When business was deprived of some of the privileges which it had abused many a financial heart was broken, though now it is recognized that most of the restrictive regulations were wholesome. Now that labor leaders are being deprived of some of their inequitable powers there is more wailing and gnashing of teeth; threats of reprisal are heard on every hand and large sums of money are reportedly being allocated to fight the congressmen who promoted labor's "Declaration of Independence." And "Declaration of Independence" is just what the T-H act was for tabulations have strongly indicated that the labor vote led the "Revolution

The T-H act protects the worker from coercion by employer but also from coercion by unions. It relieves him of the necessity of joining a union in order to GET a job-though he may still be compelled to join in order to KEEP his job if the majority of the workers vote such a requirement. It forbids all the unfair labor practices by employers which the Wagner act banned, while it allows the employer at least to defend himself from calumny; and it emancipates the American public.

The T-H act has gone a long way toward returning freedom of action to the union member. When he goes to the polls to vote he will be voting to retain that freedom or to throw it away. He will vote for the candidate who will preserve it for him or for the candidate whose platform will be-"Kill the Taft - Hartley

It seems safe to predict that the harder the big labor leaders press the fight to save their thrones the greater will be the electoral sweep for the men who had the guts to emancipate the common laborerand the American public!


Food Conservation **Promoted Through** Use of Proper Diet



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
