"In a town I'd never seen before, I found a hundred friends!"

says Oveta Culp Hobby - Commanding Officer of the Women's Army Corps

(WAC) in World War II.

She describes how a strange town became, in an hour, like home-and how she found there, not only friends, but more happiness for the future.



"Their faith makes them real ..."

"One morning, lonely in a strange town, I turned a corner and came upon a church, its doors wide open, the organ playing.

"Inside, the service was just beginning, and somehow, there I felt at home-not lonely at all, but as if I were joining in something worthwhile-so that when the last hymn ended, I was really sorry.

"As I walked out, however, someone came up to me. 'Excuse me,' she said, 'but isn't this the first time you've been here? We'd all so like to meet you.'

"Then all at once, I had friends, in a town I'd never

seen before-real friends. One of them invited me home to dinner-all of them made me feel welcome and happy.

"Ever since then, in churches all over the world I have made friends-people who have no use for pretense, for their faith makes them real-who don't need to escape, for they have the strength to stand fast -people, above all, whom I respect.

"These people gather in church, every Sunday, because they find here, each week, fresh strength and peace of mind."

There should be about 1/2 cup, including pulp, peel and juice. Cream butter, add sugar, then egg yolks, and cream until fluffy Add flour to mixture alternate ly with orange pulp. Chill. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased bak ing sheet. Bake in a moderately hot (400° F.) oven for 10 to 12 minutes. Tops will not be brown when done. While cookies are still warm, sprinkle with sugar.






