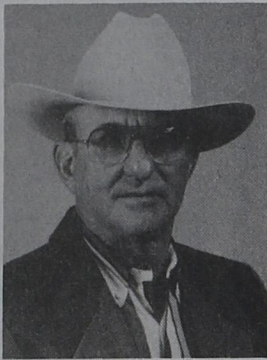

## County Has Good Election Turnout

While the main emphasis on last Tuesday's election was choosing the president for the next four years, there were some interesting local races that were decided, along with the county's stake in the state representative's race.

In Friona, incumbent commissioner Johnny Mars was unseated by challenger Johnny Tannahill by a 63-vote margin, 435 to 371. Tannahill was given a lead in the early voting box, 117-66, and then won Tuesday's voting at Precinct 101 by 13 votes, 318-305. Tannahill was running on the Republican ticket.

In the Farwell precinct (3), Jerry Davis, running on the Republican ticket, won with a total of 361 votes. Write-in candidate Ed Corn finished second in the voting with 248 votes, Democrat Lowell Primrose garnered 231 votes, and D. H. Foster, another write-in candidate, received 97 votes.

Doris Herington, incumbent tax assessor-collector, was re-elected after receiving 1683 votes to challenger Teresa Ancira's 1152.

Ancira won only the Friona 402 precinct, 76-70. She ran close in the other two Friona boxes, where Herington won Pct. 101, 326-285, and Pct. 202, 71-61. Mrs. Herington also scored a narrow win in the early voting, 302-291.

Hollis Cain, who lost his bid to unseat longtime state representative Pete Laney, none-the-less carried Parmer County, 1475-1318. Cain carried only Bailey and Parmer Counties, being from nearby Springlake. He made several campaign trips to the county.

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm, who has visited the county on several occasions, downed Victor Morales in the county, 2225-685. Morales probably got a lot of his statewide votes by having the same last name of state attorney-general Dan Morales.

U.S. Representative Larry Combest, who also has visited Friona on numerous occasions, easily won Parmer County, 2287-685.

As expected, the Bob Dole/Jack Kemp ticket was the big winner in the county. Dole/Kemp received 2042 votes, to 676 for Clinton/Gore. This was a winning percentage of 75.1.

A total of 2969 voters cast ballots in the election. This was 129 voters less than voted in the last presidential election (1992), when the total was 3098.

## Blood Drive Is Set Here Nov. 18

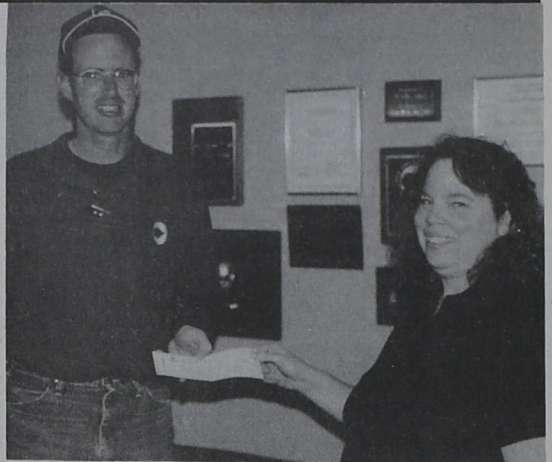
We are all aware that before someone can receive blood, someone special must give blood. Friona blood donors have always shared in this special Community Blood Drive.

## Chieftains Ready For Grid Playoffs

Having clinched the district title last Saturday with their 54-21 win over Perryton, the Chieftain football team has a chance to break new ground when they play at Sanford-Fritch Friday night.

With an 8-1 season record, the Chiefs have a chance to claim the school's best-ever regular-season record of 9-1 with a win over the Eagles. A win would also extend their current winning streak to nine, which also is an all-time best.

### 65 Yrs Ago-Nov. 6, 1931

Another firm of grain dealers has recently been organized in Friona, and is composed of O.G. Taylor and E.B. McLellan, and the new firm proposes to make grain, especially grain in the head, bring all it should for the farmers in this locality. They do their weighing at the Farmers Elevator, and their office is wherever they may be found, with their shingle hung on their car window.

### 60 yrs Ago-Nov. 6, 1936

To date, the cotton census reports show that there were 349 bales of cotton ginned in Parmer County from the 1936 crop prior to October 18, as compared to 213 bales ginned by the same date in 1935.

On Thursday night of last week, the Friona Chiefs met the valiant team from Melrose, N.M. on their first victory of the season, by a 37-0 score.

### 55 Yrs Ago-Nov. 7, 1941

One of the most apparent signs of the steady progress of Friona is completion of the new building erected by Dr. R.J. McReynolds, adjoining his residence on Main Street and housing Friona's new clinic. It is a neat and roomy structure, and houses a reception room, four bedrooms for patients, a consultation room, private office, operating room and X-ray laboratory.

### 50 Yrs Ago-Nov. 8, 1946

Last Friday night in a football game with Tulia, the Chieftains crowned their football queen, Miss Marcia Lutrell of the junior class. The pep squad, dressed in their red and white uniforms, formed a heart on the playing field. The queen and her attendants wore white. The queen was crowned by Dean Hall, captain of the football team. Tulia prevailed in the game by a score of 32-0.

### 45 Yrs Ago-Nov. 8, 1951

Survey work was commenced today on the new fire station for Friona, with actual construction to follow immediately. All bids recently were rejected by the city commissioners, and decision was made for the city to construct the building themselves.

### 40 Yrs Ago-Nov. 8, 1956

Texas agreed with the nation in returning President Eisenhower to his second term of office in the general election Tuesday, but it was a different story in predominantly agricultural Parmer County. Here, Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver, the Democratic nominees for the nation's two highest offices, took a clear cut victory. Democrats won in Friona by a 434-356 margin. Countywide, the count was 1372 votes for Stevenson-Kefauver and 1028 for Eisenhower-Nixon.

### 35 Yrs Ago-Nov. 9, 1961

An all-out drive to enroll the 20 additional members necessary before the construction of the Country Club House can begin will commence December 14, according to Andy Hurst, club president.

D.G. McClellan, local telephone maintenance man, received fractures in his ankle as a result of a fall from the top of the American Legion building Thursday.

### 30 Yrs Ago-Nov. 10, 1966

Friona and Parmer County voters turned out in heavy numbers for a non-presidential voting year to help return Senator John Tower to Washington and to favor Congressman-elect Bob Price. City and county voters gave both of the Republican candidates a surprisingly heavy majority. Seven of the eight precincts voted for the

two candidates. In Friona, Tower out-pollied Waggoner Carr, 446-226, and won the county vote, 1084-651. Price's margins were 476-179 in Friona and 1161-569 county-wide over Democrat Dee Miller.

### 25 Yrs Ago-Nov. 11, 1971

The procedure for purchasing right-of-way and making other necessary adjustments preliminary to the beginning of construction on the overpass for Highway 214 was discussed and outlined by right-of-way officials from the Texas Highway Department with city and county officials here last Thursday. The highway officials turned over to the City of Friona six tracts of land which have been approved by the State Highway Department for participation on the 50-50 right-of-way purchase, and two for the county.

### 20 Yrs Ago-Nov. 7, 1976

B.K. Buske has been named as manager of the Friona branch of Tri-County Savings & Loan Association. Buske assumed his new duties this week.

The Friona Area United Fund will hold its kickoff breakfast on Monday, November 8 at the Girl Scout House, 704 Ashland, beginning at 7:30 a.m. Keynote speaker for the kickoff breakfast will be Clint Formby, Hereford civic leader and broadcaster.

### 15 Yrs Ago-Nov. 8, 1981

A major accident involving two semi-truck trailer rigs occurred at about 4:30 a.m. Saturday morning, at Summerfield. Injured in the accident was Richard Allen White of Friona, who was operating a loaded feed truck at the time of the accident. The other driver was Douglas W. Bryan, 37, of Hereford. He was driving a cattle truck, which was also loaded. Bryan was pronounced dead at the scene.

A 16-year-old Bovina youth is being held in detention for ten days in the county jail in Farwell,

following robberies at Allsup's stores in Friona and Bovina, and a highspeed chase from Friona to Amarillo.

### 10 Yrs Ago-Nov. 8, 1986

The Friona Chieftains were playing at Floydada on Friday, needing to get past the Whirlwinds in order to stay in the running for a post season playoff spot. The Chiefs scored a one-sided, 45-0 victory at Dimmitt last Friday night. It was the second-worst defeat Friona ever handed Dimmitt in football, beaten only by a 49-0 Friona win 52 years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. R.L. Fleming formerly of Friona, were honored on the occasion of their 50th wedding anniversary with a family dinner in their home. The former Marie Beall and Raymond Lee Fleming were married October 25, 1936 in Clovis, New Mexico.

### 5 Yrs Ago-Nov. 9, 1991

Parmer County voters went against the trend of voters statewide when they opposed the creation of a state lottery in Tuesday's constitutional amendment election. The county vote was 829 opposed to 611 in favor. Statewide the vote carried, 64 percent to 36 percent.

Temperatures in the area hit a record low for the date last weekend. The mercury dipped to two degrees Sunday morning, when Amarillo set an all-time low for that date at seven degrees.

Friona High School's FFA Chapter continued their outstanding record in the District Leadership Contests recently at Texas Tech University. The Farm Radio, Senior Farm Skills, FFA Quiz, Junior Farm Skills, Junior Chapter Conducting and Senior Chapter Conducting departments each won first place banners at the district contests.

# 'Angel' Helps Chiefs Clinch District Title

It's becoming more clear as time goes along that one of the reasons the Friona Chieftains are winning this season is: they have an Angel on their side.

The Angel in question is junior wide receiver Angel Vega, who had one of those "career" games an athlete dreams of last Saturday against Perryton.

Vega caught five passes for 205 yards, scored three touchdowns, returned a punt 70 yards to set up another TD, punted twice for an average of 40 yards, and booted four points-after-touchdown.

This sparked the Chieftains to a 54-21 win over Perryton, which clinched the District 1-AAA title in Friona's first year as a member of the district. For his efforts, Vega was given "Player of the Week" honors by the Amarillo Globe-News.

The visiting Rangers, although having been bolstered in recent weeks by the return of several players, were still clearly over-matched.

Friona's first play from scrimmage was a hint of things to come. Quarterback Kyle Grimsley fired a 40-yard strike to Vega, who caught the ball despite close guarding. In just five more plays the Chieftains had taken the lead.

David Shelby ran 14 yards to the Perryton three, and from there Grimsley went over, fighting across the goal-line. Vega's kick hit the left upright, but Friona had taken a 6-0 lead after only 2:13 of play.

Cecil Cooper's sack of QB Trey Duke caused the Rangers to punt. The punter did his job, nailing a 45-yarder with the south breeze. But Vega fielded the kick, and set sail on his second "angelic" play of the game.

The 140-pound mighty-mite reversed his field, fought off several tackles, and after about 35 yards of his criss-crossing, found himself past midfield with some blockers still out front to help. He was finally shoved out of bounds at the Perryton ten.

On third down, Shane Blackburn sliced across the goal-line. Grimsley hit a wide-open Quint

Ellis for a two-pointer, and Friona had taken a 14-0 lead. The opening quarter was still less than half gone.

On Perryton's second play from scrimmage, Ellis separated the ball-carrier from the ball, and Jesus Mata pounced on it at Perryton's 30.

Blackburn gained 16, and Shelby took a pitchout 14 yards around the left side into the end zone. Vega's kick made it FHS 21, PHS 0. There was still 4:07 left in the opening quarter, and some of the visitors might have been thinking ahead to halftime, and what kind of dessert they were going to get at the cafeteria.

On the final play of the quarter, Grimsley and Vega hooked up with almost a carbon copy of their first offensive play, when Vega made one of his patented heart-stopping catches, this one a 37-yarder.

But this effort came up empty on the scoreboard, when the Chieftains lost their only fumble.

The Rangers took advantage of this break, driving 53 yards in nine plays. Allen Adkison made the TD, as the score became 21-7.

Friona responded to the challenge. Daniel Cuevas had gains of 10 and 15 on the drive, and then responded with a one-yard plunge for the score. Vega's kick was true and the Chieftains had a 28-7 lead.

That "almost" was the halftime score, but the Rangers burned Grimsley for his first interception of the season, and ran the ball about 50 yards for the score, to make the score at intermission 28-13.

Shane Blackburn returned the favor to the visitors by intercepting their first pass of the second half, and returned it 34 yards to the Perryton 36.

Andy Kendrick ran 30 yards on his only carry of the game, and Grimsley got the TD on a six-yard

keeper play. A high snap foiled the PAT, but Friona had built its lead to 34-13 with 9:08 left in the third.

The pass interception-short drive worked for two more Friona touchdowns. Aaron King got the second INT. Cuevas turned in a 20-yard run, and then it was time for Grimsley to dial "22." Vega caught the pass at the goal-line, and the score became 40-13 with 3:41 left in the third.

Next it was Orlando Rivera who gave Friona the ball on an interception near the Rangers' 30. Two plays later, it was Grimsley to Vega on one of his easier catches. Grimsley lofted the ball goal-ward, and the speedy Vega ran under it for his second TD of the game, and added the PAT for good measure: FHS 47, Perryton 13.

Both teams got one more score. The Rangers made a 75-yard drive, which accounted for much of their game yardage, to make it a 47-21 game on the final play of the third quarter.

Three plays into the fourth quarter, the Grimsley to Vega combination again paid off, for an awesome 72-yard scoring play. The ball was tipped, and Angel caught it on his second try, and then hot-footed it to the goal-line. His kick brought the score to 54-21.

Reserves played most of the

Rudy Torres, Mario Pina, Jose Baeza and Ismael Jurez each came up with six tackles. \* \* \* \*

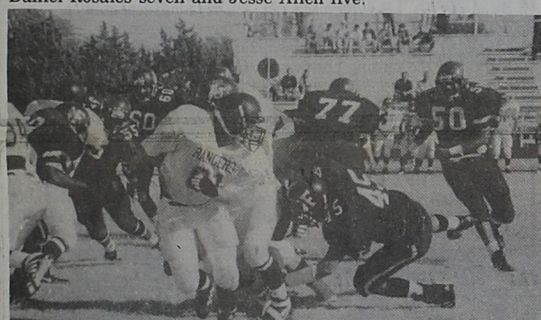
The freshman Chieftains downed Perryton, 22-14 in a game last week.

Landon Martin had a 43-yard reception and Tafoya gained 23 yards.

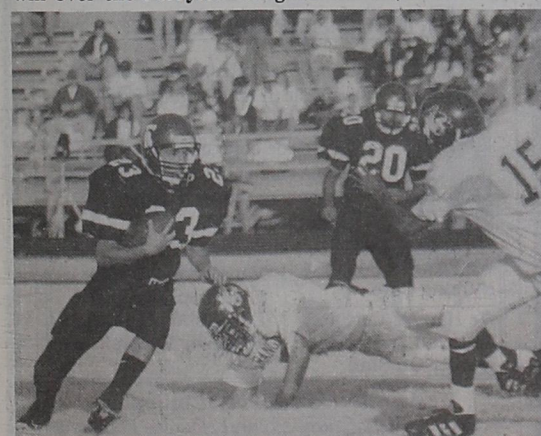

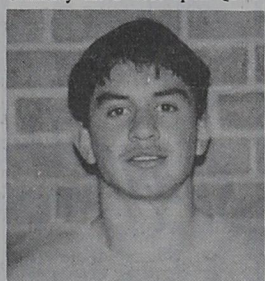

Dalhart and had lived in Amarillo since 1984. He was salutatorian of the 1973 graduating class at Dalhart High School.

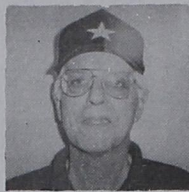

## November Shot Dates

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for November.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The vaccinations are available at the WIC Office, 704 Main St., Friona, on Friday, November 15 from 10-11:45 a.m. and 1-3:45 p.m.

## New Rules For School Examinations

The State Board of Education (SBOE) has enacted new rules requiring districts to offer examinations for acceleration, or credit by exam, for any student in grades K-12.

The rules require that students have the opportunity to take an examination to be accelerated to a higher grade level or to receive credit for a course he or she has not yet taken in school.

A student in grades 1-5 must score 90 per cent or above on a criterion-referenced test for the grade level to be skipped in each of the following areas: language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies.

In grades 6-12, credit is awarded if the student scores 90 per cent or above on a criterion-referenced examination for the course. Other requirements for acceleration are that a district representative, a teacher or administrator, must recommend that the student be accelerated; and the student's parent or guardian must give written consent.

All tests cover the essential elements for the grade level or course and must be a State Board approved test from a university.

Testing dates scheduled for credit by exam for the school year 1996-97 are November 16 and 23, December 14, April 12, May 28, and June 18. Students planning to take an examination for acceleration must register with the principal no later than 30 days prior to the scheduled testing date on which the student wishes to take the test.

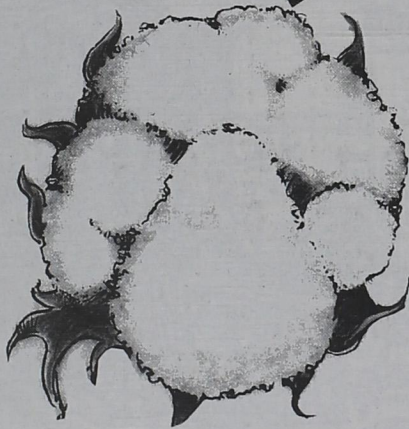
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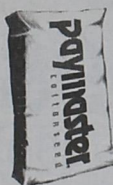

## Parmer SWCD To Sponsor Contests

Each year at this time, the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District sponsors a coloring, poster and essay contest for the school children in Parmer County. The Parmer County S.W.C.D. sponsors these contests each year to encourage soil and water conservation and help the children become aware of such concerns at a young age while making it fun and rewarding for them.

Kindergarten through second grades will have a coloring contest. The entries will be judged from each school. There will be a first, second and third place winner from each grade in each school and they will receive ribbons. The top entries will then be judged county-wide. The first, second and third place county winners will receive trophies.

Third grade through sixth grades will have a poster contest. The posters will be on a 22"x14" poster board. The themes for this year are "Harmony: People and Places" and "Backyard Stewardship." The "Harmony: People and Places" theme stresses the relationship between people and their environment.

The "Backyard Stewardship" theme emphasizes how successful soil and water conservation is accomplished by individuals, farmers and ranchers, working together to provide a healthy environment.

Seventh grade through twelfth grades will have an essay contest. The essay contest will be "Soil and Water Conservation." This title includes, but is not limited to, the following general concept: the soil and water resources of

this nation are vital for providing us with the necessities of food and shelter.

The entries will be judged in two categories per school. Seventh and eighth grades will be category one and ninth through twelfth grades will be category two. Each category will have a first, second and third place winner and they will receive ribbons. ## Screening Date Set November 26

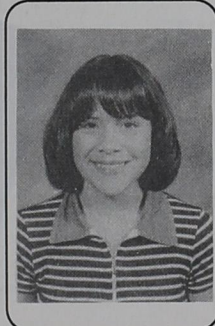
The Women's center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at Parmer County Hospital, 1307 Cleveland Avenue in Friona on November 26.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing a breast self-exam each month.

## Friona Fifth Graders Study Conservation

Fifth-grade students at Friona Elementary School are learning to be "water wise" by participating in a pilot urban water conservation education program sponsored by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock.

The program, "Learning To Be Water Wise," is designed to encourage water conservation through the use of hands-on experience and classroom education.

"At school, various activities will teach the students the importance of water conservation. This learning will be transferred to the home when children—with parental assistance—install low-flow showerheads and sink aerators provided to them at no charge as part of this program. Both parents and students will discover ways to conserve water," said Carmon McCain, High Plains Water District Information/Education Director.

Instructor Sheryl Taylor is teaching Water Wise to 102 students in Friona ISD—one of four school districts participating in the program. The other school districts are

Hale Center, Lubbock-Cooper and Morton.

Some of the activities included in the Water Wise curriculum include checking showerhead flow rates, determining the application efficiency of a lawn watering system, calculating the amount of water used each day through normal use of the shower, the bath tub, the toilet, and the bathroom sink, and conducting a home energy and water use audit.

Students are expected to complete the water unit just before the Thanksgiving holiday.

Data collected from this pilot education program will be used to determine if the Water Wise program should be expanded to include the remainder of the 15-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District service area.

"This educational program reinforces our belief that water conservation is best accomplished through public education. It is our hope that the Learning To Be Water Wise program will teach area children how to save our precious water resources," said McCain.

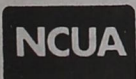

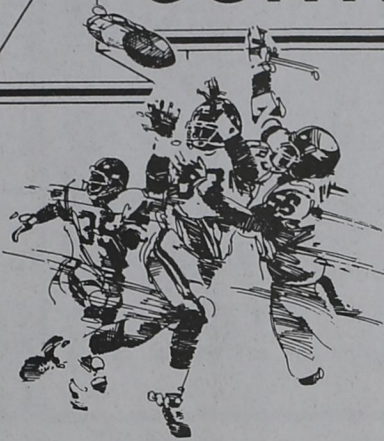

## What Is Macular Degeneration?



The macula is a tiny area in the retina composed of millions of light receptor cells. This is the key to central vision, what we use for reading, recognizing faces, even watching TV. As we age, these light receptor cells weaken. By age 60, nearly one-third of adults have some signs of macular degeneration and nearly nine per cent have lost some central vision.

For most people, the changes are slow, painless and largely untreatable. But not always, which is why it's important to see your eye doctor promptly after any vision change.

One form of macular degeneration, the so-called "wet" form, moves faster as fluid leaks from blood vessels in a membrane in the retina. Prompt treatment is needed to save the patient's vision, though the condition may recur.

Can macular degeneration be prevented? Doctors recommend wearing sunglasses outdoors and avoiding smoking.

## Protect Your Future With Long-term Care Insurance

Many individuals who have made sound insurance decisions — insuring their health, home and cars — fail to protect themselves and their families from the high cost of extended nursing-home or in-home health care costs. Often, these people mistakenly believe "it will never happen to me." However, the facts are:

- nearly 50 percent of Americans age 65 and over will spend some time in a nursing home, and
- one in four Americans is expected to require an extended stay in a nursing home.

With the cost of nursing-home care averaging \$36,000 annually and the average stay lasting nearly three years, the price tag can easily exceed \$100,000. In-home care also can be expensive — and emotionally draining on family members, as well. Contrary to the popular belief that Medicare will cover most nursing-home expenses, it actually pays an average of only 2 percent of that cost.

About 70 percent of single people who enter a nursing home are impoverished within one year, and about 50 percent of all couples are impoverished within a year of one spouse entering a nursing home.

Fortunately, there is an alternative to depleting your financial reserves. Long-term care insurance covers a wide range of medical, personal and supportive services for individuals who need help with normal daily activities. Benefits are payable for care provided in a nursing home or assisted-care facility, and also may include care at home. Long-term care insurance is generally suitable for people age 50 to 84 who need to protect assets that would be vulnerable in the event of a nursing-home stay.

The rapid growth of this segment of the population (currently about 6,000 people turn 65 every day, and the number of people over 65 will double in just over 30 years) has fueled the growth in the number and variety of long-term care insurance plans. However, because not all such insurance plans are created equal, it's important to be selective in choosing your provider. Some of the factors to evaluate include:

- **Quality** — Any insurance company you select should be financially solid and have strong ratings from the major rating agencies. This means at least "A" or better from A.M. Best or Standard & Poor's.
- **Track record** — Find out what percentage of claims the company historically has paid and how quickly claims are settled.
- **Premiums** — Virtually all companies reserve the right to raise their rates, but look for one that has a long track record of relatively stable rates.
- **Benefit triggers** — Avoid policies stating that insurance benefits are contingent upon some "medical necessity." Rather, look for a policy specifying that benefits kick in upon illness or injury, cognitive impairment or inability to perform normal daily functions.

Once you have selected an insurance provider, you'll need to determine your level of coverage, including the daily benefit amount, the length of coverage and the number of days you pay out-of-pocket before benefits begin. These are all decisions that should be based on your particular situation and preferences.

The emotional toll of a nursing-home stay is high enough without the added burden of financial worries. Long-term care insurance can help protect you and your family from the financial costs of an extended illness or nursing-home stay, leaving you better prepared to cope with the emotional costs.
