



## Star Lites

**THE U. S. government, as most taxpayers over the age of 18 are well aware, has trouble getting things right.**

The government comes out with plans, programs and edicts that in most cases a committee from your average junior high school's gifted and talented program would see through in an instant.

The latest faux-pas perpetrated on its citizens is the new 100-dollar bills. Compared to the new \$100, the old Monopoly play money looks pretty good. We're thinking about digging out our old Monopoly set and compare "notes." If they're taking these new Franklins, then they'll probably take almost anything.

There has to be a lot of counterfeit bills out there that look a lot more convincing than this new design foisted on our people, the country's stores and money-changers.

For one thing, Franklin's picture on the new \$100 bill is considerably off-centered. Typical of the present administration, it's far too much to the left. The photo of Franklin is about twice the size of any of the presidential photos which have adorned the country's paper money for the past 100 years.

When you first see one of these bills, it looks for all the world like something the kids in school had dreamed up, for a play-like business course.

The other thing about the new \$100 bills is that they stick together--and, they are thin. Yep, you heard it right--the newest of the country's largest circulating bills look like a joke and feel like a joke.

One of the main reasons, we are told, that the government approved a new currency, was to make it harder for the counterfeiters to rip off the country's money supply.

Some of the best counterfeiters of U.S. currency in recent years are located in Asia, particularly in Korea and Cambodia.

A Japanese currency expert, who manufactures a machine which detects counterfeit bills, says that the new U. S. \$100 bills won't be that hard for the savvy counterfeiters to duplicate.

The United States' currency is easy to copy, according to Yoshihide Matsumura, and "is made so sloppily that the best counterfeiters have to lower their quality in order to duplicate it."

Who are these people who are put in charge of changing the country's money supply?

It hasn't been too many years since the mints were given the okay to make a new one-dollar coin. This would save the nation a lot of money, since dollar bills wear out due to their continual use. The coins would last longer.

Good premise, but the usual Washington bureaucracy came up with a coin that was exactly the same size as the quarter. Oh, sure, they were supposed to be 12-sided coins, and "everybody would notice that," the experts said. They didn't!

About three months into the Susan B. Anthony dollar-coin program, even the U.S. Mint officials had to admit that this was a mistake. Not only were some people receiving two or three of the new dollars in change for a 10-cent purchase (using a paper dollar), there were no places for the new coins in the nation's cash registers.

Once again, Washington D. C. had shot itself in the foot. We have saved a handful of the Susan B. Anthony dollars since the year they came out. Usually, the first year's issue of a coin would gain in value just like your first issue postage stamps. However, coin collectors say that these things are still just barely worth a dollar.

Back during the war, the nation couldn't spare copper for one-cent coinage due to the war needs. Someone came up with the bright idea of making the 1943 coins out of a steel-zinc mixture. Zinc was still in plentiful supply.

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## Baileys Survived After Home Was Destroyed

E. M. Bailey will celebrate his 70th birthday in August.

About a year ago the prospect of his reaching that landmark was in serious doubt.

On June 2, 1995, Ed and Delores Bailey were minding their grandson Terrance, 9, at their modest, quiet trailer home on the end of South Main and FM 2397.

Their youngest son, Mark Bailey, had taken his two daughters with him to do some construction work east of Friona, which turned out to be out of the tornado's path. He left Terrance with his grandparents.

The tornado began its path of destruction south of Friona, just about on top of the intersection where the Baileys, the Mendozas, the Whites and Osborns lived.

One year later, the Whites, Mendozas, and Osborns have rebuilt and repaired their damage for the most part. They all still live there at the intersection.

But not the Baileys. According to son Mark, most of the remains of their trailer was hauled away within two days of the tornado by volunteer workers.

After months of rehabilitation, Ed and Delores Bailey live comfortably in a Friona apartment, most of which was furnished and prepared by local churches and concerned citizens.

On the one year anniversary of the tornado, we visited the site of their former trailer with them and their son Mark.

Mark said that he kept trying to call the house after the tornado to check on his parents and son Terrance but got no answer.

He finally found his mother and son at the hospital. But they did not know where his daddy was.

The trailer home was buckled in the middle, shoved completely off its foundation and ended up in an "L" shaped heap against a row of trees 50 feet away. Ed Bailey was buried somewhere underneath.

Today he can recall most every detail of his life, including birthday's and dates he worked for

newspapers in New York, Chicago, Dallas, and McLean, Texas.

But he still cannot recall the night of the tornado or the three months afterward.

Bailey was in a comatose condition at Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital for a month following the tornado. He finally regained consciousness after being transferred to the Dallas Rehabilitation Institute.

He says that when they moved into that trailer in April of 1991, he strapped it down himself. He drilled into the hard ground every few feet to anchor it.

Today he claims that the ground was so hard that the work of anchoring the trailer led to an aneurism a few weeks later that almost cost him his life in May, 1991.

Today, signs of those anchors remain, but not the trailer. As Mark said, it is impossible to anchor a trailer against a tornado.

On our visit to the site, the Baileys walked around quietly

## Roadside Park Was Dedicated

Travelers passing through Friona on Highway 60 can once again take advantage of the new facilities at the rest area east of town.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) held a ribbon-cutting to dedicate the new roadside park at 11 a.m. on Thursday, June 6, at the rest area. Representatives from the Chamber attended the ribbon cutting. The public was invited.

After the ribbon-cutting, the Bovina maintenance section cooked hamburgers for TxDOT employees, special guests and other individuals who helped restore the roadside park.

Last year's tornado destroyed the park, with damages estimated at \$23,000.

The old area was nice, but the new facilities are even better, commented George Villarreal, Bovina maintenance technician for TxDOT.

"We've planted trees and bushes and vines and put up new picnic tables with arbors," he noted. "The chain link fence is 250 feet longer than the old one."

TxDOT completed the new rest area in May, opening the facilities to Memorial Day travelers. They planted Black and Honey locust trees throughout the park and lilac bushes and trumpet vines along the fence. They replaced the old tables with four slatted tables and benches. The grating is powder coated and baked for a smooth finish. They were built by Roy Lloyd, Bovina maintenance technician.

When the Friona warning sirens went off a couple of Saturdays ago, luckily they were in Amarillo.

## Former City Resident Has "Longhorn Project"

Linda Outland Mannix of Durango, Colorado, daughter of Lorena and A. L. (Jake) Outland of Friona, along with her husband Jeff is compiling information which they plan to turn into a history of the Texas Longhorns--the animals, not the football team.

A graduate of Friona High School, Linda can quote you a ream of information about her favorite subject. She has been researching the longhorn cattle, and was surprised to learn that only one other book has been published regarding the longhorn, that was published in 1941 by noted author J. Frank Dobie.

Linda and Jeff Mannix were enroute back to their Colorado home from the annual convention and sale sponsored by the Texas Longhorn Breeders Assn. of America, in Fort Worth.

They took three longhorn cows and three heifers to sell, and came back with three animals. One was a beautiful ten-year old Longhorn steer that they purchased from the El Coyote Ranch of Kingsville.

They plan to use the steer for publicity purposes. He is the epitome of the classic Texas Longhorn, with as nice a pair of horns as you'll ever see, and a pretty red and white coat.

Mannix is a pro rodeo producer, Texas Longhorn breeder, writer and

"lover of the West."

The Colorado couple has travelled 4,000 miles gathering information about longhorn cattle.

Like the American Bison, the Texas Longhorn was on the brink of extinction, until a group petitioned the government in 1927 for a grant to save the longhorns.

A herd of 30 cattle were collected and put out to pasture in the Wichita Wildlife Refuge near Cache, Oklahoma. Today there are hundreds of thousands longhorns.

The government appropriated \$3,000 in 1927, and Forest Service employees made a 5,000 mile trip

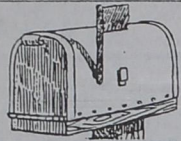
evening. The dates for the workshop are June 17-29. Three productions will be presented at the conclusion of the workshop.

Thanks to everyone's efforts in avoiding fires this past month, we have not had any grass fires or fires from people burning trash and getting out of control.

The firemen had one truck fire six and one-half miles south of Friona. This was the same afternoon of Friona's power outage. There was also a truck turned over on Highway 60 one-half mile east of Black.

The firemen went to Amarillo to the Panhandle Firemen Convention and entered the pumper races. Some of the firemen's wives entered the pumper races for the women's division. The women came in third in the six women competition and first in the three-women race.

The firemen are working on a two and one-half ton truck and getting ready to put on two-500 gallon water tanks and a pump to help put out fires in CRP grass.

The truck has six-wheel drive and will go just about anywhere. The firemen were called on this past month to help on weather spotting.

"Please be careful if using fireworks, because there is an extreme fire danger. It just takes one spark as dry as the conditions are to spread fire clear across the county. Have a good Fourth of July, but please be careful," the firemen say.

### 55 YRS AGO-JUN 27 1941

The twenty charter members of the Friona Lions Club celebrated their Charter Night last Tuesday night in the Friona Woman's Club House, with a large attendance of Lions from clubs around the territory.

The Friona territory is still being afflicted with a little too much rain all at one time, although there were a few days last week on which it did not rain during either day or night.

### 50 YRS AGO-JUN 21 1946

In the election held here last Tuesday, to determine whether or not the people of Friona are in favor of bonding the city in a sufficient amount to give the city an ample and adequate sewer system, the bond issue carried by a good margin. Out of 121 votes cast, 113 were in favor, only four against, and four ballots were mutilated.

Floyd Brookfield, who recently received his discharge from the Navy, has moved to Dimmitt with his wife, where he is employed with the Ford agency.

### 45 YRS AGO-JUN 21 1951

That's right, it was an earth tremor! Residents of the Friona area experienced a definite earthquake Wednesday at 12:36 o'clock noon, when the vibrations were sufficient during their five-second duration to attract the attention of most everyone. Evidently, persons sitting at the time were more acutely aware of the disturbance, as some reported violent rocking of their chairs. A mild rumble preceded the quaking.

### 40 YRS AGO-JUN 21 1956

Friona Wheat Growers has received a check in the amount of \$290,944.55 from Commodity Credit Corporation, representing payment on storage and handling 90 million pounds of milo in the Cooperative's elevator last year. It was the biggest check in the firm's history.

### 35 YRS AGO-JUN 22 1961

"It was just what we had ordered," was the way one farmer described last week's rain, which was the first general moisture the area had received in about three months. Coming on the eve of what is expected to be a great wheat harvest, the slow, steady rain measured 3.5 inches and lasted throughout the night last Wednesday.

### 30 YRS AGO-JUN 23 1966

The State Highway Department has lifted the "Farm to Market" status from Highway 214, thereby making it eligible for state planning and assistance on improvements for the road.

### 25 YRS AGO-JUN 24 1971

Six Friona youngsters left this week for Haiti and Jamaica, where they will be part of a ten-day mission work tour. ### 15 YRS AGO-JUN 21 1981

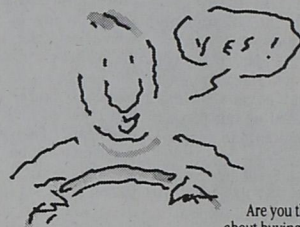
Larry Rogers was appointed the new postmaster in Friona, effective Saturday, June 21. Rogers, 41, is a native of Stamford, Texas.

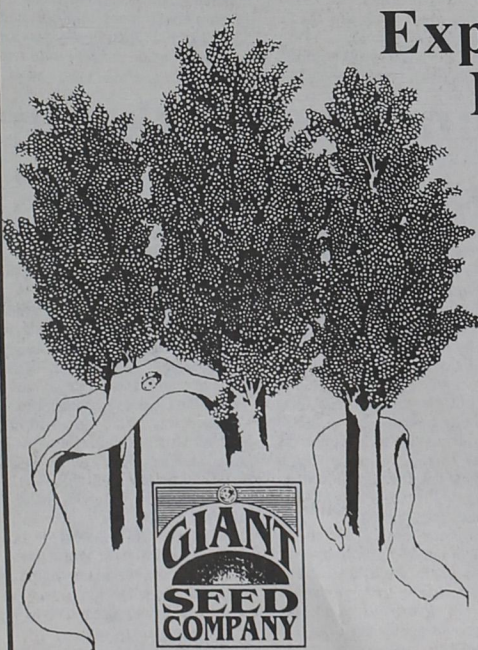

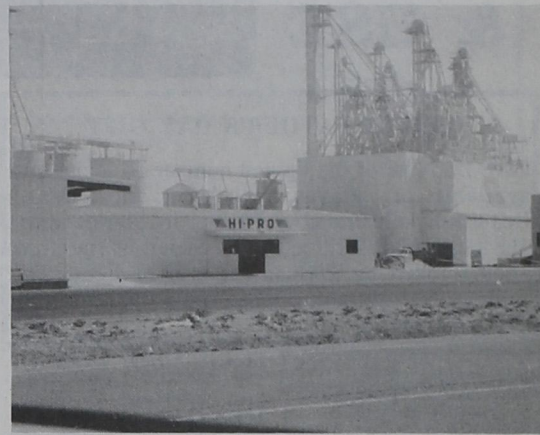

The remains of the Ed Bailey mobile home following the tornado

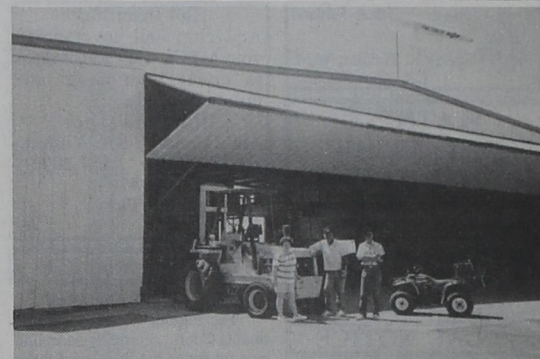
## Tornado Anniversary Is Observed

## '95 Tornado Left Trail Of Stories

In the aftermath of the tornado that snaked across the area June 2, 1995, a number of unusual stories were related.

Tommy Weemes of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, told about seeing wheat straw embedded into a power pole.

Weemes was surveying the damage on the Frank Zinzer place in southern Deaf Smith County when he saw a bunch of wheat straws embedded in a power pole. Zinzer's place is located north of the rural area where the storm hit in Parmer County.

The straw was attached to the lower part of the pole. "It looked like a porcupine was stuck in the pole," he said. "I have been convinced that this can happen. It appeared that the wind velocity was so hard that instead of breaking the straws, it embedded them in the pole," he said.

The REC had over 150 power poles blown down or broken by the storm.

\*\*\*\*

GENE HARTIS, who was manager of the Friona Inn, said he watched the tornado cloud approaching from the southwest. He saw a funnel touch down. It got his attention when he saw 20 or 30 of the PVC pipes which had been stacked on the Four-Way Pump property down the highway from the motel, come sailing in the air across Highway 60.

"They were about windshield high. I remember thinking that if they hit a vehicle, it would be as if it (the vehicle) had been torpedoed," Hartis said. Some of the pipe landed in the parking lot of D.L.'s Thriftway. I heard that one of the pipes hit a pickup on the parking lot and knocked a window out," he reported.

through south Texas and Mexico to locate the original stock needed.

During the dark days following the Civil War, the Texas Longhorn became the financial salvation of the Southwest. Men returning home from the war found that their only source of income was the thousands of Texas Longhorns wandering freely--worth next to nothing in Texas but hungered for by the residents to the north.

An estimated 10 million Texas cattle were trailed to northern markets between 1866 and 1895, bringing in the staggering sum of \$200,000,000. To begin with, the cattle were sold at market for \$1 per head. But the animals found their own food and water along the "drives," many of which ended in Kansas.

Texas Longhorn mother cows are known to produce calves for 20 years, giving birth to a calf every year.

The longhorns are known for more lean meat than the English breeds, and for being disease and parasite resistant.

They adapt well to various climates, and take advantage of the forage which is available. They are a docile breed, and work well for cross-breeding purposes.

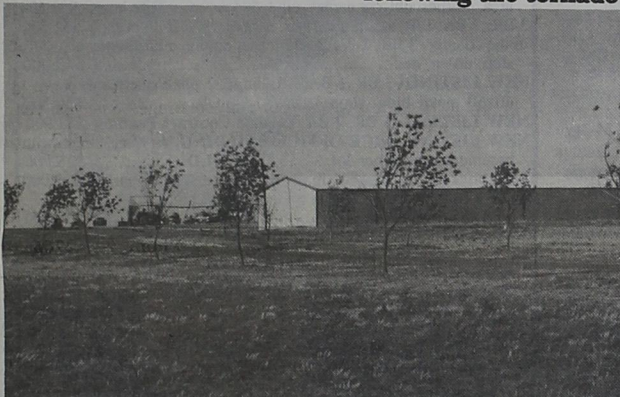

by merchants as dimes, and you could pay for a drink with one of the new coins and possibly get some change.

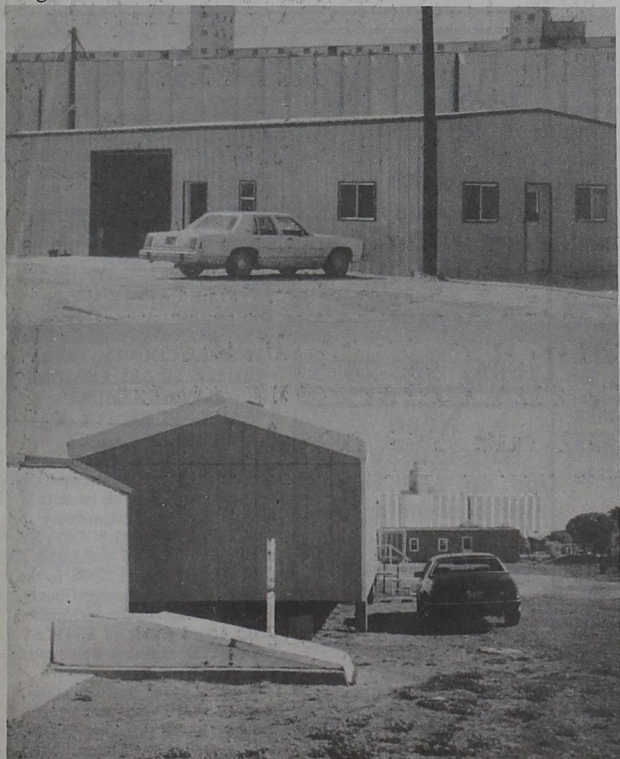
In 1883, the U.S. Mint came out with a new design for the five-cent (nickel) piece. Nickels were the same size as the \$5 gold piece.

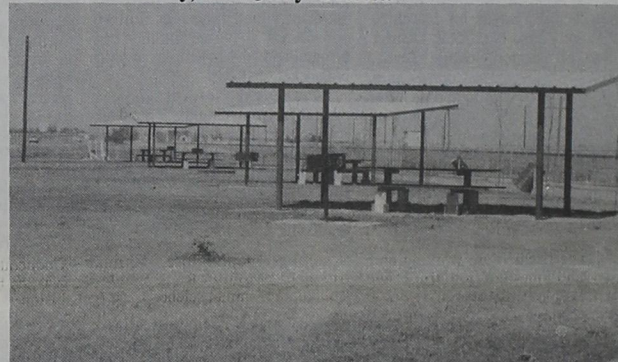

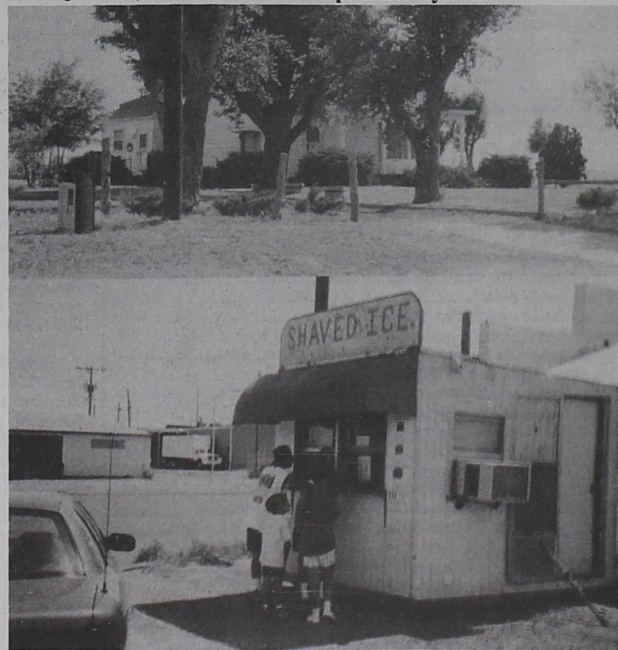

# Out Here

*"On the road again. I just can't wait to get on the road again....."*

The summer months are upon us. The RV's and vans and rental trucks will be rolling along every highway in America carrying people on vacation or moving them to a new location.

Airlines like Southwest will be shuttling plane loads of kids to visit daddy (or mommy) now that school is out and visitation rights kick in.

If you are planning a long road trip this summer, I thought this might be a good time to refresh ourselves on what to expect, and what to do.

Last Saturday, my mother and I drove to Iowa Park, near Wichita Falls, to pick up my kids, Zach, 7, and Megan, 5. We drove back the same day.

That's a total of almost ten hours on the highway. To me anything over two hours is a long trip.

The first observation is that no two people drive alike. Mother and I alternated driving and she tends to talk to other drivers more than I do.

"Well, what is he doing anyway?" She was talking to a truck driver up ahead of us and we didn't have a CB.

When I drive, I don't speed (much). Maybe a mile or two over the limit. I think it is interesting that when a speed limit is set, the first thing we want to know is how far over it we can go without getting stopped for speeding.

The best option ever invented on a vehicle is cruise control. I set mine on 70 (maybe 71), and drive and think. Until I am interrupted by the road.

The stretch of Highway 287 between Amarillo and Wichita Falls is a state testing laboratory for various types of road surfaces. I actually saw one sign that said "Road surface testing ahead".

You drive the right lane for a while and suddenly you are on two strips of blacktop for the next few miles.

So you move over to the left lane to see if it is any better. But they have run thin diagonal strips of asphalt across that lane every ten feet. So you can listen to the "thump-thump, thump-thump" every second, or go back to the blacktop strips.

One of my favorites is the sign that says, "Caution, grooved pavement ahead".

First off, why do they groove the pavement out in the middle of nowhere. Then they put up a sign to warn you about it? Does that mean it is dangerous. To me it is time to change lanes again.

For about ten or twelve miles on Highway 287, the road narrows to two lanes due to construction, which has been going on since about 1989.

When the sign says "Right lane ends, 1500 feet", I move over. But there is always that one driver who stays in the right lane until the very end.

The speed limit through the construction was 55 mph and there was a "DO NOT PASS" sign too so I set my cruise control on 55. By

the time we got through the two-lane construction, I had more vehicles backed up behind me than cars on a Santa Fe coal train. Most of them didn't seem very happy to see me as they went around when we got back on the four-lane.

On Highway 287, you get to see places like Claude, Childress, Memphis, or Hedley. When we came to Estelline, mother shouted to slow down even slower than the speed limit. The "Reduced Speed Ahead" signs are very common.

Another type of driver that bugs me are those who take five minutes to pass you. You know the kind. They are only driving two miles an hour faster than you, but they still try to pass and it seems to take them forever.

If you are going to pass somebody, pass them. Then slow down some so they can pass you. Might as well play the highway "passing" game. "Hey, didn't we pass them once already?"

Maybe it is my imagination but it seems that the truckers are observing their 60 mph limit whether they like it or not. I can't remember one truck passing us on this trip.

We stopped at a roadside vegetable stand. In ten short minutes, the old farmer had told me about his grandkids and sows and piglets, Megan had her shoes full of red dirt, and Zach learned how to

pick out a watermelon from the farmer's wife.

That is not the kind of life experience you'll find on the Interstate.

If you have young children and grandchildren to take along on your road trip, I suggest you call McDonald's and ask what the Happy Meal toy is going to be the week you are traveling.

Some of you already know what I mean. I can see you smiling.

Once I took my son Casey and two other nine-year-olds on a road trip from Dallas to Orlando, Florida. It happened during McDonald's "Play Doh" week.

Three boys times two McDonald's stops a day added up to play doh all over the van.

So, hey, pack up the van, service the RV and remember:

\*Use your cruise control and don't speed. Be courteous.

\*Get off the Interstate and see some of America.

\*Change lanes if you encounter grooved pavement.

\*Remember there are almost 100,000 concealed handgun permits issued in Texas. That driver you are about to yell at may be one of them.

\*Try to force yourself to stop somewhere other than McDonald's once in a while. \*Have a nice trip.

## Velma Hodges Tells About Early Days

(Editor's note: each month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home, is featured in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times." This month, Velma Hodges is featured. Her daughter, Bettye Owen, penned the article.)

Velma Caldwell Hodges was born June 21, 1907 in Decatur, Texas. Her parents were Charley and Catherine Caldwell.

Their family consisted of four brothers and two sisters. Her sister, Eunice Boyer and sister-in-law, Lelia Caldwell of Hereford, are the only family members still living.

The Caldwell family came from Henrietta to Hereford in 1920, moving to the Progressive community.

Mother married Cecil Hodges, son of Deaf Smith County pioneers, Charles and Ollie Hodges, December 15, 1927 and moved to their home, north of Dawn in the Daniel community, where Cecil was farming and ranching.

Mother said, "The school house was not the only place for learning but was the social center of the community."

Ball games were played, singings were held and the Literary Society afforded opportunities for people to participate in plays, and entertainment for others.

The practice times were as much fun as production time and it was here Cecil and Velma grew to know each other and began their

relationship. A creek ran through the farm and this is where mother learned to bait a hook and fish, and enjoyed learning how to shoot a "22" rifle at the frogs jumping out on the bank.

Our family moved into Hereford in November of 1938 due to failing health of daddy, who died January 20, 1940.

Following Charley's death, mother was confronted with the task of providing for her three children, so she attended business school and her sister, Eunice, stayed with the family and cared for the children, Doris Jo, Bettye and Keith.

Mother was elected County Treasurer for Deaf Smith County in 1941 and served in this office until retiring in 1971.

Mother enjoyed her yard work and growing flowers. Some of mother's neighbors on Avenue J in Hereford said her yard was one of the prettiest on the street.

We have a loving family, who loves our mother, mom or "Nannie," as fourteen grandchildren call her. The twenty-six great-grandchildren and four great-great-grandchildren have all heard stories of Nannie Hodges.

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for June.

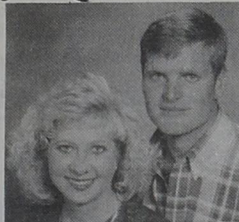

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### NOTICE OF PROPOSED GAS RATE CHANGE

On May 31, 1996, Energas Company filed Statements of Intent to change its gas rates with each incorporated city listed below. The proposed changes will take effect no sooner than 35 days after filing. Each city may suspend the proposed effective date for an additional 90 days.

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct a

Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at Parmer County Hospital, 1307 Cleveland, Friona, on June 19.

Each participant at our screening will receive a breast exam and one-to-one instruction in breast self-examination by a Registered Nurse specially trained in breast cancer detection, and a mammogram by a mammography technician. The program is certified by the FDA, American College of Radiology and the State Health Departments of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. Financial aid is available for breast screening and mammograms to individuals who qualify.

## Lincoln Would Probably Avoid Penny Stocks

People who try to get something for nothing often end up with nothing.

This sometimes happens with people who invest in penny stocks. According to the Securities and Exchange Commission, a penny stock is one that sells for \$5 a share or less and is not traded on a major exchange or the NASDAQ over-the-counter market. Many high-quality companies—for example, Wal-Mart and Coca-Cola—never sold as penny stocks. On the contrary, penny stocks may be offered by promoters who want to look for a gold mine, develop a pet project or even start up a legitimate business. If that sounds like someone wants to use your money to take their risk, then you already understand penny stocks.

Most major securities firms discourage their customers from investing in penny stocks. Some prohibit the recommendation of any penny stock not followed and rated by their firm's analysis. Others simply don't pay their investment representatives for any order of a stock selling for less than \$5 a share.

Why do many investment firms avoid penny stocks? According to the North American Securities Administrators Association, those who speculate in penny stocks lose money 70 per cent of the time. That's the good news. When fraud is involved, the odds of a loss rise to 90 per cent.

Generally, limited information is available on penny stocks. Stocks listed on the New York and American stock exchanges, as well as the NASDAQ over-the-counter market, must meet certain financial standards regarding pro-tax income, assets, distribution of common stock, and more. Penny stocks have few, if any, of these requirements. Most information on penny stocks comes directly from the issuing company, and this information is seldom verified by financial analysts.

## Colby Carthel Makes List At San Angelo

Colby Don Carthel of Friona, a student attending Angelo State University in San Angelo, was listed on the Dean's List for the spring semester at the university.

Carthel, is a biology major. His parents are Donny and Cindy Carthel of Friona.

To be eligible for the Dean's List, a student must be enrolled as a full time student and have at least a 3.25 grade point average.

In spite of the limited information that is provided and the odds against making money, investors continue to buy penny stocks. If you are one of these people, be aware of the risks of your investment. Penny stocks are appropriate only for money that you can afford to lose. They are not a good way to invest for long-term needs like retirement.

If you're going to buy penny stocks, it's vital to do your homework. Look for companies with new or innovative products that have strong potential. Stay away from start-up companies in highly technical fields that you know nothing about. Call the company, and ask direct questions. Ask for printed information such as a recent prospectus or annual report. Expect to spend the equivalent of one or two working days investigating any penny stock that you plan to buy.

Finally, diversify. This is good advice with any investment, and it makes especially good sense when buying low-priced stocks of small companies that often go bankrupt.

Take a good look at a penny. See the profile of honest Abe Lincoln? Remember, this is not a logo for penny stocks.

A: No, because, this occasion, originally known as Armistice Day, was a day of celebration, not of mourning.

## YOUR EYES

### Blurred Vision

Occasional blurriness caused by excess tearing or morning mucus in the eye is not a cause of concern, but if the blurring continues for an hour or more or if it recurs, do see your optometrist to find the cause and clear up the problem--and the vision.

There are any number of reasons why eyes get blurry. You may just need corrective lenses, or the blurring may indicate an infection; medication to cure the infection should stop the blurring. If central vision is blurred, but not the edges, it may signal a change in the central part of the retina--the macula. This calls for immediate professional attention.

But blurred peripheral or side vision, while central vision is normal, may be the first sign of glaucoma. This change can be so gradual that the patient adapts to the limited field of clear vision, continuing with regular activities, but prompt diagnosis and treatment is important to save the individual's vision.
