## INSPECT ROUTE

### SOUTHERN PACIFIC RAILROAD OFFICIALS TO INSPECT PROPOSED NEW ROUTE

It has been announced at Fort Davis, Texas, that the committee sent by that city together with the committee which went from Marfa to Houston, to confer with President Fay of the Southern Pacific-Sunset Lines, regarding the project of building a line of railroad from Marfa to Fort Davis, thence to Pecos. That President Fay with party will make an examination of the project soon after January first, and if the project is feasible and would make a good paying line, will be built. The cost of such a line would be extremely large, owing to mountains and other difficulties, but it is agreed that a big summer resort transportation business in the way of resort seekers could be built up. Fort Davis is to be congratulated on getting this far in the matter, and it is generally believed that the road will be constructed. It is believed that if the road decides to build to a Texas & Pacific connection, after reaching Fort Davis, that Pecos, because of its logical location and accessibility, would be the only point considered. The whole matter is now up to the decision of the proper Southern Pacific officials but it is believed that the road will be built, and that the Southern Pacific will enter Fort Davis soon, and later to Pecos.

## EXPERIMENTAL FARM IMPROVEMENTS

Supt. H. C. Stewart of the Experimental Station informed a Record reporter that they are making many needed improvements on the farm, and that the equipment for next years work will be very much better.

The installation of a modern pumping plant, good sheds for the farming tools, improvements on the cottages, better and larger barns for stock and crops and many other changes.

Supt. Stewart is proving himself master of the situation and the people of Reeves county are to be congratulated on securing the services of one so progressive and enterprising.

## OUR SOFT WATER

### SAMPLES OF AVARY AND RITZ WATER GOES FORWARD OTHER TO FOLLOW

A representative of the Commercial Club appeared before the City Fathers at the last meeting of the Council in regard to the soft water situation. Letters were shown covering different analyses of water sent to water softening companies, and it was asked that the city agree to pay for some of the future analyses made and after a short talk made by Mayor Prewit, the council made an appropriation in the matter.

Since the meeting samples of the Avary water, the Chris Ritz Water, Shaft water and others have been sent to the University of Texas. Analysis of the Sparks water has been received. It is a good water in many respects.

A representative of the Pittsburgh Filter Mfg. Co, is expected in Pecos soon. This representative will confer with the city council regarding the soft water situation. Rev. Jasper T. Moses of Carlsbad had put his water in competition with others as a soft water for Pecos. His well is located about 15 miles West of Pecos.

The T. & P. Ry. has agreed to terrace the depot park, so it will be left to the people to plant the trees and grass. The company will also furnish the water. This is a move in the right direction, so let's do our part in beautifying.

**GREAT MEETING OF COMMERCIAL CLUB**

That was a big meeting and so much accomplished and all for the real good of Pecos. The meeting Thursday night of last week at the Commercial Club rooms—the first monthly meeting of the organization. After the minutes of the annual meeting were read and adopted and after every available seat and sitting place in the rooms was full, the Carnegie Library Committee submitted its report and showed that a total of \$1240.00 has been subscribed to date for the site for the library and that of the same \$1080.50 had been collected. Motion carried that committee be instructed to continue work until completed. Many visitors were present.

Then in rapid fire order, the meeting took care of in A1 shape the Good Roads Matter, the Fair for 1912, the soft water situation and several minor matters. The beauty of the whole meeting was the harmony, the spirit, the enthusiasm, the "do it for Pecos" idea. An elaborate discussion of the good roads matter occurred, and on motion made by Will P. Brady, a recess was taken and a Good Roads Association formed. Great enthusiasm prevailed and when it was decided to see how many present would join such an association, 26 enrolled. Dr. Jim Camp and F. W. Johnson were placed in nomination for President of the Association. Mr. Johnson in discussing the exceptional fitness of Dr. Camp for President withdrew his own name, and Dr. Camp was unanimously elected. H. B. Link was elected secretary.

W. P. Brady then jumped into the Fair matter and it is no exaggeration to say that his topic was received with applause. The Record has not sufficient space at this time to tell all the good things said and done regarding the Fair, in which discussion many people joined, but it can be tritely said that the stock capitalization plans suggested by Mr. Brady was adopted and the following were elected as officers: Will P. Brady, President, R. S. Johnson, Vice-President, F. W. Johnson, Treasurer, Porter A. Whaley, Secretary. Power was conferred on the President and Vice-President to select a working committee.

Soft water situation was discussed and very satisfactory reports and progress submitted on same. Committee was instructed to go ahead with the work. The Record believes that shortly a plan will be given to the public by which this matter will be settled.

Parking of the depot grounds, proposition of American Refrigerator Transit Co., Texas Land Fair matter, Lake Mohawk Arbitration matter, etc., were considered and action taken or deferred.

The Record regrets that neither space nor time will permit a more detailed report of the way of this fine meeting. The Record is proud of the meeting and proud of the aggressive citizenship of Pecos, working harmoniously together for the common good, and for the betterment of the "City Talked About."

#### GOOD ROADS PAY

Let those who are not willing to vote a bond issue for the purpose of building good roads read the following extract from a Tennessee paper:

"Bradley county, with a population of 16,000, issued \$90,000 in bonds in 1900. There was bitter opposition, but before the money was half spent, the amount was increased to \$116,000, selling for \$120,000. Before roads were built land went begging at from \$8 to \$10 an acre and now sells for from \$15 to \$30 per acre.

This seems to be an argument for building good roads that is hard to refute when we consider that farms in ten years increased over a hundred per cent in value while the rural population increased only 3.5 per cent. The remarkable rise in value cannot be attributed to increased population.

If we are not our brother's keeper, we should at least be interested in his prosperity when we realize that our own success is largely dependent on his. So let's patronize home industries and help everybody—ourselves included.

## FIVE SIMPIL RULES

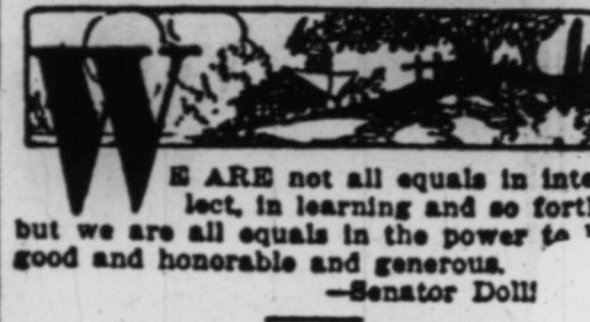

**SUMMER DESSERTS.**  
 During the warm weather months we like food that is both attractive, refreshing and satisfying. Cold desserts of all kinds are popular at this season.

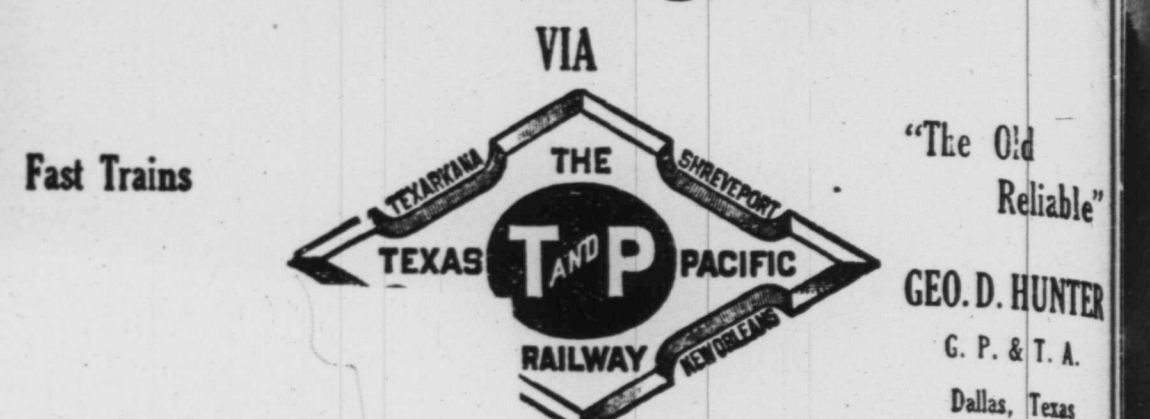
A very pretty and tasty dessert was discovered one day when a coffee custard had been carelessly left too long over the heat and curdled slightly. The custard was at once removed to a cool dish and whipped with the egg beater until smooth. Of course, it was too thin to serve as planned, so a few slices of bananas were placed in the bottom of some sherbet cups and the custard poured over them, then three overlapping slices were arranged on top. The combination of coffee and banana flavor was a surprise.  
 One could use any bits of fruit at hand, as strawberries, pineapple or any fruit that is liked.

**Banana Cantaloupe.**—Soak two table spoonfuls of granulated gelatine in one-fourth of a cup of cold water; dissolve in one cup of hot cream. Add a cup of sugar, three egg whites well beaten, six mashed bananas and a fourth of a cup of lemon juice. Chill and, as it begins to thicken, fold in the whip from a pint of cream. Line a melon mold with lady fingers, add the cream mixture, chill and serve Garnish with cherries.

**Rice and Coconut Custard.**—Put half a cup of well-washed rice into a double boiler with three pints of milk. Let it cook until very soft, then set aside to cool. Beat together five eggs leaving out the whites of two, add one cupful of sugar and one of grated coconut. Stir in the cold rice mixture and bake in the oven to a soft custard. Make a meringue of the two whites and six table spoonfuls of powdered sugar; pile on top of the pudding and set back in the oven to brown delicately.

**Blenheim Pudding.**—Make a custard of one egg, a table spoonful of sugar and a cup of milk. Butter a pudding dish and put in a layer of jam; over this put slices of buttered bread and some raisins. Pour over the custard and bake until the custard is of a creamy consistency.

**The KITCHEN CABINET**



It is not the good that we do, but the spirit in which we do it that counts in our character building.

There are some people that never do a kind act without acting as if it were a great drain upon them.

**VEAL DISHES.**

Veal should be at least six weeks old to be wholesome, one reason that it is so often hard to digest is because it is imperfectly masticated.

Veal With Tomatoes.—Cut two and a half pounds of veal in cubes and salt them. Heat in a kettle some sweet fryings or fresh butter. Put in the meat and brown; add an onion, two tomatoes, one carrot and a piece of celery root or stalk, all cut fine. Add four tablespoonfuls of sour cream, a tablespoonful of vinegar and let the whole simmer for an hour or two. Just before serving add a tablespoonful of flour cooked with a little cream.

A veal breast makes a nice roast. Cut slits in the meat next the bone, to make pockets to hold the stuffing, and roast with a slice or two of salt pork laid over the meat while roasting.

Veal Goulash.—Cut three pounds of veal into pieces and salt them. Fry brown in a kettle with a little butter, with two sliced onions. Add a teaspoonful of paprika, dredge with flour, add stock or boiling water and simmer for an hour or two.

Veal Loaf.—Take three pounds of lean veal, one and a half pounds of uncooked ham, three eggs well beaten, three crackers rolled fine, one teaspoonful of salt, half a teaspoon of pepper, three tablespoonfuls of cream, three tablespoonfuls of boiling water. Mix all together thoroughly; grease the pan well and pack in the meat. Bake two and a half hours. Serve either hot or cold.

Veal Glace.—This is a good hot-weather dish. Cook two pounds of veal two hours in a pint of water in a fireless cooker; season well and remove. Cut off all the meat from the bones and put it through the meat chopper. Soak a half a box of gelatin in a cup of cold water. Add the juice of a lemon, and when it begins to harden stir in the veal. Place in a mold and set away to cool. This may be served in slices on lettuce as a salad.

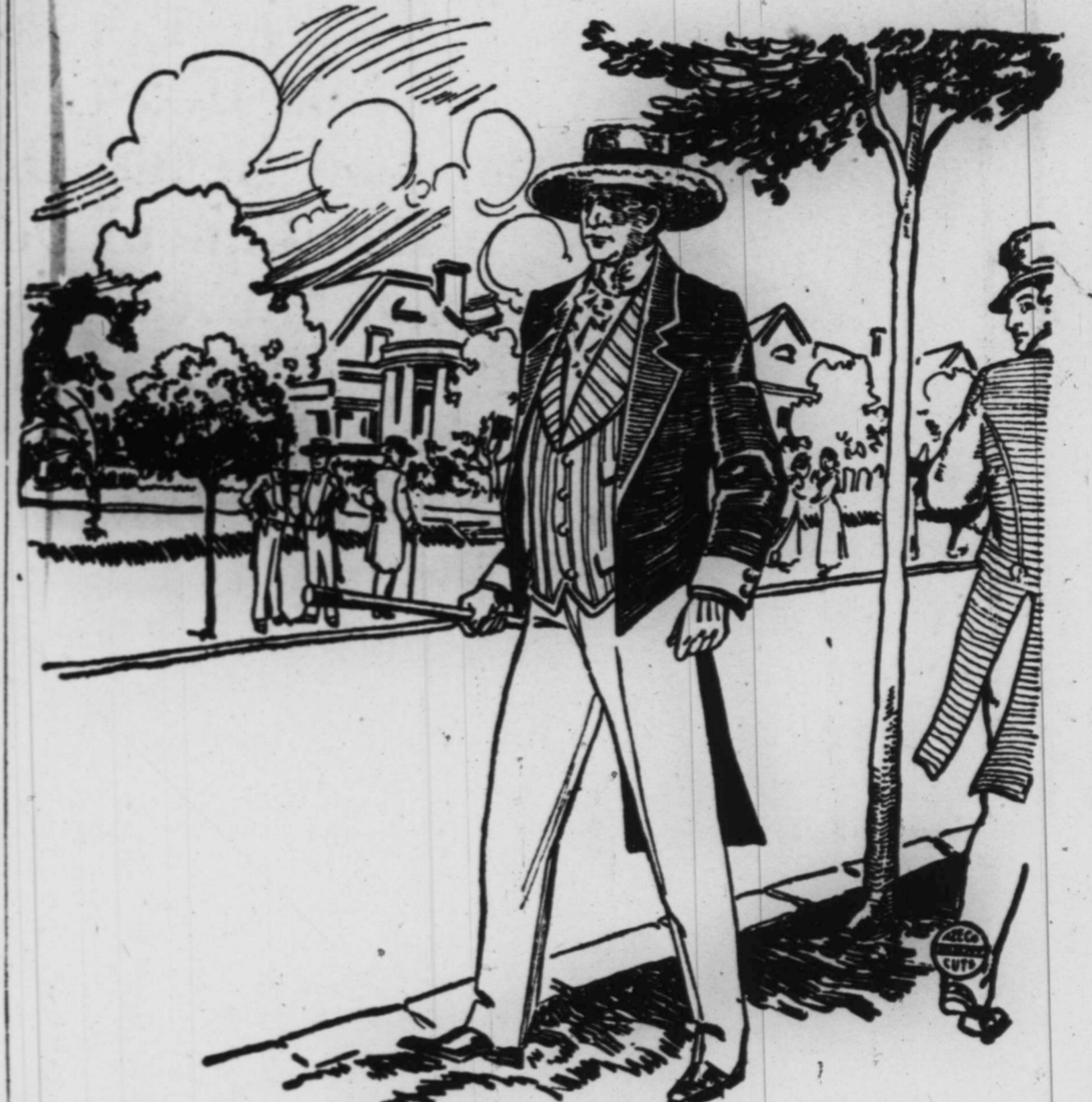

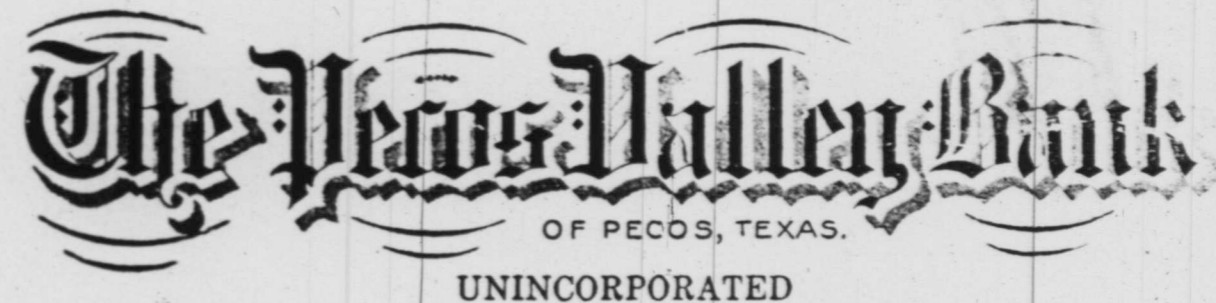
