Peace Officers to Attend Conference With FBI At Waco

San Antonio, Oct. 28.—Peace officers from Bell, Bosque, Burnet, Coryell, Falls, Freestone, Hamilton, Hill, Lampasas, Leon, Llano, Limestone, Llano, Mason, McCulloch, Milam, San Saba, Somervell, Washington, Williamson, Robertson and Burleson counties are expected to attend the FBI Law Enforcement Conference to be held at the Raleigh Hotel in Waco beginning at 2 p. m. next Tuesday, November 4, 1947.

The officers will be welcomed to Waco by Chief of Police Marvin "Red" Burton and Sheriff C. G. Alexander who will be acting as hosts to the officers at the conference.

The principal speaker will be Charles E. Weeks, newly appointed Special Agent in Charge of the San Antonio Office of the FBI who succeeded Maurice W. Acers who recently resigned.

Weeks will discuss with the officers recent developments in criminal activities in Texas and over the nation, together with the latest techniques being developed by law enforcement agencies to combat crime.

For the second phase of the program, the officers will adjourn to a nearby stretch of highway for a demonstration and discussion of stopping a car containing dangerous and armed criminals. This exhibition will be under the direction of Weeks who will use a public address system to contrast the recommended and the undesirable features of the maneuver.

Sgt. E. K. Hallmark of the Texas Highway Patrol, "Dub" Naylor, Texas Ranger, with agents of the FBI will take the part of the fugitives and arresting officers.

The third phase of the demonstration will call for them to make the arrest in "slow motion" with each stop explained to the visiting officers.

Following the exhibition an open forum discussion will be held with the participating officers answering the questions of the group and discussing the suggestions made.

Immediately following the adjournment of the conference, the officers will be the guests of Sheriff Alexander and Chief of Police Burton at a barbecue supper.

Farm Operators Urged to Inquire About War Surplus

Farmers of the agricultural Southwest are being encouraged to contact Customer Service Centers of the War Assets Administration for such limited farm equipment and supplies as are offered from time to time. Farm operators are urged to communicate with such Centers in their territory regarding any wanted items on farms whether or not the equipment desired has been advertised, declared R. G. Berle, newly appointed agricultural representative of the Grand Prairie Zone office of WAA. "We are eager to serve our food producers with such equipment and supplies as are available or whenever they come into our surplus inventories," Mr. Berle added. "We will welcome correspondence or visits to these centers in order that individual farm needs might be checked against whatever items might be on hand for sale at the time." Customer Service Centers in the Southwestern WAA zone are located at Grand Prairie, Houston and San Antonio, Texas; New Orleans, La.; Tulsa and Oklahoma City, Okla., and at Jackson, Miss.

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA

With military aircraft originally costing \$100,000,000 already programmed for a quick clearance sale, the WAA's Southwest zone is again leading the country in the final disposal of all remaining planes. Last April the Grand Prairie office was one of the first to sell out of the airplane business. Recently acquisition of additional planes from the Navy has already resulted in plans: (1) to sell 29 trainer planes at the Dallas Naval Air Station to veterans and other buyers starting November 10; (2) price slash to \$5,000 each on 482 C-46 transports at Walnut Ridge, Arkansas.

North Camp Hood near Gatesville, Texas, was cleaned out of its last remaining surplus property recently by 135 buyers who submitted high bids on \$51,000 worth of assorted lots of materials in less than two hours. The sale disposed of laundry equipment, machinery, automotive supplies, clothing and 23,000 wooden bunk beds. The sale was conducted by War Assets Administration.

Municipalities doing road and street work might well inquire concerning a tandem road roller, a crawler type tractor and a towed type grader being offered to the priorities group at fixed prices until November 3 through War Assets Administration. These items are listed in a current catalogue issued out of the Grand Prairie WAA office through its Customer Service Center. The roller is located at the Amarillo Air Field and the tractor and grader are at the Red River Arsenal near Texarkana.

A part of war surplus miscellaneous originally valued at \$186,500 sold at a recent War Assets Administration sale at Grand Prairie appeared destined for foreign markets. The General Export Iron and Metal Company of Corpus Christi was heaviest buyer at the close of the sale, claiming 12 of the 45 lots offered at high bid sale on a non-priority basis. Competition was brisk on all the lots.

Veterans' News

The Veterans Administration is appealing to veteran students and job-trainees, as well as to schools and job training establishments in which veterans are enrolled under the GI Bill, for assistance in preventing subsistence allowance over-payments.

The veterans and their training establishments are asked to notify VA immediately when trainee-veterans abandon their training programs. When veterans know in advance the definite date on which they will complete or discontinue their training, they should advise VA at that time instead of waiting until they actually stop their training.

Failure to notify VA of training discontinuances usually results in overpayments of subsistence allowances, VA said. Such overpayments must be refunded to the government.

A recent survey disclosed an average lapse of 23 days between the time the veteran stopped his training and the time VA was notified of his discontinuance. As a result, the veteran continued to receive subsistence allowance payments to which he was not entitled.

Immediate or advance notice of training discontinuances will assist VA materially in reducing the amount of overpayments. In many cases, such notices will eliminate overpayments and the necessity for refunds by veterans.

Veterans who fail to make arrangements to repay subsistence allowance overpayments may be prevented from re-entering schools or job-training courses under the GI Bill.

Veterans are not being forced to turn back full amounts immediately. They need only make arrangements for monthly repayments that cause them no financial hardship and thus become qualified to resume training.

The Veterans Administration is now custodian of more than 53,000,000 Army chest X-ray films of World War II veterans, which it will use in its long-range anti-tuberculosis program. VA records show that about 23,000 veterans of World War II are drawing compensation for tuberculosis contracted in the service. Included in the state figures are Texas 317, Louisiana 390 and Mississippi 332.

Tigers Defeated In Hard-Fought Game At De Leon

Hico fans who did not go to De Leon last Friday night missed out on the best game that the Tigers have played this year. There appeared to be a new team on the field. The little lecture and the like that Coach Parker gave them early in the week had results.

At the beginning of the game a light rain was falling and looked as if it would rain harder, but the elements changed their ways and there was good weather all of the game, but the ball was slick and as a result there were a few fumbles by both teams.

The Tigers played an outstanding defensive game all the way through, and especially in the first half. At the end of the first half the score was 0 to 0 and Hico had played the De Leon boys off their feet. However in the second half, De Leon received and marched down the field on passes, line plays and end runs to score early in the third quarter. Again the Hico lads tightened up and held the powerful De Leon eleven until the last minute of the game when they completed a long pass for the second touchdown.

The Tigers did not get started on the offense play, but did make a few nice gains around end and a few on short passes, but they have improved very much on the defense. Hill has been shifted to tackle where he played a stellar game on defense. He has improvement to make on the offense. Texas State Fair Biggest—Intends to Remain That Way

Dallas, Oct. 27.—Texans have something new to brag about now as their State Fair of Texas set a new all-time high attendance record. When the gates swung shut Sunday midnight, October 26, on the 62nd anniversary show, count showed that 1,792,321 persons had been to the Fair during its 16-day run.

This is 123,925 more visitors than attended the 1946 Fair which itself broke all previous records. The new record upholds Texas' claim to having the world's biggest state fair. Biggest single day was the middle Sunday, Oct. 12, when 221,320 visitors swarmed over the 187-acre grounds and through the mammoth exhibit halls.

Attendance went past the 100,000 mark on eight out of the 16 days of the Fair. Simultaneously with the close of the 1947 season, R. L. Thornton, president of the big statewide institution, announced that the Fair would take bids immediately on construction of a new \$700,000 Automobile, Aviation and Recreation Building, to be ready for next year's Fair.

Top Fair officials also are contemplating visits to the East and West sections of the country to bring even bigger exhibitors and entertainment attractions to the Fair in 1948. This year every square foot of exhibit space was sold months before opening date of the Fair, but Exhibit Director Fred E. Tommas Sr. and directors of the institution have their eyes on some additional big national firms.

Top attractions this year, according to most visitors, were the \$1,500,000 art show of world-famed masterpieces loaned by New York's Metropolitan Museum; the livestock show, the Quarter-Horse Show—biggest ever held in the nation—and the Broadway production of "Annie Get Your Gun" starring Mary Martin. The Fair also had more big free events than ever before.

To California's challenge that they were going to take away Texas' title to the biggest state exposition, State Fair officials this week pledge that they mean to keep the title in the Lone Star State.

Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District News

The local soil scientist of the Soil Conservation Service recently completed soil surveys on a group of farms immediately south and west of Carlton in the South Carlton group of about 1,520 acres. Those who requested these surveys as a safe and scientific basis for making sound erosion control and proper land use plans on their farms were: Walter Price, Jim Pierce, Miss Mattie Rogers, R. W. Treat, Jim D. Wright and J. E. Young.

J. M. Grisham near Fairy which is in the North Fairy group has planted 20 acres of Speitz and hairy vetch to which 200 pounds of superphosphate had been applied.

G. E. Smith, four miles north of Pottsville in the Dawson Ranch group, has planted 30 acres of Abruzzi rye and hairy vetch, with 200 pounds of superphosphate per acre.

Henry Johns, whose farm is 3 miles south of Pottsville in the South Pottsville group, has constructed approximately 7,000 feet of standard terraces and 1,000 feet of diversions.

Joe B. Sharp, 1 mile south of Carlton, has constructed 1,100 feet of standard small ridge type terraces.

Virgil C. Battershell, also 1 mile south of Carlton, has constructed 2,050 feet of standard channel type terraces and a pasture terrace outlet waterway 1,700 feet long covering 40 acres.

K. R. Jenkins, also of the South Carlton group, has shaped and smoothed a pasture outlet waterway 2,100 feet long covering approximately 50 acres.

Alfred Seider, whose farm is 1 mile southeast of Aleman, and Daniel Bottlinger, whose farm is 2 miles southwest of Aleman, have with the assistance of Soil Conservation Service technicians, completed coordinated conservation plans on their respective farms and have signed cooperative agreements with the Hamilton-Coryell District which entitles them to receive all the assistance the District has available for establishing the needed measures on the land.

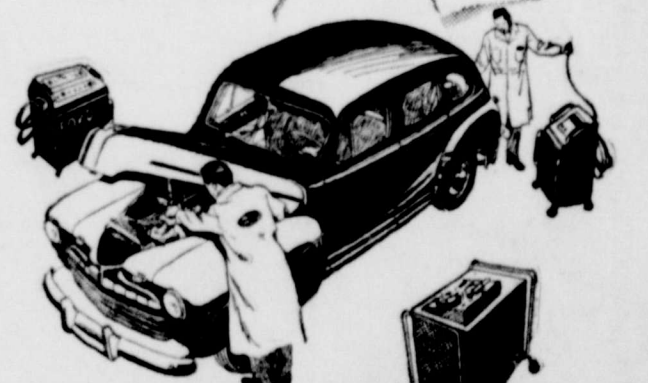

In order that the public may have an accurate report on the death of my husband, which occurred on Tuesday morning of last week, will say he finished a hearty breakfast about 6:00 a. m., listened to the radio until 6:35, leaving at this time for a short walk which his physician had advised him to take each day. He had planned to go to Hamilton to the auction sale and take a cow and calf. The gate to the loading chute opened into a sheep shed and the soil had to be dug down several inches in order that the gate might be opened. I went to do this for him as he wasn't able, and put out some feed to toll the cow into the chute pen as she had recently been brought in from the range pasture. At this time our son-in-law, Carl Ray Sellers, and little daughter, Carolyn, came up and wanted to see him on some business. I told him he had gone for his walk and that we would go and find him. We started toward the house. I looking up the road one

way and he looking toward the field another way, and he remarked that he saw him over in the field but I knew from the tone of his voice that something was wrong. Then I saw my husband lying full length on the ground. I began crying and hurrying to his side. Carl Ray had left me with the baby and rushed to him as soon as he saw him. I called to him when he reached him to know if he was gone and he told me he was afraid so. I reached his side and felt his face which was cold. I felt of his pulse, but there seemed to be none, yet his wrist was still warm. Carl Ray had gone for help. When they arrived I asked if something couldn't be done, but I was told it was useless—he was gone. We think he had stooped and dug down a grain furrow, as there was a place about 18 inches deep near his body; and had turned around and started toward the house when stricken. His right hand under the shed. We found him around 6:45 to 7:00 o'clock and I feel sure he was stricken shortly after reaching the field. “Just another tragic milestone along our road of sorrow.” May God bless all who came to me in my grief and sorrow, and may we more fully realize the uncertainty of life and be prepared to go when God calls us. I only hope and pray I can be as well prepared as I feel my dear husband was.

James Owen Richardson, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joe Richardson, was born on the Denton farm near Fairy on June 9, 1888, being 59 years, 4 months and 13 days of age. He departed this life on Tuesday morning, October 21, at about 6:45 of a heart attack.

He was married to Miss Eunice Newman on June 13, 1909. To this union five children were born, two daughters and three sons, namely: Mrs. Loreta Allison of Dublin; Mrs. Charlene Sellers and Hermal Richardson of Fairy; and James Dudley and J. C., who preceded their father in death. James Dudley, age 17, passed away on June 25, 1939, and J. C., age 12, on August 3, 1926.

Mr. Richardson united with the Church of Christ in August, 1910, and had lived a faithful Christian life, always attending services when his health would permit. He had been in ill health for the past 18 months.

He had spent his entire life near Fairy and he and his wife moved

to their present farm home in October after their marriage, where they had since resided.
