The pageant was sponsored by the Women's Division of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

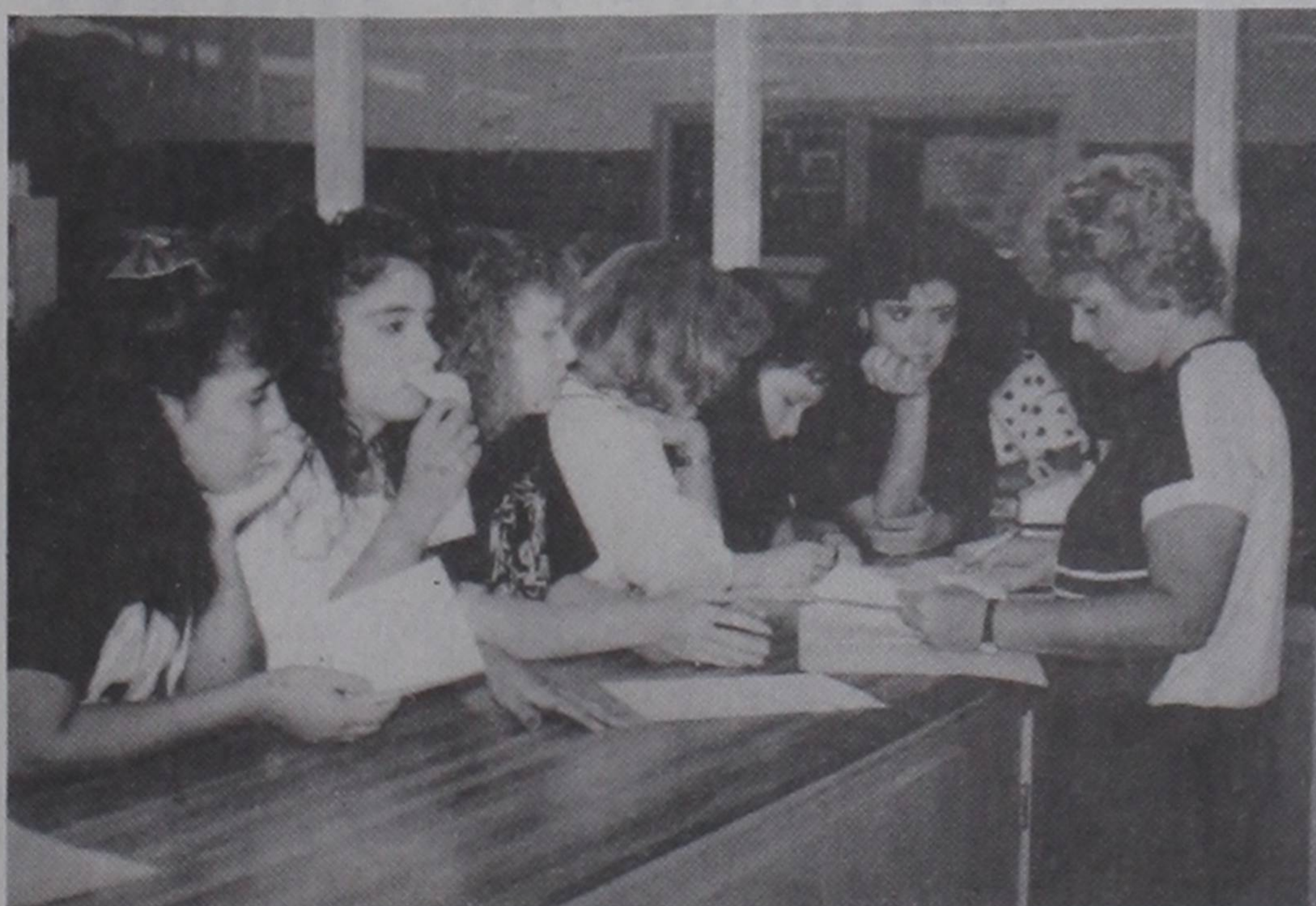
Rev. Henry Salley of Friona's First United Methodist Church, served as the master of ceremonies.

Cousins Receive Kidney Transplants

Two second cousins were doing well late this week at Dallas' Methodist Medical Center, after receiving kidney transplants from a common donor.

Leslee Upton, 22, of Friona, and Danny Pierce, 34, of Dumas, both seemed to be responding well following surgery on Monday at the Dallas medical center.

A hospital spokesman said it was highly unusual for cousins to be chosen. "Of course, the whole organ donation system is based on factors such as tissue typing, which are very much in sync between blood relatives...if you extend it out, it would stand to reason that two cousins would have similar factors," said Barry Pound, spokesman for Methodist Medical Center.

The cousins did not realize they had both been called for transplants until they were in the hospital.

"Both of the transplanted kidneys appear to be functioning.

D.A.R.E. Project Implemented Here

Parmer County's four school systems will participate in the D.A.R.E. project, a joint project of local law enforcement agencies and local school districts and communities to prevent substance abuse in children and youth.

Karen Britten has been employed as a sheriff's deputy for Parmer County, and will be the instructor for Project D.A.R.E. in Parmer County schools.

The program emphasis for Project D.A.R.E. is to help students recognize and resist the many subtle pressures that influence them to experiment with alcohol and drugs. In addition, program strategies are planned to focus on feelings relating to self-esteem, interpersonal and communicative skills, decision making, and positive alternatives to drug abuse.

In order to teach the D.A.R.E. course, a person has to be a licensed, certified police officer. Ms. Britten, a native of Groom, attended Texas Tech University and Amarillo College, and then enrolled in the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy, graduating in May of 1988.

She was serving as assistant director of security at the Excel Corp. plant at Friona prior to accepting the county's D.A.R.E. assignment.

The program is designed for grades five and six, and has had many positive results in those schools in which it has been implemented.

Teachers and principals report fewer in-classroom disciplinary problems, decreased absenteeism and tardiness, and a higher respect for authority. Also, there has been a marked decrease in school vandalism in many of the participating schools.

Ms. Britten's instruction also will focus on resisting peer pressure, building self-esteem, managing stress without taking drugs, alternatives to drug abuse, and taking a stand.

They have been up walking, and have been able to walk to one another's room," said Minnie Knight, Leslee's grandmother.

It is thought that both Miss Upton and Pierce would spend about ten days in the hospital, but then must stay in the Dallas area to take anti-rejection shots for three weeks.

Pierce has been on dialysis for about three years, and Miss Upton about two years. Relatives of both individuals have tried to donate kidneys, but a tissue match was not found.

The most dramatic part about the situation turned out to be in locating Pierce, who had been at Lake Meredith on Sunday for an outing with his parents, when the Dallas hospital tried to locate him concerning the transplant.

Hospital officials called Pierce's sister, Debbie Sweatt of Friona, at about 6:15 p.m. last Sunday, notifying her that there was a donor that might be suitable for her brother. Hospital officials told her they were unable to reach Pierce at his Dumas home, and that he would need to be available for a call at 8 p.m.

Needing to contact her brother, Debbie said she called Officer Steve Jones of the Friona Police Department to find out what county Lake Meredith was located in.

"I told him what the problem was, and he said, 'Do you want me to handle that for you?' I said yes."

Jones contacted park officials at Lake Meredith, and they found Pierce.

Mrs. Sweatt said they had to have someone break into Pierce's house in Dumas in order to take

the 8 p.m. call from the hospital.

Pierce and his swimsuit-clad family were rushed directly from the lake to Amarillo International Airport Sunday evening.

"He made it on the plane with about 90 seconds to spare. If the flight hadn't been delayed due to mechanical purposes, he wouldn't have made it," Mrs. Sweatt said.

"We are very, very thankful that things have worked out as well as they have so far. We appreciate the concern of the residents of the Friona area. The doctor said that these transplants appeared to have the best chances (of succeeding) of any that he had performed," Mrs. Sweatt added.

Pierce and Mrs. Sweatt's mother is Neelie Pierce, who is a sister of Minnie Knight (Martha Upton's mother), thus the second-cousin relationship.

Injuries Hit Chieftain Players

The injury bug was felt by the Friona Chieftain gridders during their pre-season workouts.

Chieftain coach Steve Williams said that quarterback/free safety Scott Houston sustained a dislocated finger and will be out of action two weeks.

Lineman Steven Dickson broke his hand while making a tackle, and will miss about three weeks. Gabe Gonzales hurt his back, and also is expected to miss three weeks of action.

Williams said that Daniel Saiz has stepped in at quarterback and has done a super job, and Wade Procter and Blue Field are replacing Dickson.

"When there is crisis, there also is opportunity, so maybe the injuries will make us a better team," Williams said.

The first-year coach said that the Chieftain gridders had been working hard. He has been trying to get the players in good physical condition.

"They responded real well to the increased conditioning. We are anxious to see how we come out in the scrimmage Friday. This will give us a chance to see ourselves on film and try to make improvements," Williams stated.

The Chieftains scrimmage Seagraves here at 5 p.m. Friday, August 24.

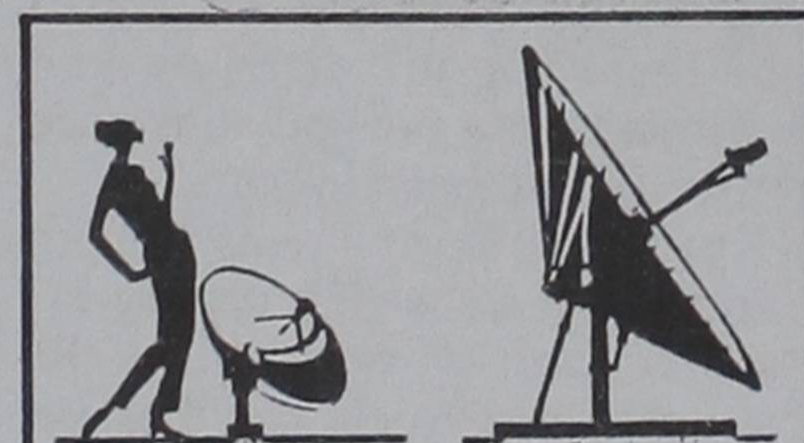

Exes Set Second Meeting

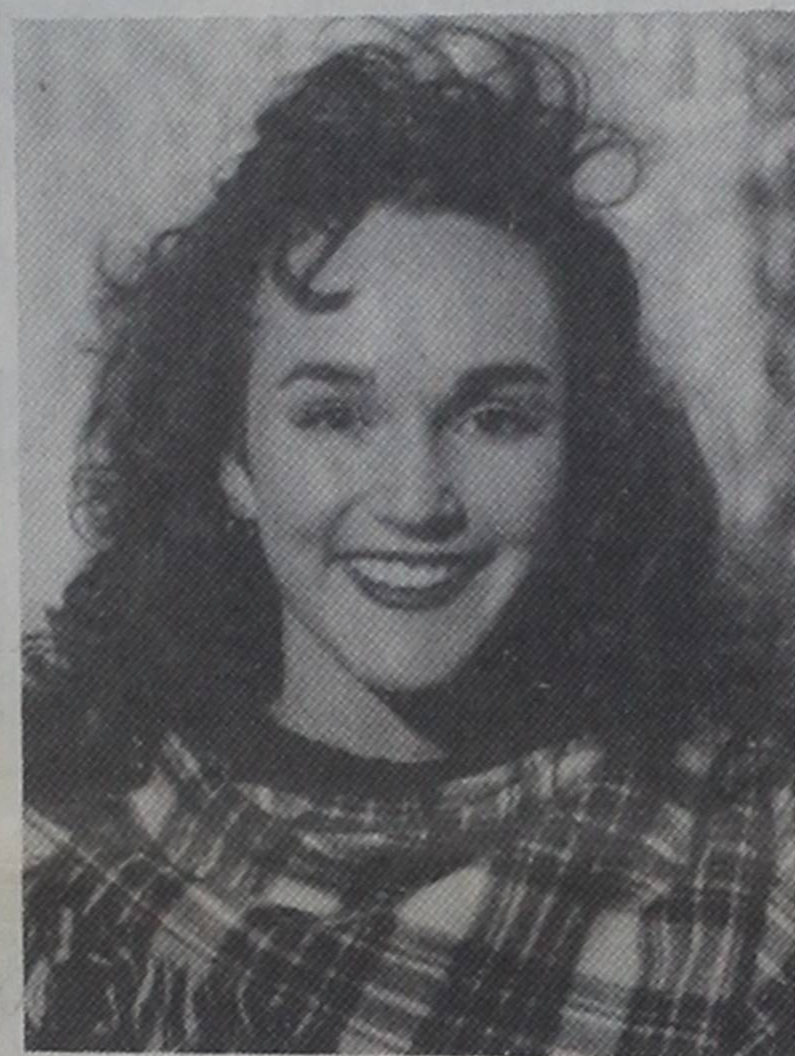

The purpose of this meeting is to update committee functions and to finalize plans for the five-year reunion of all persons who attended or taught in Friona Schools.

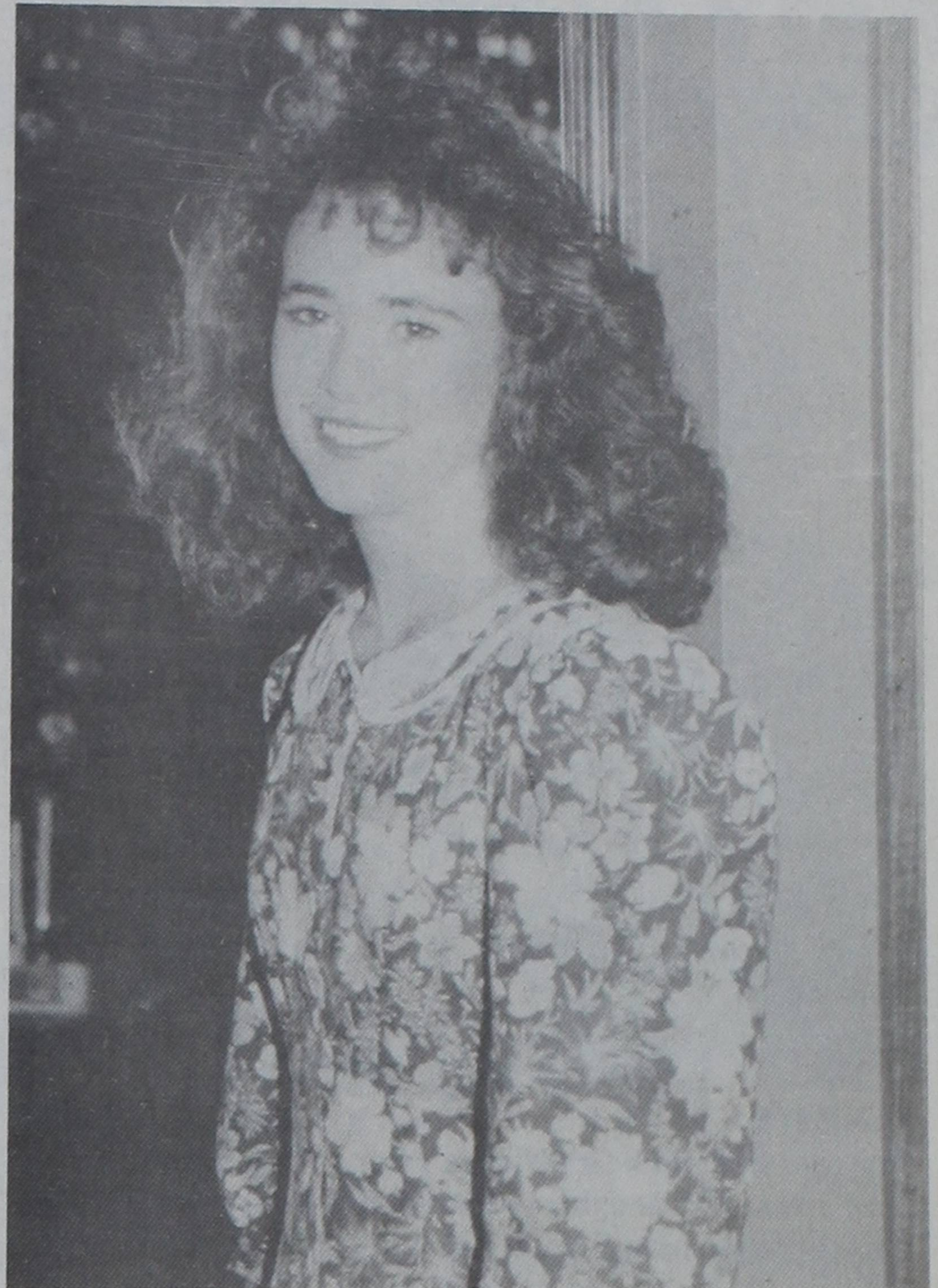
Buske states that it is not just for graduates of Friona High School but for any and all who have ever been students in the Friona School system, their spouses and friends.

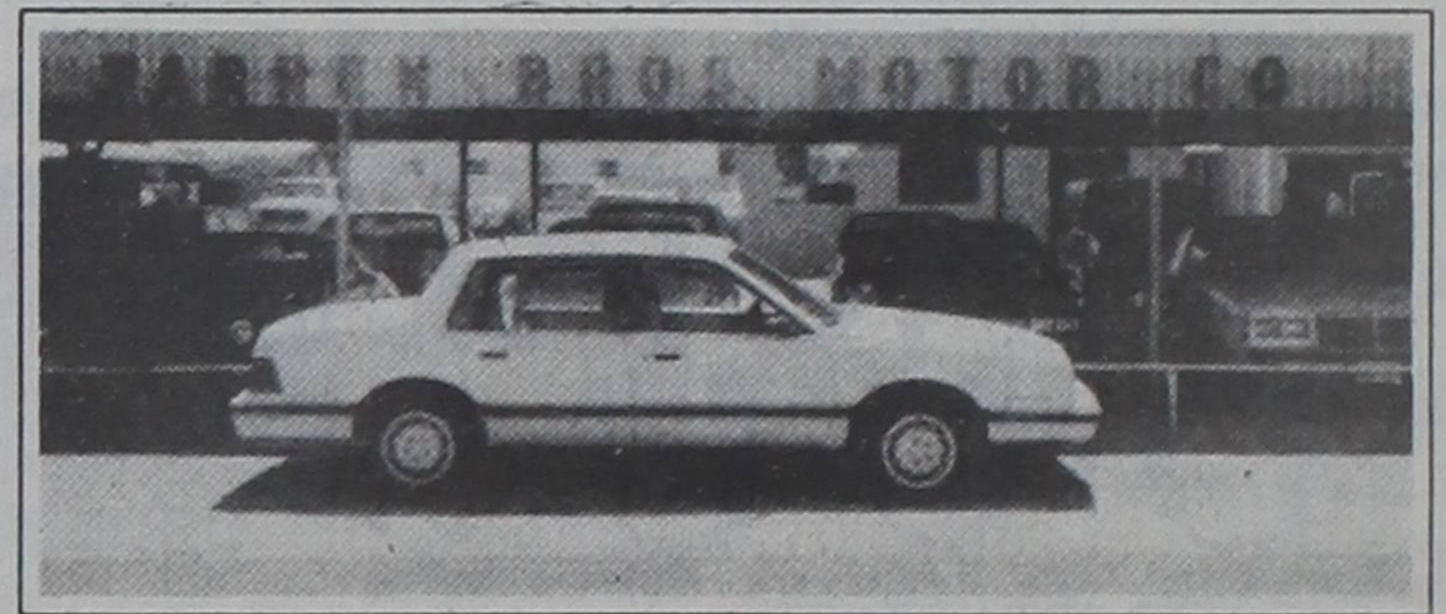
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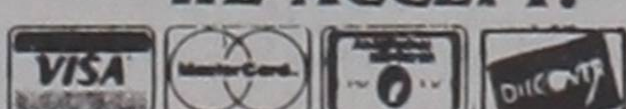
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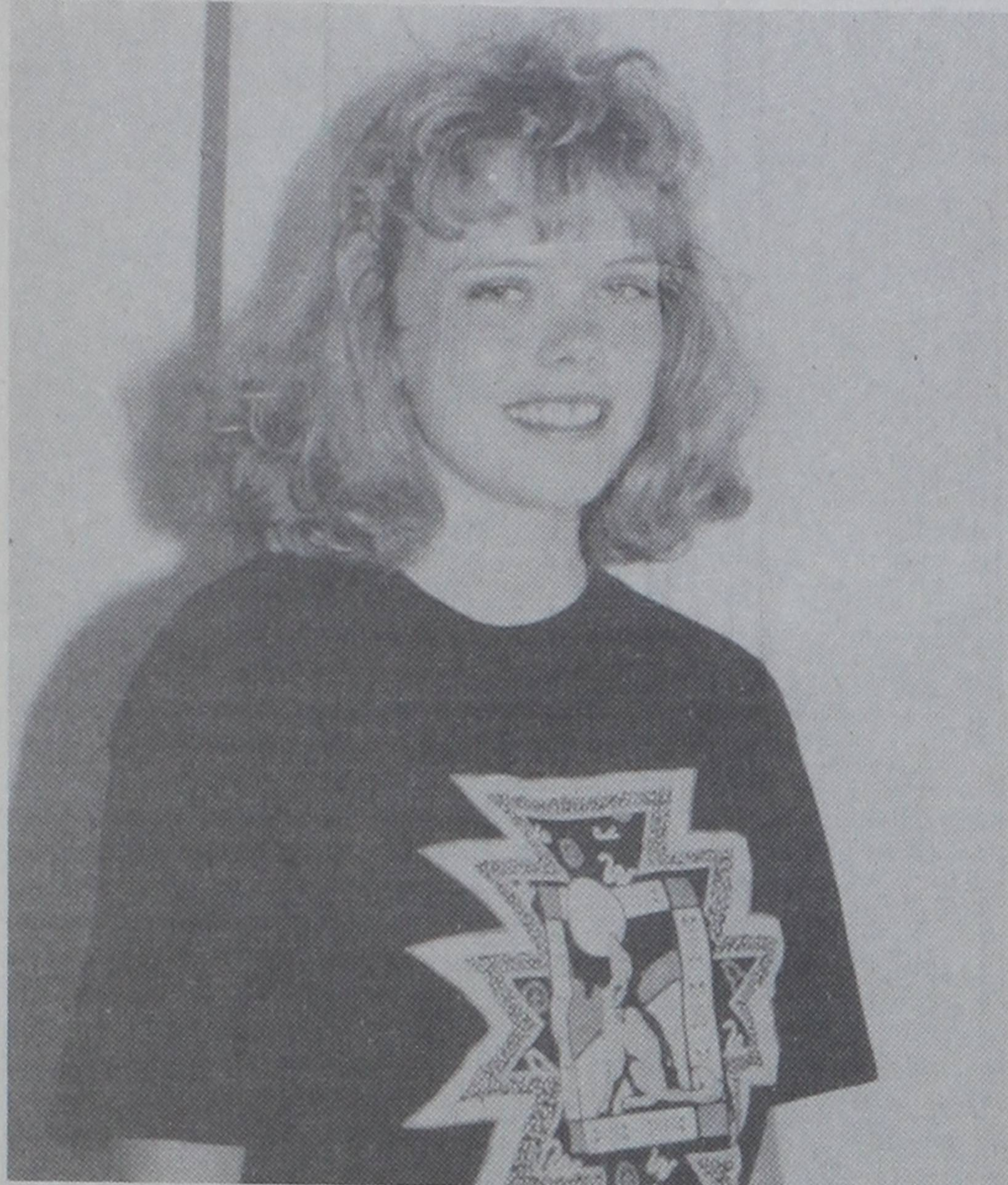

Hereford Gains Industrial Boost

Operations at the Holly Sugar factory in Hereford will be expanded as construction gets underway on the sugar industry's newest ion exclusion facility, a state-of-the-art extraction process that produces refined sugar from beet molasses. Ground breaking on the site of the new plant is scheduled for Thursday, September 13, 1990.

The new \$11 million addition, which extracts the sugar which remains in molasses following the traditional processing of sugar beets, will increase plant utilization and create additional jobs in the Hereford area, according to Holly President Roger Hill. Holly already is the area's largest employer, with more than 375 workers on the payroll during the sugarbeet harvest.

Richard Hopping, formerly production manager of Holly's Hereford factory and now production manager, ion exclusion, will direct and supervise construction of the new facility scheduled to begin full operation by August 1991.

Imperial Holly Corporation was formed in 1988 when Imperial Sugar Company, Sugar Land, Texas, acquired Colorado-based Holly Sugar Corporation. The combined Imperial Holly Corporation, with eight beet sugar factories and the cane sugar refinery at Sugar Land, is now the second largest publicly held sugar company in the United States and ranks among the Fortune 500 industrial corporations.

"For the 25 years since it was built, the Hereford factory has been virtually idle at the end of the annual beetlicing campaign," Hill said. "Now we can use the facilities longer with an economical process that produces more sugar and benefits the community. If all goes as well as expected here, it's quite possible ion exclusion capabilities could be installed at the other Holly facilities."

According to Hill, officials at the Colorado Springs-based Holly Sugar Corporation and its parent, Imperial Holly Corporation of Sugar Land, Texas selected the Hereford site as the prime choice because of the spirit and support of the Hereford community. "Sugar beets are in good supply and Hereford has a good market for cattle feed that uses beet sugar by-products," Hill said. We want to reassure our growers that Holly is planning for now and the future and that includes the support of our mutual interests in sugar beets with the newest technology available."

Dual Pricing--Another Way To Pay For Mutual Funds

Most people like a bargain, and mutual fund investors are no exception. But what may look like a bargain could contain hidden fees.

One fee that has recently become the subject of some hot debate is the "load" or acquisition cost. If you pay a fee to purchase a mutual fund, it's called a load. The load may be as high as 8.5 per cent of the offering price or less than 1 per cent, and it's generally based on how much you invest as well as the pricing structure of the fund you buy. This cost is explained in the prospectus.

If a fund charges fees when you sell shares or adds a fee each year for the expense of running the fund, it would be called a "no-load."

Sam Chandoha, senior vice president of Shareholder Communications Corp. (SCC), a shareholder relations consulting firm, predicts that a new type of mutual-fund pricing, called dual-pricing, could gain acceptance during the 1990s. Dual-pricing gives shareholders the option of paying their fees either when they make their purchase or when they

sell shares. According to Chandoha, load funds that do not switch to dual-pricing could suffer competitively. He was quick to add, however, that many shareholders are suspicious of the dual-pricing structure.

Shareholder concern is understandable. One could argue that by eliminating the front-end charge, all your money goes to work without first extracting the load. On the other hand, if the mutual fund performs as expected and assets increase, you'll pay a percentage of a larger amount at withdrawal. Unfortunately, at the time of purchase, there's no way to determine which option will be most beneficial.

Despite what anyone may tell you, everything has a price tag. Mutual funds are business enterprises, and like all businesses, they offer a product and a service for which they receive reasonable compensation. From that they pay the bills, meet the payroll and, hopefully, have some profits left over.

It's hard to resist the temptation of a free lunch. But if that's the promise you're hearing, take it upon yourself to carefully read the prospectus and understand mutual fund fees.

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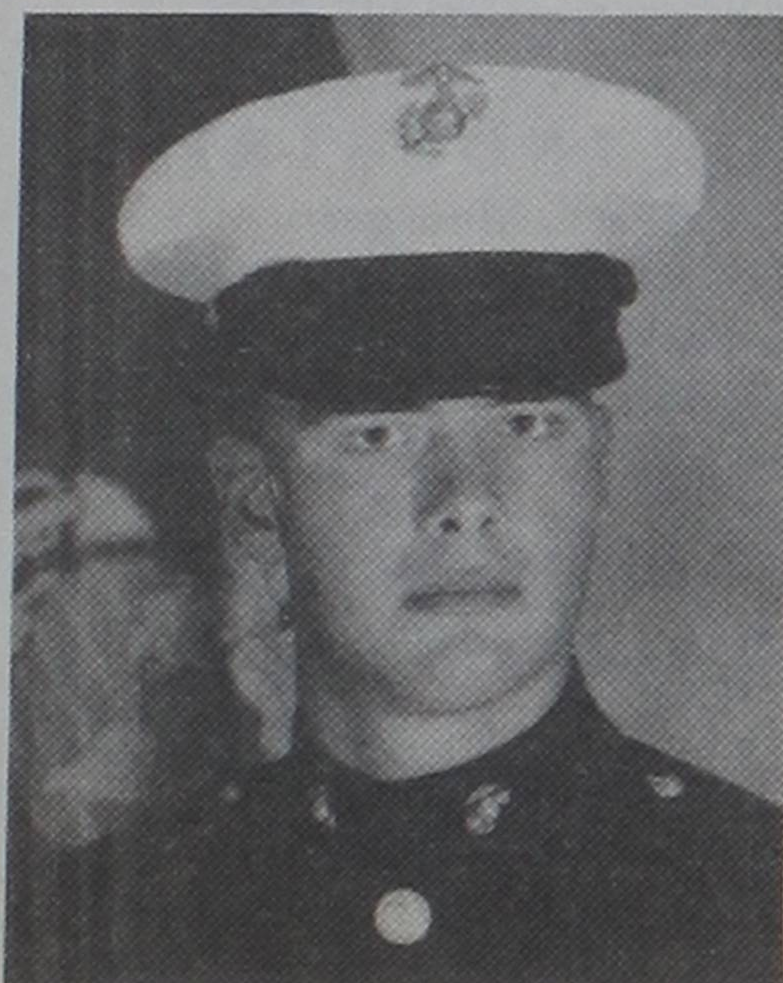

Hazel reported, "Sis left here Friday morning and made it all the way home before a violent thunder and rain storm hit in the Mile High City area."

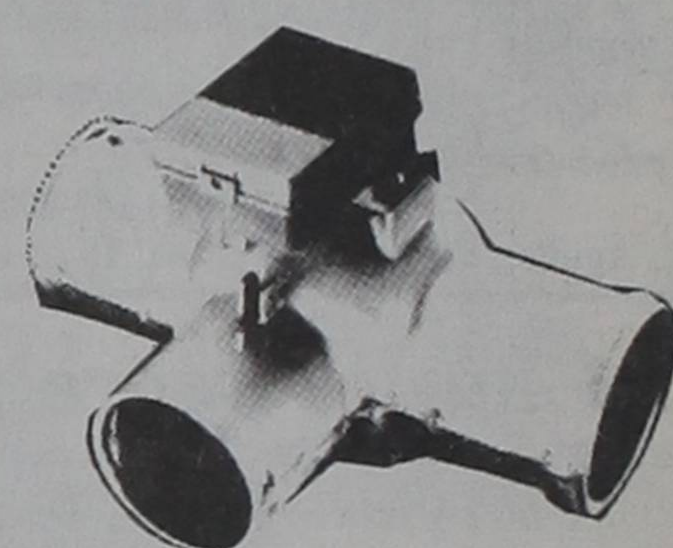

Angler's Corner

As fall approaches and many folks prepare for harvest or a late vacation, knowledgeable bass anglers try to squeeze in a few days of fishing as this time of year presents a unique opportunity. For the handful of diehards that search for that five to ten pound plus largemouth bass, the fall season is trophy hunting time.

While a five pound bass isn't much in east and south Texas, in the Panhandle, it's a wall-hanger. A seven pounder is considered a monster. The culprit is the shorter growing season. A month or two difference can mean several pounds difference over the lifespan of a bass. Growth stops in water lower than 50 degrees. In northern lakes, a largemouth may live to be 12 to 15 years old. In the warmer southern lakes, 10 years is about maximum.

Females outlive their male counterparts and therefore account for the vast majority of trophies. In one study only nine per cent of the males reached five years or more while thirty per cent of females lived for over five years. The balance of bass to forage also effects growth as over-populated lakes force the fish to compete for food.

The world record bass weighed in at a heart-stopping 22 pounds, 4 ounces. In just the last few years only two bass weighing more than 21 pounds have been certified. Today 20 pound class largemouths are rare. That makes the world record even more spectacular when you consider that it was caught over 58 years ago in June of 1932, by George Perry at Montgomery Lake in Georgia. Little did Mr. Perry realize when he cast a wooden Creek Chub crankbait that he would turn the bass fishing world on its ear for more than half a century.

California, Florida and Texas are believed by many fisheries biologists to hold a few lakes capable of producing the next world record. For the Panhandle basser, this means heading out of town, way out of town. If your heart is set on a 10 pound plus fish, head south and don't stop until you get to Lake Fork near Dallas. Choke Canyon near San Antonio is another contender for the title. Both are expertly managed and fairly new lakes. There are a handful of other hopefuls in the south but these two remain the most consistent.

For the Panhandle angler that simply doesn't have the time for a long trip, a 5 pounder from an area lake can be as elusive as the next world record. Knowing where the bass are and why they are there are the key elements in trophy hunting.

The summer feeding reduces the forage bass forcing the bass to cruise the shallows for prey. Cooling of the water combined with the sun lower in the sky allow the fish to stay in shallows longer. It would seem that all one would need to do is locate a forage school on one's sonar unit and work the area.

This is easier said than done. The shallower water reduces the size of the sound cone emitted from the sonar's transducer. In water less than five feet, the cone of a transom mounted unit may not reach the front of the boat. While a front mounted trolling motor transducer can show you what lies beneath you, positioning your boat that close to shore will spook any fish in the vicinity.

Your best bet is to fish shallow water adjacent to deep drop-offs or ravines. Rip-rap is also an excellent fall location as the rocks hold some of the day's heat attracting forage and predators. On our area lakes, outcroppings of rock, shallow shoreline brush and isolated shallow cover are top choices.

Live crawdads rank as the best choice, followed by frogs and large waterdogs. Soft plastics such as the grub or worm are good choices in lures. Large spinnerbaits are another top choice. It would be advisable to attach some type of trailer to the spinnerbait such as a pork frog or eel, or plastic split tails.

As winter approaches, the largemouth goes into a feeding binge to gear up for the approaching cold weather. If you want that once in a lifetime fish, fall is definitely the time to ply the waters.

The white bass have been hot at the marina at Meredith as well as

the smallmouths. Local authorities point to Bugbee Canyon as a hot spot for crappie, whites, largemouth and smallies. The fishing at Meredith takes a nosedive on the weekends, more than likely due to increased traffic and fishing pressure but really picks up as the week goes on.

On the night of July 29, the white bass were close enough to the top to watch them take live minnows suspended a few inches under the surface. For several minutes, the whites hooked up with bait as fast as you could get it back to the water. A small inch and a half clear/sparkle tube lure also enticed the whites to strike. Some jigging was necessary after the first hook-up.

I used an underwater fishing light called the starlight. It is an extremely bright light that draws baitfish by the hundreds. This in turn brought the white bass and crappie. This light can be obtained through tackle dealers or ordered from Bass Pro Shops.

R.B. Riley joined me for a couple of days at Meredith after one of the recent rains and caught more fish out of the back of the boat than I could take from working the docks. The fishing was good as evidenced by the fact that I'm not sure I ever saw him get out of his chair except when he had to haul in fish or bait the hook. In the short time he was there, he caught whites, crappie, catfish and smallmouth bass.

Anyway, keep that line tight and be careful on the water. Good luck.

The post is chartered through the Boy Scouts of America. A

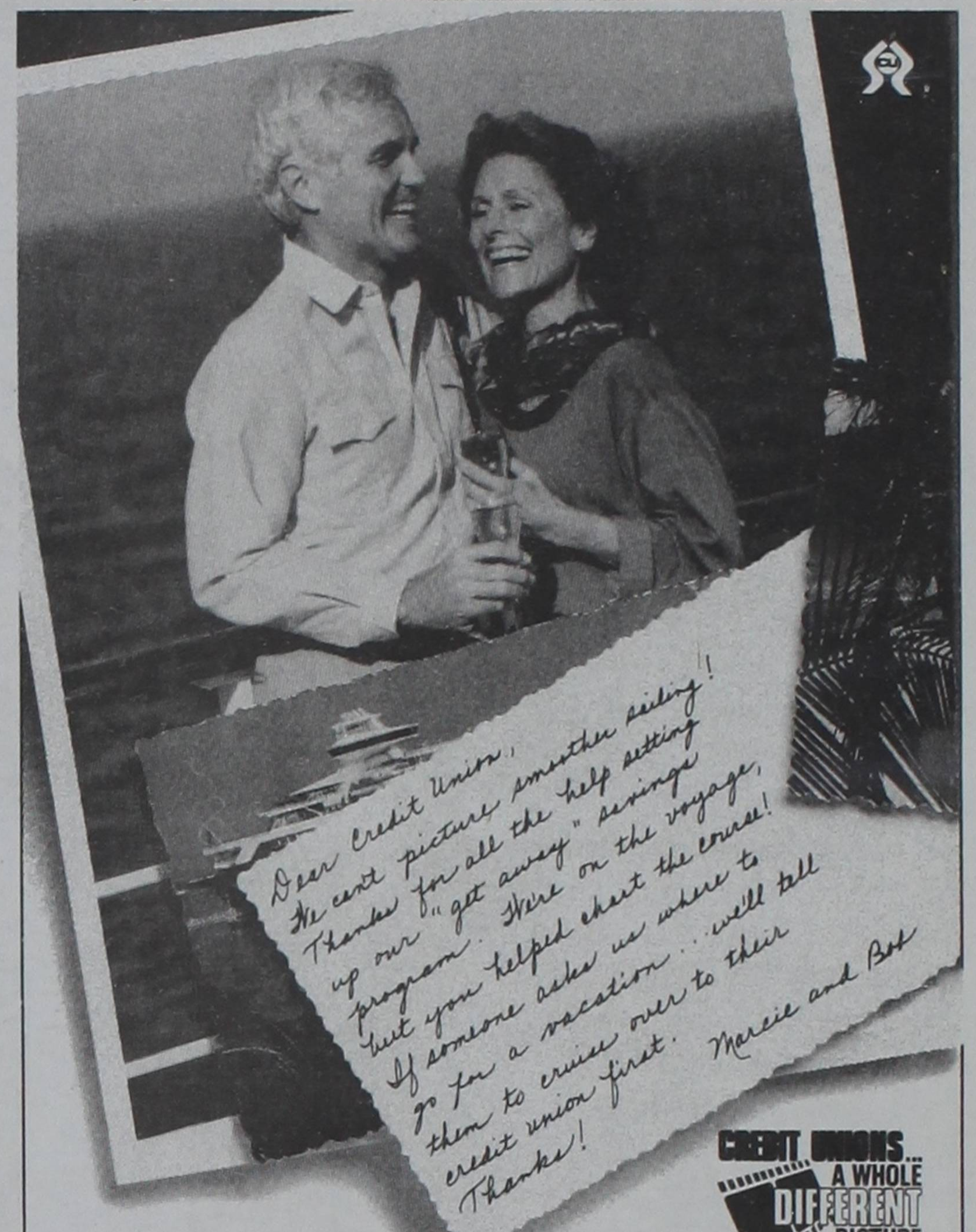
number of field trips have been planned for the upcoming year.

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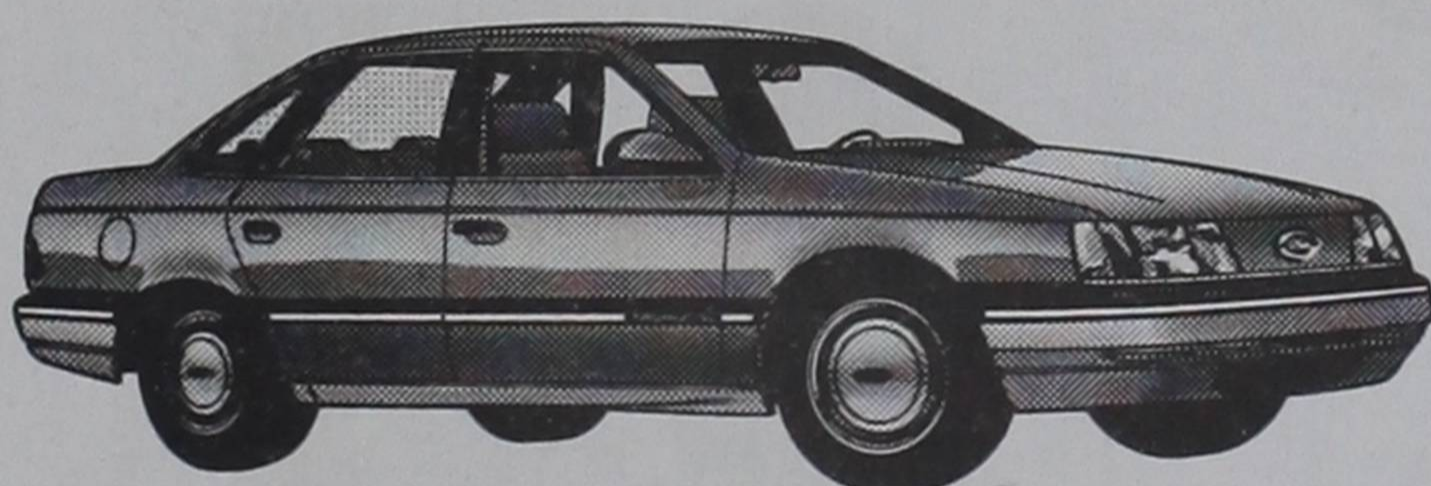
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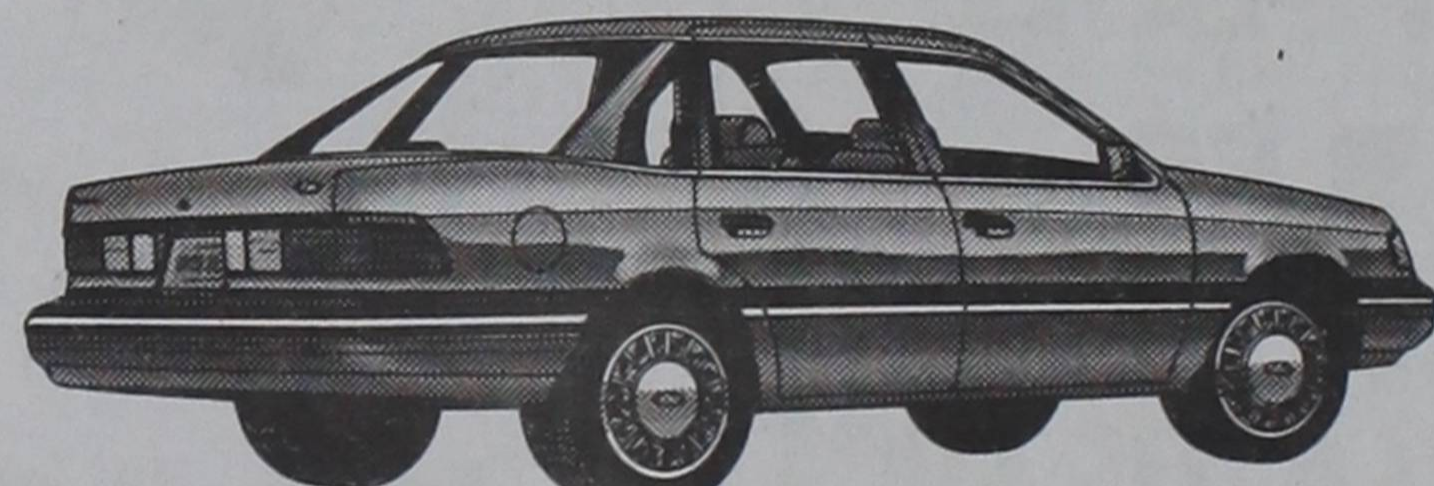
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
