

Farm Cash Income August to September Stages Brisk Gain

Austin, Nov. 17.-Farm cash in ome in Texas staged a brisk August-to-September gain to boost the easonally-adjusted index up to a point five times above its prewar levels. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research re-

The 42 per cent August-to-September hike bounced the index up to 506.3, based on the prewar (1935-39) average of 100. The part played by a rise in prices is difficult to determine, but increased production on the state's farms has augmented the rising prices of farm products to bring in more intake to Texas farmers than they have ever had before.

Cotton lint and cowpea prices were down during the month but prices of all other Texas farm products advanced. Grain prices oared as high as the 18 per cent wheat price rise over its August level, livestock prices were on the march upward, and poultry and egg prices were far above their August marks.

Estimated farm cash income for the state reached \$221,029,000 in September, pushing the total in take for the year to date. January through September, to \$1,138,394 000. Income stood 43 per cent above its total for the same period last year. Greatest gain for the year to date came in the Northern High Plains district, where income registered a 123 per cent increase over the same period last year. All other districts reported farm | bler income gains with the exception Trans-Pecos area and the Lower Rio Grande Valley, where farmers were not doing as well as they were at the same time last

The Northern High Plains also led in dollar-intake for the year to date, chalking up a \$205,740,000 total. Running second was the Black and Grand Prairie area. where farm cash income for the year to date reached \$162,095,000

Dallas, last week at a fixed price sale of surplus planes, the War Assets Administration announced at Grand Prairie. Nearly 200 eager veterans were present when the sale opened. Members of WAA's aircraft disposal division conducted a series of impartial drawings to determine buyers. Several of the successful purchasers were former army and navy pilots who plan to use the craft for private flying. Others said they are now engaged in GI flight training or plan to complete a flying course in the near future



Veterans News

The Veterans Administration has announced a new plan for VA inspection of houses financed by GI loans while the houses are still Activities of Social

under construction. VA will make a pre-construction appraisal of "reasonable value" based upon complete plans and specifications. A minmum of three inspections are required as work of the Social Security Administraadvances to assure adherence to tion, opened to serve the people of agreed standards. The plan optionally available to builders. lenders and sponsors of such

projects. Builders and financing agencies thus may receive a definite commitment as to "reasonable value" in advance of construction, provided the homes are completed according to specifications.

The commitment will remain valid for a specified period-usually predicated on the probable time necessary to complete construction.

Heretofore, a definite VA commitment on the maximum price for which a house could be sold to a reteran upon completion was available only where an individual veteran asked for a construction loan. With the new plan, VA for the first time is assuming directly the function of assuring proper construction-from plans to completion-of houses built for sale to veterans with GI loan financing.

VA inspections will not be required in connection with work supervised by the Federal Housing Administration. The job training program pro-

vided for World War II veterans by the GI Bill has passed its peak under present laws and conditions. the Veterans Administration believes.

The peak apparently was reached last January when 632,000 veterans were training on-the-job. Steady decreases since then cut the total to 564,000 by September 30, 1947.

VA said principal factors in the decline were the ceilings on income plus subsistence allowance and the two-year limits on all jobtraining (other than apprenticeship training).

Veterans training on-the-job in the Dallas Branch Area as of September 30 included: Texas, 41,000; Louisiana, 9,000; and Mississippi, 11.500.

Statistics Given On Security Field Office

This week marked the ninth anniversary of the Waco field office eleven Central Texas counties, including Hamilton.

In commenting on the office anniversary, R. R. Tuley, Jr., manager, reminded the News Review that the passage of time has brought about many changes in the attitude of Hico residents.

"About the only adverse criticism we get today," Tuley said. "is on two scores. The rising cost of living makes the present benefit scale too low in most cases, and farm people and small business employers are provided no insurance protection under the present system of old-age and survivors insurance.

Tuley furnished the News Review the following data on field office activities in the past nine

1. Almost 200,000 original account number cards issued.

2. Over 150,000 duplicate cards issued as replacements for lost, worn out, baby-chewed, laundrycleaned, plowed-under, or wallpaper-covered originals. The office believes that there remains no new way to destroy or lose a social security card, as the above list is far from complete.

3. Fifty people in Hamilton counare receiving monthly benefit checks amounting to \$8,736.00 annually. This is a November estimate

a. Twenty retired workers and their wives account for \$4,260.00 of the total above.

b. The other 30 persons are widows, minor children, and dependent parents, receiving \$4,476.00 of the annual total.

c. In the country as a while, more than two million people are now receiving more than \$36,000,-000.00 each month under this pro-

gram. Tuley also reminded News Review readers that he or his assistant, Joe Clepp, have regularly scheduled visits to this section, and will be glad to discuss individual social security problems at the office in Hamilton County Courthouse on the third Tuesday in each month.

Ma Hoskins **Sneezed at Cats!**



TOURISTS PLANNING A TRIP TO MARS CAN LOOK IT OVER FEBRUARY IS

Austin. Nov. 18. - Astronomers tre going to get a good look at the planet Mars next February 18, Dr. Gerard F. Kuiper, director of the University of Texas McDonald Observatory, says.

On that date, Mars will be close enough for magnification to a size four times as large as the full noon appears to the eye. Dr. Kuier says he hopes to observe the rared spectrum of polar caps and green areas previously visible. and perhaps determine whether water is present on Mars.

Mars will make its closest approach to earth for the next two years. Astronomers will look at resources .- Arthur Raper. the planet through a spectrometer sensitive instrument which applies the science of electronics to as-

· Frost proof the barnyard hydrant on your water system. To do this, install a valve below the frost level and put in an extension rod so you can turn the water off from above ground. When you turn it off, the water in the stand pipe drains out into a small gravel-filled pit, and this keeps the stand pipe from freezing up.

· Many abortions are caused by rations deficient in vitamin A, phosphorus and calcium. Feeding good alfalfa hay supplies vitamin A. Phosphorus and calcium can be provided by feeding a good mineral mixture.

· Keep on using the milk cooler during the winter if you want to get -paid well for all the milk you produce. Prozen milk, resulting when the cans are set out in the winter air to cool, may stick to the can and not be weighed at the milk plant.

· When people try to live by getting more out of the land and out of each other than they give back the community sickens and may die.
