Housing Authority

Allocates \$3,200.00

On 16-Unit Project A preliminary loan of \$3200 to the Hico Housing Authority for 16 units of rural non-farm housing has been approved by the Public Housing Administration and is subject to the approval of President Truman, according to information received Tuesday by Odis Petsick from Congressman Omar Burleson and Senator Lyndon

The local Housing Authority, composed of Petsick, W. B. Coats, Morgan Moon, Truman E. Roberts, and Aubrey Duzan, submitted a preliminary management plan and operating budget, which was approved by the City Council, with their application for the low-rent dwelling units in September.

The project is planned for families living in sub-standard quarters with incomes from \$800 to \$2000 per year. Rental is to be 20 per cent of the annual income, with a minimum rental estimated at \$18 per month, including utilities, and a maximum of Dwellings are to be equipped with mechanical refrigerators, cook stoves, hot water heaters, and space heaters.







GUEST SPEAKER



REV. GERHARD BELGUM

Professor Belgum, guest speaker at The Texas Circuit Luther League Convention, Cranfills Gap, is prominent throughout the United

He was born in Nashua, Montana, and attended high school in Minneapolis, Minns., graduating in 1931. He then attended the University of Minnesota, Luther College, and took his Bachelor of Theology degree from Luther Seminary in 1940.

After a year of interneship at Central Lutheran Church, Portland, Oregon, he was ordained on June 10, 1940, by Dr. J. A. Aasgaard at Central Lutheran College, Minneapolis. His first pastorate was at Immanuel Lutheran Church, Tacoma, Wash, where he remained until becoming a chaplain in the U. S. Army in 1942, serving until 1946 in the ETO with the 35th Infantry Division, being engaged in five campaigns.

From 1946 to 1948 he studied at Princeton Theological Seminary, acquiring his Master of Theology degree in 1950 and becoming a Teaching Fellow at the Princeton Seminary. Meanwhile he was in the Department of Christian Philosophy, and studied at the Univer-sity of Chicago in the summer of 1949, where he was Associate Professor of Bible in the summer of 1947 and from the fall of 1948 to the present. His present status is Professor

of Philosophy and Bible, and Head of the Department of Philosophy.
