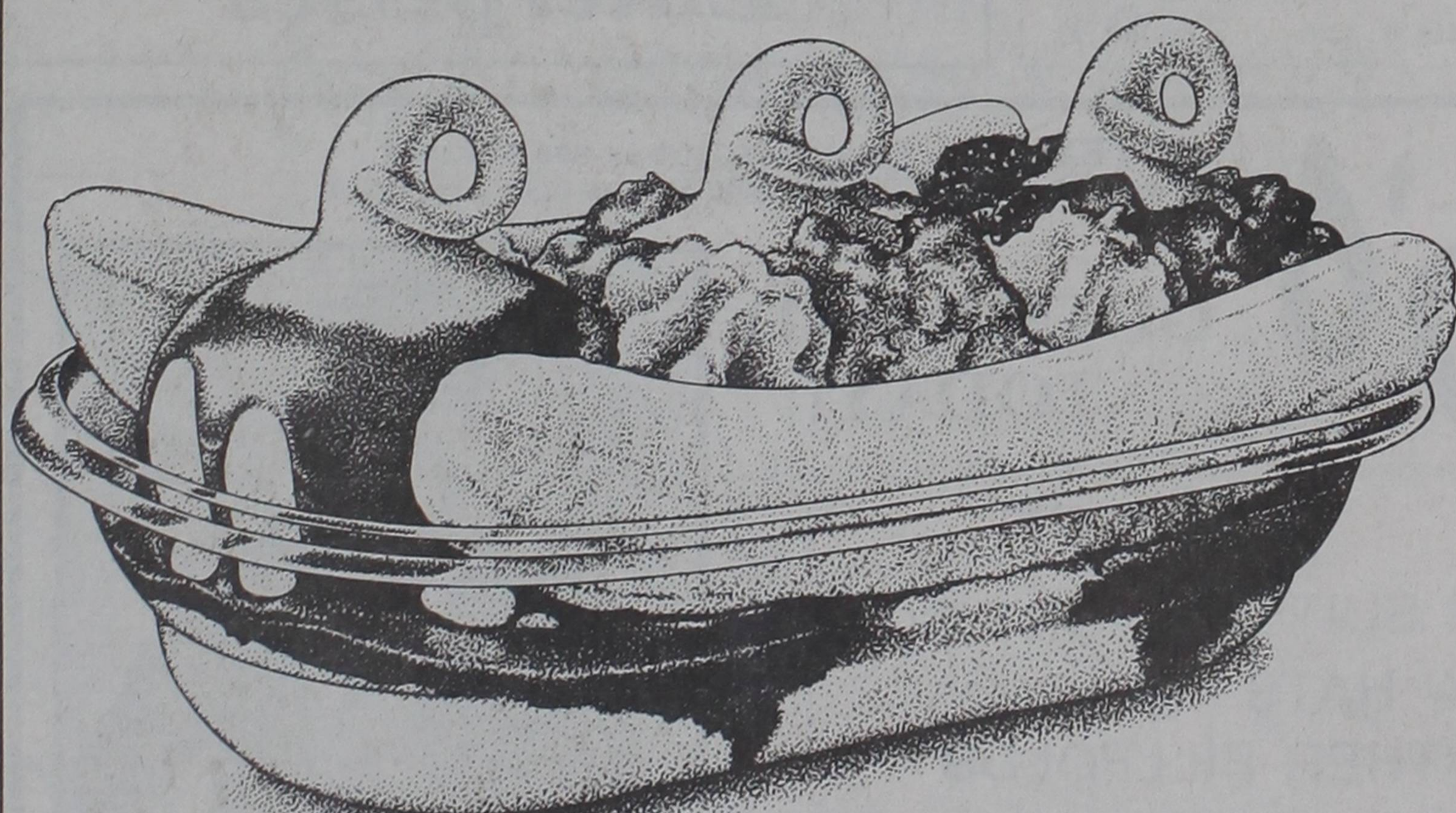

# Choir Will Sing Here

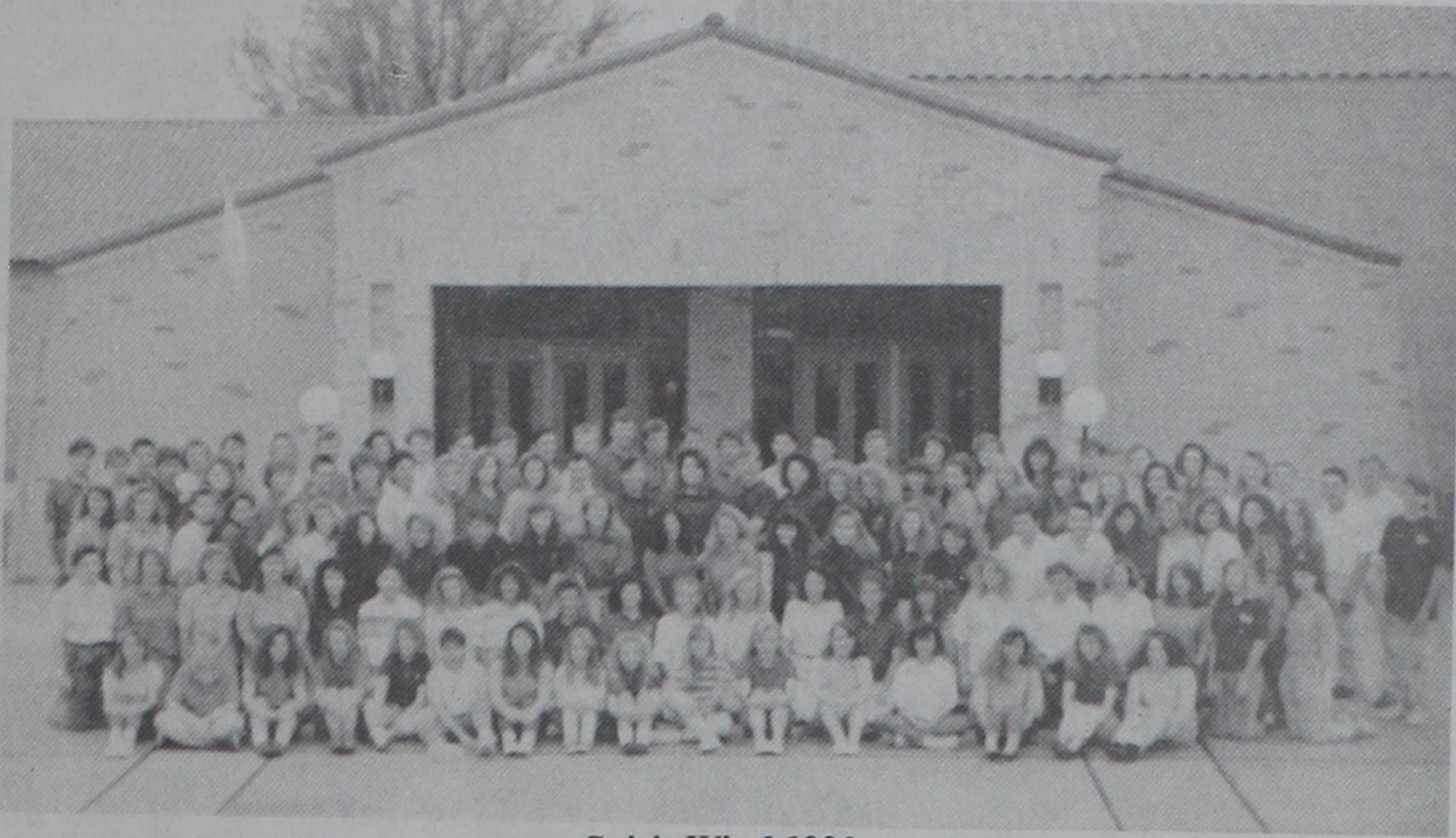
