Area Gets Nice Rain

The Friona area received some nice rainfall this week, with moisture recorded three consecutive days.

Best day locally was Tuesday, when an inch even was recorded in the official gauge. Another .38 inch was registered on Wednesday, and .17 inch fell Thursday.

Jim Dixon, who farms in the Rhea area, said he received a half inch of rain on Tuesday, then a whopping two inches on Wednesday in a two-hour period.

"We have received seven or eight inches of rain for the year, which is about half of the average," Dixon said.

The rainy weather also made for lower temperatures during the week, with highs only in the 70s on two straight days, and in the low 80s two other days.

Trustees Act On Matters

The board of trustees of the Friona Independent School District met in regular session August 13.

Highlights of the meeting included:

(1) The board accepted and awarded bread, milk, and gasoline bids for the 1990-91 school year. Borden, Inc. was awarded the milk bid and Mrs. Baird's Bakeries was awarded the bread bid. Houlette Petroleum was awarded the gasoline bid.

All bids were awarded on the basis of the low bid submitted.

(2) The board adopted a resolution which would prohibit tobacco use on school property during school hours effective August 27, 1990.

(3) Cafeteria prices for the 1990-91 school year will remain the same as last year.

(4) The board accepted Certified Values for Friona Independent School District for 1990-91 from the Parmer County Appraisal Office. Values are \$154,098,851.00 which are down approximately \$2,000,000.00.

(5) The board conducted a work session on the 1990-91 budget.

School Schedule Is Announced

The beginning of school schedule was announced this week by Hal M. Ratcliff, Superintendent of Schools for the Friona ISD.

Students who will be in kindergarten or first grade will have a very important orientation night on Thursday, August 23 at 7 p.m. in the Elementary Cafeteria. Room assignments will be made at this time.

For those K-1 students new to the district or who have not pre-enrolled, registration needs to be done at the Primary office any time during the day prior to August 27. All immunizations and records need to be completed by this time.

Elementary students (2nd-5th grade) who are new to Friona may register from August 20-August 24 at the Elementary school office.

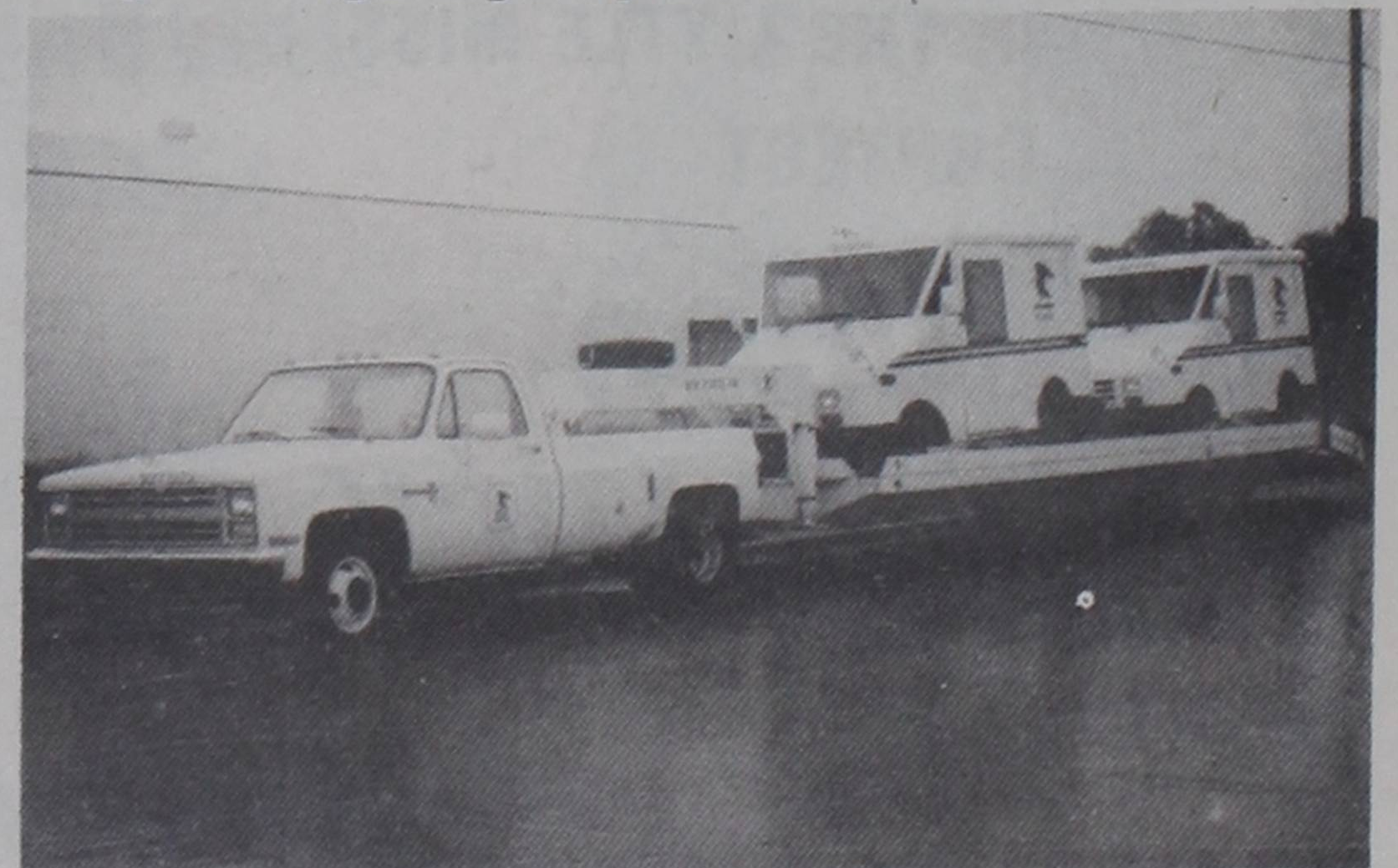
All students in grades 6, 7 and 8 who are new to the community may enroll for school from August 20-August 24. Students who pre-enrolled last spring will only need to show up for school on August 27.

All high school students are to pick up their schedules on Thursday, August 23. Juniors and seniors need to report at 9 a.m., and freshmen and sophomores should report at 10 a.m. Students must have their Social Security numbers with them in order to pick up their schedules.

All students are encouraged to bring their Social Security numbers when they register. The first day of classes for the fall semester is August 27. All kindergarten students will be dismissed at noon the first week of school.

Lumbrera Refuses Extradition

A 32-year-old former Bovina resident accused of murdering four of her children has refused to waive extradition to Texas, where three of the charges are pending.

"I'd rather go through all this here and just wait," Diana Lumbrera told Finney County District Judge J. Stephen Nyswonger on Monday.

Lumbrera is charged in Finney County with the smothering death of her four-year-old son, Jose Antonio Lumbrera.

She carried the child into the hospital emergency room May 1. Doctors and emergency room personnel worked for an hour trying unsuccessfully to revive the child.

Her first-degree murder trial is scheduled to get underway September 19.

Last week, a Parmer County grand jury indicted Lumbrera on three counts of capital murder stemming from the deaths of three other children: Mellissa Lumbrera, three; Melinda Ann Garza, two; and Joanna Lumbrera, three months.

The charges allege she killed the children for insurance money.

Two more of Lumbrera's children, 14-week-old Jose Lionel Garza and five-month-old Christopher Daniel Lumbrera, also died in her care, as did Erica Lenore Aleman, the six-week-old daughter of a cousin.

Grand juries in three Texas counties, Castro, Bailey and Lubbock, are investigating the other deaths.

With the exception of Jose Antonio Lumbrera, all the deaths occurred in Texas between 1976 and 1984.

Lumbrera, who had been free on a \$50,000 bond in the Garden City case, was arrested on the Texas warrants last Wednesday. She appeared without an attorney Monday and remained composed throughout the 25-minute hearing.

Nyswonger told her she could waive extradition and have Texas authorities pick her up or wait

until Texas had completed all the paper work and Kansas Governor Mike Hayden issued a governor's warrant. She chose the latter.

Nyswonger also ordered she be held without bond because the charges, if proved, carry a possible life sentence or death penalty in Texas.

He ordered her returned to court September 7 to see if the governor's warrant was issued. If Parmer County still hasn't filed the necessary paper work, Nyswonger said he could grant an additional 60 days.

Parmer County has set \$100,000 bond on each of the three charges there, but Nyswonger said those bond amounts apply only when and if Texas assumes custody of Lumbrera.

Cain Rites Conducted In Corpus

Jim Cain, Sr., owner of Cain's Western Wear, died July 29 in a local hospital after a sudden illness. He was 65 years old.

He was a native of Bunola, Pa., and moved to Corpus Christi in 1953. He was a teacher at West Oso High School and South Park Junior High and was employed at Sunside Refinery from 1959 until 1975, when he opened the clothing store on the city's northwest side.

Cain served in the 71st Infantry Division of the U.S. Army during World War II and was awarded the Bronze Star and Combat Infantryman's Badge.

He was a member of Gateway Baptist Church, charter member of V.F.W. Post 3837 in Calallen-Annaville; a Scout master for 14 years of Boy Scouts of America Troop 73 and was awarded the Silver Beaver.

Survivors include his wife, Emily Pilkington Cain; two sons, Jim Cain, Jr. and Ron Cain, both of Corpus Christi; a daughter, Jeanne Warrenfeltz of Corpus Christi; four brothers, George Cain of Sarasota, Florida, Howard Cain of Clairton, Pennsylvania, Tom Cain of Elizabeth, Pennsylvania, and Leroy Cain of Clairton; a sister, Cathryn Graham of Wellsburg, West Virginia; twelve grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held August 1 in the Sawyer-George Funeral Home chapel. Graveside services were held August 2 in the Greenleaf Cemetery in Brownwood.

60 YEARS AGO--AUG. 1, 1930

John H. Aldridge, Jr. was the winner in the county judge race in the Democratic primary last Saturday, with 759 votes to 529 for Clyde V. Goodwine. J.M.W. Alexander will succeed Judge D.H. Meade as commissioner in the Friona-Black precinct, winning by 250-214. There will be a runoff for county sheriff between W.D. (Bill) Kirk and W.D. (Bill) Hall. Lee Thompson was elected commissioner in the Farwell precinct. W.S. Menefee was re-elected in the Lazbuddie precinct.

50 YEARS AGO--AUG. 2, 1940

In the Democratic primary last Saturday, David Moseley won the race for commissioner, precinct 1, over L.F. Lillard, 305-272. Charlie Lovelace and D.K. Roberts will meet in a runoff for county and district clerk. Roy B. Ezell won over two opponents, Robert Maddux and W.M. Lloyd, for county treasurer. Lee Thompson, Earl Booth and A.D. Smith were unopposed for county judge, sheriff and attorney, respectively.

45 YEARS AGO--AUG. 3, 1945

In view of the long continued drought from which this territory has been suffering since last September, a serious feed shortage is one of the most apparent conditions with which our farmers are now confronted. There will apparently be no cotton grown this year. Farmers had their soil in fine condition in the spring for planting row crops, but realizing the futility of planting before rain came, they simply waited for that rain, and are still waiting.

40 YEARS AGO--JULY 29, 1950

Over 1600 Parmer County voters went to the polls last Saturday in the Democratic primary. In county races, A.D. Smith held the office with 1,015 votes to W.L. Edelman's 545. Henry Ivy unseated present Precinct 4 commissioner, W.S. Menefee, with a 178-vote total to Menfee's 81. County voters followed the general pattern of other Panhandle counties, swinging to Mrs. Altawene Clark for Congress, Harold LaFont for state representative and E.A. Bills for district judge.

35 YEARS AGO--JULY 29, 1955

J.B. McFarland, a well-known promoter of Parmer County Community Hospital, recently donated a new oxygen tent, not only for the benefit of the patients, but the nurses. Old style oxygen tents had to be cooled with ice, which was carried to the tent every few hours. The new model tent gives the hospital three tents, to adequately serve the hospital's needs, states manager Jimmy Baxter.

30 YEARS AGO--JULY 28, 1960

Martell Leveque and Porter Roberts are co-chairmen of Friona's annual Maize Days celebration, which is September 5-10 this year.

Members of the Friona City Council okayed plans and specifications for the modernization and improvement of the city's water and sewer system to bring the systems up to serve a town double the present population.

I first heard the story I'm about to repeat in Garland early this spring and as a collector of recipes, it intrigued me. One of my first thoughts was, "I wish I knew the person involved so I could get a copy of the recipe."

To make a long story short, I now have the recipe and it is titled "Neiman-Marcus \$250 Cookie Recipe."

She thought it was the most wonderful cookie she had ever tasted and asked if the recipe was available. She was told that it was, but there was a charge of two-fifty. She said that was fine. She got the recipe and told them to charge it to her account.

In December, when she received her bill, there was a charge for \$250. She called Neiman's and told them it was a mistake--the charge should be \$2.50. She was told there was NO mistake--that the charge for the recipe was correct. They told her it was not a returnable item and she would have to pay the amount charged to her account or become delinquent.

The bottom line is she paid. She vowed to get back at Neiman's and wants to give the recipe out to everyone she possibly can. She asks that everyone who

gets a copy send it to everyone they know. So, here it is:
 2 cups butter
 2 cups granulated sugar
 2 cups brown sugar
 4 eggs
 2 teaspoons vanilla
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 2 teaspoons baking soda
 24 oz. chocolate chips (2 large bags)
 1-8 oz. Hershey bar, grated
 (Yes, this is really 1/2 lb.)
 4 cups flour
 3 cups chopped nuts
 5 cups blended oatmeal

Blended oatmeal: measure and process in blender to fine powder. Cream butter and both sugars. Add eggs and vanilla. Mix together with flour, oatmeal, salt, baking powder and baking soda. Add chips, candy and nuts. Roll into balls and place two inches apart on a cookie sheet. Bake for 6 minutes at 375 degrees F. Makes 112 cookies.

Wade Procter Reports On Texas Boys State

First of all, I would like to thank the American Legion Post of Friona for deciding to send two delegates this year, and for choosing me to be one of them. Wes Drake was the other delegate selected to attend.

This year was the 50th anniversary of Texas Boys State. Boys State is held in Austin at the University of Texas. Here, along with approximately 950 other guys, I learned how Texas government really works. During the week, we set up a mock Texas government and ran for local, county, district and state offices.

We left for Boys State on June 5 from Amarillo with 30 other guys from this region. After a three and a half hour layover in Dallas, we finally arrived in Austin. We checked in and learned the city and party we belonged to. I was placed in Scott City, and was informed that I was a member of the Nationalist party.

We went right to work as soon as we arrived. The first night we elected city officials and filled out filing forms. In order to run for an office, you had to obtain a certain amount of signatures on your filing form. For instance, a state position required thirty signatures. There was also a twenty-five cent processing fee that had to be paid. The next morning, we elected

a precinct chairman, our county convention delegates, a county chairman and our state convention delegates. We had our first State Party Convention that night. During the State Party Convention meeting, we elected a state chairman, a secretary and state party whips. The whips acted as "administrators to propaganda," that is, they basically acted as cheerleaders. They were the ones who came up with slogans, chants, songs and cheers to support our party.

We had state party meetings daily. We also attended general assembly, one of the few times everyone was assembled together. During these assemblies candidates from both parties gave speeches for state offices. At each general assembly, we also had guest speakers.

Mayor Cook, the mayor of Austin, was our first guest speaker. He welcomed us to Austin and praised Boys State. Another guest speaker was General Robinson Risener, a former prisoner of war. He talked about his ordeals which began in 1965, when he was shot down on a bombing mission over North Vietnam. He was a prisoner of war for over seven years, during which time he was subjected to brutal tortures. He was finally released in 1973. Louis Temberlake also spoke

to us. He is probably the most dynamic man I have ever heard speak. He gave us the six steps needed to become a leader. They are:

Step 1--"L," a leader should be willing to learn.

Step 2--"E," he should be enthusiastic about everything he is involved in.

Step 3--"A," a leader should have a positive attitude.

Step 4--"D," one who is dedicated to his work.

Step 5--"E," he must have empathy.

Step 6--"R," a leader recognizes his responsibilities.

Friday morning, primary elections were held. The election results were posted after lunch. I was elected as county constable. County constable serves, processes, attends sessions of the Justice Court, and performs the duties of a peace officer. That night we had a run-off election.

Saturday the Boy State Legislature convened, and began the drafting of legislation. That night, general elections were held.

Sunday we attended church, then the general election results were released. Derik Eagleton of Houston was elected governor, and Andrew Justis of Amarillo was elected lieutenant governor. While the House and Senate were in session, everyone else toured the LBJ Library. Later that afternoon, the governor's staff met to get organized. That night was the Boys State talent show. The Boys State choir and band also performed.

Monday we marched almost seven blocks to the capitol. We toured the capitol and each Boys Stater visited the offices of his state senator and state representative. We then assembled in the house chamber. The Boys State House and Senate conducted a joint session, and then the governor and lieutenant governor were sworn into office. The governor's address was given by the Governor of Texas, the Honorable William Clements. After a picnic lunch in front of the capitol, we checked out and left for home.

I would again like to express my gratitude for being selected to

Second, members are convinced stocks will continue to move to new highs. They consider sharp drops and stagnant prices normal, short-term events that are characteristic of a free market. Eventually, those prices will rise to new highs, and individuals who have continued to purchase them will profit.

Finally, NAIC members practice continuing education. They believe that only with a reasonable amount of time and study can individuals select securities that outperform the market averages.

These may sound like lofty ideals, but the NAIC has shown them to be practical guidelines that work.
