It was a lot of work for \$5, but winning is fun and always better than losing.

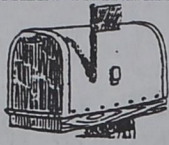

50 Yrs Ago-Oct. 25, 1946

At least one indication of the return of the good old pre-war conditions was manifest in Friona this week when two men spent Tuesday and Wednesday here quite busily employed at their craft of repairing typewriters and adding machines. They seem to have been quite welcome callers for many of our business concerns.

45 Yrs Ago-Oct. 25, 1951

The new school building located just north of the grade school has been virtually completed, and occupancy is expected some-time next week. Four classrooms, a study hall and the high school principal's office will be contained in the new building, Superintendent Caffey said.

40 Yrs Ago-Oct. 25, 1956

Now under construction is a new building to house Jones Motor Company in east Friona on Highway 60. Opal Jones, owner, says she hopes to have the building finished by the first of the year. Jones was the Friona Dodge-Plymouth dealer from 1935-1938.

35 Yrs Ago-Oct. 26, 1961

An English class for Spanish-speaking people who are helping with the harvest in the Friona area will convene Sunday at 5:30 p.m. at the American Legion Hall in Friona. The first session of the year, October 15, drew a total of 92 to try to learn some part of the English language. Wesley Foster is ramrodding the class. The need for a similar class, to teach local businessmen and residents conversational Spanish, was discussed.

30 Yrs Ago-Oct. 27, 1966

A total of 783 farms were counted in Parmer County during the 1964 Census of Agriculture, the Bureau of the Census reports. The number was 80, or about one-tenth less than the figure obtained five years earlier, which indicated 863

farms in the county.

25 Yrs Ago-Oct. 28, 1971

Friona's Ken McLellan reigns as world champion in the Super Stock Eliminator class, following the National Hot Rod Association's World Finals of drag racing last weekend in Amarillo. McLellan, who has won a basement full of trophies during the past ten years, called his latest win his "most satisfying," though admitting that he felt little different since notching the world title.

20 Yrs Ago-Oct. 24, 1976

The Friona Chieftains came alive last Friday night as Keith Martin completed two long passes for touchdowns and Edward Castillo added the extra points and a field goal to lead the Chieftains to their first win of the season. The Chiefs beat a tough District 3-AA rival the Morton Indians, 17-12.

Jane Williams, longtime employee at Friona State Bank will be honored for her retirement at the Community Room of the bank Thursday. Mrs. Williams started at the bank in October 1946. She was the fourth member of the bank's staff, which now numbers 31.

15 Yrs Ago-Oct. 25, 1981

Santa Fe Railroad announced Wednesday that it plans to do away with its freight stations and agents at Friona, Bovina and Hereford in this district, and at seven other

Panhandle area cities, in its new regional marketing concept.

The cost of mailing a first-class letter will rise to 20 cents beginning Sunday, November 1 when new postage rates go into effect. Postmaster Richard Wilson reminded customers this week.

The Friona area received a light freeze Friday morning, when the mercury dipped to a low of 31 degrees for a short time.

10 Yrs Ago-Oct. 25, 1986

A groundbreaking ceremony for the new sanctuary for Calvary Baptist Church will be held Sunday at 12 noon. Earle Webb Construction Co. of Amarillo is the general contractor for the project, which has an estimated cost of \$167,480.

According to the U.S. Census Department, Parmer County is one

of only seven Texas Panhandle counties that showed population growth between the years of 1984 and 1985. The county's rate of gain was .62 per cent.

5 Yrs Ago-Oct. 26, 1991

Richard and Janette Collard are selling their law practice and will be moving to Waco, they announced this week. Partners in the firm will now be Jerry Matthews of Dimmitt and Byron Boyd of Lubbock.

Thirteen-year-old Jeremy Bentley was the week's winner in the Friona Star football contest. He correctly picked 16 games, running away with the \$10 prize. His dad, Jerry, was the week's winner in the Bovina Blade contest and his mom, Rhonda, was second, both picking 13 of 14 games correctly.

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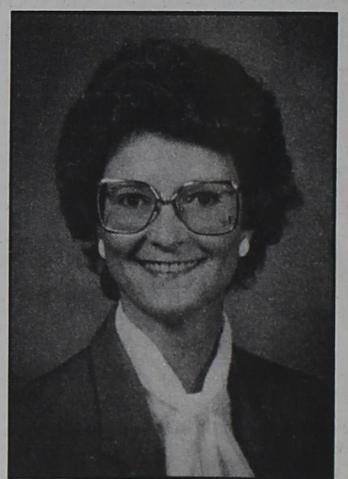

Chiefs Hang Wolves Out To Dry, 44-21

The second quarter has been Friona's bright spot in district play, and their game at Dalhart was no different.

The Chieftain offense clicked for three touchdowns in the second period, enroute to their fourth straight district win, 44-21.

Coach James Morton's troops added another 21 points in the first 12:05 of the second half, and put the game out of reach for the Wolves, who had handed Dimmitt its first district loss in their previous outing.

Defense marked the opening quarter, as each team made three first downs but couldn't maintain a drive.

Daniel Cuevas bolted for a 42-yard gain on Friona's third offensive play of the game, going all the way to the Dalhart 34. But the Chiefs fumbled on the very next play to ruin an early scoring opportunity.

But on their third possession of the game, the Chiefs helped themselves with a partially blocked punt, and took over on the Dalhart 39. Cuevas raced 13 yards to the Wolves' 25.

Then the small runningback raced 15 yards to Dalhart's five, but fumbled as he was tackled. Dalhart recovered, but Friona's charging defense took advantage of an errant pitchout and Perry Hanes recovered the ball on the Wolves' ten yard line.

Blockers opened up a nice hole, and Cuevas charged ten yards for the go-ahead touchdown. Angel Vega's kick gave the visiting Chieftains a 7-0 lead with 10:40 left in the half.

Friona's area-ranked defense held the Wolves, one of the top offensive teams in the Panhandle, to only seven yards in their next two possessions, and got the ball on their own 37.

Quarterback Kyle Grimsley kept the ball on the option play, went up the middle for a 26-yard gain. Two plays later, Andy Kendrick crashed through the line on a quick-opener, and raced 40 yards for the score. A bad snap foiled the PAT, but Friona had hiked its lead to 13-0, as 2:43 remained in the period.

Chieftain linebacker Fidel Rodriguez stepped in front of a Josh Reynolds pass and returned it ten yards, giving Friona possession at the Dalhart 36.

Grimsley hit wide receiver Vega, who made a nice catch at the Dalhart seven, and three plays later Kendrick crashed over from the two. David Shelby ran for a two-point conversion, and Friona's lead became 21-0 with just 49 seconds left on the clock.

That should have been the halftime score, but Reynolds teamed up with his favorite

receiver for two long passes in the closing seconds, including a 22-yard TD with 16 seconds left. So the halftime score was 21-7 in favor of the Chieftains.

Friona's offense and defense picked up right where they had left off in the third quarter. A nice defensive play by Cecil Cooper, and a sack by Quint Ellis handed the ball back to the Chieftains early-on.

Cuevas reeled off runs of 17 and eight yards, both for first downs, and Kendrick bolted 35 yards, being stopped at the Dalhart 12. On second down, Shelby ran around right end untouched for the TD, and Vega's kick made it 28-7, Friona. The Chieftains had driven 81 yards in only eight plays.

Dalhart's Danny White proved to be hard for the Chieftains to tackle, and he broke two or three tackles on the ensuing kickoff, running 75 yards for a Dalhart TD.

That cut Friona's lead momentarily to 28-13.

Grimsley danced 13 yards on the option play for a first down. Then he faded to pass, saw Vega coming open behind his defenders and delivered a perfect strike which Vega caught in full stride at about the Dalhart 20 and raced in for the score.

The Chieftain wide receiver still had enough breath left to kick the PAT, and Friona had quickly regained its 21-point lead at 34-14.

Dalhart tried to drive, and aided by a penalty moved to midfield. But once again Reynolds was forced into a bad pitchout and Cooper claimed the ball for Friona at the Dalhart 41.

Grimsley hit Cuevas on a 19-yard pass play, Shelby ran ten yards, and Grimsley ran 12 yards as Friona quickly advanced the ball. Grimsley then faked a handoff and ran into the end zone. Vega's kick made it 42-14, just five seconds into the final quarter.

If Chieftain fans thought their favorite team was taking advantage of its scoring opportunities, they were right: the Chieftains had scored on FIVE straight possessions beginning early in the second quarter.

About all that remained for Friona was for Ellis and Eloy Trejo to trap Dalhart's quarterback in his end zone for a safety, and Friona's final two points with 4:05 left in the game.

Jesse Mendez added the last defensive highlight, intercepting a pass at the Friona 10, and returning it 22 yards to the 32.

The Chieftains cracked the 500-yard mark in total offense, and were above 400 yards for three consecutive weeks.

The Chieftains had been making most of their yardage in previous weeks with the option veer to the outside, and surprised Dalhart with runs up the middle.

"Daniel (Cuevas) did a great job of running the ball. We also had some big passing plays," Morton said. "But I think it was our defense that set the tone," Morton added.

Cuevas gained 143 yards, Grimsley 108 and Kendrick 90. Vega caught two passes for 72 yards.

Another Vital Game For FHS

Coach James Morton said this week that it's the team Friona is facing is potentially the best team they've faced to that point.

"But Dimmitt definitely has the capabilities of beating us, and we're going to have to play our dead-level best to win, and if we win, it will go a long way toward deciding the district title," Morton said.

The Chieftain coach said that the boys have had a good week of workouts, albeit a somewhat colder climate for the drills, especially on Monday, as they worked with a covering of snow.

The team is in pretty good physical condition, the coach said.

It shouldn't take much to get the team in the frame of mind it needs to be in, as Dimmitt is Friona's top rival, in terms of games played. Friday's game will mark the 61st renewal of the Parmer Co. vs Castro County teams.

It will be the 39th consecutive year for the two schools to meet on the gridiron, and every game has been a district match. Dimmitt is not only the only team on Friona's 1996 schedule to have been played 38 consecutive years, but also the only team to have been in the same district with the Chieftains all of this time.

Down through the years, Dimmitt has had by far the most success in the series. The Bobcats hold a whopping 40-19-1 lead in the series, but Coach Morton's personal record is 2-2 vs DHS.

The Bobcats have been ranked as the area's top defensive team all season, allowing just 184 yards per game. Contrast that to the 373.6 yards per game the Chieftains are averaging, and something will have to give. The 'Cats are the third-rated team in offense, at 257.6.

Friona is right behind Dimmitt in the defensive column, allowing 191.7 yards per game.

Andy Kendrick leads the area in rushing with 688 yards, and teammate Kyle Grimsley is third with 599 yards. Kendrick also leads the scoring with 58 points. Angel Vega is still a leader in receiving with 16 catches for 406 yards, and Grimsley is a top passer, completing 50.7 per cent of his passes.

Andy Hill is Dimmitt's leading rusher with 517 yards. Zack Matthews has rushed for 395 yards and has scored 30 points.

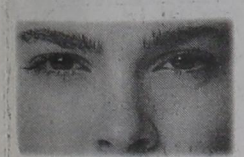

Georgia Rites Held For Horton Brother

Graveside services for Robert "Bob" Horton, 65, were conducted October 10 at Decatur (Georgia) City Cemetery.

Horton, civic leader and retiree after 38 years with South Central Bell Telephone, and 27 years as Corporate and Community Affairs director at the Decatur office, died Monday, October 7. He had had cancer for the past year.

Horton was known not only for his civic work, but for his infectious smile and the ability to make people laugh.

His co-workers agreed that Alexander Graham Bell would have wanted a man like Bob Horton to smooth the rough spots.

He was born in Rome, Georgia, October 27, 1930. He had said in a newspaper interview that he was raised in a close-knit family with his twin sister Emily, who died in 1976, and his brothers Thomas and Hollis.

He attended Alabama Polytechnic Institute--now known as Auburn University--where he studied business administration and was a member of Kappa Alpha.

He was praised by a close friend, attorney John Key, who called Horton's death a great personal loss as well as a loss to Decatur.

"He loved to fish, hunt,

play golf, tennis, loved his friends and always had a big smile on his face. He was a great family man, to boot," Key said.

Horton was past president of Decatur Rotary Club, was a Paul Harris Fellow, past director and treasurer of the Decatur Chamber of Commerce, past chairman of the United Way of Morgan County, and was instrumental in starting the Miss Point Mallard pageant.

He also was on the board of the Alabama Telco Credit Union, and had organized blood drives at area schools.

Of his club work, Horton once said "I guess I've been in Decatur so dang long I've about run out of clubs. But if I'm going to be involved, I'd rather be in charge."

Survivors include four daughters, Laura H. Fite and Mary B. Horton, both of Decatur, Emily L. Horton of Birmingham and Marshall H. Wise of Chattanooga; one brother, Hollis Horton of Friona, and five grandchildren.

Attending the service were the children of Lunell and Hollis Horton, Kathryn Gurley of Friona, Sunny and Franklin Ratliff of Amarillo, Tracy Bowden of Dallas, Trip Horton of Beaumont, as well as Doris and Wesley Barnett of Friona.

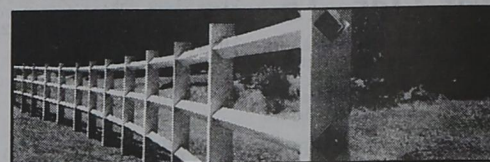

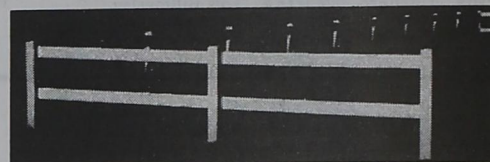
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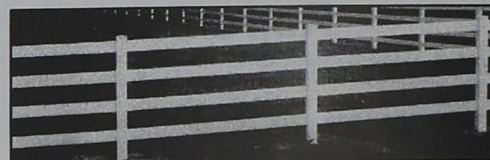

Could you, in your wildest imagination, think of a young teenage girl asking Pres. Carter if he wears boxers or briefs...and, even more ludicrous, can you imagine Pres. Carter glorifying that question with an answer?

I heard one young couple say they didn't particularly like either candidate, but they would vote for Clinton because he seemed nice and friendly. Okay, maybe you don't like Dole, but you DO like MONEY, don't you? With Dole's Republican tax cut, a family of four who makes \$30,000 a year will be able to keep \$1,261 more than what they're taking home now.

During the four years of the Clinton presidency, federal spending has ballooned nearly \$200 billion; the number of new federal regulations has exploded, and by 1997, President Clinton's programs will have added close to \$1 trillion to our national debt.

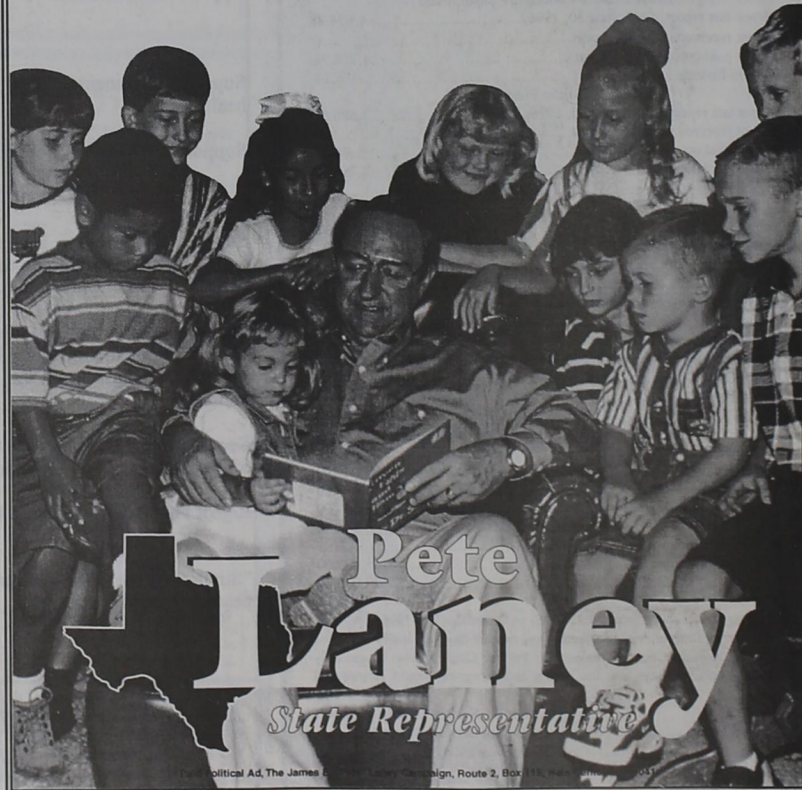

Jeremy, old boy, I think we have been having mashed potatoes for years here in Farmer County except we usually put gravy in the well.

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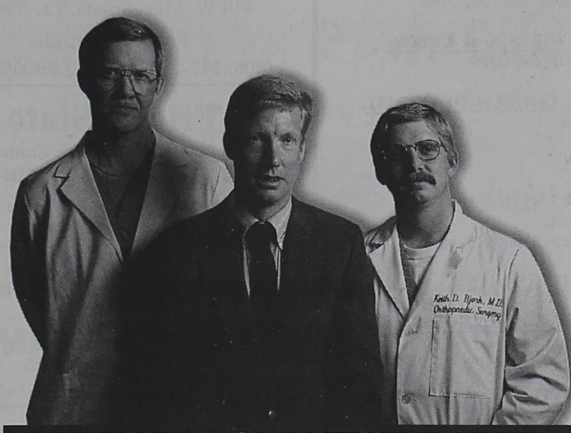

"In regard to United Way funds donated to Panhandle Community Services, I would like to report the following expenditures that have assisted Panhandle County residents.

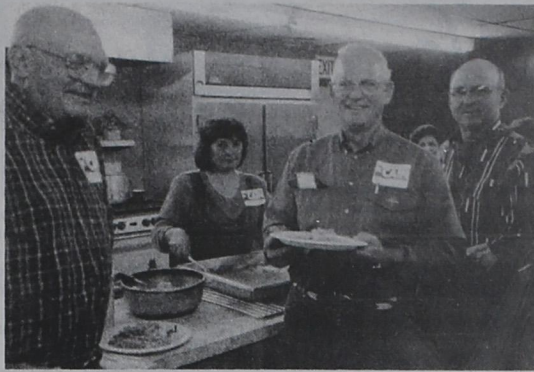

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Gary of Dimmitt and Kyle of Midland, Texas; two daughters, Susan Cerday of Wimberly, Texas, and Linda Welch of Friona; one brother, John Wise of Atlanta, Georgia; two sisters, Neta Lewis of Lubbock and Neva Parker of Midland; and 17 grandchildren.

Those on the board from Friona are Peggy Monroe, Porter Roberts, Kitty Gallman, and Jo Blackwell. Additional board members are from Bovina, Lazbuddie, and Farwell. These are all appointed by the Panhandle County Commissioner's Court.

Most Panhandle County foster children come from Friona and the board is very appreciative of the funds given by the Friona United Way.

The commissioner may not have acted illegally, but it was definitely unethical.

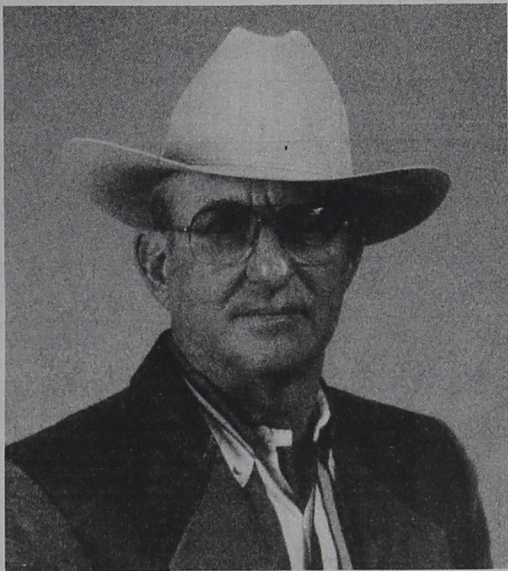

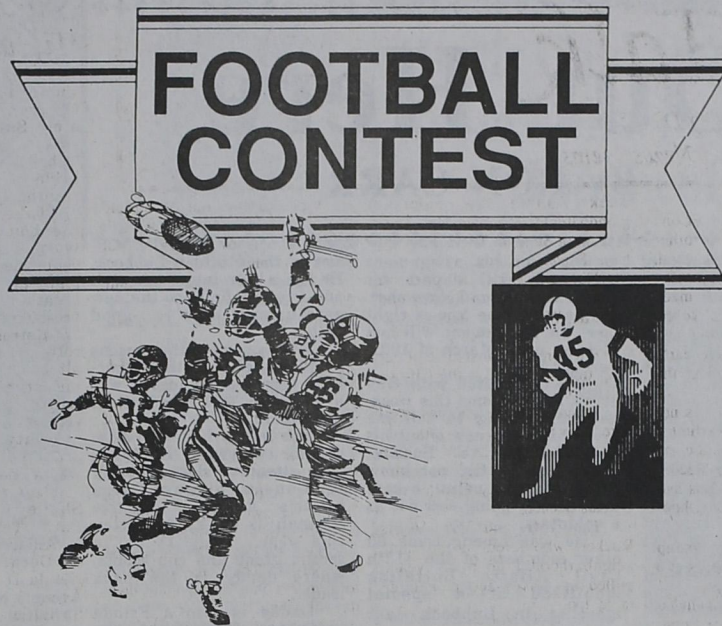

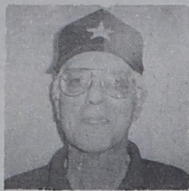

Out Here

Chances are the residents of Bosnia-Herzegovina are not concerned much about buying fertilizer, especially with another harsh winter coming on.

They are more concerned about whether the truce between the Serbs and Croats will continue.

They are more concerned that no more of their loved ones are slaughtered in the senseless feud in their country and whether they can make it to the market and back without another sniper or mortar attack.

Parmer County resident Guy Warren III, manager of the Wilbur-Ellis fertilizer and

chemical facility south of Black can sure help them with fertilizer and soil advice if they need it.

More important to him and other members of the 413th Civil Affairs Battalion of Lubbock, he hopes to also help them keep the fragile truce and rebuild their country.

As a U. S. Army Reserve member for the last four years, Specialist 4th Class Guy Warren, III, will ship out around November 1 to Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

After a couple of weeks of orientation about the situation in Bosnia and

training for his assignment there, he will depart for Bosnia around mid-November.

As far as he knows right now, the assignment will last at least until March of 1997. Perhaps longer.

When I visited with Guy at his Friona home this week, he was willing to tell me everything he knew about his mobilization to Bosnia. Trouble is, he did not know much at this point, except that he was going and not as a volunteer.

He was among some 60 other members of the 413th Civil Affairs Battalion mobilized at a special meeting in Lubbock last weekend.

"Usually we meet the first weekend of each month", he said. "But they called a special meeting and handed out a list of those who would be ordered to Bosnia".

Warren told me that prior to now, his unit had asked for volunteers for duty in Bosnia. They also sent volunteers to the skirmish in Haiti.

As of now, he still has not received his official orders, but all his gear was arranged in a pile in the family living room. There were no civilian clothes on the pile.

Guy Warren, III, was born to an Air Force family in Fort Worth where his dad, Guy, Jr. was in the Air Force during the Viet Nam war.

He grew up in Cowntown, graduated from high school there and met his wife Heidi there also.

He attended college at Tarleton State in Stephenville where he received his degree in Plant and Soil Science.

He and Heidi married, moved to Kansas, and had two children, Guy IV, 8, and Hannah, 5.

They moved from Kansas to Spearman where he was a Co-Op manager.

After his Army Reserve unit in Kansas was disbanded, Warren found a

slot in the 413th in Lubbock. He has a keen interest in civil and foreign affairs so the new assignment was a good match.

He says one of the reasons he took the job with Wilbur-Ellis here was because it was a lot closer to Lubbock than Spearman.

The family has been here now for two years. Heidi has been attending classes at WT in Canyon aiming for a nurse's degree. Little Hannah is in kindergarten this year. Guy IV is in second grade and cub scouts, where daddy is the pack leader.

Daddy is also a Friona volunteer fireman. The family attends First United Methodist Church and are active in school and community affairs.

As Guy has found out, there are a lot of details involved in putting your life on hold while you serve your country.

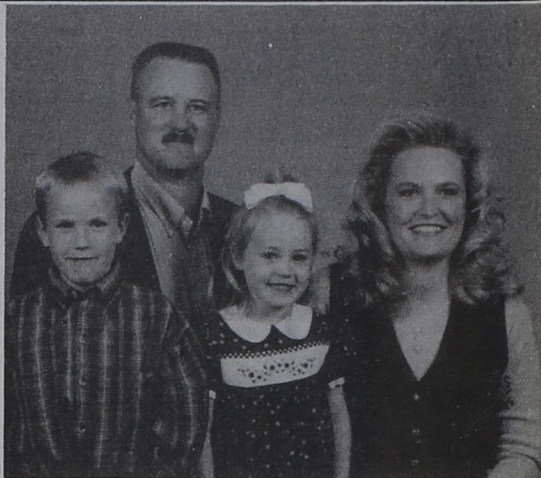
"I have spent the week so far notifying the fire department and cub scout parents that I will be on leave for a while. This Friday, I have a meeting with my two bosses to figure out what the company can do while I am gone".

Heidi has tried to figure out how to juggle her schedule of kids and college too.

They have talked to the kids and told them as many details as kids can absorb. How do you explain Bosnia to a couple of kids when most grownups don't understand it?

For all the trouble, Warren maintains a sense of duty and in some ways is looking forward to the experience.

He and Heidi checked out some reference material on Bosnia and Eastern Europe from the WT library. "Most

people here in the U. S. don't realize how old and how much history that part of the world has", he said with some degree of anticipation.

"A part of the region was once called Macedonia which goes back to biblical times".

The 413th Civil Affairs unit will act as liaison between the Bosnian government and the United Nations military to help Bosnia rebuild their government and civic infrastructure.

There are American, British, and French sectors there. Warren doesn't know which sector they will be assigned to.

They will find out at Fort Bragg along with learning more about U. N. rules.

He already has language tapes of both Serb and Croatian dialects. It is a unit requirement that they study and learn as much of the language as they can.

They are not allowed to take civilian items other than shaving gear, cameras, and stationery. The Army will issue clothes and rifles at Fort Bragg. Guy will carry an M-16, loaded, and he probably won't need one of those concealed weapons licenses.

Maybe you remember

seeing television reports of our troops in Bosnia last year in the middle of a ferocious winter.

Maybe you remember too, hearing Commander-in-Chief Clinton assuring us that our troops would be home by December, 1996.

Maybe you remember that Clinton took a trip over there. So did Hillary and Chelsea.

And so too will Guy Warren, III of Parmer County. Chances are that his accommodations will not be as warm and convenient as that of the First Family. But no doubt Guy will serve his time, do his duty, and return to Parmer County.

We hope real soon. God bless Guy III, Heidi, and the kids. It is because of people like them we can still be proud to say God Bless America!

P.S. As soon as Guy III gets a Bosnia mailing address, we will print it in hopes everyone will write him often to let him know Parmer County awaits his return.

Wouldn't a batch of homemade chocolate chip cookies make a Bosnian winter a little easier to take? Godspeed Guy! We'll be in touch.

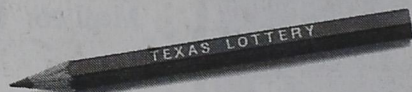

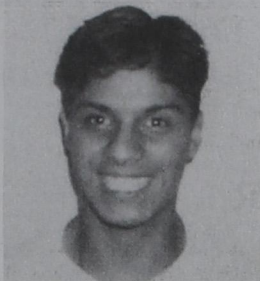

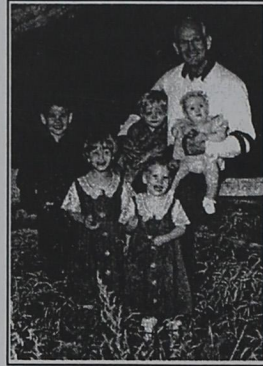

CYBERSPACE...certainly not something that I ever thought I'd have anything to do with much less be trying to explain to someone else as a "Cybrarian." (A Cybrarian is an information access facilitator—much like a librarian—for the infinite information arena known as Cyberspace.)

Librarians have long been known for their willingness to search for that elusive bit of information, the proverbial 'needle in a haystack.' Cybrarians will be doing the same thing, but the new tools and technology should make the job much easier and faster.

Much of what goes on in this cyberspace is commercial business (sort of like a gigantic electronic yellow pages with the added benefit of video and sound. It would be a little like being able to sit down and call any number in the directory just to see what you would find. Who has time for that?)

With a lot of electronic and telecommunication wizardry and equipment (and a few \$\$) you may connect the telephone, personal computer and modem in your humble abode to the electronic highway known as "the internet" and explore or "surf the net."

In fact with your set-up, some know-how and more \$\$, you can open your own web page or site on the world wide web (www) and open your own electronic window to the world...and then it's "bring on the plastic money!" Everything from direct travel connections to pizza delivery is available.

An absolutely astounding amount of information is available for access: being manipulated, updated, downloaded, transmitted, transferred and received 24 hours a day, every day. Information that is instantly available (that is if the chosen site 'isn't busy' and some of it is updated daily or hourly).

News, weather, government information, statistics, legislative updates and texts, on-line periodicals texts, directories, information on subjects only limited by the human mind or imagination.

With the right connections in place, you may "visit" any of these "addresses" or "sites" simply by typing in the address and then exploring that page/site. There are list servs, discussion groups, computer "shareware," etc., etc. with "web browsers" and/or "search engines" to help make the searching "surfing" easier.

Sound like magic...or mayhem? It is probably a little of both, but I'm afraid this fast growing information delivery source is here to stay. It is a vast arena, hard to control or regulate other than the self regulation of its users.

A free idea exchange could be a wonderful thing...imagine being able to access many great minds around the world with a problem or an idea.

There are always bad apples to spoil the bunch, however, but unfortunately, it does still offer us choice of what we wish to access; we can still choose what is right for us and it is that choice that we

must try to preserve. With each new concept or idea, there is a struggle with its effects on our world and our values whether it was finding out that the world was not flat or reaching out to talk 'on-line' with the world. Just think, only a few short years ago, no one would ever have thought they'd be "clicking" a mouse! Soon you will be able to visit the Library on-line internet at our home page; meet you there. Take Care Of Your Glasses



Your prescription glasses or quality sunglasses represent an investment in your good vision and your good looks. It makes sense to protect them and prolong their useful life. Here are a few tips:

- *Keep glasses in a case whenever they're not being worn.
- *Clean dust or lint with a soft cloth, and use a lens cleaner to remove smudges and oil. Never use nails to scratch off a spot.
- *Take glasses off gently with two hands, not one. Pulling them off will strain the hinges; the temple piece may break off.
- *Wearing glasses atop one's head may look stylish, but the temples will probably stretch out of shape.
- *Don't place glasses face down on a table or other surface; they are likely to scratch.
- *If glasses are in plastic frames, avoid leaving them in concentrated sun-as, for instance, on the dashboard of your car.
