'Challenge of 50's' To Be Presented Over Radio Sunday

One of the most vitally important radio and television features of this mid-century year, with radio reporters from all over the world participating in person at New York in a discussion of "The Challenge of the '50s—Years of Crises," will be sponsored at the year's end by the Chevrolet dealers over the nationwide network of the Columbia Broadcasting System.

Recorded interviews with prominent statesmen and "men on the street" from all over the world will add dramatic interest. On television, films, animated maps and diagrams will give visual impact to the authoritative discussions of the world outlook.

The radio reporters on the program, in addition to Murrow, and the areas of the world they cover are as follows: Howard K. Smith, European news chief, London; Bill Costello, Korea, Tokyo, Philippines, Indo-China, India; David Schoenbrun, France, Portugal, Spain and North Africa; Richard C. Hottelet, Germany and Scandinavia; Winston Burdett, Rome, the Vatican, Greece, Yugoslavia; Ned Calmer, Puerto Rico and Latin America; Eric Sevareid and Charles Collingwood, Washington; Larry LeSeuer, United Nations.

The number of telephone conversations in the United States had jumped from a daily average of about 111 million in 1945, to 150 million at present—an increase of more than 50 per cent.

Home Front War Indicated During Fight On Polio

Austin, Dec. 26.—The problem of facing a home front war centering around the scourge of polio was put squarely up to the people of Texas this week.

All of the state's vaunted resources were being mustered as a mighty "Governor's Fight Polio Committee," named by Governor Allan Shivers, began pushing the urgent drive. Action on the community level will be emphasized through the new 150-man committee which will supplement the local machinery already set up in most areas.

Primary objective of the movement is to overcome a \$300,000 deficit in treating the record number of polio cases which has become so large that Texas in 1950 reported almost one tenth of all the new polio cases in the nation. The actual drive for funds, so far as the general public is concerned, will center around the 1951 March of Dimes, January 15-31. But emphasis also will be placed on large individual donations.

Members of the "Governor's Fight Polio Committee" attended meetings in Austin over the week end, carrying through a final pre-campaign state-wide meeting Monday. They took back home the message that polio cripples the economic structure of the community and state just as it cripples the persons who contract the disease.

Leading authorities pointed out that money is needed to care for patients and above all to carry out research into the cause of the disease.

In the words of Governor Shivers, "Texas must meet the challenge of this dreaded scourge until science can conquer it."
