Phyllis Brooks of Dalhart sends us the following editorial, written by Faye Plank of the Dalhart Texan, and we present it herewith, if you're thinking about voting for "none of the above" in the Governor's race:

"Everyone I talk to, or hear talking, is disgusted with the Texas Governor's race. Too much money has been spent--too much has been said. What happened to 'dignity of office.'

"Some people say they won't vote at all, some say they will not vote for either candidate and some say they will vote for the lesser of two evils. How do you decide which?

"I advocate a write-in campaign. Yes, I know the time is short but I think it can be done if everyone in Texas gets busy.

"Who would I write in? I gave this much thought. It must be someone who is well known and it must be someone with character. The name that came to mind was Kent Hance.

"Hance ran in the Republican primary but didn't have the money to defeat Clayton Williams. Hance served the state well as railroad commissioner and before that as a state legislator.

"Hance is a native of the Texas Panhandle and is a graduate of Texas Tech at Lubbock where he later taught. He has a law degree. He is well known as an upright Christian.

"You may say, 'I'll lose my vote,' but isn't that what you are doing when you vote for either of the two candidates for governor?

"How about making 10 phone calls to friends and relatives across the state and ask them to write in the name of Kent Hance. Ask them to do the same. If you like you can clip this column, have it copied, and mail or hand out. How about spending a few dollars for radio or TV time?

"Some people will say it can't be done, but several years ago in New Mexico, Joe Skeen was elected U.S. Representative on a write-in vote. This was the first time in U.S. history that a person had been elected to Congress on a write-in. Yes, it can be done.

"I think if you are disgusted enough with the present state of affairs it is time to do something about it.

"What kind of a governor do you want?"

## Hospital Contracts Therapist

Parmer County Community Hospital recently signed a contract with Joe Chandler, a physical therapist from Clovis, New Mexico. Chandler is providing physical therapy services to patients at the county hospitals. He is now seeing 15 patients twice a week, and this number is growing.

Excel's Friona plant approached the hospital administration about obtaining the services of a physical therapist. Their workers who needed this service had to travel long distances to get physical therapy treatments.

Parmer County Community Hospital requested assistance from Larry Baggett, Director of Regional Physicians Services and Hospital Relations, a subsidiary of High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo.

Baggett worked with Elda Hart, Parmer County Community Hospital administrator at that time, to obtain Joe Chandler's services. With a physical therapist now in Friona, patients will not have to travel long distances to receive this service. High Plains Baptist Hospital also donated \$12,000 in equipment and supplies to the local hospital for the physical therapy services.

Robert Alexander, M.D., and Tracey Totten, M.D., are the physicians working with the physical therapist and local businesses to carry out the care that's necessary for their patients. Patients needing special attention that cannot be received in Friona will be sent to the Bivins Rehabilitation Center in Amarillo for physical medicine and rehabilitation, where they will receive further testing, work hardening therapy or education concerning their injury and/or illness.

The ultimate goal of the Bivins Center will be to place the patient back under the care of the physicians and physical therapist at Parmer County Community Hospital, where the individual can get back to work as soon as possible.

## FHS Band Advances To UIL Regional

The FHS Chieftain Marching Band was chosen as one of the two winners at the UIL bi-district Marching and Twirling Contest at Borger Stadium last Saturday.

As one of the winners, the Friona Band will compete this Saturday, November 3, at the Region I Marching competition at Ratliff Stadium in Odessa. In that competition, two class AAA bands will be chosen to advance to the state marching contests.

Friona High School's band will perform at 3:15, according to bandmaster Jim Parker. Other class AAA bands in the competition include Canyon (the other district winner), Greenwood, Crane, Clint, Fabens, Denver City and Brownfield.

Competition will be held in Odessa for bands in all classes, 1A through 5A. Class AAA has the most bands in its division at eight. There are six bands each in 1A, 2A and 4A, and only four in 5A.

"The band needs supporters to sit together. We urge everyone to dress in red and be very vocal in your support for our school and community. This is not a formal, dignified occasion--make some noise!" Parker said.

The FHS band director was very lavish in his praise for the Chieftain Band.

"The kids have worked very hard since before school started. I was very proud of their performance at Borger. They have continued to improve with each passing week," Parker said.

The band received a "First Division" rating from each of the three judges at last Saturday's district competition.

"Your music was generally very nice today with lots of variety and contrast. Good soloists. Very musical. Well-planned show, good audience appeal. Good teaching evident here--good response from students. Congratulations!" said James A. Mallow.

"The band shows a lot of pride--I know Friona must be proud of you!"

"A beautifully-prepared band--uniforms-costumes and attention to detail."

"Exceptional trumpet solo-duet and trio work!" said another, in reference to the playing of Arturo Perez, Mark Outland and Ismael Espino.

"Your feature twirler (Renee Martin) does some really nice work," was another comment.

## Blood Drive Set Monday

Coffee Memorial Blood Center will be in Friona for a blood drive on Monday, November 5 at Friona State Bank's Community Room from 3-7 p.m.

Donors are reminded that Coffee Memorial Blood Center is conducting a "Blood Donor Sweepstakes" for the coming year. Adults donating blood between now and October 1, 1991 will be eligible for one of six major prizes, including an all-expense paid trip for two to Puerto Vallarta.

The more times a person donates, the more chances they have to win. The chances increase with each donation. Two slips go into the hopper on the second donation, three on the third, and so forth.

Students donating will receive slips for a new car to be given away by Ron Clark Ford of Amarillo.

Students' chances are increased in the same manner, with multiple registration slips when they donate more than once during the promotional period.

Those participating in the blood drive will receive registration cards, which they will be asked to bring back on successive blood drives so their cards may be validated.

## One Killed, One Hurt In Hub Wreck

Alcohol was suspected to be a factor in a wreck at the Hub intersection (U.S. Highway 60 and State Highway 214) early last Saturday morning.

DPS Trooper Frank Ellis III of Friona, who investigated the accident, said that the circumstances of the wreck were still under investigation as of Thursday, and that at that time no charges had been filed.

John F. Arias, 20, of Friona, died in the accident, and Patsy Nabours of Muleshoe was seriously injured.

Ms. Nabours, who was employed by Allsup's Convenience Store in Friona, was enroute to work at the time of the accident. She was in intensive care at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo until Thursday of this week, when she was removed to a private room.

Trooper Ellis said that Arias was

driving a 1987 Oldsmobile Cutlass east on Highway 86, when he stopped at the red blinking light at the intersection.

Arias' vehicle was struck by a 1985 Ford pickup-truck driven by Ramiro Ramos, 26, also of Friona. The two young men had apparently driven east on Highway 86 from Bovina.

The impact of Ramos' pickup striking Arias' vehicle knocked it out into the intersection, where it was struck by a 1982 Ford pickup headed north, driven by Ms. Nabours.

Arias was killed instantly. Ms. Nabours was transported first to Friona, then on to the Amarillo hospital. Ramos was treated and released from Parmer County Community Hospital.

Trooper Ellis declined to say more in regard to the accident, pending the completion of the investigation.

## John Seright Wins Week's Grid Event

John Seright of Lubbock was the winner this week in the Friona Star Football Contest.

Seright and Donita Martin were the only contestants to correctly pick 16 of the 20 contest games, and he edged Mrs. Martin out for the top spot on the basis of the Dallas-Philadelphia tiebreaker score.

All of Mrs. Martin's misses were pro games: New Orleans-Detroit, Houston-New York, Minnesota-Green Bay and Cincinnati-Atlanta.

In the race for grand prize, Martha Clements and Mal Manchee of Hereford are at the top of the heap with scores of 108. Dianne Morgan and Scott Brown are a point back at 107. Joe Tongate, Bobby Wied and Eddie Gauna are next with scores of 106.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

**60 YEARS AGO--OCT. 31, 1930**

Farmers in the Friona territory say that their chances for a wheat crop this year look extremely good. There is plenty of moisture in the ground to bring the wheat to a good growth and with the usual amount of winter moisture they will be sure to make a good stand.

**55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 25, 1935**

Monday was "Wheat Check Day" at Friona, when County Agent, A.R. Bateman and his assistants put in one full day here in the Maurer building delivering wheat checks to the wheat farmers of this locality. The checks that were delivered at that time were the last 1934 and the first 1935 checks, and those delivered totaled an estimated amount of \$80,000.00 for this locality. The total amount of money allotted the wheat farmers of Parmer County, according to Mr. Bateman, is \$200,780.30, of which amount \$121,780.30 in checks has already been received at his office at Farwell.

**50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 25, 1940**

Parmer County 4-H Club Beef Calf demonstrators have scheduled a Progress Show in the school bus barn in Friona Saturday afternoon, October 26 at 2 p.m. This is not a competitive show, but will give you an opportunity to see the type calves on feed now, and compare the feeding results next March at our spring show.

**45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 26, 1945**

Mayor Glenn Reeve announced Tuesday that the City Commissioners have appointed Freese and Nichols, engineers, to do the preliminary figuring on the prospective sewer system for Friona. Further announcements in regard to this project will be made as soon as possible.

Lion W.L. Edelman of Friona has been made Zone Chairman of the Lions Clubs at Friona, Hereford and Dimmitt. His appointment was made by Deputy District Governor Lon Edwards of Amarillo, and concurred in by District Governor Charles H. Dean of Plainview.

**40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 19, 1950**

Burglars again struck Friona last Thursday night, taking property from the Friona Lumber Company and the Friona Consumers Cooperative. The same night, tools were taken from the A.L. Black farm southeast of Friona. The lumber company safe was carried from the yard, later being found near the highway west of town, minus a small amount of cash, but still containing the books of the firm.

**35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 21, 1955**

Playing "caveman" proved fatal to a six-year-old child Thursday afternoon and placed another in the local hospital severely cut and bruised about the head. David Casares, son of an itinerant Mexican family, lost his life when playing with a number of other children in a pit at the Mills & Fleming Gin south of Friona.

**30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 20, 1960**

A three-firm shopping center has its grand opening in Friona Saturday. White's Supermarket, LuNora's Ladies and Children's Ready to Wear and E-Z Coin Operated Laundry will all have special prizes and prices to mark the occasion. All three firms are located in the new Schueler Building. E.S. White is operator of the supermarket. His son, Edward, operates the laundry and is also employed at the supermarket. LuNora's is owned by Mrs. Nora Welch.

**25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 21, 1965**

Ross Ayers last week received notice of his advancement in rank from Brigadier-General with the National Guard, and received new orders placing him in command of

SFR Brigade of the 36th Division, headquartered in San Antonio.

**20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 22, 1970**

Missouri Beef Packers was one of six Texas industries which was cited for its expansion during the 1969 calendar year at the third annual Governor's Industrial Expansion Conference in Austin on Tuesday. The Friona-based beef packing plant was cited for the tremendous strides it made during its second year of operation.

**15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 19, 1975**

The corn harvest hit its peak in the Friona area the past week, with men and machinery working early and late to get the crop into the elevators. Observers feel the

harvest will be all but finished within a few days, if the Indian Summer weather holds on.

Mr. and Mrs. P. Vaughn Ross were among 20 missionaries appointed by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board during its October meeting at First Baptist Church of Richmond, Virginia. They expect to be assigned to public health work in East Africa.

**10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 9, 1980**

Adams Drilling Company was hit by a destructive fire in the early morning hours Monday, November 3. The fire completely destroyed the company's shop area, ruining machinery, tools, etc. The company's offices also sustained considerable damage. A spokesman said the damage would

run between \$75,000 and \$100,000, and might even top the \$100,000 mark.

The Friona High School Chieftain Band scored a "Division One" rating at the University Interscholastic League's marching contests Wednesday at Texas Tech.

**5 YEARS AGO--OCT. 27, 1985**

A playoff spot will be on the line for the Friona Chieftains when they travel to Tullia next Friday night to battle the tough Hornets.

A two-vehicle accident 2.2 miles northeast of Bovina at 9:45 a.m. Friday caused the driver of the car, Paul Fant, 21, to be treated at Parmer County Community Hospital. He was attempting to pass another vehicle, when he collided with a pickup.

It appeared that the Hornets had a single mission in last week's game, and that was to beat the Chieftains by more than 40 points (that was the margin both Floydada and Littlefield had beaten the Chieftains in district play).

Say in favor of the Hornets—they know mathematics, at least up to 47 points. However, it is doubtful that Tulia will ever be nominated, at least by this Chieftain team, for the district sportsmanship trophy.

So badly did the Hornets want points that they called time out, when already holding a 27-0 lead in the second quarter, in order to score one more touchdown so they could go into halftime with a "more comfortable" 33-0 lead.

All this against a Chieftain team that hasn't scored a point in district play, were averaging five first downs per game, and had decided to move up a freshman quarterback to give him some game experience for future years.

Hopefully, the Hornet players gained something by their power display. We would also hope that they noticed that the Chieftains, although totally out-manned, never quit plugging, even to the game's final play.

Let it be said that the Hornet coach did finally send in some substitutes—late in the game and when his team's 47-point lead appeared to be "safe."

Although having to make his varsity debut against the Buddy Ryan Express, freshman Blair Burney showed some excellent potential, especially in his passing.

Burney completed just five of 20 attempts, and did suffer four interceptions. But he laid the ball right in the chest of his receivers at least five other times, and the Chieftains couldn't hold on for the completion.

Friona's most serious drive came midway through the second quarter, with Tulia holding a 21-0 lead.

However, on the next play, Burney lofted the ball into the end zone, but a Tulia defender out-manned Friona's receiver, and intercepted the pass for a touchback.

The drive made five first downs, and took up five minutes of clock time. Two penalties against the Hornets helped the drive. One was for unsportsmanlike conduct. It's hard to believe, but that's what the signal looked like.

## Beet and cotton harvests are keeping farmers busy

The only thing dampening this year's harvest is the low grain prices. Overall, harvest throughout the county has been pretty good with high yields and good quality in various crops.

Some elevator and gin operators feel that the summer's dry heat did not hurt the corn crop too much, and the timely freeze may have helped cotton crops.

Very few soybeans were planted this year.

### Cotton

Cotton gins in the county are operating around the clock as farmers continue stripping cotton.

The frost was good (for the cotton crop) because it helped get top leaves off of stalks and helped get bolls to open.

### Sugar Beets

With the help of good weather and other conditions, sugar beet harvest is going well in the area, according to Dennis Printz, agricultural manager at Holly Sugar in Hereford.

"Harvest began at the end of September and so far we are 20% complete," said Printz. "The quality of this year's crop is above average."

"We expect harvest to accelerate through November with cooler temperatures," said Printz. "Stockpiling will also begin with the cooler temperatures. Right now we are on a controlled harvest."

Two additional pilers, including one west of Nazareth, will enable the plant to receive about 7% of the total crop each day. About 887,000 tons of beets are expected to be harvested from approximately 42,000 acres.

The "controlled harvest" schedule allows beets to be harvested at the Nazareth, Hub, Farmers Corner and Dawn stations, along with factory delivered contracts 1-165, on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays. The harvest schedule allows beets to be delivered to Dimmitt, Kress, Friona and Wildorado stations, and factory delivered contracts 166-290, on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays.

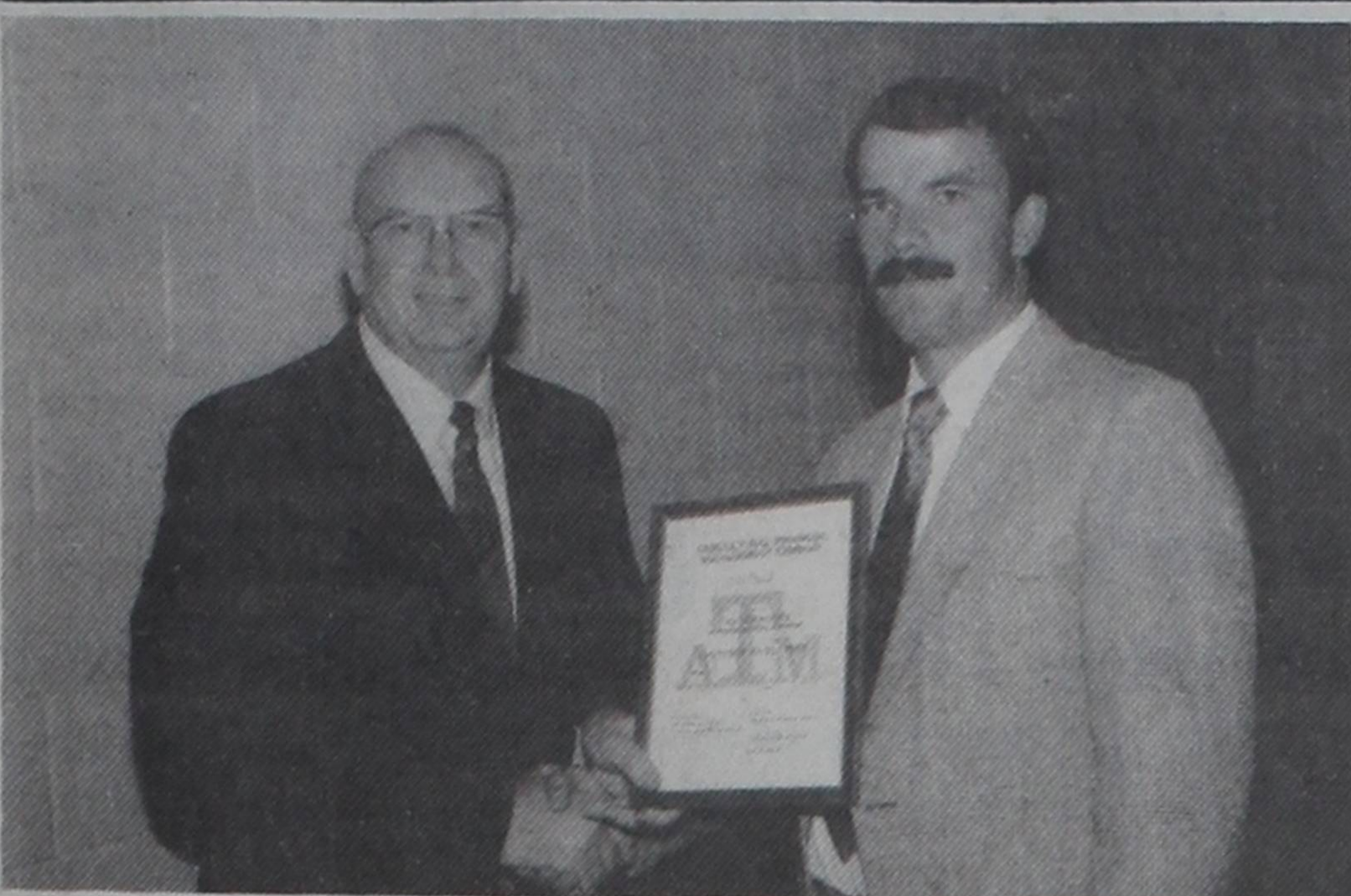

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District can assist you in planning and designing your windbreak. This free technical assistance provides you with a design and cost estimate. To keep your windbreak growing healthy, full and beautiful, a trickle watering system

is easily installed and can be used for flower beds, gardens and lawns, as well as windbreaks.

Windbreak trees and trickle systems can be ordered through the Parmer County S.W.C.D.

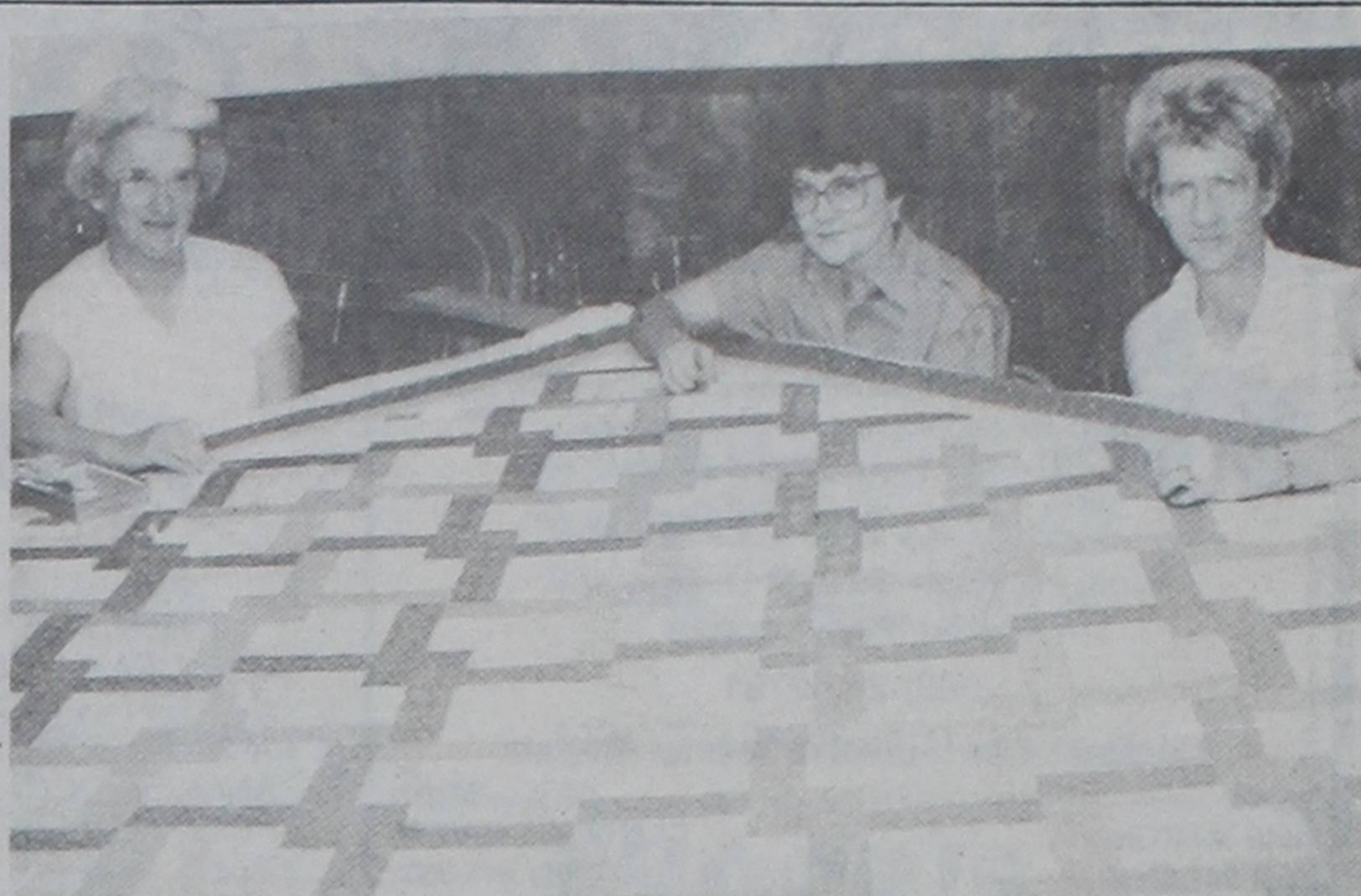

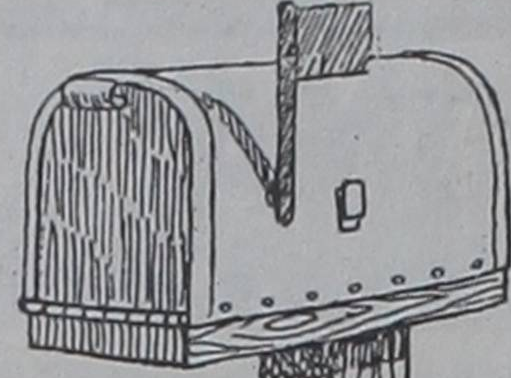
She is serving as secretary of her senior class, and has been vice president both in Thespians and N.H.S.

## Parmer Co. SWCD Acquires Flowmeter

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District has acquired a Polysonic flowmeter for checking the rate of flow of irrigation wells.

The Polysonic flowmeter may be clamped to the pipe wall on irrigation wells in a matter of minutes and flow measurements may be made without stopping the flow or physically contacting it in any way. Sound waves, that are transmitted and received by the Polysonic, measure the rate of flow. The flow rate appears as a digital read-out on the Polysonic monitor.

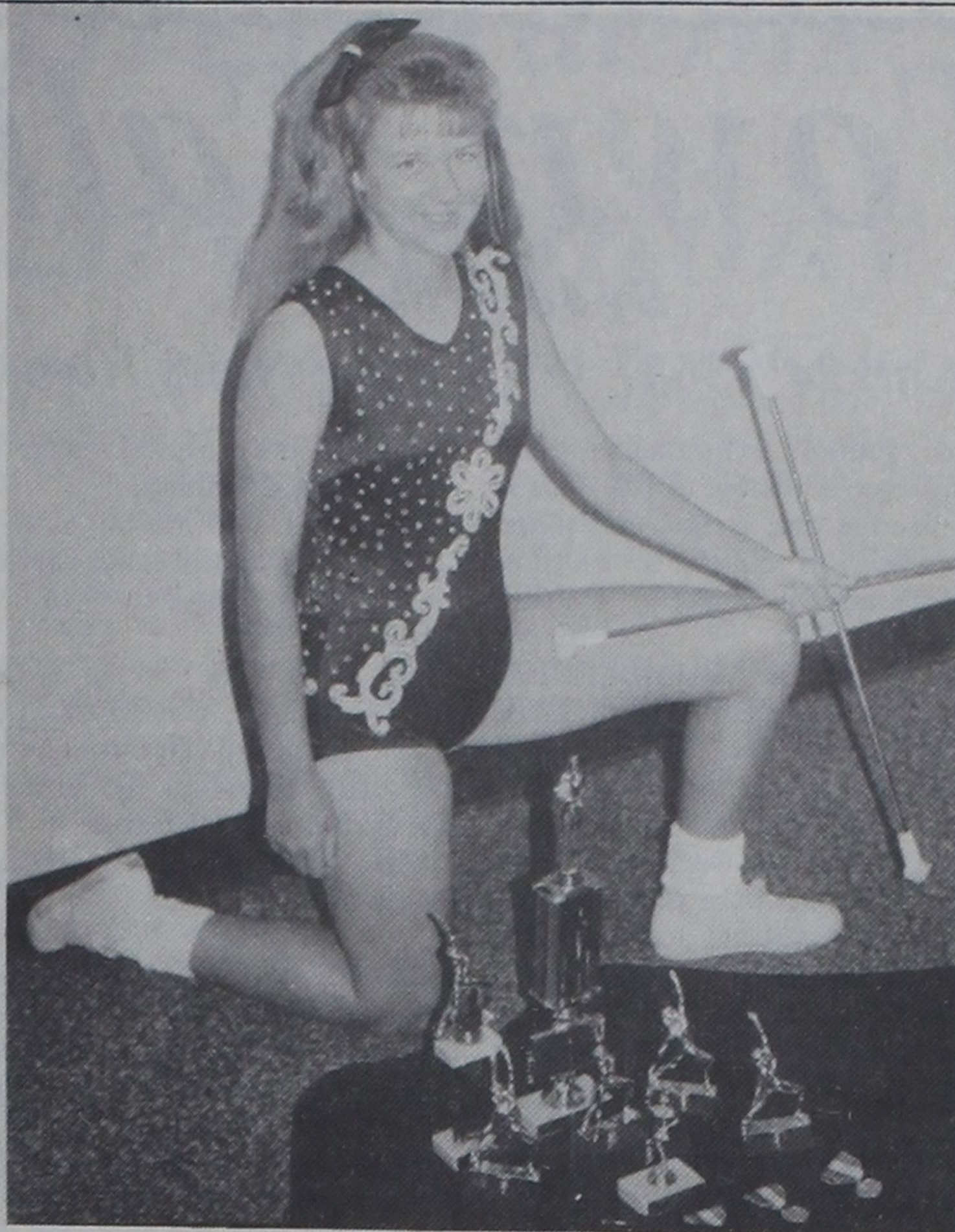
The ease and speed of hook-up

greatly reduce the time required to meter a well and more wells can be measured in a day than was previously possible.

The Polysonic can also be used to measure the rate of flow at a pivot sprinkler. This information can be useful in determining that the correct nozzles are used on the pivot.

The information obtained with the Polysonic flowmeter can be used in figuring the overall pumping plant efficiency.

### How To Tap Your Retirement Funds Early

Early retirement is more commonplace today than ever before, and the trend has raised a lot of questions about the rules affecting early withdrawals from retirement plans.

The subject of many questions is the rule that levies a 10 percent penalty, in addition to income tax, on early withdrawals. Specifically, if you were to withdraw \$10,000 from your deductible IRA before you turned 59½, you would owe Uncle Sam a \$1,000 penalty (10 percent) in addition to income tax on the entire \$10,000.

Fortunately, a strategy called systematic withdrawal allows investors to avoid the 10 percent penalty and still begin taking some retirement-plan distributions before age 59½.

Let's assume you retire early and receive a lump-sum payment from your employer-sponsored retirement plan. You decide to roll that payout into an IRA and have 60 days to do so in order to avoid taxes and penalties.

Once the new IRA is established, systematic withdrawal enables you to receive distributions free from the 10 percent penalty provided they are part of a series of substantially equal payments made on at least an annual basis. Of course, the distributions will still

be taxable as ordinary income.

The IRS suggests three methods for calculating your systematic withdrawal. The first uses the life expectancy of the individual retiree or the joint life expectancy of the retiree and beneficiary. An annual distribution is made based on life expectancy and current value of the IRA.

The second method involves amortizing the value of the account over the life expectancy of the individual or the joint life expectancy of the individual and the beneficiary at a reasonable interest rate when payments begin. The definition of "reasonable" is not defined by the IRS, so your tax professional should exercise caution when selecting an interest rate for calculation.

The third method of calculation is the annuity method. The distribution is determined by dividing the value of the account by a factor derived using a mortality table and a reasonable interest rate.

The rules on systematic withdrawals from your IRA, Keogh, 401(k), profit sharing or other plans are complicated, full of exceptions and often changed. Before you decide to tap any retirement funds get the advice of a trained professional. If you overstep the regulations there are stiff penalties that could cost you a big part of your retirement nest egg.

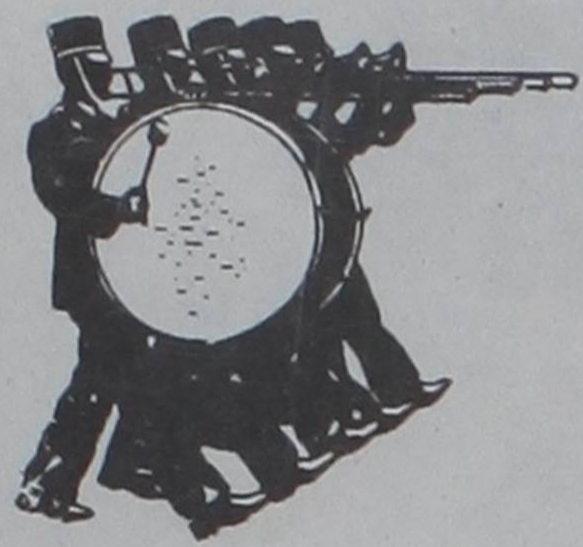

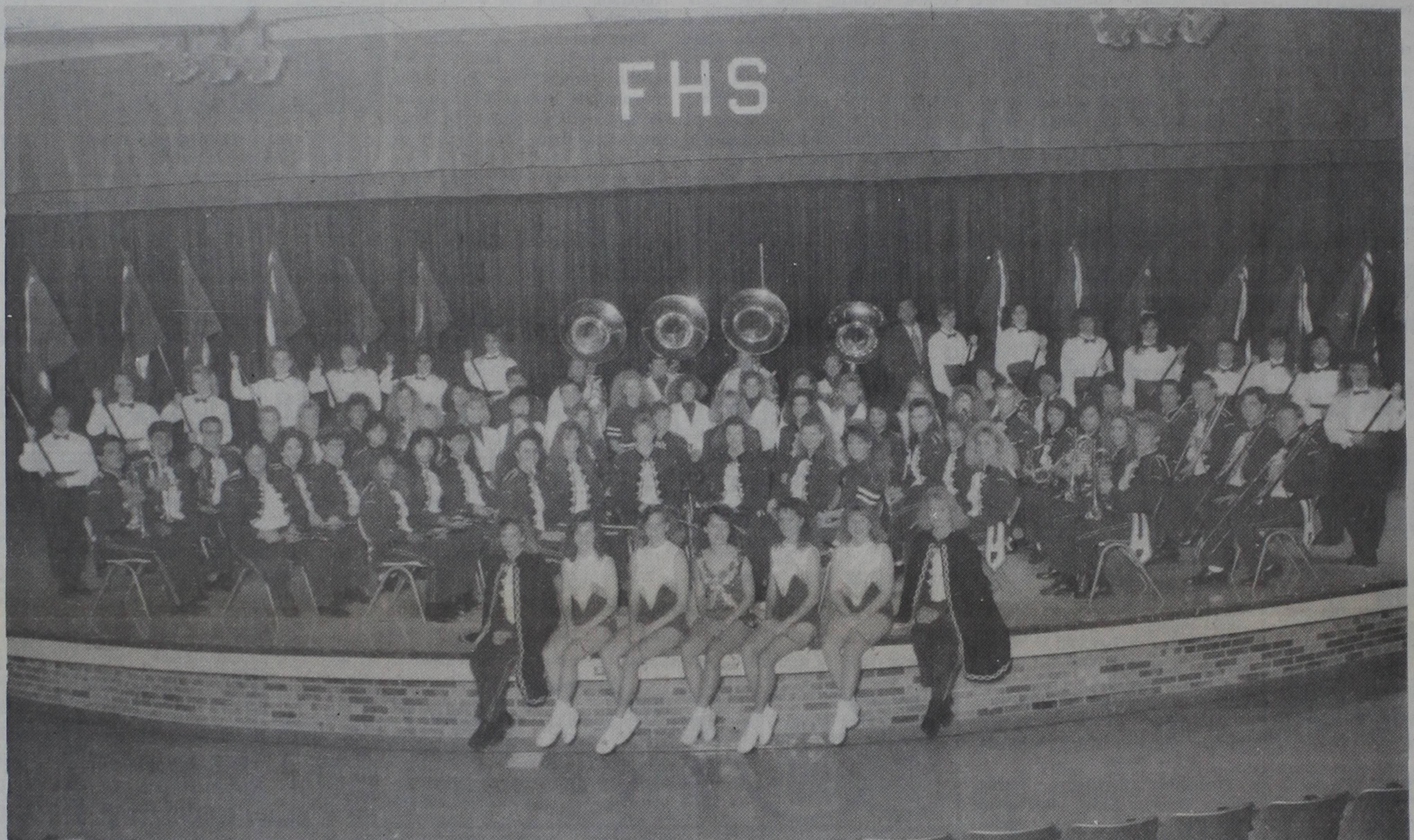
