Home Front War Indicated During Fight On Polio

Austin, Dec. 26.-The problem of facing a home front war center-ing around the scourge of polio was put squarely up to the people of Texas this week

All of the state's vaunted resources were being mustered as a mighty "Governor's Fight Polio Committee," named by Governor Allan Shivers, began pushing the urgent drive. Action on the community level will be emphasized through the new 150-man committee which will supplement the local machinery already set up in most areas.

Primary objective of the movement is to overcome a \$300,000 deficit in treating the record number of polio cases which has become so large that Texas in 1950 reported almost one tenth of all the new polio cases in the nation. The actual drive for funds, so far as the general public is concerned, will center around the 1951 March of Dimes, January 15-31. But emphasis also will be placed on large individual donations,

Members of the "Governor's Fight Polio Committee" attended meetings in Austin over the week end, carrying through a final precampaign state-wide meeting Monday. They took back home the message that polio cripples the economic structure of the community and state just as it cripples the persons who contract the dis-

Leading authorities pointed out that money is needed to care for patients and above all to carry out research into the cause of the

In the words of Governor Shivers, "Texas must meet the challenge of this dreaded scourge until science can conquer it.

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
