#### Large Number of Farmers, Ranchers Meet With Firemen

NUMBER 30.

A crowd of approximately 75 farmers and businessmen from Hico and the surrounding community gathered at Firemen's Hall Monday night to discuss plans for permanent protection against pass ture fires, which have become a dangerous threat during the current dry season, and in other previous dry seasons.

Sponsored by the Hico Volunteer Fire Department, the meeting was presided over by Truman E. Robers. J. R. Bobo, who was appointed secretary of the meeting, submitted the following notes for a

news story. Fern Jordan, Commissioner of Precinct 3, announced that he would be available to plow fireguards near the highway around pasture land. Charge for using the large machine, he said, would be \$6.50; and for the small machine, \$5.50. S. B. Starnes told the group that this method had been employed in Erath County, with the Highway Department doing

the plowing. Odis Petsick suggested a telephone-address system, by which those on a party line might be informed with a certain ring of a fire in their area, thereby bringing assistance of neighbors to help fight fires. Discussion on this subject followed, resulting in the appointment of Weldon Pierce and J. R. Bobo as a committee to work out a signal and propose the idea to the local telephone office.

Morgan Moon made the announcement that under law, only one fire truck at a time is permitted to leave the city limits in answer to calls from rural areas.

Fire Chief Richmond Herrington told about the rural fire equipment in Hamilton and gave the advantages to be gained from such equipment. Discussion followed concerning possible purchase of rural fire-fighting facilities for the Hico Fire Department. Along this line Sherman Roberson mentioned a truck carrying a 500-gallon tank which would be adequate to carry water into the country. The most that can be carried on any one O. L. Davis furthered the discus-

sion of rural fires and equipment. Although the rural fire-fighting equipment maintained in Hamilon is available to the citizens of the county at any time upon request, this machinery cannot be taken outside of Hamilton county. The major aim of the Monday meeting was to attempt to raise funds to purchase similar equipment which could be stored in Hico and used in the surrounding trade territory, much of which extends into Erath and Bosque

Willard Leach suggested that a committee be appointed, with one representative from each zone in the rural area. R. B. Goodloe, Fred Payne, Odis Petsick, Jewel Ramage, Fern Jordan, Johnnie Moore, and Sam C. Price were appointed to serve on this committee, with Richmond Herrington serving as chairman of same. Members of the committee were to hold separate meetings in their various zones to discuss preventative methods and means of aiding their neighbors in case of fire out break, and to formulate plans for raising funds for the purchase of adequate equipment to be used in fighting pasture fires.
