### "Let's Talk Live Stock"

Fort Worth, Oct. 23.-Hog men were shaking their heads over the sagging prices of late last week and those of the opening session this week. It appears from nearly all standards that hogs are under undue pressure on prices compared with beef and lambs, and that th spread in prices is wider than jus-

The super-sensitivity of the meat trade is indicated by the fact that at Fort Worth Monday, best pack-ing sows sold for \$20 per hundred. and wnile shippers and small butchers pair a top of \$20.75 for most of the good butcher hogs, the major packer top was \$20.25 or only 25 cents per hundred over the top for packing sows.

This is the most narrow spread between these types of animals in

a long, long time.

It dems from the fact that heavy hogs are scarce at the present time, most of the marketings hogs being from this year's Spring pig crop and a well-rounded meat packing operation requires a variety of types of animals.

The Southwest's failure to produce as much pork as it eats was reflected in the fact that while the tow at Fort Worth was \$20.25 to \$20.75 on best hogs, there was a top of \$20 at Chicago, \$19.50 to \$19.90 at Kansas City, and a top of \$20.25 at St. Louis.

Further pointing up the narrow spread between good butcher hogs and sows was the fact that sows sold at \$19.25 at Chicago, or only 75 cents under the extreme top. Good demand for feeder pigs in the Southwest is reflected in the holding onto that \$1 per hundred they gained last week.

Large feed supplies in Texas will undoubtedly be the cause of much more livestock feeding this Fall and Winter than a year ago. Lack of storage space for much of the maize crop in West Texas is swinging the pendulum in favor of livestock feeders.

Cattle and calves continued on the mend price-wise in the open-ing session at Fort Worth and last week's gains of \$1 or more were generally held firmly. Some cows and all stocker and feeder cattle and calves were sold at unevenly higher prices.



This does not take into consideration the inconvenience suffered, or the fact that following or during a cold, other serious illness such as pneumonia or tuberculosis os mastoiditis gain a foothold. And the common cold is only one of the many winter enemies that encounters everyone from the crib to the coffin; some of the others are influenza chitis, ear infections, sinusitis, and pneumonia. These are all respiratory diseases and they are caused by many differens germs. Some of these germs are called bacteria, and some are called viruses.

Just because you have had a cold is no reason you won't catch another. Two or three people have three colds a year, and two out of eight people have four colds a year. Wet feet, drafts, chilling, exposure to bad weather, etc. do not cause your cold but they do weaken the body's resistance to a cold So we say that there are favorable conditions for germs, one is the strength and number of the germs and the other is body resistance which includes undernourishment, fatigue, irritation of the nose and throat by air borne substances, or chilling of the body.




