## Large Voter Turn-Out Is Expected On Tues.

There are 4337 registered voters in Parmer County. Bonnie Warren, county clerk, expects this election to bring a large percentage of them to the polls.

The 459 voters that had cast their early ballots by Wednesday set the tone for the 1996 election. A total of 542 early votes were counted in 1992, the last presidential election year.

During the last general election in 1992, Warren said, "We had a real good turn out percentage-wise and we expect the same this year. There is a lot of interest in this election."

"We hope to make at least that much, plus you always have some small expenses each year in getting things ready for the production," Mrs. Orme said.

Although the Ormes are moving from Friona, Merlene plans to see production of the second season through, and will be here until December 22.

## Chiefs Host PHS In Daytime Game

It will be a new look when the Friona High School Chiefs host Perryton's Rangers Saturday at Chieftain Field. Kickoff is scheduled for 1:30 p.m.

First, the game is a Saturday afternoon affair. It may be Friona's first afternoon game since the 1930s-40s, before a lighted field meant Friday night football.

Second, the Chiefs can clinch at least a tie for District 1-AAA's championship with a win. As it now stands, Friona has clinched at least second place in the district, and a playoff spot.

Even if Friona were to lose both of its last two games, the Chiefs would end up 4-2 in district, and might be tied with Dimmitt and/or Dalhart, both of whom FHS has beaten. Hence, the team would advance in the playoffs.

But Friona coach James Morton isn't even considering the latter scenario. The Chiefs have been win-oriented all season long, and they don't plan to "back into" the playoffs or district title.

A win would mark the first time since 'way back in 1963 that a Friona football team won eight straight games under Coach Don Light.

It would be the first eight-win season since the 1986 team under Coach Tommy Moss and field-general Daniel Echols finished at 9-3. That 1986 is the only team in FHS

history to win nine games, which is a distinct possibility for this year's Chieftain team.

Saturday's matchup will be the first time ever for Friona and Perryton to meet in a regular-season game.

The only other time they met was that '86 season, when the Chiefs and Rangers hooked up in a bi-district game at Amarillo's Dick Bivins Stadium. Friona made a late touchdown to down the Rangers, 14-10. That win is the only playoff win for a Friona football team. FHS has been in the playoffs four other times, including 1995 under Coach Morton.

The bad news for Saturday is that after an extremely bad start, the Rangers now have their anticipated team all together, and it showed in their 17-10 win over Dalhart last Friday.

"They have all of the guys back who were on suspension early in the season, and more importantly, they have their quarterback (Trey Duke) back, after being academically ineligible up until last Friday's game," Coach Morton said.

The Perryton team was playing with a lot more confidence against Dalhart, Morton indicated. The Rangers are basically a run-oriented team, running about 80 per cent of the time. Running back Cody Sunday is their biggest threat, and also is one of their top defensive players.

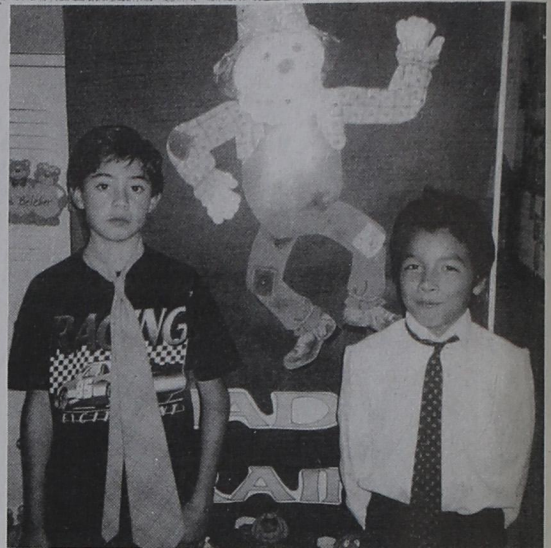
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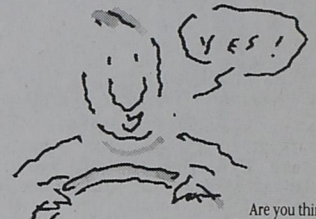

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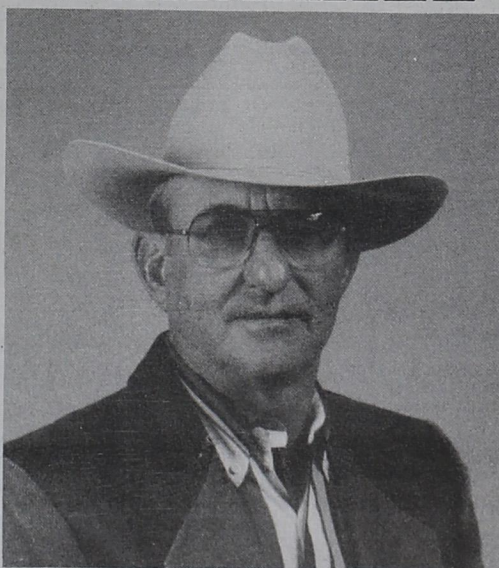

# Friona's "D" Gives 'Cats Great Lesson

Going into last Friday's game, the Dimmitt Bobcats were rated as the top defensive class 3A team in the Panhandle, and second on the South Plains.

But the FHS Chieftains gave the Bobcats a good lesson in the fundamentals, and rolled up over 400 net yards against the 'Cats.

The result was an impressive 43-0 win, which clinched a playoff spot for the Chieftains. It ran the team's district record to 5-0. Friona won its seventh straight game, to stand 7-1 for the season.

The Chiefs scored three quick TDs, causing Dimmitt to cough up the ball on their first two possessions, leading to short scoring drives and an eye-popping 21-0 lead.

"It was an offensive coordinator's dream. We surprised Dimmitt with a new defensive set, and were able to shut them down. Their fullback had been the main cog, and we neutralized him (21 net yards," coach James Morton said.

Dimmitt had the choice to start the game, and took the wind, electing to kick off with the stout south breeze to the team's backs. It turned out to be the wrong choice, at least on this particular evening.

Fullback Andy Kendrick gave Friona the early momentum. He raced 56 yards up the middle on the second play of the game, setting Friona up first and ten on the Dimmitt 19 yard line.

David Shelby gave the Chiefs a first down with a nine-yard run to the Bobcat four. Two plays later, Shelby crashed across the goal. Angel Vega split the uprights with his kick, and it had taken Friona only 3:39 of clock time to take the 7-0 lead.

The 'Cats had a good kickoff return, but runningback Beau Hill fumbled on Dimmitt's first offensive play, and Cecil Cooper pounced on the ball at the Dimmitt 42.

Kendrick had a nine-yard burst on third and four at the DHS 36, and five plays later, with Friona having a second and one at the five, Kendrick raced in for the first of his three touchdowns. Vega was dead center once again, and Friona led, 14-0 after just 6:46 of play.

On Dimmitt's second play from offense, Derek Buckley hit Zack Matthews on a seven-yard pass. But Chieftain linebacker Fidel Rodriguez jarred the ball loose on the tackle and teammate Eloy Trejo recovered.

Kendrick ran 16 yards to the Dimmitt 10, and four plays later, on a fourth and goal, Grimsley stretched to break the plane of the goal with the ball. Vega's kick was again true, and Friona led 21-0 with 1:59 remaining in the opening quarter.

Let's get this straight: Dimmitt touched the ball four times in the opening minutes, fumbled on both of the Bobcats' plays from scrimmage. Friona recovered both miscues, and turned them into points.

The Chieftain defense had handed Friona 14 points, and the FHS offense had rolled up 152 yards net offense in less than a quarter against a team that had allowed only 184 yards per game coming to Friona.

On their third possession, Dimmitt had its only good offensive gain of the night. Buckley hit wide receiver Sanders on a 57-yard play that moved the Bobcats from their own 24 to the Friona 19.

But the Chieftains were equal to the challenge. On a big fourth down play at the Chieftain 16, Quint Ellis sacked the quarterback for a 10-yard loss.

Friona moved to midfield and seemed enroute to another score. But Vega was hit on a pass play where the ball came out, the official ruled it a fumble, with Dimmitt recovering.

Aided by a 15-yard penalty on a fourth down play, the Bobcats drove to Friona's 22-yard line, but on another good defensive play,

Aaron King intercepted the ball deep in Friona's end of the field, and returned it to the 41-yard line.

The officials more or less took control of the game for most of the second quarter, and did more to slow up Friona's attack than the Bobcats could possibly do. The Chiefs were flagged five times for 50 yards.

But they got back on the scoreboard by moving 44 yards in six plays. Shelby raced 15 yards to the Dimmitt 41. Grimsley gained 11 yards in three plays, and Dan Cuevas ran 11 yards as the Chiefs moved steadily.

On the Dimmitt 24, Grimsley dropped back, arched the ball downfield, into Vega's waiting arms. The little speedster had no trouble getting into the end zone, for his --- touchdown of the year.

Proving it was Friona's night, the snap came low on the PAT try, bouncing right to Vega, who raced around the left side for two points instead of one. That sent the Chiefs into intermission with a 29-0 lead, as the Friona fans went wild.

Reverting to their first half traits, Dimmitt, thanks to a defensive hit by Ellis, fumbled the ball on its sixth offensive play of the third quarter, and Kendrick hopped onto the pigskin for the Chieftains at the Bobcat 27.

Grimsley gained eight yards, then ten on the option as the ball advanced to the 15. Grimsley and Kendrick alternated in having the ball, and it was Kendrick who crashed over from the six, and the lead went to 36-0 with Vega's fourth kick.

It was three downs and out for Dimmitt, thanks to defensive efforts by Ricardo Mendez, Fidel Rodriguez, Juan Santiago and Billy Varsity Defense Vs. Dimmitt

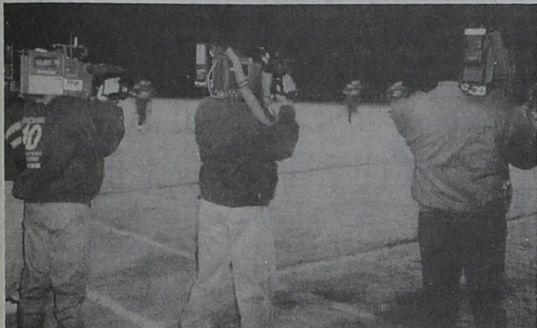

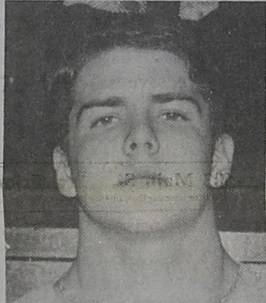

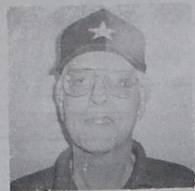

The front desk ladies dressed up in Halloween costumes last Thursday to cheer patients up on their way back to be stuck and prodded with needles and things.

The most amazing thing I heard was that Halloween is now the second highest "holiday" in terms of consumer spending. I can believe it. Did you check out the prices on a medium sized bag of miniature Snickers?

So how do we get rid of all trick-or-treaters over third grade age? Let's ask big government to help.

They will continue to grow Big Government because they are convinced that the government can and should solve all your problems.

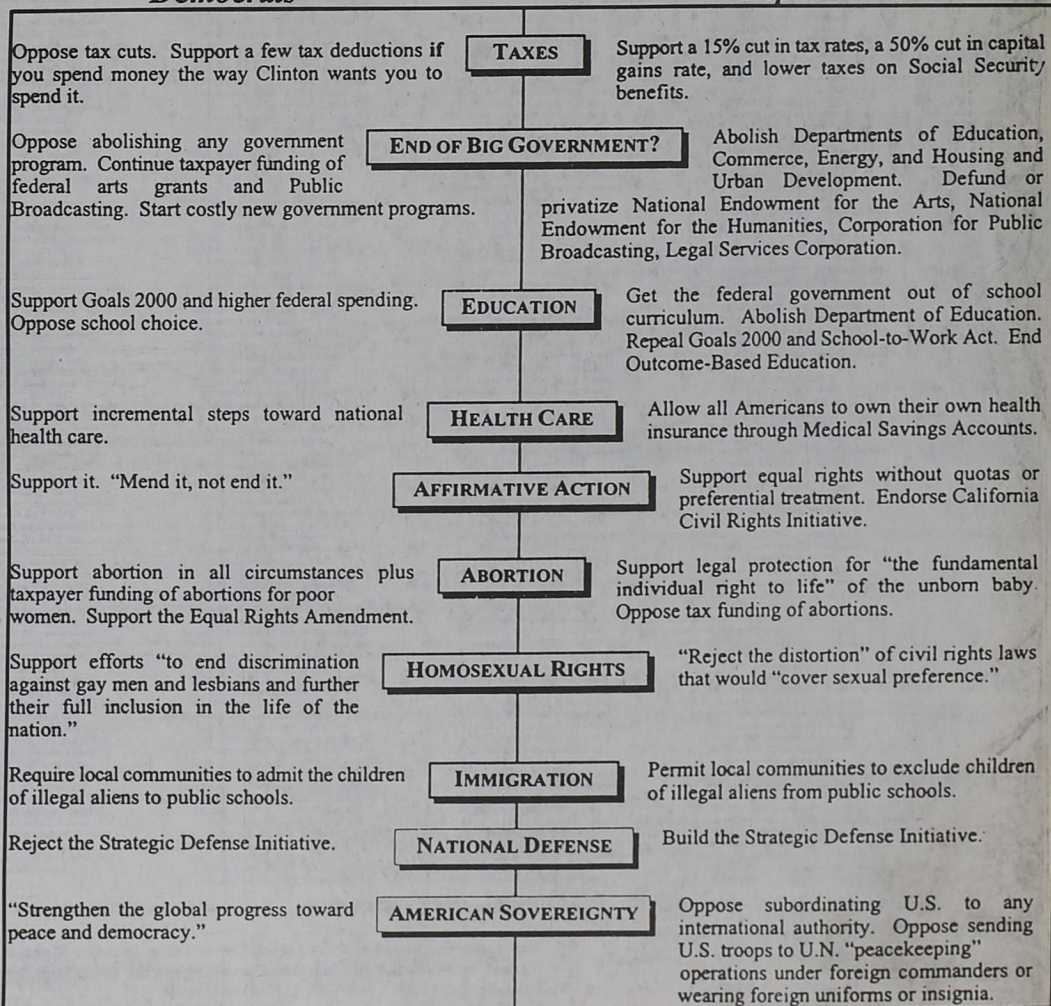

South Plains College will offer a course in Bottom Line Farming beginning December 16 in Friona to help area farmers learn more about borrowing to meet federal requirements.

The class will meet at 1 p.m. December 16 and December 18-21 at Friona State Bank under instruction of John Norwood.

A Farmers Home Administration law requires that all FHA direct and guaranteed borrowers complete and pass educational courses involving agricultural finance and agricultural production. The cost is \$350 per person. Enrollment is on a

first-come, first serve basis. Class size is limited to 25 persons per class.

Ron Presley, SPC assistant professor of agribusiness, developed the curriculum in conjunction with the Texas A&M Extension service and Texas Rural Communities.

The course includes 36 classroom hours and covers such topics as goal setting and priority management, interpretation and use of financial statements, strategic planning, operational planning and other practical aspects of farm management.

**Missing persons bureau--available** to inmates and the general public.

Locally, our chapter provides for transients and local residents in need of food, medications, gas and travel.

The chairman of the Parmer County chapter is John Blackwell and the secretary/treasurer is Shirley Ferguson.

The local representatives serve on a strictly volunteer basis and receive no remuneration for their time.

## YOUR EYES

### What Happens After Cataracts?

If, in time, the eye's natural lens is clouded, the usual choice today is to have the cataract removed. The procedure today is simpler and more successful than ever. Then what? The eye's lens must be replaced by another one, in order to focus light onto the retina so that the patient can see. Several options are available:

\*Glasses may be worn. These can enlarge the image the patient sees, but side vision is restricted.

\*Contact lenses may be worn to replace the natural lens. In most cases, soft or extended-wear lenses will be prescribed if they are appropriate, and if the patient is able to insert and remove them.

\*An intraocular lens can be implanted directly in the eye during surgery to serve as a permanent replacement for the natural lens.

In many cases, eyeglasses will still be needed to fine-tune vision. Though surgery is the province of the ophthalmologist, the optometrist often provides ongoing care and vision correction.

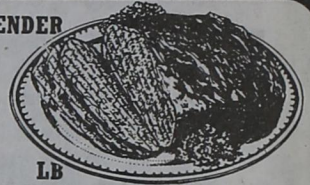

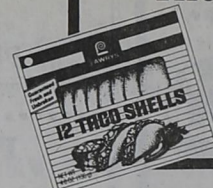
