# County Population Drops From 1980

Parmer County's population dropped 10.94 per cent from 1980 to 1990, according to preliminary figures released Thursday.

The early figures gave Parmer a total of 9,830 which was 1,208 less than the final 1980 figure of 11,038.

Twenty-two of 23 Panhandle counties lost population during the decade, and Parmer's decline was much less than some.

Friona's "partial and preliminary" total was 3,685. which is a gain of four people over the preliminary totals from 1980. However, the early figure is down by 124 from the final 1980 total of 3,809. "During the past ten years we have showed a continual gain in the number of water connections, and never a decline," stated City Manager Beelee Goodwin, who was hopeful that the final totals for Friona would yet show an increase over the 1980 count.

School terms begin in October and end in late June. September exams are studied for a long time at the end of each summer. Their seasons are much the same as ours.

On a typical day in the Lopez de Frutas home, everyone got up about 9:30 or 10:00 and had breakfast together between 10:30 and 12:00 noon. Then dinner was served between 2:00 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. Dinner consisted of several courses beginning with cold soup for an appetizer and ending with fresh fruit for dessert.

"People there use a lot of dishes," Mindy said, then continued, "my mom had two dishwashers and both of them were filled with dishes all the time."

One of Mindy's favorite entrees was Anchovies, which are large fish similar to sardines and are pickled. She also liked a rice dish and brought home a recipe.

#### Paella

Combine 1/2 cup rice, 1 cup water, 1 cinnamon stick, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 3 ounces sugar and some lemon peel in a sauce pan and bring to a boil. Cover and simmer over low heat until water is nearly absorbed, about 8 minutes. Add 5 cups milk and continue cooking until rice is very tender.

There should be enough liquid left to give a creamy consistency to this dessert.

Remove cinnamon stick and lemon peel. Dust lightly with powdered cinnamon and serve hot or cold. Makes 6 servings.
