DAIRYING FOR THE

One hears of thousands and thousands of cows being bought by bankers and business men for the farmers of the Southwest, yet, not near enough butter, cream, and milk is being produced for the home market. There is now a milk famine in El Paso in spite of the highest prices paid for milk of any place in the United States.

There are probably about 2000 pounds of creamery butter a month brought into Reeves County, and very large amounts into the other counties of West Texas.

The dairy cow will bea! all animals, perhaps, in condensing the coarse grasses, hay, alfalfa, etc., into a concentrated marketable product that will bear transportation, if need be, long distances. Fortunately, here we have a market clamoring at our very door. About Pecos there is barely enough milk produced to afford everybody plenty for their coffee.

One dairy near here is producing 3-4 of a pound of butter for each cow, and feeding nothing, only allowing them to run on alfalfa a few hours a day, and on native grass pasture the balance of the time. If a cow gives milk 300 days a year. this would make 225 pounds of butter a year, worth about \$75. This feed can be had for about a cent a pound, so there can be fine profits in feeding hogs a present prices of grain.

One hog raiser near here cuts his alfalfa and feeds to his hogs in a lot along with a little grain. He reports the results much more satisfactory than he gets from grazing. As long as grain can be had at present prices it will undoubtedly pay well to feed 2 pounds grain a day for each hundred pounds live weight of hogs while grazing alfalfa. One pound of gain ought to be gotten for each 2 pounds of grain fed in this way, and an acre of alfalfa capable of cutting 3 tons hay, ought to support enough hogs to gain 1500 or 2000 pounds in a season. Handling hogs in this way, a 200 pound hog can be turned off at about 7 months of age.

It may be in order to get chear grain, farmers will need to cooperate and buy in carload lots.



John J. Carty, chief engineer of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, has today received a cablegram from H. E. Shreeve, taht wireless telephone messages sent out by Bell engineers from the wireless station at Arlington, Va., were received at the Effel tower in Paris. Satisfactory talk was carried on by means of the apparatus under Mr. Carty's direction, B. B. Wbb one of the Bell engineers spoke and was heard by several of the French officials and by H. E. 

Ralph Peters On Railway Mail Pay



as soon as the American people realize that the whole subject, while seemingly complicated and technical, boils down to a few simple points of fair business dealing which no one need be a rate expert to understand. The first is that the Post Office Department weighs the mails, and re-

adjusts the pay of the railroads, only once in four years. This compels the railroads to carry the increase in the mail tonnage during the intervening years without pay-manifestly an injustice in the case of a rapidly growing D. 1915, then and there to answer a business. One consequence has been that last year the railroads carried fully half the parcel post for nothing.

A second point is this: In addition to carrying the mails, the railroads are required to operate many travelling post offices for sorting and distributing the mails while in transit. But the Post Office Department pays for such post offices only where they occupy whole cars, and pays nothing in the many cases in which it merely requires the use of post office apartments in combination cars, although such apartments differ from the full railway post office cars only in size. More than 4,200 apartments of this character have been fitted up, and are maintained for the exclusive use of the Post Office Department. Failure to pay for them has been an especial hardship to the smaller roads on which the Department does not find it necessary to utilize whole cars.

One last point: In thousands of instances (though not in all) the Post Office Department requires the railroads to carry the mails back and forth between railroad stations and post offices, but pays them nothing for this extra service beyond the rates covering the rail transportation. The railroads have no choice but to perform this additional service gratis, or re-

fuse to carry the mails at all. Now for the remedies the railroads ask: They do not ask to have the mails weighed daily, or to have each shipment weighed and paid for separately, as is done in the case of private shippers. They merely ask to have the mails weighed, and the pay of the railroads adjusted, at least once a year, instead of once in four years. They also ask that apartment post office cars be paid for, at reasonable rates, according to size. Lastly, they ask that the Post Office Department cease to require of them free messenger service between stations and post offices, and either relieve them of this service or pay fairly for it. These are the reforms the railroads ask of Congress. They gladly lay these reforms before the public, confident that they,
