

MISDIRECTED ENTHUSIASM. In the United States senate while the amendment to the constitution providing for a single term for President, was being discussed, Senator Bristow, of Kansas, offered an amendment for the recall of Presidents. The proposition only received ten votes and reactionaries all over the country, journalistic and otherwise, are very exuberant and say the recall principle of government is losing ground and

This is a very unfair view to take of the situation, but is typical of the arguments of the reactionaries. As a matter of fact, the democratic platform committed the party to a single term and every senator with progressive principles was anxious to have it enacted into law. No party platform has ever declared for the recall of Presidents and it has never been an issue in a campaign.
