Saturday to await the arrival of the Highway Post Office, which will now be in regular service to carry mail between Waco and Eastland Although the bus was detained by unscheduled programs causing overlong stops along the way, those who patiently waited until 11:30, when it arrived, composed a crowd described by the visitors as larger than anticipated. The official count of people who accepted an invitation to walk through the vehicle on an inspection trip showed 138 against 130 at the county seat. Foresight in purchasing a rural fire truck last week proved valuable when an emergency arose Monday at a grass fire on the land belonging to J. H. Priest, and in the adjoining pasture. The truck, manned by the Hico Volunteer Fire Department, was taken to this fire to be put to its first actual test. The blaze was extinguished in a few minutes.

Another fire, which broke out on the golf course Sunday afternoon about 4 o'clock, caused little damage, but also spread to the next place, that of M. D. Booth. The newly-acquired equipment was not ready to go in time for

Upon learning of an excellent opportunity to buy the type of truck needed at a cost less than had been anticipated, and fearing that later governmental restrictions might make the purchase impossible, Fire Chief Richmond Herrington stated that the department obtained the equipment after its release through Camp Swift near Bastrop.

The truck, though used, appeared to be in good condition and was bought for about \$2500, which represents a \$1500 reduction from the price they had expected to pay. This particular machine would have cost \$6000 new, said Weldon Pierce, member of the fire department. It will be available to the farmers and ranchers of the surrounding comunity, who are backing a fund-raising drive to support the loan made to purchase the truck

Iredell, Carlton, Olin and Fairy. Firemen Pierce and Willard Leach drove it to those places Monday and announced with a loud speaker what they were exhibiting. They reported a great deal of interest in the surrounding towns, where they showed to what extent it may be used in spraying water on buildings.

#### Equipped for Rural Fires Fully equipped, the truck will

carry from 300 to 400 gallons of water in the tank, which firemen stated would be enough to put out an average fire, and it can also be used in drawing water from a creek, river, tank, well, etc. when a larger quantity of water is needed to put out a fire. It will supply two "booster lines" of one-inch hose for use on buildings. There are 150 feet of this size hose on each side of the truck. In addition, there are 600 feet of two and one-half-inch hose. The pump on the truck has the capacity to handle one line of this hose, and this pump can be operated while the truck travels, which will be an added benefit in combating grass fires. Other equipment includes seven fire extinguishers, four or five steel wire brooms for hand use, rakes for leaves, brush hooks, and racks to carry water pails and tow sacks if necessary. Fire Chief Herrington stated

that he believed they got a good deal on this purchase, and all the firemen interviewed agreed. They expressed the hope that farmers and ranchers will back their judgment, and said that with this help, the project can be a great advantage to the community. The truck is to be operated and maintained by the Hico Fire Depart-ment and stored inside the city limits, subject to call from any emergency of fire threatening

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

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


